Series Notes: Alabama and Auburn will meet for the 84th time on Saturday. Alabama holds a 46-36-1 (.560) lead in a series that dates back to the 1893 season. The Crimson Tide and Tigers first met on Feb. 22, 1893, at Birmingham's Lakeview Park with the Tigers claiming 32-22 victory in the inaugural matchup. Alabama has had the upper hand in recent meetings, claiming eight of the last 11 contests. Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban is 10-7 all-time against Auburn, including an 8-4 mark in the Iron Bowl. Auburn head coach Gus Malzahn is 2-4 against Alabama in his seven years with the Tigers.

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SABAN'S ROAD RECORD: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 74-31-1 (.703) mark in road games across his four career stops, including a 46-8 (.852) mark while at Alabama. Saban has notched seven perfect road records (2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2018) and has lost more than one game on the road in only two seasons (2007, 2010). Alabama has also won 32 of its last 35 road games dating back to the 2011 campaign.

SABAN IN SEC ROAD GAMES: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 56-15 (.789) mark in SEC road games across his time at LSU and Alabama, including a 44-7 (.864) mark with the Crimson Tide. Saban has notched eight perfect SEC road seasons (2003, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016 and 2018).

SEC RECORD: Alabama extended its record for most consecutive 10-win seasons in SEC history to 13 when it defeated Western Carolina 66-3, on Nov. 23, to improve to 10-1 on the year. UA had a 12-2 record in 2008, 14-0 in 2009, 10-3 in 2010, 12-1 in 2011, 13-1 in 2012, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014, 14-1 marks in 2015, 2016 and 13-1 in 2017 and a 14-1 mark in 2018.

MORE THAN A DECADE AT NO. 1: With Alabama's Sept. 29 ranking at No. 1, the Crimson Tide has now been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll at least once each season since 2008. The 12-year streak is the longest in the history of the AP rankings. The previous long streak was seven seasons by Miami (Fla.) from 1986-92.

LONGEST TOP-FIVE STREAK: The Crimson Tide's No. 5 ranking in this week's Associated Press Top 25 marks the 68th consecutive AP poll in which Alabama has been ranked in the top-five. That stretch of top-five rankings is the longest streak in the poll's history, surpassing the previous record of 54 straight weeks set by Miami from Oct. 8, 2000 through Oct. 26, 2003. Alabama's run in the top-five began on Nov. 8, 2015, following a dominant 30-16 victory by the seventh-ranked Tide over then-No. 4 LSU at Bryant-Denny Stadium. During the current run, the Crimson Tide has maintained a 57-4 (.934) record and claimed two national championships to go with three Southeastern Conference titles.

LONGEST ACTIVE TOP-10 STREAK: Alabama's No. 5 ranking in this week's Associated Press Top 25 Poll marks the 74th consecutive week the Tide has appeared in the AP top-10, which leads the Football Bowl Subdivision for most consecutive weeks in the top-10 in the writers' poll. Alabama's last appearance below No. 10 was the week of Sept. 27, 2015, when the Tide was No. 13 heading to a matchup at Georgia, which resulted in a 38-10 UA victory over the No. 8 Bulldogs. The Tide has also appeared in 191 consecutive AP polls, dating back to the start of the 2008 season.

SABAN LEADS IN WINS VS. TOP-FIVE TEAMS: Alabama's 45-34 win over No. 4 Oklahoma in the 2018 Capital One Orange Bowl on Dec. 29 was Nick Saban's 24th career victory against a team ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25, the most in college football history. Saban's 24-14 career record in top-five contests gives him a .632 winning percentage, which is also college football's best. Following Saban on the all-time victory list are Bobby Bowden (18/.378 winning percentage), Barry Switzer (15/.516), Woody Hayes (15/.516), Steve Spurrier (15/.429) and Lou Holtz (15/.419). Saban's record includes six wins in the College Football Playoff: No. 3 Michigan State (38-0) and No. 1 Clemson (45-40) in 2015; No. 4 Washington (24-7) in 2016; No. 1 Clemson (24-6) and No. 3 Georgia (26-23) in 2017; and a 45-34 victory over fourth-ranked Oklahoma last season. Alabama also went 3-0 in BCS National Championship Games (vs. Texas, 37-21, 2009; vs. LSU, 21-0, 2011; vs. Notre Dame, 42-14, 2012).

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 30-11 (.732) overall record against top-10 teams, including a 15-5 (.750) mark versus the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff. In Saban's five national championship seasons at Alabama, his teams have gone 17-2 against top-10 opponents.

OUTSIDE THE TOP 15: In addition to its 91-game winning streak against unranked teams, Alabama has lost just one game to a team ranked outside the top 15 in the Associated Press poll since the start of the 2008 season (No. 19 South Carolina in 2010). For perspective, no team in the FBS has lost fewer than 10 games to teams outside the top 15 in that same time frame.

SABAN VS. AP TOP 25: Alabama's 47-28 win over then-No. 24/21 Texas A&M on Oct. 12 was Nick Saban's 83rd career win vs. the Associated Press Top 25, pushing him past Florida State legend Bobby Bowden for second all-time. Former Penn State head coach Joe Paterno leads the list with 86, three ahead of Saban. Bowden is third with 82, while Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth at 66. Former Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth at 64. Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (83-41, .669) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 59-16 (.787) against the Associated Press Top 25, including a 32-10 (.762) mark against AP top-10 teams since the start of 2008. Alabama finished 5-1 against ranked opponents in 2018 after facing 10 teams ranked in the AP poll in 2017, going 9-1 and outscoring those opponents by an average score of 38.0-17.3.

UNRANKED, NO PROBLEM UNDER SABAN: With its 66-3 win against Western Carolina on Nov. 23, Alabama has defeated 91 consecutive unranked teams under head coach Nick Saban, the longest streak in FBS history. The current streak began with a win over Colorado on December 30, 2007 in the Independence Bowl. The previous record was 72 games, shared by Miami (Fla.) (1984-95) and Florida (1989-2000). Under Saban, Alabama holds a 95-3 (.969) (91-3, .968 after vacations) mark against unranked opponents.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 140 of 143 regular season games that have had national championship implications. Following the Crimson Tide's 24-21 loss to LSU during the 2010 calendar year, UA was essentially eliminated from a chance to keep itself in the national championship discussion. The final three games of that season mark the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 12 seasons.

