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Allen, Frank Leman

Frank Leman Allen was born in Alfred, New York, March 22, 1897, the son of William Henry and Amy West Allen. He studied two years at Milton College, 1916-1918. October 22, 1918, he entered the service at Janesville, Wisconsin. He was a private in the Medical Corps, Camp Shelby, Mississippi, until he was mustered out May 10, 1919. Mr. Allen is now a farmer in the vicinity of North Loup, Nebraska.

Andrews, Everett Philip

Everett Philip Andrews, son of Darwin M. and Mary Wheeler Andrews, was born in Boulder, Colorado, February 22, 1898. He attended Milton College the year of 1917-1918. He trained with the S. A. T. C. at Boulder, Colo., during the war, and is still a student in that institution.

Babcock, Edwin J.

Edwin J. Babcock was born in North Loup, Nebraska, March 4, 1897, the son of E.J. and Jessie Babcock. In the fall of 1916, he entered Milton College as a Freshman. He enlisted at Omaha, Nebraska, February 5, 1918, and was discharged May 20, 1918. August 16, 1918, he was inducted at Ord, Nebraska. A 1st class private, when first in the service, he was trained at Columbus, Ohio, and Camp Hancock, Georgia. He was promoted to 2nd Lieutenant, before he was mustered out, December 10, 1918. He was with 20th Co. Infantry.

Babcock, Frederic Irving

Frederic Irving Babcock was born in Albion, Wisconsin, April 20, 1889, the son of Charles I, and Clarissa J. Wilcox Babcock. In 1906, he graduated from Edgerton High School and Milton College in 1914. June 28, 1918 he entered the service at Ft. Riley, Kansas, in the Chemical Warfare Department. He was a private in Co. C. He received his training at Fort Riley, and at Lakehurst, New Jersey. December 24, 1918, he was mustered out from Camp Grant. Mr. Babcock is a High School teacher at Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.

Bailey, Eli Stillman

Eli Stillman Bailey, the son of James and Tracy Bailey, was born in Little Genesee, New York, September 2, 1851. He studied at Milton for six years, graduating from the college

in 1873. Since Dr. Bailey was not eligible for the Federal Service on account of his age, he enlisted in the State Service, and was subject to duty anywhere in the United States. He was made 1st Lieutenant in the Sanitary Unit, Illinois State Reserve Militia. He was put in command of the Depot Brigade, state troops, as sanitary inspector and physical examiner. He served as medical examiner for Service Chapter, Red Cross, and Y. M. C. A. overseas service. He examined drafted men and was a United States lecturer. At one time, Dr. Bailey accompanied 608 drafted men to Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga. Dr. Bailey is still in the service.

Barker, Frank Marion

Frank Marion Barber was born July 7, 1874, in Nebraska, the son of Thomas Oscar and Mary Ann Barker. When he had finished high school, he studied at the University of Nebraska, Milton College, the University of Illinois, and in Europe. He graduated from Milton in 1898. June 13, 1917, he volunteered to serve in the Medical Corps, and was sent from Illinois to Ft. Riley, Kansas. His rank, when first in the service, was 1st Lieutenant. He was with the National Guard, and with the Medical Officers' Training Corps, and the 8th Division at Camp Freemont, California, until he sailed for France, November 2, 1918. In December, 1917, he was promoted to the rank of Captain, and in March, 1918, to Major, and in May, 1919, to Lieutenant-Colonel. He was Assistant Adjutant, Medical Officers' Training Corps, Assistant and Acting Division Surgeon, A. E. F., and Assistant Base Surgeon, Base Hospital 5, A. E. F. He returned to this country in August, 1919, and was mustered out August 22. Dr. Barker's home is at Crosse Point, Detroit, Michigan, and his office is in the Kresge Building.

Bloor, George James

George James Bloor was born May 11, 1895, in Milwaukee, Wis., the son of Dan W. and Carrie Bloor (Hartson). After completing his high school course, he entered Milton College, but December 5, 1917, he enlisted in the Motor Transport Corps and was sent to Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, for training. From a private he was made 1st class private in January, 1918, and in February promoted to corporal. From June until September, 1918, he served on detached service at Ft. Bliss, El Paso, Texas. Then he was transferred to an overseas Motor Transport Repair Unit, known as Service Park Unit, 412. He served in France from September 23, 1918, until July 2, 1919. March 22, 1919, he was promoted to sergeant, Motor Transport Corps. His outfit received one citation star for participating in the Meuse-Argonne offensive. He was mustered out of the service, July 22, 1919, and is working as an auto mechanic in Moscow, Idaho.

Bond, Dewey L.

Dewey L. Bond attended Milton College one year. He is the son of Ira and Alma Ethel Bond, and was born in Milton Junction, Wis., June 24, 1898. April 30, 1917, he enlisted in the army at Whitewater, Wisconsin. In this country he was at Camp MacArthur, Texas, until he received orders to go across. He was in the A. E. F. from February 18, 1918, until September, 1919. During that time he had all of the experiences in battles,

hospitals, and army life that anyone could ask for. October 11, 1919, he was mustered out of the service.

Bond, E. Howard

E. Howard Bond was born in Farina, Illinois, May 10, 1896, the son of William H. and Clara Greene Bond. He has attended Milton College two years. May 27, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Vandalia, Illinois. He was promoted from private to corporal, to sergeant, and 2nd Lieutenant. He was a member of Co. C. 3rd Infantry Replacement Regiment, Camp Gordon, Georgia. He was a qualified regimental bayonet instructor. Lt. Bond was mustered out November 28, 1918.

