No. 16 Gamecocks Seek First SEC Title in Rematch with No. 1 Auburn

SETTING THE STAGE

- No. 18/16 South Carolina, in its 19th season of Southeastern Conference football, will play for its first SEC Championship on Saturday as the Gamecocks face the No. 2-ranked (No. 1 BCS) Auburn Tigers in the 2010 SEC Championship Game. Kickoff is set for 4 p.m. at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, Ga., with CBS providing a national telecast. South Carolina is the designated "home" team for this game.
- The Gamecocks (9-3, 5-3 SEC) are the SEC Eastern Division Champions for the first time in school history, and are coming off a 29-7 victory over archrival Clemson last Saturday. Auburn (12-0, 8-0) is the SEC Western Division Champion for the fourth time, and overcame a 24-point deficit to win the "Iron Bowl" over Alabama last Friday, 28-27.
- South Carolina has won one conference football title in 117 seasons of intercollegiate football. The Gamecocks captured the 1969 Atlantic Coast Conference championship with a perfect 6-0 record in ACC play and advanced to that year's Peach Bowl. Auburn will be seeking its seventh SEC title.

THE SERIES

- This marks the 10th game in the series with Auburn, which dates back to 1930. The Gamecocks are 1-7-1 all-time against the Tigers, and have lost five straight in the series. The two teams met earlier this season, with Auburn claiming a 35-27 victory at Jordan-Hare Stadium. (More series info on page 3.)

QUICK HITS

- Sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery** was named a **First-Team All-American** by the American Football Coaches Association, and is one of three finalists nationwide for the **Biletnikoff Award**, presented to the nation's top wide receiver. Jeffery leads the SEC and is fifth in the nation in receiving yards per game with 112.6 yards per contest.
- Head Coach **Steve Spurrier** will be looking for his seventh SEC Championship and eighth conference title overall. He won SEC titles at Florida in 1991, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996 and 2000, and won an ACC title at Duke in 1989.
- South Carolina will be playing indoors for just the second time in school history. The only other indoor game took place Sept. 21, 1973, as Carolina played Houston at the Astrodome. The Gamecocks fell to the Cougars 27-19.
- Freshman **RB Marcus Lattimore** is South Carolina's all-time leader in single-season touchdowns with 19. He needs just one more score to tie Tennessee's Reggie Cobb (1987) for the SEC freshman scoring record, and six more scores would break Shaun Alexander's all-time SEC record of 24 touchdowns for Alabama in 1999. Lattimore is tied with Auburn's Cam Newton for the SEC lead in touchdowns scored with 19 apiece.
- Sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery** broke the school record for single-season receiving yards in the win over Troy, surpassing a 1,143-yard season by **Sidney Rice** in 2005. Jeffery passed Phillip Logan (2,063 yards) for 7th in the Clemson game.
- Junior **QB Stephen Garcia** is the third quarterback in school history to top 6,000 career passing yards, joining **Todd Ellis** (9,953) and **Steve Taneyhill** (8,782) in that exclusive club with 6,340 yards. He passed **Blake Mitchell** (5,992) for third all-time at Carolina with a 198-yard effort vs. Troy. Garcia is also third all-time with 41 career touchdown passes.
- Lattimore topped the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the season against Troy, giving the Gamecocks a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same season for the first time in school history. Lattimore now has 1,114 rushing yards on 232 carries, and Jeffery has amassed 1,351 yards on 75 receptions.
- The Gamecocks lead the Southeastern Conference and are ranked No. 3 in the nation with a school-record 39 sacks (3.25 per game). **DE Melvin Ingram** leads the way with 8.0 sacks on the season, ranking him third in the SEC; **DE Devin Taylor** has 7.5 sacks to rank fourth in the league.
- Carolina has scored six defensive touchdowns this season (five interceptions, one fumble), believed to be the most in school history. Six different players have scored defensively for Carolina: **D.J. Swearingen**, **Chaz Sutton**, **Antonio Allen**, **Byron McKnight**, **Devin Taylor** and **Stephon Gilmore**.

South Carolina head coach Steve Spurrier and Auburn head coach Gene Chizik will meet with media members at the Georgia Dome Gate E Media Center at approximately 1:30 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 3.

Post-Game

Following a 10-minute cooling-off period, Coach Spurrier will address the media following Saturday's SEC Championship Game.

Pre-Practice

South Carolina practices on Monday through Thursday are open to the media and photographers for the first 15 minutes. Media will be escorted from the "Proving Grounds" following the team's flex period.

SEC Championship Pre-Practice

South Carolina will practice at the Georgia Dome on Friday, Dec. 3, from 4:30-6 p.m. The first 15 minutes of the workout will be open to the media, and no players or coaches will be available for interviews following the practice. (Auburn will practice from 3-4:30 p.m. with the same guidelines.)

A South Carolina win over Auburn would...

- * Give South Carolina its first Southeastern Conference championship and the second conference football title in school history (1969 ACC Champions).
- * Earn South Carolina's first bid to the Bowl Championship Series.
- * Give South Carolina 10 wins in a season for just the second time in school history (1984).
- * Be the Gamecocks' second win of the season over a No. 1-ranked team (Alabama).
- * Be South Carolina's first win over Auburn since joining the Southeastern Conference; Auburn is the only SEC team South Carolina has not beaten since joining the league in 1992.
- * Be South Carolina's fourth straight victory away from Williams-Brice Stadium; the last time Carolina won four straight at road/neutral sites was 2000-2001 (2001 Outback Bowl vs. Ohio State; 2001 regular season at Georgia, Mississippi State, Kentucky)
- * Give Steve Spurrier his 45th win at South Carolina, tying him with Jim Carlen for second all-time.

THIS WEEK'S OPPONENT: AUBURN

The Auburn Tigers, at 12-0 overall and 8-0 in the Southeastern Conference, are ranked No. 1 in the latest BCS rankings and are No. 2 in both major national polls. Auburn is in its second season under head coach Gene Chizik, who enters this game with a 25-24 career record and a 19-5 mark at Auburn. This will be the fourth appearance for Auburn in the SEC Championship game; the Tigers fell to Tennessee in 1997 and to Florida in 2000, then defeated the Volunteers in 2004.

GAMECOCKS AND TIGERS

- This is the 10th all-time meeting between Auburn and South Carolina, with the Tigers holding a 7-1-1 edge, including a 2-1-1 mark in games played at neutral sites. The Tigers are also 2-0 in Columbia, and 3-0 in Auburn.
- The two teams met already this season, with Auburn claiming a 35-27 victory on Sept. 25 at Auburn's Jordan-Hare Stadium (full recap and stats on page 43).
- South Carolina's lone win in the series came on Dec. 2, 1933, a 16-14 win in Birmingham, Ala. The teams did not meet again for 63 years.
- The teams met each year from 1930 to 1933, with the four games played at three different neutral sites. The 1930 game was played in Columbus, Ga.; the 1931 contest took place in Montgomery, and the games in 1932 and 1933 were played in Birmingham.
- The teams have only met five times since South Carolina joined the SEC prior to the 1992 season, with Auburn winning all five contests.
- This will be the second meeting between the Gamecocks and Tigers when both teams have been ranked in the national polls; the other came in the earlier meeting this season.

TIES WITH AUBURN

• South Carolina has no players from the state of Alabama, but Auburn has one from South Carolina - OL Eric Mack from St. Matthews.

SPURRIER VS. AUBURN

South Carolina head coach **Steve Spurrier** is 10-6 all-time against Auburn, including a 10-3 mark while head coach at Florida and an 0-3 record while head coach at South Carolina. His Florida Gators defeated the Tigers for the 2000 SEC Championship.

SPURRIER VS. CHIZIK

This will be the second meeting between Carolina's **Steve Spurrier** and Auburn's Gene Chizik as head coaches; Chizik won the first meeting as Auburn defeated South Carolina 35-27 earlier this season. The coaches have, however, been on opposite sidelines before. Chizik was a graduate assistant at Clemson while Spurrier was head coach at Duke in 1988 and 1989; Spurrier's Blue Devils were 1-1 in two meetings with the Tigers. The Head Ball Coach defeated Chizik's team one other time: in 1999, Spurrier's Florida Gators defeated Central Florida 58-27 while Chizik was the Knights' defensive coordinator.

AIN'T GONNA BE NO REMATCH

Don't want one. This will be the fifth time in school history that South Carolina will have faced the same team twice in once season. The first three occurrences happened in the formative years of the game of football; the other happened during World War II. Carolina is 1-3 when meeting an opponent for the second time in one season.

ORANGE CRUSHED

South Carolina swept through the "Orange Crush" portion of its schedule with a perfect 3-0 record against Tennessee, Florida and Clemson, beating all three teams in the same season for the first time in school history. Only twice before had the Gamecocks managed a 2-1 mark in the season-ending stretch: the Gamecocks beat Tennessee and Clemson but lost to Florida in 1992, and Carolina earned victories over the Vols and Gators in 2005 before falling in the season finale to the Tigers.

In Memory of Kenny McKinley • 1987-2010

South Carolina's football family was stunned and saddened upon learning of the passing of former Gamecock standout wide receiver Kenny McKinley.

