COUGARS KICK OFF SEASON AT AUBURN: Washington State University opens the 2013 season at Auburn University, Saturday at 4 p.m. (PT) on ESPNU.

NEXT WEEK: Washington State will hit the road for the second straight week, heading to Los Angeles to open Pac-12 Conference play against the University of Southern California, Saturday, Sept. 7 at 7:30 p.m. on FOX Sports 1.

MIKE LEACH RADIO SHOW: Washington State Head Coach Mike Leach holds a weekly radio show on WSU's flagship station 920 KXLY live from Zeppoz in Pullman. This week's show will be Wednesday from 6-7 p.m.

COUGARS IN SEASON OPENERS: Washington State owns a 69-43-5 record in season openers in its 117-year history. When opening the season on the road, WSU is 20-28-3 all-time after dropping a 30-6 decision at BYU last season. Head coach Mike Leach is 9-2 in season openers and has won seven of his last eight. The last BCS road win to open the season was against New Mexico (21-17) in 2004. WSU is 78-34-3 all-time in home openers, including games in Pullman, Spokane and Seattle. Since 1990 the Cougars boast a 15-7 record in home debuts, and are 25-12 dating back to the start of the 1975 season.

WSU VS. AUBURN, SEC: WSU owns a 1-5 all-time record against the Southeastern Conference, going 1-4 against the University of Tennessee before suffering a 40-14 defeat to Auburn in their only previous meeting, the 2006 season opener in Alabama.

MIKE LEACH AND THE SEC: Cougar head coach Mike Leach owns a 2-2 career mark coaching against SEC opponents during his 10 seasons at Texas Tech. Leach led the Red Raiders to a 42-28 win over Ole Miss in 2002, a 49-45 victory at Ole Miss in 2003, suffered a 13-10 defeat to Alabama in the 2006 Cotton Bowl and a 47-34 loss to Ole Miss in the 2009 Cotton Bowl. In his one year as the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma, Leach saw the Sooners fall to Ole Miss 27-25 in the 1999 Independence Bowl. Leach also spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator at Kentucky where the Wildcats went 5-6 in 1997 and 7-5 in 1998.

WSU AGAINST NONCONFERENCE OPPONENTS: Since the opening of the 2001 season, WSU is 26-9 against unranked, nonconference opponents including wins over Idaho (seven times), Nevada (twice), New Mexico (twice), UNLV (twice), Boise State, Purdue, Colorado, Grambling State, Baylor and SMU.

COLLEGE GAMEDAY RECORD: In addition to Chris Fowler, Kirk Herbstreit and Lee Corso, ESPN's College GameDay has had another constant – the WSU flag, which this weekend will be making its 131st consecutive appearance on the weekly show, dating back to the beginning of the 2004 season. Two flags – Ol' Crimson and Gray – have been flown in the background of the GameDay set by dozens of friends and alumni. The Gray flag was added this year after Whitey was retired in honor of Steve Gleason's "No White Flags." WSU recognized the GameDay flag wavers in a pregame ceremony prior to the Montana State game in 2010. In addition to the flags that fly, there is a traveling flag signed by the holders after each episode. The traveling flag is retired after each season, the first of which is hanging in WSU's Alumni Center.

YOUTH MOVEMENT FOR COUGARS IN 2012: The Cougars saw a youth movement in 2012, as 17 freshmen, including nine true freshmen, appeared in a game last season. Overall, Washington State had 20 players make their first career start in 2012 including five freshmen who earned starts.

WILSON, YOST JOIN COUGAR COACHING STAFF: The 2013 Washington State coaching staff owns a pair of new faces in linebackers coach Ken Wilson and inside wide receivers coach David Yost. Wilson comes to WSU after spending the past 20-plus seasons at the University of Nevada. Yost joins Mike Leach's offensive staff after working on Gary Pinkel's University of Missouri staff as the recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach the past 12 seasons, including the Tigers inaugural season in the SEC in 2012.

BUCANNON GARNERS PRESEASON ACCOLADES: Senior safety Deone Bucannon was named to the Jim Thorpe Award 2013 watch list, the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame and Jim Thorpe Association announced this past July. Bucannon is one of 48 players included on the watch list for the award that honors the nation's best defensive back. The Fairfield, Calif. native was an All-Pac-12 second team selection last season after making a team-high 106 tackles, tied for second-most in the Pac-12 and was the highest total by any non-linebacker. Bucannon also made a team-best four interceptions including a two-interception performance against Oregon. Bucannon posted seven double-digit tackle performances including a 17-tackle game at Arizona State. Earlier this summer, Bucannon was named to the Preseason All-Pac-12 Second Team by both Athlon Sports and Phil Steel Magazine and was also named to the Preseason All-America Fourth Team by Athlon Sports.

BOWLIN, FURNEY NAMED TO PRESEASON AWARD WATCH LISTS: Senior punter Michael Bowlin and senior kicker Andrew Furney were each named to preseason award watch lists this summer. Bowlin is one of 25 candidates named to the Ray Guy Award preseason watch list that honors the nation's top collegiate punter. Bowlin averaged 41.9 yards-per-punt last season, his first with the Cougars. The Aliso Viejo, Calif. native put eight punts inside the 20, recorded 14 kicks of 50+ yards including a season long of 69 and finished the year with a team-best seven special teams tackles. Bowlin also recorded 18 touchbacks on kickoffs, the most by a Cougar since 2005. For the second straight season, Furney is one of the 30 players named to the Lou Groza College Place-Kicker Award Watch List. Furney, a Groza Award semifinalist in 2011, earned second team All-Pac-12 accolades along with Phil Steele Midseason second team All-American honors last season after going 14-for-20 on field goal attempts, tied for second in the conference. The Burlington, Wash. native was a perfect 7-for-7 on attempts inside 30 yards and 6-of-10 on kicks outside of 40 yards including a conference-best 60-yarder against Eastern Washington. Furney went 25-of-26 on PATs and capped his season going 3-for-3 in the Apple Cup victory including the game-winner from 27-yards in overtime.

BUCANNON CLIMBING WSU RECORD BOOK: Deone Bucannon enters his senior year with his name sprinkled throughout the WSU record book, appearing seventh in career solo tackles and just outside the top-10 for total tackles. He also owns nine career interceptions, needing just two more to break into the WSU's career top-10.