Bonnell, William Kenworthy

William Kenworthy Bonnell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse V. Bonnell of Elizabeth, New Jersey, graduated from Milton College with the class of 1916. He did post graduate work at Harvard University and was trained there for a time after he enlisted in the Aviation. He was also training at Fort Meyers, and Kelley Field. He was given the rank of 2nd Lieutenant. When the signing of the Armistice made an end of all preparations for war, Lt. Bonnell was in line for a commission from Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Mr. Bonnell is an expert landscape architect, and his home address is Elizabeth, New Jersey.

Burdick, Allison L.

Allison L. Burdick was born September 14, 1894, at Coloma, Wis., the son of Dr. and Mrs. A. L. Burdick. He graduated from Milton College in 1916 and has since studied two years at the University of Wisconsin. At present, Mr. Burdick is studying at Rushmore Medical School, in Chicago. July 3, 1918, at Madison Wis., he entered the Medical Reserve Corps. as a private. October 23, 1918, he was transferred to the S. A. T. C., Co. F., Regiment 1, of the University of Wisconsin. He was mustered out December 14, 1918.

Burdick, Clifford L.

Clifford L. Burdick was born in Milton, Wisconsin, on March 6, 1894, son of Justin H. and Fanny C. Burdick. He graduated from Milton in 1917. He was drafted July 16, 1918, and served as a private in Motor Transport Corps, Co. 735, at Camp Las Casas, Porto Rico. He was promoted to the rank of corporal and later to sergeant, before being mustered out April 24, 1919. Mr. Burdick is an electrician, and is working in Milton.

Burdick, Paul Howard

Paul Howard Burdick, the son of Dr. J.H. and Fannie Coon Burdick, was born in Utica, Wis., March 22, 1887. He partially completed Milton Academy, and in 1916, he graduated from the Chicago-Kent College of Law, with the degree LL B. April 9, 1917,

he enlisted as a private in the Signal Corps, and was called for active duty, July 10. October 10, 1917, he was transferred to the 313th Field Signal Battalion, Camp Dodge, Iowa. While there he served in many different capacities, and was promoted to various ranks as an enlisted man. He took a six weeks special course in Ciphers and Codes, at the Riverbank Laboratories, Geneva, Illinois. Then he was detailed to Signal Officers' Training School, as instructor, until discharged, December 16, 1918. February 22, he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant, because he had invented a cipher chart to take to the place of the cipher disk, used by all armies. This ingenious device was a decided improvement and aid to the Signal Corps.

Burdick, William D.

William D. Burdick was born January 17, 1893 at Milton Junction, Wisconsin, the son of the Rev. Willard D. and Nettie I. Burdick. He graduated from Milton College in the class of 1915. April 30, 1918, he went to Camp Grant, Illinois, accompanying a draft contingent, but was voluntarily inducted. He was trained at Camp Grant and at Camp Zackary Taylor, Kentucky, Field Artillery, Chemical Officers' Training School. June 1, 1918. He graduated from the School of Fire, for Field Artillery, at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He was mustered out January 17, 1919. Mr. Burdick is a member of the faculty at Milton College.

Clarke, Charles Perry

Charles Perry Clarke was born at Walworth, Wis., August 4, 1873, the son of Oliver Perry and Lucinda Hulbert Clarke. He attended Milton College one year before he went to medical school. August 8, 1917, he enlisted as a lieutenant in the Medical Corps and was trained with the Medical Officers' Training Corps at Ft. Riley, Kansas. Dr. Clarke sailed for France July 31, 1918. He was promoted to captain and to major. He was in France until June 17, 1919 and in the service until July 23, 1919. Major Clarke had twin sons in the 33rd Division, and Mrs. Clarke served at Camp Bowie, Texas, doing war work.

Coon, Wallace Whitford

Wallace Whitford Coon, the son of George W. and May Whitford Coon, was born May 16, 1886, at Utica Wis. He spent two years at Milton College, and is a graduate of Hahnemann Medical College, 1911. September 1, 1918, he enlisted in the Medical Corps, and was made 1st Lieutenant. He received training at Camp Riley. He served most of the time at camps in this country, doctoring Spanish Influenza patients. Lt. Coon was discharged February 7, 1919.

Coon, Carroll Leslie

Carroll Leslie Coon, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Coon, was born in Milton Junction, Wis., January 1, 1894. He attended Milton College the year 1915-1916. In July, 1917, he enlisted at Ft. Sheridan. He was a private of Co. E. 149th Regiment, Field

Artillery. October 24, 1917, he sailed for France. He took part in the battles of the Somme and the Marne. He was gassed and shell-shocked. March 27, 1919, he returned to this country and was mustered out May 15.

Crandall, George Herbert

George Herbert Crandall, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Crandall, was born at Edelstein, Illinois, May 21, 1893. He graduated from Milton College in 1914. In 1917, he received the degree of M. A. at the University of Wisconsin. April 3, 1918, he entered the service as a corporal. He received his training at Ft. Stevens, Oregon, and Ft. Monroe, Virginia. He was in Co. E. Coast Artillery, School Troops, at Ft. Monroe, and was made 2nd Lieutenant. While in the service he traveled 14,000 miles from coast to coast. He was mustered out December 19, 1918.

Crumb, Fred Wells

Fred Wells Crumb, the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Crumb, was born in Milton, Wis., April 25, 1897. He attended Milton College two and a half years. April 27, 1918, at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, he enlisted in the Navy, with the provisional rating of Carpenter's mate, 1st class. This rating was confirmed. He served at Great Lakes and on the U. S. S. New Mexico. During the winter, he served at the U. S. N. Aviation Station at Brunswick, Georgia, until his discharge, February 19, 1919.

