Wilson Leads SEC In Tackles

Junior ILBs **Ramik Wilson** and **Amarlo Herrera** have been among the SEC leaders in tackles all year. Currently, Wilson leads the league with 92 (10.2/g) and Herrera is fourth with 79 stops. Wilson has led the team in tackles six times this season. Herrera posted a team and career-high 12 in the win over #6 South Carolina.

There have been two Bulldogs to lead the SEC in tackles (Whit Marshall, 1995, 128; Rennie Curran, 2009, 130).

Turnover Margin

The Bulldogs are minus-seven in turnover margin this year, which ranks 13th in the SEC. Meanwhile, seventh-ranked Auburn is ninth at plus-1 on the year.

Last time out, the Bulldogs lost one fumble and had two interceptions against Appalachian State and UGA had a pick of its own. The Tigers had a pair of turnovers and forced one.

Many Happy Returns

Georgia looks to slow down the Tiger return game that ranks first in the SEC in kickoff returns (26.7 avg.) and third in punt returns (12.0 avg). Auburn's Chris Davis returned a punt for a TD and Corey Grant returned a kickoff for a TD as part of a record-setting day for the Tigers in the rout of Tennessee last Saturday. Auburn rolled up 312 return yards. Davis leads the SEC with a 24.1 punt return average while junior Tre Mason is third in kick returns with a 27.5 average. Grant has just two kick returns on the year.

Meanwhile, Georgia ranks 14th in the league in kickoff returns (16.2 avg.) and 12th in punt returns (3.5 avg.).

ON DECK: vs. Kentucky

Georgia holds a 52-12-2 edge over Kentucky since the teams' first meeting in 1939. The Bulldogs have won the last three in a row, including a 29-24 thriller in Lexington last year. **Aaron Murray** paced Georgia with 427 yards passing and four touchdowns while current Carolina Panther Tavarres King hauled in nine passes for 188 yards and two touchdowns. Current St. Louis Ram Alec Ogletree led a trio of Bulldog defenders with 10+ tackles.

Series History & Another Top-10 Foe

This marks the 117th meeting between Georgia and Auburn, the seventh most played rivalry in the NCAA FBS. The Bulldogs and Tigers first squared off in 1892 in Atlanta's Piedmont Park. The series is even at 54-54-8 and Georgia has won six out of the last seven and leads the series in Auburn 15-10-2. With a win, Georgia would take its first lead in the series since 1986 when they went up 42-41-7. The Bulldogs' win last year on the Plains marked the 16th time that the two teams have had an equal amount of wins. There have been six previous lead changes in the series (as Auburn won the first meeting and did not relinquish the lead until 1928). Georgia has scored 1,892 points while Auburn has tallied 1,771. A win would also mark the first time since 1966 (#7 Florida, Jacksonville; #5 Ga. Tech, Athens; #10 SMU, Dallas) that the Bulldogs would have posted three wins over top-10 opponents in the same season.

UGA travels to Auburn for the second straight year marking the first time the game has been played at the same site for two years in a row since 1958. The game was played in Columbus during a stretch from 1930-58. The first 10 games were played in Atlanta starting in 1892. There were also meetings in Montgomery, Savannah, Athens and Columbus before games on each team's respective campuses since 1959.

Last season, Georgia blistered Auburn 38-0 on the Plains. It marked the first time the Bulldogs posted a shutout against Auburn since 1978 when they won 28-0 in Auburn. The 38-point margin of victory matches the 2011 score of 45-7 win in Athens and tied for the second largest margin of victory.

Murray Secures Third SEC Record

Senior QB **Aaron Murray** set his third SEC record of the year in the first half of the Appalachian State game. With his 23-yard strike to junior receiver **Michael Bennett** in the second quarter, Murray registered the 115th touchdown pass of his career (*tied at ninth in NCAA history*). This topped Danny Wuerffel, who had 114 (Florida, 1993-96). Murray has already set the SEC's all-time mark in Total Offense (12,896) and Passing Yards (12,568). He finished the game 19-for-26 for 281 yards, two touchdowns and an interception in three quarters of play against the Mountaineers as Georgia held a 31-6 lead.

Tight Tussles The Norm In 2013

Under Mark Richt, the Bulldogs have played 45 games that have been decided by five points or less, going 26-19 in these tight tussles. This year, Georgia has played in five such contests, going 3-2.

This season, five of Georgia's nine games have been decided by four points or less. The only season that featured more was in 2006 when Georgia had six of these and went 4-2. That is tied for the most by an FBS team this year. Here are the top four teams that have had these close contests this year.

Georgia (5) 3-2; **South Alabama** (5) 1-4; **Notre Dame** (4) 4-0; **Rutgers** (4) 3-1

Run It By You

Auburn leads the SEC and is ranked third nationally in rushing offense, averaging 320 yards a game. Auburn is coming off a record-setting rushing performance in the 55-23 road win over Tennessee, tallying 444 yards on the ground. Junior Tre Mason ranks second in the SEC with 1,038 rushing yards.

Georgia ranks fourth in the SEC and 20th nationally in stopping the run, allowing just 126 rushing yards a game. The most rushing yards the Bulldogs have allowed this season came against #6 South Carolina (226) while the fewest came against North Texas (7). The Bulldogs annually face Georgia Tech's spread-option offense. In Georgia's 42-34 win over the Yellow Jackets in 2010, Tech ran the football 77 times for 411 yards.

Bulldog sophomore **Todd Gurley**, who has been limited to six games this year due to an ankle injury, ranks third in the SEC with 104.2 rushing yards per game with 625 yds. rushing and six TDs on the year.

SEC Scoring Leaders Meet

Auburn junior running back Tre Mason and Georgia sophomore place-kicker **Marshall Morgan** ranks 1-2 in the SEC in scoring average. Mason has accounted for 102 points (10.2 avg.) while Morgan has 70 points (10.0 avg.). Morgan, *a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award*, leads all SEC kickers in scoring average as he is 14-for-16 in field goals (including the nation's longest at 56 yds. at Tennessee) and 28-for-28 in PATs.

OFFENSE

Murray Sets His Third SEC Record

Senior QB **Aaron Murray** has set three SEC records this season. Most recently, he connected on the 115th touchdown pass of his career, which passed Florida's Danny Wuerffel (114, 1993-96). Murray set the league record for career total offense in the first quarter of the Vanderbilt game. The Tampa, Fla., native's 12,896 yards surpassed Florida's Tim Tebow, who had 12,232.

With a 24-yard strike to **Chris Conley** on a 4th-and-4 situation at Tennessee, Murray became the SEC's all-time leader in passing yardage. He now has 12,568 passing yards, which passed former Bulldog and SEC record holder David Greene (11,528). In 2011, Murray graduated with a degree in Psychology after posting a GPA of 3.3. The 2012 Capital One Academic Second Team All-American is now taking undergraduate classes towards another degree.

