THE GAME

Auburn (3-8, 0-7 SEC) visits No. 2 Alabama (10-1, 6-1 SEC) on Saturday, November 24, 2012, at Bryant-Denny Stadium (101,821) in Tuscaloosa. Kickoff is 2:30 p.m. CT; this 77th Iron Bowl game will be televised by CBS.

FIRST AND 10

- This is the 77th meeting between Auburn and Alabama in football; Alabama leads 41-34-1, but Auburn has a 7-1 advantage in all games played at Tuscaloosa
- Auburn's 13 seniors are playing their final game: Daren Bates, T' Sharvan Bell, DeAngelo Benton, Emory Blake, Jonathan Evans, Philip Lutzenkirchen, Onterio McCalebb, Ikeem Means, Anthony Morgan, Ashton Richardson, Travante Stallworth, John Sullen, Jamar Travis
- Those 2012 seniors have a career record of 33-18 entering the Iron Bowl
- The Auburn field goal defense unit has blocked three kicks this season, two of those by Angelo Blackson and one by Corey Lemonier
- Tre Mason's 86-yard touchdown run against Alabama A&M was the fourth longest rushing play and seventh longest play from scrimmage in Auburn annals
- Auburn is 23-34 against a ranked opponent in the Iron Bowl; the Tigers are 97-140-6 all-time against ranked teams
- Daren Bates is fifth in the SEC (8.27 tackles/game); teammates Demetruce McNeal (8.18) and Jermaine Whitehead (7.27) rank sixth and 12th among conference tacklers
- Onterio McCalebb is just the second player in SEC history to tally more than 2,000 yards rushing (2,589), 1,000 kick return yards (1,287) and 500 receiving yards (609)
- McCalebb ranks first among NCAA active players in career rushing yards per carry, with a 6.42 yards-per-carry career average in 49 games
- Auburn has won 77 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points

Series Records

Auburn and Alabama are meeting for the 65th consecutive year since 1948. Auburn trails the overall series against Alabama by a 34-41-1 record.

Five of the last nine games in the series have been decided by seven points or less and 19 of the last 24 meetings have been decided by 10 points or less.

Auburn holds an all-time football record of 90-46-2 against teams from the state of Alabama, including Alabama, UAB, Birmingham Southern, Camp Sheridan, Marion Institute, Maxwell Field, Montgomery, North Alabama A.C., Samford and Spring Hill.

More series notes:

Auburn's longest winning streak in the Iron Bowl series is six games from 2002-2007.

Since the series moved to each school's campus after the 1998 season, the visiting team has posted a 9-4 record. Auburn has gone 5-1 in Tuscaloosa, while Alabama is 4-3 in Auburn.

In all games played at Tuscaloosa, only one point separates the teams, with Alabama holding the slim 98-97 edge. In all games played in Auburn, 23 points separate the teams, with Alabama holding a 256-233 advantage.

Since 1967, the team that out-rushed the other has gone 38-7 in the series. Of those seven wins, Auburn has six. The last time a team won when rushing for fewer yards than the other was Auburn in 1997. The Tide out-gained AU 156 to 62 that year.

Since 2000, the Tigers have gone 4-3 when losing the turnover battle against the Tide. Auburn won in 2000, 2003, 2004 and 2005 despite committing more turnovers than Alabama in each game.

The 41-Year Break

Auburn and Alabama did not play for 41 years, from 1908 through 1947. There are two common misconceptions about the reason for the 41-year lapse. The first is that a fight broke out after a 6-6 tie in 1907 and caused both schools to discontinue the series.

Auburn and Alabama quit playing because of money and officiating. Auburn wanted a northern umpire for the 1908 game, Alabama wanted a southern umpire. Auburn wanted to bring 22 players and allow \$3.50 per day for expenses. Alabama wanted to bring 20 players and allow \$3 per day for expenses. The two schools could never reach an agreement on these items and they became the bone of contention for years.

They renewed their athletic rivalry - the rivalry off the field never quit - in 1948 after actually "burying the hatchet" in Birmingham's Woodrow Wilson Park. In the winter and spring of 1948, Auburn president Dr. Ralph B. Draughon and Alabama president Dr. John Gallalee decided the disagreement had gone on long enough and agreed the series should be renewed after doggedly fighting what they considered interference into their internal affairs by the state legislature.

Alabama won that renewal game, 55-0, in 1948. The Tide was a prohibitive favorite the next year, too, but Auburn pulled off one of its biggest upsets ever, 14-13, and one of the nation's great football rivalries was reborn.

Punt Bama Punt/1972

One of the most incredible Auburn-Alabama games was played Dec. 2, 1972. A few days before, Alabama head coach Bear Bryant incited the rivalry when he told reporters that he would rather, "beat that cow college once than beat Texas 10 times." That set the stage as second-ranked Alabama brought a 10-0 record into Legion Field to meet the ninth-ranked Tigers, who were 8-1.

For the entire game, Bama's defense held the Auburn offense in check. With 5:30 remaining in the game, 16-point favorite Alabama held a seemingly insurmountable 16-3 lead. Yet the Tigers came roaring back for one of the best finishes in Auburn-Alabama history. Auburn's Bill Newton blocked two Alabama punts and David Langer ran both in for touchdowns as Auburn came back to win 17-16. Newton and Langer will forever be remembered for their play in the now famous "Punt Bama Punt" game.



Bo Over The Top/1982

One of the more memorable games from the 1980s was the 1982 affair, which is remembered for “Bo over the top.” Auburn had a nine-year losing streak against Alabama entering the game, but Bo Jackson’s 1-yard leap over the Alabama goal line on fourth down with 2:26 left capped a 66-yard drive and gave Auburn a 23-22 victory, setting the stage for what Auburn people consider the Tigers’ “coming out” party in the 1980s.

The New Chapter/1980s

Though Alabama dominated the series through the 1960s and ‘70s, the rivalry reached new heights in the ‘80s, when the average margin of victory was a mere 6.4 points. Some classic battles were waged in the decade.

Two games that epitomize the series came in 1985 and 1986. Auburn won the 1986 meeting on a Lawyer Tillman reverse into the end zone with 32 seconds remaining to down Bama 21-17. Alabama won the 1985 game, 25-23, on a 52-yard Van Tiffin field goal as the clock expired. A historic new page was added to the rivalry in 1989 when Alabama came to Auburn’s Jordan-Hare Stadium for the first time.

Sack Attack/2005

In Jordan-Hare Stadium in 2005, Auburn set a new school record by sacking Alabama quarterbacks 11 times. Auburn recorded five sacks during the first quarter alone, while holding Alabama to minus-17 yards of offense in the period. Seven different players had at least half a sack for Auburn in the game.

The Comeback/2010

In the largest comeback in school history, No. 2 Auburn overcame a 24-0 deficit to defeat No. 9 Alabama 28-27 in Tuscaloosa on Nov. 26, 2010.

Alabama scored on each of its first three possessions to take a 21-0 lead into the second quarter. The Crimson Tide had a first-and-10 from its 40 when QB Greg McElroy connected with RB Mark Ingram. As Ingram raced down the sideline to the Auburn 19-yard line, Tigers lineman Antoine Carter raced 40 yards from the line of scrimmage to strip the ball from behind. The ball rolled into the end zone where Auburn’s Demond Washington recovered for a touchback. Although Auburn had to punt on the ensuing possession, the turnover stymied Alabama’s momentum.