Curtis, Henry Arthur

Henry Arthur Curtis, the son of B. J. and Nellie L. Curtis, was born August 20, 1896, at Lake Geneva, Wis. He has attended Milton College three years and is now a member of the class of 1921. September 5, 1918, he was inducted into service at Janesville, Wis., and was sent to Camp Grant. He was promoted from private to corporal of 4th Co., 1st Regiment, Infantry Replacement and Training Troops. He served at Camp Grant until he was mustered out, January 29, 1919.

Daland, Alexander Kenworthy

Alexander Kenworthy Daland, the son of William C. and Agnes N. Daland, was born in Westerly, Rhode Island, July 12, 1895. He has attended Milton College one year, and is now a student. April 29, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wisconsin, and was sent to Eagle Pass, Texas. He was a private in Co. L. 3rd Regiment, Infantry. He served on the Mexican Border, until he was discharged May 14, 1919.

Daggett, Clarence S.

Clarence S. Daggett was born September 27, 1886, in St. Paul, Minnesota, the son of R. V. and Ina M. Daggett. He spent one year at Milton College. He entered the army in 1908. He then received the greater part of his education in military affairs. When trouble with Mexico started in 1914, he went into the marines and was sent to Haiti to assist in putting down an insurrection, that was endangering the lives of Americans living in that

country. After two years of dangers and hardships there, he returned to the United States. He was then set at work drilling and organizing men into new fighting units. He received promotions from private to corporal, to Quartermaster Sergeant, and to Warrant Officer. He received training at Norfolk, Virginia, Annapolis, Maryland, and Quantico, Virginia. Mr. Daggett is a farmer at Dodge Center, Minnesota.

Davis, Earl Floyd

Earl Floyd Davis was born in Garwin, Iowa, August 19, 1889, the son of Ervin and Loretta Davis. He attended Milton College. December 15, 1917, he enlisted in the aviation section of the signal corps. He received his training at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, Kelly Field, Texas, and the Air Mechanics Training School, St. Paul, Minnesota. May 1, 1918, he was promoted to sergeant 1st class, and from then until his discharge, January 19, 1919, he served as Truck-master. Mr. Davis is a merchant in Milton, Wisconsin.

Davis, Elmer Morton

Elmer Morton Davis was born February 1, 1898 at Fouke, Arkansas, the son of Alfred Stillman and Nettie Elmina Davis. He graduated from High School and spent one year at Milton College, 1916-1917. November 27, 1917, he enlisted in the air service at Chicago, Illinois. He received training at Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas, until he sailed for France June 30, 1918. He was a private in 138th Aero Squadron. He took part in the Meuse-Argonne offensive, and was in all three American armies. While in the Army of Occupation Pvt. Davis spent three months at Coblenz on the Rhine. He sailed for America on July 18, 1919 and was mustered out August 12.

Dunn, Charles Ellis

Charles Ellis Dunn was born October 8, 1892, in Milton, Wis., the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Dunn. He attended Milton College three and a half years. August 27, 1917, he enlisted in the Officers' Training Camp at Ft. Sheridan, Illinois. January 3, 1918, he was commissioned 1st Lieutenant and sailed for France. He was with Co. "A," 128th Machine Gun Battalion. In France he took part in the St. Mihiel and Argonne Forest drives. He was with the American Forces at the Vosge Mountains and at Verdun, and in the line with the British near Ypres. He was promoted to Captain, Infantry. April 13, 1919, he sailed from St. Nazaire for this country, where he was mustered out July 1. Mr. Dunn is a farmer at Edelstein, Illinois.

Emerson, Paul L.

Paul L. Emerson was born in Albion, Wis., May 23, 1897, the son of Castella A. and Mabel C. Emerson. After completing his high school course, he attended Milton College two years. August 31, 1918, he entered the service as a private in the 144th regiment, engineers. He was trained at Indianapolis, Indiana, and at Camp Shelby, Miss., until he was mustered out December 24, 1918.

Fetherston, Paul L.

Paul L. Fetherston was born September 1, 1893, in Milton, Wis., the son of George and Hattie Fetherston. He attended Milton Academy and College five years, graduating in 1917. December 26, 1917, he enlisted in the U. S. Air Service at Indianapolis, Indiana. As a cadet, he received training at Champaign, Ill., and Scott Field, until he was discharged November 29, 1918. Mr. Fetherston is a civil engineer.

Freeborn, Victor D.

Victor D. Freeborn was born October 25, 1893, at Flandreau, South Dakota, the son of Irving L. and Nellie V. Freeborn. He attended Milton College three years. He enlisted at Hayward, Wisconsin, and entered the Vocational School at the University of Wisconsin, as a private in the Auto Mechanic Detachment. He was made an instructor, and at the time he was mustered out, December 13, 1919, he was acting 1st Sergeant Mechanic. Mr. Freeborn owns a garage at Shinglehouse, Pennsylvania.

Fox, Howard Victor

Howard Victor Fox, a member of the Class of 1922, was born September 3, 1893, at Flandreau, South Dakota, the son of Frank S. and Ella M. Fox. He attended Milton College the year 1916-1917. April 30, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wisconsin. He was a member of Headquarters 3rd Regiment, Infantry. He received training at Eagle Pass, Texas, on the Mexican Border. When he was mustered out September 13, 1919, he was a musician 3rd class.