In his 34 wins as a starter, Murray has 91 TDs to just 19 INTs. In addition to TD Passes, Total Offense and Passing Yards, Murray is also the SEC's leading active player in Completions (870) and TD Responsibility (129). His 12,568 passing yards are No. 2 nationally among active FBS quarterbacks.

Here are some of Murray's career highlights:

- Thirteenth Bulldog in history to receive NFF Scholar-Athlete Award and its \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship
- SEC's all-time leader in Passing Yards, Total Offense and TD Passes
- Two-time **Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week** after wins over #6 South Carolina and #6 LSU in 2013
- First QB in SEC history to have three consecutive 3,000-yard passing seasons
- Directed game-tying 75-yard drive in the last 1:54 of the 2013 Tennessee game to force overtime, doing it without his top two running backs and three of his top receivers due to injuries

Mason Surges In Backup Role

Junior QB **Hutson Mason** relieved Murray for the fourth quarter of the Appalachian State game and finished 11-for-16 for a career-high 160 yards and a touchdown. He connected with redshirt freshman receiver **Kenneth Towns** for a 3-yard score, marking Towns' first career reception. Junior SE **Jonathon Rumph** also snagged his first career completion on the same scoring drive with a 24-yard catch and finished with four catches for 98 yards from Mason.

Frosh Fill In Nicely

During a three and a half game stretch this year, the backfield featured a pair of true freshmen in **J.J. Green** and **Brendan Douglas**. They filled in for injured sophomore stars **Todd Gurley** and **Keith Marshall**. Gurley had been out since the win over No. 6 LSU on Sept. 28 when he went down with an ankle injury in the second quarter before returning against Florida. Marshall was lost for the year with an ACL injury in the first quarter of the UT game on Oct. 5. Now back as reserves, Green has 53 carries for 328 yards and two touchdowns while Douglas' numbers are at 64-272-2.

Gurley's Return Boosts Bulldogs

In 2012, true freshmen roommates and North Carolina natives **Todd Gurley** and **Keith Marshall** became Georgia's weapons in the backfield.

The pair picked up where they had left off during the first three games of 2013. Gurley, who has hit the century mark 12 times in his career, and Marshall combined for more than 100 yards and at least one touchdown in those contests. However, Gurley went down with an ankle injury in the second quarter during the win over #6 LSU and Marshall responded with a career-high 20 carries for 96 yards. Then, Marshall injured his right knee in the first quarter of the Tennessee game and was lost for the year. Gurley returned to action in the victory over Florida and finished with 187 all-purpose yards (100 rushing, 87 receiving) and two touchdowns (one rushing, one receiving).

In the win over #6 LSU, Gurley had eight carries for 73 yards (9.1 avg.) before leaving early in the second quarter. For the year, Gurley is averaging 104.2 yds/g as he has tallied 625 yards on 101 attempts.

Georgia's starting unit for the offensive line for the last two games has been: senior **Kenarious Gates** at LT, senior **Chris Burnette** at RG, senior **Dallas Lee** at LG, junior **David Andrews** at C and sophomore **John Theus**

at RT. The unit has kept the Bulldogs at No. 4 in the SEC in total offense (478.6/g). Burnette was named the **SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week** after the Tennessee game after grading out at 82 percent with six dominator blocks and four knockdowns.

Georgia's offensive line has surrendered just five sacks in the last seven games after allowing six in the first two contests.

Targeting New Receivers

One of the keys to **Aaron Murray**'s success has been his passing efficiency, and his ability to spread the ball around. Georgia has had a different leading receiver in five of its nine games this year. In the Bulldogs' latest win over Appalachian State, 13 different receivers had receptions. The matchup with Tennessee proved to be especially costly for the receiving corps. During the contest, the Bulldogs lost redshirt sophomore SE **Justin Scott-Wesley** (ACL) and junior SE **Michael Bennett** to right knee injuries. Against Vanderbilt, junior **Chris Conley** sustained an ankle injury in the game's final play and did not play against Florida and the Mountaineers. Conley leads the team with 30 rec. for 418 yds. and four touchdowns.

The Bulldogs turned to their theme "Next man up" as senior FLK **Ran-tavious Wooten** led the team with a career-high six catches for 38 yards and two scores against the Volunteers. Against the Mountaineers, he posted the first 100-yard game of his career after finishing with four catches for 104 yards and a score. Prior to the Tennessee game, Wooten had just two catches for 46 yards this year. He has now caught at least one touchdown in five consecutive seasons. In 2011, he got a medical redshirt following three games after he sustained a concussion in a car accident.

In the third straight victory over the Gators, Bennett returned to action after missing two games and led the team with five catches for 59 yards. Bennett again led the Bulldogs against Appalachian State with five catches for 87 yards and his second touchdown of the year.

Also in the win over the Mountaineers, junior **Jonathon Rumph** hauled in his first career catch and completed the game with four catches for 98 yards.

True freshman **Reggie Davis** caught a 98-yard touchdown strike from Murray to etch their names in school history. This was the longest offensive scoring play in school history. It is also tied for the third-longest passing touchdown in SEC history and is the longest passing touchdown in the FBS this year.

One of the team's receiving leaders last year, **Malcolm Mitchell**, went down with an ACL injury against #8 Clemson and is out for the year.

McGowan Delivers For The Bulldogs

A quick glance at the final statistics from Georgia's win over Florida shows Bulldog senior **Rhett McGowan** tallied three catches for 43 yards. Fans in attendance at EverBank Field and the millions watching know just how crucial each one of those receptions turned out to be for the Bulldogs. His 23-yard reception in the closing seconds of the first half gave the Bulldogs a first down and allowed them to kick a 32-yard field goal to make it 23-3. McGowan's other two receptions came in Georgia's last drive that ran out the final eight minutes and 17 seconds of the game, including a huge seven-yard grab for a first down on a third and seven play. McGowan's second of three catches against Florida set a Bulldog record for **Aaron Murray** as it was his 850th career completion.

Passing Attack

Georgia ranks second in the league in passing offense (297.7/g) and Auburn is 11th in the SEC in passing defense (238.8/g). However, the Tigers are the conference's fourth-best team with 11 interceptions on the year.

DEFENSE

In Defense Of The Defense

Although Georgia ranks ninth in the SEC in Scoring Defense at 28.8 points a game, the Bulldogs have surrendered four TDs on Special Teams this year. Also, miscues on Offense and other Special Teams mistakes have resulted in eight additional TD-Drives that have covered 36 yards or less. Also, the Bulldogs gave up a safety to the Gators and the ensuing kickoff resulted in a 50-yard touchdown drive and a two-point conversion.