After a field goal made it 24-0 with 8:01 left in the second quarter, the Tigers made it a 24-7 game on Cam Newton’s 36-yard touchdown pass to Emory Blake. Auburn then scored on the second play of the second half as Newton hit Terrell Zachery on a 70-yard touchdown pass to make it 24-14.

A 1-yard sneak by Newton made it 24-21 with 4:25 left in the third quarter. The Crimson Tide converted a field goal following an Auburn turnover to take a 27-21 lead into the fourth quarter. Newton notched his third touchdown pass of the game when he hit Philip Lutzenkirchen on a 7-yard pass that gave the Tigers a 28-27 lead with 11:55 left in the game.

Auburn’s defense held Alabama in check as the Tigers completed the improbable rally to finish a 12-0 regular season.

In Regular Season Finales

Auburn has an all-time record of 49-63-7 in the final regular season games played each season.

SEC Numbers

In SEC action all-time, Auburn holds a 291-230-18 overall record. In SEC games played in Auburn, the Tigers are 118-52-6 all-time, and are 9-7 in SEC home contests under Gene Chizik since 2009.

In all SEC games played away from Auburn, the Tigers are 173-178-12 overall. Under Chizik, Auburn is 7-9 in SEC road play.

For Starters

When the Auburn-Alabama game kicks off, the Tigers will have a total of 46 players with at least one game of starting experience during their college careers.

Tops among those are: Daren Bates (46); Nosa Eguae (30); Emory Blake (26); Philip Lutzenkirchen (23); Corey Lemonier (23) and Onterio McCalebb (21).

Making their first career starts for Auburn during the 2012 season have been 16 different players: Angelo Blackson, Trent Fisher, Joshua Holsey, Jonathan Jones and Cassanova McKinzy on defense; Kiehl Frazier, Jay Prosch, Tunde Fariyike, Greg Robinson, Avery Young, Tre Mason, Patrick Miller, Jaylon Denson, C.J. Uzomah, Jonathan Wallace and Christian Westerman on offense.

30+ Points Equals Victory

Auburn has won 77 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points. The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996. In its history, Auburn is now 293-4 all-time when scoring at least 30 points.

First College Action

A total of 22 different players have seen their first career action for Auburn during the 2012 season.

The complete list: Mike Blakely, Sammie Coates, Kris Frost, Justin Garrett, Corey Grant, Kemiya Harrell, Forrest Hill, Joshua Holshey, Jonathan Jones, Jake Lembke, Ricardo Louis, Cassanova McKinzy, Patrick Miller, Ja'Brian Niles, Jay Prosch, Melvin Ray, Greg Robinson, Jordan Spriggs, Anthony Swain, Jonathan Wallace, Christian Westerman, Avery Young.

Seven of those are true freshmen and eight are redshirt freshmen. Freshmen have made 36 starts for Auburn this season (25 by true freshmen and 11 by redshirt freshmen).

The O-Zone

Auburn's versatile Onterio McCalebb is just the second SEC player all-time to record more than 2,000 career rushing yards, 1,000 career kick return yards, and 500 career receiving yards. The first was Kentucky's Derrick Locke (2,618 yards rushing, 1,464 yards on kick returns, and 883 receiving yards from 2007-10.)

McCalebb now has 2,589 yards rushing to rank ninth among Auburn's career leaders. His 6.42 yards per carry average places him third all-time at Auburn, behind Brent Fullwood (7.15) and Bo Jackson (6.62). That 6.42 average ranks McCalebb first among the NCAA's active players in that career statistic.

His 104 yards rushing against Alabama A&M were McCalebb's sixth career 100-yard rushing game, his third this season. His 128 yards vs. ULM were the second-highest single game total of his career. He also had 113 yards rushing against New Mexico State.

With two TD runs of 19 and 14 yards against Alabama A&M, McCalebb now has 24 career rushing touchdowns (ninth best in AU history), and 29 touchdowns overall (eighth best at AU). McCalebb is fifth among Auburn's career all-purpose yardage leaders with 4,485 yards.

He is third on the receptions by a running back list with 62 and fifth for RB receiving yardage with 609; next is Carl Stewart (612/2004-07). McCalebb had a streak of 23 straight games where he caught at least one pass stopped against Texas A&M; he had 49 receptions for 430 yards during that span.

He ranks fifth in Auburn career kick return yardage (1,287). McCalebb's kickoff return for a touchdown to start the second half at Mississippi State was the second such score of his career; the senior from Fort Meade, Fla., scored on an 83-yd return vs. Alabama in 2011. It was Auburn's first 100-yard return since Tim Carter vs. LSU in 2000. The last player to return a kickoff for a touchdown vs. Mississippi State was Arkansas' Darren McFadden in 2006. During the Chizik Era, five kickoff returns have gone for touchdowns. AU had its previous five kickoff returns for TD in a 298-game span from 1984-2008.

The Line On Lutz

With Philip Lutzenkirchen sidelined by season-ending surgery, one of the most productive tight end careers in Auburn annals has concluded. Lutz finishes his career third

all-time in Auburn career receiving yards by a tight end, with 628, passing Fred Baxter (1991-92) who had 584 career receiving yards. Lutz is second in career catches by a tight end with 59, behind only Cooper Wallace (63 rec/2002-05). Lutzenkirchen finished with the Auburn record for career touchdowns by a tight end with 14.

The 1-2-3 Punch

The third member of Auburn's skilled senior 1-2-3 Punch has been receiver Emory Blake, also making a mark on the record book. Blake had 104 yards on six catches versus Georgia, his eighth career 100-yard game (tied for third best all-time at Auburn).

Starting the season with a then career-best 109 receiving yards versus Clemson, Blake topped that total with 118 yards receiving on 10 catches against Arkansas, both career highs. This was the most catches by an Auburn receiver in a game since the 2009 season, when Darvin Adams had 10 receptions against Northwestern in the Outback Bowl. He had 106 yards on five receptions vs. Texas A&M.

With 125 receptions to date, Blake is just the ninth receiver in Auburn history to record 100 career catches; his current per-catch average of 15.73 yards is fifth among that group.

Blake is fifth on the Auburn career touchdown receptions list with 16 scores, including a 27-yard TD against Texas A&M. Blake is fifth on Auburn's all-time receptions list (125) and seventh in career receiving yardage (1,966).

Tackling Daren Bates

Senior linebacker Daren Bates, now with 313 career tackles, is 12th among Auburn's career tackle leaders. He recorded a career-best 16 tackles at Ole Miss, his fourth double-digit tackle game of the 2012 season.

Bates led Auburn with 104 tackles last year, and has recorded 91 tackles this season, an average of 8.27 per contest. Bates is fifth in the SEC in tackles per game average. No AU player since the NCAA began using press box tackle totals instead of coaches' film (2004) has had back-to-back 100+ seasons; the last to do so was Takeo Spikes in 1996-97.

Bates' fumble return for a touchdown of 62 yards against New Mexico State was the longest fumble return for a score in Auburn records since 1969; the previous long was 60 yards by Ed Graham at Florida State in 1984.

(The longest ever at Auburn is believed to be a 91-yard return by Gusty Yearout in 1966 vs. Florida.) It was Bates' first career touchdown and the first defensive touchdown by Auburn this season. Bates also registered AU's first interception of the season, returning it 12 yards versus Clemson.

Top Twelve Tacklers

Three Auburn defenders rank among the top dozen tacklers in the SEC this season. Linebacker Daren Bates is fifth at 8.27 tackles per game. Safety Demetruce McNeal, whose best effort was an 18-tackle performance at Mississippi State, ranks sixth in the SEC at 8.18 tackles per game. Safety Jermaine Whitehead, at 7.27 tackles per game, is tied for 12th among the SEC leaders.