Garey, Alva Edward

Alva Edward Garey, a graduate of Milton College in 1913, was born in Edgerton, Wisconsin, June 2, 1883, the son of C. B. and Mary Garey. On May 13, 1917, he enlisted as a private in the first training camp at Ft. McPherson, Georgia. August 15, 1917, he was commissioned 2nd Lt. He was then transferred from the infantry to Q. M. C. Before he sailed for France, April 22, 1918, he was in training at Camps Gordon Johnstone, Meigs, Merritt. June 12, 1918, he was promoted to First Lt., and on March 19, 1919, he was made Captain. While he was in France he served as Supply Officer, Post Quartermaster and Assistant Depot Quartermaster. Returning to this country, September 6, 1919, he was mustered out on October 6, 1919. Mr. Garey is a lawyer in Edgerton, Wisconsin.

Green, Sidney Charles

Sidney Charles Green was born September 15, 1896, in Albion, Wisconsin, the son of Rollin Charles and Clara Maud Green. He graduated from Albion Academy and spent three years at Milton College, 1914-1917. April 5, 1918, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy as a hospital apprentice 2nd class, and was sent to the U. S. N. Training Station at San Francisco, California, for six months intensive training. He advanced in rating to hospital

apprentice 1st class, Pharmacist mate 3rd class, and Ph.M. 2nd class. He served in the medical department at the U. S. S. Receiving Ship, Puget Sound, and aboard the U. S. Naval Transport Von Steuben, making eight trips to France. He was discharged October 16, 1919.

Greenman, George Rogers

George Rogers Greenman was born March 28, 1897, at Milton, Wisconsin, the son of William H. and Jennie R. Greenman. He attended Milton Collge the year 1916-1917. April 30, 1917, he enlisted at Whitewater, Wisconsin, in Co. C. 1st Reg. Wis. Inf. National Guard. He was bugler of Co. K. 128th Reg. Inf. He received training at Camp Douglas, Wis., and Camp MacArthur, Texas, until he sailed for France February 19, 1918. He took part in the Aisne-Marne and Oise-Aine battles. He was made Army Field Clerk, Adjutant General's Department. January 20, 1919, he sailed for this country and was mustered out September 9. He is a student in the University of Wisconsin.

Hadden, James Henry

James Henry Hadden attended Milton Academy four years, graduating in 1915. He was born at Johnstown, Wis., January 20, 1896, the son of James Robert and Margaret Jane Hadden. April 3, 1919, he was inducted into the service at Beloit, Wis., and sent to Fort Stevens, Oregon, for training. He sailed for France August 15, 1918, a private of Battery D, 69th C. A. C. Heavy Artillery. February 4, 1919, he returned to the United States and was mustered out March 8, 1919.

Hall, F. Gregory

F. Gregory Hall, the son of Frank D. and Eva M. Hall, was born February 12, 1896, at Johnstown, Wis. He graduated from Milton College in 1917, and has studied at the University of Wisconsin in connection with his work as a Biologist. April 16, 1918, he enlisted in the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps, as a private. He received training at the U.S. School of Cinematography, Columbia University, and the U.S. School of Meteorology, University of Texas. He was promoted to Sergeant Instructor, and when he was mustered out March 26, 1919, he was a U. S. Meteorologist, Park Field, Memphis, Tennessee.

Harrison, Elmer C.

Elmer C. Harrison, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Harrison, was born at Dodge Center, Minn., August 24, 1896. He attended Milton College the year 1916-1917. He enlisted in the Field Artillery at Minneapolis, Minn., and went to Camp Dodge, Iowa, for training. From private of Battery A., 16th Regiment, Field Artillery, he was made Sergeant. While in France he was in battles at St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne. He returned to the United States, July 20, 1919. Sgt. Harrison reenlisted in the service and is in a 4th Division Band at present.

Hillstrom, William S.

William S. Hillstrom was born in Park City, Utah, January 1, 1891. He came to Milton College in 1916, and studied here until he enlisted in the Navy in December, 1917. From seaman 3rd class, he was promoted to the rating of boatswain. He served at the Great Lakes Training Station until he was released during the summer, 1919. Mr. Hillstrom is a student at the University of Wisconsin.

Hinkley, Dwight H.

Dwight H. Hinkley, the son of Irving P. and Nina Hull Hinkley, was born in Milton Junction, September 7, 1897. When he had graduated from Milton Junction High School, he went to Milton College two years, 1915-1917. April 30, 1917, he enlisted in the army at Whitewater, Wisconsin. When first in the service he was a buck private in the infantry, but was promoted to corporal. He was in training at Camp Douglas and Camp MacArthur and in France. He was in the A. E. F. from March 3, 1918 until September 1, 1919. Corporal Hinkley took part in the Alsace defensive. October 2, 1919, he was mustered out.

Hinkley, Elroy H.

Elroy H. Hinkley was born Dec. 21, 1895, at Milton Junction, the son of Irving P. and Nina Hull Henkley. He graduated from Milton Junction High School and attended Milton College three years 1914-1917. September 5, 1917, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wisconsin, as a private of Co. C, 331st M. G. Bn. From Camp Grant he was sent for training to the Provisional Officers' Candidates' Battalion, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. February 28, 1918, he was made 2nd Lieutenant. From then until he was mustered out May 5, 1919, he served with the 33rd U. S. Infantry in Panama. Lt. Hinkley is studying at the University of Wisconsin.

Holliday, Ralph Raymond

Ralph Raymond Holliday, the son of Guy W. and Eva V. Holliday was born in Beloit, Wis., February 13, 1894. March 28, 1919, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wis. He received training at Camp Grant, Ill., and Ft. Bliss and Camp MacArthur, Texas. August 3, 1918, he sailed for France. He took part in battles in the Puvencall Sector, at Meurthe and Morelle. He was in defensive battles, October 10-14, 1918, and in offensive, November 9-11. February 1, 1919, he was transferred from the infantry to the Military Police. While in the infantry, he was in Co. B, 64th Regiment, 7th Division. He was promoted from private, first class, to corporal, and to sergeant. July 5, 1919, he returned to the United States and was mustered out July 22. Before the war, he attended Milton College two years, and since his return has re-entered college.