BUCANNON POSTED 100-TACKLE SEASONS: Safety Deone Bucannon picked up his first career all-conference accolade last season, earning All-Pac-12 second team honors after making a team-high 106 tackles, tied for second-most in the Pac-12 and was the highest total by any non-linebacker. The 106 stops is WSU's first 100-tackle season since Eric Frampton made 100 in 2006 and is the most since James Darling made 136 in 1996. Bucannon also made a team-best four interceptions including a two-interception performance against Oregon. The Fairfield, Calif. native posted seven double-digit tackle performances including a 17-tackle game at Arizona State. Bucannon also pushed his career solo tackle total to 190, seventh-most in school history.

FURNEY FINISHED OFF IMPRESSIVE JUNIOR CAMPAIGN: Kicker Andrew Furney earned All-Pac-12 second team honors after going 14-for-20 on field goal attempts, tied for second in the conference. The Burlington, Wash. native was a perfect 7-for-7 on attempts inside 30 yards and 6-of-10 on kicks outside of 40 yards including a conference-best 60-yarder against Eastern Washington. Furney went 25-of-26 on PATs and capped his season earning Pac-12 Special Teams Player of the Week after going 3-for-3 in the Apple Cup victory, kicking a game-tying 45-yarder with 1:59 remaining and later hitting the game-winner from 27-yards in overtime.

DEFENSE RACKED UP THE SACKS: The Washington State defense tallied 35 sacks in 2012, fifth-most in the Pac-12 Conference and tied for No. 11 in the country at 2.9 per game. Following a year in which the Cougars recorded 17 in the 2011 season, the switch to a 3-4 defense saw more linebackers in the backfield as 23 of the 35 sacks came from linebackers. The Cougars also racked up 92 tackles-for-loss, the fifth-highest total in the Pac-12, and seventh-most per game (7.7) in the country. The 35 sacks are the most by a Cougar defense since the 2006 team had 36 while the 92 tackles-for-loss are the most since the 2003 team had 93. WSU also picked off 15 passes, the most since the 2006 team finished with 16 interceptions.

COUGARS PRODUCE PAC-12'S TOP PASSING MARK: Washington State finished 2012 with the top passing attack in the Pac-12 Conference at 330.4 yards-per-game. That figure ranked ninth nationally and marked the second-highest average in school history. Six times the Cougars threw for more than 300 yards led by Connor Halliday's four 300-yard performances, tying for third-most in the conference. WSU posted school single-season records for completions (363) and pass attempts (624), breaking the previous marks of 309 completions and 525 attempts, both set in 2007.

HALLIDAY AT IT AGAIN: Quarterback Connor Halliday picked up where he left off from 2011, tearing up the record books once again as the Spokane native passed for 378 yards and four touchdowns at UNLV then followed with 401 yards and four touchdown passes against Colorado. It was the first time a WSU quarterback has posted back-to-back four-touchdown games since 2007 when Alex Brink threw for five scores against San Diego State and four against Idaho. Halliday threw for 348 yards against No. 2 Oregon and 330 yards against UCLA and owns five 300-yard performances, two 400-yard games and four four-touchdown performances after passing for 494 yards and four scores against Arizona State in 2011. He notched his first career five-touchdown game against UCLA, the tenth such game in WSU history, and owns 24 career touchdown passes.

NEW FACES MADE BIG IMPACTS: Washington State saw a number of new faces on the field in 2012 as 17 freshmen (nine true freshmen) made their debuts and 20 players made their first career start. The newcomers were led by junior nose tackle Ioane Gauta who started all 12 games, made 31 stops including 8.5 tackles-for-loss, three sacks and an interception. Freshman wideout Brett Bartolone earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention after leading WSU with 53 receptions and added four touchdowns while fellow freshman wide receiver Gabe Marks finished third on the team with 49 catches and tallied a pair of 100-yard performances in his first collegiate season. Freshman running back Teondray Caldwell was second on the team in rushing and earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention as a kick returner after finishing the year third in the Pac-12 in kickoff return average at 25.0, posting a 63-yard return at BYU, a 54-yarder against Colorado and a 92-yarder against Oregon.

MONROE MADE HIS MARK: Linebacker Darryl Monroe produced some impressive numbers in his first full season for the Cougars in 2012, starting at MIKE linebacker in all 12 games. Monroe earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention after finishing second on the team in tackles with 80 including 8.5 tackles-for-loss. He also forced two fumbles, recovered one and made three sacks. The Orlando, Fla. native redshirted last season after suffering a leg injury in the 2011 season opener against Idaho State but bounced back after adding 15 pounds to his frame since arriving from Dr. Phillips High School where he was named one of the top five linebackers in the state of Florida as a senior.

COOPER, WILLIAMS PRODUCE AFTER REDSHIRT SEASON: After redshirting the 2011 campaign, their first season campus, defensive lineman Xavier Cooper and wideout Dominique Williams both put up impressive numbers in their first season on the field in 2012. Cooper earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention after tying for third on the team with 8.5 tackles-for-loss including three sacks in 11 games while Williams made 34 catches for 546 yards and three touchdowns. Williams started the final five games and capped the season with his first career 100-yard performance, catching eight passes for 143 yards in the Apple Cup victory.

BOWLIN BLASTS AWAY: Kicker Mike Bowlin provided a big boost to the WSU kicking game in 2012, recording 18 touchbacks on kickoffs to surpass 2011's total of one, Nick Grasu's mark of 11 in 2010, Loren Langley and Romeen Abdollmohammadi's combined total of 14 in 2006 and matched Graham Siderius' recorded 18 in 2005. Bowlin also recorded 14 punts of 50+ yards including a 69-yarder against Eastern Washington, a 60-yarder at UNLV, one for 65 yards against Oregon and put eight punts inside the 20.

SPECIAL TEAMS IMPROVED: The Washington State return game saw improvement in 2012 as Teondray Caldwell earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention as a kick returner after finishing third in the conference with a 25.0 kick return average. Caldwell recorded kick returns of 63 yards at BYU, a 54-yarder against Colorado and nearly took one to house against No. 2 Oregon, going for 92 yards. The punt return team nearly doubled the 2011 return average and improved its national ranking by 30 spots with a 6.8 return average. Leon Brooks led WSU with a 10.6 return average, more than three times the average of 2011. Brooks made a career-best 29-yard return against Eastern Washington. Additionally, the kickoff coverage team finished as the No. 61 in the country, allowing 21.3 per return, a big improvement from 2011's coverage team that ranked No. 99 at 23.7 yards-per-return.

