


Photo Fringe wanted to find an artist to make a new piece of art for the festival.

- working with people








The new piece of work also had to be on the festival theme of *Real Utopias*.

After speaking to a few artists, they selected Anne-Marie Atkinson.


She is an artist based in Leeds in the North of England.

The people who work with learning disabled people, such as artists and support workers, were also invited to take part.




Anne-Marie collected 120 pieces of art from 81 different people.

Dorset Place during the festival).



Anne-Marie brought all of these pieces of art together in a digital collage.




The collage brings lots of different people's ideas together about what a Real Utopia could be like.



The collage is presented on a website online.




The website changes the images in the collage randomly, so it always looks different.




The website address is written to the right.




During the Photo Fringe festival, the collage is also being shown as a projection at Brighton CCA Dorset Place.
