



# **Sports Arena Remembered**

**Editor's note:** Owen Davis grew up in Auburn and faithfully followed the Auburn University basketball team. Davis, who is deputy sports editor of the *Detroit Free Press*, offers some reminiscence of the team and its homecourt, the Sports Arena, which was destroyed by fire September 21, 1996. This article was reprinted with permission from Owen Davis and *The Detroit Free Press*.

One February night in 1960, the Sports Arena in Auburn was the best place to be for a college basketball game.

Auburn was playing Kentucky, which had won four national championships in 12 years and was coached by Adolph Rupp, the basketball equivalent of Knute Rockne. The teams were tied for the Southeastern Conference lead late in the season, and the game was televised -- a first at Auburn.

The Tigers had never won the title or beaten Kentucky at home.

Jimmy Fibbe, an Auburn forward from Lexington, Ky., stood at the free throw line with his team trailing, 60-59. Four seconds were left, and Fibbe was shooting a one-and-one. He made both. Auburn basketball may never have known a better moment.

The Sports Arena is gone now, burned down while Auburn and Louisiana State played football across the street. But memories of times spent there didn't die with the flames.

Auburn played at the arena from 1946-69, and even then it was an unprepossessing place. It was an old airplane hangar, painted white. Fans sat on wooden bleacher seats, and the teams sat on wooden benches behind the baselines. Only 2,500 fans could fit inside.

But the arena had charm, the way relics do when they symbolize something special. And in the late 1950s and early '60s, basketball at Auburn was special.

The Tigers won 30 straight games from the midpoint of the 1957-58 season through late in the following winter. They were ranked in the Associated Press Top 20 three straight years -- 1958-60. And in 1960, they won their only SEC regular-season championship, leading the nation in field goal and free throw shooting.

The Sports Arena typified the kinds of players who went to Auburn then -- a small-town gym for small-town guys. These weren't imports from New York or Indiana, where some Southern schools found players.

All-SEC forward Rex Frederick came from Corner, Porter Gilbert from Geraldine, Henry Hart from Eufaula, Bobby Tucker from New Market, Bill McGriff and the Tinker brothers -- Billy and later Wallace -- played at Pisgah High up on Sand Mountain. They really were like the boys next door.

Local kids, who sneaked into the gym on Sundays, also hung around the Sports Arena to watch the players warm up on practice days, and we gladly chased loose balls. In return, they might let us shoot. The only time I ever dunked on a 10-foot goal was when all-conference center Layton Johns lifted me up on his shoulders.


It was easier to feel close to college basketball players back then. Games weren't televised -- except for the one in 1960 -- so fans saw players only in person, usually close to the court in a small gym. We never saw the likes of Oscar Robertson or Jerry West, but the best in the SEC came to the Sports Arena -- Bailey Howell from Mississippi State, Roger Kaiser from Georgia Tech, Cotton Nash from Kentucky, Donnie Kessinger from Ole Miss. And later, Clyde Lee from Vanderbilt, Louie Dampier and Pat Riley from Kentucky, Pistol Pete Maravich from LSU.

Miss. State, led by Howell and coached by Babe McCarthy, finished 24-1 in 1959, when the Bulldogs were ranked third in the nation. Their one loss came at the Sports Arena, 97-66.

The man who orchestrated Auburn's best seasons was Joel Eaves, who coached in 1950-63, compiling a 213-100 record. Eaves perfected the shuffle offense, which often produced lay-ups after a series of cuts to the basket. And he commanded respect. When Cotton Nash

came to the Sports Arena in 1962, fans behind the baskets started waving their arms as Nash shot free throws. This had never happened at Auburn.

Football's prominence didn't diminish Eaves' accomplishments. And nothing could diminish the importance of that February night in 1960, when Auburn beat Kentucky with a team known as Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs -- for Eaves' white hair and the players' lack of height.


As it turned out, Jimmy Fibbe wasn't the final hero in the game. After Fibbe's free throws made it 61-60, Rupp called two consecutive timeouts, which in those days allowed a team to inbound the ball from midcourt.

The pass went to Allen Feldhaus, and unbelievably, he had a clear drive to the basket with no defender blocking his way. For a second, Auburn's victory seemed dashed. But then came the most memorable defensive play ever made at the Sports Arena. John Helmlinger, a 6-foot-6 center who wasn't among the Seven Dwarfs, reached from behind Feldhaus and blocked his shot.

Game over. Auburn had won.

The Tigers clinched the conference championship a week later by beating Alabama in overtime at Montgomery. That game was dramatic -- won on Ray Groover's last-second lay-up -- but it lacked the historical significance of the previous week's victory.

And besides, it wasn't played at the Sports Arena.
