Auburn used a 22-9 run in the final 6:43 of the game and blew open a close game to post a 73-56 decision against Florida Thursday evening at the new Auburn Arena.

The Gators held a 33-28 halftime lead, but the Tigers roared out of the locker room and started the second half scoring the first four points and whittled the deficit to one. Azania Stewart and Jordan Jones followed with buckets and retuned the Gator advantage to five, 37-32. Auburn, however, tallied six consecutive points and sparked a 13-2 run and assumed a six-point lead with 11:15 to go in the game.

Jennifer George, who finished with a team-high 10 points, scored the lone field goal during the stretch, as Stewart hit an inside jumper to stop the spree. The teams then traded scores for the next seven opportunities, as the Gators could get no close than four points, including 51-47 with 7:19 remaining. That's when the Tigers (9-6, 2-0 SEC) went on their game-ending run to earn their fifth consecutive victory and deny Florida (11-5, 1-1 SEC) its first true road win in five tries

Auburn also won the rebounding battle, 34-25, handing the Gators their worse deficit margin this year, including a seven rebound differential in the deciding second half, when the Tigers shot 57.7 percent and made 16 of their 24 trips to the free throw line. AU shot 50 percent overall during the game, the best by a UF opponent this season.

Florida shot 41.5 percent overall (22-53), including 5-of-11 from the three-point arc, but found their way to the free throw line only 10 times, all in the first 20 minutes of play.

"They won the paint, there's not any question," UF head coach Amanda Butler said. "They dominated us on the boards, did a great job of getting to the rim and posting us up and scoring. It's really disappointing because that was our emphasis. We didn't come in with the determination and fight that it's going to take to win on the road in this league. I thought we played a real soft game When we're at our best, we're playing with toughness and we didn't bring that toughness tonight.'

Stewart, who was plagued with foul trouble and whistled for her fourth with 10 minutes remaining, pulled down a team-high five rebounds along with seven points in 19 minutes of action. Nine of the 10 Gators who played scored during the game.

Chantel Hilliard scored a career and game-high 17 points for Auburn, leading four Tigers in double-figure scoring.

Ndidi Madu opened the game's scoring 12 seconds after the initial ball went into the air, but Auburn sharp-shooter Blanche Alverson came back with a three-pointer and Parrisha Simmons followed with a pair of free throws and gave the Tigers the early 5-2 lead. Jones nailed a trey for the Gators to even things up, but Alli Smalley hit a bucket and Alverson went deep again to give Auburn a 10-5 advantage with 16:38 remaining in the opening half.

Florida settled after a pair of turnovers and marched off a 12-4 run, with scoring from Deana Allen, Madu, Deaundra Young, Lanita Bartley and Jaterra Bonds and took a 17-14 lead with 9:21 remaining, as Bonds capped the spree with a three-pointer en route to a team-best seven first-half points. The teams traded buckets for the next few minutes before Auburn came right back with two consecutive scores and held a 20-19 edge with 5:17 on the clock. That started a trend of six lead changes and one tied score over the next three minutes. With Auburn holding a 28-27 advantage and 2:39 on the clock, Bonds hit two free throws, Azania Stewart converted a three-point play and Bartley capped the first-half scoring with one from the charity stripe and gave Florida a 33-28 halftime lead

March 4, 2010 * Duluth, Ga. * The Arena at Gwinnett Center * SEC Tourn, First Round Florida lost to Auburn 74-61 in the first round of the 2010 Southeastern Conference Tournament held at The Arena at Gwinnett Center in Duluth Thursday afternoon. The seventh-seeded Gators (14-16) were able to control the 10th-seeded Tigers taller frontcourt, but Auburn's backcourt sizzled from the floor and led the way with a 51.9 percent (27-52) shooting effort.

"You have to congratulate Auburn on a fantastic performance. They did a great job from the beginning of the game, UF head coach Amanda Butler said. "There were more physical than us

and dominated some statistical areas, like rebounding. This is obviously a very disappointing loss for us, a disappointing exit. We had higher hopes of our performance today."