TALIULU MADE IMPRESSIVE COUGAR DEBUTS: Safety Taylor Taliulu showed little nerves while making his collegiate debut in last year's season opener at BYU, racking up nine tackles and breaking up two passes. It was the most tackles by a freshman in his debut since Chima Nwachukwu also recorded nine tackles at Wisconsin in 2007. The Aiea, Hawaii native followed that performance with by tying for a WSU game-high with seven tackles in the home opener against Eastern Washington.

BUCANNON, FURNEY NAMED TO ALL-PAC-12 SECOND TEAM: Washington State saw 10 players receive All-Pac-12 Conference recognition last season. Deone Bucannon and Andrew Furney each garnered second team honors while graduated senior linebacker Travis Long, wideout Brett Bartolone, center Elliott Bosch, kick returner Teondray Caldwell, linebacker Cyrus Coen, defensive lineman Xavier Cooper, linebacker Darryl Monroe and graduated cornerback Daniel Simmons all received honorable mention.

COUGARS CLOSED SEASON WITH APPLE CUP VICTORY: Washington State closed out the 2012 season with a 31-28 overtime victory over Washington to claim its first Apple Cup since 2008. Andrew Furney kicked a 27-yard field goal on the Cougars first possession of overtime, and the Cougars overcame an 18-point deficit in the fourth quarter to stun the Huskies for the largest comeback victory in Apple Cup history. Jeff Tuel threw for 350 yards and Carl Winston rushed for three touchdowns in their final collegiate games.

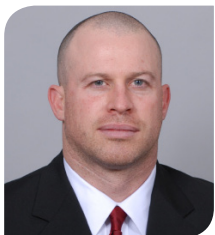

WSU-AUBURN SERIES HISTORY

ONLY MEETING September 2, 2006

AUBURN def. Washington State, 40-14

AUBURN, Ala. - Kenny Irons routinely side-stepped defenders and the Auburn Tigers did the same with the opening day jitters that have plagued them in recent years. Irons rushed for 183 yards, including a 58-yard touchdown scamper to open the third quarter, and the fourth-ranked Tigers beat Washington State 40-14 on Saturday night. No season-opening pain on the Plains this time. Only celebration, optimism and enough big plays to overcome any deficiencies against the Pac-10 visitors. Irons had a career-high 223 all-purpose yards on 20 rushes and three catches. The Tigers had an array of big runs from Irons, accurate kicks from John Vaughn, on-target passes from quarterback Brandon Cox - and a big gamble by coach Tommy Tuberville on a fake punt. Auburn had lost three of its last four openers, but will get to enjoy their highest preseason ranking since 1990 at least another week. Irons opened Auburn's first drive with a 42-yard carry and never stopped pounding away at the Cougars. His only misstep came on his biggest play. Irons slowed down around the 5-yard line at the end of his field-reversing 58-yarder to taunt pursuing defender Tyrone Brackenridge and nearly stepped out of bounds, but the play stood after a review by instant replay officials. Cox was 11-of-18 for 191 yards and had a 34-yard touchdown pass to backup tailback Brad Lester, who also ran for a 12-yard score. But the Cougars couldn't slow Irons down. Vaughn kicked four first-half field goals, including a career-long 52-yarder, for Auburn's first 12 points. Then, Lester and Cox made the Cougars pay for a blitz with their swing pass as he dove over the goal line. The defense hounded Washington State quarterback Alex from the start, sacking him on three of the Cougars' first four plays. Brink passed for 2,891 yards last season but only 67 against the Tigers, completing 11-of-24 passes with a touchdown and an

interception. His longest pass play was 16 yards, and he seldom got time to find open receivers downfield against an aggressive defense under new coordinator Will Muschamp. Plus, tailback DeMaundray Woolridge went out with a deep thigh bruise after gaining 86 yards on nine carries. His status will be evaluated during the week. The Cougars replaced Brink for one series midway through the third quarter. Gary Rogers quickly moved them downfield before finding tight end Cory Boyd wide-open across the middle for a 50-yard touchdown, making it 26-14. The Tigers then resorted to trickery in an attempt to regain momentum. Linebacker Will Herring took the direct snap on a fake punt from Auburn's own 16, running 42 yards. After a halfback pass fell incomplete, Vaughn missed a 36-yard field goal. But the Auburn defense held and Lester scored on a 12-yarder with 11:02 left in the fourth quarter. After that, the rout was back on. Auburn's defense shut down the Cougars biggest weapon, receiver Jason Hill, who averaged 110 yards per game last year. He caught a 2-yard touchdown pass but finished with four catches for 18 yards. Auburn outgained Washington State 484-274, gaining 293 yards on the ground without a turnover. The Tigers also silenced some of that talk about being slow starters.

MIKE LEACH

Head Coach

First Season

Washington State University announced Nov. 30, 2011 that Mike Leach had been named the Cougars' head football coach.

In his first season in Pullman, Leach's high-powered offense led the conference in passing, averaging 330.42 yards per game. That figure ranked ninth nationally and marked the second-highest average in school history. Seven times the Cougars threw for more than 350 yards, including the season-ending, 31-28, overtime win against Washington. In a season that produced a 3-9 overall record, the Cougars saw a bit of a youth movement as 17 freshmen played and only four seniors started regularly. Academically, nine Cougars received Pac-12 All-Academic honors while the 2012 fall semester football GPA of 2.66 marked the first time the football team had been over a 2.60 GPA for fall semester.

Leach brought a proven record of winning to Pullman. In 10 seasons as a head coach, all at Texas Tech (2000-09) his program earned 10 bowl bids. In addition, the Susanville, Calif., native who was raised in Cody, Wyo., recorded a school-record 84 victories during his tenure.

Leading the most prolific passing offense in the country, Leach received three national coach of the year awards in 2008 - the Woody Hayes Award, Howie Long/Fieldturf Coach of the Year, and George Munger Award. His offense spreads the field with his exciting brand of football and guided Texas Tech to six NCAA passing titles and three total offense titles during his 10 seasons in Lubbock. Leach's offense produced school records in nearly every passing category in 2000, his first season with the Red Raiders, but surpassed those numbers in each of his next nine seasons.

During Leach's time in Lubbock, Texas, the Red Raiders increased their yards per game by more than 150 and averaged nearly 20 points more per outing. In the passing game, Texas Tech threw for about 300 yards more per game in the decade Leach was at the helm.

