THE GAME

No. 3 Auburn (11-1, 7-1 SEC), the SEC West champion, faces the SEC East champion No. 5 Missouri (11-1, 7-1 SEC) Saturday, December 7, at the Georgia Dome (73,000) in Atlanta in the SEC Championship game. Kickoff is 3:00 p.m. CT and the game will be televised by CBS.

FIRST AND 10

- At 11-1, Auburn has posted the biggest turnaround in the nation this season (last year 3-9) and the biggest ever turnaround in SEC history (+7 conference wins)
- This is Auburn's fifth appearance in the SEC Championship game; others were 2010, 2004, 2000 and 1997. Auburn has won seven SEC titles (1957, 1983, 1987, 1988, 1989, 2004, 2010)
- Gus Malzahn is 11-1 in his first season as Auburn head coach, the second-best start ever for an Auburn coach; he served as Auburn's offensive coordinator from 2009-11
- Chris Davis' game-winning 100+ yard return for a touchdown of a missed Alabama field goal attempt with just one second remaining was only the fifth such play in NCAA annals
- Wide receiver Sammie Coates leads the nation in yards per reception (23.3); the sophomore has 32 catches for 747 yards and six scores this season
- The Tigers lead the SEC in rushing at 318.3 yards per game (81 yards better than second-place Missouri), and rank fifth nationally; Auburn is one of seven teams nationally to have had four different 100-yard rushers this season and the only team nationally with four 500+ yard rushers
- Auburn has scored at least 30 points in eight consecutive games for the first time since 1994
- Defensive end Dee Ford ranks second in the SEC and 13th nationally in sacks per game with 0.8 sacks per contest; he is now seventh on the Auburn career sacks list
- Auburn has scored a touchdown in 40 of 48 quarters this season
- Tre Mason, a Doak Walker Award semifinalist, leads the SEC in rushing (109.8) and has scored a rushing touchdown in the last nine games and 16 of the last 19 contests

About Gus Malzahn

Gus Malzahn, who served as Auburn's offensive coordinator from 2009-11, is in his first year as Auburn's head coach. He is 11-1 at Auburn and 20-4 overall. That start is the second-best ever for a new Auburn coach; Terry Bowden started his tenure 20-0.

Malzahn, who won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2010 while helping the Tigers to the BCS National Championship, returned to Auburn after serving as the head coach at Arkansas State in 2012, where he led the program to the Sun Belt Conference title. He was named Auburn's 27th head football coach on December 4, 2012.

Last season at Arkansas State, Malzahn led the Red Wolves to a 9-3 record and 7-1 conference mark. While at Auburn, Malzahn made an immediate impact during his tenure, highlighted by a record-setting offense in 2010 under Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton. The 2010 Auburn offense set nine school records, including points in a season (577), points per game (41.2), total yards (6,989), total offense (499.2), rushing yards (3,987), rushing touchdowns (41) and passing touchdowns (31), led the Southeastern Conference and finished in the top 10 nationally in six statistical categories.

Malzahn's arrival in 2009 and style of offense marked a drastic turnaround from the 2008 season when Auburn struggled offensively. In a two-year period, the Tigers improved from a tie for 110th to seventh in the nation in scoring offense (from 17.3 to 41.2) and from 104th to seventh in total offense.

Prior to Auburn, Malzahn was the offensive coordinator at Tulsa (2007-08) and Arkansas (2006). Two of Malzahn's first three collegiate offenses ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing, including the 2008 Tulsa team and 2006 Arkansas squad. His offenses at Tulsa ranked first nationally in total offense in 2007 and 2008. He coached Heisman Trophy finalist Darren McFadden at Arkansas, while helping the Razorbacks finish fourth nationally in rushing at 228.5 yards per game.

Malzahn's coaching career began in his home state of Arkansas; in 14 seasons as a high school head coach there, Malzahn led seven teams to the state championship game and won three titles. In July 2013, he was inducted into the Arkansas High School Sports Hall of Fame.

The Series

Auburn has only faced Missouri once previously, a 34-17 Missouri win at the 1973 Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas.

In The SEC Championship

This is Auburn's fifth appearance in the SEC Championship game; the Tigers are 2-2 in those contests, all played in the Georgia Dome. 1997: Tennessee 30, Auburn 29 2000: Florida 28, Auburn 6 2004: Auburn 38, Tennessee 28 2010: Auburn 56, South Carolina 17

Auburn has won seven SEC titles since joining the league in 1933. Championship seasons for the Tigers were 1957, 1983, 1987, 1988, 1989, 2004 and 2010.

Coach Gus Malzahn is attempting become the third coach in SEC history to win an SEC title in his first year at a school, joining Bernie Moore at LSU in 1935 and John Vaught at Ole Miss in 1947. Les Miles is the only other coach to make it to the SEC title game in his first year; LSU lost to Georgia 34-14 in 2005.

At The Dome

Auburn is 5-4 all-time in games at the Georgia Dome, and 8-7-1 all-time in all games in domes. Auburn lost to Clemson 26-19 in the 2012 season opener at the Georgia Dome.

In December Games

Auburn is 19-23-2 (.454) all-time in December, and 1-1-1 in games played on December 7. Auburn has played in Atlanta in December nine previous times, posting a 5-3-1 record.

SEC Numbers

In SEC action all-time, Auburn holds a 298-231-18 overall record. In SEC games played in Auburn, the Tigers are 122-51-6 all-time. In all SEC games played away from Auburn, the Tigers are 176-180-12 overall.



Against Ranked Teams

Auburn is now 99-141-6 all-time when facing ranked opponents. Auburn is 44-36-2 at home against ranked teams, 25-60-2 on the road and 30-45-2 against ranked teams on a neutral field.

The Tigers are 78-117-5 all-time when facing SEC opponents that are ranked (35-29-2 at home, 25-54-2 away, 18-34-1 neutral field).

This is the 19th time in Auburn history that the Tigers have played five ranked teams during the season.

The win at No. 7 Texas A&M was Auburn's first win over a ranked opponent on the road since October 1, 2011, at No. 10 South Carolina. The Tigers have also defeated then-No. 24 Ole Miss, then-No. 25 Georgia and then-No. 1 Alabama this season.

In Top Five Matchups

This is the ninth game in Auburn history involving two AP top five teams, and the first time that has occurred in back to back games. Auburn is 4-3-1 in those games.

Auburn has played Top Five opponents in back to back games only three times previously, in 1968 (vs. #5 Tennessee and #5 Georgia), in 1971 (vs. #3 Alabama and #3 Oklahoma), and in 1981 (vs. #4 Georgia and #4 Alabama).

In Top Ten Matchups

This will be the 37th matchup between AP Top 10 teams in Auburn history, with the Tigers being 19-15-2. The Tigers are 8-7-1 in Jordan-Hare Stadium, 6-2 in true road games and 5-6-1 at neutral sites. Auburn has won its last four Top 10 matchups, and eight of the last nine in meetings of Top 10 teams.

Auburn has won 87 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points. The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49 four-overtime loss to Georgia in 1996. In its history, Auburn is now 304-4 when scoring at least 30 points.

Auburn is the only Southeastern Conference team to record two perfect seasons since 2004, going 13-0 in '04 and 14-0 in 2010. Since the 2004 season, Auburn has won 45 of its 75 SEC games and 47 of its 77 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 (vs. Tennessee) and 2010 (vs. South Carolina) SEC Championship games. Fine Line

Auburn gets excellent production in 2013 from both its offensive and defensive line. The offensive line ranks third in the SEC and 21st nationally in fewest sacks allowed (1.25/game) and fifth in the SEC and 16th in the NCAA in fewest TFL allowed (4.33/gm).

That has allowed Auburn to get 13 100-yard rushing performances from a combination of four different players, one of only seven schools to do so. Auburn averages 318.3 rushing yards per game, first in the SEC and fifth nationally.

On the defensive line, 13 players are getting time in the rotation, and 11 of those have contributed to at least one sack this season. Auburn is third in the the SEC and ranks 34th nationally with 6.7 TFL per game.

As a group, the D-line has 55.0 TFL and 23.0 sacks; last year, the AU line accounted for 33.5 TFL and 16.0 sacks.

Senior Dee Ford, with 8.0 sacks this season in 10 games played, is third in the SEC and 20th nationally in sacks per game. With 18.0 career sacks, Ford is seventh on Auburn's career list.

The Ellis Effect

Including his current stint at Auburn, Ellis Johnson's last three stops as defensive coordinator have seen the veteran coach bring major improvement to his team's scoring defense in his first season.

This season with the Tigers, Johnson has guided the defense to an improvement of 35 spots in the NCAA scoring defense rankings through 2013 (66th to 31st):

Auburn's defense has allowed 270 points (22.5 ppg), the fewest total points since 2008, when Auburn allowed just 211 points (17.6 ppg) through 12 games.

In The Red Zone/Offense

Auburn is 44-50 scoring in the red zone on the season for the third-best percentage in the SEC (.880). Auburn has scored 35 touchdowns

and nine field goals on drives in the red zone this season.

In The Red Zone/Defense

Auburn is second in the SEC in red zone defense, allowing opponents to score 31 of 44 times, for a 70.5 percentage. Opponents have converted 21 touchdowns and 10 field goals in the red zone.

That percentage is a significant improvement from the Tigers' national ranking over the last five seasons. Auburn currently ranks eighth in NCAA red zone defense; the Tigers' best ranking in the past five seasons has been 72nd in 2010 (0.84).

More About The Tigers ...

This is only the fourth time Auburn has started a season 11-1 or better. Auburn finished the 1983 season 11-1, Auburn started the 2004 season 12-0 on its way to a 13-0 finish, and Auburn started the 2010 season 12-0 on its way to winning the national championship with a 14-0 record.

This is the sixth time Auburn has won 11 games in a season: 1983: 11-1; 1993: 11-0; 2004: 13-0; 2006: 11-2; 2010: 14-0; 2013: 11-1.

Auburn has set a school record for the best one-year turnaround with an eight-game swing. The previous best were six-game swings: 1918 (2-5) to 1919 (8-1); 1934 (2-8) to 1935 (8-2); 1992 (5-5-1) to 1993 (11-0); 2009 (8-5) to 2010 (14-0).

Auburn ranks tenth nationally in yards per play on offense at 6.94 yards.

Auburn has scored 30 points in eight consecutive games for the first time since 1994, when the Tigers scored 30 points or more in eight straight games.