Holliday, Walter Wellington

Walter Wellington Holliday was born October 20, 1896, in Beloit, Wis., the son of Guy and Eva Holliday. He attended Milton College the year 1917-1918. He enlisted as a seaman in the U. S. Navy at the Great Lakes Training Station, July 22, 1918. He was promoted from seaman to fireman, second class. He served aboard the U. S. S. Arizona on her trip to Turkey. This was the first American battleship to pass through the Dardanelles. He stayed at Smyrna and Constantinople about six weeks. He was in the service until July 8, 1919.

Holmes, John Edward

John Edward Holmes, the son of Harry Edward and Marcia Jones Holmes, was born in Clinton Junction, Wisconsin, September 16, 1896. Mr. Holmes attended Milton College before he enlisted in the Navy for the duration of the war, May 5, 1918, and is now a member of the class of 1920. He was a Landsman Electrician Radio Operator in the 7th Regiment Radio Corps at Great Lakes, where he was in training until January 22, 1919, when he was discharged.

Horwood, Stanley Richard

Stanley Richard Horwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Horwood, was born in Taunton, England, September 11, 1895. He attended Milton College three years. April 30, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wisconsin, and sent to Eagle Pass, Texas. He was made private, first class, and recommended for sergeant. December 18, 1918, he was mustered out. Mr. Horwood is the pastor of a Methodist church at Leesville, Texas.

Hurley, Dr. George

Dr. George Hurley, son of George W. and Susan Farrow Hurley, was born February 1, 1877, at Humboldt, Nebraska. He graduated from Milton College in 1903, and from the Medical Department of the University of Illinois, in 1909. December 10, 1917, he enlisted as a Lt. in the Medical Officers' Training School at Ft. Riley, Kansas. He also took a special course in surgery at Cleveland, Ohio. Victor Harold Hurley, a brother of Francis Hurley, was born April 29, 1895, at Welton, Iowa. For two years he attended Milton Academy. August 8, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Janesville Wis., and was ordered to Camp Shelby, Mississippi. He was a private in Battery F., 139th Field Artillery. October 6, 1918, he sailed for France. However, the signing of the armistice made his visit brief, and he returned December 15, 1919, and was discharged.

Hyne, Charles William

Charles William Hyne, who attended Milton College two years, 1916-1918, was born September 20, 1897, in Evansville, Wis. October 1, 1918, he enlisted in the Students' Army Training Corps, at Beloit College, as a private of Co. A., until December 21, 1918.

Johnson, Robert Lee

Robert Lee Johnson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Johnson, was born May 4, 1895, at Stonefort, Illinois. He spent one year at Milton College. April 28, 1917, at St. Louis, he enlisted in the Hospital Corps of the U. S. Navy, as a hospital apprentice, second class. He received training at Great Lakes, and when he was discharged September 15, 1917, he was hospital apprentice, first class.

Kelley, Albert Lyndon

Albert Lyndon Kelley, the son of Professor A. W. and Mrs. Hattie Kelley, was born March 2, 1895, in Battle Creek, Michigan. He attended Milton College one year. April 29, 1918, he was inducted into the army with the rank of corporal, and was sent to Ft. Benjamin Harrison for training. August 1, 1918, he went to France. He took part in the Meuse-Argonne offensive. From corporal of Co. B. 603rd Regiment, Engineers, he was made first class sergeant. June 12, 1919, he returned to this country, and was mustered out June 29.

Lanphere, Leo L.

Leo L. Lanphere, the son of Martina M. and Ella W. Lanphere, was born October 18, 1897, at Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He attended Milton College two years before the war. June 30, 1917, he enlisted as a private in Co. M. 1st Wisconsin Infantry. He was trained at Camp MacArthur, Waco, Texas, until he sailed for France, February 18, 1918. He was promoted to first class private, to corporal, and to second lieutenant. He was in an Argonne battle. May 15, 1919, he returned to the United States and was mustered out June 3. Lt. Lanphere is a member of the Class of 1922.

Loftus, George Elmer

George Elmer Loftus, the son of Mrs. H. F. Loftus, was born in Chicago, Illinois, October 13, 1895. He attended Milton College one year. May 29, 1917, he enlisted as a private in the medical department. In this country he received training at Fort Snelling, Minnesota, and Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He was promoted to Sergeant, Sergeant first class, Hospital Sergeant, and 2nd Lieutenant Sanitary Corps. He was in France from July 17, 1918, to July 10, 1919. He had a share in the Meuse-Argonne drive. Lt. Loftus is a druggist in Walworth, Wisconsin.

Lush, Lewis A.

Lewis A. Lush, the son of H. E. and Nellie A. Lush, was born February 26, 1894, at Harvard, Illinois. He graduated in 1916 from Milton College. October 27, 1917, he enlisted as a buck private engineer, at Cape Girardeau, Mo. He received training at Camp Meade and at Laurel Park, Md. He sailed for France January 23, 1918, and was made Private first class while at sea. He took a part in the Marne-Aisne, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives. He belonged to Co. "A," 23rd Regiment Engineers. He was mustered out June 18, 1919.