Leach led Texas Tech to one of the most memorable seasons in school history in 2008 as the team set a program record with 11 regular-season wins en route to an 11-2 record. The win total tied the mark, set previously by the 1953 and 1973 Red Raider squads. Numerous accolades poured in from across the country as an unprecedented four players earned first-team All-America status, in addition to Leach's three coach of the year honors. Quarterback Graham Harrell, offensive tackle Rylan Reed and offensive guard Brandon Carter each garnered first-team honors, while wide receiver Michael Crabtree was honored as a unanimous consensus All-American for the second-straight season.

On the field in 2008, the Red Raiders led the nation in passing for the sixth time in Leach's ten seasons and ranked among the top five in total offense. Harrell finished his storied career second on the NCAA career passing yardage list with 15,793 yards. Harrell also broke the career NCAA passing touchdowns mark with 134.

The Texas Tech program has established itself as one of the nation's leading producers of productive quarterbacks since the 2000 season. Harrell threw for 4,555 yards in his debut as the starter in 2006 and became the sixth player and third Red Raider in NCAA history to throw for 5,000 yards in a season with his 5,705-yard effort in 2007 and 5,111 yards last season. He also is the third quarterback under Leach to win nine games in a season and the first Red Raider in history to win 11 in a regular season. Former quarterback Kliff Kingsbury in 2002 and Cody Hodges in 2005 each posted nine-win seasons during their careers, while 2003 and 2004 signal callers B.J. Symons and Sonny Cumbie each won eight games in their respective seasons as the starter.

The Red Raiders improved their total offensive numbers from 324.8 yards per game to 531.0 yards per game since Leach's arrival. Leach's first nine seasons at Tech rank as the top nine all-time in total offense, while scoring went from 23 points per game in 1999 to a school-record 43.8 points in 2008. The most significant increase was in the passing game, where the Red Raiders averaged 475.3 yards per game in 2008 compared to 175.4 yards in 1999.

The running game flourished under Leach as well. Former Red Raider Taurean Henderson holds the NCAA career record for receptions by a running back. The Red Raiders' 28 total rushing scores in 2008 were the most for a Tech team since the 1993 team scored 30. Despite Tech's offense revolving around the pass, Leach did a tremendous job of incorporating the running back position into the mix. Henderson finished his career with 303 receptions, which ranks first in NCAA history among running backs and fourth overall.

The Red Raiders were not known solely for their play on the scoring side of the ball. The Texas Tech defense also flourished during Leach's 10 seasons. Texas Tech held opponents without an offensive touchdown a dozen times under Leach, including seven shutouts. Three of the whitewashes came in 2000 when the Red Raiders tied for the national lead.

The play of the special teams also improved with each season. Former placekicker Alex Trlica holds the NCAA record with 233 career extra points and another record for extra points made without a miss. He finished with 377 career points, which ranks among the top 10 in NCAA history among kickers. While leading the Red Raiders to 76 wins in his nine seasons, Leach is the only coach in school history to lead ten teams to bowl games.

Although Leach's presence was felt throughout the team, it also was beneficial for the players individually. In addition to picking up the Sammy Baugh Trophy in 2007, Harrell was the recipient of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame's Post-Graduate Scholarship and was one of 15 players selected as a candidate for the prestigious Draddy Award, the academic Heisman. Harrell also ranked fourth in the 2008 Heisman voting, while Crabtree was fifth. Symons was the second Tech quarterback to receive The Touchdown Club of Columbus' Sammy Baugh Trophy (Kingsbury in 2002).

Kingsbury, a 2002 All-Big 12 first-team quarterback and sixth-round draft pick of the New England Patriots, led the Big 12 Conference in several passing categories

during his final three seasons and was a Heisman Trophy candidate in 2002. He also was named the Verizon Academic All-American of the Year for football and was awarded an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.

In 2004, inside receiver Trey Haverty became Tech's first Associated Press All-American since Montae Reagor in 1998, when he was selected to the third team. Free safety Dwayne Slay earned first-team All-America honors from Sports Illustrated in 2005, marking the first in seven seasons. Slay was one of the country's most punishing tacklers that year and led the conference and finished second nationally with eight forced fumbles.

Leach has coached several players who have gone on to the NFL. While at Tech, 18 players have been drafted and 21 others have signed free agent contracts. In the spring of 2009, four players were selected among the first four rounds of the NFL Draft, marking the most successful draft for Texas Tech in the Leach era. Crabtree became the highest draft pick at No. 10, since Gabe Rivera in 1983. Crabtree, selected by the San Francisco 49ers, is the highest drafted Tech receiver since Dave Parks went No. 1 overall in 1964.

Safety Darcel McBath was selected by the Denver Broncos in the second round, while offensive lineman Louis Vasquez was taken in the third by San Diego. Defensive end Brandon Williams went to the Dallas Cowboys in the fourth.

The program made strides academically as well under Leach. During his 10 years, Tech was recognized as one of the nation's top institutions for consistently being above a 70 percent graduation rate, according to the American Football Coaches Association.

Prior to coming on board at Texas Tech, Leach, in just one season at Oklahoma, directed a Sooner offense that went from one of the worst in the Big 12 Conference to one of the best. Under Leach's tutelage, Josh Heupel was named 1999 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year. For his efforts, Leach was nominated for the 1999 Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country.

Leach guided an Oklahoma offense that went from 11th in the Big 12 in 1998 to first in 1999 and 101st in the nation to 11th. In just one year, OU's total offense numbers improved from 293.3 to 427.2 yards per game.

The rise in passing and scoring offense categories is just as impressive. Oklahoma went from last to first in the Big 12 in passing offense in one year, from 107th in the country to ninth. Under Leach, the Sooners improved from 109.9 yards passing per game to 321.7 yards per game.

In 1998, Oklahoma was last in the Big 12 and 101st in the country in scoring offense at 16.7 points per game. In 1999, the Sooners improved to second in the league and eighth in the country in scoring at 36.8 points per game, an increase of just over 20 points per game.

Under Leach, the Oklahoma offense set six Big 12 Conference and 17 OU records. The Sooners were one of only two schools in the nation to have six players with 20 or more receptions in 1999.