Tre Mason On The Carry

Sophomore Tre Mason's 181-yard rushing total against Alabama A&M gave Mason his third 100-yard game of the season. He also had 100-yard efforts with a then-career-high 152 against New Mexico State and 106 yards against Clemson. His 22 carries versus NMSU were also a career best.

Mason's 86-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the fourth longest rushing play in Auburn history and the seventh longest play from scrimmage ever. It was the longest Auburn run since 1986, when Brent Fullwood had an 88-yard gain against Mississippi State.

Mason leads Auburn in rushing this season with 920 yards on 150 carries, for a 6.1 per-carry average. Scoring twice against AAMU, his eight touchdowns are also most on the squad; he has scored seven of those in the last six games.

Mason has passed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for his career, just the 39th Auburn player ever to do so. He currently ranks 36th in AU career rushing, with 1,081 yards, averaging 6.07 yards per carry.

Items Of Note/Vs. Alabama A&M

Trent Fisher's fourth-quarter 60-yard interception returned for a touchdown was his first interception of the season. It was Auburn's first interception score since Jermaine Whitehead returned an interception 25 yards for a touchdown against Florida Atlantic in 2011. Fisher's 60-yard return was the seventh longest interception return for a score in Auburn history.

Auburn's 512 total yards of offense were its most since it gained 519 yards against Oregon in the 2010 National Championship game.

Auburn's 51 points were its most since it scored 56 against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC Championship Game.

The 44-point margin of victory was Auburn's largest since it defeated Louisiana-Monroe by 49 (52-3) in 2010

Auburn's last safety came against Virginia in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

The D-Line

Auburn's veteran defensive line can account for 109 career starts among seven Tigers: Nosa Eguae, Corey Lemonier, Jeffrey Whitaker, Kenneth Carter, Gabe Wright, Dee Ford and Angelo Blackson. They are averaging more than 16 tackles and four quarterback hurries per game.

That group accounted for 22 tackles in the opener with Clemson. Preseason All-American Corey Lemonier was credited with nine tackles and a pair of sacks (-7); that marks the third time in eight games that Lemonier recorded a multiple-sack game. Junior Dee Ford

had two sacks of Clemson's Tajh Boyd for -14 yards; those two sacks and his seven tackles overall were both career bests for Ford.

Against Mississippi State, the defensive line came up with 17 tackles, 3.5 TFL and a seven-yard sack by Lemonier. Angelo Blackson also blocked a Mississippi State field goal attempt, the first blocked field goal by Auburn since Jake Ricks had a field goal block versus Kentucky in 2009.

In the win over ULM, the defensive line accounted for 19 tackles, including an 8-yard sack by Ford, and 9 quarterback hurries; Lemonier led the group with 5 tackles and 4 hurries, and he blocked a third-quarter ULM field-goal attempt, the second blocked kick of his career (he previously blocked a South Carolina PAT attempt in 2011). And in overtime, Blackson tipped a ULM field goal attempt for his second block in as many weeks.

Lemonier had two sacks (-15) against LSU; he has 17.0 sacks for his career, placing him seventh among Auburn's career top 10. The junior has four multiple-sack games during his career, twice this season.

Against LSU, both Whitaker and Blackson forced opponent fumbles and Lemonier was credited with a fumble recovery.

Blackson also forced fumbles against Arkansas and Vanderbilt. Lemonier recovered a VU fumble. Eguae recorded his first sack of the season against Texas A&M.

Auburn got sacks from Blackson, Ford and Kemiya Harrell (a career first) against New Mexico State. The defensive line accounted for 25 tackles versus Georgia, with a sack by Ford and a shared sack by Whitaker and Lemonier. Dee Ford had two sacks (-11) and forced an Alabama A&M fumble; LaDarius Owens (1.5) and Gabe Wright (1.0) also contributed sacks against AAMU.

Average Per Down

Here's a breakdown of how the 2012 Auburn offense is operating on first, second, third and fourth down.

On first down, the Tigers have run a total of 292 plays, gaining 1,775 yards for an average of 6.1 yards per play. On second down, AU has tried 208 plays for 1,296 yards, an average of 6.2 per play.

On third down, the Tigers have run 130 plays, gaining 491 yards for a 3.8 average. Auburn has tried only eight fourth-down attempts this season, gaining seven yards.

Auburn's touchdowns this season have come seven times on first down (4 rush, 3 pass), 12 times on second (8 rush, 4 pass), and five times on third down (4 rush, 1 pass).

When Scoring 20+ Points

Since 2001, Auburn is 101-14 (.878) when scoring 20 or more points in a game. Dating back to the start of the 1993 season, Auburn is 144-21-1 (.870) when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

Ray Guy Semifinalist

Steven Clark is among the 10 semifinalists for the 2012 Ray Guy Award, announced by the Augusta Sports Council and chosen from a field of 69 candidates, recognizing the most outstanding punter in college football.

Particular emphasis was placed on the punter's net average, percentage of total punts inside the 20-yard line and percentage of punts not returned. A national voting body will decide the three award finalists, who will be announced on November 19.

Linebacker Cassanova McKinzy, a true freshman who recorded 12 tackles in his first career start at Vanderbilt, tallied the second-highest tackle total in an Auburn first start since press box defensive stats became official in 2004.

Auburn punter Steven Clark and linebacker Ashton Richardson were named to the Capital One Academic All-District football first team as voted by CoSIDA. Their selection places them on the national ballot for Academic All-America honors.

Clark, a junior from Kansas City, Missouri, holds a 3.44 GPA in exercise science. The Ray Guy Award semifinalist is averaging 41.1 yards per punt this season.

Richardson, a senior from New Orleans, La., holds a 3.94 GPA in animal sciences. He was named a finalist for a Rhodes Scholarship and interviewed for that prestigious honor last weekend.

Halftime Rallies

Five times during the Chizik era the Tigers have rallied to win after trailing at halftime. The 2011 Tigers rallied from a 21-14 halftime deficit against Utah State in the 2011 season opener for a 42-38 victory.

The 2010 Tigers overcame deficits to Clemson, South Carolina (regular season) and Alabama. Chizik's 2009 team had a halftime rally to beat West Virginia. Auburn has had three "walk-off" wins under Chizik, two coming in 2010. The Tigers defeated Oregon in the BCS National Championship Game and Kentucky on the road on field goals as time expired. A 35-yard field goal in overtime by Cody Parkey vs. ULM in 2012 clinched that victory.

FWAA Courage Award

Auburn's Jay Prosch is a Discover Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award weekly honoree. Prosch, a junior fullback from Mobile, Ala., is playing this season after the death of his mother Sept. 3.

Prosch played two years at Illinois, but transferred to Auburn to be able to spend more time with his mother. Iris Prosch was diagnosed in 2011 with Grade 4 brain cancer. Prosch was granted a waiver by the NCAA to play immediately at Auburn. The day before the season opener, his mother slipped into a coma. He played against Clemson Sept. 1, then drove to Mobile, arriving in the early morning hours Sept. 2. He was with his mother when she died.

Prosch attended classes the next day, telling others his mother wouldn't want him missing studies or practice time. After a memorial service on Thursday, Sept. 6, he returned to Auburn in time to travel with the team to Starkville, Miss., to play Mississippi State.

