



- Auburn has advanced to NCAA Regional play three out of the last four years and four of the last six. The Tigers hosted the 2005 NCAA Regional.
- Auburn has posted 25 wins over top 25 ranked teams during the past four seasons.
- The 2008 senior class has a .711 winning percentage at Jane B. Moore Field, going 59-24 during the past three seasons. The class has a .602 winning percentage overall and has posted 106 wins since 2005.
- Auburn softball plays all its home games at Jane B. Moore Field. The 1,500 seat stadium features indoor batting cages, concession area, two luxury boxes and has served as host for the 2005 NCAA Regional and 2007 SEC Tournament.



and that I can best serve that country by



AUBURN HAD 17 OF ITS 21 PROGRAMS PARTICIPATE IN POSTSEASON ACTION IN 2006-07.



- IN THE LAST THREE ACADEMIC YEARS (SINCE 2004-05), AUBURN HAS WON SEVEN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS (MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING [3], WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING [2], EQUESTRIAN, WOMEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK AND FIELD), EIGHT SEC CHAMPIONSHIPS (FOOTBALL, WOMEN'S GOLF [2], MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING [3], WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING [2]) AND THREE DIVISIONAL TITLES (FOOTBALL [2] AND SOCCER).

- SEVEN PROGRAMS FINISHED IN THE TOP 10 NATIONALLY IN 2006-07, INCLUDING TWO NATIONAL CHAMPIONS AND FIVE PROGRAMS WITH TOP FIVE FINISHES. ACADEMICS

Auburn University is committed to maintaining the highest standard of academic excellence. Auburn's academic curriculum is recognized nationally and internationally by leading education publications for its services in preparing students for challenges of the future.

Auburn student-athletes excel in part because of one of the top student support service programs in the country. Virgil Starks, Associate Athletic Director for Student-Athlete Support Services (SASS) oversees a staff of seven full-time Academic Counselors, a Learning Specialist and two Eligibility Specialists. Auburn's SASS program focuses on skill building and life skills development with an emphasis on helping the transition from high school or junior college to a four-year institution and then life after college.

Student-Athlete Development Center

In early fall, the new state-of-the-art Student-Athlete Development Center will open. The center is located in two floors on top of the Tatum Strength and Conditioning Center. The 32,434 square-foot facility will include administrative offices, counselor offices, a 50-seat multi-function classroom, a 50-seat tiered classroom, an academic excellence recognition area, 40 four-person study rooms, four eight-person study rooms, a 25-station computer laboratory, a study lounge and a library resource lounge.

Student-Athlete Support Services

The Tiger CHAMPS/Life Skills program focuses on five commitments that the NCAA has specified as necessary to a holistic approach to student development programming. Auburn University is committed to the growth and development of its student-athletes by promoting the following areas:

- Commitment to Academic Excellence
- Commitment to Athletic Excellence
- Commitment to Personal Development
- Commitment to Service
- Commitment to Career Development

The Tiger CHAMPS/Life Skills program at Auburn provides a series of services and workshops that are designed to enhance the total development of student-athletes. The Tiger CHAMPS/Life Skills program is committed to meeting the needs of student-athletes and providing interactive activities which promote and develop skills necessary to compete in the "game" of life. In order to accomplish this, the Student-Athlete Support Services (SASS) department has developed a comprehensive program which includes:

- Athlete in Society is a course designed to help student-athletes with civic involvement and community service through service learning.

Other life skills programs include:

- Career Seminars for Student-Athletes
- Tiger Tracks Resume Portfolio
- Career Symposium for Student-Athletes
- Drug/Alcohol Education Program
- Adopt a School Program (Stay in Bounds)

The Life Skills program is uniquely structured so that each counselor has the responsibility of planning activities and/or seminars in a given area of expertise. The Life Skills coordinator directs the implementation of activities and spearheads the development of the Tiger CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The Tiger CHAMPS/Life Skills program was recognized as a Program of Merit by the Division I-A Athletics Directors Association in 2003.

Student-Athlete Support Services Mission Statement

It is the mission of the Office of Student-Athlete Support Services of the Auburn University Athletic Department to promote, assist, and provide counsel to all student-athletes, whether scholarship or walk-on, in the areas of academics, eligibility, admissions, financial aid, career counseling, and substance abuse. Its primary, constant goal is to develop graduates from Auburn University who have contributed in the areas of athletic competition during their tenure of education, who are articulate, confident, poised, positive, cooperative, and mature decision-makers, and who are outstanding examples of Auburn University's commitment to the development of the whole individual.