Prior to joining Bob Stoops' Oklahoma staff, Leach served as offensive coordinator for Hal Mumme at the University of Kentucky and Valdosta (Ga.) State University. For two years at Kentucky under Mumme, Leach coached the Kentucky "Air Raid" offense that was one of the most explosive in Southeastern Conference history. Under Mumme and Leach, the Kentucky offense set six NCAA records, 41 Southeastern Conference records and 116 school records in 22 games.

Leach's Kentucky offense featured the talented Tim Couch, who passed for 4,275 yards and 34 touchdowns as a senior and was the top pick of the 1999 NFL Draft.

Named 1996 Division II Offensive Coordinator of the Year by American Football Quarterly magazine, Leach helped Mumme lead Valdosta State to a 40-17-1 record. The 1993 Blazer offense smashed 66 school records, 22 conference records and seven national records. In 1994, Valdosta State advanced to the Division II playoffs with Leach's offense shattering 80 school records, 35 conference records and seven more national marks.

Leach and Mumme first teamed up at Iowa Wesleyan College in 1989. From 1989 to 1991 Leach served as offensive coordinator and line coach for an offense that led the NAIA in passing yardage one season and finished second the other two. Iowa Wesleyan quarterbacks passed for more than 11,000 yards in Leach's three seasons and broke 26 national records.

Leach also has made coaching stops in Pori, Finland, where he served as a head coach in the European Football League (1989), as well as one-year stints at College of the Desert (1988) and Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo (1987).

After graduating with honors from BYU in 1983, Leach earned a master's degree from the U.S. Sports Academy and his law degree from Pepperdine University, where he graduated in the top one-third of his class.

The oldest of six siblings, Leach and his wife, Sharon, are the parents of four children; Janeen, Kim, Cody and Kiersten.

PROVO, Utah – Riley Nelson threw for two touchdowns and third-string quarterback Taysom Hill added another on his first collegiate pass as Brigham Young beat Washington State 30-6 on Thursday night to spoil Mike Leach's return to coaching. Washington State finished with 224 yards total offense. Washington State came out passing as expected, with Tuel starting 8 of 9. But his 10th pass was intercepted by Uona Kaveinga, and the momentum shifted to BYU before a "white-out" crowd. It was Leach's coaching debut for WSU, coaching against his alma mater. Leach never played football at BYU, but he gained inspiration for his spread passing attack from LaVell Edwards, for whom BYU's stadium is named. At one point in pre-game interviews, Leach said his team looked more like BYU of old than BYU. The BYU Cougars rolled up 426 yards offense, nearly twice that of Washington State. Andrew Furney's 47-yard field goal put Washington State on the board with 10:42 left in the second quarter and he added a 41-yarder just before halftime after a TD pass to Marquess Wilson was nullified by holding. BYU found one way to keep Leach's offense off the field - long drives. BYU's three first-half scoring drives were all 10 plays or longer, the third going for 16 and capped by Riley Stephenson's 28-yard field goal. BYU's defense, meanwhile, played up to its billing, holding Washington State to just 3 yards rushing in the first half, and limiting Tuel to 108 yards passing.

PULLMAN, Wash. – Jeff Tuel threw a pair of touchdown passes to Isiah Myers as Washington State hung on to beat Eastern Washington 24-20 on Saturday in the home debut of Cougars coach Mike Leach. Washington State (1-1), which lost at BYU in the season opener, also unveiled a \$65 million upgrade of Martin Stadium in front of the first sellout crowd here since 2007. Eastern Washington (1-1), an FCS power coming off a victory over Idaho of the FBS, kept it close behind a pair of touchdown receptions by Brandon Kaufman. This was the first meeting since 1908 between the two programs, located 60 miles apart. Washington State scored first when Tuel connected with Myers in the back of the end zone on a 2-yard scoring pass with 5:42 left in the first quarter. Eastern replied on the next series when quarterback Kyle Padron hit Kaufman with a 93-yard touchdown pass to tie the score. But Washington State drove 75 yards on its next series, with Carl Winston rushing over from the 1 to take a 14-7 lead. Winston's 27-yard run was the key play of the drive. Eastern Washington drove 80 yards on its next series, half coming on a reception by Zack Gehring, before Jordan Talley ran over from the 5 to tie the score at 14 early in the second quarter. Washington State's Cyrus Coen intercepted a scrambling Padron and ran the ball down to Eastern's 17. On the first play, Tuel passed 17 yards to Myers for a touchdown that put WSU up 21-14. A 60-yard field goal by WSU's Andrew Furney as time expired gave the Cougars a 24-14 halftime lead. It was the second longest field goal in team history after Jason Hanson's 62-yarder against UNLV in 1991. The Eagles went on a penalty-filled 99-yard drive late in the fourth quarter that ended with a 17-yard touchdown pass from Padron to Kaufman. The extra point was blocked to leave WSU with a 24-20 lead with 2:17 remaining. Washington State recovered the onside kick, had two touchdown plays called back because of penalties, and had to punt. Eastern got a last chance with 1:29 left on its 17, but could not score. Washington State has never lost in 17 games against teams from the FCS. Eastern Washington is 8-21 against FBS teams.

LAS VEGAS – Backup quarterback Connor Halliday threw four first-half touchdown passes to help Washington State beat UNLV 35-27. Starting in place of the injured Jeff Tuel, Halliday threw two touchdown passes to Marquess Wilson, and also teamed with Gabe Marks and Isiah Myers on first-half scoring strikes. Halliday completed 26 of 45 passes for 378 yards and had two interceptions. Washington State (2-1) held off UNLV (0-3) after the Rebels regained possession with 40 seconds left in the game. UNLV was unable to advance past the Washington State 42. Marks led the Cougars with six catches for 126 yards, and Wilson had five receptions for 110 yards. Nick Sherry completed 33 of 49 passes for 351 yards and three touchdowns for UNLV. He also threw an interception. Marcus Sullivan had six catches for 136 yards and two touchdowns. Washington State took a 7-0 lead when Halliday threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Wilson with 8:17 left in the first quarter. The eight-play, 70-yard drive was highlighted by a 47-yard pass from Halliday to Marks that put the ball on UNLV's 4-yard line. The Cougars increased their lead to 14-0 with 4:25 left in the first quarter, when Myers caught an 18-yard TD pass from Halliday. The drive was set up by Tyree Toomer's interception for the Cougars. UNLV cut the Cougars' lead to 14-7 when Sullivan caught a 37-yard TD pass from Sherry with 2:36 remaining in the first quarter. The second quarter featured three long TDs. Marks caught a 52-yard pass that made it 21-7. After a field goal made it a 11-point game, Wilson caught an 81-yard TD pass with 5:27 left in the period. Just 13 seconds later, Sullivan caught his second TD pass from Sherry - this one for 75 yards - to cut the Cougars' lead to 28-17. Following a scoreless third quarter, Leon Brooks completed an 88-yard drive by running three yards for a touchdown with 14:07 in the fourth quarter, giving the Cougars a 35-20 lead. The Rebels made it a one-possession game in favor of the Cougars at 35-27 when Sherry threw a four-yard TD pass to Jake Phillips with 1:44 left in the fourth quarter.