THE 2010s HAVE BEEN THE TIDE'S DECADE: Since the start of the 2010 season, Alabama has won 123 games to lead all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams. Ohio State is second on the wins list during the decade with 114. Alabama has been the wins leader in two other decades in program history, including the 1960s (85 wins) and 1970s (103 wins). Predating the creation of the NCAA, Penn won 124 games and Harvard won 116 as major college football powers in the 1890s.

ALABAMA HAS MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 149 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Crimson Tide won 12 games in 2008, followed by a perfect 14-0 record in 2009, a 10-3 mark in 2010 and a 12-1 record in 2011. Alabama finished 13-1 in 2012 and 2017, 11-2 in 2013, 12-2 in 2014, and 14-1 in 2015, 2016 and 2018. Ohio State is second with 136 wins, followed by Boise State at No. 3 with 131, Clemson at No. 4 with 130 and Oklahoma with 127 to round out the top five.

ONE AND ONLY: Since 2014, the start of the College Football Playoff era, Alabama has only lost one game by 13-plus points. The Crimson Tide's only loss by 13-plus points or more in that time period came in last season's 16-44 loss to Clemson in the College Football Playoff National Championship on Jan. 7. To compare, Clemson has three losses by 13-plus points in the same time span while Oklahoma has four and Ohio State has five.

NO MORE THAN ONE: Alabama entered November with no more than one loss for the 12th straight season (since 2008). Only one other FBS program has done that since 1950, the Nebraska Cornhuskers under Tom Osborne. In those 12 seasons, the Crimson Tide has entered November undefeated eight times (2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019).

TIDE'S TURNOVER MARGIN: Through 11 games played during the 2019 season, Alabama leads the nation in turnover margin, averaging +1.55 per a game. The Crimson Tide is also second in turnovers gained (25) and tied for fourth in turnovers lost (eight).

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SABAN ERA: Junior defensive back Xavier McKinney's 81-yard interception return for a touchdown in the first quarter against Western Carolina (Nov. 23) marked Alabama's 74th non-offensive touchdown of the Nick Saban era and the sixth in 2019. The first score this season came on a blocked punt return by sophomore linebacker Ale Kaho against Ole Miss on Sept. 28. That was followed up by another blocked punt for a score, this time from redshirt sophomore wide receiver Tyrell Shavers in the Tide's win at Texas A&M on Oct. 12. Senior defensive back Trevon Diggs has notched two of UA's six so far - his first non-offensive touchdown of the season came against Tennessee (Oct. 19) on a fumble recovery for a 100-yard touchdown. Diggs then returned an interception for an 84-yard touchdown in the second quarter against Arkansas on Oct. 26. Alabama totaled seven non-offensive scores in 2018 and recorded a single-season record 15 in 2016, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision and was the most in a season by any FBS team in the last 20 years. Alabama scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 consecutive games dating from to the CFP Semifinal vs. Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015, to the Texas A&M game on Oct. 22, 2016, and had 14 non-offensive touchdowns in that span - four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return.

ALABAMA IN THE CFP RANKINGS

The College Football Playoff was introduced during the 2014 season with the first ever rankings being released on Oct. 28, 2014. The selection committee members meet weekly, in-person, on Mondays and Tuesdays to produce rankings. The committee's rankings are announced on ESPN each Tuesday evening for the final six weeks of the season. Alabama is the only team to have appeared in all five College Football Playoffs, claiming CFP National Championships in both 2015 and 2017. The Crimson Tide also holds the CFP record for most wins with six.

Alabama has been ranked in 804 of the 1,166 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 491-131-8 (.786) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 132-19 (.874) mark under head coach Nick Saban. Alabama is also ranked in the AP poll for the 191st consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid-1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. Alabama has started seven seasons at No. 1 (2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

FIRST TIME STARTERS: Redshirt sophomore tight end Major Tennon, senior defensive lineman Tevita Musika and redshirt freshman defensive lineman Christian Barmore made the first starts of their career against Western Carolina (Nov. 23). Other first-time starters in 2019 include: redshirt sophomore tight end/offensive lineman Kendall Randolph (LSU, Nov. 9); sophomore quarterback Mac Jones and freshman placekicker/punter Ty Perine (Arkansas, Oct. 26); freshman defensive lineman Byron Young (Tennessee, Oct. 19); freshman defensive lineman Justin Eboigbe (Southern Miss, Sept. 21); junior running back Najee Harris and freshman defensive back Jordan Battle (New Mexico State, Sept. 7); running back Jerome Ford, offensive linemen Landon Dickerson, Evan Neal and Chris Owens, defensive lineman DJ Dale, linebackers Christian Harris and Shane Lee, defensive backs Josh Jobe and Jared Mayden and placekicker/punter Will Reichard (Duke, Aug. 31).

FIRST TIME PLAYERS: Melvin Billingsley (TE), De'Marquise Lockridge (RB), John Parker (WR), Michael Parker (TE), Daniel Powell (TE), Ishmael Sopsher (DL), Brandon Turnage (DB) and Paul Tyson (QB) made their first career appearances when they took the field against Western Carolina on Nov. 23. They joined Ty Perine (P/PK) (Tennessee Oct. 26); Justin Eboigbe (DL) (at South Carolina on Sept. 14); Jahleel Billingsley (TE), King Mwikuta (LB), Pierce Quick (OL), Tanner Bowles (OL), Jarez Parks (LB) and Christian Barmore (DL) (New Mexico State on Sept.); Marcus Banks (DB), Jordan Battle (DB), Scooby Carter (DB), Darrian Dalcourt (OL), DJ Dale (DL), Christian Harris (LB), DeMarcco Hellams (DB), Shane Lee (LB), John Metchie III (WR), Evan Neal (OL), Will Reichard (PK), Keilan Robinson (RB), Taulia Tagovailoa (QB) and Byron Young (DL). Redshirt junior Landon Dickerson (OL), redshirt freshmen Jalyn Armour-Davis (DB) and Tommy Brown (OL) and Kendall Randolph (TE/OL) (Duke on Aug. 31).

FRESHMAN STARTERS: Alabama leads the nation in freshmen starters with nine players having taken the field for the opening play of a game. The Crimson Tide has started one freshman on offense and two on special teams with an NCAA-high six on defense during the 2019 season. Fresno State, UMass, Stanford and Tennessee sit at second with eight, while four other programs have started seven freshmen.

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 11 drafts (87) than any other college in the nation. Twenty-nine of those picks have been first-round selections and 45 have gone in the first two rounds. The list of 87 features six Super Bowl champions, 13 Pro Bowl selections, seven All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year. Following the 2019 Draft that saw 10 former Alabama standouts selected, the Crimson Tide has now had 32 players taken in the last three NFL Drafts, marking the third consecutive year 10 or more players have been chosen. Alabama had five players picked on offense and five on defense in the 2019 draft.

