

Continued improvement and exceeding expectations. That is exactly what Tony Barbee has done in his six seasons as a head coach.

Barbee, the 2010 Conference USA Coach of the Year, did just that in his first two seasons at Auburn and in his four years at UTEP.

In his first year at Auburn in 2010-11, Barbee did this despite losing the entire starting lineup and the only returning player who had contributed the previous season in Frankie Sullivan.

Auburn finished 11-20 overall and 4-12 in the SEC in 2010-11 but won two of its last three games and went 3-4 in its last seven regular season games to finish fifth in the SEC's Western Division. The Tigers were a consensus preseason last place pick in the league and was called "the worst BCS conference team in the country" by some national prognosticators.

Barbee was being discussed as a candidate for SEC Coach of the Year by the media and league coaches in the latter part of the season.

The Tigers were one of the youngest teams in America with an average of 1.14 years of experience, ranked 315th out of 345 Div. I teams. There was not one senior on the roster and only 12 percent of Auburn's scoring returned from the previous season's team that finished 15-17 overall.

A trademark of each of Barbee's teams, it starts with defense as undermanned Auburn ranked second in the SEC with 7.8 steals per game.

The relentless Tigers, which took on the personality of their head coach, came back to win four games after trailing by 15 points or more, including wins over Mississippi State, Ole Miss and at LSU.

The 20-point comeback win over Ole Miss was the second largest in school history, just surpassing the 19-point comeback win over Mississippi State two weeks prior. Auburn upset Florida State which eventually came within one point of the NCAA Tournament Final Four.

Last season, the Tigers exceeded preseason expectations by finishing 10th in the SEC with a 15-16 overall record and a 5-11 league mark. Among the victories was a 65-55 victory over No. 23 Mississippi State.

From the previous season, Auburn improved its RPI to 145 from 253 and strength of schedule to 71 from 148.

When Barbee was named Auburn's 20th head basketball coach on March 24, 2010, he had advanced to postseason play in 18 of his 19 seasons as a head coach, assistant coach and player.

Barbee, 41, brought his energetic, exciting and uptempo brand of basketball to the Tigers, who begin their third season in the sparkling \$86 million Auburn Arena.

In addition, can be ever recruit? He recruits not only the top players in the state and the Southeast but the nation as well.

His recruiting efforts don't stop at the players either. Barbee recruits Auburn fans, Auburn students and even the media.

Barbee, who averaged 20.5 wins per season in four years as head coach at UTEP, exceeded expectations each season in El Paso. He steadily improved each year with the Miners, capped with a 26-7 record, Conference USA regular season title and NCAA Tournament appearance in 2009-10. The Miners lost to eventual NCAA runner-up Butler in the NCAA Tournament.

The Miners finished 15-1 in Conference USA and had a 16-game winning streak and set a school record for consecutive road wins with seven while being ranked in the top 25 by both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll for the first time in 18 years.

Barbee, who was also named NABC

District 11 Coach of the Year, coached C-USA Player of the Year Randy Culpepper, All-CUSA second-team selection Derrick Caracter and C-USA All-Defensive Team member Julyan Stone.

Barbee coached Conference USA firstteam selections in each of his final three seasons at UTEP to go along with four players who earned 10 All-C-USA honors combined.

Despite losing all-time leading scorer Stefon Jackson from the year before, the 2009-10 Miners cemented their reputation as one of the nation's top teams with tenacious defense.

UTEP lowered its opponent scoring average from 71.9 points per game in 2008-09 to 64.6 ppg the following season -- the second best scoring defense for the Miners in the last 18 years. UTEP's field goal pct. defense (.392) was its best in 36 years, and its 3-point field goal pct. defense (.313) tied for first in school history.

The Miners held 14 of 16 C-USA opponents below their season scoring averages and in league road games, held their opponents to a mere 35.9 percent shooting from the field.

One of UTEP's biggest wins was a 72-67 victory at Memphis on Jan. 20, ending Memphis' NCAA record-tying 64 game conference winning streak.

Barbee's record improved each of his four seasons at UTEP by going 14-17 in his first season in 2006-07, 19-14 in 2007-08, 23-14 in 2008-09 to 26-7 in 2009-10. His C-USA record improved each season as well from

The 2008-09 Miners advanced to the championship series of the College Basketball Invitational behind Stefon Jackson, who ended his prolific career as both UTEP's and Conference USA's all-time leading scorer with 2,456 points. UTEP went 23-14 overall and tied for fourth in C-USA at 10-6 as three players received All-C-USA honors: Jackson a first-team selection, Randy Culpepper a third-team pick and Arnett Moultrie an All-Freshman Team member.