The Football Writers Association of America and the Discover Orange Bowl announce a weekly nominee each Wednesday during the season. The requirements include displaying courage on or off the field, including overcoming an injury or physical handicap, preventing a disaster or living through hardship.

Richardson Rhodes Scholarship Finalist

Senior linebacker Ashton Richardson has been named a finalist for the Rhodes Scholarship, marking the fourth straight year an Auburn student-athlete has become a Rhodes finalist.

The Rhodes Scholarships, founded in 1904, are the oldest international fellowships. Winners of the scholarship have the opportunity to do graduate work at the University of Oxford in the United Kingdom.

Richardson is an Honors College student majoring in Animal Sciences (pre-veterinary medicine) in Auburn's College of Agriculture with a cumulative grade point average of 3.94. Richardson is a three-time SEC Academic

Honor Roll honoree and earlier this year was a semifinalist for the National Football Foundation Campbell Trophy, presented to the top football scholar-athlete in the country. Richardson, who grew up helping his father raise quarter-horses, has aspirations to become an equine surgeon.

The four-year letterman has played in 34 career games, registering 13 tackles. In 2012 Richardson has played in all 10 games, making four tackles, recording one sack and recovering one fumble. Richardson walked on to the football team as a freshman and earned a scholarship prior to his junior season.

A New Orleans, La., native, Richardson is writing his Honors thesis tentatively titled "Comparison of Articular Cartilage Thickness in Cadaveric Equine Limbs" under the direction of Reid Hanson, Professor of Equine Surgery in the College of Veterinary Medicine. He is scheduled to graduate from Auburn in December. Off the field, Richardson has volunteered each week for the past four years as a mentor at the Lee County Youth Development Center.

Missing Senior Day versus Alabama A&M, Richardson appeared before the District VII Selection Committee Nov. 16-17 in Birmingham, joining 11 other finalists from the district. Two finalists from District VII were selected as 2013 Rhodes Scholars; Richardson was not successful in his bid.

Richardson is the fifth Auburn student-athlete to be named a Rhodes finalist in the past four years. Other past finalists include former diver Dan Mazzaferro, swimming and diving student-athletes Erica Meissner and Jordan Anderson and former gymnast Krissy Voss. Anderson won the Rhodes Scholarship in 2009.

Good Works Team

Auburn senior Philip Lutzenkirchen is one of 22 members of the 2012 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team®, one of college football's most prestigious off-the-field honors recognizing a select group of players committed to making a difference in their communities.

Lutzenkirchen has made supporting children with cancer his personal mission, by visiting them and bringing teammates along, corresponding with them, and offering encouragement to siblings and family. A member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, he is scheduled to graduate in December with a bachelor's degree in communication.

On Scholarship

Formerly walk-ons, junior deep snapper Jake Lembke, sophomore defensive back Trent Fisher and sophomore tailback Corey Grant were put on scholarship for the Fall Semester; classes began August 16.

Senior Bowl Watch List

Five Auburn seniors are listed on the 2013 Senior Bowl watch list: defensive back T'Sharvan Bell, receiver Emory Blake, tight end Philip Lutzenkirchen, tailback Onterio McCalebb and offensive lineman John Sullen.

The top 100 seniors in the country will be invited to participate in the 2013 Senior Bowl, set for Saturday, January 26, in Mobile's Ladd-Peebles Stadium. The SEC led all conferences with 71 players on the watch list.

Winningest Programs

Entering the 2012 campaign, Auburn ranked among the 15 winningest BCS college football programs in all-time wins; the Tigers have 714 total victories. Teams that have 700+ all-time wins: Michigan, Texas, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Penn State, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Alabama, Tennessee, Southern Cal, Georgia, LSU, Auburn and West Virginia.

James Owens Among SEC Legends

The Southeastern Conference 2012 Football Legends Class includes 14 former SEC stars who have made a name for themselves as great athletes on the playing field. Auburn's 2012 recipient is James Owens, the first African-American football player at Auburn.

A Fairfield native, Owens lettered at Auburn as a fullback from 1969-72. During three seasons on the varsity, he helped Auburn to a 28-5 record and played a key role on the 1972 Amazin's team, which defied the odds and finished the season with a 10-1 record and a top five national finish.

The class will be honored at the 2012 SEC Football "Weekend of Champions" Nov. 30-Dec. 1 in Atlanta, Ga. The annual SEC Legends Dinner presented by AT&T will be held Nov. 30 at the Atlanta Hyatt Regency; the group will be recognized prior to the SEC Football Championship Game at the Georgia Dome on Saturday, December 1.

Coverage Kings

Auburn is fourth in the NCAA in kickoff return coverage (16.64 yards per return); only six of the nation's 120 FBS teams hold opponents to 17 yards/return or less in that category.

Auburn ranks second in punt return coverage (0.80 yards per return); the Tigers are among only three schools (UTEP, Northern Illinois) to rank in the Top 10 in both punt and kick return coverage.

The Tigers are third in the SEC in kickoff return average (23.57 yards/return), ranking 33rd among NCAA leaders. The AU season record for team kick return average is 27.3, set in 2005.

Onterio McCalebb ranks sixth in the SEC in kickoff return average, gaining 23.68 yards per run on 19 returns this season. He is 41st among NCAA leaders. The senior from Fort Meade, Fla., has six returns of 20+ yards this year: 100 (Miss St); 45 (New Mexico State); 43 (LSU); 24 (ULM); 22 (Texas A&M); 20 (Miss St).

McCalebb's kickoff return for a touchdown to start the second half at Mississippi State

was the second of his career; he scored on an 83-yard return vs. Alabama in 2011. It was AU's first 100-yard return since Tim Carter vs. LSU (2000). The last player to return a kickoff for a touchdown versus Mississippi State was Darren McFadden (Arkansas, 2006). It was the fifth kickoff return touchdown of the Chizik era. Prior to that, Auburn had just five kickoff returns for a TD in a 298-game span from 1984-2008.

Three Blocked Kicks

Auburn blocked two ULM field goal attempts and has three blocks on the season. Corey Lemonier blocked one with 3:52 left in the third quarter; Auburn was ahead 28-14 at the time. Lemonier has two career blocks, the other on an extra point against South Carolina in 2011.

Angelo Blackson had the second blocked field goal vs. ULM, tipping the Warhawks' try in overtime. With a block of a field goal attempt at Mississippi State as well, Blackson had blocks in back-to-back games. Auburn is the only SEC team to block two kicks in a game this season. The Tigers have 12 total blocked kicks during the Chizik era.

Parkey For Three

Cody Parkey, who kicked the game-winning 35-yard field goal in overtime against ULM, converted on nine straight three-pointers dating back through last season, before missing on

a 49-yarder vs. Arkansas. That tied the third best string of consecutive field goals at Auburn since 1981.

With two successful field goals at both Ole Miss and Vanderbilt, Parkey is now 11-14 on field goals this year, and 27-27 this season on PAT kicks. His 46-yard field goal at Ole Miss tied his career long.

He made four field goals versus Clemson (37-46-27-36 yards), tying a Chick-fil-A Kick-off Classic record. Parkey's 46-yard field goal in the third quarter vs. Clemson was a career long, earning him Lou Groza Award star of the week honors. Parkey's game-winner against ULM earned him SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

Parkey ranks fourth in Auburn career field goal percentage at .750 (24-32), just behind Scott Etheridge (.791/1992-93), Matt Hawkins (.788/1994-95) and Win Lyle (.763/1987-89).