Auburn's Allie Smalley led all scorers with 29 points, as she hit 10-of-14 from the floor, including a 5-of-7 effort from the three-point arc. Jordan Greenleaf contributed 15 points and a game-high 13 rebounds to lead the Tigers' 41-30 rebounding advantage over the Gators. Blanche Alverson tallied 13 points, seven rebounds and five assists, as she hit three treys as part of AU's

Self-14 long range shooting mark.

Steffi Sorensen scored 12 of her team-high 14 points in the first half for Florida, which hit 36.1 percent (22-61) from the field during the game. Sharielle Smith added 11 points, Jennifer George contributed seven points and a team-high five rebounds, while Jennifer Mossor dished a career-high six assists.

Azania Stewart saw action for the first time since the Feb. 11 game against LSU when she played just seven minutes. UF's 6-foot-4 center missed the final five games of the regular season with a stress fracture in her foot. Stewart hit the first bucket of the second half and Florida was within four points, 32-28. Auburn came right back with the next five points to take a nine-point lead, its largest of the game, with 18:02 to play. The teams traded scores for the three minutes until AU connected on possessions after a defensive stop and took an 11-point led, 47-36, with 13:44 remaining. Smith got on the board with a three-pointer and followed with a six-footer in the paint, before Sorensen followed with a driving layup that brought the Gators within four, 47-43, at the 11:36 mark. Blanche Alverson halted UF's 7-0 run with a three-pointer, but George completed a three-point play and kept the Gators within four points, 50-46.

Auburn rallied and put together an 8-2 spree and pulled away for a 10-point advantage with just over seven minutes remaining. After a scoring exchange, Smith and Stewart hit back-to-back buckets and Florida was within six points, 60-54, with 5:45 to play. Auburn, however, wouldn't let the Gators get any closer, as the Carrier and Smalley hit buckets to again take a 10-point lead.

Florida made one final attempt, using a 4-1 run to cut the deficit to seven points with 1:31 to

play, but Auburn made 9-of-10 free throws the rest of the way en route to the win.

Florida started cold from the field, missing each of its first four shots, as well as six of its first

eight from the floor, but hung in there in there despite Auburn's quick start, as the Tigers jumped out to a 7-0 lead on 3-of-5 shooting.

Trumae Lucas got the Gator offensive rolling with a driving layup at the 16:11 mark of the game and sparked an 8-0 run. George followed with tough bucket inside, Lonnika Thompson then stole the ball and hit the layup, before she nailed a deep jumper with her toe on the three-point arc and helped the Gators take an 8-7 lead with 13:30 to play in the first half.

Auburn came right back with eight consecutive points, thanks to three-pointers from Alli Smalley and Blanche Alverson. Steffi Sorensen stopped the run with a trey from the right side and hit another after a Tiger two-pointer, as the teams traded buckets. The undersized Gators then attacked the Tigers' much taller frontcourt, as George hit a hook shot around 6-foot-7 KeKe Carrier and drew a foul. On UF's next possession, Ndidi Madu drove the lane hard and while she missed the shot, she was fouled by Carrier, who was whistled for her third with 8:14 left in the opening frame. Madu's two free throws pulled UF within one, 19-18.

Senior point guard Lanita Bartley scored a game-high 17 points and grabbed a career-hightying 10 rebounds to record her first-ever double-double en route to an 84-55 victory over the Ole Miss Rebels. The win lifts Florida to 15-8 (5-5 SEC) while the Rebels fall to 12-12 (2-9 SEC).

The Gators surpassed their season-high for points scored at home or against an SEC opponent, with 84. The 29-point scoring margin was Florida's highest over an SEC opponent since Jan. 28, 2001, when the then-No. 10 Gators defeated South Carolina 91-53.

Bartley inked a career-high eight offensive rebounds, greatly contributing to the Gators' 18 second-chance points, while adding four assists. Azania Stewart and Brittany Shine each notched a season-high 14 points, and Stewart added seven rebounds and four blocks, marking the 22nd straight game in which she had at least one block. Ndidi Madu came away with eight points, eight rebounds and a career-high-tying four assists. Jordan Jones' steal in the first half marked the 100th of her career, the highest among active Gators. Jones also contributed seven points, four rebounds

As a team, the Gators shot 48.5% from the field, while holding Ole Miss to just 34.4%, including 29.7% in the first half. UF out-rebounded Ole Miss, 46-38, and put up 22 assists as compared to seven by the Rebels. For the second straight game and the fifth time this season, every Gator that dressed scored.

