- 1. I am not a scientist, nor do I claim to be, but I do not understand how OHV could stir up so much "dust" that it would travel miles away and cause any effects whatsoever.
- 2. The more acres of the Dunes that are closed the more heavily concentrated are the OHV in that area. If more area was opened up further South there would be less concentration of dust if that was an issue, but I still don't believe it is.