Georgia has executed a fake punt at #8 Clemson and a successful onside kick in the win over #6 South Carolina.

Linebacker Duo Leading The Defense

Junior ILB **Ramik Wilson** leads the SEC in tackles with 92 (10.2/g).

Wilson's best career performance came against Tennessee earlier this year. The Tampa, Fla., native racked up 15 stops, including a sack, to take over the conference lead. His partner on the inside, junior **Amarlo Herrera**, ranks fourth in the SEC with 79 stops (8.8/g). Herrera also collected his first interception of the year (second of his career) against Appalachian State. There have been two Bulldogs to lead the SEC in tackles (Whit Marshall, 1995, 128; Rennie Curran, 2009, 130).



Newcomer OLB **Leonard Floyd** is

another playmaker as he leads all SEC freshmen with 5.5 sacks. He has 34 tackles so far. Sophomore OLB **Jordan Jenkins**, who leads the team with nine for tackles for loss, complemented his three tackles against Appalachian State with a blocked field goal and a fumble recovery.

Sacking The Opposition

Georgia ranks second in the SEC with 26 sacks on the season, including 21 in the last six games. Senior N **Garrison Smith** exploded for 2.5 sacks against the Gators during career performance that featured nine stops. Smith had 1.5 sacks on the year coming into the Florida game and only one his first

three years. For his effort, Smith was named the *SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week* for the second time in his career (Georgia Tech, 2011).

Mauger, Wiggins Get The Nod



True freshmen **Quincy Mauger** (FS) and **Shaq Wiggins** (CB) have started the last five games, giving the Bulldogs their fourth different starting lineup in the defensive backfield this year. Mauger and Wiggins responded by combining for 13 tackles against the Vols plus 10 more versus #25 Missouri.

Wiggins made his first career interception a memorable one, returning it 39 yards for a touchdown at Vanderbilt. It marked only the second INT of the year for Georgia and gave the Bulldogs a 17-14 lead with 6:24 left in the first half.

Bulldog sophomore **Josh Harvey-Clemons** ignited the defense with a career-high 15 tackles in the victory over #6 LSU. This was the most for a Bulldog since Alec Ogletree had 15 in the win over Georgia Tech last year. Harvey-Clemons is fifth on the team in tackles with 44 tackles. He went down with a right foot injury in the second quarter against Vanderbilt but returned against the Gators and had five tackles.

Stout Opposition For The Bulldogs

Four of Georgia's opponents this season have been eighth-ranked Clemson, sixth-ranked South Carolina, sixth-ranked LSU and 25th-ranked Missouri, and the Bulldogs went 2-2 against these ranked squads. A fourth top-10 opponent is on deck this week when the Bulldogs travel back to No. 7 Auburn for the second straight year. A Georgia win would mark the first time since 1966 that the Bulldogs would have posted three wins over top-10 opponents in the same season.

Did You Know? The Bulldogs held Missouri scoreless in the third period, marking the first quarter all year that the Tigers had not scored (broke a 22-quarter streak).

While the Gamecocks tallied 24 points in the first half, the Bulldog defense held them to six points the rest of the way, including a goalline stand on their final possession midway through the fourth quarter.

The Bulldogs' stout rushing defense continued against sixth-ranked LSU. Georgia held the Tigers to just 15 yards on the ground in the first half. LSU finished with just 77 yards rushing after coming into the game averaging 221.0 rushing yards/game.

New Faces

Georgia has had 13 new starters on defense including seven true freshmen. FS **Tray Matthews**, OLB **Leonard Floyd** and CB **Brendan Langley** became the first true freshmen starters in a season opener on defense under **Mark Richt** since Kedric Golston (2002). They are the only four on defense under Richt. Prior to them the last true freshman to start in the secondary in a season opener was Tony Flack in 1982 and it was against Clemson in Athens. Flack was the first true freshman (non-kicker) to start a season opener in the Vince Dooley era, which began in 1964.

Third Down Stops

One area the Bulldogs hope to continue to improve on is third down defense. The Bulldogs are 11th in the SEC in the category allowing opponents to convert on third down 42 percent of the time. Offensively, Georgia ranks 10th in the SEC with a 40 percent success rate on third down conversions.

Smith, Drew Anchoring Defensive Front

Georgia's leading trio up-front has featured senior **Garrison Smith**, redshirt sophomore **Sterling Bailey** and junior **Ray Drew**.

Smith leads this group and is third on the team with 47 tackles after setting a career high with nine in the win over Florida. Against the Vols, Drew rose to the occasion with five tackles, including a career-high two sacks, before adding another two sacks against #25 Missouri. Drew came into the year with 0.5 sacks and now has five this season.

Redshirt sophomore N **Chris Mayes** has seen more action of late, starting the last three games, and posted a career-high six tackles against Vanderbilt.

A Look At The Specialists

Sophomores **Marshall Morgan** and **Collin Barber** have been the starters the past two seasons at place kicker and punter.

Morgan is No. 2 in the SEC in scoring average at 10.0 pts/game and has been named a semifinalist for the **Lou Groza Award** and the **SEC Special Teams Player of the Week** three times this year. He is 14-for-16 on field goal attempts this year (*misses were from 52 vs. North Texas, 39 @ Tennessee*), including a career-long 56-yarder that is tied for the nation's longest in 2013. His 56-yarder versus Tennessee this year is the longest since Morgan drilled a 55-yarder in the win over #6 LSU. It is the longest FG for the Bulldogs since Blair Walsh kicked a 56-yarder versus Buffalo in 2011 and the longest on the road in school history. Morgan then won the UT game with a 42-yarder in overtime. It marked the first game-winner by a Bulldog since 2009 (Walsh, 37 yds., ASU).

Morgan scored a career-high 14 points, including his 55-yarder, in the win over LSU as he connected with three field goals and 5 PATs. He is one of four Bulldogs to make FGs of 55 or longer twice in a season. Morgan joins Rex Robinson (1980), Kevin Butler (1984) and Brandon Coutu (2005). Morgan is 4-for-7 in his career from 50 yards or longer.

Sophomore **Patrick Beless** filled in for Morgan in the first two contests this year and was 10-for-10 on PATs and 2-for-2 on FGs (both versus #6 South Carolina) during the first two games. He was lined up to attempt another 19-yard field goal against #8 Clemson, but a high snap caused a fumble and loss of six yards.