McKinley, 23, died Sept. 20 in Denver, Colo. He was drafted by the Denver Broncos in the fifth round of the 2009 NFL Draft and appeared in eight games for the Broncos in 2009 before being placed on injured reserve with a knee injury. He was back on IR in 2010 after another preseason knee injury.

McKinley finished his South Carolina career as the school's all-time leader in both career receptions (207) and career receiving yards (2,781). He also set a school record by catching a pass in 43 straight games from 2005-08. He scored 19 touchdowns during his Gamecock career.

South Carolina has worn a black decal with McKinley's #11 on its helmets in each game since McKinley's death.

GAMECOCKS VS. NUMBER 1

With the Oct. 9 win over No. 1 Alabama, the Gamecocks are now 1-4 all-time against the nation's No. 1 team. Alabama was only the second No. 1-ranked team to visit Williams-Brice Stadium, joining 2009's top-ranked Florida Gators. Carolina's three prior meetings with the nation's top-ranked squad were on the road. This week's game with Auburn will be Carolina's first meeting with a No. 1 team at a neutral site.

WE TYPICALLY PLAY OUTDOORS

• And by "typically," we mean 1,125 out of 1,126 games in the 117-year history of South Carolina football. Saturday's SEC Championship Game at the Georgia Dome will be just the second football game played indoors by a South Carolina team. The only other indoor game in school history came on Sept. 21, 1973, as the Gamecocks traveled to the "Eighth Wonder of the World" to face Houston in the Astrodome. The Cougars took a 27-19 victory that day, and the Gamecocks have played in the great outdoors all 438 games since.

• That 1973 game against Houston served as a footnote to another historic sporting event. The night before, in the same venue, Billie Jean King and Bobby Riggs squared off in the famed "Battle of the Sexes" tennis match. The Gamecock players and coaches skipped their customary pre-game movie to attend the match, and they watched along with 30,472 at the Astrodome and an estimated 50 million others on an ABC worldwide broadcast as King defeated Riggs 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, in the most-watched tennis match of all-time.

NINE WAS FINE, BUT TEN? EPIC WIN

Prior to this season, South Carolina had reached the eight-win mark just nine previous times in school history. With wins over Troy and Clemson, the Gamecocks hit the 8-win mark for the 10th time ever and crossed the 9-win plateau for just the third time in Gamecock annals. Only once has Carolina logged a 10-win season: the 1984 "Black Magic" team posted a 10-1 regular-season record and earned a berth in the Gator Bowl. THE BEASTS OF THE EAST

Prior to South Carolina's victory over Florida, only the Gators, Georgia and Tennessee had ever won the SEC Eastern Division. In addition to becoming the fourth different SEC East

SPURRIER IN ELITE COMPANY

Head coach Steve Spurrier is one of just four coaches to record 100 or more wins as an SEC coach against SEC competition (he also has three wins against SEC teams while coaching at Duke). With the win over Alabama, he now ranks second all-time among SEC coaches in conference victories.

team to head to Atlanta, the Gamecocks defeated the Gators, Vols and Bulldogs in the same season for the first time in history.

WINNING MORE OFTEN

• South Carolina has now won nine games for the third time in school history (and eight or more for just the 10th time). But more impressive is the fact that the win over Clemson was the 29th in the last four seasons, which sets a school record for the best four-year stretch in history. The Gamecocks had managed four-year stretches of 28 wins on three occasions - the 1990, 2008 and 2009 senior classes experienced a 28-win career.

• With the win over Florida to secure their seventh victory of the year, the Gamecocks assured themselves of posting three straight winning seasons and seven consecutive seasons of at least a .500 record. Previously, the Gamecocks went 6-5 in 2004, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 6-6 in 2007, and 7-6 in both 2008 and 2009. The team has now equaled a school-record stretch from 1928-34 in which the Gamecocks had seven straight seasons at .500 or better.

OUT OF THEIR LEAGUE

South Carolina finished the regular season 4-0 outside of SEC play after defeating Furman and Southern Miss in September and taking down Troy and Clemson to wrap up the season. They are 21-6 in non-conference games under **Steve Spurrier**, including wins in 19 of their last 23 non-league tilts. The year-by-year breakdown: 2005 (2-2); 2006 (5-0); 2007 (3-1); 2008 (3-2); 2009 (4-1); 2010 (4-0). Carolina will face one more non-conference foe this season in a bowl game yet to be determined.

GAMECOCKS IN THE POLLS

South Carolina is ranked in this week's Associated Press Poll and USA Today Coaches Poll for the 13th consecutive week. Only two other times in school history have the Gamecocks stayed in the polls for that many straight editions:

• The Gamecocks appeared at No. 19 in the AP poll the week of Oct. 31, 1987, then proceeded to defeat NC State 48-0. Carolina climbed as high as No. 8 before losing the regular-

season finale to No. 2 Miami, then dropping a 30-13 decision to No. 7 LSU in the Gator Bowl; Carolina finished 15th in the final poll. The Gamecocks were then ranked No. 19 in the 1988 preseason ranking and stayed in the poll nine straight weeks until a 59-0 loss at Florida State on Nov. 5, 1988. Total weeks in the rankings: 18.

• After defeating Ohio State in the 2001 Outback Bowl, Carolina finished at No. 19 in the final AP poll of 2000. The Gamecocks then stayed in the rankings every week of the 2001 season, climbing as high as No. 9 in the polls and finishing at No. 13 after another defeat of the Buckeyes in Tampa. Carolina was then ranked in the first two polls of the 2002 season before a 34-21 loss at Virginia dropped them from the rankings. Total weeks in the rankings: 18.

COMPARING THE FIRSTS

TAMING THE TIGERS

In the rivalry that often defines a South Carolina season, the Gamecocks have won two straight over the Clemson Tigers, earning a 29-7 win at "Death Valley" last week and taking a 34-17 win in the 2009 regular-season finale in Columbia. It had been 40 years since a Gamecock team defeated Clemson two straight seasons; Carolina's last winning streak over the Upstate rivals was three straight from 1968-70.

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION

With a 69-point outburst vs. Troy on Nov. 20, the Gamecocks set numerous records:

- The 69 points marked the fifth-most in school history, surpassing three 68-point games (1912 vs. Charleston, 1915 vs. Cumberland, 1995 vs. Louisiana Tech). It was the highest-scoring output for Carolina since posting 77 points vs. Kent State in 1995.
- It was South Carolina's highest-scoring game under Spurrier; in fact, the previous high-water mark of 52 points vs. Middle Tennessee State in 2006 was eclipsed by halftime; Carolina led 56-7 at the break.
- With 93 points between the teams, it was the third-highest combined total in a game involving South Carolina. The Gamecocks and Mississippi State combined for 104 points in

PLAYING AND BEATING THE BEST

South Carolina's best win over a ranked opponent came on Oct. 9, 2010, as the Gamecocks knocked off No. 1 Alabama, 35-21, at Williams-Brice Stadium. It surpassed a win in the 1981 season when it defeated No. 3 North Carolina by a 31-13 score. With a win this week, Carolina could beat the nation's No. 2 team for the first time.

1995 (W 65-39), and a game against East Carolina in 1994 produced 98 points (L 42-56).

• The Gamecocks' 56 first-half point total is believed to be the highest-scoring single half in school history. It was the most points scored in a half since posting 42 against Kent State on Oct. 7, 1995.

PERFECT AGAINST NON-AQ SCHOOLS

With the Gamecocks' 69-24 win over Troy, head coach **Steve Spurrier** is a perfect 41-0 all-time against schools outside of BCS automatic qualifier conferences, including a 54-0 mark since coming to South Carolina. He defeated Southern Miss and Troy this season to keep his mark perfect over his 21-year collegiate coaching career.

FIRST TIME FOR EVERYTHING

Leave it to a freshman and a sophomore to make Carolina history. For the first time in school history, South Carolina has a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same season. With 102 yards vs. Troy, **RB Marcus Lattimore** eclipsed the 1,000-yard barrier to mark the ninth 1,000-yard rushing season in school history. Sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery** had already topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark heading into the Troy game.

MARVELOUS MARCUS

So much for freshman jitters. In 11 games (did not play at Vanderbilt), freshman tailback **Marcus Lattimore** has rushed for 1,114 yards on 232 carries and caught 23 passes for 328 yards, scoring 19 of South Carolina's 45 offensive touchdowns on the season. For some perspective:

- Lattimore is South Carolina's all-time leader in single-season touchdowns with 19, breaking Harold Green's record of 16 set in 1987. He is one shy of the SEC freshman record of 20, set by Tennessee's Reggie Cobb in 1987.
- With six more touchdowns this season, Lattimore would break the SEC's all-time single-season record of 24 TDs, set by Alabama's Shaun Alexander in 1999.
- Lattimore's 40-carry, 212-yard performance in the SEC East-clinching win at Florida ranked as one of the top performances in school history. The 40 carries broke a 36-year-old school record (Ron Bass, 39 vs. North Carolina in 1974) and the 212 yards marked the 8th-best rushing total in school history and the best ever against an SEC opponent.
- In the victory over Florida, Lattimore surpassed **Thomas Dendy** for the South Carolina freshman rushing record. Dendy had held the record since 1982, when he amassed 848 yards.
- Lattimore was the only freshman in the country to score a touchdown in each of his first seven collegiate games.
- With 3 touchdowns against Florida, Lattimore broke the South Carolina freshman record for touchdowns (**Sidney Rice**, 13 in 2005) and tied the all-time single-season touchdown record (**Harold Green**, 16 in 1987).
- His 114 points this season breaks a 23-year-old school record, previously held by **PK Collin Mackie** (113 points in 1987). He will likely be the first non-placekicker to lead South Carolina in scoring since 2005 when **Sidney Rice** scored 78 points.
- Lattimore's 37 carries vs. Georgia were fourth-most in a single game in school history.
- His 184-yard effort against Tennessee ranked as the 16th-best game in school history, surpassing his own 182-yard effort against Georgia on Sept. 11. It also surpassed a 182-yard effort by **Steve Wadiak** against George Washington on Oct. 27, 1950.
- Only **Brandon Bennett**, with a 278-yard outburst against East Tennessee State on Oct. 5, 1991, has run for more yards in one game as a freshman. Bennett's mark also stands as the all-time school record.
- The names ahead of Lattimore in the all-time single-game rushing totals read like a who's who of backs at South Carolina - **Brandon Bennett**, **Jeff Grantz**, **Steve Wadiak**, **George Rogers**, **Derek Watson**.