Maxson, Charles Seymour

Charles Seymour Maxson, the son of Wm. Benjamin and Myrtle Gertrude Maxson, was born in Milton, Wis., March 12, 1895. In 1915 he entered Milton College, where he studied two years. September 18, 1917, he entered the service at Janesville, Wis., by enlistment by draft. He received his training at Camp Grant, Camp Logan Texas, and with the British Army in France. Private Maxson was in Co. C., 124th Machine Gun Battalion, 33rd Division, A. E. F. Co. C. sailed from Hoboken, New Jersey, May 16, 1918, on the U. S. S. Mount Vernon, and arrived at the same harbor on the same boat, May 16, 1919, just "a year to the day." During July and August, 1918, he took part in the Somme defensive, with the British and Australian Forces. From September 9-26, he was with his Company in the Verdun Sector, on the front line outposts, and from September 26 to October 21, in the Meuse-Argonne. October 21, after forty-four days of continuous action without relief, the French as relief, took their position. During that time Co. "C." made many advances under heavy counter-attacks. From October 25 to November 11, he fought in the Troyon-sur-Meuse Sector, on the St. Mihiel front. Among many important actions of Co. "C," was the capture of St. Hilaire and Bois de Harville, November 10. The latter was one of the enemy's most important elements of the Hindenburg system, which was vital in holding the Troyon Sector. Co. "C" calls itself "4-elevens-'18," since it had 11 casualties, 6 killed and 5 wounded, at the last hour of the war on the morning of November 11, in a machine gun battle against the town of Butgnerville. Private Maxson has served with five armies and twelve army corps. About October 18, 1918, he was slightly gassed while fighting in the front line, in Bois de Dannevoux, on the west bank of the Meuse River in the Argonne Forest.

Maxson, Rolland H.

Rolland H. Maxson, the son of William B. and Myrtle Bolser Maxson, was born in Milton, Wisconsin, March 16, 1896. He attended Milton College one year. May 18, 1917, he enlisted in the U. S. Naval Reserve Force at Great Lakes, Illinois. He was an electrician, Radio second class, the rating of a petty officer. He was detailed during his service, which ended December 20, 1918, at radio stations.

Mr. Maxson is now a senior in the College of Engineering, University of Wisconsin.

Maxon, Jesse Garfield

Jesse Garfield Maxon, son of Henry J. and Phebe A. Howland Maxon, was born in Walworth, Wisconsin, June 9, 1880. He graduated from Milton College in 1904. He also studied at University of New Mexico, University of Wisconsin and Hahnemann Medical College. In 1912 he was commissioned a 1st Lt. in the Medical Reserve Corps and in 1916 was called to active duty as examiner and surgeon. When that work was practically completed, he was discharged from the service at Camp Grant, on Aug. 28, 1919, and returned to his duties as a physician at Harvard, Illinois, after 28 months' service in the World's War.

McCartney, E. Ray

E. Ray McCartney was born in Johnstown, Wisconsin, January 14, 1897, the son of T. G. and A. M. McCartney. He attended Milton Academy four years, graduating in 1914. August 14, 1918, he enlisted as a private in a medical detachment and was sent to Bradley Technical Institute, Peoria, Illinois, for training. He sailed for France, November 12, 1918, and was there until May 31, 1919. He was promoted to first class private and to corporal. From October 16, 1918, until January 4, he was clerk for Lt. Hoyt, and from January 4, until May 31, he was clerk for Captain Marks. July 7, 1919, he received his discharge.

McKean, Elwin Jackson

Elwin Jackson McKean, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. McKean, was born in Minnesota, June 28, 1889. He graduated from Milton College in 1913. June 7, 1918, he enlisted in the navy and his first rating was second class seaman. He was trained at Municipal Pier, Chicago, and at Great Lakes. February 8, 1919, he was released from active duty, while in training for a commission at the Naval Officers' Training School,

where he was in Co. F. 22nd Regiment. Mr. McKean is city superintendant of schools in Neillsville, Wis.

Nelson, Julius Smith

Julius Smith Nelson, the son of Mr. and Mrs. N. P. Nelson, was born Jan. 20, 1886, at Dell Rapid, S.D. He graduated in 1914 from Milton College. April 2, 1918, he was inducted into the service and sent to Ft. Stevens, Oregon. There he was assigned to the 9th Co. Columbia. June 1, he was transferred to Battery F. 69th Reg. Artillery. The latter part of June he was sent to the Fifth Officers' Training Corps at Fortress Monroe, Virginia. On Sept. 25 he was commissioned 2nd Lt. Coast Artillery, and was ordered to report at Ft. Stevens. He was mustered out from there, November 29, 1918.

Oakley, Carroll F.

Carroll F. Oakley, the son of Mrs. Grace Oakley, was born in Milton, Wisconsin, February 21, 1899. He attended Milton College before he enlisted in the navy, July 12, 1918, and since has reentered college and is a member of the class of 1922. He was trained at Great Lakes and at Hampton Roads. While in the service he crossed the Atlantic Ocean eight times. He sailed from Boston through the West Indies and the Panama Canal. He spent a month at Panama, and traveled extensively in the United States. September 26, 1919, he was released from active service.

Ormsby, Elwood Walter

Elwood Walter Ormsby was born November 4, 1893, at Alfred Station, New York. He attended Milton College two years, 1915-1917. September 5, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Marion, Iowa, and was sent to Camp Dodge, Des Moines, for training. He was a private in Co. 50, 163rd Depot Brigade, Infantry. He was transferred into the Development Battalion. There he acted as instructor in the school conducted by the Y. M. C. A. until November 25, 1918, when he was mustered out. Mr. Ormsby is an Iowa farmer.

Peterson, Lester William

Lester William Peterson, the son of the Rev. F. E. and Mrs. Addie Randolph Peterson, was born February 21, 1890, at Morgan Park, Illinois. He attended Milton Academy two years, and did two years of College work. July 27, 1917, he enlisted at Ft. Snelling, Minnesota, as a private in the Field Artillery. There and at Camp Mills, Long Island, he received his training. October 18, 1917, he sailed for France, and was there until February 1, 1919. He was promoted to Sergeant in Battery A. 151st Field Artillery. He took active part in battles at Champagne, Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel, and Argonne-Meuse. On October 26, 1918, he received severe gas burns while in Argonne Forest. He was mustered out March 5, 1919.

