FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....



Dear Friends,

12 or 72 disciples? We reflected on this question last Sunday based on the Lukan gospel about Jesus sending out 72. It is such an important point for our understanding of our own role as disciples that I wish to emphasize it further. Luke the only gospel writer who mentions this, has a universalist outlook. He wants us to know that the mission of Jesus is not restricted just to the 12 Apostles, but also to a much larger group. The 72 thus represents us all who are baptized Christians whose duty it is to pass on our Faith, as Pope Francis wrote in his first Encyclical 'The Light of faith': "... from one person to another, just as one candle is lighted from another. ... It is through an unbroken chain of witnesses that we come to see the face of Jesus." We are part of that beautiful chain of witnesses, binding us all the way back to Christ and the first 72 he sent out. Whether others become part of that chain depends on whether we do our part like those ahead of us have. It is wonderful to see some of our parishioners doing precisely that. When I talk to some new faces in our church, they tell me they came because someone invited them. That's a beautiful example for the rest of us. If more of us were to do that.... well, you know the result!

But there are difficulties too. Some parishioners have shared with me their struggle to answer some of the questions people put to them about our faith, our church, our doctrine and about the Bible in general. We feel less confident to share or speak about faith matters. That's one reason we are introducing the 'Whole Family Catechesis.' This inter generational process will be a boon especially for parents who truly want to educate themselves about what we believe. It will enable them not only to teach their children but also to engage other adult acquaintances and friends on religious topics.

Here's another suggestion for all of us: this summer time offers us a wonderful opportunity to enrich ourselves with some knowledge of our faith. Instead of depending on media gurus for summer reading lists, why not make our own list of faith-related summer reading? How many of us have read our last Christmas gift, "Rediscover Jesus" ? Or, have we started to browse through the latest writing of Pope Francis, "The Joy of Love" which has caught the world's attention like a wild fire? Or his writing on the care of creation (Laudato Si)? When our friends or co-workers talk about Pope Francis, reading his writings will truly enable us to speak boldly about his attitude and teachings. I invite you to do something constructive this summer for our inner life, the life of our soul.

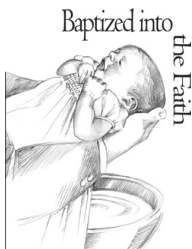

PARENTING TUNE-UP

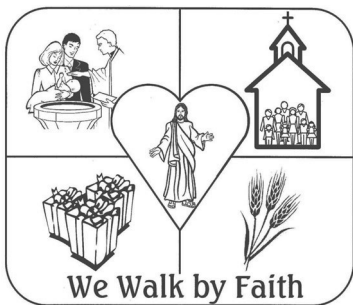

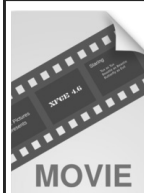
ST. JOHN'S ANNUAL TAG SALE

SUNDAY REFLECTION: A Hole in the Fence!

The parable of the Good Samaritan: "And who is my neighbor?" Luke 10: 25-37

There's been a great deal of buzz of late about building fences to keep out those deemed undesirable. One such fence now under construction will have a gaping hole in it. The government of Austria is building a fence along its southern border with Hungary in an effort to prevent migrants from entering the country illegally. The government maintains that it is already overwhelmed with an influx of 90,000 immigrants just last year. A stretch of the fence was to cross land owned by the Catholic Church, but the bishop of the diocese has refused permission to build the fence on church property. In a letter to the Austrian government, Bishop Agidius Zsifkokvics of Eisenstadt wrote that the planned barrier is inappropriate for a diocese which "lived for decades in the shadow of the Iron Curtain."

"I grew up with the Iron Curtain and I know what it meant for us all when it finally fell. I have said repeatedly new fences will not solve the refugee problem. We need to tackle today's problems at root, which means stopping organized human trafficking, stopping European arms sales, stopping war and the deliberate destabilization of the Middle East, and stopping the exploitation of African raw materials and agriculture by European firms.

"A fence would be contrary to the spirit of the Gospel and Pope Francis' clear message to Europe," the bishop said. So there will be an opening in the fence where it crosses on church land.

The holes in such fences are the pathways of the Good Samaritan. The story of the Good Samaritan begins with a vision that mirrors that of God, a vision that sees every man, woman and child as a son and daughter of God, our brother and sister in God's Christ. No one is expendable, no one is ever written off; everyone matters, everyone counts; all are welcome no matter how much we have to squeeze in to make room for one more. Christ calls whoever would be his disciples to look beyond what divides us and focus on what unites us; to put aside our own needs and wants to embrace the needs of others; to see our own wealth as a means to bring healing and hope into the lives of those who have little; to break down walls and "make holes" in whatever fences are erected that undermine that Gospel vision.

INTRO TO IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY

What is Ignatian Spirituality? Ignatian Spirituality is a unique form of prayer and relating to God using scripture, reflection, contemplation, life events, and imagination. This form of prayer was developed by St. Ignatius Loyola in a body of work known as the Spiritual Exercises. Incidentally, Jorge Bergoglio, who later became Pope Francis, was a member of the Society of Jesus, founded by St. Ignatius, also known as the Jesuits.

Fred Galano, a parishioner and a Religion teacher trained in Ignatian Spirituality invites parishioners to explore this type of prayer. One could learn one or two of the prayer methods in a session, or complete a variation of the Spiritual Exercises which would take a longer amount of time. The time commitment would be discussed with each individual according to their need.

ARE WE GOOD NEIGHBORS?

A good neighbor does not say, "I do what I want to do," or even, "I do what I have to do," but, "I do what I ought to do." In today's gospel, the lawyer's question—"Who is my neighbor?"—reveals that he was really self-centered. The parable makes us realize that every human person is our neighbor. How have we been good neighbors this week? To whom did we behave in a neighborly way? The parable is a condemnation of our non-involvement as well as an invitation for us to be merciful and kind to those in need, including those in our family, school neighborhood and parish. We are invited to be people of generosity, kindness, and mercy toward all who are suffering. A sincere smile, a cheery greeting, an encouraging word of appreciation, a heartfelt "thank you" can work wonders for a suffering soul. Within every society, there is fear of those who are "different," who differ from us in religion, skin-color, dress or language. The parable invites us to make them neighbors. Why? Because *"one's neighbor is the living image of God the Father, redeemed by the blood of Jesus Christ, and placed under the permanent action of the Holy Spirit. One's neighbor must therefore be loved, even if he or she is an enemy, with the same love with which the Lord loves him or her."*

(Pope St. John Paul II, *Sollicitudo Rei Socialis*, 1987)

An attitude of gratitude is central to the stewardship way of life.



SMILE WITH YOUR FAMILY



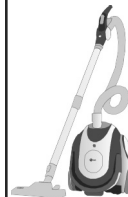

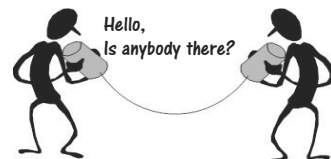