2019 NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw 10 former players selected in the 2019 NFL Draft, including three first-round picks in Quinnen Williams (No. 3, New York Jets), Jonah Williams (No. 11, Cincinnati Bengals) and Josh Jacobs (No. 24, Oakland Raiders). Irv Smith Jr. (No. 50, Minnesota Vikings) followed in round two with Damien Harris (No. 87, New England Patriots) then going as a third-round selection. In the next round, Christian Miller (No. 115, Carolina Panthers) heard his name called followed by a trio of Crimson Tide players going in the fifth round, including: Deionte Thompson (No. 139, Arizona Cardinals), Ross Pierschbacher (No. 153, Washington Redskins) and Mack Wilson (No. 155, Cleveland Browns). Isaiah Buggs (No. 191, Pittsburgh Steelers) rounded out the Tide's 10 picks, going in the sixth round. The 10 selections ties Alabama's 2017 roster along with the 1945 squad (32-round draft) for the second-most players taken in one draft in program history. The Crimson Tide all-time mark is 12 from the 2018 draft which also set a Southeastern Conference record for the most players taken in a single draft from one member team. Alabama has now had double-digit players selected in three consecutive drafts and has produced multiple first-round picks in eight of the last 11 NFL Drafts with single first-round selections in 2009, 2015 and 2016.

OFF-THE-FIELD NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama’s success on the field over the past 12 seasons under Nick Saban has coincided with the Crimson Tide’s success in the classroom. The 2019 squad is no exception as Alabama entered the season with eight players who already had degrees in hand heading into the opener with Duke. The eight Tide graduates are: Giles Amos, Mike Bernier, Shyheim Carter, Landon Dickerson, Miller Forristall, Anfernee Jennings, Chris Owens and Matt Womack. Since 2013, Alabama has seen 158 degrees earned (graduate and undergraduate) by players who were still suiting up for the Crimson Tide after having graduated. Since the 2010 season, Alabama has seen an impressive 24 players earn a master’s degree before stepping foot on the field for the final time.

GRADUATING WITH THE BEST: The Alabama football team has not only been dominant on the field, but also in the classroom. The Crimson Tide remained at an 84 in the most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures released last November. Those numbers covered student-athletes who attended the University during 2008-11. The 84 mark ranked fourth among Southeastern Conference football programs, marking the 10th year in a row that the Crimson Tide football squad has ranked in the top four in the SEC by GSR.

ALABAMA SHARES 2019 AFCA ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARD: The Alabama football program is among six recipients of the 2019 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award, the association announced. This is the second time in the last three years the Crimson Tide has earned this recognition. Alabama is one of six football programs to receive the honor this year, joining the Air Force Academy, Clemson, Louisville, Rice and Utah. The NCAA’s single-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) is used to select the winner and all six schools posted perfect scores of 1,000 for 2017-18. Each student-athlete receiving athletically related financial aid earns one point for staying in school and one point for being academically eligible. A team’s total points are divided by points possible and then multiplied by 1,000 to equal the team’s Academic Progress Rate. The Academic Achievement Award was established by the College Football Association in 1981. The award recognized the CFA-member Football Bowl Subdivision institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team. When the CFA disbanded in 1997, the AFCA stepped in to present the award.

DICKERSON, WILLS JR. EARN CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT HONORS: Alabama football offensive linemen Landon Dickerson and Jedrick Wills Jr. were both voted to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District IV team. It was the second such honor for Wills Jr. and the first for Dickerson. Now pursuing his master’s in business administration (MBA), Dickerson previously earned his undergraduate degree in management with a 3.68 GPA at Florida State. Wills Jr. carries a 3.44 GPA while pursuing a degree in finance. Both student-athletes now advance to the national ballot with a chance to be voted to the Academic All-America Team. Alabama football has now tallied 19 CoSIDA All-District honors since 2009, including Academic All-America honors eight times under head coach Nick Saban, the most notable being Barrett Jones, the only four-time honoree in CoSIDA Football Academic All-American history.

ACADEMIC PROWESS: The Tide has been a model of success on the football field, but the team has generated plenty of accolades in the classroom as well. Below are some of the academic highlights under Nick Saban.

- A total of eight Crimson Tide players will take the field with their degrees in hand for the season opener with Duke.
- Earned Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 84 in 2017-18 ranked fourth among SEC football programs.
- In 2018, Alabama ranked among the national leaders with 22 graduates on its roster during postseason play. The Tide led the nation in graduates on its roster during postseason play in 2015 (29), 2014 (22) and 2013 (28).
- Alabama’s five national title football teams under Nick Saban (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017) included 114 players who had earned their degrees prior to game time.
- The 2014 team was recognized as one of the nation’s top academic programs, ranking third in the annual academic rankings of the top 25 college football teams produced by New America, a Washington D.C. think-tank.
- The 2011 BCS national championship team had 21 graduates playing in the bowl game, which was the second most in the country.
- That 2011 team led the SEC with 38 student-athletes being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
- The 2009 BCS national championship team led the country with 11 graduates playing in the bowl game.
- In 2017-18, Alabama finished second in the number of football student-athletes being named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll with 10 honorees. Alabama topped that list in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and shared the top spot in the 2015-16 academic year.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE COMMUNITY: Last season, Alabama worked 400-plus hours of community service in Tuscaloosa and the surrounding areas. The team volunteered its time across numerous areas during the 2018 season including in schools, hospitals, with Habitat for Humanity and on campus.

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 29 seasons (1991-2019), and in 2014, Amway became the title sponsor. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches’ poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and six USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017) coaches poll national titles.

ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM NOMINEE CHRIS OWENS: Chris Owens was nominated for the 2019 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team. The award is one of the most esteemed off-the-field honors in college football and recognizes nominees across all NCAA and NAIA divisions for the 2019 season. While at UA, Owens has been a team leader in the community and on campus. He has given his time to several groups in his time with the football program, including visits to the Tuscaloosa Magnet Elementary to promote the importance of reading while sharing some of his favorite books. He has also volunteered at the VA Medical Center and, most recently, helped to rebuild neighboring Lee County in tornado relief efforts.

ALABAMA ATHLETICS AS A WHOLE: The University of Alabama has built a total program, winning championships on the field and bringing home plenty of academic awards in the classroom.