COLORADO AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Jordan Webb scored on a 4-yard run in the final seconds, the last of three Colorado touchdowns in the final 7 minutes, to beat Washington State 35-34 on Saturday in the Pac-12 Conference opener for both teams. Connor Halliday threw four touchdown passes for Washington State (2-2), which was looking for its first three-game winning streak since 2006. Washington State was ahead 34-28 when Colorado took over on its 30 and marched to the WSU 4. On fourth down, Webb bootlegged up the middle for a touchdown to tie the score. Will Oliver's extra point gave Colorado its first lead, 35-34, with 9 seconds left. The game was played in air thick with smoke from wildfires 200 miles away in central Washington. Washington State was coming off wins over Eastern Washington and UNLV. Washington State scored on its first possession, when a scrambling Halliday hit Gabe Marks in the end zone with a 32-yard pass for a 7-0 lead. Colorado replied with a crisp 75-yard drive that ended when Webb connected with Nelson Spruce on a 16-yard touchdown to tie the score. Webb completed all five of his passes on the drive. Halliday was intercepted near the Colorado goal line by Jered Bell on WSU's next possession. Colorado's drive stalled at WSU's 13 and Will Oliver missed the 30-yard field goal attempt. Marquess Wilson caught a 23-yard scoring pass from Halliday as WSU took a 14-7 lead early in the second quarter. Colorado fumbled the ball away at its own 39 on its next possession. Halliday's 15-yard touchdown pass to Isiah Myers put WSU ahead 21-7 with 11:48 left in the first half. The drive was kept alive when Halliday hit Myers on fourth-and-8 for an 11-yard gain. In the third, Carl Winston fumbled deep in WSU territory on the Cougars' first possession, and Terrel Smith picked the ball up on the 10 and ran it down to the 1. Webb ran the ball over on the next play as Colorado closed to within 21-14. Furney missed a 53-yard field goal attempt for WSU on their next possession. Daniel Simmons intercepted Webb on the next series, and Halliday threw a short pass to Wilson, who turned it into a 49-yard touchdown reception and a 28-14 lead for Washington State. A shanked punt gave WSU possession on Colorado's 30, but the Cougars couldn't move the ball and settled for Furney's 45-yard field goal and a 31-14 lead early in the fourth, setting the stage for the Buffaloes' comeback.

NO. 2 OREGON VS. WASHINGTON STATE

SEATTLE – No. 2 Oregon used a third-quarter scoring blitz to shake Washington State for a 51-26 win on Saturday night. Playing for the first time outside the Eugene city limits, the Ducks (5-0, 2-0 Pac-12) looked shaky at times in the first half and led just 23-19 at the break, but put together a nearly flawless third quarter to run away from the Cougars. Thomas capped an 18-play drive to start the half with a 4-yard TD, then Patterson stepped in front of Connor Halliday's pass for Oregon's third interception return for a TD in two games. After Washington State (2-3, 0-2) went three-and-out, Barner scored on a 10-yard run to cap the 21-point spurt in just over 4 minutes. Barner finished with four total touchdowns, including scoring runs of 22 yards in the first quarter and an 80-yarder in the fourth to go along with a 30-yard touchdown reception in the first half. His 195 yards rushing was the second-best rushing game of his career behind the 201 yards he had against Fresno State earlier this season. The Ducks started the second-half with their longest scoring drive - by plays - of the season, a methodical 18-play march that ate up more than 6 minutes. They ran nine times and threw nine times on the drive and only three times faced third down. The last came from the Cougars 4 when Barner went in motion and the middle opened for quarterback Marcus Mariota to hand off to Thomas, who plowed in for his fifth rushing TD of the season. Before Washington State got a chance to answer, Patterson was stepping in front of a pass intended for Gabe Marks and racing untouched the other direction for a score. Patterson joined Ifo Ekpre-Obomu and Troy Hill with returning interceptions for touchdowns this season. After another three-and-out by the Cougars and a short punt, Oregon needed just seven plays for Barner to find the end zone for the third time and a 44-19 lead. Barner put a cap on his night and an explosive second half when he escaped a pileup near the Oregon sideline and skirted free to run 80 yards early in the fourth quarter. Mariota finished 21 of 32 passing for 169 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions in the first road start of his career. Thomas had just six touches in the first half for a total of 33 yards and no play longer than 15. He got four touches on the first drive of the second half alone including the capping TD run. He also got his first kickoff return of the season after most teams had refused to kick toward the speedy sophomore, but his longest return was 19 yards. While the crowd of 60,929 was mostly crimson, there was plenty of green and highlighter yellow that made the trip north to see the Ducks first road game of the season. Connor Halliday threw for 348 yards and Marquess Wilson had 12 catches for 182 yards and a touchdown to become Washington State's all-time leader in yards receiving. Halliday was sacked seven times. Washington State has proved a somewhat problematic foe for the Ducks the past few years. Saturday night was the same, with the Cougars falling behind 20-3 late in the first quarter. Washington State scored 16 of the next 19 points, getting a 2-yard TD run from Carl Winston following Teondary Caldwell's 92-yard kickoff return, and Brett Bartolone's 26-yard touchdown reception to pull within 23-19 at the half. The Cougars had a chance to go to the break with the lead, driving to the Ducks 17 late in the half before three straight sacks of Halliday forced Washington State to punt.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 14 OREGON STATE