In 2007-08, UTEP went 19-14 overall and tied for sixth in C-USA with an 8-8 record as Jackson was named first-team All-C-USA. Jackson led C-USA and was ranked seventh nationally in scoring at 23.6 ppg, eclipsing Dwyane Wade's C-USA junior scoring record with 778 points. Culpepper was selected the C-USA Sixth Man of the Year.

Despite being hired just two months prior to the start of practice and inheriting a roster with only three returning letterwinners, Barbee made UTEP competitive with a 14-17 record overall and 6-10 mark in C-USA, good for 10th in his first season. Jackson was an All-C-USA second-team selection.

Prior to his stint at UTEP, Barbee spent six highly successful seasons as an assistant coach at Memphis under John Calipari where he was considered one of the nation's top recruiters.

During Barbee's tenure as an assistant coach at Memphis from 2000-06, the Tigers

victories per season.

Memphis made six consecutive postseason tournament appearances (NCAA: 2003, 2004, 2006; and NIT: 2001, 2002, 2005). The Tigers earned three final AP top 25 rankings, fourth in 2006, 19th in 2003 and 24th in 2004.

In 2005-06, Memphis had a 33-4 record while reaching the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight. The Tigers won the C-USA regular season title and tournament championship while having two players chosen in the first round of the NBA Draft -- Rodney Carney (Philadelphia 76ers) and Shawne Williams (Indiana Pacers).

Memphis won a share of the 2004 C-USA regular season title, won the 2002 NIT and won the C-USA National Division in 2002 and 2003.

Barbee was named the top assistant in C-USA by Street & Smith in 2005-06 and was also honored by Rivals.com as the nation's No. 3 recruiter while at Memphis. HoopScoop magazine tabbed him as one of the nation's top assistant coaches in 2004.

Memphis produced top 10 recruiting classes in each of Barbee's six years, including the 2001 class that was ranked No. 1 in the country. The 2002 recruiting class would have been top-ranked had it not lost a player to the NBA.

Ten players coached by Barbee are playing or have played in the NBA - Derrick Caracter (Los Angeles Lakers), Arnett Moultrie (Philadelphia 76ers), Rodney Carney (Golden State

Warriors), Joey Dorsey (Toronto Raptors), Chris Douglas-Roberts (Milwaukee Bucks), Earl Barron (Portland Trail Blazers), Shawne Williams (Portland Trail Blazers), Marcus Camby (Portland Trail Blazers), Dajuan Wagner (Cleveland Cavaliers) and Antonio Burks (Memphis Grizzlies).

Barbee began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UMass for the 1995-96 season under Calipari. The Minutemen went 35-2 en route to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament as Barbee was also the team's radio color analyst.

He was promoted to assistant coach at UMass from 1996-98 under Bruiser Flint while the Minutemen went to a pair of NCAA Tournaments.

Barbee was an assistant coach at Wyoming under Steve McClain in 1998-99 as the Cowboys went 18-10 and reached the NIT second round.

Barbee went back to UMass under Flint for the 1999-2000 season and advanced to the NIT

As a player at UMass, Barbee was instrumental in the Minutemen posting a 91-39 record and earning four straight postseason tournament bids. UMass won back-to-back Atlantic 10 Conference regular season and tournament titles in 1992 and 1993.

Barbee still ranks among the school's alltime leaders in numerous statistical categories, including scoring with 1,643 points. He was a second-team All-Atlantic 10 player in 1991 and 1993 and All-Atlantic 10 Freshman



**PERSONAL DATA:** Born Sept. 27, 1975, in Mitchell, S.D. Younger brother of Mike Miller, a 12-year NBA veteran who won the 2012 NBA Championship with the Miami Heat.

**COACHING EXPERIENCE:** College – First year as associate head coach at Auburn (2012-pres.); Two months as an assistant coach at Missouri (2012); Five years as an assistant coach at New Mexico (2007-12); One year as an assistant coach at Pepperdine (2006-07); Three years as basketball operations assistant at Memphis (2004-07).

**EDUCATION:** Graduated from Mitchell (S.D.) Senior High in 1994; B.A. in Physical Education from Northern State in 2000.

PLAYING EXPERIENCE: High School – Lettered two years in basketball at Mitchell (S.D.) Senior High School (19xx-94). College – Four-year letterman at Northern State (1994-98). Professional – Drafted into the CBA in 1999.

