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Invitation and Outreach: OGHS & Fifth Sunday Offering



Many thanks to the church family for the huge success you made our 5th Sunday Offering! This church continues to amaze me with how we rally around an offering or an event that needs to get done. You donated \$695.00 dollars that will benefit the FPC Compassion Fund greatly. You also donated twelve bags of non-perishable goods to Franklin Cooperative Ministry. We are a small church with a big heart. It blows me away that we can have such a far reaching effect for our community. Well done!

We will be collecting One Great Hour of Sharing on Easter, this Sunday, April 5th. Please remember what the money does in our world. The Presbyterian Hunger Program receives 36% of undesignated gifts, while Self-Development of People and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance each receives 32%.

Our next giving opportunity is the Pentecost Offering. A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also addresses the needs of at-risk children. Forty percent of the Pentecost offering can be retained by individual congregations wanting to make an impact in the lives of young people within their own community. Money gets broken into three areas: Young Adult Volunteers, Ministries for Youth, and children at risk. Our portion of the money (40%) benefits the Children’s Center. This offering runs from 04/26/15 to 05/24/15.





I ran across the following on my home laptop just the other day, and it helped put a few things back into perspective. It is called "Praying When God Seems Distant," and was written by the Rev. Craig Wansink, pastor at Second Norfolk Presbyterian and a great guy. I thought you might find it helpful as we finish up Lent and enter the joyous season of Easter.

As we see in Job, sometimes when we pray, "Lord, take this trial away from us!" we really should be praying, "Lord, give us the strength to bear this trial." I always smile when I think of Billy Graham's wife. She is fond of saying that she is glad that God does not answer prayers the way we want them answered or she would have been married to five other men before she had even met Billy. One of the most beautiful prayers, or reflections on prayer, comes from an unknown Confederate soldier. He writes:

I asked for strength, that I might achieve; I was made weak, that I might learn to humbly obey.
 I asked for health, that I might do greater things; I was given infirmity, that I might do better things.
 I asked for riches, that I might be happy; I was given poverty, that I might be wise.
 I asked for power, that I might have the praise of men; I was given weakness that I might feel the need for God.
 I asked for all things, that I might enjoy life; I was given life, that I might enjoy all things.
 I got nothing that I had asked for, but everything that I had hoped for.
 Almost despite myself, my unspoken prayers were answered; I am, among all men, most richly blessed."

During this Easter and always, remember that through you and the love of God, I am indeed most richly blessed.

I Killed Jesus

I think it's easy to read the Bible like it's a history book. Moses parted the sea, Jesus died on a cross, Columbus sailed across the ocean.

I know it's more than an account of historic events but I often struggle to see how it applies to my life.

"They" (that collective, scholarly, holy group of people) say that when you read the Bible you should place yourself in the story. So the other day I was doing that while I read the story of Christ's passion and death in the gospel of Matthew. I was looking for myself in the story. Which character am I? What is God trying to teach me? Well...

I think that I am every character in the story of the passion and death of Christ. And I think that's the whole point.

Let me explain...

I am an apostle, sleeping in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matthew 26:40). I'm prone to give in to laziness in the presence of holiness. In the most sacred places, like before Christ in the Eucharist, I allow my flesh to dictate how attentive my soul is. I don't put up a fight against the pull of distractions or sometimes even sleep.

I am Judas. Jesus has every right to call me both "friend" and "betrayer" barely 30 seconds apart (Matthew 26:46, 50). My heart is fickle and weak and sometimes my commitment to being Jesus' friend is blown off on the whim of an emotion.

I am Caiaphas, the high priest. I want Jesus to prove Himself to me (Matthew 26:63). I want signs and wonders to know that I really can trust Him. I want *my* prayers answered in *my* way. I want concrete proof over humble faith.

I am Peter. Sometimes I deny Jesus (Matthew 26:72). I deny Him in the face of the homeless when I chose to look away. I deny that I know Him when I don't pray before eating in a restaurant. I deny Him when I am afraid of being judged and condemned by those around me.

I am in the crowd yelling, "crucify Him" (Matthew 27:21-23). And I say it again and again every time I knowingly choose to sin.