The University Honors College

The University Honors College at Auburn is part of a long tradition. Swarthmore College established the first honors program in this country in 1922, using as its model the Oxford tutorial system, in which small classes of students and faculty studied the Greek and Latin classics. Other models for honors programs and classes include the Socratic dialogues, the German seminars, and the European guild system. Drawing on these traditions, the University Honors College offers qualified Auburn students a unique academic experience, designed to provide many of the advantages of a small college in the midst of the many diverse opportunities available at a large university. CITY OF AUBURN

Auburn's beautiful main campus graced by greenery and open spaces and highlighted by historic Sanford Park - is made up of 375 buildings spread across 1,875 acres bordered on two sides by farms and woodlands. Buildings in the main campus area are within walking distance of each other. Residence halls are only a short walk from classrooms, dining and athletic facilities.

Auburn is located in the Southeastern United States in east central Alabama about 30 miles from the Georgia border. One of the state's fastest growing cities, Auburn has a population of about 45,000. An adjacent twin-city, Opelika, has a population of about 30,000. Atlanta, Ga. is only 100 miles to the northeast via Interstate 85; Birmingham is 100 miles to the north via U.S. 280 or I-85/65; Montgomery is 50 miles to the west via I-85; and the Gulf beaches are about 200 miles away.

The university enjoys the advantages of security, seclusion and clean air and water. Auburn is a clean city with a mild climate that offers many cultural opportunities. Auburn, Alabama was founded in 1836 by Judge John J. Harper of Harris County, Georgia. Envisioned as a religious, educational and cultural center, Auburn was incorporated as a town on Feb. 2, 1839. By 1856, Auburn University was chartered as the East Alabama Male College and has since become a thriving addition to the city.

With each year, "the loveliest village of the plains" continues to grow and improve. With a population of 45,000 and growing, Auburn offers a wide variety of entertaining events, cultural activities and educational opportunities including recreational events, sports, the Colonial Mall Auburn-Opelika, more than 100 restaurants, two bed and breakfasts, four campgrounds and 1,550 hotel rooms in the area.

Geographically, the city of Auburn and Auburn University meet at what is known as "Toomers Corner."

Here the flourishing community and expanding university create a warm, friendly spirit that can only be described as "Auburn." The bond between the city and university is exemplified along the streets of downtown Auburn where tribute is paid to Auburn University's greatest athletes, coaches and administrators. Known as Tiger Trail of Auburn, this walk of fame consists of 38 granite plaques bearing the names of those honored along the Trail. Each year new plaques are added, as more Auburn women and men are recognized for their contributions to Auburn. The Tiger Trail is sponsored by the Auburn Chamber of Commerce and funded by Auburn people. This tradition represents a connection between the city of Auburn and Auburn University that will remain forever. Truly, the city of Auburn is unique to the state of Alabama. Once the "Auburn Spirit" gets in your blood, you will never want to leave. Come to visit and stay a lifetime.

Some of the activities Auburn offers include:

Chowacha State Park, a 696-acre park with a 26-acre lake, offers rustic cabins, tennis courts, nature trails and camping facilities.

Kiesel Park, willed to the city by Dr. George Kiesel, this property has been developed as a "nature park." A two and one-half mile walking and jogging trail winds in and around gurgling streams, over rolling, tree covered hills and through a wildflower meadow.

Golf - In an area known for big time sports and small town charm, a golfer's dream awaits. The Auburn area offers more than 162 holes of great golf: Auburn University Club, Auburn Links at Mill Creek; Grand National; Indian Pines Golf Complex; Moore's Mill Country Club, Pin Oaks Golf Club; Sougahatchee Country Club and the Driver's Club, a lighted driving range.



Jane B. Moore Field, the home to Auburn softball, is entering its sixth full season and it has never looked better. And the Tigers fully intend to use it to their advantage.

Auburn is coming off its fourth straight winning season at home, going 14-11 at the venerable facility.

In 2006, the Tigers posted a 19-8 record at home which was due in large part to Jane B. Moore Field, which saw an average attendance of 439 fans per game, by far the best in the program's history.

The 1,500 seat complex had the opportunity to shine under the Southeastern Conference microscope last season when Auburn hosted the 2007 SEC Tournament. With seven games in three days, the facility withstood the rigors of SEC competition and proved to be one of the elite facilities in the nation.

It was not, however, the first chance for Jane B. Moore Field to shine under the spotlight. Auburn's 50-18 overall record in 2005 enabled the Tigers to host their first ever NCAA Regional. More than 2,500 fans witnessed the three-day tournament at the picturesque stadium.

The Tigers have utilized their home field advantage, going 107-48 (.690) at Jane B. Moore Field since 2002. Since playing their first game at scenic Jane B. Moore Field in 1998, Auburn has posted a .613 winning percentage.

"Jane B. Moore Field has become a real benefit to our program," Auburn head coach Tina Deese said. "Hosting an NCAA Regional in 2005 was a great step for us. It shows how much we love our complex."

The Tigers played their first full season at the modern Moore Field in 2003, and, in 2004, went 19-5 en route to an NCAA Regional appearance.