Ryan Miller enters his first year on Coach Tony Barbee's staff at Auburn and his fourth coaching with Barbee.

Miller, who spent two months at Missouri prior to coming to Auburn, coached the previous five years from 2007-12 as an assistant coach at New Mexico under head coach Steve Alford. He was a part of the most successful five-year period in New Mexico basketball history, helping the Lobos to a 126-46 record, five consecutive postseason appearances and a pair of NCAA Tournament berths.

New Mexico won two regular season Mountain West Conference Championships and one MWC Tournament Championship during his coaching stint.

"I'm excited about Ryan joining on our staff," said Barbee. "He is a close friend who I have known for quite a while now. He is going to add a lot to the program in all areas from recruiting to coaching to relationships with players."

Miller is considered one of the top recruiters in the country where he has contacts throughout the United States as well as foreign countries including Australia, where he also played competitively.

He was a basketball operations assistant at Memphis under head coach John Calipari from 2004-06 when Barbee was also an assistant coach on the staff. During Miller's three years at Memphis, the Tigers went 78-28 and made three postseason tournament appearances, including two NCAA Tournament berths.

Miller spent one year as an assistant coach at Pepperdine before joining the New Mexico staff prior to the 2007-08 season.

A native of Mitchell, S.D., Miller attended Northern State University in Aberdeen, S.D., where he was a two-time Northern Sun All-Conference and All-Academic selection. He finished his career eighth on Northern State's all-time scoring list after leading his teams to four straight conference championships and the 1998 regional title. He was named a Div. II All-American and an All-Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference Academic selection as a senior in 1997-98.


In the 1998 North Central Region Championship, Miller scored 45 points, making nine 3-pointers, leading Northern State to an 88-82 victory over South Dakota State to advance to their first Elite 8 in Louisville, Ky.

Miller was drafted into the CBA in 1999 and played professionally for the Fargo-Moorhead Beez of International Basketball Association that season.

Miller earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Northern State in 2000. He attended Mitchell (S.D.) Senior High where he was a two-time all-state selection, leading Mitchell to the 1994 state championship. His brother, Mike, is a 12-year NBA veteran who won the 2012 NBA Championship with the Miami Heat.

He was born on Sept. 27, 1975, in Mitchell, S.D.









Milt Wagner enters his third season at Auburn, his seventh season under head coach Tony Barbee and his 13th overall with Barbee. He is one of the few players in history who has won championships at the professional, collegiate and prep levels as a player.

Inheriting a team that was a consensus preseason last place pick in the SEC and called "the worst BCS conference team in the country" by some national prognosticators, Auburn has improved in overall and league wins in each of the two seasons of the Barbee era.

He recruited a pair of top 100 players in Jordan Price and Shaquille Johnson in 2012.

Wagner spent four successful seasons at UTEP from 2006-10 and six seasons at Memphis from 2000-06 while helping lead the Tigers to six straight postseason appearances, including the Elite Eight of the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

UTEP won the 2010 Conference USA Championship with a 26-7 record overall and a 15-1 league mark as it advanced to the NCAA Tourna-

ment before losing to eventual NCAA runner-up Butler.

UTEP averaged 20.5 wins during the four-year Barbee era and the Miners record steadily improved each season. UTEP reached postseason play three straight years.

The Miners went 27-8 in 2004-05 and won the WAC Tournament title en route to earning its second straight NCAA Tournament appearance. UTEP won 21 games in 2005-06 and went 11-3 in Conference USA while advancing to the NIT.

The Miners played in three postseason tournaments in his four years in El Paso. He coached Stefon Jackson, who is the all-time leading scorer in UTEP and Conference USA history; C-USA Player of the Year Randy Culpepper; All-CUSA second-team selection Derrick Carracter, who was drafted by the two-time defending World Champion Los Angeles Lakers in 2010; Arnett Moultrie, a 2009 C-USA All-Freshman Team selection, who was drafted in the 2012 NBA Draft first round and is with the Philadelphia 76ers; and C-USA All-Defensive Team member Julyan Stone.

