Dear Friends,

When the Pope announced the Holy Year of Mercy, he had in mind very specific ways and events through which he wanted this most important nature of God (mercy) to be understood and practiced by all. As I write this column today (February 22 = on the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter the Apostle), the Pope is celebrating a special jubilee for the Roman Curia, the Vatican's governing officials, and the institutions linked to the Holy See. It is truly mind-boggling to see other such events in Rome he has already planned! Here are a few of them:

- On April 1-3 2016, the jubilee of Divine Mercy spirituality will be celebrated. Pope Francis will lead a prayer vigil. He will say Mass for Divine Mercy Sunday.
- The teenagers' jubilee will begin with an April 23 evening festival at Rome's Olympic Stadium, followed by a Mass said by Pope Francis in St Peter's Square the following day.
- The jubilee of deacons will take place May 27-29, with conferences on their role as icons of mercy for the new evangelization in their families, parishes, and jobs.
- Priests will celebrate their jubilee June 1-3. The first day will be dedicated to Eucharistic Adoration, lectio divina, and confessions. The Pontiff will preach their spiritual retreat June 2, and June 3 will say Mass with them.
- The jubilee of the sick and disabled will occur June 10-12, with special events.
- Catechists' jubilee is scheduled Sept. 23-25, with focus on salvation history through the ceiling painted by Michelangelo, a catechesis on mercy and a prayer vigil.

Pope Francis asked the whole Church to keep "24 Hours For The Lord." In his own words: "*In order to be capable of mercy, therefore, we must first of all dispose ourselves to listen to the Word of God. This means rediscovering the value of silence in order to meditate on the Word that comes to us. In this way, it will be possible to contemplate God's mercy and adopt it as our lifestyle. The initiative of "24 Hours for the Lord," to be celebrated on the Friday and Saturday preceding the Fourth Week of Lent, should be implemented in every diocese.*" Considering our Parish situation, we will keep the spirit of the Pope's initiative by having three hours of events in the Church on Friday evening 6-9pm (Soup & Stations, First Friday devotion, Holy Hour & prayers) and 3 hours on Saturday morning 9am – 12noon (adoration, songs, prayers, meditation etc). This is also an ideal time for those who wish to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. And it will culminate with our 5:30 Mass where these themes will be highlighted. I invite us all to take this opportunity seriously to reap its fruits through our active prayerful participation.

WHAT IS THIS “24 HOURS FOR THE LORD”?

This is an initiative that the Pope is asking every Diocese to implement from 4th evening to 5th evening of March this year. His intention is to make us all deeply aware of one important Biblical truth: “Mercy is the true name of God.” Pope wrote: “The Evangelist reminds us of the teaching of Jesus who says, “Be merciful just as your Father is merciful” (Lk 6:36). It is a program of life as demanding as it is rich with joy and peace. Jesus’s command is directed to anyone willing to listen to his voice (cf. Lk 6:27)..” The particular context of our Parish calls us to adapt it to our situation as follows: Friday evening from 6-9 pm: we will hold our Soup & Stations, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Adoration with the First Friday Devotion; Saturday morning from 9am – 12 noon: we will have Adoration, silent meditation, prayers, etc. And the conclusion will be during our 5:30 Mass with the same theme. Please hold the date and plan to use this occasion for our own purification as well as growth into communion with the God of Mercy.

WHAT SHOULD I “DO” DURING ADORATION?

Today, in the United States, there are 644 chapels where Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is exposed twenty-four hours for the adoration of the faithful. There are another 6,605 chapels that have partial adoration hours. Each Adoration Chapel is like an oasis of peace in a busy, demanding world. All we need to do is walk in and be still. We will begin to feel Our Lord Himself there, personally present, All-Powerful and all good, waiting to listen to all we have to say and letting us listen to what he has to tell us. We come, often tired, burdened with problems, or even discouraged. Trusting in the words of Jesus, “Come to Me all you who are weary and I will give you rest.” (Matthew 11:28), we come ready to be fed. We come to bathe in His Love, ready to be healed, allowing His Living Presence to minister to all our needs by listening to his tender words of love. We come to tell Him of our love for Him. We come to thank Him. We come to beg His mercy on someone’s behalf. We come. We step out of the buzz of our active lives into the gentle silence in His Presence. We come. **BUT, THE QUESTION REMAINS: WHAT SHOULD I “DO” DURING ADORATION?**

St. John Vianney would notice a peasant come to his small church everyday and sit on the last bench. One day he went up to him and asked him, "My good fellow, what are you doing here? Are you praying? You seem to be doing nothing." And pointing to the Blessed Sacrament, he said in reply, "*I look at him - and he looks at me. That's all I do.*"

Another nice advice from a late-starter who tried Prayer: “Never give up, folks. I’m 83 and I’m only now figuring out how to talk with God more often and with simplicity. Trouble is, I probably won’t have enough time left to ever “get it right!”

DINNER AND AUCTION


AUCTION

3RD SUNDAY OF LENT: The garden at Sant' Ana

The parable of the fig tree: "Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future." Luke 13: 1-9

Margarida's downward spiral went from drinking to smoking crack to stealing to support her addiction. She lost everything, including her home and her family's small plot of land. Soon she found herself in the largest women's prison in Brazil, Sant'Ana in the city of Sao Paulo. There Margarida found salvation in dirt. Sant'Ana, a sprawling facility with over 2,500 inmates, has its own organic garden. The garden was devised by two students - a Brazilian and an America - as part of an urban agricultural development course they were taking. "The project was built on the idea that women prisoners needed a beautiful place of respite from the ugly walls of the prison," the students explain.

With 200 starter plants from the university and donations from family and friends in the United States, the two students approached the prison staff for permission to plant the garden. At first, the prison staff was reluctant to approve the garden, having seen too many well-intentioned projects get started only to end abruptly when the organizers lost interest or ran out of time and money. But the students convinced the staff they were committed to making a go of the garden.

Some 20 prisoners and classmates they recruited took part in the watering, planting and caring for seedlings. That first season they harvested zucchini, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, lemongrass and other herbs, as well as flowers and shrubs. The garden was not just a source of food but a hands-on learning experience about the environment. Working the earth has been therapeutic for many of the inmates who suffer from mental health issues; the garden also teaches social and communications skills to the women, many of whom are illiterate. For Margarida, the garden has been a Godsend. "The garden was a clinic for me. Drugs were destroying my life. I believe that I will leave this place changed. I have faith in God and faith in my own willingness to change." [Maryknoll, May/June 2015.]

The prison garden at Sant'Ana is the Gospel fig tree. Both the prison garden and struggling fig tree mirror the hope of the Gospel: that we can always rework our plot of land, replant relationships that have not been nurtured, plant new seedlings where previous attempts to harvest something good and just have died on the vine. Like the gardener of the poor fig tree, we have the choice to work the soil and "feed" our ability to grow and move beyond ourselves and our hope for a just and compassionate world - or we can allow ourselves to be "cut down" in our sadness, disappointment and despair. In the parable of the fig tree, Jesus assures us that we always live in the hope and mercy of God enabling us to rise from the ashes of sin to rebuild and transform our lives, to work and re-work our own small plots and realize its harvest of compassion and grace.