- Since 2008, Crimson Tide athletics teams have won 11 national championships in five different sports and 26 SEC championships in eight different sports.
- Alabama claimed two SEC team titles during the 2018-19 academic year, including football and softball.
- On a department-wide basis, Alabama's approximately 600 student-athletes earned better than a 3.25 grade point average. All 17 programs earned better than a 2.7 GPA with 15 earning better than a 3.0. A total of seven Tide teams earned over a 3.5 GPA in 2018-19, marking the ninth year in a row that at least five teams have met that standard.
- Alabama was also prolific when it came to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, earning the accolade 361 times during the 2018-19 academic year. The Crimson Tide had 90, 66 and 126 student-athletes named to the SEC Fall, Winter and Spring Academic Honor Rolls and 79 named to the First-Year Academic Honor Roll.
- Alabama was once again among the nation's leaders in Academic All-America honors, totaling 10 during the 2018-19 academic year. The Crimson Tide's total makes Alabama the only school to earn double-digit honors the last six years in a row.
- Alabama has earned Academic All-America honors a Division I-best 98 times since 2009-10 and 66 times over the last six years. The Tide's six-year total is 5 better than second-place Stanford over that span. Alabama has also made a significant jump in the rankings when it comes to honors since 2000, jumping Notre Dame in 2017-18 to move up to second place with 144.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

10 POINTS OR LESS: Alabama's 66-3 win against Western Carolina on Nov. 23 marked the 91st time under head coach Nick Saban that the Crimson Tide has held opponents to 10 points or less and the 35th time in the last 70 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: With junior Xavier McKinney's interception in the first quarter against Western Carolina on Nov. 23, the Crimson Tide has now forced at least one turnover in 65 of its last 70 contests dating back to the start of the 2015 season. During the current run, the Crimson Tide has forced 117 turnovers (77 interceptions, 40 fumbles) and returned 25 of those miscues for touchdowns. Alabama's five turnovers forced in last Saturday's game against the Catamounts were the most it has had since it accounted for five at Arkansas in 2012.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS: Alabama has caused at least one turnover in 10 games this season with 10 fumble recoveries and 15 interceptions. The Crimson Tide is outscoring opponents, 121-31, in points off turnovers (Sept. 7 vs. New Mexico State – 17; Sept. 14 at South Carolina – 10; Sept. 21 vs. Southern Miss – 14; Oct. 26 vs. Arkansas – 24; Nov. 16 at Mississippi State – 7; Nov. 23 vs. Western Carolina – 35).

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: Western Carolina's 179 yards of total offense on Nov. 23 marked the 51st time in the last 166 games under Nick Saban (since the start of the 2008 season) that the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposition to fewer than 200 yards of total offense.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 300: The Crimson Tide defense held Western Carolina to 179 yards of total offense in Alabama's 66-3 victory over the Catamounts on Nov. 23, marking the 112th time in 178 games (62.9 percent) under head coach Nick Saban that the Tide has held an opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense. The Tide has limited 24 of its last 40 opponents below 300 yards, dating back to the start of the 2017 campaign.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 239 touchdowns over the last 150 games. That is 60 fewer than the second most in the nation (LSU with 299).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama has permitted seven scores on the ground through 11 games this season and just 39 in its last 70 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season. The Crimson Tide allowed 11 rushing touchdowns in 2018 after allowing nine rushing touchdowns in 2017. The Tide defense led the nation in 2016 with only five rushing touchdowns allowed, one year after giving up only seven rushing scores through 15 games in 2015, the second-lowest total in the country. Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, the Crimson Tide has allowed 95 rushing touchdowns. Iowa is No. 2 in that category, giving up 143 since 2007, followed by Ohio State (151) at No. 3. Utah is No. 4 at 157 while TCU (170) rounds out the group at No. 5.

RUSHING DEFENSE: Alabama has surrendered only 25 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the fewest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 20 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game.

DEFENSE STEPPING UP AGAINST ARKANSAS: Arkansas gained 53 yards on its first 10 plays before a fumble that set up Alabama's first touchdown (Oct. 26). Following that fumble, the Razorbacks gained a grand total of 49 yards on the following five drives (19 plays), resulting in three punts and two interceptions. In that same time frame, Alabama totaled 196 yards and 31 points. The Hogs gained 51 yards on their next drive before throwing a pick to give the Crimson Tide a 41-0 halftime lead.

ALABAMA NEARLY DOUBLES SEASON TOTAL FOR PASS BREAKUPS: Heading into the matchup at Texas A&M on Oct. 12, Alabama had compiled 13 pass breakups to start the season. Against Texas A&M, the Tide accounted for 10 PBUs with senior defensive backs Shyheim Carter and Trevon Diggs along with sophomore defensive back Patrick Surtain II leading the way with two each.

DJ DALE SELECTED AS SEC CO-DEFENSIVE LINEMAN OF THE WEEK: Freshman defensive lineman DJ Dale earned SEC Co-Defensive Lineman of the Week honors for his performance against Duke on Aug. 31. The Birmingham, Ala., native put together a standout performance in the trenches in his first career start, finishing with three tackles including half a stop for a loss. Dale helped the Tide defense limit Duke's rushing attack to only 107 yards on 32 carries as part of just 204 total yards of offense by the Blue Devils on the afternoon.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 166 games dating to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has turned the ball over only 180 times (99 fumbles, 81 interceptions) for 1.08 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 162 times in 150 games (1.08/game). That number since 2009 includes 63 interceptions in 3,831 attempts (1 INT every 60.8 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 27 fumbles in 3,920 carries (one fumble lost every 145.2 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: Junior running back Najee Harris found the end zone on the opening possession at Mississippi State on Nov. 16. With that score, Alabama extended its streak to 33 straight wins when scoring a touchdown on its first offensive possession of a game. The Tide's last loss after finding the end zone on its first drive was to the Oklahoma Sooners in the 2014 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for consecutive games with a score to 253 thanks to redshirt sophomore Joseph Bulovas' 29-yard field goal in the first quarter versus Western Carolina on Nov. 23. The Crimson Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama has a 196-54 (.784) record over the course of the current streak.

500+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama recorded 541 yards of total offense in the 66-3 victory over Western Carolina on Nov. 23. The 500-plus yard performance marked the 32nd time in the last 70 games, dating to the start of the 2015 season, that the Crimson Tide has eclipsed the 500-yard mark. Last season, UA totaled 500 or more yards in 12 of 15 games to set a single-season school record. The Tide has eclipsed 500 yards of offense in eight of the 11 games in the 2019 campaign.

