They stayed in our community for the weekend before they continued their journey unto Chisasibi on Monday, February 29th. Chisasibi would be their final destination and is expected to be reached on Friday, March 4th, 2016.



Before they left Wemindji, community members gathered to wish them well on their path and offered a prayer for a safe and prosperous journey. It was a great experience to witness their departure from the riverbank. It brought back good memories for many people recalling the ways of our people long ago before dog sleds, snowmobiles and such.

The TCI mine's HR staff have been reminded that they must always be honest and to ensure to let employees know of any upcoming plans or changes by Goldcorp. Also to always ensure to defend and justify positions at the mine when possible. Based on the price of the production of gold, they should not be doing that bad.

The current price of gold is only a small factor of the layoffs. To reach a profit and increase reinvestments to the mine's development, Goldcorp is in the process of becoming more efficient. Goldcorp and its production of Gold is in US dollars, which is currently higher than the Canadian dollar.

To prevent the future miscommunication, TCI and Goldcorp will limit verbal information and communications. To improve this area all communications and information will have written documentation in the form of minutes for meetings and agreements.

Tawich Construction Incorporated is scheduled to be presenting at the next Community meeting that will be announced by the Cree Nation of Wemindji. TCI will have a booth set up to answer any questions, or provide updates on our Strat Plans, for the upcoming projects and training. Extra-curricular Activities






SMART Goals

Another path to student success MES is working on is through the planning and implementation of SMART Goals. "SMART Goals" stands for "Specific Measured Attainable Realistic Time-bound Goals". These goals are set within each cycle and through careful assessment, planning, intervention strategies, frequent check-ins and reflection; teachers are able to establish and monitor a common academic goal to work on over an 8-week period. For example, Cycles 1 and 2 chose to focus their SMART Goal on increasing fluency in reading. The Cycles set a goal for their students to achieve at the start of the sequence, implemented great activities and intervention strategies to help their students achieve these goals, checked-in frequently over an 8-week period with students to monitor the effectiveness of these strategies and intervene where necessary, and at the end of the sequence, measured the overall success of the goal! Students have shown incredible growth through the implementation of these goals in both Secondary and Elementary sectors and in all academic disciplines, including Cree Language and Culture, Phys-Ed, Math and Science and English Language Arts. Keep up the great work MES Staff and Students!

Wemindji: Home Sweet Home

I am what most would describe as a homebody. I put down roots, I establish myself, I make a home and I get comfy. I have definitely gotten comfy in Wemindji. When I first moved to Wemindji in August of 2012, I didn't plan on staying longer than a few years. I had been hired by the Cree School Board to teach at Maquatua Eeyou School for Grade 2. I was a fresh graduate of an Ontario teacher's college and was anxiously looking to find full-time teaching work. The CSB answered this call and I decided to throw caution to the wind and give it a try! I had lived away from the family home for years at this point, and Wemindji certainly wasn't the farthest I had ever lived away from them before, but it was certainly the most "exotic" location I had found myself settling in.

It was a big move. I had an apartment in Mississauga - a suburb of Toronto, a long-term relationship and was very close to my small family and friends. Moving here meant I was going to say "see ya!" to those people for a long time, but I was looking for a change and felt a strong pull to Wemindji. I was lucky to have interviewed in-person here in June of 2012 and got a good taste of what life would be like.

What made me most comfortable with the idea of a 1500+km, cross-provincial move from my southern home to my new digs on Beaver Road were the people I was joining here. During my stay here for the interview I was welcomed into future co-worker's homes, treated to a tour of the community and school and shown the beauty of this Wemindji - all by enthusiastic promoters of the town. Seeing Wemindji with the sun shining, the sky a beautiful blue and a crisp breeze, no nearby busy highways or sky scrapers, no traffic jams or honking horns - I was hooked. The fact that I would be teaching in my very own classroom was icing on the cake! I was excited to start my career in such a beautiful place.

Nothing could have prepared me however for the powerful connections I would make with the people of this community. Immediately I was welcomed here by staff and students and their families. Teachers at school embraced me and instantly became second family. My students and I quickly formed bonds that still exist today, years later. Families of students took interest in my origins and made effort to greet me outside of school. In this small community I felt at home. As the years have passed, it has only gotten better. I have formed deeper bonds with my friends here, built relationships with others in the community and established a feeling of belonging in a place so very far from where I was born and raised.

The point I am trying to get across is that Wemindji is full of amazing people. This is a unique place to live, if you are not already from the area. Wemindji is a place like no other existing on the planet. Coming from a busy suburb where you hardly know your neighbours' names to a place where you are more than likely to run into parents and students at the grocery store while wearing your PJs made me re-evaluate my description of community. I have never felt more at home. I have never felt the kindness and generosity of strangers and friends alike in a place like this before.