No Return Policy

Punter Steven Clark, a 2011 Ray Guy Award finalist and 2012 semifinalist thus far, continues to excel. Only four of his 63 punts this season have been returned.

Clark is averaging 40.3 yards per punt, placing 14 kicks inside the 20. His long kick of the season was 54 yards against LSU; he has six punts this year of 50 yards or more.

For his career, Clark has a 40.1 average on 141 career punts, with 49 punts landing inside the 20 and 19 kicks of 50 yards or longer.

LAST MEETING WITH ALABAMA

Auburn got a pair of touchdowns from its defense and special teams but was held to a season-low offensive output as the Tigers fell short to No. 2 Alabama on Nov. 26, 42-14, in the 76th edition of the Iron Bowl at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The Tigers were held to 140 yards of total offense while Alabama gained 397 yards, 213 of them on the ground. The Tide got 203 of those rushing yards on 27 carries from Trent Richardson, who led all rushers on the night. Auburn was led by Michael Dyer with 48 yards on 13 carries.

Clint Moseley was 11-for-18 through the air for 62 yards and one interception. Quan Bray was Auburn's leading receiver with five catches for 22 yards.

For Alabama, A.J. McCarron went 18-for-23 for 184 yards and three touchdowns. Brad Smelley was Alabama's top receiver with six catches for 86 yards and a touchdown.

Onterio McCalebb was a standout for the Tigers on special teams as he had three kickoff returns for 136 yards and a touchdown, his first career kickoff return for a score, on the opening kickoff of the season half.

The Crimson Tide got on the board first with a bit of trickery as McCarron, off a flea-flicker, found Kenny Bell for 41 yards to give Alabama a 7-0 lead midway through the opening quarter.

After a short punt on the next Tiger possession, Alabama took over at the Auburn 35 and capitalized on its first play as McCarron hit Smelley for 35 yards, putting the Tide ahead 14-0.

Auburn would get a huge play from its defense to get on the board with four seconds remaining in the first quarter. After a quick-kick from Moseley pinned Alabama at its own 10-yard-line, Corey Lemonier got pressure on McCarron, forcing a fumble that was recovered in the end zone by Kenneth Carter to pull the Tigers within a score at 14-7.

Alabama, however, would answer on its next possession. The Tide would put together a

12-play, 80-yard drive, capped off by a 5-yard touchdown run from Richardson to take a 21-7. The Tide would then tack on a 30-yard field goal from Jeremy Shelley late in the half, taking a 24-7 lead into halftime.

Auburn would waste no time getting the sellout crowd of 87,451 at Jordan-Hare Stadium back into the game. McCalebb returned the opening kickoff of the second half 83 yards for a touchdown to pull Auburn back within 10 points at 24-14.

Shelley added Alabama's second field goal midway through the third quarter to give the Tide a 27-14 lead that would stand until the end of the period. Then, on the third play of the fourth quarter, Alabama's Dee Milliner returned a Moseley interception 35 yards for a touchdown, and a two-point conversion made it 35-14.

The Tigers would drive deep into Alabama territory early in the fourth quarter but would turn it over on downs inside the Crimson Tide 10-yard-line. From there, Alabama would go 90 yards in five plays and take a 42-14 lead on a 15-yard run by Jalston Fowler.

Cody Parkey made a career-high four field goals and Tre Mason rushed for a career-high 106 yards for Auburn but No. 14 Clemson edged past the Tigers for a hard-fought 26-19 victory in the Chick-fil-A Game in the season opener for both teams at the Georgia Dome on Saturday.

Emory Blake caught four passes for a career-high 109 yards and a touchdown while sophomore Kiehl Frazier threw for 194 yards and one touchdown on 11-of-27 passing and one interception in his first career start for Auburn. Tre Mason rushed for a career-high 106 yards while Onterio McCalebb added 82 yards.

The game was tied at 16 entering the final quarter after Parkey tied with a field goal with 55 seconds left in the third. Daren Bates intercepted Tajh Boyd and returned it 12 yards to the Clemson 35 on the first play of the fourth quarter. It set up Parkey making his career-high fourth field goal of the game, a 36-yarder to give Auburn a 19-16 lead with 12:50 remaining.

Clemson then scored the final 10 points of the game to outlast Auburn.

In the back-and-forth game, Clemson came right back on a 10-play, 75-yard drive as Boyd threw a 4-yard fade route to DeAndre Hopkins, who had a Clemson single-game record 13 receptions for 119 yards, in the back right corner of the end zone as Clemson took the lead for good, 23-19, with 9:17 left.

Clemson stopped Auburn on the next possession and drove 79 yards on the strength of Andre Ellington's 45-yard run to the Auburn 8. Auburn's defense stopped Clemson at the 1-yard line for the second time to give itself another shot. Chandler Catanzaro made his fourth field goal of the game for a 26-19 Clemson lead with 1:24 left.

Ellington rushed for 231 yards on 26 carries while Boyd threw for 208 yards and a touchdown on 24-of-34 passing.

Clemson opened the game's scoring as Catanzaro made a 39-yard field goal with 5:22 left in the first quarter. Auburn's defense held after Clemson drove 83 yards down to the Auburn 1-yard line.

Tyler Russell threw for three touchdowns and 222 yards to lead Mississippi State to 28-10 victory over Auburn in the SEC opener for both teams at Scott Field on Saturday. Demetrace McNeal led the Tigers with a career-high 18 tackles.

With the Auburn offense struggling in the first half, Onterio McCalebb returned the second half kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 10-7 lead. It was the second of his career, the other an 83-yarder vs. Alabama last year, and Auburn's first 100-yarder since Tim Carter vs. LSU in 2000.

However, it was all Mississippi State after that.

Mississippi State (2-0, 1-0) answered quickly as the Bulldogs drove 75 yards in eight plays to regain the lead, 14-10, on Russell's 13-yard touchdown pass to Chad Bumphis touchdown with 11:35 left in the third.

After holding Auburn (0-2, 0-1) to another three and out, State drove 58 yards and took a 21-10 lead on Russell's third touchdown pass, a 3-yard play action to a wide-open Marcus Green, who scored his second of the day, in the back corner of the end zone with 4:38 to go in the third.

The Bulldogs iced the game as LaDarius Perkins scampered 21 yards breaking four tackles to give State a 28-10 lead with 12:33 left in the game.

Mississippi State outgained Auburn 388 to 216 as the Tigers didn't score an offensive touchdown. The Tigers had 91 yards rushing, led by freshman Mike Blakely's 42 yards on 11 carries. Kiehl Frazier completed on 13-of-22 passes for 125 yards to go along with five turnovers, three interceptions and two fumbles. Quan Bray had six receptions for 50 yards while Emory Blake caught two passes for 31 yards.

Cody Parkey's overtime field goal clinched Auburn's first win of the season as it defeated Louisiana-Monroe, 31-28, on Saturday afternoon at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Angelo Blackson made Parkey's game-winning kick possible as he blocked a ULM field goal attempt just minutes earlier during ULM's first overtime possession.

Auburn (1-2) saw a 14-point lead disappear late in the fourth quarter as ULM (1-1) rallied from a 28-14 deficit to tie the game with 1:18 left in regulation before the overtime heroics from Blackson and Parkey.

Auburn finished the game with a season-high 418 yards of total offense, including 255 on the ground. Oterio McCalebb finished with a 128 yards, his fourth career 100-yard rushing game, while Tre Mason had 90 yards rushing on a game-high 22 carries.

Kiehl Frazier was 10-of-18 for 130 yards with a touchdown and an interception while his counterpart from ULM, Kolton Browning, was 28-of-46 for 237 yards with three touchdowns.