Barber ranks fourth in the SEC in punting at 45.0 on 25 punts. He also ran five yards for a first down on a fake punt from the Georgia 34 yard line at #6 Clemson. Barber returned to average 49.8/yds on five punts against North Texas, including a career-long 61 yarder. In the Tennessee game, a blocked punt led to a touchdown and he sustained a concussion on the play. Junior **Adam Erickson** finished the game as punter. Erickson punted twice against No. 25 Missouri for a 40.5 average while Barber's two averaged 32.0 yards.

Redshirt sophomore **Nathan Theus** has assumed the role as the Bulldogs' snapper this season.

The Return Men

Six Bulldogs have returned kicks this year for an average of 16.2/yds, including the longest by **Sheldon Dawson** for 29 yards against Florida. True freshman **Reggie Davis** has four returns for 69 yards. In the punt return game, junior CB **Damian Swann** has nine returns for 28 yards while Davis has nine for 44 yards.

Did You Know?

Georgia is one of only two teams since after the 2000 season to beat two top-10 teams in a season before Oct. 1, according to ESPN citing the Elias Sports Bureau. Alabama in 2008 was the other.

In fact, Georgia's 44-41 victory over No. 6 LSU marked the first time in

NFL Picks Record Eight Bulldogs

Georgia tied a school record with eight Bulldogs selected during the 2013 NFL Draft. This equaled Georgia's tally in 2002. Unlike 2002 where Charles Grant was the sole first rounder, the Bulldogs had a pair of first round picks in Jarvis Jones (Pittsburgh Steelers - 17th) and Alec Ogletree (St. Louis Rams - 30th). Georgia had the fifth-most players in the nation selected in the 2013 Draft.

The Bulldogs have 35 players on the active NFL rosters. In addition, Georgia has six players who are either on the injured-reserve or practice squads and five who play in the Canadian Football League.

Youth Movement

CLEMSON, S.C. -- The No. 5 Georgia football team dropped its season opener at Memorial Stadium by a score of 38-35 to the No. 8 Clemson Tigers in front of a crowd of 83, 830 and an ABC national television audience.

With the loss, the Bulldogs drop to 0-1 on the season, while Clemson improves to 1-0. Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray led the passing attack, going 20-29 for 323 yards and an interception. Sophomore tailback Todd Gurley finished the game with 12 carries for 154 yards and a pair of touchdowns, including a run of touchdown run of 75 yards in the opening quarter.

Michael Bennett returned to the receiving corps for the Bulldogs after missing the second half of last season with an ACL injury, and he finished the game with five catches for 60 yards. Justin Scott-Wesley also had four catches for 55 yards, while junior Chris Conley finished the game with three receptions and 67 yards.

Junior Ramik Wilson turned in a career-high total of 13 tackles, completely destroying his previous career-high mark of two tackles. Amarlo Herrera also contributed 12 tackles, while freshman Tray Matthews finished with eight tackles.

Clemson scored first on a 4-yard touchdown run from quarterback Tajh Boyd, but the Bulldogs responded less than 15 seconds later when Gurley split several defenders and raced past the Tigers' secondary to turn in a 75-yard touchdown run. The offensive showdon continued, as just over one minuter later, Clemson receiver Sammy Watkins hauled in a 77-yard pass from Boyd to give the Tigers the early 14-7 lead.

The Bulldogs once again responded in the first quarter, this time with sophomore tailback Keith Marshall finding the endzone on a 4-yard run to knot the score at 14 apiece. Quayvon Hicks then had his first career touchdown run at the 13-minute mark of the second quarter to give the Bulldogs their first lead of the night at 21-14. With just under two minutes remaining in the first half, Boyd carried the ball for a two-yard touchdown score that would leave the game tied entering halftime.

Clemson opened the scoring in the second half, as Zac Brooks hauled in a 31-yard reception from Boyd to put the Tigers back in front. Gurley once again responded midway through the third quarter, this time with a 12-yard run that tied the game once again for the Bulldogs.

Clemson was able to secure a 24-yard field goal from kicker Chandler Catanzaro with just under five minutes in the third quarter. After Georgia missed their own chance at a field goal as a result of a miscued snap, Clemson once again scored as Boyd found Stanton Seckinger in the back of the endzone for a 9-yard TD pass that put the Tigers in front 38-28.

Murray would lead one final drive for the Bulldogs, culminating in a 1-yard run by the quarterback that trimmed the Tigers' lead to just three with 80 seconds remaining. Georgia then attempted an onside kick, but the Tigers recovered and were able to run out the remaining time on the clock, thereby sealing the 38-35 victory.

ATHENS, Ga. -- The 11th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs earned a 41-30 shootout win over the No. 6 South Carolina Gamecocks on Saturday, Sept. 7, in front of 92,746 fans and a nationally-televised ESPN audience at Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga.

With the win, the Bulldogs improved to 1-1 on the year and 1-0 in the Southeastern Conference. South Carolina dropped to 1-1 on the year and 0-1 in the SEC.

Aaron Murray led the passing game, finishing with 309 yards and four touchdowns on 17-for-23 passing. Justin Scott-Wesley led all receivers with three catches for 116 yards and a touchdown. Todd Gurley led the running game with 30 carries for 136 yards and one touchdown. Keith Marshall added 62 yards on seven carries. Marshall also had 54 receiving yards and one receiving touchdown. Defensively, the Bulldogs were led by Amarlo Herrera, who finished with 12 tackles, including five solo stops and one tackle for a loss.

South Carolina's Connor Shaw finished with 228 yards through the air on 16-for-25 passing. Nick Jones was South Carolina's leading receiver, picking up 97 yards and two touchdowns on six receptions. Mike Davis led the ground attack for the Gamecocks, finishing with 150 yards and one touchdown on 16 carries.

South Carolina won the toss and elected to receive the ball on the opening drive. The Gamecocks put together an 11-play, 57-yard drive that resulted in a field goal and an early 3-0 lead. Georgia responded with a six play, 60-yard touchdown drive that took just two minutes off the clock as Murray connected with Michael Bennett to set up a 1st-and-10 at the South Carolina 20. Following a 19-yard run by Gurley, Murray found Lynch in the back of the end zone for a one-yard scoring pass that put the Bulldogs up 7-3.

The Bulldogs recovered an on-side kick near midfield on the ensuing play and marched down to the South Carolina seven before Patrick Beless connected on his first-ever field goal attempt to extend the Georgia lead to 10-3 with 2:51 left in the first quarter.

The Georgia defense forced a three-and-out on South Carolina's next drive, putting the ball back in Murray's hands for a seven-play, 69 yard scoring drive that culminated in a six-yard touchdown pass to Marshall with 12:22 to play in the second quarter.

