

History Comes Alive at St. Andrew's

For many Kingstonians, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church is a familiar landmark. Despite its central downtown location at Clergy and Princess, some local residents may not be aware of its remarkable historical significance.

Since the erection of the original edifice by Loyalist and Scottish immigrants in 1822, the church has maintained close ties with notable Kingston politicians, intellectuals and academic institutions. As a member of St. Andrew's congregation, Sir John A. Macdonald played a pivotal role in the founding of Queen's University in 1839. He seconded the motion in favour of creating a local school to train Presbyterian ministers. Two years later, Queen's was established through the determined efforts of the church trustees. Reverend John Machar even served as an unpaid Principal for seven years. His daughter, Agnes Maule Machar, was a well-educated woman ahead of her times, and also left a legacy in Kingston. In addition to being an acclaimed artist and writer, she was a prominent feminist, environmentalist and social reformer.

Cadets at the Royal Military College of Canada also attended Sunday services. A young Billy Bishop certainly left his mark at St. Andrew's. "W. A. Bishop" is carved into the back of a pew. Many members of the congregation served in the First and Second World Wars, and are commemorated by plaques and memorial windows throughout the sanctuary.

St. Andrew's connection to Kingston's heritage extends well beyond the formidable stone walls of the church. The first minister, Reverend John Barclay, is buried in McBurney Park, otherwise known as Skeleton Park. Barclay strongly advocated for a Presbyterian cemetery, which later became a public burial ground, and a final resting place for the Scottish minister.

Shannon's cannon, located on the south church lawn, often takes visitors to St. Andrew's by surprise. This authentic cannon dates back to the Siege of Londonderry in 17th century Ireland. Named after Protestant Orangeman William Shannon, it was donated to the church in 1909.

The current residents of St. Andrew's handsome manse, Salon Theatre Productions, showcase Kingston's rich heritage with their theatrical shows. Notably, their outdoor theatre experience, *In Sir John A's Footsteps*, explores the life of Canada's first Prime Minister.

To passersby, St. Andrew's is a stunning building to behold. The church's Romanesque-style stone architecture features beautiful stained glass windows, high arches and an impressive bell tower. Yet, the most intriguing stories about St. Andrew's come alive inside the sanctuary, where the historical interpreters share lesser-known details about its heritage. Offered during the summer, the free tours give church visitors an in-depth look at a fascinating part of Kingston's past and present.

Annie Dilworth and Chloe Grande, students from Queen's University, served as interpreters at historic St. Andrew's this past summer. Part of their professional development included visiting other heritage sites in Kingston, such as Bellevue House, the Murney Tower Museum and City Hall.

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
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
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