The final phase of the softball complex, completed prior to the 2003 season, added 1,400 seats, a concession area, indoor batting cages and a state-of-the-art press box with two luxury boxes.

The Tigers started playing at the facility on April 24, 1998, when they played their first home game at the new on-campus field. The Tigers hosted Georgia, also making it the first SEC game played at the facility. Junior Kim Blair recorded the first hit for the Tigers while senior Ashley Camp drove in Blair for the first run at the new park.

1999 marked the first full season the field was in use. Prior to the new complex, the team played its games at the Auburn city complex.

"The Auburn Complex was adequate," Deese said. "It just wasn't ours. It didn't offer the stadium-type environment that we want to have."

The dream of an on campus facility, which began when softball was added as an intercollegiate, sport started to take form in November of 1996, when the Board of Trustees approved a bid from French and Associates Landscape Architects for the construction of phase one which was intended to include the actual playing surface. French and Associates was responsible for the design and construction of Golden Park in Columbus, Ga., which was host to the 1996 NCAA Women's College World Series and the 1996 Summer Olympic Games Softball competition.

The firm was also responsible for the construction of the South Commons Softball Complex in Columbus, including its centerpiece, the South Commons Stadium, which was the host to the SEC tournament from 1997-2000.

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new complex were held on August 4, 1998, on a plot of land adjacent to the intramural fields, in an area of campus that would eventually be home to the women's sports complex, the McWhorter Center. The complex houses offices for soccer, softball and gymnastics, and also contains the gymnastics team's practice area.

Phase one of the softball complex consisted of the construction of the playing field, including the outfield fences, bullpens, dugouts, and restroom facilities and a state-of-the-art scoreboard.

"We are extremely excited about having a facility of our own. It is hard to be competitive in the SEC without your own on-campus complex," Deese said.

During 1997, the league's inaugural season of softball, six of the eleven sponsoring schools had stadiums. That list included brand new facilities at Tennessee, Florida, Arkansas and Mississippi State. In addition to the obvious recruiting benefits, the complex offers other benefits to the Tigers as well.

The plans for the facility called for it to resemble a scaled down version of the home of Auburn Baseball, Samford Stadium and Hitchcock Field at Plainsman Park. Permanent seating for 1,500 was built in phase two of the project. The Auburn Softball Complex was renamed Jane B. Moore Field in 2002 in honor of Dr. Jane Moore who served more than 20 years as a member of Auburn's Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics. It was dedicated on April 26, 2003.





Built in 2001, the McWhorter Center is the home to the Auburn softball and gymnastics teams.

The facility, which was dedicated on Sept. 1, 2001, houses head coach Tina Deese's and assistant coach offices, team locker rooms, a training room and a team room available to student-athletes.

"The McWhorter Center is a spectacular facility for our players," Auburn head coach Tina Deese said. "It is a first-class facility and allows us to have the amenities to be successful."

The 44,000-square foot McWhorter Center is situated beyond the Jane B. Moore Field outfield fence. The coaches' offices offer a spectacular view of the field.

Players, coaches and staff are afforded just a short walk away from the field after leaving the McWhorter Center locker and training rooms.

The McWhorter Center is one of the finest facilities in the nation.



Athletic Training Room

The training room consists of taping tables, a whirlpool, ice machine and various rehabilitation equipment. Student athletes use the training room before and after practices and games. The softball team has a full-time certified trainer to supervise all activities.



Team Lounge

The team lounge contains a 51" big screen television, a DVD for viewing game film and computers with Internet access for homework, research and e-mail. Chairs, tables and couches provide a great atmosphere for team meetings and post-game events.



Locker Room

The carpeted locker room has wooden lockers for each student-athlete, individually stalled showers, restrooms and a state-of-the-art stereo system.

Additional Facilities

The Auburn softball team has the finest in weight training equipment. The team trains at the James T. Tatum Strength and Conditioning Center, a 14,000 square foot facility which opened in 2002 and is situated at the Auburn Athletic Complex.

Adjacent to the weight room is a 20-yard astroturf hill, set at 45 degrees, which is used for speed and endurance conditioning. The center also houses the strength and conditioning coaches' offices.

Auburn athletes train indoors at the John H. Watson Fieldhouse, which contains a 40-yard artificial turf field. The facility, which measures 155 feet by 210 feet, has a heating system and is cooled by large fans. It was dedicated on Sept. 4, 1999. In addition, the Tigers also have the use of a Sprinturf artificial field outside the fieldhouse. The Sprinturf field is available to all Auburn athletes and is regularly used by the Tiger football team.

The Tigers have the benefits of one of the finest strength and conditioning staffs in the nation. Head strength and conditioning coach Kevin Yoxall supervises all strength programs for men's and women's sports and has been at Auburn since 1999. Joe Walker serves as the strength and conditioning coach for the Auburn softball team and is entering his fourth season on the Plains.