THE 100 CLUB

• In its 21-7 victory at Vanderbilt, South Carolina had a player rush for 100 yards and two players receive for 100 yards in the same game for the first time in school history. **RB Brian Maddox** came off the bench to rack up 146 yards on 24 car-

ries with one touchdown, while **WR Alshon Jeffery** caught nine passes for 155 yards - including a show-stopping 72-yard touchdown - and **WR Tori Gurley** shattered his previous career highs with a school-record 14 catches for 112 yards and a score.

- Two other times this season, Carolina has had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game. Against Georgia, **RB Marcus Lattimore** carried 37 times for 182 yards while **WR Alshon Jeffery** caught seven passes for 103 yards. The same duo combined went 100/100 again vs. Troy as Lattimore gained 102 rushing yards on just 7 carries while Jeffery hauled in five passes for 123 yards.

- Jeffery has topped the 100-yard receiving mark seven times this year, with a career- and season-best coming with 192 yards at Auburn. Lattimore has four 100-yard games - 212 vs. Florida, 182 vs. Georgia, 184 vs. Tennessee and 102 vs. Troy - and Maddox and Gurley have one apiece.

OPENING STATEMENT

- South Carolina has been at its best in the first half, outscoring opponents 245-110 in the first two quarters, including an 123-40 edge in the opening stanza. The Arkansas game was the only time this season the Gamecocks have trailed at the half; two weeks later, the Gamecocks set a likely school record with 56 first-half points vs. Troy.

- This is a stark contrast from last season, when the Gamecocks were outscored 162-134 in the opening half, including an 81-65 deficit in the first quarter. In 2009, the Gamecocks' best quarter was the third as they held an 87-39 scoring advantage; this year, the Gamecocks have controlled the third quarter by a 75-56 count.

GAMECOCKS AS A RANKED TEAM

Under Steve Spurrier, the Gamecocks have been a ranked team heading into 27 contests. Carolina is 15-12 in those opportunities when appearing in the national rankings. In home games, Carolina is 10-4 when ranked under Spurrier, including a 7-1 mark at home over the last two seasons. Carolina is 5-8 in road contests as a ranked squad under Spurrier. This week will be Carolina's first neutral-site game as a ranked team since the 2002 Outback Bowl.

SIZE MATTERS

The tallest player on the Gamecock roster is defensive end **Devin Taylor**, who checks in at 6-7. The shortest player is tailback **Bryce Sherman**, listed at 5-4. The Gamecocks have 11 players who tip the scales at 300 pounds or better, including eight offensive linemen: **Rokevious Watkins** (325), **Corey Robinson** (317), **Jarriel King** (324), **T.J. Johnson** (302), **Terrence Campbell** (305), **Kyle Nunn** (304), **Steven Singleton** (303), **Garrett Chisolm** (303). Defensively, junior college transfer **Byron Jerideau** (339) leads the way, along with **Kenny Davis** (303) and **J.T. Surratt** (300). Former track sprinters **Bryce Sherman** (155) and **Marty Markett** (168), freshman receiver **Ace Sanders** (165) and freshman punter **Patrick Fish** (170) are the only players that check in at 170 pounds or less.

HOME FIELD ADVANTAGE

The Gamecocks have an all-time record of 252-178-14 (.583) at Williams-Brice Stadium since its original construction as Carolina Stadium in 1934. Under Steve Spurrier, the Gamecocks are 28-13 (.683) on their home field. South Carolina has won 14 of its last 16 at home, dating back to a victory over Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008. In that 16-game stretch, Carolina has outscored its opponents 499-292, with an average margin of victory of 12.9 points per game.

WORKING OVERTIME

The Gamecocks have played just two overtime games in their history, both at Tennessee. They dropped a 23-20 decision in Knoxville on Sept. 27, 2003, then fell by a 27-24 score on Oct. 27, 2007, also at Neyland Stadium. Every other SEC team has played at least three overtime games since the rule was established in 1996.

THEY PAY TO SEE THE GAMECOCKS PLAY

- South Carolina averaged 76,668 fans for its seven home games at Williams-Brice Stadium this season. The largest crowd came on Oct. 9 as 82,993 fans packed Williams-Brice Stadium to witness the historic Gamecock upset of No. 1 Alabama. That crowd was the 19th-biggest in Williams-Brice Stadium history and the largest since 83,704 were on hand for the Gamecocks' contest against then-No. 2 Georgia.
- Earlier in the year, Gamecock fans gave Williams-Brice Stadium its biggest crowd in nearly two years with 80,974 on hand for the game vs. Georgia. The last bigger crowd

was 81,731 vs. Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008. A total of 79,336 turned out for an early kickoff against Tennessee on Oct. 30.

- With more than 7,500 Gamecock fans in attendance, a total of 90,558 packed Ben Hill Griffin Stadium in Gainesville, Fla., as the Gamecocks clinched their first SEC Eastern Division title on Nov. 13 with a 36-14 win over Florida. It was the biggest crowd to watch South Carolina in 2010.
- During the 2009 season, Carolina averaged 75,369 fans at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia, ranking 17th in the nation in average attendance. Not surprisingly, the two sell-outs were in the season's final two games against top-ranked Florida (79,297) and versus Palmetto State rival Clemson (80,574).

SUCCESSFUL ERA

South Carolina is enjoying one of its most successful stretches in the history of the program. Since coach **Steve Spurrier's** arrival prior to the 2005 season, Carolina has:

- Won the school's first SEC Eastern Division title.
- Produced the winningest senior class in school history with 29 victories over the last four seasons.
- Had back-to-back senior classes leave with a school-record 28 victories in their four-year careers. Only once previously had 28 wins over four years happened (1987-90).
- Put together three straight seven-plus win seasons for the first time in school history.
- Posted seven straight non-losing seasons, the longest stretch since seven straight such years from 1928-34.
- Been bowl-eligible for seven consecutive years, the longest streak in the modern era.
- Won eight games in a season for the 10th time in 117 years of intercollegiate football.
- Won nine games in a season for the third time in school history.
- A head coach that has taken Carolina to four bowl games, the first coach in school history to do so, while needing just five years to accomplish the feat.
- Developed a distinct home-field advantage. The Gamecocks have gone 6-1 at home for two straight seasons and have won a total of 14 out of their last 16 home games, dating back to the penultimate home game of the 2008 season (a 27-6 win over Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008).

In Memory of Bob Fulton • 1920-2010

Bob Fulton, the legendary "Voice of the Gamecocks," died Wednesday, Nov. 3, at his home in Lexington, S.C. He was 89.

Fulton retired in 1995 after 43 years as the radio voice of the Gamecocks, announcing thousands of Carolina football, basketball and baseball games during that time. His tenure with the Gamecocks was the fourth-longest among NCAA Division I broadcasters with one school at the time of his retirement.

Fulton was an eight-time selection as the state of South Carolina's "Sportscaster of the Year." In 1990 he became the first non-coach or athlete to be inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame and in 1993 was inducted into the University of South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In 1994 he received the state's highest award, The Order of the Palmetto, from Governor Carroll Campbell.

GARCIA'S OUR GUY

- **QB Stephen Garcia** has completed 189-of-287 passes (65.9%) for 2,646 yards and 18 touchdowns through 12 games. He has a chance to have the top single-season completion percentage in SC history, topping **Steve Taneyhill's** 67.1% in 1995.
- With 198 yards in the win over Troy, Garcia passed **Blake Mitchell** (5,992 yards) for third all-time in career-passing yards at Carolina (see chart at left).
- He posted back-to-back 300-yard passing games with a career-high 382 at Kentucky and another 355 at Vanderbilt, where he tied a career-best with 31 completions on 39 attempts.
- He had what coach **Steve Spurrier** called "the best game of his career" against No. 1-ranked Alabama, completing 17-of-20 passes (85%) for 201 yards and three touchdowns. He started the day 9-for-9 for 94 yards in the first half.
- Garcia ran for a pair of touchdowns against USM, the first time in his career to amass multiple TD runs in one game; he also had two scoring runs vs. Tennessee and one each vs. Florida and Troy.
- He has played in 33 games for the Gamecocks, starting 28 over three seasons (17-11 as a starter). He is 13-3 when starting at home, 4-6 on the road and 0-2 at neutral sites.
- Garcia currently ranks in the all-time top 10 in the following:
 - Career Passing Yards: 3rd (6,340)
 - Career Completions: 3rd (493)
 - Career Pass Attempts: 4th (841)
 - Career Passing TDs: 3rd (41)
 - Career Completion Pct.: 4th (58.6% - 493 of 841)

BUT SHAW HAS PLAYED

True freshman **Connor Shaw** has played extensively in five games, setting a career-high with 5 completions on 8 attempts vs. Troy. He was 4-of-5 appearances vs. Southern Miss (where he threw his first career TD pass to D.L. Moore) and Furman, and he was 4-of-8 with two interceptions at Auburn. He completed 2-of-2 passes for 20 yards and rushed four times for 23 yards vs. Arkansas before leaving the game after a late hit out of bounds. Shaw also played sparingly vs. Kentucky and Tennessee.