Most of you reading this may not know me very well but for those of you who do know me, you know that I am a little accident prone - to say the least. I have had more than my fair share of automobile mishaps and physical injuries. Each time I have encountered a roadblock, I have been helped by the people of Wemindji in the most kind and generous ways. During the winter is when I have found myself most at the mercy of others. I'd like to point out that my driveway seems to be located in a snow drift weather warp of some kind which means that even the tiniest gust of wind relocates feet of snow neatly in the way of me driving out.

Now, more than once I have been physically unable to clear my own driveway due to some sort of injury or another. What never ceases to amaze and humble me is when a friend or complete stranger comes to shovel or plow me out – and this has happened on many occasions and each time I am nearly brought to tears by the gesture! (Shoveling is one of my most loathed tasks, so this means A LOT to me). Even today as I took a break writing this, a friendly snow removal man came by and helped me tackle the giant mountain of accumulated snow left at the end of my driveway by yesterday's blizzard! There are good people everywhere.

Whether its when I've hurt myself or damaged my car, or just in need, I am always asked with genuine concern if I am okay, if I need anything, is there anything that person can do. I know that if I needed something from someone in this community, people would rally to help me. I recognize this quality in the people of Wemindji and I try to do the same. I know that my family away from family is here for me. I know this place I call home is ready to help me because that is what Wemindji, I feel, is all about.

I am proud to call Wemindji my home. I am a proud Wemindjian, and grateful for the acceptance from the community and excited to see what the future holds for me in this wonderful community.



Lentil Soup Recipe

Preparation Time: 10 minutes

Cook time: 45 minutes

Total time: 55 minutes

Serving size: 8 servings

Ingredients

½ cup - olive oil

2 - large carrots, diced

2 - celery stalks, diced

1 - medium onion, diced

3 - cloves garlic, minced

2 cups- low sodium vegetable/
chicken broth

½ can – tomato paste

1 cup – green or brown lentils

2 bay leaves

1 teaspoon - thyme

1 cup - frozen spinach

Salt and pepper to season

1 tablespoon - white vinegar

Preparation

1. Rinse lentils in cool water.
2. Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium; heat until shimmering, about 3 minutes.
3. Add the celery, carrot, onion and cook; stirring occasionally, until the vegetables have softened, about 10 minutes.
4. Stir in the garlic and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute. Season with pinches of salt and pepper.
5. Add the broth, tomatoes with their juices, tomato paste, lentils, bay leaves, thyme and spinach, and stir to combine. Cover and bring to a simmer, about 15 minutes.
6. Once simmering, reduce the heat to low and continue simmering, covered, until the lentils and vegetables are soft, about 15 minutes more.
7. Taste and season with more salt or pepper as needed, and then stir in the vinegar.

If you prefer a creamier texture, purée half of the soup in a blender and add it back to the pot.

Tofu Sandwich

Preparation Time: 10 minutes

Servings: 6



Ingredients

- 4 - hard boiled eggs
- 350g - extra firm tofu
- ¼ cup - dijon mustard
- 2 tbsp - plain greek yogurt
- 2 tbsp - low-fat mayonnaise
- ½ tsp - garlic powder
- Salt and pepper to season
- ¼ cup - chopped fresh chives
- 2 - whole wheat bread, slices

Preparation

1. Chop tofu into small pieces and then stir in eggs. Add the mustard, yogurt, and mayonnaise and garlic powder. Season generously with pepper and add a pinch of salt.
2. In a food processor, blend ingredients until it become a smooth and homogeneous texture.
3. Transfer to an airtight container and mix in chives.
4. Spread on bread and top with any raw vegetables.
5. The spread will keep for 5 days in the refrigerator and do not freeze.

As of **March 16, 2015** when coming to the clinic for all visits (including refills) please present yourselves to the receptionist (Carolyn Asquabaneskum and or her replacement). Your RAMQ cards needs to be stamped by the front receptionist then proceed to Archives with the stamped paper; you will be given so that your chart can be taken to the appropriate place you require services from. If a family member or friend drops off your medication containers for a refill, you must ensure that the person has your valid RAMQ; seeing you are the person requiring the refill then your card needs stamped and not the person's card who's dropping off the containers.

Friendly reminder for all community members to always have a VALID RAMQ and to present it to the receptionist at all times you come for any medical consultations here at Willie Matches Memorial Miyupiimaatisiun Center. The clients that show up without their cards will have to go back and get it as it's the proper way of rendering free health services in Quebec.

As for lost cards and expired cards, let the receptionist know so she can refer you to someone that can help you out. Thank you.