Auburn threw for 200+ yards just once in 2011 (286 yards vs. Utah State) and twice in 2012 (281 vs. Arkansas and 211 vs. Texas A&M). Auburn has thrown for 200+ yards in a game six times in 2013 (339 vs. Mississippi State, 224 at LSU, 201 vs. Western Carolina, 236 at Texas A&M, 206 vs. Florida Atlantic, 243 vs. Georgia).

Although only +1 in season turnover margin (17 to 16), Auburn has outscored its opponents 72-31 in points off turnovers (6.0 to 2.5 points per game).



- The Tigers are 5-0 in games decided by seven points or less and 6-0 in games decided by eight points or less, with six come-from-behind wins.

- Auburn is sixth nationally with 189 rushing first downs, after Navy, Army, Ohio State, Georgia Tech and Northern Illinois.

- Auburn has had a 100-yard rusher in 10 of 12 games this season, including at least one in eight of the last nine contests. The Tigers have had a pair of 100-yard rushers in three games this season.

- Auburn's total offense of 628 against Florida Atlantic gave the Tigers a school record for most yards of total offense in a three-game span (1,955). Auburn had 712 vs. Western Carolina and 615 at Texas A&M. The previous record was 1,726 yards in 2010 vs. LSU (526), at Ole Miss (572) and vs. Chattanooga (628).

- The Tigers currently have 3,819 yards rushing on the season. The last time Auburn had at least that many yards in a season was 2010 when it finished with 3,987 in 14 games. Auburn has 39 rushing touchdowns this season, for the first time since 2010 (41).

- Auburn has scored on its opening drive in seven of 12 games this season (five touchdowns and two field goals).

- Auburn's 44.85-yard average on seven kick/punt returns vs. Tennessee set a new NCAA record; the previous NCAA record was 41.8 yds/ret by Florida State vs. Virginia Tech in 1974.

- Auburn won SEC road games in consecutive weeks for the first time since winning at Kentucky 49-27 on November 5 and winning at Georgia 31-30 on November 12 in 2005.

Drive Time

Auburn has had 25 drives of 75 yards or longer during the 2013 season, all of them accounting for touchdowns. Last season, Auburn had only 13 drives of that length in 12 games, and only 11 such drives in 2011.

The past 18 years, the current total ranks second: 2010 (29); 2013 (25); 2004 (24); 2005 (20); 2000 (17); 1994, 2003 (14); 2012 (13); 2001, 2009, 2011 (11); 1999, 2006, 2007 (10).

Auburn has had 10 scoring drives of less than a minute this season. The quickest scoring drive for the Tigers was a 10-second drive on a 43-yard run by Corey Grant against Florida

Atlantic. The quickest SEC drive was 0:25 covering 29 yards on two plays at Arkansas.

The Field Goal Return

Chris Davis' 100-yard return of a missed Alabama field goal attempt for the game-winning score in the final second of the Iron Bowl was the first-such touchdown in Auburn history. The return started at the back of the end zone and is recorded statistically as 100 miscellaneous yards.

According to the NCAA record book, it is just the fifth time in NCAA history that a missed field goal was returned for 100 yards for a score and the second time this year (LSU vs UAB – Odell Beckham, Jr. for LSU).

The two other times were in 1968 (Clemson vs. Georgia – Richie Luzzi for Clemson) and 1966 (California vs. Washington State – Don Guest for California).

Davis ranks second nationally in punt returns, averaging 20.5 yards per return on 12 attempts, including an 85-yard punt return for a touchdown at Tennessee.

More From The Alabama Win...

- Auburn's win marked the third time this year Auburn has scored in the last 30 seconds of a game to claim the win when trailing or tied (Mississippi State 10 seconds; Georgia 25 seconds).

- The win was Auburn's first SEC win as time expired in regulation since the 2010 win at Kentucky (Wes Byrum field goal).

- Auburn's 296 yards rushing are the third-most ever by the Tigers against Alabama and the most since 1983 (355 yards).

- Auburn is now 4-8 all-time when facing the nation's top ranked team. Auburn is 2-2 against No. 1 at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Auburn's last win over No. 1 was a 23-20 win over Florida in 2001. Auburn is 4-3-1 in games involving two AP top five team and 2-1-1 at home.

- This is the first time Alabama has given up two rushing touchdowns in a game this season and the first time an opponent has rushed for more than 200 yards against Alabama since Georgia Southern in 2011

- The previous high rushing total this season by an Alabama opponent was 165 yards vs. Arkansas. Auburn rushed for 162 yards in the first half and finished with 296 for the game.

- Since 1968, Auburn has scored 13 or more points in the final 38 seconds of a game only one other time. Against Georgia Tech on October 17, 1987, the Tigers scored on a four-yard touchdown pass from Jeff Burger to Lawyer Tillman with 22 seconds left. Auburn then added a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by Aundray Bruce as time expired.

- Ryan Smith's partial block of the first-quarter Alabama punt was the first block of his career, and the first punt block for Auburn since the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

- Nosa Eguae's fourth-quarter field goal block was the first of his career.

- Nick Marshall's 45-yard TD run in the first quarter was his longest TD run of the season; his previous long score was a 38-yard run at Tennessee. It was Marshall's 10th rushing touchdown of the season.

- Gabe Wright's second-quarter sack was his first since the Ole Miss game and his third of the season.

- The third-quarter 13-yard TD pass from Nick Marshall to C.J. Uzomah was Uzomah's third TD reception this year.

- Auburn's 34 points scored versus Alabama were the Tigers' most points in an Iron Bowl since 1969.

Air Marshall Well Grounded

Junior Nick Marshall continues to excel at the helm of the Auburn offense. He is 10-1 as a starter and has already engineered four comebacks in the fourth quarter, vs. Mississippi State, Texas A&M, Georgia and Alabama. During Auburn's current eight-game win streak, he has accounted for 17 touchdowns with only three turnovers.

Named SEC player of the week, Marshall rushed for 214 yards on 14 carries at Tennessee, scoring twice, to tie the third-highest rushing total ever by an Auburn quarterback. It was the best rushing performance by any player in the SEC and the 28th best rushing performance in Division I this season.

His 62-yard run in the second quarter was a career long for Marshall, the longest run by an Auburn QB since a 71-yard run by Cam Newton vs. Arkansas State in 2010, and the longest run ever by an Auburn player vs. Tennessee.

Marshall was 15-26 passing for 229 yards against Georgia, with the game-winning 73-yard pass to Ricardo Louis on 4th-and-18 with just 0:25 remaining. Marshall also rushed for 89 yards and two scores against Georgia, the fourth time this season Marshall has rushed for multiple TDs in a game.

Marshall gained 99 yards rushing with a 45-yard touchdown run, and passed for two more scores in the win over Alabama.

For the season, Marshall has passed for 1,627 yards and rushed for 922 more, averaging 231.7 yards total offense per game. He is fourth among Auburn's QBs in season rushing, passing Travis Tidwell (772 in 1946). He did not see action against Western Carolina and left the Florida Atlantic game early in the second quarter.

Marshall passed for 236 yards and a pair of touchdowns and rushed for 100 yards, scoring twice on runs of 16 and 13 yards in the win at Texas A&M, earning his first SEC offensive player of the week award. At Arkansas, he rushed for 59 yards and his 88-yard touchdown completion to Sammie Coates was the third longest pass play in Auburn history.

Against Ole Miss, Marshall posted his first 100-yard rushing game, with 140 yards on 14 carries, scoring twice. Only seven Auburn QBs have rushed for 100 yards in a game; AU quarterbacks have only rushed for 100 yards in a game 18 times in 121 seasons.

Only three quarterbacks nationally have rushed for more yards in a game this season:

Jordan Lynch (Northern Ill) 316 vs. C Mich Taysom Hill (BYU) 259 vs. Texas Keenan Reynolds (Navy) 240 vs. San Jose St Keenan Reynolds (Navy) 226 vs. Hawaii Nick Marshall (Auburn) 214 at Tennessee

His two touchdown runs against Ole Miss were the first pair of rushing scores by an Auburn QB since Kiehl Frazier scored two rushing TDs in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The last Auburn QB to rush for 100 yards in a game was Cam Newton vs. Georgia in 2010. Marshall became the 61st player in Auburn history to have a 100-yard rushing game.

In just his third start, Marshall finished the Mississippi State game 23-34 passing for 339 yards, the first AU quarterback to pass for 300 yards since Cam Newton threw for 335 vs. South Carolina in the 2010 SEC title game.



Marshall's 339 passing yards were 16th all-time at Auburn for single-game passing yardage and the ninth-highest passing total against a conference opponent. Marshall's 339 yards passing were also the most ever by an Auburn quarterback in an SEC debut.

On the game-winning drive against Mississippi State, Marshall accounted for 84 of the 88 total yards, completing six of eight passes for 65 yards while rushing three times for 19 yards. With his 151 yards passing (9-11) in the first quarter, Marshall had already established a new season high.

Marshall was the first Auburn quarterback to pass for more than 200 yards since Barrett Trotter versus Utah State in 2011, and the first to throw for 200+ yards versus an SEC opponent since Newton did it against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC Championship game. Adding 22 yards rushing, Marshall finished with 361 yards total offense. He also had a 37-yard pass reception off a tipped ball he threw and then caught.

His 339 yards were the most passing yards by an Auburn quarterback since Brandon Cox threw for 343 versus Georgia Tech in 2005. It was just the fifth time since the start of the 2000 season that an Auburn QB has thrown for 339 or more yards:

Tre Mason On The Carry

Junior Tre Mason, a Doak Walker Award semifinalist, is having a memorable season for Auburn. Mason is averaging 104.8 rushing yards per game, best among the SEC rushing leaders.

He has rushed for touchdowns in nine consecutive games (the first since Carnell Williams in 2004) and in 16 of the last 19 games. He is second nationally in consecutive games with a rushing touchdown behind Bishop Sankey (Washington) with 14.

Mason now has 26 career rushing touchdowns, 28 total career touchdowns and 10 100-yard games. He has six career games with multiple touchdowns scored, and ranks ninth on Auburn's all-time TD scored list.

His 1,317 yards rushing this season rank seventh on the Auburn single season rushing list, and Mason's 18 rushing touchdowns this season rank him second in Auburn single season records behind only Cam Newton (20 in 2010).

Mason crossed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the second consecutive season with a 10-yard carry in the third quarter of the win at Tennessee; he reached the 1,000-yard mark on his 175th carry of the season.

Mason is the first Auburn player to rush for 1,000 yards in back to back seasons since Michael Dyer in 2010-11; the others all-time were Carnell Williams in 2003-04, Stephen Davis in 1994-95, James Brooks in 1979-80 and Joe Cribbs in 1978-79.