WHAT A RUSH

- South Carolina has a strong running game, as evidenced by 54 carries vs. Florida, 52 carries against Georgia and more rushing yards than passing yards in four games this year. Freshman **Marcus Lattimore** is a big reason for that, gaining 1,114 yards on 232 carries and scoring 19 touchdowns (17 rush, 2 rec) in his first 11 games. His 40-carry, 212-yard, 3-TD performance against Florida was a game for the Carolina record books, as were his performances against Georgia and Tennessee (see page 9 for more info).
- Senior **Brian Maddox** came off the bench to give an inspired performance at Vanderbilt, rushing for a career-high 146 yards on 24 carries. Of those 146 yards, 123 came in the second half.

REVERSAL OF FORTUNE

Coming into this season, South Carolina had finished last in the SEC in rushing yards each of the last two years. Carolina ran for 121.23 yards per game in 2009 and just 94.08 yards per game in 2008. But this season, the Gamecocks' rushing attack has been one of their strengths as they now rank eighth in the league and 58th nationally with 155.5 yards per game.

SOME GLORY FOR TORI

Sophomore **WR Tori Gurlley** had a breakout game against Vanderbilt, hauling in 14 passes for 112 yards, setting career-highs in both categories. His 14 receptions also tied the school record for catches in a single game, matching **Zola Davis'** 14 catches vs. Vanderbilt in 1998 and **Kenny McKinley's** 14 receptions at Tennessee in 2007. Gurlley has caught touchdown passes this year vs. Furman, Auburn, Vanderbilt and Arkansas.

FAST LEARNER

Sophomore **T.J. Johnson** moved to center for the first time against Southern Miss after starting every game at right guard during the 2009 season. He obviously picked up some things quickly as he was named the **SEC's Offensive Lineman of the Week** after helping pave the way for 449 yards of total offense in the opener against Southern Miss. Johnson has started every game of his college career.

NOT AS MUCH SHUFFLE THIS YEAR

South Carolina has settled into a groove with its starting offensive line, making few changes during the course of the season. This year, seven different Gamecocks have started on the offensive line as opposed to 10 different starters during the 2009 season. Through 12 games, Carolina has started four different offensive fronts; in 13 games last year, the Gamecocks started the game with 10 different combinations on the front line. Listed below are active Gamecock offensive linemen and their starts at each position (Game 12 starters in bold):

IN THE CLUTCH, FIND THE BIG GUY

South Carolina is 12th in the nation in converting third downs as the Gamecocks have kept the chains moving 49.7% of the time (77-of-155). A big reason for that is the clutch performances of sophomore **WR Alshon Jeffery**. Of those 77 third-down conversions, 17 of those have been successful because of passes to Jeffery. On average, Carolina needed 6.1 yards on those third-down passes, and Jeffery's catches on those plays averaged 15.0 yards apiece. And keeping those drives alive has paid off tremendously: Carolina has scored on 14 of the 16 drives in which Jeffery made a third-down catch (10 TDs, 4 FGs).

Notes on the Carolina Defense

THE GAMECOCK DEFENSE

• So far in 2010, the Gamecocks have allowed 242 points through 12 games (20.2 avg.). The Gamecocks rank third in the SEC and 25th in the nation in scoring defense.

• Since **Ellis Johnson** took over the South Carolina defense prior to the 2008 season, success has come quickly. The Gamecocks have finished in the nation's top 15 in total defense in each of the last two seasons, posting a 15th-place showing last season and a 13th place mark in 2008. Seven of 11 starters return from a defense that gave up 300.69 yards per game in 2009.

THOSE RESPONSIBLE HAVE BEEN SACKED

• As a team, South Carolina has set a school record with 39 sacks through 12 games, an average of 3.25 per game, which leads the SEC in both average and overall total. That number also rates the Gamecocks No. 3 in the nation in sacks per game. A total of 12 different players have recorded at least one sack this year, and nine of those have dropped the quarterback multiple times.

• Junior **DE Melvin Ingram** had his best game as a Gamecock with 2.0 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss in the victory over Alabama. He is having the best season of his career with 8.0 sacks among 23 total tackles this year, giving him the team lead and ranking him third in the SEC in sacks. He needs 2.0 more sacks this year to tie for South Carolina's single-season record.

• Sophomore **DE Devin Taylor** had a huge game against Georgia, picking up a career-high two sacks and equaling his high-water mark with 3.0 tackles for loss, including a sack of Bulldog quarterback Aaron Murray on the game's final play. Taylor also tallied 2.0 sacks in the win over Vanderbilt. Taylor now has 7.5 sacks on the year to rank fourth in the SEC.

• With seven sacks against Alabama and Furman, the Gamecocks had their best outings since recording eight sacks against Central Florida on Sept. 6, 1997.

• **CB Stephon Gilmore** had two sacks against Alabama and one against Arkansas, and he now has 6.0 for his career. He has done even more against the pass - he picked off a Furman pass and returned it 80 yards for a touchdown to seal the victory over the Paladins on Sept. 18. It was the second interception of Gilmore's career, and the first returned for a touchdown since Eric Norwood had a 35-yard runback against Georgia last season.

CLIFF NOTES

DE Cliff Matthews moved into eighth place all-time at South Carolina with 14.5 career sacks, passing Phil Ellis (14.0) with 1.0 sacks against Clemson. He passed Eric Sullivan, Fitzgerald Davis and Troy Duke for ninth all-time as he had 2.0 sacks in the Tennessee game. Matthews needs 0.5 sacks to tie three Gamecocks for fifth in school history.

WHAT A RUSH - OR NOT

• South Carolina has the SEC's No. 1 rushing defense and the fifth-best in the nation, holding opposing offenses to 93.2 yards per game on the ground. Opponents have been held under 100 rushing yards in nine of 12 games, including defending national champion Alabama, which rushed for 264 yards in last season's meeting, and two-time defending SEC East Champion Florida. Under **Steve Spurrier**, the Gamecocks are 21-3 when holding opposing offenses under 100 rushing yards.

• Florida rushed for just 35 yards in the Gamecocks' SEC East Division-clinching victory, marking the second-lowest rushing total allowed by a Spurrier-coach Gamecock squad. Only a 34-yard effort by Tennessee on Nov. 1, 2008, was lower than Alabama's output that day.

• Alabama's potent rushing offense was held to just 36 yards by the Gamecocks on Oct. 9, the third-fewest rushing yards allowed by a Steve Spurrier-coached Carolina team.

• Furman managed just 51 yards on 27 carries (1.9 avg.), ranking as the fifth-fewest rushing yards by an opponent under Spurrier.

• Georgia and Clemson each managed just 61 yards on the ground.

MOMENTUM CHANGERS

• South Carolina has scored six defensive touchdowns this season, including at least one defensive score in four of the last five games. It marks the most defensive scores by a Gamecock squad since joining the SEC in 1992; accurate records are spotty prior to that.

• Carolina had two defensive touchdowns in the 69-24 win over Troy. **SS D.J. Swearingner** picked off a pass and returned it 22 yards for a score late in the second quarter, and then **DE Chaz Sutton** gained control of a batted ball on the final play of the half and raced 56 yards to give Carolina a 56-7 halftime lead. It was the first time for the Gamecocks to score two defensive TDs in a game since **Eric Norwood** returned a pair of fumbles for scores against Kentucky in 2007.

• **CB Stephon Gilmore** had the first defensive score with an 80-yard interception return vs. Furman. **DE Devin Taylor** picked off a Tennessee pass and raced 24 yards for a score in the third quarter of that game, and **DE Byron McKnight** scooped up an Arkansas fumble (caused by a Gilmore sack) at the 1-yard line and stepped into the end zone for another score. **SPUR Antonio Allen** was the latest Gamecock defender to put six on the board as he picked off a Kyle Parker pass and returned it 37 yards to give Carolina a 29-7 lead over Clemson.

OPENING DEFENSE

The Carolina defense has been at its stingiest in the early part of games so far this season. Opponents have scored just 110 first-half points through 12 games, with 27 coming by way of field goals and one touchdown coming via a kickoff return. The Gamecocks have only allowed 12 first-half touchdowns this season, three against Arkansas, two at Auburn and one each vs. Florida, Alabama, Kentucky, Vanderbilt, Tennessee, Troy and Clemson. As a result, the Gamecocks have only trailed at halftime once this season (Arkansas).