The Gamecocks answered with a 12-play, 84-yard touchdown drive that took just over five minutes off the clock and made it a 17-10 game after Wilds' six-yard touchdown run. South Carolina then took advantage of a mishandled snap as Georgia attempted to punt on its next possession, recovering the ball at the Bulldogs' 18-yard line. On the next play, Shaw connected with Jones for a touchdown to tie the game at 17.

Georgia then embarked on a 70-yard drive that was capped-off by Gurley's two-yard touchdown run. The Gamecocks got the ball back with 1:38 left in the half and responded with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Shaw to Jones that tied the game at 24-24 with 13 seconds left to play in the half.

Following the break, both teams exchanged possession before the Bulldogs used a 48-yard catch-and-run by Marshall to move the ball inside the South Carolina 30-yard line. Another Beless field goal gave Georgia a 27-24 lead. Georgia then made it a 10-point game with 18 seconds left in the third quarter when Murray found Gurley in the corner of the end zone on an 8-yard touchdown strike.

The Gamecocks responded with a touchdown run by Davis, but a missed extra point kept the Georgia advantage at four points. On the Bulldogs' next possession Murray found Scott-Wesley streaking down the sideline for an 85-yard touchdown that put Georgia up 41-30 with 13 minutes to play. A goal-line stand by the Georgia defense on South Carolina's next possession sealed the win for the Bulldogs.

South Carolina has a very good team, and this year, we get a chance to sit in the driver's seat. We haven't been 1-0 in the league in a while because South Carolina's been getting us. ATHENS, Ga. -- The No. 9 ranked University of Georgia football team earned a 45-21 win over the North Texas Mean Green on Saturday, Sept. 21 in front of 92,746 fans and an SEC TV audience. The Bulldogs are now 2-1 on the season, while North Texas falls to 2-2 on the year.

Aaron Murray finished with 408 yards and three touchdowns on 22-of-30 passing to lead the Bulldogs through the air. Chris Conley was Murray's top receiving target, grabbing five catches for 63 yards and a touchdown. Arthur Lynch finished with four catches, 85 yards and a touchdown. Reggie Davis was also on the receiving end of a touchdown grab and finished with 134 yards on two catches. Todd Gurley led Georgia's ground game with 91 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries.

Ramik Wilson led the Bulldog defense with nine tackles, including six solo stops and two tackles for a loss. Josh Harvey-Clemons finished with seven tackles, four solo tackles and one tackle for a loss. Leonard Floyd recorded two sacks. As a unit, the Bulldogs recorded 57 tackles, nine tackles for a loss, two sacks and an interception by freshman FS Tray Matthews. The Georgia defense allowed the Mean Green 236 total yards, including just seven yards on the ground.

The Georgia offense marched 69 yards in 2:01 on its third possession of the game to get on the board first. Murray connected with TB Keith Marshall and TE Jay Rome to pick up key first downs on the drive, before Gurley rushed for a 12-yard touchdown that put the Bulldogs up 7-0 following the Marshall Morgan extra point.

On the first play of the second quarter, Murray found freshman receiver Reggie Davis streaking up the middle for a 98-yard touchdown pass that was the longest offensive play in Georgia football history. It was also Murray's 100th career touchdown pass, and put the Bulldogs up 14-0.

The Mean Green got on the board with just under 10 minutes to play in the first half, though, as QB Derek Thompson led North Texas on a 10-play, 86-yard drive that culminated in a 20-yard touchdown pass to receiver Darnell Smith.

With its advantage halved at 14-7, Georgia responded with a touchdown of its own on the ensuing drive. Rantavious Wooten found Lynch over the middle on a trick play to gain 42-yards, and five plays later Lynch took a 16-yard pass from Aaron Murray to restore the Bulldogs' two touchdown advantage.

The margin was short-lived, however, as a second quarter, 99-yard kickoff return by the Mean Green's Breelan Chancellor and a recovered blocked punt in the endzone on Georgia's first possession of the second half knotted the game at 21-21.

Georgia then went on an eight-play, 63-yard drive to break the tie with 7:11 to play in the third quarter. Key receptions by Michael Bennett and Lynch moved the Bulldogs to the North Texas 1-yard line, setting up Murray to score on a 1-yard rush.

The Mean Green looked poised to tie the game again, going 48 yards to the Georgia 27-yard line, but an interception by Matthews at the five prevented the score and allowed Murray and the Georgia offense to retake the field. The Tampa, Fla., native then capped off a 95-yard drive in 4:41 with a 4-yard pass to Conley and in the process became Georgia's all-time leader in total offense.

Up 35-21, Georgia embarked on two more scoring drives that resulted in a Morgan field goal and a 1-yard touchdown rush by freshman J. J. Green. Down 45-21, North Texas got the ball back with 1:52 left to play but would not score, sealing a second-straight home win for the Bulldogs.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"I think the biggest key in the game was the defense and how well they played. Overall the defense stepped up and played well. Offensively, anytime you go over 600 yards that's a pretty good day, too, so they did some things well. Our special teams were good, but we had some bad things obviously. We've got to rise to the challenge and do better than that."

ATHENS, Ga. -- In its third game against a top-10 team this season, the ninth-ranked Georgia football team won a 44-41 shootout with No. 6 LSU in front of a sellout crowd of 92,746 and a nationally televised CBS audience at Sanford Stadium on Saturday, Sept. 28. Georgia now improves to 3-1 on the year (2-0 SEC), while LSU drops to 4-1 overall (1-1 SEC).

Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray went 20-for-34 for 298 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Bulldogs to the win. Chris Conley was Murray's top target, hauling in five catches for 112 yards, including a touchdown. Keith Marshall led Georgia's ground game, rushing for 96 yards on 20 carries.

Josh Harvey-Clemons led the defensive efforts with 15 tackles, while Leonard Floyd finished with eight tackles and a sack. The Bulldogs totaled four sacks on the day.

Georgia wasted little time in scoring first, driving 75 yards on eight plays in just over three minutes for an opening-drive touchdown. It marked the first time that LSU has trailed this season. The Tigers answered on the next drive, going 66 yards on six plays before tying the game with a 48-yard touchdown pass. LSU intercepted Murray on Georgia's next drive and scored on a four-yard touchdown pass to Kadron Boone to take their first lead of the game at 14-7.

The lead didn't last long, as Georgia marched 79 yards on five plays to tie the game at 14. Todd Gurley took the ball 23 yards on the first play of the drive before Murray found Conley in the back of the end zone three plays later for a 25-yard touchdown pass.

Marshall Morgan broke the tie with 8:16 left in the first half with a 24-yard field goal to push the Bulldogs back in front 17-14. Following punts by both teams on each of their next possessions, LSU made a 49-yard field goal to tie the game at 17. Georgia would answer with a nine-play, 82-yard touchdown drive that culminated with Murray finding the end zone on a one-yard keeper. The Bulldogs entered halftime leading 24-17.