Mason now has 2,480 rushing yards in his career, putting him in 10th place all-time at Auburn. Mason's career total is fourth best in Auburn history by a player through the end of his junior season:

- Stephen Davis 2,811*
- Carnell Williams 2,666*
- Bo Jackson 2,517*
- Tre Mason 2,480*

Rushing for 164 yards and a TD against Alabama, which was only giving up 91.3 rushing yards per game to opponents as a team, Mason posted his fourth consecutive 100-yard game, just the fifth time since 2008 that an opponent rusher gained 100+ yards on Alabama.

Mason had 115 yards rushing and a touchdown in the win over Georgia. He rushed for 117 yards and three touchdowns at Tennessee. Mason is the first Auburn player to rush for eight touchdowns in a three-game span since Cam Newton rushed for nine in 2010.

Mason rushed for 168 yards and four touchdowns in the win at Arkansas on a career-high 32 carries, the first Auburn player to score four rushing TD in a game since Cam Newton vs. Kentucky in 2010. He earned SEC offensive player of the week honors for that effort.

In his last 19 games dating back to the Ole Miss game in 2012, Mason has rushed for 2,013 yards and 25 touchdowns on 349 carries for an average of 105.9 yards per game and 5.77 yards per carry.

In five games against ranked teams this season (LSU, Ole Miss, Texas A&M, Georgia, Alabama), Mason has totaled 666 rushing yards and six rushing touchdowns on 130 carries for an average of 5.1 yards per carry and 133.2 rushing yards per game on an average of 26 carries per game. He has also caught six passes for 81 yards and returned seven kickoffs for 159 yards in those games.

Mason has five career 100-yard rushing games against ranked opponents, including four in 2013 (LSU, Texas A&M, Georgia, Alabama). In 16 career games against ranked opponents, Mason averages 5.3 yards per carry.

Auburn Staff in the SEC Championship Game

Members of the Auburn coaching staff have made 17 appearances in the SEC Championship Game since the inaugural event in 1992. In those 17 appearances, Auburn coaches have won nine SEC titles while representing eight different universities.

This will be the third appearance in the game for head coach Gus Malzahn after trips with Arkansas (2006) and Auburn (2010). Associate Head Coach/Defensive line coach Rodney Garner leads the staff with six appearances.

Five other members of the staff have coached in the SEC title game. Ellis Johnson, Charlie Harbison and Garner will be coaching in the SEC Championship Game with their third different program.

He has two of the seven best rushing performances in the SEC this season:

- 214 Nick Marshall (Aub) at Tennessee
- 184 Jeremy Hill (LSU) vs. Auburn
- 178 Tre Mason (Aub) at Texas A&M
- 176 Matt Jones (Fla) at Kentucky
- 172 Alex Collins (Ark) vs. Samford
- 169 Rajion Neal (Ten) vs. South Alabama
- 168 Tre Mason (Aub) at Arkansas

He, Kent State's Dri Archer and New Mexico's Carlos Wiggins are the only players in the nation with a 100-yard rushing game, a rushing touchdown and 100-yard kick return TD this season.

He leads the SEC in rushing touchdowns scored this season in road games with 10; he has averaged 148.8 rushing yards in those four road games.

Mason rushed for 178 yards and the game-winning touchdown at Texas A&M; he had 108 of those in the fourth quarter. Mason had 100 rushing yards, all in the first half, against Western Carolina and 132 yards at LSU.

Mason had two rushing touchdowns of 53 and 20 yards against Western Carolina. He scored on a 1-yard run vs. Ole Miss, twice against LSU and scored an 11-yard rushing TD against Arkansas State and rushing and return scores against Washington State.

His kickoff return touchdown of 100 yards against Washington State was the second KOR score of his career; his first was a 97-yard return against Utah State in the 2011 season opener. The Tigers have returned 21 kickoffs for touchdowns in program history. Mason's three returns that day for 141 yards set an Auburn record for best kick return average (47.0).

Now sixth among Auburn career leaders in kickoff return yards, Mason has 1,107 total, and 3,595 all-purpose yards in his career, putting him in that Auburn top 10 also. His 1,825 all-purpose yards in 2013 are just 34 yards shy of the Auburn single season record (1,859) set by Bo Jackson in 1985.

On the final carry of 2012, Mason passed the 1,000-yard rushing mark, finishing with 1,002 yards on 171 carries (the fewest number of carries to 1,000 yards by any SEC rusher last season). He was the first nonquarterback to lead Auburn in total offense for a season since Bo Jackson in 1985.

Mason had 100-yard efforts last year against Alabama A&M (181), New Mexico State (152) and Clemson (106). Mason's 86-yard first-quarter TD run against Alabama A&M was the fourth longest rushing play in AU history and the seventh longest from scrimmage ever.

Mason led Auburn in rushing for the 2012 season season with 1,002 yards on 171 carries, a 5.9-yard per-carry average. Scoring twice against AAMU, his eight touchdowns were also most on the squad; he scored seven of those in the last seven games.

The Ground Game

Auburn leads the SEC in rushing at 318.2 yards per game due to a trio of outstanding tailbacks -- Tre Mason, Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne -- and quarterback Nick Marshall.

With 146 yards rushing on nine carries against Washington State, Corey Grant posted his first 100-yard game, the 59th Auburn rusher ever to do so. Grant's 75-yard second quarter TD run was his first Auburn score and the 24th-longest TD run in Auburn history.

Grant made his first career start against Arkansas State, and responded with a 17-yard first quarter touchdown. He scored on a 43-yard run against Florida Atlantic, and had the opening touchdown against Georgia, a 21-yard score. Grant is averaging 48.8 rushing yards per game and 9.8 yards per carry.

Cameron Artis-Payne scored his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter of the win over Arkansas State, a 12-yard run that also put him beyond 100 yards on the night, the 60th player in Auburn history to record a 100-yard rushing game. He rushed for 133 yards and a touchdown against Western Carolina.

Artis-Payne scored a touchdown in the fourth quarter at Texas A&M and in the third quarter of the win over Florida Atlantic. The junior college transfer is averaging 47.8 yards per game on the ground.

This is the first time in Auburn history that Auburn has had four different 100-yard rushers in the same season: Corey Grant (Washington State); Cameron Artis-Payne (Arkansas State and Western Carolina); Nick Marshall (Ole Miss, Texas A&M, Tennessee) and Tre Mason (LSU, Western Carolina, Texas A&M, Arkansas, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama).

2013 AUBURN FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Auburn has 13 100-yard performances to its credit this year. Auburn, Air Force, Minnesota, Arkansas State, Southern Cal, Ole Miss and Ohio State are the only teams to have at least four different 100-yard rushers this season.

Last season, Auburn scored only eight offensive touchdowns total in eight SEC games. This season, the Tigers have scored 32 offensive touchdowns in SEC games.

Auburn rushed for three touchdowns against both LSU and Ole Miss; four at Texas A&M, at Arkansas and against Florida Atlantic and Georgia; and five against Western Carolina and at Tennessee.

Auburn has had six 300-yard rushing games this year; the rest of the SEC has eight combined. It's the first time Auburn has rushed for at least three TDs in seven consecutive games through records kept since the 1967 season, and four rushing TDs in six straight games. It is the first time Auburn has had at least three rushing TDs in six straight SEC games through records back through 1967.

50+ Carries

Auburn is averaging 50.1 rushing attempts per game this season, and the Tigers have carried the ball more than 50 times in seven contests (60 Texas A&M; 59 Florida Atlantic; 57 Georgia; 53 Tennessee; 52 LSU; 52 Alabama; 50 Arkansas State).

Since 1967, Auburn is 143-35-3 (.797) when rushing 50+ times in a game, 44-6-1 (.873) when rushing 60+ times in a game, 5-0 when rushing 70+ times in a game, and 1-0 when rushing 80+ times in a game (82 carries in a 41-0 win over Ole Miss in 1985).

Interceptors

Auburn has recorded 12 interceptions this season, after grabbing only two all last season. Seven different players have accounted for those picks, led by Robenson Therezie with four and Ryan Smith with three.

Therezie and Joshua Holsey each recorded their first career interception against Washington State. It marked the first time two players recorded their first career picks in the same game since Jake Holland and Jermaine Whitehead did so vs. Florida Atlantic in 2011.

Therezie was the first Auburn player to record two interceptions in a game since Josh Bynes against Arkansas in 2010. Auburn as a team had only two interceptions in the 2012 season. Therezie was selected as SEC Defensive Player of the Week and the Jim Thorpe Award national defensive back of the week.

Therezie scored on a 78-yard interception against Ole Miss, the eighth longest such play in Auburn history. It was the longest interception return for a touchdown by an Auburn player since Walter McFadden in the 2010 Outback Bowl vs. Northwestern. Auburn's last interception for a touchdown was by Trent Fisher vs. Alabama A&M last season, a 60-yard return. It was Therezie's third interception of the season, and the first interception thrown by Ole Miss' Bo Wallace this year.

Therezie's fourth pick of the season game at Tennessee. The last Auburn player to have four interceptions in a season was Walter McFadden with six in 2009.

Ryan Smith recorded his first career interception against Ole Miss in the fourth quarter of that win, and had a first-quarter interception at Texas A&M. He had Auburn's only interception versus Georgia, his third pick of the season.

Jermaine Whitehead recorded a third-quarter interception at LSU, breaking Zach Mettenberger's string of 77 pass attempts without an interception. It was Auburn's first interception in an SEC game since 2011 vs. Ole Miss (T'Sharvan Bell). It was the second career pick for Whitehead; his first was versus Florida Atlantic in 2011.

Jonathon Mincy recorded his first career interception, and the first by an AU corner since 2011, with a 10-yard pick against Western Carolina. Ryan White posted his first career interception versus Texas A&M and Cassanova McKinzy nabbed his first career interception at Arkansas.

Catching On

Sophomores Sammie Coates (32) and Ricardo Louis (25) and true freshman Marcus Davis (22) are three of Auburn's top four receivers for the season. The young trio has combined for 79 receptions for 1,228 yards and nine touchdowns. Those totals account for 53% of Auburn's receptions and 59% of its receiving yards this year.

Junior Quan Bray, with 20 catches for 191 yards and three touchdowns, rounds out the Auburn reception leading quartet.

Coates set a career high at LSU with 139 yards receiving on four receptions, his first career 100-yard receiving game and the first for an AU receiver since Emory Blake vs. Georgia in 2012. He is the first Tiger other than Blake to record 100 yards receiving since 2010.

Coates had 104 yards receiving on five catches in the win at Texas A&M, including a 43-yard TD catch. He had 113 yards receiving on just three catches against Florida Atlantic, with touchdowns of 67 and 36 yards from Jeremy Johnson. He had 102 yards on three catches at Arkansas, including a career-long 88 yard touchdown from Nick Marshall.