Pierce, Arthur Lester

Arthur Lester Pierce was born at LaCrosse, Wisconsin, June 13, 1893, the son of Leopold and Rosalie Pierce. The year 1912-1913 he attended Milton College. October 25, 1917, he enlisted in the U. S. Naval Radio Service, at Great Lakes, as an Electrician, 3rd class, and was sent to Harvard University for training. He was promoted to Electrician 1st class. He served on board the U. S. S. Mark H. SHumway was born in Milton, Wisconsin, August 7, 1893, the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Shumway. He attended Milton College one year. June 15, 1918, he enlisted at Janesville, Wisconsin, as a private in the Artillery. He received training at Madison, Wisconsin, Camp Sheridan, Atlanta, and Camp Taylor, Kentucky. From private he was

made corporal, Battery A., 75th Artillery. He was mustered out on December 15, 1918. Mr. Shumway is a clerk in Beloit, Wisconsin.

Siedhoff, Clark Hull

Clark Hull Siedhoff was born April 24, 1893, at Lodsport, N.Y., the son of Henry W. and Florence B. Siedhoff. He graduated from Milton College in 1916. November 19, 1917, he was drafted from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and sent to Camp Custer, Battle Creek, Michigan. He was a private of Co. H. 340th Inf., until he was honorably discharged March 26, 1918, because of poor health.

Skinner, Charles Robert

Charles Robert Skinner, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Skinner, was born at Madison, Wisconsin, September 23, 1896. He attended Milton College one year, 1915-1916. June 9, 1916, he entered Annapolis Naval Academy. June 7, 1919, he received the commission, Ensign, and is serving aboard the U. S. S. Chester.

Sorenson, Nels George

Nels George Sorenson was born December 16, 1898, in Denmark, Europe, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Sorenson. He graduated from Milton College in 1916. April 30, 1918, he enlisted as a seaman in the U. S. Navy, at Wausau, Wis. He served aboard the U. S. S. Rochester, making cross-Atlantic trips. He also served at the U. S. Rifle Range, Peekskill, New York. He was discharged June 27, 1919.

Stillman, Clair L.

Clair L. Stillman was born in Utica, Wisconsin, August 24, 1886, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Stillman. He graduated from Milton College in 1912. May 14, 1918, he enlisted at Milwaukee, Wisconsin in the U. S. Naval Reserve Force, as a Landsman for Electrician. He was sent to the Naval Training Station at Newport, Rhode Island. During November, 1918, he was in Washington, D.C., on special detached duty at the Naval Department. He was released from active service, December 4, 1918. October 24, 1918, he was inducted into the service and was sent to Camp Nicholls, New Orleans, La. From private he was promoted to Corporal, Headquarters 9th Trench Mortar Battalion, Coast Artillery. He was mustered out at Camp Dodge, December 18, 1918. Mr. Talbot is a medical student at the University of Wisconsin.

Thorngate, George

George Thorngate, Milton College, 1916, was born in North Loup, Nebraska, October 14, 1893, the son of Charles W. and Ethel Babcock Thorngate. August 27, 1917, he enlisted as a candidate in the R. O. T. C. at Ft. Sheridan. November 27, 1917, he was made 1st Lieutenant and was sent to Ft. Oglethorpe, Georgia, where he stayed until he sailed for France April 9, 1918. While in France he took active part in battles in the Arnold Sector, St. Die Sector, Frapelle, St. Mihiel, and Argonne-Meuse. Thorngate, John H.

Major Turner served as General Superintendent Telegraph and Telephone for Transportation Corps, entire A. E. F., until August 18, 1919. He left France, September 2, 1919, and was mustered out September 23. November 28, 1919, he was recommissioned Major, Signal Section, U. S. R. His address is Tulare, California, Box 72, Route 1, where he is a train dispatcher, telegrapher, and attorney-at-law.

Van Horn, Dale Rex

Dale Rex Van Horn was born July 29, 1895, at North Loup, Nebraska, the son of Jay and Estella Van Horn. He attended Milton College three years. He received the promotion from private to private 1st class. December 23, 1918, Private Van Horn was mustered out.

Van Horn, Herbert Clarke

Herbert Clarke Van Horn, the son of Holdrege C. and Mattie D. Van Horn, was born March 23, 1874, at Humboldt, Nebraska. He is a graduate of Milton College, 1898, and Alfred Theological School. September 3, 1918, he enlisted as an assistant Y. M. C. A. secretary in New York City. He had the distinct honor of having the nearest "Y" hut to the front line trenches with the 36th Division, and was under shell fire at the battles of Vaux Champagne and Attigny. He served as acting divisional secretary in arranging for and detrainning the 36th Division in the Seman Area. Captain Charles E. Hodges, Intelligence Officer of the 143rd Infantry, in a letter of appreciation to Mr. Van Horn, says that "he faithfully and efficiently performed a valuable service to the army." Mr. Van Horn stayed with the 143rd Infantry until he returned to the United States, May 20, 1919. June 2, he received his discharge. He is pastor of the Seventh Day Baptist Church at Dodge Center, Minnesota.