The Rebels came out of the locker room trailing 41-26, ready to play, opening the second half with six straight points to close the gap to 44-34, but a big three-pointer by Bartley at 17:29 gave the momentum back to the Gators.

Danielle McCray, caught her own rebound and got the tip-in to try to keep the Gators from

pulling away, but the Rebels were unable to get within 10 for the remained of the game.

A pair of made free throws by Monique Jackson brought the Rebels back within 11, down 52-41 with 15:8 to play, but the Gators continued to push forward, steadily growing harder to catch.

Deana Allen hit back-to-back free throws at 4:22, to give Florida its first 20-point lead of the game, and eight straight points by Shine in the final two minutes, including two three-pointers, sealed the deal for the Gators with a final score of 84-55.

The game started tight, as the teams traded the lead back and forth as the score ran to a 9-9 tie at 16:04. A pair of layups by Jennifer George gave the Gators a 13-9 lead, but the Rebels came back to tie the score at 13 with two made free throws by Tia Faleru at 11:42.

With the game tied at 13, with 11:42 remaining, the Gators mounted a 18-2 run that lasted almost five minutes and took a 31-15 lead with 6:43 left in the first half. UF got scoring from Madu Bartley, Jones and Stewart during the stretch, when the Gators hit 8-of-10 shots from the floor and outrebounded the Rebels, 8-0, while UM hit 1-of-6 from the field and turned the ball over twice

But the Gators then went cold from the floor after Jones' jumper at the 6:43 mark, as the Rebels chipped away at their deficit and scored the next nine points, closing Florida's advantage to seven points, 31-24, with 2:18 to go.

Two free throws from Jaterra Bonds at the 1:34 mark halted Ole Miss' run and sparked a 10-0 Gator swing, as Allen converted a layup and Bartley nailed back-to-back treys that extended UF's lead to 17 points, 41-24, with 25 seconds remaining.

Monique Jackson ended the two-minute Rebel scoring drought with a layup underneath and Florida took a 41-26 lead into the halftime locker room.

Opening Tip-Off

Florida looks to build on its current two-game win streak when the team plays host to Auburn on Thursday in the O'Connell Center.

It will be the only regular-season meeting between the Gators and Tigers this year.

Last Week's Big Wins

Florida earned two significant wins last week, helping the team get to an even 5-5 in the league standings. The Gator's 73-64 win at LSU marked their first against LSU in Baton Rouge since January of 1996. The 84-55 victory against Ole Miss was the team's largest margin of victory in an SEC game since a 38-point win versus South Carolina on Jan. 28, 2001.

The UF-Auburn Series

The Tigers hold a 32-15 lead in the all-time series, including a 10-8 record in games played in Gainesville, where Florida's last win in the series occurred (71-68, Jan. 7, 2010).

The Tigers have won six of the last eight games in the series, including last year's 73-56 decision on Jan. 6, 2011, in Auburn.

Avengers

Florida is 8-for-11 this season in avenging losses from last year when the Gators finished 20-15, turning the table in its favor against Florida State, Hampton, Charlotte, LSU (twice), Ole Miss (twice) and Alabama, but falling to Kentucky twice and at Georgia.

Team Ties

Amanda Butler's fellow classmate during her four-year career as a Gator letterwinner was Kerry Cremeans, who is the associate head coach at Auburn. The two were backcourt mates from 1990-94, helping UF earn its first-ever NCAA Tournament bid their junior year and repeated the trip their final season.

Cremeans also was an assistant coach at Florida during the 2003-04 season, when the Gators posted a 19-11 record and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Fans Get their Money's Worth!

Florida has played <u>49 games</u> over the last two-plus seasons with outcomes decided by 10 points or less, posting a 26-23 record in those tight ballgames.

11 games fit into that category this year, when UF has posted a 4-7 record.

7 of UF's 10 SEC games this season have been decided by six points or less, with 8 of 10 by decided by single digits.