600+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama recorded 603 yards of total offense against New Mexico State on Sept. 7, marking the first time the Tide exceeded 600 yards of total offense since Oct. 6, 2018 at Arkansas when the Tide tallied 639 yards. Overall, the Tide's 603 yards against the Aggies was the 14th 600+ yard game under head coach Nick Saban.

ALABAMA 300+ YARDS RUSHING IN A GAME: Alabama rushed for 318 yards against New Mexico State on Sept. 7, marking the first time the Crimson Tide rushed for 300-plus yards since Oct. 14, 2017 when the Tide had 308 yards against Arkansas.

MOST POINTS IN A QUARTER SINCE 2014: Alabama's 31 points in the second quarter against Ole Miss on Sept. 28 marked the most scored by the Crimson Tide in a quarter since it had 35 in the second against Texas A&M on Oct. 18, 2014.

ONE FOR THE BOOKS IN COLUMBIA: The Crimson Tide's 495 passing yards at South Carolina on Sept. 14 set the new Alabama single-game record, surpassing the Tide's previous high of 484 in the 1969 Iron Bowl. Quarterback Tua Tagovailoa's 444 yards through the air were the third most by a quarterback in a single game while Mac Jones added 51 yards on three attempts. In all, Tagovailoa and Jones were 33-of-39 for 495 yards and five touchdowns.

HARRIS RECORDS RUSHING AND RECEIVING SCORES FOR THIRD STRAIGHT GAME: Junior running back Najee Harris once again scored a rushing and receiving touchdown against Western Carolina (Nov. 23), marking the third consecutive game he has done so. Harris is the first player in the Southeastern Conference to achieve that feat over the last 20 seasons.

JONES THROWS FOR A CAREER HIGH: Redshirt sophomore Mac Jones set a new career high in passing yards, collecting 275 on 10 completions.

FIRST IN UA HISTORY: Junior running back Najee Harris became the first Alabama player to score three touchdowns in the first quarter of a single game at Mississippi State on Nov. 16. Two of his scores came by way of the rush while the other was a 19-yard reception.

HARRIS SETS SINGLE-SEASON RECORD: Junior running back Najee Harris recorded his seventh receiving touchdown of the season in last Saturday's game against Western Carolina on Nov. 23. That mark set the Alabama single-season record for receiving touchdowns by a running back.

IN GOOD COMPANY: At Mississippi State on Nov 16, Najee Harris totaled four touchdowns. Three of his scores came on the ground with one receiving touchdown. The week prior against LSU on Nov. 9 saw Harris collect two scores - one rushing and one receiving. The back-to-back performances made Harris the first UA player to record rushing and receiving scores in back-to-back games since Mark Ingram in 2009.

HARRIS ECLIPSES 100-YARD RUSHING MARK: Junior running back Najee Harris finished with 146 yards on the ground against LSU on Nov. 9 and is the only Alabama rusher to go over the century mark this season. The game against the Tigers was the fifth 100-plus yard performance of his career (Arkansas State on Sept. 8, 2018 – 135 yards; Southern Miss on Sept. 21, 2019 – 110 yards; Texas A&M on Oct. 12, 2019 – 114 yards; Tennessee on Oct. 17, 2019 – 105 yards; LSU on Nov. 9, 2019 – 146).

SMITH ADDS ANOTHER 200-YARD GAME: Wide receiver DeVonta Smith notched his second 200-plus yard receiving performance of the season against LSU on Nov. 9, recording 213 yards. Smith's first outing over 200 yards came against Ole Miss on Sept. 28, where the junior set the Alabama single-game record with 274 yards receiving. With his effort against the Tigers, Smith became the first UA receiver with multiple 200-yard games in a season since Amari Cooper in 2014. In that 2014 campaign, Cooper eclipsed the 200-yard marker on three occasions.

DEVONTA'S NATIONAL RANKS: The 2019 campaign has been a breakout one for wide receiver DeVonta Smith, earning him a spot on the semifinalist list for the Biletnikoff Award. The junior has totaled a team-high 13 touchdowns and 1,120 receiving yards. His impressive play through 11 games this season ranks Smith seventh nationally in receiving yards while his touchdown total is tied for fourth in Division I. The Amite, La., native has also been impressive after the catch, recording 610 yards so far to lead the country in that category.

RUGGS III AVERAGE TOUCHDOWN LENGTH: Junior wideout Henry Ruggs III has accumulated 23 touchdown receptions for his career, a total that is third on the Alabama career touchdown receptions list. The Montgomery, Ala., native is currently averaging 40.2 yards per touchdown over his career, including an average of 21.7 yards on six touchdown catches in the first 11 games this season. He is averaging 19.4 yards per catch overall to rank 21st nationally.

TWO OVER 100: With 100-yard receiving performances by DeVonta Smith (136) and Henry Ruggs III (122) against South Carolina on Sept. 14, Alabama has now recorded nine games with two receivers over 100 yards, including one this year and three in 2018. Prior to 2018, Alabama had only seen receiving duos post 100 or more receiving yards in the same game five times in program history and only once in the Nick Saban era.

FOUR ABOVE 1K CAREER RECEIVING YARDS: The Alabama roster currently features four wideouts with 1,000-plus yards receiving for their careers. Junior Jerry Jeudy leads the way and ranks fifth all-time in career receiving yards at UA with 2,512 yards. Behind him are fellow juniors DeVonta Smith (1,973) and Henry Ruggs III (1,590). The group of four is rounded out by Jaylen Waddle, with the sophomore recording 1,303 total yards in his one-plus seasons with the Crimson Tide. Smith's 136-yard receiving performance along with Waddle's 12-yard effort at South Carolina on Sept. 14 pushed all four receivers past 1,000 yards with the duo joining Jeudy and Ruggs, who'd already eclipsed the 1,000-yard marker leading up to the trip to Columbia. Prior to the matchup with SC, Alabama had only seen three 1,000-plus yard receivers on a roster at the same time in program history. The last time three receivers were on the same roster at the same time and accumulated over 1,000 yards receiving was during the 2016 season with O.J. Howard (1,457), Calvin Ridley (1,814) and ArDarius Stewart (1,713) all eclipsing 1,000 yards.

JEUDY MAKING HIS MARK ON ALL-TIME RECEIVING YARDS LIST: Junior Jerry Jeudy has accumulated 2,512 receiving yards for his career, a total that is fifth-best on the Alabama career receiving yards list. The Deerfield Beach, Fla., native is currently averaging 84.8 yards per game in 2019 and has totaled 100-plus yards receiving on nine occasions during his time with Crimson Tide, including four matchups this season.