CORVALLIS, Ore. – Jordan Poyer had three interceptions, Sean Mannion passed for 270 yards and No. 14 Oregon State survived a shaky start with a 19-6 win over Washington State. Markus Wheaton had 95 yards receiving and a touchdown but it was the Beavers defense which kept the Cougars at arm's length on the day when Mannion, who threw three interceptions, was more down than up. Jeff Tuel was 11 of 17 for 126 yards after replacing Connor Halliday, who threw three interceptions in just over one half of action. Marquess Wilson had four catches for 54 yards to lead the Cougars (2-4, 0-3). Halliday was 9-for-20 passing. Turnovers kept the Cougars from gaining a foothold as they continue to implement new coach Mike Leach's pass-happy offense. Oregon State kept both Halliday and Tuel on the run, forcing four interceptions and a fumble. Defensive end Scott Crichton tallied three sacks. Mannion was named Pac-12 offensive player of the week after throwing for 433 yards last week in a 38-35 win over Arizona, but he was not sharp to start the game, throwing two interceptions early. The Beavers had another promising drive stopped when they failed to convert a fourth-and-2 at the Washington State 24. The Beavers had to settle for Trevor Romaine's two field goals and a 6-3 half-time lead. Mannion showed more poise in the second half. He marched the Beavers down the field for a 75-yard scoring drive to start the third quarter, hitting Wheaton for a 12-yard touchdown pass. In the fourth, he generated an efficient time-consuming 86-yard drive that Tyler Anderson capped with a one-yard run. Helped out by two 15-yard Oregon State penalties, Tuel completed 5 of 7 passes on a drive early in the fourth, but the drive ended in an Andrew Furney 32-yard field as Wazzu never did get in the end zone. Furney also connected from 24 yards in the second quarter.

CALIFORNIA AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Quarterback Zach Maynard threw for a touchdown and ran for another as California beat Washington State 31-17. C.J. Anderson rushed for two touchdowns as the Golden Bears (3-4, 2-2 Pac-12) earned their eighth straight win over the Cougars. The Bears scored first, after Michael Lowe's interception gave Cal the ball on its own 25. On the third play, Maynard connected with his brother, Keenan Allen, on a short pass that turned into a 69-yard touchdown reception and a 7-0 Bears lead late in the first quarter. On its next possession, Cal drove to WSU's 10 before Maynard was intercepted by Anthony Carpenter. Jeff Tuel, who replaced Connor Halliday at quarterback after Halliday was intercepted twice, then led WSU 86 yards to the 3. But two incomplete passes and a short run made them settle for Andrew Furney's 20-yard field goal to cut Cal's lead to 7-3 in the second quarter. Cal responded with a 75-yard drive, and Anderson ran over from the 4 to give the Bears a 14-3 lead that they held at the end of the first half. WSU receiver Marquess Wilson, who caught four passes for 87 yards in the first half, was injured late in the half and did not return. Cal marched 71 yards on the opening drive of the second half, with Maynard running over from the 1-yard line for a 21-3 lead. Washington State came back with a 75-yard drive, with Tuel passing 8 yards to Brett Bartolone for a touchdown to narrow Cal's lead to 21-10 with 6:42 left in the third. That broke a string of six quarters in which WSU had not scored a touchdown. Vincenzo D'Amato hit a 52-yard field goal to lift Cal to a 24-10 lead with 2:02 left in the third. Furney missed a 43-yarder for WSU early in the fourth quarter. Anderson added a 29-yard touchdown run for a 31-10 lead. Bartolone caught a touchdown pass from Tuel midway through the fourth quarter to complete the scoring.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 19 STANFORD

STANFORD, Calif. – Jeff Tuel threw for 401 yards and two touchdowns, but No. 19 Stanford (6-2, 4-1) sacked Tuel 10 times - including on the game's final play - to overcome a sloppy offensive effort in a 24-17 victory over Washington State (2-6, 0-5) on Saturday. If not for its defense, Stanford's Pac-12 North Division hopes might be dashed. Tuel led a 12-play, 75-yard drive capped by a 10-yard touchdown pass to Kristoff Williams with 6:29 to play to bring Washington State within a touchdown. Stanford managed two first downs before punting the ball back to Washington State. Marquess Wilson made a leaping 42-yard catch to give the Cougars the ball at the Stanford 23. And on fourth-and-21, Bobby Ratliffe caught a 25-yard pass from Tuel at the Stanford 9. Then Usua Amanam pressured Tuel as the quarterback threw the ball into the ground for a 15-yard intentional grounding penalty and an automatic 10-second runoff. With Washington State looking for one final heave to the end zone, Henry Anderson planted Tuel into the ground for a final sack as time expired. Tuel threw for 401 yards and two touchdowns. He completed 43 of 60 passes - mostly short outs that Stanford allowed - but needed one more. Then again, both teams had few offensive highlights in this one. Tuel hit Dominique Williams for a 43-yard completion, then went to him again when he floated a 3-yard TD pass to the corner of the end zone that put the Cougars ahead 7-3 midway through the second quarter. The lead for Washington State this season didn't last long. Just 47 seconds later, Nunes found Jamal-Rashad Patterson on a broken play with the cornerback blitzing and no safety help over the top. Patterson caught the short pass and sprinted down the sideline for a 70-yard touchdown that put Stanford back in front 10-7 on its longest play of the season. Gabe Marks caught seven passes for 52 yards for Washington State before getting sandwiched by two defenders in the second quarter and limping off the field. The Cougars patiently dinked-and-dunked the ball down field to set up Andrew Furney's tying 24-yard field goal on the final play of the first half. The momentum never carried over. Stanford took advantage of a pass interference call on Anthony Carpenter that extended the opening drive of the third quarter. Hewitt bulldozed through the line for a 1-yard TD run - the fullback's first of the season - on third down to give the Cardinal a 17-10 lead, the only drive all game they looked in rhythm. Reynolds intercepted Tuel's pass and returned it for a score to put Stanford ahead 24-10 with 10:43 remaining. With the offense struggling to control the clock, Washington State made one final charge until the Cardinal defense again flexed its muscles.

SALT LAKE CITY – Reggie Dunn returned a kickoff 100 yards for the third time in two weeks and John White rushed for 101 yards and two touchdowns as Utah defeated Washington State 49-6 Saturday. The loss was the sixth straight for Washington State (2-7, 0-6 Pac-12), assuring coach Mike Leach of his first losing season. Utah freshman Travis Wilson completed 17 of 21 passes for 171 yards, with two touchdowns and an interception. Washington State's Jeff Tuel was 23 of 45 for 232 yards, with a 5-yard TD pass to Kristoff Williams on the game's final play. Tuel was intercepted, fumbled and sacked six times. Tuel, who set a school passing mark with 43 completions last week as Washington State took it down to the wire against nationally ranked Stanford, completed three of his first five passes for 41 yards Saturday, but was just 1 of 9 for 6 yards the rest of the quarter. Leach pulled Tuel in the third quarter and inserted Connor Halliday, but Tuel finished the game, engineering the late TD drive to avoid a shutout. Utah held a 453-255 advantage in total yards, limiting the nation's 120th-ranked rushing attack to minus-4 yards. Marquess Wilson entered the game with 184 career receptions and needed 12 to set the school record of 195. He finished with five catches for 73 yards.