Twenty-three of UF's program-record 35 games during the 2010-11 season were decided by 10 points or fewer, with 16 being six-point differences - including the final two of the season. The Gators were 14-9 in games decided by 10 points or less in 2010-11.

During the 2009-10 season, the Gators played 15 games decided by fewer than 10 points and posted an 8-7 in those outings.

Gators Picked to Finish in Top Half of SEC

Florida was picked in the preseason to finish fifth and sixth in the SEC by the league's coaches and media in the polls, respectively.

In each of the previous four years under head coach **Amanda But-ler**, Florida has at least met preseason expectations, exceeding them on three occasions.

Who's Hot?

Senior **Lanita Bartley** averaged a team-best 14.5 points and 8.5 rebounds per game in leading the Gators to two wins, including their first against LSU in Baton Rouge since January of 1996.

Bartley was UF's leading scorer in both wins last week, scoring 14 at LSU and a game-high 17 points versus Ole Miss. Her 17 points against Ole Miss marked her 20th career double-figure scoring game.

Bartley hit 58.5 percent (10-17) of her shots from the floor, including 4-of-8 (50%) from the three-point arc. Entering the week, Bartley had averaged 8.3 points and 4.9 rebounds, while hitting 39.5 percent from the floor and connecting on only 9-of-28 three-pointers.

Gator Watch

Junior forward **Jennifer George** continues to lead UF in scoring (12.7 ppg) and rebounding (9.1 rpg), an effort that also **is tied for second in the SEC** (SEC games, No. 3 for all games).

She has posted **12 double-doubles** this year - and 16 in her career. George recently compiled a streak of eight consecutive double-doubles, a run that ranked tied as the fourth-longest in UF history. The run ended at Georgia on Jan. 12, when she posted 15 points with eight rebounds.

Not bad considering she was held scoreless on 0-for-1 shooting with three rebounds in the season opener versus Michigan!!

George also has a team-high 16 double-figure scoring games.

Jones Right Behind George

Senior **Jordan Jones** has been doing a bit of everything for the Gators this year, contributing 12.2 points, in addition to 3.7 rebounds, 2.0 assists and 1.05 steals, while hitting 48-of-139 treys (34.8%).

Jones had started 43 consecutive games prior to missing the Feb. 2 game at LSU because of a concussion she sustained during the Jan. 29 game at Arkansas.

Jones had converted at least one three-point attempt in **11 consecutive games** before going 0-3 from beyond the arc against South Carolina on Jan. 8. This was her career third double-digit streak of converting three-pointers in a game, having already notched runs of 23 and 16.

She has at least **one three-pointer in all except three games** this year (one of which she didn't play in).

During her two-plus-year tenure at UF, Jones has drained <u>175 three-pointers</u>, the fourth most in a career (third is 212 by Sha Brooks, 2005-09), as well as <u>272 overall</u>.

Last year, Jones was 72-of-186 from long range for 38.7%, the second-highest accuracy mark in a season in UF history. Her 72 treys tied for the seventh-most in a season.

Deana Allen Stars off the Bench & NOW as a Starter

Senior **Deana Allen** has provided Florida with a definite spark off the bench in every game she's played this year, averaging 7.5 points (fifth on team) and 5.4 rebounds (tied for second on team), with 1.6 steals (second on the team). She hits 33.3 percent from the three-point arc (the third-highest on the team) and 72.7 percent from the free throw line (highest percentage).

The only game Allen has missed this year was the season-opener against Michigan when she sat out to recover from a concussion.

Allen did make her first start of the year on Jan. 8 against South Carolina, responding with nine points, a season-high 10 rebounds and a

team-best three assists with a pair of steals. She followed that with another start and a 14-point, six-rebound, four-steal performance at Georgia. Allen **started seven consecutive SEC games** this year, but came off the bench against Ole Miss (Feb. 5).

The Gators are coming off a three-game SEC road swing. Florida lost a tough 57-52 decision at No. 6 Kentucky on Sunday, January

22nd and a 73-72 double-overtime setback at Arkansas on Jan. 29, but capped the trip with a 73-64 victory at LSU where the Gators earned their first win since January 21, 1996.

