





Reflecting nationwide trends, TMHA saw the demand for mental health services increase during the last 4 months of the Fiscal Year, while the majority of our programs converted to telehealth delivery.

10,821 10,037

Crisis calls did not significantly increase during the first 4 months of the pandemic.

Outreach & Education

12,305 people received outreach and education in SLO County.

1,457 of these individuals were teachers and students who received mental health training or education through our High School Program.