With one of the top returning pitchers in the Southeastern Conference in the circle for her sophomore season, the Auburn Tigers will rely on pitching and defense as the backbone of their 2008 season.

All-SEC Freshman pitcher Anna Thompson looks to continue her success from 2007 when she posted an Auburn freshman record 15 wins to go along with a 1.72 ERA and 291 strikeouts, second most in the league.

The senior class of Jorja Bell, Brittany Day, Starr Dorsey, Jessica Martin and Brittany Scott will be counted on to ease the transition to the SEC for the Tigers' eight freshmen.

"It's an exciting season for us," 12th-year head coach Tina Deese said. "We will be looking to our seniors to help lead the way. It's going to be challenging, without a doubt, but the young players are easily motivated, they are very talented and very hungry."

Pitching


The Tigers' pitching staff features senior Brittany Day, Thompson and freshmen Angel Bunner and Lauren Schmalz.

"Anna obviously brings a lot of game experience and is center stage," Deese said. "But the thing that will help her is the players around her. We will have a lot of different looks from the other pitchers and I think that will be a real strength for us."

Last season, Thompson logged 187.0 innings, including 92.2 in SEC play, while holding opponents to a .169 batting average.

"Anna is strong mentally and knows what she needs to do in order to be successful," Deese said. "Going into this season, she is really working on refining her game. She has a tremendous amount of confidence in what she is doing."

Bunner competed for Conwell-Egan High School in Fairless Hills, Pa., where she earned First Team All-Southeastern Pennsylvania honors as a senior.

"Angel is our lefty and brings another dimension to our staff," Deese said. "I look for her to get us a lot of ground balls and keep hitters off balance. She is really working hard to improve her game."

Schmalz begins her Auburn career after helping lead Everglades High School to a state title her senior year. She was named the *Miami Herald* Pitcher of the Year in 2007, while also being named an EA Sports Second Team All-America.

"Lauren did some really good things in the fall," Deese said. "She has a lot of potential. She has really improved her game in the short time she has been here. I think she has a very good chance to be a factor for us this season."

Day, from Columbus, Ga., looks to continue her success from 2007 when she recorded a career-best 46 strikeouts in 55.1 innings of work.

"Brittany is certainly one of our senior leaders and someone we count on to lead the way," Deese said. "Brittany, and the other seniors, will have to help prepare the younger players for the demands of the season, especially conference play."

Outfield

Speed will be in strong supply with the Tigers' outfielders in 2008.

Senior Brittany Scott, juniors Taryn Gray and Myesha Finney and freshmen Krista Clyde and Katie Colton all bring solid defensive skills and excellent range to the table.

"Colton, Clyde and Finney all have good arms as does Taryn Gray," Deese said. "We are going to have great speed. Krista Clyde has great speed, Colton has terrific instincts and Myesha is very athletic."

Slated to play in right, Finney appeared in 55 games, starting 40, last season. The Atlanta, Ga., native, scored 16 runs and was a perfect 4-for-4 in stolen bases in 2007.

Colton, from Yucaipa, Calif., will play left along with Scott, who is from Mount Dora, Fla.

"Katie has seen a lot of good pitching," Deese noted. "She is a gap type hitter with the power to put it over. She is a very intelligent player. She can play the short game as well, so that's another dimension to her game."

Clyde, from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., will play center.

"She has tremendous potential," Deese said. "She has a lot of room to grow as a player and if she does, there's no telling what she can do. She is a very talented player."

Infield

Behind the plate, the Tigers will primarily have senior Jorja Bell and junior Tatiana Fernandez. Senior Jessica Martin will also see time at catcher and pinch-



hitter.

Bell, from Auckland, New Zealand, started 50 games last season and worked extensively with Thompson during record-setting freshman season.

"Jorja and Anna worked well together last year," Deese said. "That was key for us. Jorja did a great job with her, they are really on the same page."

Fernandez, from Miami, Fla., started 51 games and hit .293 with 24 RBI and six home runs.

"If Tatiana can bring the presence she had in the fall to the field this spring, she will have a good season," Deese noted. "Mentally, she has really matured and she continues to do so."

On the corners, the Tigers will have senior Starr Dorsey at third base and junior Lindsey Harrelson at first base.

Up the middle, freshmen Kyndall White and Cassie Trosclair will take over at shortstop and second base, respectively.

"This is our best defensive lineup," Deese said. "They have good range at each position and have very good footwork."

Harrelson, from Alexander City, Ala., started 56 games last season primarily at shortstop.

"Lindsey is very athletic and has a quick glove," Deese said. "She is learning a new position, but she is a quick learner and will do well at first."

In 2007, Harrelson was second on the team with seven steals, an element Deese noted will be valuable in 2008.