First Half in the Books

Florida capped the first half of the team's 16-game SEC schedule on Sunday, Jan. 29 with a 73-72 double-overtime loss at Arkansas

The Gators compiled a 3-5 record during the first half of the slate, a mark that placed them tied with Mississippi State for eighth in the standings.

The Perfect 10

Because of injuries, the Gators have been limited to 10 healthy players for every game this year except the season opener versus Michigan when only nine Gators suited up.

Florida began the season with **Kayla Lewis** in the starting lineup and senior **Deana Allen** out with a concussion, while freshman **Andrea Vilaro Aragones** was in Spain for the first four games due to the passing of her mother and freshmen **Viktorija Dimaite** (ankle) and **Carlie Needles (knee)** redshirting the season due to injuries.

Lewis suffered a stress fracture during the Nov. 17 Florida State game and has not dressed since the third game of the year. She will redshirt the 2011-12 season.

Hello, Again!

The 2011-12 season marks the beginning of new rotation for the SEC's 16-game schedule, with each team still playing the other 11 schools once, while keeping a home-and-home series with its 'natural geographic rival' (UF's is **Georgia**). Florida's four other games will be home-and-home series against **Kentucky**, **South Carolina**, **LSU** and **Ole Miss**.

Strongest Gator

Jennifer George is unquestionably the strongest member of the team. With her legs, she moves 225 pounds for a dead lift (2 sets, 9 reps) and 185 pounds for a front squad (2 sets, 10 reps), while using 65 pound dumb bells for a bench press (2 sets, 6 reps).

UF vs. Ranked Teams

Florida is 1-4 this year against nationally-ranked opponents, posting a 72-58 victory on Nov. 17 against Florida State, which checked in at No. 21 in the AP and No. 19 in the ESPN-Coaches poll, but losing to No. 11/12 Rutgers (63-49) on Dec. 2 at the Ocean Center in Daytona Beach, to No. 6 Kentucky (59-56) on Jan. 1 in Gainesville and 57-52 on Jan. 22 in Lexington and at No. 19/16 Georgia (61-55).

The Gators earned two wins last year against ranked foes, with the last coming on Feb. 27, 2011 when unranked UF knocked off then-No. 22-ranked Georgia, 74-71, in the O'Connell Center.

Including this year's win against the Seminoles, Florida has collected 46 upset wins against a higher-ranked opponent, with 26 of those coming when the Gators were unranked.

Back-to-Back 20-Point Games Not Common

Three different Gators have charted a 20-point game this season: Lanita Bartley (28 vs. Charlotte), Jennifer George (24 at San Francisco, 21 vs. Stetson) and Jordan Jones (21 vs. Michigan, 28 vs. Hampton, 20 vs. Rutgers, 20 vs. Charleston Southern).

The last time a Gator was able to string back-to-back 20-point performances was during the 2008-09 season, when **Sha (SHAY) Brooks** tagged Arkansas for 27 (Feb. 19) and South Carolina for 24 (Feb. 22).

George Joins Elite Swat Team

Jennifer George's first blocked shot of the game against Kentucky on Jan. 1 was the 100th of her career (Keyla Snowden, 14:13 mark of first half). She became the eighth Gator to block 100 in career.

George Honored as SEC Player of Week

Jennifer George was named the SEC Player of the Week for the games played Dec. 19-25.

George was the catalyst in Florida winning its own Gator Holiday Classic, as she totaled 34 points and 23 rebounds en route to earning MVP honors, the first such honor of her career.

George posted a double-double in both tournament wins, extending her double-double streak to four games, the first time a Gator has strung together as many since Vanessa Hayden did so midway thru the 2003-04 season.

George shot an incredible 72.2 percent from the floor during UF's two games during the week, hitting 13-of-18, and blocked five shots.

Gators in the Golden State

When Florida played at San Francisco on Dec. 7, it was the first time the Gators have played a game in the state of California since Nov. 18, 2006.

Gators in the Big Apple

Only four Gators on the current 13-player roster had ever stepped foot in the state of New York prior to the Courtyard LaGuardia Turkey Classic hosted by Long Island University, Nov. 25-26.