TUA'S TOUCHDOWN RESPONSIBILITY: Junior Quarterback Tua Tagovailoa threw for 33 scores and ran for two touchdowns (35 total) as a junior prior to his season-ending injury at Mississippi State. Tagovailoa, the school's career leader in total touchdowns accounts for 96, a number that includes 87 through the air and nine on the ground (33 games), an average of 2.9 touchdowns per game for his career. Tagovailoa set an Alabama single-season record for touchdown responsibility in 2018 with 48 scores (43 passing/five rushing).

TAGOVAILOA SETS CAREER PASSING TOUCHDOWNS RECORD: On the Crimson Tide's second touchdown of the first quarter at Texas A&M on Oct. 12, junior signal-caller Tua Tagovailoa set the UA career touchdown record, moving ahead of AJ McCarron (2010-13) who previously held the record with 77. With his two passing touchdowns against Mississippi State on Nov. 16, Tagovailoa recorded 87 for his career.

TAGOVAILOA THIRD ON UA CAREER PASSING YARDS LIST: With his 256 passing yards against Mississippi State on Nov. 16, junior quarterback Tua Tagovailoa accumulated 7,442 passing yards in 33 career games to rank third all-time at Alabama. Tagovailoa was just 482 yards shy of John Parker Wilson (2005-08), who is second on the list with 7,924 yards. AJ McCarron (2010-13), the program's all-time leader, finished with 9,019 yards across his four seasons in Tuscaloosa.

TAGOVAILOA THROWS FOR 300+ YARDS FOR THE 10TH TIME: Tua Tagovailoa threw for 418 yards against LSU on Nov. 9, marking his 10th career 300-plus passing performance at Alabama, the most in school history. In his three seasons at the Capstone, Tagovailoa accounted for 10 of the 39 performances of 300 or more passing yards by a UA quarterback in school history. The junior quarterback threw over 290 yards on 14 occasions.

TAGOVAILOA SETS PASSING TOUCHDOWN MARK; THROWS FOUR-PLUS TOUCHDOWNS AGAIN:

Junior quarterback Tua Tagovailoa's four touchdown passes against LSU on Nov. 9 marked the 12th time he threw for four or more touchdowns in a game during his career (sixth time in nine games in 2019). The 12 games with at least four touchdowns passes AJ McCarron (2010-13) for the Alabama program record. Last season, Tagovailoa threw for four or more scores six times to set a new single-season school record. The Crimson Tide has played 1,288 games in program history and only 13 times prior to Tagovailoa had a Tide quarterback thrown for four touchdowns in a game.

TAGOVAILOA VS. SEC: In his six games against Southeastern Conference opponents this season, quarterback Tua Tagovailoa threw 1,984 yards and 21 touchdowns with only three interceptions on 121-of-176 passing (68.8).

TOUCHDOWN TOSSES: Tua Tagovailoa accumulated 33 touchdowns this season, ranking him third nationally through Week 12 of the 2019 campaign. He recorded those touchdowns on just 180 completions and 252 pass attempts. That averages out to score every 5.5 completions and 7.6 attempts.

TRACKING TUA: Tua Tagovailoa authored another impressive season at quarterback in 2019. The junior is among the highest-rated passers in the nation and completed 71.4 percent of his passes for 2,804 yards and 33 touchdowns despite playing in the fourth quarter only four times this season, going 16-of-24 for 257 yards and four touchdowns (205.3 passer rating). A deeper look at his numbers shows he's been a consistent performer regardless of quarter, down or field position.

TAGOVAILOA PASSING TD PER ATTEMPT: During his three seasons in an Alabama uniform, quarterback Tua Tagovailoa threw 87 touchdowns across 684 career passing attempts, which averages out to a passing touchdown every 7.9 attempts or 12.7 percent of his career attempts.

250-PLUS AT HALF: Junior quarterback Tua Tagovailoa threw for 250 or more passing yards six times throughout his career at Alabama. This season, he accounted for 286 passing yards in the first half at South Carolina (Sept. 14), 301 against Ole Miss (Sept. 28) and 256 in Starkville. His career high for first half passing yards is 334 at Arkansas in 2018, going 10-of-12 with four touchdowns against the Hogs.

CAREER GAME FOR DeVONTA SMITH: In the SEC home-opener against Ole Miss on Sept. 28, junior wide receiver DeVonta Smith became the program's all-time receiving touchdowns leader in a game with his fourth catch in the second quarter, passing the previous record of three touchdown catches, which was held by multiple players and last achieved by ArDarius Stewart against Mississippi State on Nov. 12, 2016. Smith also passed Amari Cooper for most receiving yards in a game (224). The junior finished the day with 11 receptions for 274 yards and five receiving touchdowns. His five touchdown receptions ties the SEC record for touchdowns in a game (last in 2006 by Sidney Rice, South Carolina) and 274 yards ranks sixth in a game in SEC annals. Smith also became the sixth player in the SEC to score at least two touchdowns and go over 200 yards in a game, which he has done twice this season, the first occasion he did in one quarter alone (Ole Miss on Sept. 28 - two touchdowns 274 yards; LSU on Nov. 9 - two touchdowns, 213 yards).

SMITH NAMED SEC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR PERFORMANCE AGAINST OLE MISS:

Junior wide receiver DeVonta Smith was selected as the Southeastern Conference's Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Crimson Tide's 59-31 win against Ole Miss on Sept. 28. The junior set Alabama single-game receiving records with 274 yards and five touchdowns, while hauling in a career-best 11 passes on the day to average 24.9 yards per catch, the second-best mark in a single game by a wide receiver at UA with at least eight catches. Smith's five touchdowns tied the SEC single-game record while his 274 yards ranked sixth in league annals.

TAGOVAILOA NAMED SEC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR PERFORMANCE AT SOUTH CAROLINA:

Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa was selected as the Southeastern Conference's Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Crimson Tide's 47-23 win at South Carolina on Sept. 14. Tagovailoa shined in his first SEC matchup of the 2019 campaign, going 28-of-36 for 444 yards and five touchdowns. With his day in Columbia, Tagovailoa became the first quarterback in Alabama history to throw for 400-plus yards and five touchdowns in the same game.

DICKERSON EARNS SEC OFFENSIVE LINEMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS FOLLOWING SOUTH CAROLINA VICTORY:

Alabama offensive tackle Landon Dickerson was selected as the Southeastern Conference's Offensive Lineman of the Week following his performance in Alabama's 47-23 win at South Carolina on Sept. 14. The redshirt junior turned in his most consistent performance as a member of the Crimson Tide, with 58 snaps at guard and did not allow a quarterback hurry, pressure or sack against the Gamecocks.