ULM went 89 yards on its first drive of the game, a 12-play march, and converted on a fourth-and-goal from the one to take the early touchdown lead, 7-0. The drive was capped by a Browning to Harley Scioneaux pass into the corner of the end zone, the first of two touchdown catches for the ULM tight end.

Auburn answered with a five-play, 76-yard scoring drive of its own on its first possession. McCalebb had three carries on the drive, including the 27-yard touchdown run, while Mason had a 34-yard reception on the previous play to get Auburn into ULM territory as Auburn tied it at 7-7.

Browning put ULM back up a touchdown, 14-7, with his 39-yard touchdown run up the middle with 3:52 left in the first half. The run capped a six-play, 80-yard drive that ate up just 2:54 of clock time. Auburn immediately answered with a quick strike of its own, using a Quan Bray pass back to Frazier for the score. The pass covered 33 yards as Auburn went 75 yards in four plays to tie it at 14-14 with 2:18 left in the half.

Auburn struck one more time before the half as Frazier's 33-yard pass to Sammie Coates as time expired put Auburn ahead, 21-14. Auburn took advantage of a 33-yard punt by the

GAME 4

Auburn's defense held LSU to a season-low 351 total yards and only three points in the final three quarters but fell to the visitors from Baton Rouge, 12-10, on Saturday night before 86,721 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Auburn (1-3, 0-2 SEC) got an outstanding performance from its defense, forcing a pair of LSU turnovers, but could not get a crucial stop late in the fourth quarter with enough time left to have a final scoring chance as LSU's final drive ate up most of the final four minutes.

LSU (4-0, 1-0 SEC) had a chance to extend its lead with less than a minute to play, but Drew Allemen's 34-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right. Auburn had one final possession with 37 seconds left, starting from their own 20, but could only manage 17 yards with no timeouts remaining, and Kiehl Frazier's final desperation heave with no time left was intercepted to end the game.

LSU appeared to be driving for the end zone on their first possession, but Mettenberger fumbled the snap at the Auburn 2-yard-line, where it was recovered by Jeffery Whitaker to end the LSU threat. It was just the second fumble lost by LSU so far this season.

But LSU would find its way onto the scoreboard on Auburn's next play from scrimmage, taking a 2-0 lead on a safety when Tre Mason was tackled in the end zone by Sam Montgomery. It was the first safety scored against Auburn since the Tigers' 3-2 victory over Mississippi State in 2008.

LSU would then take advantage of the good field position after the safety, driving 59 yards in nine plays and taking a 9-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Michael Ford with 4:18 to play in the first quarter.

After taking over deep in LSU territory when Corey Lemonier sacked Mettenberger and forced a fumble that was recovered by Angelo Blackson, Tre Mason went around left end for 26 yards to the LSU 4-yard-line. On the next play, McCalebb walked into the end zone for Auburn's first touchdown of the night, cutting the deficit to 9-7 as time expired in the opening period.

The Arkansas Razorbacks forced five Auburn turnovers and sacked Tiger quarterbacks eight times in a 24-7 Razorback win Saturday afternoon before 85,819 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The Razorbacks outgained the Tigers, 372-321, including a 130-40 advantage in rushing yards, yet Auburn had 22 first downs to Arkansas' 19. Auburn also matched a season-high with five turnovers and was unable to take advantage of Arkansas' two giveaways.

Emory Blake paced the Auburn offense with 10 catches for 118 yards and Auburn's only score. During the game, he hauled in his 100th career reception, becoming the eighth Auburn player to reach that mark, and now has 1,573 receiving yards for his career to move into a tie for 10th all-time at Auburn.

The Tigers used three quarterbacks for the first time this season. Kiehl Frazier earned the start and finished 9-of-14 for 118 yards and one interception, but was sacked four times in the game. Clint Moseley saw his first game action of the season, starting the second half and finishing 13-of-21 for 163 yards and a touchdown, but he also threw two picks and was sacked four times. Jonathan Wallace did not attempt a pass but rushed twice for 11 yards.

The Razorbacks struck first, taking their second possession of the game 80 yards in 10 plays, capped by a two-yard touchdown run from Dennis Johnson to take a 7-0 lead with just more than a minute left in the first quarter.

Arkansas took advantage of an Auburn turnover deep in Tiger territory midway through the second quarter and increased its lead to 10-0 on a 27-yard field goal from Zach Hocker with 6:33 to play in the half; the score would remain 10-0 at the half.

After neither team could generate much offense throughout the third quarter, Auburn mounted a 5-play, 68-yard scoring drive late in the period, cutting the deficit to 10-7 on a 21-yard touchdown pass from Moseley to Blake with 0:33 left. All five plays on the AU scoring drive went for positive yardage, including a 22-yard completion to Tre Mason and a 13-yard rush by Mike Blakely.

After Auburn scored 17 straight second quarter points, Ole Miss outscored Auburn 27-3 to run away with a 41-20 victory at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium on Saturday. Tre Mason rushed for two touchdowns and 82 yards on 18 carries for the Tigers while Clint Moseley threw for 118 yards on 11-of-18 passing.

Ole Miss (4-3, 1-2) opened the game's scoring on a toss sweep to running back Randall Mackey, who threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to quarterback Bo Wallace down the left sideline with 7:14 left in the first quarter.

On Auburn's next possession from its own 28, backup center Tunde Fariyike, who was filling in for injured starter Reese Dismukes, snapped the ball over Moseley's head and C.J. Johnson recovered it in the end zone for a touchdown and a 14-0 Ole Miss lead less than two minutes later.

Auburn (1-5, 0-4) bounced right back and drove 74 yards in 13 plays and 6:43 as it cut the lead in half on a Mason 1-yard touchdown run just over a minute into the second quarter. That marked the Tigers' longest scoring drive of the season in plays and time of possession.

Auburn's defense continued to hold Ole Miss after the Rebels' opening drive as the Tigers took over on the Ole Miss 48. Two plays later, Auburn tied it 14-14. Auburn came back as Mason's 26-yard run to the Ole Miss 15 to set up Parkey's second field goal of the day, a 31-yarder that closed Auburn to within 24-20 with 4:38 to go in the third. Ole Miss answered with a 39-yard field goal by Rose to give the Rebels a 27-20 lead with 13:28 left in the game.

Ole Miss sealed the game with five minutes left on a 55-yard touchdown pass from Wallace to Jeff Scott to give the Rebels a 34-20 lead. On the play, Auburn's Ashton Richardson tackled Jeff Scott at the Auburn 42 but Scott rolled off and ran it in for the touchdown.

The Rebels intercepted a Moseley pass and took a 41-20 lead on 2-yard Wallace run, his second of the day, to cap the scoring.

Senior Zac Stacy became Vanderbilt's all-time leading rusher as he gained 169 yards and a touchdown on 27 carries to lead Vanderbilt to a 17-13 victory over Auburn in Vanderbilt Stadium.

Vanderbilt (3-4, 2-3) took the opening kickoff and drove 75 yards in 16 plays to take a 7-0 lead on a 7-yard Wesley Tate touchdown run with 6:35 left. On the drive, the Commodores had two successful fourth down conversions.

Auburn (1-6, 0-5) recovered its second of three fumbles as Vanderbilt failed on a fake punt that was recovered by Ashton Richardson at the Commodore 36 yard line. On 3rd and goal from the 10, Clint Moseley threw behind a wide open Emory Blake in the end zone. Cody Parkey brought Auburn to within 7-3 on a 27-yard field goal with 8:10 left in the half.