"We're going to need her speed in the game," Deese said. "She's mature and a smart base runner."

Despite a lack of experience at shortstop and second base, Deese is confident in the abilities of White and Trosclair.

"Cassie is a natural infielder and she is much more suited to play second base," Deese said. "Kyndall is very athletic and plays the position well."

White, from Pinson, Ala., was an all-state performer each year during her high school career.

"Kyndall can go to her left with the best of them," Deese said. "She is poised at the plate and doesn't get too up or down. She has the power to put it out of the park."

Trosclair, from Harvey, La., will be counted on to use her speed to spark the Tigers' offense.

"It's about speed, speed, speed with Cassie," Deese



said. "She'll put the ball in play and use her speed."

As the lone senior on the infield, Dorsey's play at third will be significant to the Tigers' defensive success.

"Starr is the hometown favorite and will be counted on to play well on defense," Deese said. "She is very solid in the field and has really worked on her game at the plate this fall."

Schedule

The Tigers are slated to play 25 games before the start of SEC action in March. Auburn will play a total of six teams that won at least 39 games in 2007 to prepare them for the rigors of conference play.

Auburn begins the season by hosting the Tiger Invitational for the eighth consecutive year. The tournament is set for Feb. 15-17, and features Evansville, McNeese State, Gardner Webb, Marshall and Furman.

After a stop in Mobile to play South Alabama in their first road game of the season, the Tigers head to Orlando for a tournament hosted by the University of Central Florida.

The Tigers open play with host UCF Feb. 22, and then play George Mason, Drake and Birmingham Southern before closing with Michigan Feb. 24.

Auburn will participate in the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Leadoff Classic Feb. 29 - March 2, in Columbus, Ga.

The Tigers open the NFCA Classic with Georgia Tech and then face Winthrop, Charlotte, Massachusetts and Syracuse.

The Tigers return home for their last regular season tournament of the season. Auburn hosts the War Eagle Classic March 7-9.

"The non-conference schedule always plays such an important role in your RPI," Deese said. "We have 25 games to get us ready for the SEC and we will face some very good competition in these tournaments."

Auburn's home SEC schedule features Mississippi State, Arkansas, national runner-up Tennessee, Alabama and Kentucky.

"It's always challenging playing in the SEC," Deese said. "Each team you play is so talented and you have to bring your 'A' game every time out."

Speak of Auburn softball and the name Tina Deese immediately comes to mind. The architect of the softball program at Auburn, Deese has turned the Tigers into a national power by stressing academics, leadership, hard work and loyalty.

Deese has achieved success two-fold. Her teams win on the field and in the classroom, paving the way for Auburn student-athletes to achieve success after their collegiate careers.

Auburn rolled to a program-record 50 victories in 2005 and hosted its first ever NCAA Regional at picturesque

Jane B. Moore Field. For the second straight season, the Tigers finished in the top 25 of both collegiate polls.

Deese guided Auburn to its second straight, second-place finish in the SEC's Western Division in 2005. The Tigers went 21-8 in conference play, and did not allow Alabama to clinch first until the second-to-last day of regular season play.

Auburn made an unprecedented second straight appearance in postseason play, and went 1-2 in the NCAA Regional at Jane B. Moore Field. Even though the Tigers failed to advance to a Super Regional, Deese's program showed it will continue to be a force to be reckoned with.

With the creation of a program comes hurdles. Deese has met these head on, and, as the only head coach in Auburn's history, she has been successful every step of the way.

In 11 seasons with the Tigers, Deese has guided Auburn to five winning seasons, including three in the last four years. Those winning seasons have coincided with Auburn's NCAA Regional appearances as the Tigers have become postseason veterans.

Auburn's players have done it right in the classroom as well. The team placed seven players on the 2005 SEC Academic Honor Roll, a program record. In nine seasons, the Tigers have seen 42 players on the conference's honor roll. Auburn has had at least two in every season.

The 12th-year head coach has stressed the importance of giving back to the community as well. Her players often visit children at schools in the Lee County community. In September, members of the Auburn softball team helped raise money for the American Red Cross which helped fund recovery efforts for the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

Deese has proved to be a master at finding and developing talent. In the past three seasons, two of her players -- Holly Currie and Tara Donaldson -- have joined the program after being named Miss Softball of Alabama.

In turn, Deese has mentored five All-Americans and nine All-Region players. She has been recognized in the SEC as well, as 15 Tigers -- including a program-record four in 2005 -- have been named to the All-SEC Team. Last season, the Tigers placed three players on the first-team, tying for most



in the conference.

On a conference note, Deese's hard work into building the Tigers into an SEC and national power has not gone unnoticed. In 2002, after guiding Auburn to a then-program best 38-27 record, she was named the Co-SEC Coach of the Year.