SEEING RED

A big reason for Carolina's success has been its red-zone defense. Opponents have been held scoreless in 12 of 39 trips inside the Carolina 20-yard-line, ranking the Gamecocks sixth in the country in that category. Below is a list of the nation's top teams in red-zone defense:

Carolina 19, The Citadel 6

The Gamecocks wrapped up a 6-4 regular season - their fourth straight at .500 or better under Rex Enright - with a 19-6 victory over The Citadel in Charleston. It would be the teams' last meeting for 10 years before resuming the series in 1964.

Notes on the Carolina Special Teams

DOUBLE DUTY

• Senior **Spencer Lanning** is in his second year handling both the kicking and punting duties. Last year, Lanning set a school record for consistency by connecting on 17-of-20 field goal attempts - including 12 in a row at one point - for an .850 field goal percentage. He also hit 28-of-29 extra point attempts with his only miss by virtue of a blocked kick. He led the team in scoring last year with 79 points, the sixth-best single season in school history. In addition, Lanning has a career punting average of 42.4 yards per kick over two seasons with a long of 58.

• Through nine games, Lanning has punted 42 times for an average of 44.0 yards per punt, ranking him sixth in the SEC in punting average. He is also 12-for-16 on field goal attempts on the season, including a long of 51 yards. Lanning has also made his last seven consecutive field goal tries.

• Lanning has been named **SEC Special Teams Player of the Week** twice this year, earning the honor after the Florida and Clemson games. He connected on three field goal attempts in each game and was stellar in his punting duties as well.

CAREER BEST, TIMES TWO

Spencer Lanning had a busy night against Furman on Sept. 18 as he punted five times, connected on five extra points and attempted a field goal. But in the midst of extended work, Lanning notched a pair of career bests. He drilled a 51-yard field goal in the third quarter, surpassing his previous best by four yards (47 vs. Tennessee and Clemson in 2009). He also boomed a 58-yard punt, two yards longer than a 56-yarder against Kentucky last season that had stood as his previous top mark.



Steve Spurrier, who has coached a national championship team, won seven Southeastern Conference titles, and won nearly three-fourths of the college games in which he has coached, begins his fifth season as head coach at the University of South Carolina. Spurrier was introduced as Carolina's 32nd head coach on Nov. 23, 2004, before an overflow news conference crowd in the south end zone of Williams-Brice Stadium.

Now in his 21st collegiate season, Coach Spurrier has compiled a 186-71-2 (.722) won-loss record as a major college head coach, including a 44-31 mark (.587) at Carolina. He led the Duke Blue Devils to the 1989 Atlantic Coast Conference championship before returning to his alma mater, the University of Florida, as head coach in 1990. During his 12 seasons with the Gators, Spurrier's teams won seven Southeastern Conference championships, one national title and finished ranked in the nation's top 10 nine times. His record at Florida was an amazing 122-27-1 (.817). Spurrier, who won the 1966 Heisman Trophy as a quarterback for the Gators, most recently was head coach of the NFL's Washington Redskins (2002-03). He returned to the college ranks in 2005 after a one-year absence from the sidelines.

In his first season at South Carolina, Coach Spurrier led the Gamecocks to a 7-5 record and a second-place finish in the SEC Eastern Division. In doing so, he posted a five-game winning streak, the 15th consecutive year in which he has had a five-game winning streak, something no other coach in college history has accomplished. He was honored as the SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press after leading the Gamecocks to a school-record five straight SEC wins, their first win ever at Tennessee and their first win over Florida since the 1930s. It was the eighth time he has been honored as his league's Coach of the Year.

He came back with an 8-5 record in 2006, just the ninth time in school history that the Gamecocks posted eight or more wins in a season. The season was capped with a victory in the Liberty Bowl over Conference USA champion Houston. With that win, Coach Spurrier matched Joe Morrison for the most wins by a Carolina head coach in his first two seasons in Columbia.

In his third season with the Garnet & Black, Coach Spurrier's squad raced out to a 6-1 record and moved as high as No. 6 in the BCS rankings, before finishing the campaign with a 6-6 record. With 21 wins, he set the Carolina record for coaching victories after three seasons at the helm.

With a 7-6 record in 2008, Carolina has finished with a .500 or better overall record in each of Coach Spurrier's four seasons. He has logged 30 wins as the Carolina head coach, moving past Warren Giese into sole possession of seventh place on the Gamecocks' all-time list. Lou Holtz is next on the list with 33 career wins.

- His 122 victories at Florida from 1990-2001 rank as the best win total for a coach in his first 12 years at a school in major college history.
- Coached Florida to two National Championship Game appearances (1995 and 1996), claiming the 1996 national title.
- The only coach in SEC history and one of only two coaches in major college history to lead a squad to six straight seasons of 10 or more wins (1993-1998).
- His Gator teams appeared in the weekly polls 202 of a possible 203 weeks, including each of his last 202 consecutive weeks. From 1990-2001, the Gators were ranked number one in the polls 29 times.
- His six outright SEC titles ('91, '93, '94, '95, '96, 2000) ranked as the second-best total in SEC history, trailing only "Bear" Bryant's 11.
- Has been named his conference's Coach of the Year eight times (1988 and 1989 in the ACC with Duke, in 1990, 1991, 1994, 1995 and 1996 in the SEC with Florida and in 2005 in his first year at South Carolina).



Quarterback Stephen Garcia and freshman tailback Marcus Lattimore each ran for two touchdowns and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier won his 18th straight college opener 41-13 over Southern Miss on Thursday night.

Garcia got things started with a 22-yard touchdown run and Lattimore followed with first-half scores of 3 and 7 yards to send the Gamecocks to a surprisingly easy win against the Golden Eagles.

And Lattimore wasn't the only young star to excel for Spurrier.

Sophomore Alshon Jeffery had 106 receiving yards and freshman Ace Sanders had a 53-yard rush - the Gamecocks' longest in four years - to set up Lattimore's first score.

Even freshman backup passer Connor Shaw came through, connecting with D.L. Moore for a 15-yard touchdown pass for South Carolina's final score.

South Carolina's rout was a welcome result after a restless summer. Spurrier and the Gamecocks have been dogged by the NCAA the past two months. Standout tight end Weslye Saunders, a central figure in the probe for possible contact with agents, did not play because of an unrelated team suspension.

Then South Carolina scratched two starters - left tackle Jarriel King and cornerback Chris Culliver - right before kickoff, although the athletic department would not say why.

Southern Miss kept the Gamecocks offstride early on, forcing a punt on South Carolina's opening series and quickly driving to the Gamecocks 22.

That's when momentum changed for good.

Akeem Auguste broke up a third-down pass that settled into the hands of safety DaVonte Holloman and South Carolina followed with a solid drive of its own led by Garcia.

The junior was 4-for-4 passing for 51 yards on the series and finished things with a gritty, 22-yard TD run.

Then South Carolina's youngest guns took control.

Speedy Sanders had his back-breaking end around to the Southern Miss 9. Two plays later, Lattimore bounced through for his first college score from 3 yards out.

Lattimore, considered the country's top tailback prospect last February, got the call a series later. This time, he picked his way through Southern Miss defenders for a 7-yard scoring run as South Carolina led 24-6 - its most points by halftime since the 2006 Liberty Bowl.


Garcia ended 16 of 23 for 193 yards.

Golden Eagles coach Larry Fedora followed Spurrier as Florida's playcaller in 2002 and tried to out-scheme him with a no-huddle, flood-the-field attack.

But Southern Miss twice bogged down in the red zone after the early pick, settling for two field goals.

Playmaking receiver DeAndre Brown was covered up most of the night by South Carolina's secondary. The junior, who caught 114 passes his first two seasons, didn't catch one against the Gamecocks until the final period when Southern Miss trailed 41-6.

Brown had the Golden Eagles' only touchdown, a 29-yard scoring catch with 1:33 left.

South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier brought in Marcus Lattimore to run the ball.

And Spurrier let his prize freshman do it all day against No. 22 Georgia.

Lattimore rushed for 182 yards and two touchdowns to lead the 24th-ranked Gamecocks (2-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) to a 17-6 victory Saturday.

Lattimore carried 37 times in his first SEC game, punching in two 2-yard TDs and sealing things during a long, fourth-quarter field goal drive.

"I'm a little sore," Lattimore said.

He'll let the cheers at Williams-Brice Stadium soothe any lingering pain. The fans chanted his name at the end as Lattimore pounded the Bulldogs (1-1, 0-1) again and again.

Get used to it, SEC, because Spurrier sounds ready to ground it out all season.

He pushed past the defensive line for his first 2-yard touchdown. Lattimore had two defenders on his back on his next score and dragged them into the end zone for a second 2-yard TD.

He also had yardage on South Carolina's final scoring drive, starting with a 16-yard run and carrying eight of 11 plays to seal the game with Spencer Lanning's 24-yard field goal.

It was a complete reversal from most games in the South Carolina-Georgia series. It's usually a Bulldogs tailback who takes charge and the Gamecocks who play catch up.

This time, Georgia was outgained by more than 100 yards and held without a touchdown for the first time in three years since its last loss to South Carolina, 16-12, in 2007.

The Bulldogs' best chance to tighten the game came in the third quarter when they drove to the South Carolina 3 while trailing 14-6. But Washuan Ealey fumbled and cornerback Stephon Gilmore recovered to end the threat.