Georgia and LSU traded field goals on the first two possessions of the second half. LSU notched a 39-yard field goal before Morgan answered with a career-long 55-yarder to extend Georgia's lead to 27-20 with 6:35 left in the third quarter.

LSU would once again tie the game on its next possession, driving 80 yards in just under three minutes for a 39-yard touchdown pass from Zach Mettenberger to Jarvis Landry. After a three-and-out, Georgia was forced to punt but the catch was bobbled, allowing Connor Norman to recover the fumble at the LSU 20-yard line. Two plays later, Murray found Michael Bennett wide open in the end zone for a 21-yard touchdown reception.

The lead didn't last long, as LSU drove 70 yards in just over 40 minutes for another TD score to tie the game at 34 apiece. Georgia scored at the 8:09 mark of the fourth quarter on a 38-yard field goal by Morgan to reclaim a slim lead, but LSU responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive that gave it a 41-37 lead with just over four minutes remaining.

On the ensuing drive, Murray went 3-for-3 to lead the Bulldogs into LSU territory. J.J. Green then picked up 18 yards on the ground before Murray found Justin Scott-Wesley in the endzone for what eventually proved to be the game-winning 25-yard touchdown with 1:47 remaining. The Georgia defense held strong in LSU's final drive, not allowing Mettenberger to complete his last four passes. This resulted in Georgia taking over on downs and running out the clock to seal the 44-41 victory.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"In the moment of truth, we took care of business. We knew it would take everything we had in this game. Everything was so crucial. I'm just so humbled and thankful to be the head coach here and to be able to enjoy what happened here today. I thought it would be a knock-down, drag-out fight. I didn't think we'd be able to slow down their run like we did."

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. -- In their third Southeastern Conference matchup of the season, the sixth-ranked Georgia Bulldogs won an overtime nail biter over the Tennessee Volunteers 34-31 in front of a nationally televised CBS audience and a crowd of more than 102,000 in Neyland Stadium on Saturday, Oct. 5. Georgia improves to 4-1 on the year, including a 3-0 mark in the SEC. The Vols fall to 3-3 overall and 0-2 in the SEC.

Senior quarterback Aaron Murray led the Bulldogs through the air, completing 19 of 35 passes for 196 yards and 3 touchdowns. Murray surpassed former Bulldog quarterback David Greene to become the SEC's all-time leader in passing yards. Chris Conley and Rantavious Wooten were Murray's top targets on the afternoon, as Conley tallied 64 yards and a touchdown on five catches, while Wooten had six receptions for 38 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Freshman running back J.J. Green led Georgia's rushing attack, with 17 carries for 129 yards. On the defensive side of the ball, Ramik Wilson led the team with 15 tackles and a sack.

On its opening drive, Georgia took an early 3-0 lead with a 56-yard field goal by Marshall Morgan. The kick was a career-long for Morgan and the longest field goal successfully kicked against the Vols in Tennessee history. The Bulldogs extended the lead on their next drive, going 80 yards in 12 plays, as Murray connected with Conley in the corner of the end zone for a touchdown. After Morgan's PAT, Georgia took a 10-0 lead over the Vols.

Following a 26-yard field goal by Tennessee's Michael Palardy, Georgia responded on its next drive with a 4-yard touchdown pass from Murray to Wooten. Facing a fourth-and-four situation, Murray hit Conley across the middle for a big first down, and the drive eventually culminated with Wooten's touchdown, his first of the season. Georgia led 17-3 at the half.

Tennessee took advantage of a missed Georgia field goal on the Bulldogs' first possession of the second half, as the Vols marched down the short field and scored on a touchdown pass from Justin Worley to Marquez North. On Georgia's next possession, the Vols blocked Colin Barber's punt and returned the loose ball to the endzone to tie the score at 17 apiece.

Georgia wasted no time in answering, however, as a career-long 57-yard scramble by Murray set up a 3-yard touchdown run by freshman tailback Brendan Douglas. The Volunteers responded in kind, as Rajion Neal ripped off a 43-yard run on fourth-and-one to keep Tennessee's offense on the field. Five plays later, Neal scored on a 1-yard run to tie the game at 24. Tennessee then held Georgia and got the ball back with 8:36 left in the fourth quarter. The Vols took 6:42 off the clock in a 13-play, 80-yard drive that resulted in a 7-yard touchdown run by Neal.

Down 31-24, the Bulldogs took possession of the ball with 1:54 remaining. After several penalties by Tennessee defenders pushed Georgia deep into Vol territory, Murray hit Wooten in the back of the end zone for a two-yard touchdown pass with just five seconds left to tie the game at 31 and force overtime.

The Bulldogs won the coin toss prior to the start of overtime, electing to begin play on the defensive side of the ball. Tennessee quickly drove down to the Georgia three-yard line, but a fumble by Pig Howard on the goal line resulted in a touchback that gave the ball to the Bulldogs.

Georgia regained possession of the ball on the Tennessee 25-yard line, and with the Bulldogs unable to convert a first down, Morgan lined up for a potential game-winning field goal. He hit the 42-yarder straight through the uprights, sealing the 34-31 Georgia victory.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"We never give up hope. I never gave up hope. I didn't think much about it, but yes, I was glad Murray was there to do it, but no matter who our quarterback was or is at that time, we always expect those guys to bring us down the field and score. Murray has really played extremely well this year. I'm really proud of him. I think this was a big game. I don't know what anybody else thought, but he played big."

ATHENS, Ga. -- The No. 7 Georgia football team dropped a 41-26 decision to the No. 25 Missouri Tigers on Saturday, Oct. 12 in Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga., in front of 92,746 fans and a nationally-televised ESPN audience. The Bulldogs fall to 4-2 on the year and 3-1 in league play, while Missouri improves to 6-0 overall (2-0 SEC).

Aaron Murray led the Bulldogs through the air, going 25-for-45 for 290 yards with three touchdowns and a pair of interceptions. Rantavious Wooten was Murray's top target, finishing with four catches for 83 yards and a touchdown. J.J. Green led the rushing attack, picking up 89 yards on 12 carries. Ramik Wilson paced the Georgia defense with nine tackles, while Ray Drew picked up seven tackles, including two sacks for a loss of 12 yards.

After the first three drives of the game resulted in punts, Murray orchestrated a 12-play, 86-yard drive that gave Georgia a 7-0 lead after the Marshall Morgan PAT. Highlighting the play was a 26-yard pass to Wooten that set up the Bulldogs at the Missouri 14. Murray eventually connected with Brendan Douglas for a seven-yard TD.