Deese helped oversee the creation of Jane B. Moore Field, a sparkling facility on the edge of the Auburn campus. Since 1998, the team has called the field on the edge of campus home but it wasn't until 2003 when the final phase of Jane B. Moore Field was completed that the Tigers could truly call it home.

Deese has used that home-field advantage. Since 1999, the Tigers have gone 124-76 at the picturesque stadium. In the past three seasons, the Tigers have dominated opponents on the Plains, going an impressive 67-33.

In 2005, that home field advantage was never more prevalent. The Tigers went 26-5 at home. Deese parlayed that dominance and made Jane B. Moore Field an NCAA Regional host site for the first time in program history.

Deese took over the program before its first season in 1997. Since then, she has built the program to one which expects an NCAA Tournament berth every year. Among her many achievements at Auburn, which includes close to 300 wins, Deese has led Auburn to one season with 50 victories, two with 40 or more wins and seven seasons with 30 or more victories.

In 2004, Deese posted a 42-18 record with the Tigers, the best season in program history. The Tigers won 19 games in the SEC, finishing second in the Western Division, and were a game away from earning a spot in the SEC Championship game. Auburn finished the season ranked 20th, a program first.

In her first season, Deese led Auburn to a 34-35 overall record and a third-place finish in the SEC Tournament. However, tough times followed as the Tigers suffered two more losing seasons before Deese guided the program to its first winning season in 2000. That team finished 34-31 overall and proved that Auburn was a program on the rise.

Deese was also responsible for starting the softball pro-



gram at Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala.

In her eight seasons at Huntingdon, Deese proved her ability to build a program as she amassed a 286-123 record. She led her teams to seven straight winning seasons and third-place finishes in the NAIA (National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics) in 1992 and 1994. Those years, she won 49 and 55 games, respectively. In 1992, Deese was named NAIA District 27 Coach of the Year.

In addition to her duties as Huntingdon softball coach, Deese also handled volleyball head coaching duties.

Prior to her arrival at Huntingdon, Deese served as a pitching coach at her alma mater, Florida State, from 1985-86.

Deese began her playing career in 1982 as a member of Golden West College's (Calif.) Varsity Softball team. She helped lead the team to the California State Championship in 1983 and was named the California State Championship Most Valuable Player.

Her accomplishments at Golden West led her to Florida State where she once again was greeted with immediate success. In 1984, her first season with the Seminoles, Deese led the nation in strikeouts per seven innings at 11.6, which remains tied for fifth in NCAA history. As a result, she was named the Lady Seminoles Most Valuable Player while helping lead the team to the Florida State Championship. She was also named to the All-Southeast Region First Team - a feat she duplicated her second season and final season at Florida State.

Deese received a bachelor of science degree in leisure services and studies from Florida State in 1986. She later received a bachelor of arts degree from Huntingdon College in human performance and kinesiology in 1994. She completed her master of arts in teaching from Troy State University in 1995.

Deese and her husband, Allen, have one son, Tyler, 14, and daughter, Jessi, 10.



Jack Byerley is in his fourth season as an assistant coach for the Auburn softball team. He was named to the staff in August 2004, after two years as the head coach at Francis Marion University in Florence, S.C.

Prior to joining Auburn, Byerley led Francis Marion to a 73-26 record as the team's head coach. He guided the Patriots to a 36-9 mark in 2003, then bettered that a year later, going 37-17. In 2003, Francis Marion earned its first ever national ranking in Division II play.

Byerley served as the top assistant at the University of Florida from 2000-02, helping lead the Gators to an NCAA Regional appearance in 2001. With Florida, Byerley was responsible for working with the team's infielders and hitting, recruiting and team travel.

A pioneer and strong promoter of fastpitch softball, Byerley started the fastpitch program at Central Alabama Community College in 1996. He saw immediate success with the Trojans, posting a 205-47 record from 1996-2000. While with Central Alabama, Byerley guided the Trojans to four conference titles (1997-2000) and made three consecutive trips to nationals. He earned Alabama Junior College Athletic Association Coach of the Year honors in 1997 and 2000.

While with the Trojans, Byerley also served for four years as the president of the AJCA Coaches Association and was the chairman for the NJCAA All-American selection committee. Taking the chance to impact more athletic lives, Byerley also coached the Central Alabama volleyball program for four seasons.

Byerley had a long tenure at Robertsdale (Ala.) High School, heading the program from 1981-1996. However, in 1995, he may have made his biggest impact, starting the fastpitch program at Robertsdale. In two seasons as head coach of the fastpitch program, Byerley was 107-9 as his teams claimed back-to-back state titles.

Prior to that, Byerley guided the slowpitch program at Robertsdale from 1989-94, making the state tournament five consecutive times. Overall, as the head coach of Robertsdale High School softball, Byerley compiled a 211-46 record.