I am Barabbas. I am chained in sin and holed up in the prison of my own pride. And instead of suffering the full punishment for my sins for which I am guilty... Christ takes my place (Matthew 27:26). And I often forget to thank Him.

I am Pilate. I want to give up when life is too challenging (Matthew 27:24). I'm ready to wash my hands of Christianity when being a follower of Jesus means pursuing virtue over mediocrity, a life of prayer over a life of pleasure.

I am Simon of Cyrene (Matthew 27:32). I suffer reluctantly. I will take the cross but I won't seek it. I'll only take it if it's been placed on my shoulders... and I don't love it.

I am a passer-by. These passers-by mocked Jesus while He was hanging on the cross (Matthew 27:30). How quickly they had forgotten all the good works He had done among their cities and towns. When popular opinion about Jesus changed, they followed suite. How quickly *I forget* the good He's done for me. In a brief moment of pain all my gratitude is forgotten and replaced by resentment.

I am one of the Roman soldiers (Matthew 27:35). I killed Jesus. My sins were the reason He was nailed to that cross. It was my fault and I know it.

But sometimes...

I am the centurion. My eyes are opened to who Jesus is in my life (Matthew 27:54). My heart swells with the truth that God became man and died for me. And this knowledge brings me peace and a resignation to amend my life.

I am one of the women standing by the cross (Matthew 27:55-56). When I'm open to God's grace, I can be a faithful and constant Christian. In the midst of pain and suffering, I can stay close to the cross. Jesus, my beloved, is my strength and He's all I need.

I am Joseph of Arimathea (Matthew 27:59). Again, only by God's grace, I can be selflessly compassionate, putting others' needs before my own. Moved by God, I will use what He has given me in the service of others. My time, talent, and treasure are all for Him.

I am every character in the story of the passion and death of Christ. And I think that's the whole point. Why *wouldn't* every dimension of the human heart be represented in the greatest story of all time? It only makes sense because the story is timeless. We have to apply it to our lives today because the reality of its events matter today.

This isn't just a story in some history book. It's the story of your salvation... how God saw the good and the bad in our humanity and He came anyway. He died anyway.

I killed Jesus. But I am also the reason He rose from the dead.

Do you have the courage to see yourself in these characters? Can you blame yourself for the nails in His hands? The stripes in His flesh? Do you realize that your sins killed Him also? And that because of you, because of His intense, unending love for YOU... He rose again.


Support Your Local Schools: Something for Nothing!

We all know that there are many ways to support our schools. Here are a few easy ways that cost you absolutely NOTHING:


- ◆ Clip the "Labels for Education," including the barcode. These are found on Campbell soups, crackers and many other foods
- ◆ Clip the "Box Tops for Education," found on Ziploc bags and many other items
- ◆ Turn in receipts from Farm Fresh that you get along with your regular receipt at the cash register
- ◆ Turn in receipts from purchasing gas from Farm Fresh

These labels and receipts can be placed in the box in the narthex.

- ◆ My Coke Rewards—on all bottles of Coke products, look under the caps, go to the website and enter the codes. You do have to set up an account, but it is easy. If you don't want to do that, bring the caps to church to **Tiffany Matteson** or **Vivian Christie**. Also, on canned Coke products, look for a code on the flap as you open the 12-pack box. The following recipe was submitted by **Vivian Christie** at the request of several women of the church. Enjoy (and share! ☺) —Editor

Red Cabbage and Apples

Chop one head red cabbage and put in cold salted water for 10-15 minutes.

Sautee 4 slices of bacon until crisp-remove bacon

Add 4 Tablespoons onion-chopped fine and

Add 2 apples peeled and chopped.

Sautee until onion browns and apples soften

Drain and pat dry the cabbage and add to sautee pan.

Crumble bacon and add to the pan.

Mix ¼ cup vinegar, ¼ cup brown sugar, 2 Tablespoons honey, salt and pepper.

Pour over ingredients and stir.

Cover, simmer 1 hour, stirring from time to time.

Note:I changed the directions ever-so-slightly. I like to have the cabbage soaking first. Then, I can pat it dry while the other stuff is cooking. Just a Viv thing. It makes a big frying pan full but only lasts us a couple/three meals.