The Tigers stopped the Commodores again on fourth down, this time with an inch to go from the Auburn 48 as McKinzy made a huge hit and tackle with just under four minutes to go in the half. The key play of Auburn's scoring drive came as Moseley threw a 24-yard strike to Blake on play action to the Vandy 6. Onterio McCalebb rushed it to the 1, and Tre Mason punched it in despite a shaky handoff to give Auburn its first lead of the game at 10-7 with 1:21 before halftime.

Vanderbilt quickly drove 65 yards in 11 plays as Carey Spear kicked a 30-yard field goal to tie the game 10-10 on the last play of the half.

The Commodores stopped the Tigers on the opening possession of the third quarter and scored on its second consecutive drive to take a 17-10 lead on Stacy's 2-yard run with 7:34 on the clock. Vanderbilt drove 85 yards in 7 plays in only 2:56.

Auburn had the beginnings of another good drive as Mason had a career-long 34-yard rush on a nice block by Patrick Miller to the Vanderbilt 40, but a pair of false start penalties and a 10-yard third down sack pushed Auburn back to its own 40. The Tigers punted the ball to the Commodores with less than a minute to go in the third.

Auburn took over on its own 49 with 14:01 left in the game. Parkey nailed his second field goal of the day, a 39-yarder, to make it a 17-13 Vanderbilt lead with 9:55 remaining.

Vanderbilt responded as Jordan Rodgers completed a 37-yard pass to a wide open Chris Boyd to the Auburn 38. The Commodores went for it on fourth down for the fifth time, needing three yards this time from the Auburn 31, and Gabe Wright tackled Stacy for a 7-yard loss. The Tigers took over on their own 38 with seven minutes left as they stopped Vanderbilt for the third time on fourth down.

Auburn had it 2nd and 2 from its own 45, but Mason had a rush for no gain and McCalebb lost two yards.

The Commodores took over on their own 19 with 4:41 remaining. On the first play, Stacy, a native of Centreville, Ala., and Bibb County High School alum, rushed it for 27 yards from the wildcat position to the Vanderbilt 41 to become Vanderbilt's all-time leading rusher with 2,647 yards.

Stacy fumbled at the Auburn 32 with 2:24 remaining. On 3rd and 2, Moseley completed an 18-yard pass to tight end C.J. Uzomah to the Vanderbilt 41 with 1:44 to go. Moseley was sacked on second down and Auburn's comeback threat was ended.

True freshman quarterback Jonathan Wallace connected on touchdown passes to C.J. Uzomah and Emory Blake and threw for 122 yards but it wasn't enough to overcome No. 21/22 Texas A&M's 672 yards of total offense as the Auburn football team fell to 1-7, 0-6 SEC with a 63-21 loss on Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium in Auburn.

Both of Wallace's touchdown tosses covered 27 yards and both came in the third quarter after Auburn went down 49-7 at the half. Auburn's lone score in the first half was a Tre Mason one-yard run on Auburn's first possession of the second quarter, Mason's fifth scoring run in the last four contests.

Wallace finished the night 6-for-9 from the pocket and also ran for 71 yards on 13 attempts while Mason rushed 12 times for 80 yards and his fifth touchdown of the season.

Tre Mason and Onterio McCalebb combined for 265 rushing yards and three touchdowns, and Auburn snapped a five-game losing skid with a 42-7 Homecoming victory over New Mexico State at Jordan-Hare Stadium Saturday afternoon.

Mason carried 22 times for a career-high 152 yards and a touchdown, averaging 6.9 yards per carry. Meanwhile, McCalebb made the most of his eight touches, picking up 113 yards (14.1/carry) while scoring two touchdowns.

Freshman Jonathan Wallace made his first start at quarterback, completing 9-of-16 attempts for 164 yards and a touchdown along with one interception.

Auburn outgained New Mexico State 475-305, including a 311-83 advantage on the ground. The Tigers also converted on 5-of-12 third-down opportunities and held NMSU to a 2-for-13 conversion rate. Auburn turned the ball over just once while the Aggies had two giveaways.

McCalebb got his first score when he broke loose on a 38-yard run around the right end for Auburn's fourth score of the day, its third via rushing touchdown, to make it 28-0 Tigers at the 2:58 mark of the third quarter. His run finished off a 96-yard scoring drive - Auburn's longest of the season by yardage - that lasted just seven plays and 3:26.

The Auburn senior would add his second touchdown of the day on a 7-yard run with 11:20 to play in the game, giving the Tigers a 35-7 lead. McCalebb's scoring run was set up by his own 45-yard kickoff return to near midfield, and a 40-yard run by Mason got Auburn in the red zone two plays later.

Trovon Reed capped off the scoring for Auburn with a 40-yard reception from Wallace for his first career touchdown, giving the Tigers a 42-7 lead with 7:19 to play.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Tigers struck first with a five-yard touchdown run from Mason that capped a 13-play, 89-yard drive to give Auburn a 7-0 lead with 4:56 to play in the half. It marked the longest scoring drive of the season for the Tigers. That would be the halftime score as NMSU would be unable to cross midfield.

The Tigers went to the ground game to open the third quarter, putting together a seven-play,

80-yard drive that ended with a Jay Prosch 1-yard dive for his first collegiate touchdown, giving the Tigers a 14-0 lead. Mason had runs of nine and 37 yards on the drive, and the Tigers gained 66 of 80 yards on the drive via the run game.

Midway through the third quarter, Auburn's first defensive score of the season gave the Tigers a 21-0 lead. Daren Bates recovered a fumble by NMSU quarterback Andrew Manley and went 62 yards, stiff-arming an Aggie defender at the 10-yard-line before diving into the end zone for the score. It was the longest fumble return for a touchdown in Auburn history and the first since Kenneth Carter recovered a fumble in the end zone for a score against Alabama last season.

New Mexico State found its way onto the scoreboard early in the fourth quarter as Tiger Powell dove in from two yards out to make it a 28-7 game with 12:36 to play. The scoring play was set up by a 51-yard completion from Manley to Franklin down to the Auburn 6-yard-line.

In Homecoming activities at halftime, Auburn women's basketball player Blanche Alverson was named 2012 Miss Homecoming.

Emory Blake had his eighth career 100-yard receiving game, but Georgia earned a 38-0 win over Auburn on Saturday night before 86,146 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The Tigers fell to 2-8 overall, 0-7 in SEC play. With the win, Georgia (9-1, 7-1 SEC) clinched the SEC Eastern Division title and a spot in next month's SEC Championship Game.

Blake had a team-best 108 receiving yards on six catches, his fourth time over 100 yards this season. Auburn quarterback Jonathan Wallace, making his second career start, finished with 15 completions on 22 attempts for 181 yards and an interception. His 15 completions were the most by an Auburn quarterback in a game this season.

The Tigers struggled in the rushing game, gaining just 57 yards on 27 attempts. Tre Mason led the way with 33 yards, and Onterio McCalebb had 16 on the ground to go along with 43 receiving yards on three catches.

Georgia's Aaron Murray completed 18-of-24 pass attempts on the night for 208 yards and three touchdowns, connecting with six different receivers as the Bulldogs employed a balanced attack throughout the game. Running backs Todd Gurley and Keith Marshall each topped the 100-yard mark with Gurley getting 11 carries for 116 yards and Marshall rushing eight times for 105. Malcolm Mitchell was Georgia's leading receiver with 47 yards on five catches.