Right from the start, Georgia had no answer for Lattimore, the freshman who was considered the country's top high school running back last winter. He had runs of 16, 10 and 10 on South Carolina's opening drive that ended with Lattimore's first touchdown.

Lattimore was back at it right before halftime, giving the Gamecocks a 14-3 lead that Georgia couldn't match.


Spurrier likes Lattimore's square posture that keeps him moving forward even after he's hit. It also helped that Gamecocks called on Lattimore's favorite zone-read play from high school.

"That's all I did for four years," he said.

Georgia got a quick start from Ealey, the tailback who was suspended for the Bulldogs' opener last week. Ealey gained 32 yards on his team's opening drive, which stalled in the red zone when Orson Charles bobbled a third-down pass from Aaron Murray with running room ahead.

But the Bulldogs' attack sputtered the rest of the half, managing 13 yards as they went three-and-out three straight possessions.

Georgia finished with 253 yards while giving up 354 to the Gamecocks.

South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier knows the best part of his 13th-ranked Gamecocks beating lower-division Furman.

“Glad the game’s over,” he said, “and we don’t have to play them again for another 25 years.”

Stephen Garcia threw for two touchdowns, freshman Marcus Lattimore rushed for one and South Carolina won 38-19 on Saturday, improving to 3-0 for the first time in three years. Not that it came easily against the Paladins - something that’s happened before with FCS teams in Spurrier’s six seasons.



The Gamecocks needed a fourth-quarter interception to hold on against Wofford 27-20 in 2006, then managed only a pair of touchdowns against those same Terriers in a 23-13 win.

The last time they played Furman was even worse for the Gamecocks, a stunning 28-23 win for Paladins at Williams-Brice Stadium in 1982.

And Furman (1-1) of the FCS Southern Conference seemed poised to make this one tight, cutting a 28-6 lead to 31-19 in the final period and driving for more before Stephon Gilmore’s interception and 80-yard TD return finally settled things.

Furman’s Adam Mims finished with 10 catches for 202 yards.

It was a drastic turn from a week ago, when the Gamecocks’ stamped themselves contenders in the Southeastern Conference with a 17-6 win over Georgia.

Garcia’s 15-yard scoring throw to Tori Gurley and Lattimore’s 4-yard touchdown run put the Gamecocks up 14-0.

When Garcia completed a nifty 6-yard throw to D.L. Moore in the back of the end zone early in the third quarter, South Carolina led 28-6 and looked ready to rout Furman.

But the Gamecocks had trouble putting this one away.

Shawn Boone began Furman’s comeback, tipping and catching Garcia’s screen pass attempt near the goal line for a 3-yard touchdown return.

After Spencer Lanning’s career best 51-yard field goal, the Paladins struck again with Tersoo Uhaa’s halfback pass to Mims for a 72-yard touchdown.

Furman drove 53 yards to South Carolina’s 30 the next time it had the ball before Cody Worley’s overthrown pass settled in Gilmore’s hands with a clear path to the end zone.

Still, Spurrier improved to 40-0 all time against programs from outside the BCS automatic qualifier conferences.

Things get decidedly tougher from here. The Gamecocks go to Auburn next Saturday and, after a week off, face top-ranked Alabama at home.

Garcia finished 13 of 20 for 150 yards with his first two interceptions of the year. Lattimore added 97 yards rushing and his fifth TD on the ground this year. Jeffery had five catches for 97 yards, coming up short of his third straight game with at least 100 receiving yards.

South Carolina’s defense registered seven sacks and held Furman to 51 yards on the ground.

Spurrier was disappointed in some of his team’s breakdowns, but hoped it would wake the players up to what might happen with a lack of focus. “Pretty sad some of the things that happened, but hopefully it happened in a game where we had a decent lead,” he said. “We can try and prevent those things in the future.”

AUBURN, Ala. (AP)—

Cam Newton and No. 17 Auburn are hard to stop once they get going.

The Tigers' 250-pound quarterback rushed for 176 yards and three touchdowns and passed for two more scores. Auburn then forced four fourth-quarter turnovers to pull off another come-from-behind victory, this one 35-27 against No. 12 South Carolina on Saturday night.

The Tigers (4-0, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) overcame a double-digit halftime deficit for the second straight week against a team from the Palmetto State, this time falling behind 20-7. Both of Newton's scoring passes came in the fourth quarter after fumbles by South Carolina quarterback Stephen Garcia.

South Carolina (3-1, 1-1) twice drove into Auburn territory in the final minutes behind freshman backup Connor Shaw, but he was intercepted each time. Demond Washington picked off a pass that deflected off the hands of receiver Alshon Jeffery in the end zone with 33 seconds left to seal the win.

Newton was 16-of-21 passing for 158 yards and also logged 25 runs, including a 54-yard TD scamper after a nice fake handoff in the first quarter.

Auburn racked up 334 yards rushing against a defense that came in giving up a league-low 60 yards on the ground.

The Tigers were ball hogs in a dominant second half, running 49 plays to South Carolina's 22.

The Gamecocks had no turnovers in the first three quarters and four in the final 15 minutes to waylay a bid for their first 4-0 start since 2001. South Carolina was also seeking SEC win No. 107 for coach Steve Spurrier, which would have given him sole possession of second-place behind Alabama's Bear Bryant. Instead, the Gamecocks left with their sixth straight loss in league road games and fifth in a row against Auburn since joining the SEC.

There was some give and take in that regard. Earlier Auburn had lost three fumbles, and the first two set up South Carolina touchdown drives.

Shaw took the Gamecocks downfield on both his drives but, threw the ball right to linebacker Josh Byner under pressure for an interception at the 11 to end the first.


Auburn failed to get a first down and run out the clock on three straight Newton runs, but then capitalized on one of the few balls Jeffery didn't bring down.

He had eight catches for 192 yards and caught two of Garcia's three touchdown passes. Garcia went 15-of-21 passing for 235 yards, but was sacked three times and had two costly fumbles before being pulled in the fourth quarter.

The Tigers' Michael Dyer won the battle of highly touted freshman running backs, outgaining Marcus Lattimore 100-33. Dyer had 23 carries but Lattimore was stymied early and only carried 14 times after emerging as a workhorse coming into the game. Dyer gained 78 yards after halftime.

The defense and Newton's timely passing carried the day in the end. He completed a 7-yard touchdown pass to tight end Philip Lutzenkirchen to take a one-point lead early in the fourth.

Then, Emory Blake jumped over a diving defender and just pushed the ball over the goal line for a 12-yard TD with 6:23 left.

Stephen Garcia threw three touchdown passes, two to Alshon Jeffery, and Marcus Lattimore scored three times as 19th-ranked South Carolina stunned No. 1 Alabama 35-21 on Saturday.

Never before had the Gamecocks beaten a team ranked No. 1 - at least not in football. So Steve Spurrier had plenty of reason to bask in one of the biggest victories of his illustrious career.

South Carolina has been solid under Spurrier, but still hasn't won the SEC East--and never really has come close. This bunch of Gamecocks might be

able to change that with a winning mix of dynamic skill players and dominating defenders that could keep them in the title chase all season.

Opponents have had little chance against Alabama the past few seasons. The defending national champions had won 19 straight games - including last week's 31-6 rout of Florida - since losing the Sugar Bowl to Utah after the 2008 season.

But facing a third consecutive ranked SEC team caught up with Alabama as Garcia and the Gamecocks used the Crimson Tide's formula for success: Cashing in on chances close to the goal line and limiting the country's best tailback duo in Mark Ingram and Trent Richardson to 64 yards.

South Carolina shredded the country's top-rated scoring defense, putting up the most points on Alabama since a 41-34 loss to LSU in 2007. The Gamecocks scored four touchdowns when they got inside the 'Bama 20--double what the Crimson Tide had allowed coming in.

Alabama tried to rally back as it had against Arkansas two games ago, this time cutting South Carolina's 21-3 lead to 28-21 with most of the fourth quarter left.

The Crimson Tide's charge came courtesy of an odd safety by Garcia - Spurrier threw his notes about 5 yards onto the field when his quarterback grabbed a wayward shotgun snapped and flung it through his own end zone from about the 2 - a field goal and a 51-yard touchdown catch by Darius Hanks.

Alabama's last chance to tighten things came at the start of the fourth quarter when Jeffery, the SEC's leading receiver, bobbled a catch into the hands of Tide defensive back Will Lowery for an interception. But McElroy was sacked for a 7-yard loss by Stephon Gilmore and Saban called a fake field goal that didn't come close to working as defensive lineman Ed Stinson dropped the throw from holder A.J. McCarron.


South Carolina answered with a 75-yard drive, capped by Lattimore's 2-yard score with 7:01 left that put the game away.

Alabama could not respond and South Carolina fans, as they had after the basketball team beat Kentucky in January and the baseball team beat Arizona State at the College World Series in June, celebrated beating the country's No. 1 team.

Spurrier earned his 107th SEC victory, breaking a tie for second with Mississippi great Johnny Vaught. Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is the all-time leader with 159 league wins.

Lattimore finished with 93 yards rushing. He also caught Garcia's first scoring pass, a 9-yard touchdown in the opening quarter.