TAGOVAILOA NAMED SEC CO-OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK:

Junior quarterback Tua Tagovailoa earned SEC Co-Offensive Player of the Week honors for his performance against Duke on Aug. 31. The Tide signal-caller led an Alabama offense that put up 42 points and 512 yards of total offense. He finished with a career-high total for completions as part of a 26-for-31 performance that resulted in 336 yards and four touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

PUNT DEFENSE CONTINUES IMPRESSIVE PLAY IN 2019:

Alabama's punt return defense remains stout this season, allowing just eight returns for 56 total yards. Last season Alabama gave up just nine punt returns in 42 attempts for 24 yards to rank fifth in the Football Bowl Subdivision in punt return defense at 2.67 yards per return.

WADDLE'S PUNT RETURN RANKING:

Sophomore wide receiver Jaylen Waddle leads the nation in punt return average (24.9) with 19 punt returns for 474 yards over the past 11 games. Waddle is averaging 20.2 yards for his career, a total that ranks atop the Alabama career list.

RETURN YARDS A PLENTY FOR WADDLE AND RUGGS:

Sophomore wide receiver Jaylen Waddle and junior wide receiver Henry Ruggs III combined for 259 return yards at Texas A&M on Oct. 12. Waddle's 128 punt return yards ranks No. 3 in the Alabama record book for most in a game, while both set career-best marks in those respective categories.

WADDLE EARNS SEC SPECIAL TEAMS OF THE WEEK HONORS FOLLOWING TEXAS A&M VICTORY:

Alabama sophomore Jaylen Waddle was selected as the Southeastern Conference's Special Teams Player of the Week following his performance in Alabama's 47-28 win at Texas A&M on Oct. 12. The sophomore recorded 128 yards on four punt returns, a total that ranked the third-most in Crimson Tide single-game annals. Against the Aggies, Waddle averaged 32.0 yards per return with a long of 43.

SERIES NOTES

THE ALABAMA-AUBURN SERIES: Alabama and Auburn will meet for the 84th time on Saturday. Alabama holds a 46-36-1 (.560) lead in a series that dates back to the 1893 season. The Crimson Tide and Tigers first met on Feb. 22, 1893, at Birmingham's Lakeview Park with the Tigers claiming 32-22 victory in the inaugural matchup. Alabama has had the upper hand in recent meetings, claiming eight of the last 11 contests. Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban is 10-7 all-time against Auburn, including an 8-4 mark in the Iron Bowl. Auburn head coach Gus Malzahn is 2-4 against Alabama in his seven years with the Tigers.

IRON BOWL RANKINGS: For the 34th time since 1980, at least one team is ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 entering the annual Iron Bowl. Neither team was ranked in 1982, 1998 and 2003. Alabama is No. 5 in the current AP poll and is ranked entering the Iron Bowl for the 45th time in history. Auburn is ranked No. 16 in the AP poll this week. The Crimson Tide is 32-12 (.727) against the Tigers when ranked in the AP poll. Auburn has been ranked a total of 30 times in Iron Bowl history and has compiled a 21-9 (.700) record when ranked in the AP Top 25. The highest-ranked team owns a 46-11 (.807) record in the series since 1955.

IRON BOWL COACHING RECORDS: Former Alabama head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant holds the Iron Bowl record for most games coached (25) and most wins (19). Here is a look at the all-time Iron Bowl coaching records entering the 2015 season.

TELEVISED GAMES: The 2019 Alabama-Auburn game will be the 45th televised game between the two in-state rivals, dating back to the series' first televised game in 1964. Alabama owns a 25-19 record in the previous 44 television games. The Alabama-Auburn game is being televised for the 26th consecutive year.

UA-AU WINNER GETS "FOY TROPHY": On July 13, 1948, the two circles of Omicron Delta Kappa, a national leadership honor society from Alabama and Auburn, joined together to sponsor a trophy devoted to sportsmanship between the two universities. The ODK-James E. Foy V Sportsmanship Trophy is a tradition which symbolizes the good relationship between the two schools. Originally the trophy was displayed in Birmingham in Loveman's store window the week prior to the football game between the two universities. Then, in a parade preceding the game, the trophy would be carried in a convertible with the Omicron Delta Kappa presidents from each school on either side. The parade was stopped in the 1960s but the trophy has continued to be awarded every year. The trophy is now awarded to the winner at halftime of the Alabama-Auburn basketball game on the winner's home court. The trophy remains in their care until the next year's presentation takes place. In January 1978, the trophy was dedicated to Dean James E. Foy V upon his retirement as the Dean of Student Affairs at Auburn University. He began serving in that position in 1950 after serving as Assistant Dean of Students at The University of Alabama.

GENERAL NOTES

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban's 123 conference wins (including SEC championship games) ranks No. 3 on the SEC career conference wins list. Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .820 (123-27). He is also second in SEC history in winning percentage in all games at .839 (198-38). Saban is fourth on the league's career wins list at 198 victories.

139-7 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, the Crimson Tide is 139-7 (.952) when leading at the half. Alabama has held the lead in 56 of its last 70 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season. Alabama is also 123-4 (.969) when leading by seven or more points at the break during the Saban era.

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: The Crimson Tide's matchup against Western Carolina on Nov. 23 was the Tide's 429th televised game. Alabama has compiled a 290-135-4 (.682) all-time record in televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed circuit telecasts).

148 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 164 GAMES: Alabama's appearance on ESPN against Western Carolina on Nov. 23 was the Tide's 148th nationally televised game since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of the 2014 campaign.

THE 2015-16 CLASS: The Class of 2015-16 has gone 64-5 over a five-year span, including a 50-4 mark across the last four seasons. The group has won three SEC titles and two national championships (2015, 2017) during their time at the Capstone. Included in the class are six All-Americans that secured a combined total of seven national awards so far.

RETURNING SUCCESS: The Alabama Crimson Tide returned 16 starters and 41 lettermen for the 2019 season. On offense, 19 letterwinners and seven starters returned while the defense has 17 lettermen and another six starters back on the field, with five starting specialists returning, as well. On offense, the Crimson Tide returned consensus All-America quarterback Tua Tagovailoa who shattered school passing records with 3,966 yards and 43 touchdowns as a sophomore. Tagovailoa is surrounded by one of the deepest and most talented receiving corps in the nation as Biletnikoff Award winner Jerry Jeudy returned along with fellow juniors Henry Ruggs III and DeVonta Smith to go with sophomore Jaylen Waddle. The defense returned four starters in the backfield led by senior cornerback Trevon Diggs and junior safety Xavier McKinney along with senior STAR Shyheim Carter and sophomore corner Patrick Surtain II. Redshirt senior Anfernee Jennings returned on the outside with 23 career starts, 111 tackles and 22 tackles for loss. The front welcomed back two-year starting defensive end Raekwon Davis, who elected to return for his senior season.