The last Auburn receiver to record three straight 100-yard games was Tyrone Goodson vs. Ole Miss, LSU and UCF in 1997. The last to catch a touchdown pass in three consecutive games was Philip Lutzenkirchen in 2011.

Coates, who had a 39-yard touchdown reception in the final minute of the win over Alabama, leads the nation in yards per catch (23.3). His 12 catches this year of 30+ yards are tied for seventh most of any player nationally. His six catches of 40+ yards this season tie for 17th nationally and he is tied for ninth in the country with four catches of 50+ yards. With three catches of 60+ yards, Coates is tied for ninth nationally.

Coates has six touchdown catches this season, and is averaging 56.8 yards per TD reception; the touchdown distances: 88, 68, 67, 43, 39, 36.

Louis caught the dramatic 73-yard tipped pass that won the Georgia game. He had 131 receiving on just four catches (his first career 100-yard game) and added another 66 yards rushing against the Bulldogs, earning him a spot on the Paul Hornung Award honor roll.

No Return Policy

Senior punter Steven Clark, a 2011 Ray Guy Award finalist and 2012 and 2013 semifinalist, continues to excel. His season average is 42.7 with eight of 50+ yards and 18 inside the 20. Clark has had only five punts returned during the 2013 campaign on 47 kicks. He did not punt against Western Carolina.



Only five of his 70 punts last season were returned. Clark averaged 39.8 yards per punt in 2012, placing 15 kicks inside the 20. His season long was 54 yards against LSU; he had six punts last year of 50 yards or more.

For his career, Clark has a 40.5 average on 195 career punts, with 66 punts landing inside the 20 and 27 kicks of 50 yards or longer. Only 11 percent of his career punts (22-195) have been returned, for an average of just 5.4 yards per return.

A nominee for the National Football Foundation post-graduate scholarship and Senior CLASS Award, Clark is fourth in Auburn career punts (195) and career punting yards (7,897).

Introducing Jeremy Johnson

True freshman quarterback Jeremy Johnson saw his first collegiate action making his first start against Western Carolina. In that 62-3 Auburn victory, Johnson was 17-21 passing for 201 yards and four touchdowns against just one interception. He also rushed for 26 yards, earning SEC Freshman of the Week honors.

Johnson's four TD passes vs. WCU were the most by an Auburn quarterback since Clint Moseley threw four against Ole Miss in 2011, and tied him with Stan White (vs. Cal State Fullerton, 1990) for second-most career passes by an Auburn QB in his first career start but the most by a true freshman. Daniel Cobb threw for five touchdowns against Louisiana Tech in his debut in 2001 as a senior.

Johnson entered the action against Florida Atlantic early in the second quarter and threw a 36-yard touchdown pass to Sammie Coates on his very first play. Johnson was 10-16 passing for 192 yards and two scores (both to Coates) and also rushed for 21 yards against FAU, earning SEC Freshman of the Week honors for the second time this season.

Parkey For Three

Cody Parkey hit three field goals in the 24-20 Mississippi State win, including a 47-yarder that tied his career long, earning Lou Groza Award Star of the Week honors. Parkey also kicked a 47-yarder against Washington State, one of three FG he made in that 31-24 win.

Parkey had his SEC-leading string of 90 consecutive PAT kicks made snapped with a blocked PAT at Tennessee. He now has 124 career PAT (124-126), making him the fifth player in Auburn history to kick more than 100.

His string of 19 straight field goals made from 45 yards and in, dating back through the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl, was broken on a 40-yarder vs. Florida Atlantic. He is 13-17 on field goals this season.

Parkey now ranks fourth in Auburn career field goal percentage at .755 (37-49), just behind Scott Etheridge (.791), Matt Hawkins (.788) and Win Lyle (.763).

Parkey is first in the nation in touchbacks with 59 this season. During his career, 132 of Parkey's 233 kickoffs have gone for touchbacks (.566), including 131 of 198 since the beginning of his sophomore season (.662).

In 2012, Parkey converted on nine straight three-pointers dating back through the 2011 season, before missing on a 49-yarder vs. Arkansas. That tied the third best string of consecutive field goals at Auburn since 1981.

Parkey was 11-14 on field goals last year, and 27-27 last season on PAT kicks. He made four field goals versus Clemson (37-46-27-36 yards), tying a Chick-fil-A Kickoff Classic record and earning him Lou Groza Award star of the week honors. Parkey's game-winner against ULM earned him SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

The Return Game

Auburn is one of five teams nationally to return a kickoff and a punt for a touchdown in the same game this season:

Auburn ranks third in the nation among teams with the longest active streak of kickoff returns for a touchdown in consecutive seasons. The Tigers have had at least one kickoff return for a score in each of the past six seasons, including Tre Mason's 100-yard return against Washington State and Corey Grant's 90-yard return at Tennessee.

Only 10 teams have returned two kickoffs for touchdowns this season: Auburn, Duke, Iowa State, New Mexico, Purdue, Rutgers, Stanford, TCU, Texas State and UTEP.

First-Time Tigers

In the season opener against Washington State, 14 Auburn players saw their first action in a Tiger uniform: Montravius Adams, Will Adams, Mackenro Alexander, Cameron Artis-Payne, Ben Bradley, Elijah Daniel, Marcus Davis, Johnathan Ford, Brandon King, Alex Kozan, Carl Lawson, Robert Leff, Nick Marshall and JaViere Mitchell.

There were eight more Tigers who saw their first Auburn action against Arkansas State: Gage Batten, Shon Coleman, T.J. Davis, Jordan Diamond, Kenny Flowers, Kamryn Melton, Gimel President and Tony Stevens. Patrick Lymon saw his first action at LSU.

Twelve players saw their first collegiate action against Western Carolina: Eric Averett, Shane Callahan, Wirth Campbell, Michael Clifton, Devonte Danzey, Adam Dyas, Khari Harding, Jeremy Johnson, Tyler Nero, Dimitri Reese, Chandler Shakespeare and Mack VanGorder.

Kyle Bolstad, Reid Brooks and Jackson Thomas were first-time players against Florida Atlantic.

Of Auburn's 38 first-time players this season, 10 are true freshmen, 16 are redshirt freshmen and six are junior college transfers.

Penalties

Auburn has been flagged with only 55 total penalties this season. The Tigers committed nine penalties against Arkansas State, eight versus Georgia, seven at Arkansas, six against Florida Atlantic and only 25 in the other eight contests combined.

Auburn had only one penalty against both Mississippi State (a five-yard penalty for illegal formation) and one at Tennessee (five yards for defensive offsides). The last time Auburn had only one penalty in a game was in 2008, when Auburn had one five-yard penalty in a 37-20 win over UT Martin.

Auburn is 25th nationally and second in the SEC in fewest penalties per game (4.58). In fewest penalty yards per game, the Tigers are 25th nationally and fourth in the SEC (39.0 ypg). Both averages are Auburn's best for a season since 1989 (3.42 and 30.0 ypg that year).

Average Per Down

Here's a breakdown for the season of how the 2013 Auburn offense operates on first, second, third and fourth down.

On first down, the Tigers have run a total of 384 plays, gaining 2,735 yards for an average of 7.12 yards per play. On second down, AU has tried 318 plays for 1,897 yards, an average of 5.97 per play. On third down, the Tigers have run 153 plays, gaining 1,111 yards for a 7.26 average. Auburn has tried 14 fourth-down attempts, gaining 97 yards (6.9-yard average).

Auburn's touchdowns have come 18 times on first down (12 rush, six pass), 21 times on second down (16 rush, five pass), and 12 times on third down (seven rush, five pass).

Academic All-District

Auburn punter Steven Clark and defensive back Trent Fisher have been named to the 2013 District 4 Capital One Academic All-District * Football Teams, selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America. These teams recognize the nation's top student-athletes for their combined performances athletically and in the classroom.

Clark, who graduated in May with his bachelor's degree in exercise science, had a 3.70 grade-point average as an undergraduate. He is now enrolled in graduate studies in biomechanics. Fisher, a junior safety from Brentwood,

Tenn., holds a 3.73 grade-point average in communication. He is a nominee for the Bursworth Trophy.

District 4 is comprised of all colleges and universities in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and Puerto Rico. First-team Academic All-District * honorees advance to the Capital One Academic All-America * Team national ballot, where first-, second- and third-team All-America honorees will be selected later this month. Capital One has been the entitlement rights holder to CoSIDA's Academic All-America programs since 2011.

Scoring By Quarters

This season in the first quarter, the Tigers have outscored the opposition 128-56. In the second quarter, Auburn is ahead of its opponents 138-96. In the third quarter, Auburn has outscored its opponents 104-60, and the Tigers hold a 93-58 lead in the fourth quarter.

Auburn has had three streaks of scoring in at least 10 consecutive quarters this season. The Tigers started the season by scoring in all 12 quarters the first three games. After being shut out in the first half at LSU, Auburn scored in 17 quarters until the fourth quarter of the Florida Atlantic game. Since then, Auburn has scored in 16 consecutive quarters.

For the season, Auburn has scored in 45 of 48 quarters. Additionally, Auburn has scored a touchdown in 40 of 48 quarters this season.

Conversion Rate

The Auburn defense ranks first in the SEC allowing opponents to convert just 25.0 percent (11-44) of third down attempts in the fourth quarter, and only 28.75 percent (23-80) in the second half, second-best in the SEC.

The Tiger defense kept Mississippi State from converting a third down in the second half; MSU was 0-7. The last time Auburn held an SEC opponent to 0 first downs for a half was last year at Vanderbilt, where the Commodores were 0-4 on second-half third downs.

Notes About The Coaching Staff...

Malzahn has now produced 10 1,000-yard rushers in eight seasons as a college head coach/coordinator, at least one in each season, with Tre Mason (1,317) being the most recent.

Overall, Malzahn has had 10 1,000-yard rushers, five 1,000-yard receivers and three 3,000-yard passers. Malzahn had two 1,000-yard rushers in the same season twice, 2006 (Arkansas) and 2010 (Auburn). His 2007 Tulsa team had three 1,000-yard receivers.

Auburn offensive line coach J.B. Grimes was the offensive line coach at Missouri during the 1984 season.

Rodney Garner and Dameyune Craig are the first pair of AU football lettermen to be on Auburn's staff at the same time since Kurt Crain and Garner were on the Tiger staff from 1993-95. The last time Garner and Craig were in Auburn uniforms together at Jordan-Hare Stadium prior to this season was the 1995 Iron Bowl, a 31-27 Auburn victory. Craig's last home game as an Auburn quarterback was an Auburn 18-17 Iron Bowl victory in 1997.