Garcia was a tidy 17 of 20 for 201 yards and the one interception. He also picked up a critical fourth-and-1 on the Gamecocks final scoring drive. Jeffery had seven receptions for 127 yards, including TD catches of 26 and 15 yards.

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—

The 10th-ranked Gamecocks seemed as if they'd keep it together before freshman running back Marcus Lattimore went down with an ankle injury.

Then they could only watch as Kentucky's Randall Cobb caught a 24-yard touchdown pass with 1:15 remaining then added the two-point conversion to cap a furious second-half rally and give Wildcats a stunning 31-28 victory, ruining South Carolina's chance to get a leg up in the jumbled SEC East.

Mike Hartline threw for a career-high 349 yards and four touchdowns for the Wildcats, who had lost 10 straight to the Gamecocks and never beaten Spurrier in 17 tries.

Lattimore had 212 yards of total offense and three touchdowns but spent most of the second half on the sideline after rolling his left ankle while getting tackled early in the third quarter. Kentucky shut the Gamecocks down over the final 30 minutes, holding them to 103 yards - 49 of which came on the desperate final drive - while slowly chipping away at the lead.

Hartline hit LaRod King for a 5-yard touchdown pass to cap a 95-yard drive and bring Kentucky within 28-17. Then Hartline found Matthews for a 38-yard score to get within 28-23. Matthews finished with 12 receptions for 177 yards and a score.

Given one last chance with 7:31 remaining, Hartline guided Kentucky to the South Carolina 24. Facing fourth down, he pumped the ball once and lofted the ball to a wide open Cobb in the end zone. Cobb bulled over left tackle for the 2-point conversion to put the Wildcats up three.

Garcia, who finished with 382 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions, quickly moved the ball to the Kentucky 20 with 11 seconds remaining. The Gamecocks used a timeout and opted to take a shot at winning in regulation. Garcia threw it up to 6-foot-3 receiver Lamar Scruggs. The ball was tipped and Mosley snagged it out of the air.

The giddy celebration hardly seemed possible after a first half in which the Gamecocks did whatever they wanted behind Lattimore. The freshman bounced off Kentucky's would-be tacklers on handoffs or ran past the overmatched defensive ends who had the assignment of covering him on pass routes out of the backfield.

Lattimore came into the game with 81 yards receiving all season. He had 133 in the first half, when the Gamecocks victimized Kentucky's overzealous pass rush by sending Lattimore on wheel routes out of the backfield. Three times Lattimore ran by a Kentucky defender and into the open field, gaining huge chunks of yardage. A 48-yard reception set up his own 10-yard touchdown run, and later added a 47-yard scoring pass in which he sprinted past defensive end Taylor Wyndham then easily sidestepped another Kentucky defender at the 10 before strolling into the end zone.

The score gave the Gamecocks a 28-10 halftime lead, and things could have been worse. South Carolina turned it over three times in the half, and the Wildcats turned two of the miscues into points.

Brian Maddox rushed for a career-high 146 yards and the game-clinching touchdown to lead No. 19 South Carolina to a difficult 21-7 win over Vanderbilt on Saturday night, giving Steve Spurrier his 40th victory with the Gamecocks.

The win snapped South Carolina's seven-game Southeastern Conference road losing streak that dated back to 2008 and put the Gamecocks (5-2, 3-2) in first place in the SEC East. South Carolina had lost two of the last three to Vanderbilt (2-5, 1-3).

Maddox didn't carry the ball until South Carolina's fourth series with about 6 minutes left in the first half, replacing an ineffective Kenny Miles, who started in place of injured freshman Marcus Lattimore.

His touchdown from 2 yards out with 4:59 left in the third quarter broke a 7-7 tie and seemed to shake the Gamecocks awake.

A combination of intense first-half pressure on quarterback Stephen Garcia and the Gamecocks' own mistakes kept the Commodores in it most of the way.

South Carolina had drives end on sacks, an errant snap, Casey Hayward's SEC-leading fifth interception and a blocked field goal, among other issues.


The Commodores' pass defense and intense pressure kept Garcia focused on the short passing game most of the night. Through 2 1/2 quarters he seemed to favor the left flat and Tori Gurley, who had career highs with 14 catches for 112 yards. Vanderbilt had four sacks--half of its season total--and several key hurries in the first half.

It wasn't until Garcia hit a couple of long passes late that things seemed to open up.

First, he found Gurley on a 24-yarder to set up Maddox's touchdown. The second went for a 72-yard touchdown to Alshon Jeffery midway through the fourth quarter to end Vanderbilt's threat.

Jeffery finished with nine catches for 158 yards, giving the Gamecocks two receivers with 100 yards in the same game for the first time since 2006. Garcia also hit Gurley for a 15-yarder on a quick-strike 51-second drive at the end of the first half to tie the game after Larry Smith put Vanderbilt up on a 3-yard run.

Garcia hit 31 of 39 passes for 355 yards a week after throwing for 382 in loss to Kentucky last week.

Alshon Jeffery's 70-yard touchdown catch broke a fourth-quarter tie and kept No. 17 South Carolina in control of the SEC East with a 38-24 victory over Tennessee on Saturday.

The Vols (2-6, 0-5 South-eastern Conference) had rallied back from a 14-point deficit on a pair of touchdown passes from backup quarterback Tyler Bray to tie the game 24-24.

That's when Stephen Garcia found Jeffery in the middle of the field and the SEC's leading receiver outraced three defenders to the end zone with 12:17 to go.

Garcia sealed the win for South Carolina (6-2, 4-2) with his second rushing touchdown, this one from 1-yard out with 3:28 left.

The Gamecocks are the East's only two-loss team. They can clinch their first berth in the SEC title game with wins over Arkansas and Florida in the next two weeks.

South Carolina freshman Marcus Lattimore had a career-high 184 yards and his 11th rushing touchdown in his first start since spraining an ankle in a 31-28 loss at Kentucky two weeks ago.

Things haven't gone well in Tennessee coach Derek Dooley's first season. The Vols were run over by Georgia and Alabama in the past two weeks and Dooley compared his team to German troops watching the Allies' D-Day invasion during World War II.

Tennessee, though, showed it wasn't ready to give up anything to South Carolina with its second-half rally.

The Vols pulled off their first successful fake punt since 2004 as Chad Cunningham ran for 25 yards on fourth-and-10. On the next play, Bray connected with Denarius Moore on a 30-yard scoring pass to pull within a touchdown.

Bray and Moore were at it again on Tennessee's next series. The two combined for a 64-yard reception to the Gamecocks 2 and, after a personal foul penalty pushed the Vols back, Bray hit Gerald Jones for a 17-yard touchdown to tie it up at 24-all.

That's when South Carolina struck back with Jeffery's catch and run. He had only one reception for 5 yards until that point.


For Tennessee, Moore had six catches for a career high 228 yards.

It was South Carolina mistakes that kept the Vols in it early on.

The Gamecocks moved 72 yards to the Tennessee 3, but Garcia threw an interception--forcing the ball to the triple-covered Jeffery.

Things tipped back the Gamecocks way in the second quarter when Lattimore carried seven times for 51 yards, the last a 1-yard TD run that put South Carolina ahead 10-3.

But Tennessee responded quickly. Matt Simms found Moore for a 13-yard pass on third-and-10 and ended the series with a 12-yard touchdown toss to wide open tight end Luke Stocker.

No. 17 Arkansas showed South Carolina what a Southeastern Conference title contender should look like.

Ryan Mallett threw for 303 yards, Knile Davis tied a career high with three touchdowns and the Razorbacks (7-2, 4-2 SEC) handed 18th-ranked South Carolina its worst home loss in five years, 41-20, on Saturday night.

Despite the hammering, the Gamecocks (6-3, 4-3 SEC) get a shot at the Eastern Division and their first spot in the league title game against Florida at The Swamp next Saturday night.

The surging Razorbacks? They're two games behind undefeated Auburn and needing a miracle to reach the top of the SEC West.

The SEC West is 15-2 against the East this season.

The Razorbacks scored on four of their five first-half possessions to lead 24-10 at the break, held Gamecocks star runner Marcus Lattimore to 30 yards and gained 140 yards rushing on the SEC's top defense against the run. Knile Davis had 110 yards, including scoring runs of 2, 21 and 1 yard.

The Gamecocks hadn't been beaten this badly at Williams-Brice Stadium since a 37-14 win by Alabama in coach Steve Spurrier's debut season of 2005.

"We didn't have much tonight," Spurrier said. "The way we played, you wonder how we won six games already this year."

To make it seven, South Carolina will have to win at Florida where it's 0-12.

"The only thing we can do now is regroup, and try to improve and give ourselves a chance to win next week," Spurrier said.

Arkansas brought the country's second-best air attack and the league's top passer in Mallett into Williams-Brice. The Razorbacks were missing injured receiver Greg Childs, out for the season with a knee injury, but it didn't slow down Mallett. He got things started with a 4-yard TD pass to Cobi Hamilton, who moved into Childs' spot and caught seven passes for 111 yards.

Then it was Davis' turn. The sophomore continually eluded defenders and tied his career high for touchdowns set last month against Ole Miss.

And kicker Zach Hocker hit a career-long 51 yard field goal, the Razorbacks longest since 1992.


Spurrier said when Mallett saw the way Gamecocks defensive backs played the past month - this was the fourth time in five games they allowed 300 passing yards -- he'd lick his chops.