Georgia outgained the Tigers 497-238 with 24 first downs to Auburn's 11. The Bulldogs also converted 8-of-14 third downs.

The Bulldogs marched straight down the field on their first possession, taking a 7-0 lead on a six-yard completion from Murray to Chris Conley with 10:51 to play in the first quarter. The scoring opportunity was set up by a 49-yard rush down the left sideline by Gurley on his first carry of the game.

Georgia doubled its lead to 14-0 late in the opening quarter, driving 80 yards in nine plays and scoring on Murray's second touchdown pass of the night, this time to Mitchell for five yards. It was 21-0 after the Bulldogs' first drive of the second quarter that spanned 64 yards in nine plays, capped by another Murray TD pass to Marlon Brown.

Auburn's offense exploded out of the gate, scoring 21 first-quarter points on 237 total yards of offense as it cruised to a 51-7 win over Alabama A&M in the final regular season home game of the 2012 season. Running backs Tre Mason (181) and Oterio McCalebb (104) each rushed for over 100 yards, the second time in the last three games the duo has both topped the century mark.

Auburn's rushing attack gained a season-high 341 yards, marking the second time this season Auburn (3-8) has rushed for over 300 yards in a game, the other coming against New Mexico State in a 42-7 Auburn win two weeks ago. The team also finished with 512 total yards of offense, which was the most since the National Championship Game victory over Oregon (519).

Alabama A&M (7-4) was held to just 208 total yards.

Freshman quarterback Jonathan Wallace was 10-of-18 on the afternoon for 171 yards with a touchdown for Auburn. His touchdown toss was a nine-yarder to Sammie Coates with 23 seconds left in the first half that put Auburn up 35-0.

After back-to-back 19-yard touchdown runs by Mason and McCalebb put Auburn up 14-0 with 4:31 left in the first quarter, Mason went 86 yards over right guard for Auburn's longest run since Brent Fullwood rumbled 88 yards against Mississippi State back in 1986 to put Auburn up 21-0.

A Jay Prosch three-yard touchdown run made it 28-0 on Auburn's first possession of the second quarter as Auburn scored on each of its first four possessions en route to its largest margin of victory of the season. The score, his second of the season, capped a 91-yard drive, which was Auburn's second longest of the season.

After Coates' touchdown catch made it 35-0 at the half, Alabama A&M scored on its first possession of the second half to avoid the shutout as Deaunte Mason scored from a yard out to finish a 10-play, 88-yard drive.

McCalebb's second score of the day came just 50 seconds into the fourth quarter when he ran it in from 14 yards out for a 42-7 lead.

Jordan-Hare Stadium is Auburn's showcase football stadium, which seats 87,451 with 70 luxury suites located between the lower level and upper deck on the East side.

The stadium was dedicated Nov. 30, 1939, with 7,500 seats. Ten years later, 14,000 more seats were added, and the stadium was named Cliff Hare Stadium (after a member of Auburn's first football team and eventual professor and dean of the School of Chemistry), although only 12 home games were played there over that 10-year span. Additional seats were added in 1955, 1960 and 1970. The West upper deck was completed in 1980; the East upper deck and suites were finished for the 1987 season. The most recent addition to the stadium was the construction of a 30-foot by 74-foot Daktronics LED board in 2007, coming at a cost of \$2.9 million. Auburn was the first school in the SEC to install a high-definition video board display.

The facility was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, recognizing Hall of Fame coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan. The turf at Jordan-Hare Stadium was officially named after Pat Dye, Auburn's Hall of Fame

coach and athletics director, prior to the 2005 Iron Bowl. The Tigers posted a 99-39-4 record in 12 seasons under Dye from 1981-92, and won four SEC championships. Auburn's home games are now played at Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On game days, Auburn's Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium becomes the sixth-largest city in the state of Alabama as Auburn has averaged at least 80,000 fans per game for the last 19 seasons. Since Jordan-Hare Stadium expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2004 season, the Tigers have tallied 28 sell-out games.

Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's 10th-largest on-campus stadium with a capacity of 87,451. It is the sixth-largest in the SEC.

The Tigers have won 77.9 percent of their games in Jordan-Hare Stadium since its inception in 1939 and hold an overall record of 288-74-7 there.

COACHING LEDGER

The 2012 season is Gene Chizik's 25th season as a coach in the collegiate ranks. Chizik began his career as a graduate assistant at both Middle Tennessee (1990-91) and Clemson (1988-89) before heading to Stephen F. Austin (1992-97). He then moved to Central Florida from 1998-2001 before making his first stop on The Plains (2002-04). Texas was his final post as an assistant coach. Chizik served as defensive coordinator with the Longhorns from 2005-06. Two seasons as the head coach at Iowa State (2007-08) preceded Chizik's tenure as head coach at Auburn (2009-current). He also spent two seasons coaching at the high school level in Florida.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

In 2010, in just his second season as head coach at Auburn, Gene Chizik led the Tigers to their first national championship in more than 50 years, defeating Oregon, 22-19, in the BCS Championship Game on Jan. 10, 2011, in Glendale, Ariz.

SEC CHAMPS

Chizik led Auburn to the Southeastern Conference Championship in 2010, the seventh in program history. The Tigers routed South Carolina, 56-17, at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta on Dec. 4, en route to the national title. It was also Auburn's seventh SEC West Title.

.647 WINNING PERCENTAGE

Auburn has a 33-18 record the last three-plus seasons under Gene Chizik for a .647 winning percentage. The Tigers have posted no fewer than eight wins in each of his seasons as head coach. When playing at home, Auburn is 23-7 under Chizik.

ALL-SEC

Under Coach Chizik, eight Auburn players have been named All-SEC First Team, including current Tigers Steven Clark and Corey Lemonier.

GOING BOWLING

Auburn has been to three straight bowl games under Chizik, including the 2010 BCS Championship Game. In his first season as

head coach, the Tigers brought home a 38-35 overtime win over Northwestern at the Outback Bowl on Jan. 1, in Tampa, Fla. The following season, Auburn defeated Oregon, 22-19, for the national title, and in 2011, the Tigers earned a decisive, 43-24, victory against Virginia in the Chick-fil-A Bowl in Atlanta on Dec. 31.

RECRUITING

Auburn has signed three straight Top 10 national recruiting classes under Chizik.

TROPHIES

Since Chizik arrived on the Plains, four different Auburn players have been first-team All-America while also winning the Heisman Trophy, Lombardi Award, Davey O'Brien Award, Walter Camp Award and Maxwell Award. Chizik himself was named National Coach of the Year for 2010.

GRADUATION

Since Chizik was hired, 63 Tiger football players have earned their academic degrees from Auburn.

NFL DRAFT

Chizik has coached seven former Tigers who went on to become NFL draft picks, including Cam Newton, the No. 1 overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft by the Carolina Panthers.

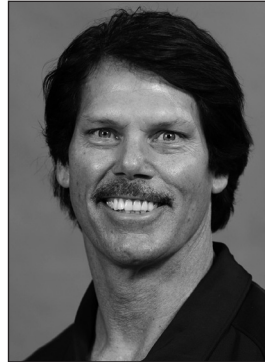

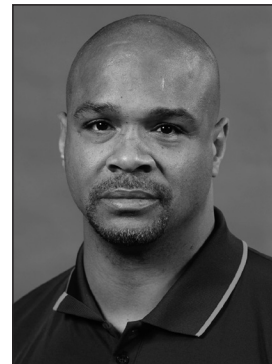