The Graduates

Five members of the 2013 Auburn squad have already earned bachelor's degrees. May graduates were Nosa Eguae (communication), Steven Clark (exercise science) and Chandler Shakespeare (business management). Craig Sanders (human development and family studies) and Ryan Smith (public administration) were August graduates.



Fantastic Finish I

In its 24-20 win over Mississippi State, Auburn scored the game-winning touchdown with just 10 seconds left in the game. The winning play was an 11-yard TD pass to C.J. Uzomah from Nick Marshall, capping off Auburn's 12-play, 88-yard drive that began with just 1:56 remaining. The last time Auburn scored a game-winning touchdown in the final 30 seconds of regulation in a game was against Utah State in 2011 (Michael Dyer 1-yard TD run).

Auburn's 24-20 victory over Mississippi State was the Tigers' first fourth-quarter comeback win in an SEC game since the Tigers won at No. 10 South Carolina 16-13 with 1:38 left on a Barrett Trotter 9-yard touchdown pass to Philip Lutzenkirchen in 2011.

Auburn's last victory over an SEC opponent in the final seconds of the game was a 37-34 win at Kentucky in 2010 on a 24-yard Wes Byrum field goal as time expired. Auburn's last victory over any opponent in the final seconds was the 22-19 victory over Oregon in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game with Wes Byrum's 19-yard field goal as time expired.

Fantastic Finish II

After holding a 27-10 halftime lead over No. 25 Georgia, Auburn was down 38-37 to the Bulldogs with just 1:45 remaining in the game. Starting the drive at the AU 22, a Nick Marshall completion to Marcus Davis and a four-yard rush by Marshall gained a first down, but two incomplete passes and a 6-yard sack left Auburn at 4th-and-18 from its own 27.

Marshall threw the ball deep and it was tipped by one of the Georgia defenders in double coverage. But Ricardo Louis stuck with the play, grabbing the tip at the 14 yard line and running to the endzone, a 73-yard touchdown play that put Auburn ahead 43-38 with just 0:25 remaining in one of the greatest finishes ever at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Fantastic Finish III

With the Iron Bowl tied 21-21 after three quarters, Alabama broke the deadlock with 10:28 remaining on a 99-yard pass play from A.J. McCarron to Amari Cooper. Auburn was forced to punt on its next two drives, and Alabama attempted a 44-yard field goal with 2:32 remaining that was blocked by Auburn's Nosa Eguae, Alabama's third missed field goal of the game.

Taking over at the AU 35, Nick Marshall engineered another comeback drive culminated by a 39-yard touchdown pass to Sammie Coates with just 0:32 remaining to tie the game again 28-28. Alabama moved the ball to the AU 38 as time expired, but the officials returned one second to the clock, ruling that was the time the runner stepped out of bounds.

Alabama set up to attempt a 57-yard field goal, which fell short in the endzone into the waiting grasp of Auburn return man Chris Davis, who took the return the length of the field for a 100+ yard touchdown in one of the greatest finishing plays in college football history.

100-Yard Rusher, 100-Yard Receiver

Tre Mason gained 132 yards rushing against LSU, his first 100-yard outing against an SEC opponent. Sammie Coates, with 139 yards receiving against LSU, posted his first career 100-yard game.

That's the first time an Auburn duo combined for 100 yards rushing and receiving since last year's season opener with Clemson, when Mason (106 rushing) and Emory Blake (109 receiving) posted those marks. It's the first such duo for Auburn in an SEC game since the 2011 Mississippi State game, when Blake had 108 yards receiving and Michael Dyer totalled 150 yards rushing.

Mason (178 yards rushing) and Coates (104 yards receiving) combined again to repeat the feat at Texas A&M, and again in the win at Arkansas (Mason 168, Coates 102). Mason (115 rushing) and Ricardo Louis (131 receiving) gained the combination vs. Georgia.

This is the first time Auburn has had four such combination games in one season. The previous best was three in 1994, when Stephen Davis had 100+ yards rushing against Mississippi State, Florida and Arkansas, and Frank Sanders (twice), Andy Fuller and Thomas Bailey were the 100-yard receivers.

Auburn has a total of 45 players with at least one career start for the Tigers. Tops on that list is Nosa Eguae with 41 career starts, eighth best among current SEC players.

Thirteen players have made their first career start for Auburn this season. Five made their first Auburn start against Washington State: QB Nick Marshall, OG Alex Kozan, DE Craig Sanders, DE LaDarius Owens and Star Robenson Therezie. Against Arkansas State, defensive tackle Ben Bradley and tailback Corey Grant were first-time starters.

Marcus Davis made his first start at WR against Ole Miss. QB Jeremy Johnson, WR Ricardo Louis and RB Cameron Artis-Payne were first-time starters against Western Carolina. LB Kris Frost and WR Melvin Ray made their first start at Texas A&M.

The Auburn Tigers stunned No. 1, unbeaten and two-time defending national champion Alabama, 34-28, in one of the most memorable finishes in college football history to earn the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week honor for games of the weekend of Nov. 30.

The Football Writers Association of America has named a national team of the week since the 2002 season. This is the ninth season that the award has been sponsored by the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

Members of the FWAAs All-America Committee decide the weekly honor. Each Monday during the 2013 college football regular season, the FWAAs has named the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week. This is the final selection of the 2013 season.

Dee Ford On Hendricks Award List

Senior Dee Ford is one of 18 players on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list, honoring the premier defensive end in college football.

The Ted Hendricks Award is named in honor of college football's first three-time firstteam All-American. As a defensive end at the University of Miami, Hendricks used his agility, height and reach to block passes and kicks, force interceptions and pressure quarterbacks and running backs. He roamed the front line, read plays and blitzed on impulse, completely transforming the way the defensive end position was played. His professional career spanned 15 years and 215 consecutive games, four Super Bowl victories, eight Pro Bowl selections and inductions into the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame.

Frank Sanders 2013 SEC Legend

Auburn's Frank Sanders has been chosen as one of 14 former Southeastern Conference players to be named to the 2013 SEC Football Legends Class.

A four-year letterwinner (1991-94) at wide receiver for Auburn, Sanders was named first-team All-America by the Associated Press, FWAAs and Scripps his senior season after leading the SEC in receiving yards per game (910) and breaking Auburn's single-season record for receptions (58).

A consensus all-SEC selection as a senior, the Fort Lauderdale, Fla., native finished his Auburn career second in total receptions with 121, receiving yardage with 1,998 and receiving touchdowns with 15. Sanders had a nine-year

NFL career from 1995-2003, including eight with the Arizona Cardinals from 1995-2002 and one with the Baltimore Ravens (2003).

He had 507 receptions for 6,749 yards and 24 touchdowns during his professional career. His most prolific season came in 1998 when he led the NFC in receptions with 89 for 1,145 yards and three TD.

Sanders and the rest of the class will be honored at the 2013 SEC Football "Weekend of Champions" December 6-7 in Atlanta.

2014 Auburn Schedule

The 2014 Auburn football schedule will feature seven home games and five road games, featuring SEC home contests against Arkansas, LSU, South Carolina and Texas A&M. Auburn's non-conference home games are against San Jose State, Louisiana Tech and Samford.

Auburn will open the 2014 season at Jordan-Hare Stadium against Arkansas on Aug. 30, the Tigers' first SEC season opener since a 46-13 win over Ole Miss in 1995. Auburn will host A-Day on Saturday, April 19.

LAST MEETING WITH MISSOURI

Missouri's defense kept Auburn's offense off balance from the opening kickoff and stormed away with a 34-17 win in the 39th annual Sun Bowl.

Auburn was able to score first following a Missouri fumble which Auburn's Rusty Deen recovered at the Missouri 49. Auburn's seven-play drive could only muster 30 yards and the Tigers settled for a 35-yard Roger Pruett field goal.

After an exchange of punts, Missouri recovered an Auburn fumble at the AU 35-yard line. One play later, Missouri had the lead as quarterback Chuck Link passed to John Kelsey for the TD.

Missouri scored again one minute later following another Auburn fumble. Ray Bybee scored on a two-yard run capping a three-play, 24-yard drive.

Missouri continued to move the ball, scoring on a 10-play, 48-yard drive, with Ray Smith connecting with Kelsey from two yards for his second touchdown, and a 21-3 Missouri lead.

With 3:08 to play in the first half, Auburn started on its only real offensive threat of the game. Quarterback Phil Gargis passed to Thomas Gossom from 17 yards out. Only eight seconds remained in the half and Auburn had cut the lead to 21-10.

On the ensuing kickoff, Missouri's John Moseley took the ball 84 yards for the touchdown. Missouri went to the locker room with a comfortable 28-10.

Missouri opened the second half scoring on a five-play, 33-yard drive that began after recovering an Auburn fumble. Smith found

Jim Sharp in the corner of the end-zone on a 14-yard scoring strike to make Missouri's lead 34-10.

GAME 1

Auburn opened the Gus Malzahn era with a 31-24 win over Washington State at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The two teams played a see-saw first half, which saw five lead changes and 46 total points before Auburn pulled out the victory.

Auburn rushed for 295 yards on 46 carries, led by Corey Grant's 146, which included a 75-yard touchdown run in the second quarter which helped give Auburn a lead it would hold onto for the rest of the game.

Nick Marshall finished 10-for-19 for 99 yards. Sammie Coates (44 yards) and Quan Bray (28 yards) each had three catches.

Auburn's defense collected three interceptions on the night, two by Robenson Therezie, including one in the end zone as Washington State was driving late in the fourth quarter for a tying score.

Washington State struck first, taking a 7-0 lead on a Jeremiah Laufasa 4-yard run, capping a 12-play, 75-yard drive.

Auburn took its first lead of the game when Ryan White's two-point conversion run made it 8-7 following a Tre Mason 8-yard scoring run. The touchdown the 10th of Mason's career while the successful two-point conversion was Auburn's first since Lee Guess caught a Carl Stewart pass at Alabama in 2006.

Washington State took a 14-8 lead with 8:02 left in the first half on a Connor Halliday 7-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Ratliff, capping off a nine-play, 67-yard drive. The lead was short-lived, however, as Mason returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for the game-tying score. A successful Cody Parkey extra-point put Auburn ahead, 15-14.

Mason's 100-yard kick return tied for the second-longest in school history and marks the sixth consecutive season in which Auburn has returned at least one kickoff for a touchdown, tied for the third-longest active streak in the nation.