Wagner came to UTEP after serving as Coordinator of Basketball Operations at Memphis for six seasons. While at Memphis, Wagner worked with Barbee and was a part of the school's run to 148 victories and six straight postseason tournament appearances, including the Elite Eight of the 2006

NCAA Tournament. Memphis also won the 2002 NIT.
Seven players coached by Wagner and Barbee at Memphis played in the NBA - Dajuan Wagner (Cleveland Cavaliers), Rodney Carney (Golden State Warriors), Joey Dorsey (Toronto Raptors), Chris Douglas-Roberts

(Milwaukee Bucks), Antonio Burks (Memphis Grizzlies), Shawne Williams (Portland Trail Blazers) and Earl Barron (Portland Trail Blazers). The Camden, N.J., native led Louisville to the 1986 NCAA Cham-

pionship along with three Final Four berths while still ranking fifth (was fourth after finishing collegiate career) in Cardinal history with 1,836 career points.

The Cardinals' 1986 NCAA Championship team defeated Duke 72-69 in the championship game and Auburn 84-76 in the Elite Eight. Louisville also advanced to the NCAA Final Four in 1982 and 1983 as well as to the 1984 NCAA Sweet 16. Wagner helped the Cardinals to a 113-32 record, three Metro Conference regular season titles and two Metro Conference Tournament crowns during his college career.

A three-time All-Metro Conference selection, Wagner had a 12.7 career scoring average while also averaging 3.0 assists and 2.5 rebounds. He played in 144 career games, second all-time at Louisville, and started the last 111 games he played.

One of the most clutch performers in U of L basketball history, he ranked sixth in career assists (432) and seventh in career free throw percentage (.808, 336-of-413). He redshirted the 1985 season with a broken foot.

"Milt Wagner is a guy who I have known and worked with on the same staff at Memphis, who when you talk basketball resumes, there are very few people in his stratosphere when you talk about a playing career having won high school state championships in Camden, N.J., having won the National Championship at Louisville and also having won a NBA World Championship with the Los Angeles Lakers in that group with Magic Johnson," said Barbee.

There hasn't been a more accomplished basketball resume from the playing side, and Milt is developing his coaching resume in the things that he has accomplished in the short period of time having worked with him closely at Memphis and then having him as a part of my staff at Auburn and UTEP. His connections are not only nationwide, but they are worldwide because of his experience playing in Europe for several years and obviously the name Milt Wagner rings a bell throughout the country. People remember his success as a player which has helped him be a very successful recruiter. He has brought all of that experience and connections with him to help us get it done at Auburn.

Following his brilliant college career, Wagner was selected in the second round of the 1986 NBA Draft by the Dallas Mavericks. He went on to enjoy a 13-year professional career which included an NBA title for the 1988 World Champion Los Angeles Lakers.

Wagner spent one season with the Miami Heat in 1990-91 and played

in the CBA, as well as nine professional seasons in Israel and Europe.
A four-year letterman at Camden (N.J.) High School, he was a member of the 1979 state high school championship team and was a high school teammate and college teammate of Billy Thompson.

Wagner was one of 10 Louisville players named to the U of L Dream Team. He was a second-team selection on the squad which was picked during a three-month period of fan voting during the 1992-93 season. In 2000, Wagner's No. 20 jersey was retired at the University of Louisville. He earned his bachelor's degree in Sports Communication from

Memphis in 2004.
Born Feb. 20, 1963, Wagner is married to the former Jan Ford of Memphis and they have a daughter, Janay Elise (8). He also has a son Dajuan (29), who played for Memphis and was selected sixth overall by the Cleveland Cavaliers in the 2002 NBA Draft, and has two daughters, Munirah Walker (30), and Dashonda Wagner (25).

# Randall Dickey Dir. of Basketball

**Operations** 

Randall Dickey enters his third season at Auburn and his seventh under head coach Tony Barbee. Dickey has coached in the Southeastern Conference, Big 12 Conference, Pac-10 Conference and Conference USA.

He was an assistant coach under Barbee for the previous six years and begins his first year as Director of Basketball Operations. He handles the day-to-day responsibilities in the basketball office as well as coordinating the Tony Barbee Basketball School summer camp, team budget, team travel, team meals and ordering team apparel. He is also very involved with academics and on-campus recruiting.

Inheriting a team that was a consensus preseason last place pick in the SEC and called "the worst BCS conference team in the country" by some national prognosticators, Auburn has improved in overall and league wins in each of the two seasons of the Barbee era.

Dickey spent six successful seasons at UTEP from 2004-10, five seasons at Oklahoma State from 1994-99 while helping lead the Cowboys to the 1995 Final Four and four seasons at Washington State from 1999-2003.

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"Coach Dickey is a veteran assistant who has been in the business for a long time," said Barbee. "He brings a wealth of knowledge having been in the Big 12, the Pac-10 and helping to rebuild the UTEP program into Conference USA Champions and making the NCAA Tournament. He has been a valued member of my staff."