Missouri answered on the following drive, going 79 yards on nine plays to tie the game on a five-yard touchdown run by quarterback James Franklin. A short punt after a Georgia three-and-out gave Missouri the ball near midfield, and Franklin eventually found L'Damian Washington in the end zone for a 16-yard TD that gave the Tigers a 14-7 lead.

The Bulldogs were able to cut the lead to 14-10 on the next drive on Morgan's 29-yard field goal. The Tigers continued to extend the lead with just under six minutes remaining in the first half, as Marcus Murphy picked up 36 yards on the ground for a touchdown that made it a 21-10 game following the extra point. On the ensuing drive, the Tigers recovered a fumble at the Georgia 21-yard line and ran it back for a TD to take the 28-10 lead at half.

On the second play of the second half, Green streaked 57-yards down to the Missouri 10-yard line. The Bulldogs had to settle for a field goal on the play, with Morgan splitting the uprights on a 28-yard attempt that made it a 28-13 game.

After forcing a Missouri punt, Georgia took over at its own 20. Later in the drive facing 4th-and-5, Murray hooked up with Chris Conley for a gain of six, and Arthur Lynch caught a pass from Murray for a gain of 21 that put the Bulldogs inside the Missouri 15. Following another pass interference call on the Tigers, Murray connected with Wooten in the end zone for a touchdown that made it a 28-20 game, following the Morgan PAT.

A defensive stand by the Bulldogs that included a sack of Franklin for a loss of 11 gave Murray and the offense the ball back with under a minute remaining in the third quarter. Douglas carried the ball four times for 23 yards during the drive that put the Bulldogs at the Missouri 10. Murray found Conley waiting in the end zone for a touchdown that trimmed the Tigers' lead to two. The Bulldogs attempted a two-point conversion but were unsuccessful. Missouri then answered with an eight-play, 75-yard scoring drive that made it a 34-26 game. Missouri kicker Andrew Baggett kept it a one-score game with a missed PAT.

Georgia got the ball back with 4:25 left, but Murray was intercepted on the first play of the drive, giving the Tigers the ball at the Georgia 39. The Tigers scored four plays later on a seven-yard rush by Henry Josey to extend the lead to 41-25 with just under two minutes to play. Georgia was unable to get into the end zone on their final possession of the game.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"You can't win a game turning it over like that. They did a really good job of securing the ball and we didn't. We did a good job defensively and started scoring some points. It was impressive to get it back close early in the fourth quarter...Being down as we were, we did a good job of making it interesting."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- Vanderbilt outscored No. 15 Georgia 17-0 in the fourth quarter to claim a 31-27 victory in front of a crowd of 40,350 at Vanderbilt Stadium and a CBS national television audience. With the win, Vanderbilt (4-3, 1-3) captured their first SEC victory of the season, while the Bulldogs fall to 4-3 overall (3-2 SEC).

Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray became the SEC's all-time leader in total yards with a seven-yard completion to tight end Arthur Lynch in the first quarter, moving Murray past former Florida quarterback Tim Tebow's record of 12,232 yards.

The Bulldogs were able to strike first, as sophomore kicker Marshall Morgan capped off a nine-play, 49-yard drive with a 22-yard field goal. Vanderbilt quickly responded with a four-yard touchdown run by Jerron Seymour to put the Commodores in front 7-3.

After both teams went three-and-out on their next drives, Georgia's run game helped push the Bulldogs back in front. Brendan Douglas carried the ball four times for 41 yards, including a bruising 16-yard run up the middle that landed Georgia at the one-yard line. Murray was then able to sneak the ball in for the score, giving the Bulldogs the 10-7 lead.

The Commodores were quick to respond once again, ultimately scoring off of a fake field goal attempt that resulted in a three-yard touchdown run by kicker Carey Spear. Vanderbilt's 11-play, 69-yard drive was given a boost from a targeting penalty against Georgia defensive end Ray Drew that resulted in his ejection from the game.

Freshman comebacker Shaq Wiggins provided a momentum-changing play with a 39-yard interception return that gave Georgia a 17-14 lead at the 6:24 mark of the second quarter. The interception was just the second of the season for Georgia's defense.

Murray kept the momentum going on the Bulldogs' next offensive possession, capping off a 10-play, 54-yard drive with his second rushing touchdown of the game that gave the Bulldogs a 24-14 lead entering the break. Georgia was later able to score on their second drive coming out of halftime, as Morgan nailed a 23-yard field goal to extend the Bulldogs' lead to 27-14 with 6:24 remaining in the third quarter.

At the end of the third quarter, Georgia punt returner Damian Swann muffed a punt that was recovered by Vanderbilt at the Georgia 36-yard line. The Commodores elected to go for it on fourth-and-four from the Georgia 30, but the intended pass was knocked incomplete on a big hit by Ramik Wilson. A late flag was thrown, penalizing Wilson for a personal foul, which gave Vanderbilt an automatic first down to keep the drive alive.

Vanderbilt back-up quarterback Patton Robinette eventually ran the ball for a two-yard touchdown to trim Georgia's lead to 27-21 with 10:38 remaining. After Georgia went three-and-out on their next possession, the Commodores came back with a 40-yard field goal by Spear to trail by just three at 27-24 with 4:44 left in the game.

The Commodores once again held Georgia to another three-and-out, forcing the Bulldogs to punt. Punter Collin Barber was unable to handle the high snap and instead had to fall on the ball on Georgia's 14-yard line. Vanderbilt scored the go-ahead touchdown on the next play with a 13-yard run by Seymour that put the Commodores in front 31-27 with just under three minutes remaining. Murray looked to lead Georgia to yet another fourth-quarter comeback, but Jake Sealand forced Douglas to fumble the ball on Georgia's final drive, thereby sealing the 31-27 upset victory for the Commodores.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"(Vanderbilt) played a great game, and they played better than us. Their fans did a great job, and so did the backup quarterback who came in in a tough position. They had outstanding defense, and we just got beat by a good team...We certainly made mistakes today on special teams, but this is a team game. Offense has a responsibility, defense has a responsibility and special teams has their responsibility. We win as a team, we lose as a team."

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. -- The Georgia football team held on for a 23-20 win over the Florida Gators in front of a capacity crowd of 84,693 at EverBank Stadium in Jacksonville, Fla., and a nationally-televised CBS audience.

The Bulldogs improve to 5-3 on the season, including a 4-2 mark in the Southeastern Conference. Florida drops to 4-4 overall and 3-3 in the SEC. The win marked the third in a row for the Bulldogs over the Gators as quarterback Aaron Murray became just the third starting QB in school history to post three wins over Florida. The feat has not been accomplished since Buck Belue went 3-0 against the Gators from 1979-81.