Auburn finished the season 26-30 overall and 10-18 in Southeastern Conference play. The Tigers took fifth place in the SEC's Western Division and missed the SEC Tournament by one game, finishing ninth overall in the conference.

2007 Honors ... Freshman Anna Thompson and sophomore Ashley Arcuri were recognized by the SEC for their outstanding play this season.

Thompson earned SEC All-Freshman honors after finishing second in regular season conference games with 136 strikeouts and a 7-9 record. She also earned Freshman of the Week honors Feb. 19 and April 30.

Arcuri batted .375 with a team-leading eight doubles during conference play to earn All-SEC Second Team honors. It was her first conference award.

About The Departing Seniors ... The Auburn senior class consisted of Holly Currie, Sara Ghezzi, Nicole Russo and Lauren Walton and may be perhaps the most successful senior class in program history.

The Tigers won 154 games over the past four seasons, tying the 2006 senior class for the most over that stretch. The 2007 seniors posted 65 SEC wins -- an average of 16 per season -- while picking up 25 victories over top 25 teams.

The 2007 class made three NCAA Regional trips and hosted its first postseason regional in 2005. The four seniors combined for three All-SEC honors -- including two by Ghezzi -- and a Second-Team All-American award that was taken by Currie in 2005.

Statistically, they combined for 517 hits, 84 doubles, 55 home runs and 284 runs batted in over the four seasons.

Leaves; Their Stats ... The Tigers will lose four seniors. They are: Holly Currie, Sara Ghezzi, Nicole Russo and Lauren Walton. Here's a look at their career statistics:

RPI ... Despite having a losing record, the Tigers remained in the top 50 of the unofficial Ratings Percentage Index. Auburn ended the season with the best RPI of any losing team, earning a No. 42 overall ranking.

The Tigers owe a large part of that to the team's schedule, which featured some of the best teams in the nation en route to a No. 7 strength of schedule ranking. Auburn ended the regular season with a No. 2 ranking.

The Tigers had the highest RPI of any team that did not make an NCAA Regional and had a better number than 23 teams that did.

an average of 39 per season -- including 65 in conference games.

Sara Ghezzi earned two All-SEC honors, taking first team in 2005 and second team in 2006. Holly Currie earned second-team All-American and Second-Team All-SEC honors in 2005.

Somewhat Eerie ... The 2007 team nearly mirrored the 2003 club perfectly. The teams both posted 26 wins -- which gives the 2006 seniors and 2007 seniors a tie for 154 victories over a four-year stretch -- and had at least 30 losses. The 2003 team lost 31 games to 30 this season.

Of course, is the 2008 team follows the pattern, head coach Tina Deese and the Tigers will be in great shape. The 2004 club went 42-18, earning the program's second-ever NCAA Regional appearance. That paved the way for 50 victories in 2005.

Anna Will Be Key For That ... If the Tigers are to mimic past seasons, freshman and future sophomore Anna Thompson will be a big reason for that. The Huntsville, Ala., native, posted incredible numbers in 2007, putting together the best rookie season in team history.

She went 15-15 overall and finished with 291 strikeouts, which placed her second among all pitchers in SEC regular season play. Thompson finished with a 1.72 ERA and allowed just 111 hits in 187 innings. Her final WHIP of the season stood at 1.07 while she struck out 10.9 batters per seven innings.

Currie Firm At No. 3 ... Holly Currie posted nine home runs in 2007, giving her 36 for her career, which places her third all-time in team history. She trails Mary Petrie, who hit 42, and Ashley Moore, who hit 40 round-trippers.

But She's No. 1 From The Circle ... Holly Currie also got it done from the circle. The Pisgah, Ala., native, finished No. 1 in team history with 782 strikeouts and posted 60 victories, which ties her with Kristen Keyes for the most in an Auburn career.

More On Thompson ... At the surface, Anna Thompson's 2007 campaign is impressive. Look even further, however, and one can appreciate how special it was.

Thompson finished the season with 14 double-digit strikeout efforts, placing her just one off the team record of 15 set by Kristen Keyes in 2004. Thompson struck out 14 in the second game of a doubleheader March 31 against LSU, which was just two off the single-game SEC record of 16 set by Keyes against Tennessee in 2003.

It gets better. Thompson allowed two inherited runners to score in the team's season-opener Feb. 8 against DePaul in Hawaii. From that point on, she did not allow an inherited runner to score, styming 23 straight.

Ghezzi Starts Every Game ... The Tigers had four players who started all 56 games this season, but it was Sara Ghezzi who truly made her mark at one position. She was the only Tiger to play right field this season. She played every inning of every game.

To Set A Record ... Myesha Finney already held the single-season record for most hit by pitches, but the sophomore took it to a career level after getting plunked twice against Tennessee during the Tigers' series with the Lady Vols. Finney has now been hit 28 times in two seasons with the Tigers, which surpasses Ashley Moore (1999-2002), who had 26.