Washington State wasted little time answering Mason's return, going 75 yards in just 1:28 to reclaim the lead, 21-15, with 6:18 left in the half. Halliday hit Ratliff for a 53-yard pass down to the 1-yard line before Laufasa carried it in for his second score of the day.

Grant's 75-yard touchdown run on the first play following the WSU score tied it and a Parkey extra point gave Auburn the lead for good, 22-21.

GAME 2

Nick Marshall threw for 147 yards and two touchdowns and tailbacks Tre Mason, Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne each scored a rushing touchdown as Auburn (2-0) cruised to a 38-9 win over Arkansas State (1-1) at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Artis-Payne, finishing the night with 102 yards on 19 carries, led an Auburn rushing attack that finished with 301 yards on the ground.

Marshall finished the night 10-for-17, connecting with seven different receivers, as Auburn led from start to finish.

Mason finished the game with 99 yards on 14 carries, including an 11-yard touchdown in the third quarter that put Auburn up 28-9, while Artis-Payne's 12-yard touchdown run came in the fourth quarter and was the final score of the game.

Marshall's first career touchdown pass landed in the hands of Marcus Davis for an 18-yard score to put Auburn up a touchdown just 3:23 into the game. The catch was the first of the season for Davis.

After a Brian Davis field goal cut the lead to 7-3, Grant rushed 17 yards around right end to cap an 8-play, 85-yard drive to put Auburn ahead, 14-3. The touchdown marked the second straight week that Grant carried a touchdown in, marking the first Auburn player since Oterio McCalebb in 2009 to score in each of the first two Auburn games of a season. Mason would later join Grant in the accomplishment.

Marshall found Sammie Coates just 2:20 before halftime for a 68-yard touchdown strike that extended Auburn's lead to 21-3. The catch was the longest of Coates' career.

Davis hit a 21- and a 42-yard field goal in the third quarter for Arkansas State, cutting the margin to 12 at 21-9 before Mason's third touchdown of the season gave Auburn a 28-9 lead with just 1:14 left in the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 35-yard field goal with 8:46 left in the game extended the lead to 31-9. It capped off an 11-play, 62-yard drive that lasted 5:12, its longest of the game by both time and number of plays.

Chris Davis finished with a career-high 10 tackles for Auburn, including seven solo, 1.5 sacks, two pass break ups and one forced fumble.

GAME 3

Nick Marshall hit C.J. Uzomah for a 11-yard touchdown pass with just 10 seconds left in the game as Auburn rallied to defeat Mississippi State, 24-20, at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Marshall finished the night with 339 yards passing and two touchdowns as Auburn moved to 3-0 (1-0 SEC) on the season.

Facing a 3rd-down and 10 on the Mississippi State 25-yard line, Marshall rushed over left end for 11 yards and a key first down to keep Auburn's final drive alive. Two plays later, Marshall connected with Uzomah, who finished with three catches for 48 yards, for the game-winner. Auburn's drive had started on its own 12-yard line with just 1:56 on the clock.

Marshall, who finished 23-34 with two touchdown and two interceptions, had the first 300-yard passing game by an Auburn quarterback since Cam Newton threw for 335-yards in the 2010 SEC Championships Game against South Carolina.

Marshall connected with nine different receivers in the game, with Quan Bray leading the team in yards with 80, while Marcus Davis led the team in receptions with six, totaling 43 yards.

Mississippi State (1-2, 0-1 SEC) had taken its first lead of the game, 20-14, when Dak Prescott scored his second rushing touchdown of the game, a 2-yard scamper just 2:22 into the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 47-yard field goal, which tied a career long, cut the lead to 20-17 with 9:53 left in the third quarter.

A Parkey 40-yard field goal and a Bray 76 yard touchdown reception helped Auburn jump out to an early 11-0 lead. Instead of kicking the extra point following Bray's catch from Marshall, Auburn successfully went for the 2-point conversion for the second time this season. Bray's reception was the first touchdown catch of his career while the 76-yard connection tied for the 19th-longest in Auburn history and was the longest since Newton hit Terrell Zachery for an 80-yard touchdown against Chattanooga in 2010.

Mississippi State cut the lead to 11-6 as Jameon Lewis rushed for a 14-yard touchdown, but MSU's 2-point conversion failed.

GAME 4

In the first loss of the Gus Malzahn era, LSU's Jeremy Hill rushed for a career-high 184 yards and three touchdowns as No. 6 LSU defeated Auburn 35-21 on a rainy Saturday night in Tiger Stadium.

Playing in inclement conditions throughout the night, both teams were forced into a ground game with Auburn (3-1, 1-1 SEC) totaling 213 rushing yards to LSU's 228. Auburn out-rushed LSU 140-74 after halftime.

Tr Mason led the way on the ground for Auburn with 132 yards on 26 carries and two touchdowns. He was the third different 100-yard rusher for Auburn in 2013 joining teammates Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne.

The performance was his first 100-yard game since Alabama A&M in 2011 and the fourth of his career. It was his first 100-yard rushing game against an SEC opponent in his career.

Auburn opened the second half with an interception by safety Jermaine Whitehead of LSU quarterback Zach Mettenberger. The pick was the first of the season by Whitehead and his first since 2011.

The Tigers followed up the interception with a two-yard touchdown run by Mason. Mason later added another two-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter to post his fourth career game with two rushing touchdowns.

The score capped a 10-play, 94-yard drive that included a 52-yard throw from Nick Marshall to Sammie Coates - the longest play surrendered by the LSU defense in 2013. Marshall completed 17-of-33 passes for 224 yards with two interceptions. He also rushed for 46 yards on 14 carries.

Artis-Payne added a 12-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter. He finished with 41 yards on seven carries.

Coates finished with a career-best 139 yards on four receptions to become Auburn's first 100-yard receiver of the season. Ricardo Louis had a career-high five catches.

Mettenberger finished the game 14-of-22 for 229 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Jarvis Landry had seven receptions for 118 yards to lead LSU.

GAME 5

Auburn raced out to a 17-point first half lead and then held off an Ole Miss second-half rally as Auburn defeated the No. 24 Rebels, 30-22, on Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Quarterback Nick Marshall finished with 140 yards rushing as Auburn moved to 4-1, 2-1 SEC on the season.

Auburn's defense played a key role in the win, sacking the Ole Miss (3-2, 1-2 SEC) quarterbacks six times and also intercepting two passes. Robenson Therzie had one of the two picks for the Auburn defense, returning a Bo Wallace second-quarter pass 78 yards for a touchdown and a 13-3 Auburn lead late in the first quarter.

The six sacks by the Auburn defense were the most for an Auburn defensive unit since it registered 11 quarterback sacks against Alabama in 2005.

Auburn jumped out to a 20-3 lead on the back of touchdown runs from Tre Mason and Marshall and Therzie's pick-six. Mason's 1-yard rush capped off a six-play, 80-yard drive early on Auburn's first drive to put it up 6-0 while Marshall pushed the lead to 20-3 with a 5-yard touchdown run with 5:17 left in the first half to cap an 8-play, 80-yard drive.

Ole Miss scored on a pair of first half field goals. Andrew Ritter hit on a 42-yard field goal in the first quarter and then a 44-yarder with 41 seconds left in the half to make it 20-6 in Auburn's favor at the half.

Ritter connected on a 22-yard field goal early in the third quarter to cut it 20-9 only to have Marshall answer with his second rushing touchdown of the game, a 5-yard run as Auburn went up 27-9 with 6:35 left in the third quarter.

Ole Miss wouldn't go away quietly as Wallace hit Donte Moncrief for a 49-yard touchdown pass with 5:55 to go in the third and a 13-yard touchdown pass with 8:29 to go in the fourth to make it 27-22.

The two teams traded turnovers in the fourth quarter following the second Wallace to Moncrief connection. Auburn's Cameron Artis-Payne had the ball stripped for a fumble following an 18-yard run to give Ole Miss the ball at its own 40-yard line but Ole Miss gave it back just three plays later when Ryan Smith intercepted a Wallace pass in the flat.

After a 3-and-out by the Auburn offense, Auburn punter Steven Clark pinned Ole Miss at its own 1-yard line with a 39-yard kick. Ole Miss would also go 3-and-out, punting it back to Auburn, with the kick covering just 30 yards.

Cody Parkey would connect on a 23-yard field goal to make it an 8-point game, 30-22, and then the Auburn defense held strong, sacking Wallace on third- and fourth-down before kneeling on the ball to end the game.

Marshall's 140-yard rushing effort marked the fourth time this season Auburn has had a 100-yard rusher, with Marshall being the fourth different runner to hit the century mark. Corey Grant (Washington State), Artis-Payne (Arkansas State) and Mason (LSU) have also had 100-yard rushing nights, marking the first time Auburn has had four different 100-yard single-game rushers in a season.

GAME 6

Jeremy Johnson threw for four touchdowns and completed 17-of-21 passes in his first career start as Auburn (5-1) cruised to a 62-3 win over Western Carolina (1-6). Auburn accounted for a school-record 712 yards of total offense on the day, which included 511 yards rushing, the third-most rushing total in school history.

Johnson and Auburn jumped out to a 42-3 halftime lead while holding the ball for 12:29, scoring on six of its seven first-half possessions. The true freshman finished with 201 yards passing, 183 of it in the first half, hitting eight different receivers while also carrying it for 26 yards on three carries.

Tre Mason finished with 100 yards rushing, his second 100-yard rushing game of the season and the fifth of his career. He scored on a 20-yard run on Auburn's first possession of the game and later scored on a 53-yard run that put Auburn up 35-3 with 7:46 left in the first half to give him seven rushing touchdowns this season.

Cameron Artis-Payne also topped 100 yards on the ground, carrying it seven times for 133 yards. His 25-yard touchdown run up the middle midway through the third quarter extended Auburn's lead to 56-3.

Corey Grant carried it five times for 83 yards, scoring on a 51-yard run that put Auburn up 28-3 with 13:54 left in the second quarter. Johnathan Ford (2 carries, 45 yards) also had a rushing touchdown, scoring on a 38-yard run up the middle just 10 seconds into the final quarter, while Chandler Shakespeare finished with 61 yards on 10 carries, all of it coming in the fourth quarter.

Auburn's rushing total was its most since it ran for 526 yards against Furman in 1946 while the school record is 565 yards rushing against Southwest Louisiana in 1985.

Johnson hit Jay Prosch for an 8-yard score on Auburn's second possession of the game, the first career passing and receiving touchdown for the duo. On Auburn's next possession Johnson hit Ricardo Louis for a 46-yard touchdown strike to extend the Auburn lead to 21-3.

