- Are financially able to support themselves and their family
- Have increased their knowledge of budgeting and household management
- Have increased their knowledge and skills in regards to personal relationships, child development, and parenting
- Are addressing and have stabilized all medical and mental health issues
- Are self-sufficient and graduate from the program

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What is Supportive Housing?

Care Corps provides two supportive housing programs, Transitional Housing (TH) and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) for the homeless. Supportive Housing is designed to address the needs in our rural community. Assistance is provided to help the participants obtain adequate employment and safe, suitable permanent housing.

How Does it Work?

- Intensive, home-based case management
- Supportive housing (up to 24 months for TH; indefinite length for PSH)
- Professional mental health/substance abuse counseling
- Employment skills development training
- Budgeting and home management classes
- Healthy parenting and family relationships education classes

Participant Responsibilities

- Participate in home-based meeting with their case manager
- Follow program goals developed by you and case manager
- Abide by the terms of the lease
- Achieve independence
- Follow all program guidelines

Who Can Refer Participants?

Participants can be referred by any human service agency worker. Please note that the participants must complete the process, not the referring worker.

Who is Eligible?

- Those that meet HUD's homeless criteria
- Those living in a shelter (homeless or domestic violence)
- Those age 19 years or older
- Individuals and families
- Those who have a qualifying disabling condition (i.e. mental health, substance abuse, chronic medical health)
- Those in recovery from substances
- Those who can support themselves and live independently
- Those willing to participate in and follow program guidelines



How is the supportive housing program funded?

Care Corps and the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

Participating Landlord Guidelines?

- Abide by the conditions specified in the lease agreement
- Maintain communication with staff
- Ensure the unit meets building codes and HUD housing quality standards
- Cooperate with the tenant by responding promptly to repair requests

Benefits to Landlords?

- Rental units are occupied
- Free Housing Quality Standard Inspection
- Tenants who use a structured budget
- Tenants are educated in proper rental practices
- Support staff for all program participants