Only **Jennifer George**, **Jordan Jones**, **Ndidi Madu** and **Azania Stewart** had visited New York.

Opening with a Small Bench

Florida suited up just nine players for the Nov. 11 season-opener against Michigan, with Deana Allen listed as day-to-day, Andrea Vilaro Aragones in Spain with the passing of her mother and freshmen Viktorija Dimaite and Carlie Needles redshirting the season due to injury.

All nine played at least 10 minutes in the game against the Wolverines and eight scored.

The Gators did Allen back for its next game versus Stetson and she responded with 11 points and eight rebounds in 19 minutes of work.

Mini Preseason Outlook

For the third time since the 1990-91 season – and the first time since the 2003-04 campaign - the Gators return all five starters from the previous year. Florida's 2011-12 roster features five seniors, each of whom boasts starting experience, as 10 returning letterwinners welcome three talented newcomers aiming to build upon last year's 20-win season and earn a fifth consecutive postseason berth under fifthyear head coach **Amanda Butler**.

Stewart is SEC's Leading Returning Shot Blocker

Senior center **Azania Stewart** blocked 1.8 shots per game, the second-highest average among all SEC players last year, trailing only Tennessee's Kelly Cain, who transferred away from the program during the 2011 summer.

A Safer, Cosier O'Connell Center

The O'Connell Center underwent renovations during the 2011 summer. New handrails were installed throughout the lower level section, all of the 13-year-old lower level bleachers were replaced with contoured blue seats and the original, 31-year-old support structure and undercarriage were replaced. These upgrades slightly reduced the maximum capacity for basketball games from 12,000 to 11,373.

All Starters from 2010-11 Return

For the third time since the 1990-91 season, the Gators return all five starters from the previous year (1996-97 and 2003-04 were the other previous years and both ended in trips to the NCAA Tournament – 1997 team went to Elite Eight; 2004 team to second round).

Leading the Way - and Returning

Jordan Jones led the 2010-11 balanced Gator scoring effort, recording 10.2 points per game, hitting a team-leading 72 three-pointers at a 38.7 percent clip and playing 32.6 minutes per outing.

Azania Stewart was Florida's leading rebounder last season with 6.1 per game and hit 52.7 percent of her shots from the floor. Her 62 blocked shots also was tops for the Gators and ranked second in the SEC.

Gators Assemble Nationally-Ranked Signing Class for 2012-13

Officially signing a National Letter of Intent to join the Gators for the 2012-13 season are:

Chandler Cooper (5-11, Guard, Clarksville, Tenn./Clarksville HS),

Christin Mercer (6-0, Post, Douglasville, Ga./Douglas County HS),

January Miller (5-8, Guard, Orlando, Fla./University HS) and

Sydney Moss (5-11, Guard/Forward, Union, Ky./Boone County HS).

"I'm really excited about this class in every way," **Coach Amanda Butler** said of the quartet. "They have a chance to be one of the most talented classes that has ever played here. I like their personalities, they all have championship mentalities and they are all excited to be Gators and that goes a long, long way with me. All of them will be the type of players that others are definitely going to want to play with and not just because they are talented, but because of the type of people they are."

Chandler Cooper, who ranked as high as the No. 30 overall prospect in the 2012 HoopGurlz Recruiting Rankings, is one of five players from Clarksville High School to sign a NLI to an NCAA Division I basketball program, with three to a Southeastern Conference school during November's early signing period. Cooper already owns the program's all-time record with 177 career three-pointers. In her regimented practice routine, Cooper is said to attempt 200 three-pointers per day. She averaged 9.1 points, 4.2 rebounds and 3.8 assists during her junior season.

Christin Mercer was honored as a 2011 Class AAAA First Team All-State performer, as she helped Douglas County High School to a 31-1 record and advance to the state semifinals for the first time in school history. The 2011 Region 5-AAAA Player of the Year averaged 14.2 points, 10.3 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per game while hitting 51.8 percent of her shots during her junior season with coach Chet Forsh's Lady Tigers.