Quan Bray led the Auburn receivers with four catches while Louis' 53 yards were tops on the team. Bray caught a 3-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter for his first receiving touchdown of the season while

Tony Stevens, who caught three passes for 47 yards, scored on a 22-yard pass with just 1:38 left before the half.

Auburn tallied nine touchdowns on the afternoon (five rushing, four receiving), with eight different players scoring.

Kris Frost and Anthony Swain tied for the team-high in tackles with three each while Dee Ford, Justin DeLaine, Jabrian Niles and Elijah Daniel each recorded a sack for Auburn's defense, which allowed just 173 yards of total offense to Western Carolina.

Jonathon Mincy had an interception for the Auburn defense, its seventh of the season and the first of his career.

GAME 7

Senior defensive end Dee Ford sacked Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Manziel twice in the final three plays to force seventh-ranked Texas A&M into a turnover on downs with 11 seconds remaining as No. 24 Auburn knocked off the Aggies 45-41 on Saturday at Kyle Field.

The win was the first for Auburn over a ranked opponent on the road since October 10, 2011 at No. 10 South Carolina.

Tre Mason put the Tigers (6-1, 3-1) ahead with just over a minute remaining with a five-yard touchdown run. The junior running back finished with 178 yards rushing on a career-high 28 attempts for his sixth career 100-yard rushing game and third of the season.

Auburn fell behind 34-24 in the first minute of the fourth quarter, but stormed back scoring 21 points in the final stanza on three-straight possessions.

Quarterback Nick Marshall scored his second rushing touchdown of the day from 13 yards out before Cameron Artis-Payne found pay dirt on a 2-yard run to take a 38-34 lead.

Manziel then put the Aggies on top 41-38 with five minutes remaining with his 1-yard touchdown plunge setting the stage for Auburn's final drive.

Auburn converted three third downs on the final drive included an impressive 27-yard connection from Marshall to freshman wide receiver Marcus Davis on a 3rd-and-9 down to the Texas A&M 12-yard line.

The Tigers finished the day 7-of-14 on third down. After converting its first third down attempt, Auburn held the Aggies to just one of its next five leading to a 5-of-13 afternoon.

Marshall finished the day 11-of-23 for 236 yards and two touchdowns while also rushing 20 times for 100 yards and two scores. It was his second career 100-yard rushing performance.

Sammie Coates was the leading receiver with 104 yards on five catches and a 43-yard score. Quan Bray also had a 13-yard touchdown to go

Auburn kept the ball on the ground for each of its first 14 plays, gaining 165 yards and scoring three touchdowns en route to a 45-10 win over Florida Atlantic on Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Auburn finished the game with 422 yards rushing and 628 yards of total offense, marking the third time this season Auburn has gone over 600 yards of total offense in a game.

Tre Mason, Corey Grant and Nick Marshall all scored for Auburn (7-1) in the first quarter. Mason scored on an 8-yard run, Grant on a 43-yard run and Marshall on a 10-yard run as Auburn raced out to the 21-point lead. Auburn finished the first quarter with 186 yards rushing on 18 carries for a 10.3 yards per rush mark.

When Auburn did throw a pass, Jeremy Johnson, who had come in for an injured Nick Marshall, hit Sammie Coates for a 36 yard touchdown pass as Auburn extended its lead to 28-0 with 13:55 left in the first half. Auburn ended the first half with 440 total yards and a 38-7 lead.

Johnson finished the game 10-for-16 for 192 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. Both of his touchdown passes went to Coates, who also hauled in a 67-yard touchdown catch with 3:10 to go in the first half.

Cameron Artis-Payne scored Auburn's final rushing touchdown of the game, his fifth of the season, midway through the third quarter.

Ten different players contributed to Auburn's 422 yards rushing with Artis-Payne leading the way with 93 yards, Grant with 75, Marshall with 73 and Mason with 60.

The 422 yards rushing gave Auburn 2,523 rushing yards on the season, which is the most it has gained in an entire season since it finished the 2010 season with 3,987 yards on the ground.

Florida Atlantic (2-6) was held to 247 yards of total offense, marking the second time this season Auburn has held an opponent under 250 yards of total offense in a game.

GAME 9

Tre Mason rushed for 168 yards and a career-best four touchdowns to lead No. 8 Auburn to a 35-17 win over Arkansas on Saturday at Reynolds Razorback Stadium.

Mason finished the night with a career-best 32 carries as the Tigers improved to 8-1 (4-1 SEC) on the year. His 168 yards rushing were the third-best performance of his career.

After Arkansas (3-6, 0-5 SEC) had scored back-to-back touchdowns to pull within 11 points in the fourth quarter, Mason led the Tigers to a response with a 12-yard touchdown run, his fourth of the night, with 10:17 left in the game.

The touchdown stretched Auburn's lead to 35-17 and marked the first time an Auburn player rushed for four or more touchdowns since Cam Newton against Kentucky in 2010.

The Tigers got on the board first with a 9-yard touchdown run by Mason with 2:35 left in the first quarter. Auburn took over with a short field after Kris Frost recovered an Arkansas fumble at the Razorbacks' 29-yard line.

Following a field goal by Arkansas, Auburn covered up an attempted onside kick and again converted the short field with six points. The drive was punctuated by a 4-yard touchdown run from Mason, who carried 13 times for 93 yards in the first half.

The Tigers came up with a huge goal line stand late in the second quarter with JaViere Mitchell making stops at the 1-yard line on third and fourth downs as Auburn forced the Hogs to turn it over on downs.

Mason kept running hard as the second half began and the junior scored his third touchdown of the day from 5 yards out to cap an 11-play, 65-yard drive. The drive included Auburn quarterbacks Nick Marshall and Jeremy Johnson completing 4-of-4 passes.

The Tigers stretched their lead to 28-3 on an 88-yard touchdown throw and catch from Marshall to Sammie Coates. The play was the longest of the season for Auburn and third-longest pass in school history.

Coates finished the day with three receptions for 102 yards and a touchdown for his fourth 100-yard receiving game of the season. In a night heavy on the run game, Marshall completed 7-of-8 passes for 118 yards and the score while also rushing for 59 yards on nine carries.

Arkansas used a long kickoff return followed by a 13-yard touchdown pass from Brandon Allen to Keon Hatcher to claw back in, 28-10, with 6:11 on the clock in the third quarter.

After a three-and-out by the Tigers, Arkansas took advantage of two pass interference calls against Auburn to punch in another touchdown. This time it was Keiro Small scoring from two yards out, but Auburn still led 28-17.

Jonathan Mincy had a career-high nine tackles to lead Auburn. Arkansas' Jonathan Williams led his squad with 104 yards on the ground. Alex Collins added 92 yards rushing.

GAME 10

Seventh-ranked Auburn used a pair of special teams touchdowns and a career day rushing by quarterback Nick Marshall to defeat Tennessee 55-23 on Saturday at Neyland Stadium.

Auburn's 55 points were the most scored by either team in the series, a total that ranks third all-time in program history for points on the road in an SEC game.

Marshall rushed for a career-best 214 yards and two touchdowns, tying Bobby Hunt (1959) for the third-best rushing performance by a quarterback in program history.

Additionally, Running back Tre Mason eclipsed 1,000 yards rushing on a 10-yard run in the third quarter for his second-straight season over the plateau. He finished with 117 yards and three touchdowns.

The Tigers rushed for 444 yards on 53 attempts as a team, the most ever by the program in an SEC game. It was Auburn's fifth game with more than 300 yards rushing this season.

Tennessee sandwiched an Auburn touchdown with a pair of field goals to tie the game at six with three minutes left in the first quarter. Marshall found C.J. Uzomah for the 25-yard Auburn score, but Cody Parkey's extra point was blocked.

The two teams combined for 42 points in the second quarter as Auburn took a 34-20 lead into the break.

Mason rumbled 13-yards for a score to knot the game at 13-all after Tennessee's Rajion Neal had given the Vols the lead in the opening seconds of the second quarter. Mason's touchdown began a streak of 21 unanswered points for the Tigers that also included an 85-yard punt return touchdown by Chris Davis and a 7-yard touchdown scamper by Marshall.

The punt return for Davis was the longest for Auburn since 1970 and the third-longest in school history. It was the first punt return for a touchdown since Robert Dunn scored against ULM in 2008.

After a pick-six for the Vols, Marshall redeemed himself with a 38-yard scoring run with 51 seconds remaining in the half to give Auburn the 34-20 lead. The junior had a career-best 164 rushing yards in the first half, the fourth most in the first half by a player in Auburn history and tied for fifth most in either half by an individual.

The Tigers opened the second half with a 90-yard kickoff return touchdown by Corey Grant, the first of his career. The score widened Auburn's advantage to 41-20 and marked the first time in program history the Tigers had returned a kickoff and punt for a touchdown in the same game.

Auburn finished with an average of 44.85 yards on seven kick and punt returns to set a new NCAA record. The Tigers' average eclipsed the mark of 41.8 yards set by Florida State against Virginia Tech in 1974.

Mason scored his second touchdown of the game with 7:52 left in the third quarter on a run from four yards out. The touchdown pushed Auburn's lead to 48-23.

He later added his third touchdown of the day from one-yard out with 13 minutes to go in the game for his second game with three or more touchdowns this season.

GAME 11

Wide receiver Ricardo Louis hauled in a desperation touchdown throw from quarterback Nick Marshall with 25 seconds left and Auburn down by a point. The 73-yard catch, which was deflected up into the air by a Georgia defender, gave No. 7 Auburn a 43-38 win over No. 25 Georgia on Saturday afternoon at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Facing a 4th and 18 at its own 27, and potentially its second loss of the season, Marshall heaved a ball down the middle of the field that a pair of Georgia defenders converged on. Louis was past the defenders, who both tried to make a play on the underthrown ball but instead bounced it up into the air long enough for Louis to get under it and scamper into the end zone to give Auburn (10-1, 6-1 SEC) its 13th 10-win season in school history and a shot at a SEC West Championship when it faces Alabama in the Iron Bowl on Nov. 30 at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Georgia (6-4, 4-3 SEC) was not done after the score, however, starting at its own 25 yard line after a touchback but moving the ball all the way down to the Auburn 20 with three seconds left. Aaron Murray, who finished with 415 yards passing for Georgia, had one last chance but Auburn defensive end Dee Ford forced Murray out of the pocket and got a hand on him as he was releasing the ball, causing an incompleteness and pandemonium from the 87,451 in attendance.

Auburn led 34-17 heading to the fourth quarter but saw Georgia score 21 points in the final 15 minutes, taking its first lead of the game, 38-37, on a Murray 5-yard touchdown run with 1:49 left.

