It is quite a nice collection and he shared how they were made and what things to look for in order to determine their age. He also talked about the colors - some were clear and others were blue, red or green. Thank you, Gene, for bringing them in for all of us to see. Technical - Arlyn Bieber shared with us some of the reasons why our cars might overheat. License plates are often attached to the headlight bar. If they are put in that location they will block 30% of the fin area of the radiator. It's a better idea to mount it on the front bumper. He also talked about checking the fan belts for cracks or to see if they are too loose. It was suggested that a spare fan belt should be one of the things we carry in our tool box. Arlyn also mentioned that the 2 bladed original Model-A fan should be replaced with a cast aluminum, one piece 2 bladed fan. The cast aluminum 2 bladed fan has a high pitch angle which pulls as much or more air through the radiator as a 5 or 6 bladed fan. Also the original Ford 2 bladed fan can come apart as it gets older and fatigued. Check your timing and your wheel alignment. Don't use antifreeze in your radiator, but do use an anti rust product. The mystery part was a knurled knob for tightening or loosening the front window - aka, air conditioning control knob. I was so excited because I won!!! Gals you can do it too. I knew there was a reason why Stan was always asking me to check the tightness of the knob. Who would have guessed that it would be the mystery part. Ways and Means - Ed Poffenberger handed out lots of great door prizes to lucky winners. He has been doing a good job this year coming up with a variety of items. Everyone keeps hoping they will go home with the Julian pie! Joke - Thank you Ric Bonnoront for coming up with clever jokes each month. We are in smiles each time you share them with us. TECHNICAL TALK: Arlyn Bieber

Trouble Shooting Tips for the Running Model A

Excerpts from an article by Lynn Sondenaa, June, 2014 Beaver Chapter newsletter.

Let us assume that the Model A was running fine, but then something changed causing it not to purr like a kitten. It might backfire sometimes, or the engine might have a miss. This is a list of problems to consider and check.

Point gap -- Wear can cause a change in the point gap setting. Loss of power, hard starting could mean the point gap is too narrow. Proper point gap is between 0.018" & 0.022".

Plugged carburetor jet -- To do a quick unplug of a carburetor jet without taking the carburetor apart try this method. With engine warm and idling, wear a glove and place your hand over the choke housing to momentarily cut off the air supply. This may help to dislodge a particle of dirt. If covered too long the engine will die.

Backfire -- This could be many things, so here is a list of possibilities.

Defective condenser Too rich of a fuel mixture Incorrect float level Manifold air leak by the block Exhaust/muffler leak at the clamp area Too lean of a fuel mixture

Backfire going downhill


Spark retarded too much Fuel mixture too lean

Loss of power going uphill

Spark is advanced too far Fuel mixture too lean Incorrect float level Clogged fuel screens at tank/ sediment bowl/carburetor

Low speed shimmy

Tires not inflated to 35 psi Loose wheel lug nuts Loose wheel bearings Worn wheel bearings Worn king pins Tie rod or drag link loose Worn tie rod or drag link balls Incorrect toe-in (should be 1/32")


1930 SUMMER DRESSES

This pink dress on the left has short cape sleeves and shirring and a bow at the neckline for a feminine touch. This would be considered a Spectator Sport* outfit since she is wearing heels, gloves, a hat and is carrying an envelope bag. The Blue dress on the right could be considered as Active Sportswear*.

Perhaps this lady has been playing golf or tennis... I say this because she has no hat or gloves on (we can't see what kind of shoes she is wearing). The sleeveless dress also indicates she's been active, as a lady would usually have some kind of jacket to wear. Again this dress has shirring and a bow at the neckline; the skirt has pleats that wrap around to the back equally at the hipline; it's finished with a belt. Another clue it could be worn for active sportswear are the pleatsthey would provide fullness in the skirt for ease of movement. These fashions are from a McCall's May 1930 magazine. 

In September 2014 my Pennsylvania Model A'er friend Don Freed asked me if I would like to see a barn full of Model A parts. WHO WOULDN'T? As a point of reference, Don (*pictured on the right in the baseball cap*) was featured in the Dec. 2013 edition of the Quail Call when he invited me to ride shotgun on a ride in the country in his Model A sedan. The fellow who collected and sold various old Ford parts lived a little over an hour from where we hang our hats so Don arranged a meeting time to take in the sights.






How right he was. Upon arriving at our destination we met the proprietor Bill Haberer, (pictured on the left), Club members who attended Hershey may have seen him there as a vendor. He bought the farm in 1988 and has been collecting ever since. After introductions we proceeded to the first of several storage and repair facilities. It was a 30 ft, by 230 ft. former chicken house that was crammed full of Model A parts as far as the eye could see. There

were piles of headlights, starters, generators, fenders, etc. with barely enough of a pathway to navigate through the place. Some parts were stored above the rafters.

Outside were many rusting hulks deteriorating in the elements. Some still restorable, others not. Next





We then ventured up to the main barn floor where I was near to hysteria at

the sight of parts stacked floor to ceiling, and boxes that only Bill knew what they contained. There were approximately 20 vehicles of every description stored on the property, including a 1930 two door Sedan he had driven to school as a teen. When I inquired as to how he was able to find a specific part, he explained they were all placed with parts of like kind and he could locate


