Strong student engagement in learning is characterized by curiosity, participation, and a drive to learn more.


Low student engagement is top-of-mind right now for many educators, families, and communities. There is a common understanding of the connection between student engagement and student academic achievement if students are engaged in what they are learning in school, the process of learning is more effective, and that will result in demonstrable academic outcomes.

According to the Gallup Student Poll, "engaged students are 2.5 times more likely to say that they get excellent grades and do well in school, and they are 4.5 times more likely to be hopeful about the future than their actively disengaged peers."³

"We all intrinsically want to engage our minds in learning, it is the fun part of life...**If you start from the premise that human nature is to want to think and learn, it changes how you teach.** Teaching needs to unleash the innate desire to learn."

How do we measure student engagement?

"[When students are engaged] student curiosity, discussion, questions, and participation increases. It is contagious and all or most students get involved when students are energized about the learning activity."

When describing what student engagement looks like in the classroom, educators often reply "I know it when I see it." Student engagement can be a difficult outcome to measure, with many teachers (65%) basing their assessments on physical cues such as head-nodding and tracking eyes.⁶ However, given the evolution of today's classrooms, this measure can be subjective and may not account for sustained engagement in a conversation, lesson, or virtual classroom setting.

The 2023 Gradient Learning Poll asked teachers to consider the multitude of ways that they identify and measure student engagement in their classrooms. Teachers agreed that focusing on how a student is connecting with the classroom content and activities can help determine their level of engagement. Here are the key ways that teachers say they identify and assess their students' engagement levels:

Students making connections 79% Students making students making between topics and ideas



Interestingly, school leaders and classroom teachers had differing views on the most impactful methods of measuring student engagement.

The table below compares responses from school leaders (2021-22 Speak Up Research Project) and classroom teachers surveyed for the Gradient Learning Poll regarding the best ways of measuring student engagement.



Noteworthy in this principal-teacher comparison is the metric of student academic outcomes. School principals (67%) identified academic outcomes as one of the best ways to assess student engagement, while student academic outcomes rank #10 overall on teachers' list of best ways to evaluate engagement with only 48% of the teachers choosing this response.

This difference in perspective, as well as the others reflected in this survey, may help point to opportunities for school leaders to align with their teaching teams on the relationship between student engagement and academic achievement as they work together to close gaps. "Outcomes I have observed with highly engaged students: More on-task behavior, more creativity and critical thinking, more cooperative learning, deeper understanding of the standards. It's more learning focused, more collaborative, and definitely more joyous."

How do we increase student engagement?

"Students become more curious about what we are learning and will continue their learning about the topic on their own,

they ask good questions, and they share what they are learning about with others... The classroom has more energy and in general is a more positive place."

Grade 6-8 teacher CA Educators know their students best, and their insights are critical for identifying ways to boost student engagement. Teachers ranked the following strategies as "highly effective" ways to engage students in the learning process⁹:

Building stronger teacher-student connections



(78% rated as "highly effective")

Connecting learning to real-world skills

72%

Leveraging students' personal interests and passions within learning

Incorporating active, hands-on learning experiences

64%

65%

Celebrating class and individual student successes and growth

60%

Facilitating meaningful student collaborations

59%

Helping students develop trusting bonds with each other

52%

The emphasis that the teachers surveyed place on building personal connections and relationships support the long-held premise that student engagement is essential for educational success.

What support do teachers need?¹⁰

Providing teachers with appropriate tools and strategies to engage with their students is essential. Here's what teachers say they need:

Planning time to revise current lessons to support student engagement

Dedicated classroom time to get to know students better

58%

The ability to select curriculum/resources that meet the needs of their students

54%

Best practices for classroom management when providing students with more choices

51% Structured 1:1 time with students

43%

Professional learning on student engagement strategies

These numbers indicate teachers have both an understanding of the role of the student-teacher relationship in student engagement and are also interested in opportunities for further professional learning to become more purposeful and intentional to increase student engagement.

Educators agree that student engagement is important, and

they are concerned about low student engagement in classroom-based learning.

To support teachers as they create classroom environments that nurture student engagement, it is essential for school and district leaders to **explore what teachers need to be more effective in combating this engagement gap.**

95% of teachers say it should be a priority for every school to support teachers with the tools and strategies they need to increase and sustain student engagement.¹¹

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About the Gradient Learning Poll

The Gradient Learning Poll is conducted in partnership with <u>Project Tomorrow</u>, a nationally recognized, education nonprofit organization with a focus on understanding the impact of new learning models and interventions on student outcomes and teacher effectiveness. From October-December 2022, the Gradient Learning Poll conducted an online survey of over 400 educators across the country—including respondents from all 50 states—to better understand their views on the state of education, specifically related to student engagement.