Marshall finished with 229 yards passing for Auburn, connecting on 15 of 26 passes. Louis (131 yards) and Sammie Coates (39 yards) each caught four passes.

Auburn used its punishing running game to build a 27-10 halftime

Marshall contributed 70 of Auburn's 246 yards on the ground in the first half, scoring on a 6-yard run with 8:32 left in the half as Auburn built a 20-7 lead.

Cody Parkey kicked three field goals for Auburn, hitting on a 22-yarder to cap off Auburn's first drive of the game, a 35-yarder early in the second quarter and a 32-yarder early in the fourth.

With the win Auburn took a one-game lead in the Deep South's oldest rivalry, 55-54-8.

GAME 12

Chris Davis returned a missed Alabama field goal 100 yards as time expired to give No. 4 Auburn (11-1, 7-1 SEC) a 34-28 win over top-ranked Alabama (11-1, 7-1 SEC) and send it to the SEC Championship Game for the fifth time in school history.

With one second remaining, Alabama, which ended the game 0-for-4 on field goal attempts, lined up for a 57-yard field goal attempt. The final second was added after Alabama's T.J. Yeldon ran 24 yards and stepped out of bounds with the game clock originally reading 00:00.

Adam Griffith, who was attempting his first field goal of the night after Cade Foster missed two field goal attempts and had a third blocked, sent his kick to the very back of the end zone where Davis caught it. Davis followed his blockers to the Auburn sideline and raced the entire length of the field to send the sellout crowd inside Jordan-Hare Stadium into extreme pandemonium for the second straight game.

Auburn will play in the SEC Championship in Atlanta on Saturday, Dec. 7 against either Missouri or South Carolina, which would be a rematch of the 2010 SEC title game.

Auburn jumped out to a 7-0 first quarter lead when Nick Marshall rushed over left guard 45 yards for a touchdown. Marshall would finish the night with 99 yards rushing on 17 attempts and also was 11-for-16 passing for 97 yards.

Alabama would erase the deficit with a 21-point second quarter. AJ McCarron hit Jalston Fowler for a 3-yard touchdown to tie the game and then found Kevin Norwood for a 20-yard touchdown pass to put Alabama ahead 14-7. T.J. Yeldon pushed the lead to 21-7 with a 1-yard touchdown run with 3:48 left in the half.

Tre Mason, who finished with 164 yards rushing on 29 attempts, capped a 7-play, 81-yard drive with his 18th rushing touchdown of the season to make it a one-score game, 21-14, with 1:40 left in the first half. All 81 yards on the drive came on the ground, with Mason collecting all but 15 of them.

Auburn tied the game at 21-21 when C.J. Uzomah caught a 13-yard pass from Marshall just 3:04 into the second half.

After a Steven Clark punt pinned Alabama on its own 1-yard line, McCarron found Amari Cooper down the right sideline for a 99-yard touchdown pass, the longest play from scrimmage in Iron Bowl history for either team. The score put Alabama ahead, 28-21 with 10:21 left in the third quarter.

Alabama found itself in scoring position twice in the fourth quarter but it failed to convert on a 4th-and-1 from the Auburn 13 when Carl Lawson stopped Yeldon and then saw Foster's third field goal attempt of the game get blocked by Robenson Therezie with 1:54 left in the game.

Auburn tied the game at 28-28 with just 32 seconds left when Marshall hit Sammie Coates for a 39-yard touchdown pass. The scoring drive covered 83 yards in 2 minutes.

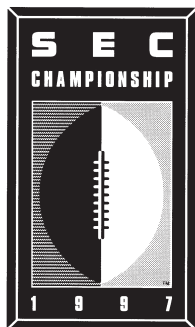

Marcus Nash's 73-yard catch and run in the fourth quarter provided the winning points as Tennessee defeated Auburn, 30-29, in the 1997 SEC Championship Game. Peyton Manning's scoring pass to Nash capped a 13-point Vol comeback.

Tennessee jumped out to an early lead when Manning hit Peerless Price on a 40-yard score on the first drive of the game. But Auburn took advantage of Vol miscues to score on a pair of Jaret Holmes field goals, a 24-yard Brad Ware fumble recovery and a 51-yard Dameyune Craig-to-Tyrone Goodson pass. The Tigers led 20-10 heading into the intermission.

The two teams exchanged touchdowns early in the third quarter before Manning hit Price for another score, this one from 46 yards out, late in the third. However, Auburn's Charles Dorsey blocked the PAT, which was returned by Quinton Reese for a 29-23 Tiger lead.

Auburn enjoyed that lead until Nash caught a five-yard pass from Manning, dodged a tackle and raced 73 yards up the sideline for the game-winning score.

The Tigers' last legitimate scoring chance for ended when Karsten Bailey fumbled a reception at the Vol 40.

Turnovers plagued the 17th-ranked Tigers in their rematch against the 7th-ranked Florida Gators in the 2000 SEC Championship Game in Atlanta.

Florida scored touchdowns off three Auburn turnovers in the first half to come away with a 28-6 victory.

On the first play of the game, Auburn quarterback Ben Leard hit Reggie Worthy for a 10-yard gain, but the ball was knocked loose and the Gators recovered at the Auburn 41-yard line.

Five plays later, Florida quarterback Rex Grossman connected with Reche Caldwell on a 10-yard scoring pass to give the Gators a 7-0 lead less than two minutes into the game.

After an exchange of punts, Auburn took over at its 31-yard line and went on its first march into Florida territory. Leard hooked up with Ronney Daniels twice for 17 yards and hit Rudi Johnson for an 11 yard gain to move the Tigers to the Florida 22-yard line.

But the drive ended when Leard's pass for Daniels was intercepted at the seven-yard line.

The Gators wasted little time in converting on the turnover. Grossman again found Caldwell, this time for a 66-yard scoring strike to give Florida a 14-0 advantage.

Auburn again marched into Florida territory. But, Florida recovered a fumble at its 11-yard line to end the Auburn scoring threat.

Grossman then marched the Gators 97 yards in eight plays, capped off by a 27-yard touchdown reception by Jabar Gaffney, for a 21-0 lead.

With :35 seconds remaining in the first half, the Tigers got their first break of the game. Rodney Crayton intercepted a Grossman pass to set up the Tigers' first score.

Damon Duval connected on a 44-yard field goal to cut the margin to 21-3 at halftime.

In the second half, Florida turned to the running attack to protect its lead as the Gators had 116 yards on the ground in the half.

Auburn could manage only a 21-yard field goal by Duval as the Gators came away with a 28-6 win.

Jason Campbell passed for 374 yards and three touchdowns as No. 3 Auburn defeated 15th-ranked Tennessee, 38-28, to earn its first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1989.

Campbell completed 27-of-35 passes and also ran for 57 yards on 13 carries. He ended the game with 431 offensive yards -- the second best in Auburn history -- en route to being named the 2004 game's

Most Valuable Player.

Auburn, meanwhile, went 12-0 for the first time in school history. The Tigers defeated Tennessee for the second time during the season and third meeting in a row. The Tigers had not defeated the Volunteers in three straight games since 1982-84.

Auburn started off the scoring early, capitalizing on a Carnell Williams fumble into the end zone as Cole Bennett jumped on the ball, and the Tigers had a 7-0 lead less than two minutes into the game.

Williams got his score five minutes later, taking the ball into the end zone

for a 5-yard rush. The score marked Williams' 13th this season and extended his scoring streak to nine games, a school record.

Tennessee's Cedric Houston scored on a rush with no time left in the first, but Courtney Taylor, who led all players with 111 yards on six catches, scored on a 4-yard pass from Campbell with 9:15 to play in the second.

Robert Meachem and Gerald Riggs combined for the next 14 points early in the third quarter, giving Tennessee a tie with the Tigers. Yet Devin Aromashodu's 53-yard touchdown reception from Campbell with 3:45 to play in the third gave Auburn a cushion, one that was expanded to 10 points with a John Vaughn 22-yard field goal to start the fourth quarter.

A Tennessee touchdown less than two minutes later pulled the Volunteers to within three, but Ben Obomanu ensured Auburn's SEC Championship with a 43-yard touchdown pass from Campbell with 6:56 to play.

Travis Williams led Auburn with eight tackles, including one for loss, while Carlos Rogers was credited with two pass breakups.

Auburn out-scored South Carolina 28-3 in the second half of the 2010 Southeastern Conference Championship Game, capping off a 56-17 victory over the Gamecocks, giving the Tigers their seventh SEC title and a trip to the Tostitos BCS National Championship Game.

Auburn's 56 points set a SEC Championship Game record, as well as its 39-point margin of victory. Quarterback

Cam Newton, who was named the game's MVP, tied the SEC Championship Game record for touchdown responsibility with six (four passing, two rushing).

Along with his six touchdowns, Newton posted a 17-of-28 passing night for 335 yards and 73 rushing yards in his MVP performance.

Newton's first touchdown came on the fourth play of the game as he found Onterio McCalebb in the flat for a 12-yard touchdown pass. After a South Carolina score, Auburn again took the lead, 14-7, on a 5-yard Newton run. The Tigers then took a 21-7 first-quarter lead as Newton found Darvin Adams for a 54-yard touchdown pass down the right sideline.

Receiving the ball with 2:02 left in the half, the Gamecocks moved 80 yards down the field in 1:46, setting up a 1-yard TD pass to Alshon Jeffery. Taking over with only 16 seconds left in the half, Auburn squashed whatever momentum South Carolina had as Newton heaved a hail Mary pass 51 yards down the field where it was caught by Adams after being tipped by a South Carolina player. Adams finished the game with a championship game-record 217 yards on seven catches.

Opening the second half with a firm 28-14 lead, Auburn continued to roll, scoring 21 straight points. Newton scored first on a 1-yard run on Auburn's first possession. The Tigers scored again just 33 seconds later as T'Sharvan Bell intercepted a Garcia pass, returning it 10 yards for a touchdown and a 42-14 lead. Auburn opened the fourth quarter with another score as Newton hit Emory Blake on a 7-yard touchdown pass.

USC got its lone second-half score with 7:48 left in the game on a 33-yard Spencer Lanning field goal. With the backups in, the Tigers capped the 56-17 win with 2:22 left in the game as senior Mario Fannin ran in from six yards out for a TD.

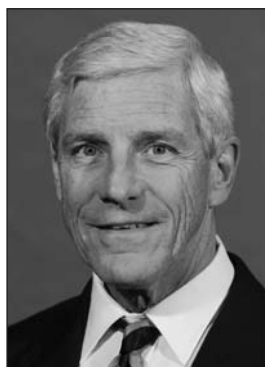