At Washington State in 2000, he helped put together a recruiting class that was rated as high as 28th by Bob Gibbons and a junior college class that was ranked fifth in the nation.

At Oklahoma State, Dickey coached four all-conference players including Bryant Reeves, who led the Cowboys to the 1995 NCAA Tournament Final Four prior to being chosen sixth overall by the Vancouver Grizzlies in the NBA Draft.

Adrian Peterson, Randy Rutherford and Brooks Thompson also garnered all-conference honors.

The Cowboys compiled a 128-65 record during Dickey's tenure under Eddie Sutton, making four postseason tournament appearances in five years with three of those in the NCAA Tournament in 1995, 1998 and 1999.

Dickey was an administrative assistant and basketball operations director at Oklahoma State for the 1993-94 season.

The Valley Springs, Ark., native started his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Howard College from 1990-91 and Midland College from 1991-93. He began as a head coach at Lakeside High School in Hot Springs, Ark., from 1983-84 and

Corey Speights enters his third year at Auburn, including his second year as Video Coordinator. He worked as an Administrative Assistant under coach Tony Barbee in 2010-11.

Speights averaged 2.1 points in 7.4 minutes in 15 games off the bench for UTEP as a sophomore in 2006-07 while shooting 38.9 percent (7-of-18) from 3-point range and 7-of-7 from the foul line. He scored 18 of his 32 points against Southern Miss as he 9 had points in both games vs. the Golden Eagles, including shooting 6-of-9 from 3-point range.

He scored seven points vs. UC Riverside and made his Miner debut vs. Texas Tech on Nov. 25.

Speights was a first-team All-Conference selection for Central Florida Community College in 2005-06 as he led the Patriots to a 21-10 record by averaging 10.0 points, 3.7 rebounds and 3.3 assists.

He was named the Alabama Class 4A Player of the Year in 2004 as a senior at Livingston High School and was a finalist for Mr. Basketball in Alabama after averaging 24 points, 7.6 rebounds, 5.4 assitss and 2.0 steals.

The Livingston, Ala., native totaled 33 points, 10 rebounds and six assists in the regional championship game vs. Choctaw County High in 2004. He was a national honor roll sutdent at Livingston.

Speights earned a bachelor's in General Studies from UTEP in 2008 and a master's in Health and Human Performance from North Alabama in 2010. Born Oct. 4, 1985, he is the son of Robert and Patricia Speights and has three brothers, John, Derrick and Robert Jr.



# Williams Administrative Assistant

Harper Williams enters his second season as an Administrative Assistant under coach Tony Barbee after a 17-year European professional basketball career.

A four-year college teammate of Barbee at UMass from 1989-93, Williams played professionally in the top leagues of Europe, including the Spanish ACB, the Lega Basket Serie A in Italy, the Heba A-1 in Greece and Ligue Nationale de Basketball. He was a player/coach I nLiga Espanola de Baloncesto – Adecco Oro, Liga Nacional de Baloncesto Profesional and Novo Basquete Brasil.

Williams was the 1992 Atlantic 10 Player of the Year and was a two-time Atlantic 10 Most Outstanding Player in 1992 and 1993 as well as a two-time first-team all-conference selection. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

Williams and Barbee teamed to lead UMass to a 91-39 record and four-straight postseason tournament bids. UMass won back-to-back Atlantic 10 Conference regular season and tournament titles in 1992 and 1993.

The duo led UMass to its first winning season and postseason appearance in 20 years as freshmen in 1990 in the NIT and the NIT Final Four in 1991. Williams drilled a game-tying 3-pointer, his first attempt of the season, to help UMass to a 77-71 victory over Syracuse in the 1992 NCAA Tournament Second Round, giving the Minutemen their first Sweet 16 berth.

Despite missing several games with a broken wrist as a senior in 1992-93, Williams returned to lead UMass to the NCAA Tournament Second Round and a repeat of its Atlantic 10 Conference Championship.

Williams' professional accomplishments include the 1996 Copa de Rey Championship with Manresa, the 2000 French National Champions with Limoge CSP along with the 2000 Korac Cup Championship and the 2000 French King's Cup. He was the Most Spectacular Player in 1994, a French All-Star in 2000, a Greek All-Star in 2001 and ACB All-Star in 2003 and led the ACB in blocked shots in 2002.