10-YEAR RUN: Nick Saban entered 2018 with a 125-14 (.899) record over his previous 10 seasons in Tuscaloosa (2008-17), which is the best of any major college school over a 10-year span since Bud Wilkinson and Oklahoma in the late 1940s through the late 1950s. UA's 125 wins over that decade are the most for any FBS school during a 10-year span in the Associated Press poll era (since 1936).

ALABAMA LEADS IN QUALITY WINS OVER LAST FIVE YEARS: According to College Football News, Alabama led all Division I programs from 2014-18 in "quality wins" with 47. Quality wins are defined as victories over FBS opponents that finished the season with a winning record. The Crimson Tide's win total was three ahead of second-place Clemson (44) with Ohio State (36) ranking third. Head coach Nick Saban and the Tide finished at 67-6 (.918) over that stretch with 70.2 percent of the team's victories being defined as quality wins.

SABAN AMONG 20-YEAR LEADERS: Alabama's 45-40 win over Clemson in the 2016 College Football Playoff Championship Game was head coach Nick Saban's 191st victory in his first 20 years as a college head coach. That total is the second-most in FBS history for a coach in the first 20 seasons of his career. Former Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne won 195 games in the opening two decades of his tenure in Lincoln. Long-time Penn State head coach Joe Paterno ranks third with 187. Saban's five national championships in 20 seasons tops both Osborne (none) and Paterno (one).

NEW HIRES: Nick Saban's 2019 coaching staff features seven new faces, including five newcomers to Tuscaloosa and a pair of returnees from previous staffs. Saban's five new hires include: Brian Baker as associate head coach and defensive line coach; Kyle Flood as offensive line coach; Charles Huff as associate head coach and running backs coach; Charles Kelly as associate defensive coordinator and safeties coach; and Holmon Wiggins as wide receivers coach. In addition, Steve Sarkisian returned to the Capstone as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, while Sal Sunseri assumed the role of outside linebackers coach. Sarkisian was previously in Tuscaloosa as an analyst during the 2016 season, eventually taking over play-calling duties for the 2017 College Football Playoff National Championship Game in Tampa, Fla. Sunseri enters his fourth year overall on Saban's staff, previously spending three seasons from 2009-11 as assistant head coach while guiding the outside linebackers.

ALABAMA AMONG NFL COACHING EXPERIENCE LEADERS: The Alabama coaching staff ranks third among all Football Bowl Subdivision programs - and places second in the SEC - in years of National Football League coaching experience among its on-field coaching staff. The Crimson Tide boast 43 years of NFL experience between head coach Nick Saban (eight years), associate head/defensive line coach Brian Baker (19), outside linebackers coach Sal Sunseri (10), offensive coordinator Steve Sarkisian (3), offensive line coach Kyle Flood (2) and associate head/running backs coach Charles Huff (1). Illinois ranks No. 1 with 49 years followed by LSU (45) to round out the top three.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban has produced the most first-rounders of any NCAA Division I head coach. Saban has coached a total of 34 players who were chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 29 while at Alabama. This year's three selections in the 2019 NFL Draft pushed Saban past Bobby Bowden (32) at No. 2 and ahead of the previous all-time leader Joe Paterno, who produced 33 first-rounders.

CRIMSON TIDE PLAYERS ON NFL ROSTERS: The Alabama football program is again well-represented in the NFL during the 2019 season with numerous former players on league rosters. The Tide has 65 former players (active, injured reserve, practice squad) working on an NFL roster. Week one of the NFL season saw 43 of those 65 players earn playing time on the field. In the last 11 NFL Drafts (including 2019), Alabama has had 87 players selected, including 29 players in first round, 25 in the second and third rounds, nine in the fourth, 11 in the fifth, four in the sixth and nine in the seventh round.

- Saban has a 247-64-1 (.793) record as a college head coach to date (242-64-1, .790 after vacations). He has six national championships – five at Alabama – nine conference championships and 20 of his teams have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals each of the last five seasons including the last four CFP National Championship Games.

- Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships, the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and one of only two coaches to win multiple CFP National Championships. He has won six titles in his last 15 years coaching college football, most recently capturing the CFP National Championship following the 2017 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years, joining Frank Leahy (Notre Dame - 1946-47, 1949) and Tom Osborne (Nebraska - 1994-95, 1997). He is also just the second coach in the poll era to win six national championships (Paul "Bear" Bryant) and the first to ever win five titles in a nine-year span.

- In 2009, Saban produced Alabama's first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. He made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He took down Clemson 45-40 to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game. He captured his sixth national championship - and fifth at Alabama - in 2017 with a 26-23 overtime win over Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game.

- In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team's response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

- His most recent college head coaching stint, a five-season run at LSU, produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships, three SEC West Division championships, and a 3-2 record in bowl games including two Sugar Bowl victories and a Peach Bowl win. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban's guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America. Saban was named SEC Coach of the Year twice (by the Birmingham News in 2001 and by the Associated Press in 2003).

- Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans' defensive coordinator/secondary coach. After playing in just one bowl game in the previous four years, Michigan State made four postseason appearances in Saban's five years at the helm. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach.

- In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season. The Spartans' performance that year landed them a spot in the Citrus Bowl. The Spartans led the Big Ten in rushing defense (77.0 yards per game) and total defense (299.0 yards per game) while ranking fifth nationally in rushing defense and 11th in total defense. The Michigan State offense averaged 31.0 points per game.

- Saban's first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points) and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

- A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. He earned a master's degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie.

- At Michigan State, Saban started the "Nick's Kids" Foundation, which the Sabans continue here in Tuscaloosa. Since their arrival at the University of Alabama, the Saban's have helped raise roughly \$8 million for "Nick's Kids" that has been distributed to more than 250 charities and organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the Southeast. The Sabans also built 16 homes, one for each of the Tide's national championships, with Habitat for Humanity following the April 27, 2011, tornado that struck Tuscaloosa.

- In June of 2008, the Sabans announced a \$1 million gift to benefit Alabama's first-generation scholarship program. The gift has a special meaning to the Sabans as both Nick and Terry were both first-generation graduates.