NO. 17 UCLA AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Brett Hundley threw three touchdown passes to help No. 17 UCLA beat Washington State 44-36 on Saturday night. UCLA (8-2, 5-2 Pac-12) has won four games in a row since a loss at California, and is first in the Pac-12 South. Connor Halliday threw five touchdown passes for Washington State (2-8, 0-7) in the loss. Washington State dominated the first quarter, then was outscored 30-0 in the second quarter as Hundley threw three touchdown passes and the Bruins piled up 181 yards. The Bruins' defense blocked two WSU field goal attempts, returning one for a touchdown. They also returned a fumble for a score and knocked WSU quarterback Jeff Tuel out of the game. Washington State took the opening kickoff and drove to the UCLA 23, where the drive stalled. Andrew Furney's field goal attempt was blocked by Datone Jones, and the ball was picked up by UCLA's Sheldon Price, who ran it back 68 yards for a touchdown. On the next drive, the Cougars got to the 1-yard line before a penalty pushed them back to the 16. Furney's 33-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Cassius Marsh. Washington State finally scored on its third deep field drive of the first quarter, when Halliday hit Dominique Williams with a 6-yard touchdown pass to tie the score at 7-7. Halliday had just gone into the game in place of injured starter Tuel. Washington State outgained UCLA 167 yards to 22 yards in the first quarter. But it was all UCLA in the second quarter. The Bruins took a 14-7 lead on Hundley's 16-yard scoring pass to Johnathan Franklin. Teondray Caldwell fumbled on the ensuing kickoff return, and UCLA took possession on the WSU 24. Joseph Fauria caught a 9-yard pass from Hundley to give UCLA a 21-7 lead. Halliday was sacked in the end zone, with the safety giving UCLA a 23-7 lead. The Bruins also got the ball back, and scored on Hundley's 10-yard pass to Devin Fuller for a 30-7 lead with 6:40 left in the first half. Halliday fumbled after a hit from Marsh and the ball was picked up by UCLA's Eric Kendricks, who ran 40 yards for a touchdown and a 37-7 halftime lead. Washington State cut into UCLA's lead in the second half while holding the Bruins to one score. Halliday threw touchdown passes to Brett Bartolone and Marcus Mason in the third, while Jordan James added a touchdown for UCLA on a 2-yard run. Halliday threw fourth quarter touchdown passes to Dominique Williams and Kristoff Williams, the last with 1:31 left.

PULLMAN, Wash. – Andrew Furney kicked a 27-yard field goal on Washington State's first possession of overtime, and the Cougars overcame an 18-point deficit in the fourth quarter to stun rival Washington 31-28 in the Apple Cup, snapping an eight-game losing streak. Washington quarterback Keith Price threw an interception on the first play of overtime that defensive lineman Kalafitoni Pole nearly returned for a game-ending touchdown, but he was caught at the 5. The Cougars (3-9, 1-8 Pac-12) took possession and, after picking up a first down, Furney kicked a 27-yard field goal, leading to a crush of crimson and gray fans storming and celebrating at midfield. Washington (7-5, 5-4) had a chance to win on the final play of regulation, but Travis Coons' 35-yard field goal attempt at the same end of the stadium was wide right after a bad snap. In a rivalry known for unpredictability, the 2012 version will rank among the tops in Apple Cup lore. Washington led 28-10 after Bishop Sankey's second touchdown run late in the third quarter, but the Huskies wilted under a siege of self-inflicted mistakes with turnovers and penalties coming back in favor of the Cougars. Carl Winston ran for three touchdowns for Washington State, matching the Cougars' entire season total of touchdowns rushing entering Friday's game. His third TD with 7:26 left, combined with Jeff Tuel's 2-point conversion pass to Brett Bartolone pulled the Cougars within 28-25. Washington was then forced to punt with 5:25 left after Price was forced to throw it away on third down. Tuel hit Gino Simone for 18 yards, his first catch of the game, to get into Washington territory and later a 9-yard reception to get inside the Huskies 30. The Cougars stalled after missing on third-and-1, but Furney connected on a 45-yard field goal to pull the Cougars even at 28-28 with 1:59 left. Washington started at its 25 with all three timeouts. Price scrambled for a 7-yard run, and the Huskies were aided by a 15-yard personal foul call against Casey Locker moving the ball to the 47. Price hit Austin Seferian-Jenkins for 7 yards into Cougars' territory and found DiAndre Campbell for consecutive 11-yard throws to get to the Washington State 24 with 59 seconds left. Sankey then carried twice to the 15, forcing Washington State to use its final timeout with 47 seconds left and the Huskies facing a third-and-1. Washington's school record-tying 18th penalty backed them up, and Sankey came up short on third down. Washington coach Steve Sarkisian ran the clock down to 5 seconds before calling timeout. Coons was 3 of 4 inside 40 yards this year, but the snap back to holder Cody Bruns was low and the timing was off. Washington State elected to go on defense first in overtime. Price was pressured by Logan Mayes on the first play of the extra session and he tried to throw for Sankey, but the pass landed in the arms of Pole. The big defensive lineman tried to end the game with the interception return, but was caught at the 5 by Bruns. Because Pole didn't score, Washington State took possession at the 25 and on third-and-4, Tuel found Bartolone for 10 yards to the 9 and Mike Leach decided to end it there. Furney lined up and the kick was true, giving the Cougars their first win over their rivals since 2008. Tuel finished 33 of 53 for 350 yards and two interceptions. The Cougars made plenty of mistakes, especially during Washington's 21-point third quarter, but showed resolve in the fourth quarter that was absent for most of Leach's miserable first season as coach at Washington State. Price was 20 of 34 for 194 yards and two touchdowns, but also committed two costly turnovers. He had a fumble in the fourth quarter that led to Winston's third TD run. Sankey rushed 84 yards, seeing his streak of 100-yard rushing games snapped at three, but had two touchdowns bringing his season total to 15. Washington saw its four-game win streak snapped and failed in its shot at its first 8-win season since 2001.