January Miller verbally committed to the Gators following her sophomore season, when she averaged 21 points, 6.2 rebounds, 3.9 steals and 2.6 assists and eclipsed the 1,000-point plateau. Through her three years running the floor at University High School, Miller has amassed 1,507 points in addition to averaging 18.8 points, along with 6.0 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 3.7 steals. The three-time All-Central Florida honoree is already UHS's all-time leader scorer in girl's history and has a chance to become the school's all-time leader, needing 77 points her senior season to reach the boy's mark.

Sydney Moss has been a two-time First Team All-State selection as named by the Louisville Courier-Journal and Lexington Herald, collecting honors in 2010 and 2011. She led Boone County High School to the 33rd District championship when she was named MVP in 2010 and 2011, as well as the 9th region title when she was the 2010 MVP and an appearance in the 2010 KHSAA State Tournament final, being named to the 2010 KHSAA All-State Tournament Team. Moss has amassed 2,140 points and 1,156 rebounds in her prep career, averaging a double-double in her career with 18.2 points and 10.5 rebounds. During her junior campaign, Moss averaged 22.9 points, 11.8 rebounds, 3.4 assists, 2.8 steals and 1.3 blocks, while hitting 51.4 percent from the floor, including 35.3 percent from the three-point arc.

Lanita Bartley dished a team-leading 3.4 assists in 2010-11 and collected a team-high 1.77 steals, while finding her way to the free throw a team-best 132 times.

Stewart's Uniqueness in Senior Quintet

The 2011-12 roster features five seniors, each of whom boasts starting experience

Of the five seniors, only **Azania Stewart** was recruited by and will have played four years under coach **Amanda Butler**. Fifth-year senior **Ndidi Madu** signed under former coach Carolyn Peck; **Jordan Jones** played her freshman year at South Carolina before transferring to UF; **Deana Allen** and **Lanita Bartley** both played at a junior college before transferring to UF.

Tough 24 Hours

The Gators suffered tough news on Nov. 6 and 7 to two of their freshmen. Carlie Needles tore the ACL in her right knee during a scrimmage (non-contact, defensive play) on Nov. 6. Less than 24 hours later, Andrea Vilaró Aragonés' mother Maria Angels Aragones Barbera passed away from cancer. Andrea flew back to Barcelona, Spain on Nov. 3 to be with her mother and family.

Rookie to Redshirt

Upon signing with UF, Viktorija Dimaite's plan with the Gator coaching staff had always been to redshirt the 2011-12 season to develop her strength and get physically stronger. The day before the 2011 Under-20 European Championships were to begin, Dimaite dislocated her right ankle and was unable to play with her native Lithuanian U20 team that was set to compete. Since stepping foot on campus for the 2011 fall semester, Dimaite has been rehabilitating her injury.

Lewis on the Mend

Sophomore **Kayla Lewis**, who missed 19 games last year due to injury, was hampered during the summer because of a bone bruise on her left tibia; similar injury she dealt with last year on her right tibia, but not as severe. Her preseason workouts were limited as a result. The last game she played prior to the 2011-12 season was on Jan. 23 at LSU, seeing just eight minutes of action.

Going Global

Trio of First-Timers

The three freshmen on the 2011-12 women's basketball roster are the first ever in program history from a specific state or country: Carlie Needles is the first Gator hoopster from the state of Colorado; Viktorija Dimaite is the first ever from Lithuania; and Andrea Vilaró Aragonés is the first-ever Gator from Spain to join the team.

Jordan Jones - earned her bachelor's degree in Business in May of 2011; currently pursing a Master's Degree in Sport Management (this is the third consecutive season a member of the team has played having already earned their bachelor's degree - Susan Yenser in 2009-10 and Ebonie Crawford in 2010-11).

Fast Learner

Azania Stewart, a native of England, began playing basketball when she was 15 years old when she was spotted while competing in netball, a 7-on-7 game similar to basketball, but the players don't dribble and the hoop does not have a backboard.

Respect Your Elders

Deana Allen has seven younger brothers and sisters.

Jersey Girl

Kayla Lewis' high school jersey was chosen to be in the 2010 Ring of Honor at the National Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Might as Well JUMP!

Kayla Lewis and Deana Allen have the top vertical jumps on the team, with Lewis (a.k.a. 'Roo') lifting off for 31 inches and Allen for 28.