Williams' 17-year European playing career consists of playing for Leon (ACB) in 1994, Estudiantes (ACB) in 1995, Manresa (ACB) in 1996, Estudiantes (ACB) in 1997, Leon (ACB) from 1998-99, Limoge CSP (France) in 2000, Pannionas (Greece) in 2001, Imola (Italy) in 2002, Manresa (ACB) from 2003-05, Gran Canarias (ACB) in 2006, Lugo (LEB) in 2007, Caceres (LEB) in 2008, Durango (LNB) in 2009 and France (NBB) in 2010.

The Bridgeport, Conn., native, led Bassick High to the Connecticut state championship with a 23-0 record as a senior in 1989 and was named the Connecticut Player of the Year. Williams earned a bachelor's of arts degree in Education from UMass in 1995.

Jay Gogue began his tenure as Auburn University's 18th president on July 16, 2007.

The Waycross, Ga., native is a two-time Auburn graduate in horticulture, receiving a bachelor's degree in 1969 and a master's in 1971. In 1973, he earned a doctorate in horticulture from Michigan State University.

Shortly after returning to his alma mater, Gogue engaged the talent and insight of the Auburn family toward development of a dynamic and forward-looking strategic plan to guide the University for the future. Students, alums, employees, business leaders and other stakeholders contributed to a roadmap that will strengthen Auburn's academic, research and outreach mission, improve operational efficiency and develop human capital.

Gogue arrived at Auburn with ample experience in the top ranks of academia. He was selected president of New Mexico State University in 2000 and, in 2003, named president of the University of Houston and chancellor of the University of Houston System.

Gogue worked for the National Park Service from 1973 to 1986, rising to the position of chief administrative scientist for several regions of the U.S. Park system. He began his distinguished career in higher education administration in 1986 as associate director of the Office of University Research at Clemson University, where he also served as vice president for research and vice president/vice provost for agriculture and natural resources. Utah State University selected Gogue as provost in 1995.

Gogue met his wife, Susie, in the 8th grade, and they married during their undergraduate years at Auburn. Susie also earned two Auburn degrees. They are the proud parents of three children and have two grandchilden.

He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Golden Key honor societies, Sigma Chi Fraternity, Sigma Xi scientific research society and the National Society of Scabbard and Blade, the honorary military society for all branches of service. Gogue previously served as an accreditation reviewer for the Pacific Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.

Auburn Director of Athletics Jay Jacobs has a vision of leading Auburn Athletics to becoming the nation's preeminent Athletics Department.

In his tenure at the helm of the Tigers' program, the department has prospered athletically, academically and financially.

Under Jacobs' leadership, Auburn Athletics has made major strides benefitting Auburn student-athletes, coaches and fans. The department has focused on five strategic goals under his leadership: Winning, graduating student-athletes, managing the department's fiscal affairs, complying with SEC and NCAA rules and providing a positive game day experience.

The Auburn Athletic Department has consistently ranked in the top 10 percent of the NACDA Directors Cup and has claimed 10 national championships under Jacobs, including a school-record four titles in 2005-06. In 2010, the football program claimed the BCS National Championship, its first national title since 1957. The Auburn equestrian team also won its second national title in 2011. Under Jacobs' watch, Auburn's athletic programs have captured 22 Southeastern Conference titles

Academically, Auburn has earned seven public recognitions by the NCAA for scoring in the 90th-100th percentile nationally in the Academic Progress Rate (APR).

Jacobs served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Tigers Unlimited prior to his appointment as Director of Athletics and has initiated several successful business ventures for the Athletics Department, including a lucrative contract with Under Armour Performance Apparel and a nine-year extension with multimedia rights holder IMG.

During Jacobs' tenure, Auburn has also moved forward with numerous facility projects designed to benefit Tiger athletic programs and their fans, most notably, the construction of the state-of-the-art Auburn Arena and basketball practice facility for the 2010-11 season. The most recent facilities upgrade was a \$16 million multipurpose 100-yard indoor practice facility.

Jacobs was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec.

Jacobs was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec. 22, 2004, after working in almost every area of the Auburn Athletic Department for the previous 20 years.

Jacobs earned his undergraduate and master's degrees in business administration from Auburn in 1985 and 1988, respectively, and was a member of the Auburn football team, earning two letters as an offensive tackle in 1982 and 1983. He is a member of the Auburn chapter of Phi Kappa Phi honorary.

He is married to the former Angie Sapp of Dublin, Ga. The couple has three daughters, Haley, Meagan and Jayne. They are also foster parents.
