WE WELCOME DEACON ENOCK BERLUCH TODAY

Before the earthquake, Haiti has been described as one of the poorest country on the face of the earth. After the earthquake, it became the poorest country on earth. "Source de Vie," (means Source of Life in English) is the vision of a good Haitian missionary, led by Father Edmond Antoine Ceriel in short Father Pascal. The residents of this community are the Haitian society's typical bottom layer, the forgotten. Father Pascal's project calls for bringing help to the people of "Source de Vie" in a dignified way, by giving them the tools to grow, educate themselves, and share among them the skills to labor the earth, raise cattle and poultry, develop arts and crafts. Unfortunately there was no water in the community. The villagers had to literally climb over mountains to access water, in Haiti that means going about it on foot. A water well was an immediate necessity. With the financial help of many, the project of digging a well was successful. Fortunately, we have found plenty of water. More Funds are needed for more projects to help the community become a self-sufficient community.

Deacon Enock Berluce has been going to Haiti back and forth on mission helping Fr. Pascal and Source de Vie Community in Haiti. He is scheduled to preach a mission appeal in our parish this weekend. Your generous financial support for the Haitian people will be greatly appreciated.



INTERGENERATIONAL CATECHESIS: AN APPRENTICESHIP OF CHRISTIAN LIFE



When it was time for my youngest to learn to tie her shoes, our family gathered together and knelt on the ground to take turns demonstrating and gently guiding her own attempts. Over the next few weeks Mom, Dad, or older brother would be sure to be at her side to coach and guide until, in very short order, she was tying them up right along with us.

Catechesis, at its heart "...is an apprenticeship of the entire Christian life, it is a 'complete Christian initiation,' which promotes an authentic following of Christ, focused on his Person" (GDC). Catechesis is intended to introduce us to the person of Christ in such a way that we become followers, and not just followers, but family: "He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will" (Ephesians 1:5). As catechists our ministry is the building up of God's family and teaching our newest members how to be active members of the family of Christ.

In this light, intergenerational catechesis makes an amazing amount of sense. How did we learn to be a part of our own families? By doing those things that families do, with all the other members of our families: older cousins, younger sisters, uncles and grandmothers. Each member had something to teach us. My little brother taught me how much fun it can be always to have someone to climb trees with; my grandmother shared with me her great gift of hospitality; my cousins taught me to read, to ride a bike, and to catch frogs in the mud. We grew together; shared life together; learned to love, laugh, and reconcile, together.

In the same way, each member of our parish family has something valuable to teach our newest members, whether they are actively preparing for sacraments or continuing to grow in their faith. In our parish, intergenerational learning and growing has become the norm. It hasn't been easy, and many still ask if there will be time for the "little kids" to go off and learn on their own. Experience has shown that as moms and dads, older brothers, younger sisters, grandfathers, and aunts begin to share in the activities and share their own unique approaches to this life in Christ, the special gifts and graces that Christ desires to share invariably begin to shine. We can give no greater gift to the families of our parishes than to create open, welcoming, energetic learning spaces where seeing the relationship another has with Christ opens the door to seeing Christ with fresh eyes ourselves.

The class delved into many of the undiscussed and undisclosed ways that food goes from the farms and factories, to our plates. I was shocked at my ignorance and lack of knowledge around these topics. This class opened my eyes to different ways of eating and living more consciously.

In my first three years at Scranton, I was set on completing my Doctorate in Physical Therapy. That was the track I was on, and that was what I was preparing for. Then, after shadowing a few PT's, experiencing the aforementioned opportunities and doing a LOT of self-reflection, I changed my mind. After struggling mightily with what type of career I wanted to pursue... It hit me. I had a great conversation with my mother, and I eventually saw that I could do anything I put my mind to. I wanted to become an RD, and here I am, ready to start classes in the fall. I am excited and grateful for what the future holds.

My advice for fellow students: Find something that makes you happy. Growing up, my parents used to ask me, 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' My answer, after many discussions with them, became: 'I want to be happy.' Short and simple. Life is too short to not enjoy your time in high school, college or graduate school. In the wise words of my dad, 'If you want something, go get it.' Last, but not least, I'll leave you with one of my favorite quotes...It has a way of reminding me of my inner strength, all that I am capable of, and all that I encompass: 'You are not a drop in the ocean; you are the entire ocean in a drop. -Rumi' Congrats to all the fellow graduates, best of luck with your future endeavors, and thank you to the parish for your unwavering support! SUNDAY REFLECTION: Follow Your Call

"I will follow you wherever you go."

(Luke 9:51-62)

Bill Haber, a famous movie producer, was one of the most powerful people in Hollywood. For thirty years, his life consisted of making and breaking the careers of movie stars, and he did his job well. In 1995, when his two partners at Creative Artists Agency left him in order to run their own studios, Bill started a nonprofit organization called *Save the Children*, where he now supervises forty thousand employees in forty-one countries. He left behind the glitz and glamour of Hollywood for the day-in day-out realities of starving kids. Why would he make such a move? Simple, he says. "You only live once, and I felt God calling me to work with children." He realized that wealth and power aren't everything, and when confronted with the chance to make a lasting difference in people's lives, he simply said, "I couldn't afford to let the opportunity pass." Amazingly, Bill Haber says that nobody in Hollywood ever thought he was crazy for doing what he did. In fact, several have said to him, "I wish I could do that." The truth is that anyone at any time can do what Bill Haber did.

In today's Gospel Jesus gives us an invitation to abandon the building of our own individual kingdoms, and to join with him in building his eternal Kingdom, right here and right now, with total commitment. But like those invited in the gospel making excuses, I hear there is always something I could be doing which can get in the way of my following Jesus. Life's day to day responsibilities can pile up, providing a profound distraction. Jesus invites me to pray about what is getting in the way of my being a follower. What distracts me from living my faith? How can I support others who get bogged down in their desires to do things other than what Jesus is asking me to?

JOSEPH F. LABUTA AWARDS TO OUR YOUTH

Michael is active in St. John Neumann's Catholic Heart WorkCamp, a venture by SJN youth to visit an east coast city to give service in housing needs, property upgrading, and general errands. He is active as an Eagle Scout, Model UN participant, lacrosse player, swimmer, the WHAM club (a semi-annual academic competition contested amongst the high schools of Warren and Hunterdon counties), and the National Honor Society. With a 4.12 academic average at the close of junior year, Michael continues to distinguish himself at school taking four AP courses, and extracurricular-wise having placed 5th worldwide in 2011 in the Odyssey of the Mind competition. In the community Michael serves as life-guard and swimming instructor at Brady Life Camp and volunteering for St. John Neumann events and local firehouse breakfasts as a "sampler" with 329 hours of community service in all!