Rookies Going the Distance

(located 1,453 miles from Gainesville), is the closest in distance to home; **Viktorija Dimaite** is from Lithuania – 5,223 miles from Gainesville; **Andrea Vilaró Aragonés** is from Barcelona, Spain – 4,642 miles from Gainesville.

2011-12 & 2012-13 Women's Basketball More Significant Rule Changes:

*Restricted area arc: addition of a restricted area three (3) feet from the center of the basket (rationale is that the arc will mark the area under the basket where a secondary defender is not permitted to establish a legal guarding position.)

NCAA Rule Change: Preseason Practice

Women: shall not commence on-court preseason basketball practice sessions prior to 5 p.m. on the date that is 40 days prior to the date of the institution's first regular-season contest. An institution shall not engage in more than 30 days of countable athletically related activities prior to its first regular-season contest.

SEC Expansion

The SEC has welcomed Texas A&M and Missouri to the join the league, beginning with competition in all sports for the 2012-13 academic year.

The addition of Missouri on Nov. 6, 2011, will increase SEC membership to 14 institutions. The additions of Texas A&M, announced on September 25, 2011, and Missouri, are the first expansions for the SEC since September of 1991 when the University of South Carolina joined the league.

The University of Arkansas joined the SEC in August of 1991. With the addition of Arkansas and South Carolina, the SEC was the first conference to split into divisions and add a conference championship game in 1992.

Expanded Expansion

With the addition of Missouri and Texas A&M, the SEC's television package will go from a viewership of 19 million homes to 30 million.

Head Coach Amanda Butler

Combine passion, pride, toughness, intensity, humor, wittiness, competitiveness, leadership and mix in a healthy dose of a swagger and you have Amanda Butler, who in 2011-12 is in her fifth year as head coach of the University of Florida women's basketball

Each of her first four Gator teams have earned a postseason berth - the first time any of the previous eight coaches in program history has been able to

Butler's four-year win total (78) with the Orange & Blue is already the most of any coach in program history through their respective first four seasons.

Butler also has made the O'Connell Center a tough venue for opponents, as her Gators have won 89.2 percent of their games against non-conference foes, posting a 33-4 home record during her four-year tenure.

In the 37-year history of the Florida women's basketball program, the team has posted 20 wins 10 times, with Butler accounting for two of those, including the 20-victory campaign in 2010-11.

That final 20-win season coming in 2010-11 was compiled by an extremely young and inexperienced team that returned only two starters and listed one scarcely-used senior on its roster

The 2008-09 season will go down as one of the most successful campaigns in program history. In addition to tying the school record with 24 victories during the year, Florida marched into the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the seventh time in history. In the team's first trip to the round of 32 since 2004, the 2008-09 squad had its season close on the road at top-ranked and eventual NCAA champion Connecticut. Florida ended the year rated among the top-25 in both national polls for the first time since 2002.

When Florida earned the No. 23 spot in the Dec. 8, 2008 Associated Press national poll, Butler joined an elite list of women. She became one of only 24 women in the history of NCAA Division I women's basketball who had played for a team that was ranked in the AP Top-25 and later coached a team that earned a top-25 ranking. Even more rare was the fact the Butler played for and coached the SAME team that earned a top-25 ranking, becoming only the sixth woman ever to accomplish that

During Butler's four-year tutelage in Gainesville, a Gator has been named First-Team All-SEC three times and awarded a spot on the All-SEC Freshman Team three times, as well.

During her two years as head coach at Charlotte, Butler compiled a 40-22 record that included two WNIT berths and a share of the 49ers first-ever Atlantic 10 Conference regular-season championship. Her debut season resulted in an overall record of 21-9, the most wins ever by a Charlotte coach in their first year, as Butler was recognized as the league's Coach of the Year.

Given her talents as a collegiate coach, it comes as no surprise that Butler has played a role in some of the most successful seasons in Florida history. Upon graduation, then-Florida coach Carol Ross hired Butler as the Gators' assistant coach. That 1995-96 squad compiled a 21-9 record and earned a berth into the NCAAs. The following season, the Gators won a program-record 24 games and advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament, falling to Old Dominion, 53-51