South Carolina's head ball coach wasn't too far off.

Mallett wasted little time torching the Gamecocks secondary. He went 3 of 4 for 50 yards on the Razorbacks opening drive, ending with Hamilton's touchdown.

In the second quarter, Mallett launched a 57-yard throw to a falling Jarius Wright - he easily got behind cornerback C.C. Whitlock - to set up Davis' first rushing TD from 2 yards out.

When the Gamecocks didn't come close on a fake punt try after snapping to upback Dalton Wilson, Mallett and the 'Hogs were at it again. Mallett used passes of 6 yards to Hamilton and 11 yards to tight end D.J. Williams to set up a 21-yard scoring run along the sidelines by Davis for a 24-7 lead.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP)—

The Head Ball Coach notched a huge win at his old stomping grounds. After years of being the top Gator, Steve Spurrier led South Carolina to its first division crown in the stadium he nicknamed The Swamp.

Marcus Lattimore ran 40 times for a career-high 212 yards and three touchdowns, Stephen Garcia played turnover-free and the 22nd-ranked Gamecocks upset No. 24 Florida 36-14 Saturday night to clinch the Southeastern Conference's Eastern Division.

The Gamecocks won for the second time in 19 tries against Florida, snapped an 0-for-12 streak in Gainesville and earned a spot in the league title game for the first time. The Gators lost to a division opponent for the first time in 17 games, dropped their third consecutive home game and proved they didn't deserve to play for a championship.

South Carolina started celebrating after Garcia's 8-yard TD run early in the fourth that put the Gamecocks ahead 29-7. Players and fans got even more raucous after Lattimore's 11-yard scoring run with 2:43 remaining. Players doused Spurrier with - what else? - Gatorade with 1:01 remaining. Spurrier spent the final few seconds with cameras in his face, then got carried to midfield on players' shoulders.

Andre Debose returned the opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown, but it was one of the few highlights the Gators could muster.

The first quarter was all anyone needed to watch to see how the game would unfold: The Gators ran 18 plays for 51 yards, failed to convert a third down, punted five times and had five penalties.

The Gamecocks had to settle for three field goals from Spencer Lanning, who hit from 49, 47 and 41 yards. He also banged an extra point off the left upright following Lattimore's 7-yard touchdown run in the first quarter.

There was little else South Carolina did wrong.

Garcia had his first turnover-free game since late September. He completed 15 of 22 passes for 156 yards. He added 28 yards on the ground.


Lattimore, the league's second-leading rushing behind Auburn quarterback Cam Newton, demoralized Florida with every carry. He ran 21 times for 83 yards in the first half, then added a backbreaking, 21-yard TD run to cap South Carolina's opening drive of the second half.

Alshon Jeffrey, the SEC's leading receiver, came up with several key third-down receptions and was Garcia's safety valve. Jeffrey caught six passes for 53 yards. South Carolina finished with 395 yards, 169 more than Florida.

John Brantley took most of the snaps for Florida and completed 16 of 31 passes for 130 yards, with an interception. Trey Burton and Jordan Reed played sparingly. Reed threw a 26-yard TD pass to Chris Rainey late, but was stopped short on a fourth-down run near midfield earlier.

Even after a lackluster first half and time to regroup in the locker room, the Gators were inept. They had just 16 yards in the third quarter.

Maybe the most telling play of Florida's problems came on the first drive of the second half. Brantley, who has clearly been a misfit in the spread option, had a pass tipped at the line of scrimmage. The ball sailed backward and toward Brantley. Instead of batting it to the ground, Brantley caught it for a 10-yard loss.

Marcus Lattimore had three touchdowns and 102 yards rushing by halftime to lead the 17th-ranked Gamecocks to a 69-24 victory, its biggest point total under Steve Spurrier and the most it has scored in 15 years.

Lattimore and the Gamecocks ended the doubts early as he scored on runs of 17, 8 and 5 yards for a 21-0 lead less than 7 minutes in.

The TD surge gave Lattimore 19 touchdowns, surpassing Harold Green's 16 for South Carolina's single-season mark. Lattimore also moved one TD away from the SEC freshman record of 20 set by Tennessee's Reggie Cobb in 1987.

Troy had five turnovers, all which led to touchdowns.

After Troy's DuJuan Harris fumbled the opening kickoff, Lattimore took his first handoff 17 yards for the touchdown. Next possession, he set himself up with a season-long 58 yard run, then ended the series with an 8-yard score. Moments later, Lattimore was in the end zone again with his 5-yard romp.

Garcia threw two touchdowns and ran for a third. Even the defense chipped in with safety D.J. Swearinger and defensive end Chaz Sutton both running interceptions back for touchdowns.

Sutton's was a 56-yard bolt as the second quarter ended and put South Carolina ahead 56-7, believed to be the most points the Gamecocks ever scored in a half.

It bettered the Gamecocks previous high for points in Spurrier's six seasons, a 52-7 win over Middle Tennessee State in 2006, and was South Carolina's most points since a 77-14 victory over Kent in 1995.

It was only the 10th eight-win season for the Gamecocks, who began playing football in 1892. And Spurrier says there could be more big moments ahead.

Lattimore's yardage gave him 1,066 for the season, the first South Carolina rusher to break the 1,000 mark since Derek Watson in 2000.

South Carolina receiver Alshon Jeffery had five catches for 123 yards in the first half for 1,210 on the season. He moved past Sidney Rice's 2005 total of 1,143 for the school's single-season yardage mark. Lattimore and Jeffery became South Carolina's first runner and receiver combo to surpass 1,000 yards each.

Garcia completed 9 of 12 throws for 198 yards in a half of work.


The biggest minus coming out of this one could be Stephon Gilmore leaving with what the team said was a "headache." It was later announced he had a concussion.

Troy entered with hopes of catching the Gamecocks peeking too far ahead. Plus, the Trojans are comfortable going toe-to-toe with anyone as shown by their 41-38 loss to current No. 12 Oklahoma State last September.

This time, though, Troy came unglued early. Maybe it was last week's stunning 52-35 loss at home to Florida International that dented hopes of a fifth straight Sun Belt Conference title. Or maybe it was South Carolina playing free and loose after clinching its division.

Little, though, went right for the Trojans. Harris had his early miscue, then punter Will Goggans fumbled his kick attempt, a turnover that led to Lattimore's third TD.

Quarterback Corey Robinson had the two pick-six interceptions. The Trojans had more yards on kickoff returns than offense (46 to 37) in the first quarter. They were outgained by South Carolina in the half, 320 to 136.

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP)—

Stephen Garcia threw for two touchdowns, Alshon Jeffery had his seventh 100-yard receiving game and No. 18 South Carolina posted its third nine-win season ever with a 29-7 victory over rival Clemson on Saturday.

In a season of milestones, this was likely one of the sweetest for the Southeastern Conference Eastern Division winners, who beat the Tigers in consecutive games for the first time since 1968-70.

The Gamecocks (9-3) have only won nine games twice before in 117 seasons of football, going 10-2 in 1984 and 9-3 in 2001. And their passing game,

led by Garcia and star wideout Jeffery, gave Auburn's secondary something to worry about with next week's SEC championship coming up.

Jeffery had four catches for 126 yards by halftime, including a 37-yard touchdown throw from Garcia.

Clemson (6-6) was held scoreless for the game's final 58 minutes.

South Carolina's already had a landmark season with its first-ever win at Florida and its first divisional crown. Adding a victory at Clemson - its second in the past three trips here - was a satisfying way for the Gamecocks to head into the Georgia Dome for next week's SEC title game.

A year ago, it was Clemson with bigger things down the road as it brought its ACC Atlantic title into the season-ending rivalry. The Tigers, though, fell in that contest 34-17.

Trailing 7-3, the Gamecocks' Brian Maddox pounced on a ball that got away from Clemson's punter Dawson Zimmerman. Garcia threw a simple screen to fullback Patrick DiMarco on the next play to put the Gamecocks ahead for good.

Jeffery struck for catches of 39 and 37 yards, the last a beautiful post route for a touchdown. It was the first time in seven games Clemson's defense had surrendered two TDs in a game. South Carolina and Jeffery weren't through. He added a 33-yard catch a series later that ended with Lanning's second field goal.

Jeffery's best reception may have been one out of bounds in the third quarter after he tipped up a long pass between two defenders and lunged for the catch that didn't count. He finished with five catches for 141 yards. Garcia was 14 of 30 for 227 yards.


Clemson, meanwhile, suffered through the offensive problems that have plagued it the past month.

Freshman DeAndre Hopkins ignited the crowd just minutes into the game as he got behind South Carolina's secondary for a 45-yard TD, giving Clemson an early lead.

The Tigers managed just 39 yards of offense the rest of the half, though. Coach Dabo Swinney even brought in injured Andre Ellington, the team's leading rusher who's been out since Oct. 30 with foot problems, for a spell. But he didn't gain any ground, either.

It was a bad end for Kyle Parker, Clemson's two-sport star who gave up \$800,000 in additional money from the Colorado Rockies to play one last season for the Tigers.

But Parker got an earlier exit than expected after Antonio Allen returned an interception 36 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter. Backup Tajh Boyd took over, the second time in two home games Parker, who threw 20 touchdowns a year ago, was benched. Parker was just 7 of 17 for 117 yards.