Warner, Myron Oliver

Myron Oliver Warner, the son of Frank M. and Kate Adel Warner, was born May 14, 1897, at Randolph, Wis. He attended Milton College three years. He enlisted in the navy and was sent to Great Lakes for training. For seven months he served as seaman of the U. S. S. Winslow, a destroyer. During that time the U. S. S. Winslow took part in President Wilson's reception on his first trip to France, December 13, 1918. It also went across in connection with the flight of the N.-C. 4. This boat went to Cuba and Haiti with the fleet and visited England, the Bermudas, and the Azores. June 23, 1919, he received his discharge.

West, Robert

Robert West, Milton College 1916, was born in Reedsburg, Wisconsin, November 26, 1892, the son of Allen B. and Hattie West. June 3, 1918, he entered the service by voluntary enlistment from Janesville, Wis., and was sent to Camp Greenleaf, Georgia. He was first a private, then corporal then sergeant of the Psychological Detachment of the Medical Department at the Receiving Camp, Camp Wheeler, Georgia. December 17, 1918 he was mustered out. Mr. West is a teacher in the University of Iowa.

White, George Albert

George Albert White, the son of Charles E. and Marcella E. White, was born March 4, 1887, at Chappell, Nebraska. He graduated from Milton with the class of 1914. He entered the service April 6, 1918, at Albert Lea, Minnesota. As a private in the Field Artillery he received two months schooling at the University of Cincinnati, before going to Camp Jackson, South Carolina. He was retained there as an instructor in the Motor School until November 8, 1918. At that time he was sent to Officers' Training School at Camp Zachary Taylor, Ky. When he was mustered out from there on December 3, 1918, he was candidate for commission. Mr. White is a school teacher at Albert Lea.

- **Kelly, Paul David**

Paul David Kelly, the son of Earl O. and Lizzie Thorpe Kelly, was born in Milton Junction, Wis., January, 1898. He spent the year 1916-1917 at Milton College. April 30, 1917, he enlisted in the service at Whitewater, Wisconsin. He was a private of Co. C. 1st Wisconsin Infantry. He received his training at Whitewater, Camp Douglas, and Camp Mac Arthur. In February, 1918 he left the United States for France. July 18, 1918, he died of wounds received in action, near Soissons. In France, he had been transferred from the 128th Infantry to Co. I. 26th Infantry.

- **Lewis, Clinton Edward**

Clinton Edward Lewis, the son of Walter H. and Lineil E. Lewis, was born June 20, 1892, at North Loup, Nebraska. He attended Milton Academy two years. July 18, 1918, he was inducted into the service at Janesville, Wisconsin. He was a private in the Machine Gun Battalion. He received training at Columbus Barracks, Ohio, and Camp Hancock, Georgia. He died of pneumonia at Camp Hancock, October 25, 1918.

- **Perry, Lloyd Arthur**

Lloyd Arthur Perry enlisted at Pittsfield, Mass., April 11, 1917, in the Naval Aviation Service, as a Landsman's mechanic for Quartermaster. He received his training in this country at Pensacola, Florida. January 22, 1918, he was commissioned ensign, and February 28, he left this country for France. He fell while training in Lacanau, Gironde, France, just one year from the day he enlisted. He enlisted April 11, 1917, was married February 11, 1918, and was killed April 11, 1918. November 11 completed this tragic

series of elevens. Ensign Perry was born September 9, 1895, the son of Willard J. and Lillian B. Perry. He attended Milton College the year 1912-1913.

- **Randolph, Kenneth Bowen**

Kenneth Bowen Randolph, Milton College, 1916, was born May 16, 1895, in Chicago, Illinois, the son of Lester Charles and Susan C. Strong Randolph. October 1, 1918, he volunteered and was performing military duty with the Students' Army Training Corps, at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, when he died of influenza October 9, 1918. Technically, he was not yet a soldier, as the papers arrived for his signature after his death. Kenneth Randolph left a wife, Ruth Sackett Randolph, and an infant daughter, Jean Marie. He was a man of clean and purposeful life, who did not live in vain.

- **Randolph, Paul Phelps**

Paul Phelps Randolph, the son of Lester Charles and Susan Strong Randolph, was born June 5, 1897, in Chicago, Illinois. He attended Milton College one year. In August, 1917, he enlisted as a seaman in the Naval Reserve, and was sent to San Pedro Station, California, October, 1917. From there he went to Pelham Bay Park Naval Training Station. He was promoted to the rating of yeoman. He made a trip to Rio de Janeiro and to Panama on the U. S. S. Orion. It was his first trip on the U. S. S. Herman Frasch, that he went down with his ship. October 4, 1918. One of the survivors wrote to Paul's family, that he was a favorite with every man on board. He had a sense of justice and squareness in everything that won a place for him in the memory of all who knew him.

- **Van Horn, Floyd**

Floyd Van Horn was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Van Horn of Welton, Iowa. Floyd attended Milton Academy the year 1916-1917. He enlisted in the U. S. Navy, and was in training at the Great Lakes Station. October 6, 1918, after vain efforts had been made for his recovery, he died of Spanish Influenza. Thus another blue star was changed to gold.

- **West, Carroll B.**

Carroll B. West was the son of Allen B. and Hattie West of Milton Junction, Wis. He graduated in 1916 from Milton College. He was a sergeant, Co. B., Twelfth Machine Gun Battalion. Sergeant West was awarded the distinguished service cross for gallantry in action, and his citation read, "For extraordinary heroism in action near the Bois de Ogons, September 30, and October 2. Sergeant West displayed exceptional courage and leadership in leading the section forward and maintaining fire on the enemy from an advanced position in the wood, successfully covering the withdrawal of the infantry to a more secure position." October 2, 1918, he was killed, while successfully directing his section in breaking up an enemy counter attack. The influence of his noble life has been an inspiration to all who knew him, and his unselfish courage and service in whatever work he undertook will be long remembered as a fitting memorial.