Aaron Murray led the Bulldogs passing attack, finishing with 258 yards and a touchdown on 16-for-25 passing. Todd Gurley returned to game action for the first time since sustaining an ankle injury against LSU on Sept. 28, leading the team with 17 carries for 100 yards and a touchdown on the ground. Gurley was also Georgia's leading receiver, picking up 87 yards and a touchdown on three catches. Michael Bennett also made his return to the playing field against Florida after missing the previous two games with a torn meniscus suffered against Tennessee. Bennett finished the game with five catches for 59 yards, while fellow split end Rhett McGowan finished with three catches for 43 yards.

Ramik Wilson led Georgia's defense, racking up 11 tackles. Garrison Smith added nine stops, including three sacks for a loss of 12 yards. Corey Moore also had a key sack late in the fourth quarter to go along with five tackles, and Amaro Herrera chipped in with seven tackles.

Georgia jumped out to an early 14-0 lead in the first quarter, scoring on its first two possessions of the game. On the opening drive, Gurley took the ball 39 yards on two carries down to the Florida five-yard line before taking the handoff from Murray to the end zone that put Georgia up 7-0 after the Marshall Morgan extra point.

After the Gators missed a 40-yard field goal attempt, Georgia got the ball back with just over 10 minutes on the clock. On third-and-six, Murray found Gurley over the middle for a 73-yard touchdown that made it a 14-0 game, following the PAT.

On its third possession, Murray led the Bulldogs into Gator territory with the help of a bruising 21-yard run by Douglas. The drive was capped off by a 49-yard field goal by Morgan that gave the Bulldogs a 17-0 lead. Georgia added another field goal on its next possession, this time a 27-yarder that made it a 20-0 game with 14:37 on the clock in the second quarter.

Florida got its first points of the game five minutes into the second quarter on a 31-yard field goal by Frankie Velez to make it 20-3. After the Gators failed to convert on fourth-and-ten, the Bulldogs got the ball back at their own 43. After a first down catch by McGowan, Morgan made a 32-yard field goal that extended Georgia's lead to 23-3 as time expired in the half.

The Gators scored their first touchdown of the game following a Georgia turnover with 6:21 left to play in the third quarter. Two plays after a fumble on a lateral pass by Murray, Florida found the end zone on a five-yard run that cut the Georgia lead to 23-10. With 1:23 left in the third quarter, Murray was sacked in the end zone for a safety that brought the score to 23-12. Following the free kick, the Gators went 50 yards on five plays for a touchdown and a two-point conversion that trimmed the Bulldogs' lead to 23-20.

Georgia got the ball back with 8:17 left in the game and milked the clock for the remainder of the contest with the help of five first downs, including one by McGowan with just over two minutes left. A personal foul penalty against the Gators late in the drive gave Georgia an automatic first down, and the Bulldogs were able to let the clock expire and hang on for the 23-20 victory.



Coach Mark Richt said...

"I'm thankful for the win and I'm proud of the effort from everybody. We played tremendously in the first half, then gave [Florida] some life and got their blood pumping. It could've turned bad, but we got some big stops on defense and the offense finished with that beautiful drive. ... Any time you can get out of here with a win, it's special."

ATHENS, Ga. -- The Georgia football claimed a 45-6 win over the Appalachian State Mountaineers on Homecoming in Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga., on Saturday afternoon in front of a sold-out crowd of 92,746 and a regional WSB-TV television audience.

With the win, the Bulldogs improve to 6-3 on the season while the Moutaineers drop to 2-8 overall.

Georgia quarterback Aaron Murray became the SEC's career leader in touchdown passes with 115 as he went 19-for-26 for 281 yards and a pair of touchdowns to lead the Bulldogs offensively through the air. Rantavious Wooten was his top targer on the afternoon, finishing with 104 receiving yards and one touchdown on four receptions. Todd Gurley was Georgia's leading rusher, picking up 75 yards on 13 carries and a score. Redshirt junior quarterback Hutson Mason also saw action in the game, finishing 11-for-16 for 160 yards and one touchdown.

Ramik Wilson led the way for Georgia defensively with 12 tackles, while Amarlo Herrera added seven tackles. Junior defensive end Ray Drew recroded five tackles, including a sack.

The Mountaineers struck first in the scoring column, going 62 yards on the opening drive before Drew Stewart kicked a 33-yard field goal to take an early 3-0 lead.

Georgia quickly responded with a six-play, 72-yard drive that took just 2:08 off the clock and put the Bulldogs in front 7-3, following the Marshall Morgan PAT. Wooten was Murray's top target on the drive, picking up 58 yards through the air, including a 35-yard touchdown strike. With that touchdown pass, Murray tied former Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel with the SEC career passing touchdown record at 114.

The Moutaineers added another three points with a career-best 49-yard field goal by Stewart with just over two minutes left in the first half. The score capped off an eight-play, 50-yard drive. After a Georgia turnover near midfield, Appalachian State looked to take the lead, but Jordan Jenkins blocked the field goal to preserve the Bulldogs' lead.

Georgia then answered on the next drive, marching 68 yards on seven plays in 3:03 to go up 14-6. Th drive was highlighted by Michael Bennett's 23-yard touchdown grab from Murray. The touchdown pass was the 115th of Murray's career, giving him sole possession of the SEC record in career touchdown passes.

The Moutaineers threatened with three minutes left in the half but Stewart missed a 46-yard field goal attempt wide left, allowing Georgia to take a 14-6 lead into the half.

Georgia elected to receive the ball in the second half and proceeded to take it into Moutaineer territory with the help of a 33-yard catch by Wooten. The Bulldogs eventually settled for a 42-yard field goal by Morgan on the drive to extend the lead to 17-6 with 12:59 remaining in the third quarter.

With just under eight minutes to play in the quarter, Murray orchestrated an eight-play, 68-yard touchdown drive that put the Bulldogs up 24-6. Murray rushed for 23 yards during the drive, and Bennett picked up 34 yards through the air before Gurley took the ball two yards up the middle for the score.

After an Appalachian State fumble, Mason led Georgia on a five-play, 42-yard drive that took 1:59 off the clock. Mason ultimately completed a three-yard touchdown pass to Kenneth Towns to extend the Georgia lead to 38-6 following Morgan's extra point.

The Bulldogs added one final touchdown with 8:29 left to play when Brendan Douglas ran for a two-yard touchdown that secured the 45-6 victory for Georgia.

"Appalachian State played great, in the first half especially. They had a great plan. They had four field goal attempts, and it could have been 14-12. The defense did a good job of forcing field goals instead of touchdowns. That was the best thing we did. In the second half, we played a whole lot better. We created some turnovers and played so many young guys, so that was great."