Finney was hit 19 times in 2007, which also stands as the Auburn single-season record.

Scoring, Scoring, Scoring ... When the Auburn offense lit up the scoreboard in 2007, it did so in style. The Tigers finished the 2007 season 22-4 when scoring three or more runs in a game. At home, that number was a healthy 13-0.

Since 2001, the Tigers are 208-49 when scoring three or more runs in a game.

From The Pitching Side Of Things ... Meanwhile, when the Tiger pitching staff and defense limit what the opponents can do, the Tigers will come out on top. Auburn was 22-8 in 2007 when allowing two runs or less and 202-31 since 2001.

Just Learn To Say 'No' ... Holly Currie's no-hitter against Georgia State Feb. 14 marked the seventh of her career. The senior holds the AU career record for no-no's. She also holds the single-season record with five last season. She is the only Tiger with a perfect game, achieved February 11, 2005 against the College of Charleston.

In only its 12th year of existence, SEC softball continues to grow as a national force in collegiate softball.

The Southeastern Conference qualified seven teams for the 2007 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee as the conference made its 10th overall, fifth consecutive, Women's College World

Series appearance.

A record five teams advanced to the Super Regional rounds and Tennessee led the charge all the way to the Championship series of the World Series. History was made as the Lady Vols became the first SEC team to advance to the Championship Series and was part of the most-viewed WCWS game on TV.

As the runners-up, Tennessee finished the season ranked No. 2, the highest ever by an SEC team.

Tennessee was the SEC Regular Season Champion as LSU claimed the SEC Tournament Championship. The Lady Vols' Ralph and Karen Weekly were named SEC Co-Coach of the Year, while India Chiles earned SEC Player of the Year honors.

Four-time All-American Monica Abbott of Tennessee earned SEC Pitcher of the Year, while teammate Lindsay Schutzler earned SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year honors.

Mississippi State's Chelsea Bramlett was tabbed SEC Freshman of the Year. With seven teams, the SEC trailed only the PAC-10, with eight, that advanced to the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

Softball came under the auspices of the Southeastern Conference in the 1996-97 season. Since that time, nine different conference teams have made appearances in the NCAA Championship, including four teams earning Women's College World Series berths - one by South Carolina in the inaugural season, Alabama in 2000 and 2005, LSU in 2001 and 2004 and Tennessee in 2005, 2006 and 2007.

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances and four teams have climbed into the Top 10 (Alabama, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee) of the NFCA/USA Today Poll.

At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC Softball. In 1999 alone, SEC teams made 29 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the flagship team of the league with a rich history in softball dating back 33 seasons. The Gamecocks have made 15 NCAA Regional and three Women's College World Series appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980's before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC.

Tennessee added softball in 1995-96, one year before its inception in the SEC.

Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs in 1996-97 to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Championships.

As the sport continues to grow in competitiveness and popularity, the SEC has had five different regular season champions and four different conference tournament champions.

Noting the SEC

- ♦ SEC Teams have won 555 games over Top 25 opponents in the past seven years.
- ♦ The SEC has made 44 appearances on FOX Sports Net South, including the last eight SEC Tournament Championship Games.
- ♦ Game three of the WCWS Championship finals between Tennessee and Arizona was the most watched WCWS game on TV in NCAA history. With more than 1.6 million households, and a 1.8 rating, it marks the most-viewed NCAA WCWS game on ESPN or ESPN2.
- ♦ 2007 marks the first time that three SEC Teams have been ranked in the top six heading into the NCAA Tournament.
- ♦ Tennessee's No. 2 ranking in the final USA Today/NFCA Coaches Poll is the highest finish by any SEC school. Prior to the 2007 season, the highest ranking any SEC team has been in the final USA Today/NFCA Coaches Poll is third. LSU tied for third in 2001, and was ranked third in 2004. In 2005, Tennessee finished the season with a No. 3 ranking.
- ♦ The SEC has had three teams finish the season ranked in the Top 10 twice. In 2007, Tennessee finished No. 2, Alabama was No. 9 and LSU was No. 10. In 2005 Tennessee finished the season with a No. 3 ranking, Alabama was No. 7 and Georgia was No. 9.



Auburn University has a proud and dynamic history. The institution was chartered on Feb. 1, 1856, as the East Alabama Male College, a private liberal arts school established by Alabama Methodists to foster Christian education.

A single four-story building was completed at a cost of \$111,000 in 1859 with 80 students enrolled and a faculty of five. Five male students were graduated in the first commencement held. When Alabama seceded from the Union, faculty and students resigned to enlist for the duration of the Civil War. Among those joining was William J. Samford, who would later become governor of Alabama.

The college building, then named Old Main, was used as a Confederate hospital from 1864 until classes resumed in 1866. When fire destroyed Old Main in 1887, it was replaced on the same site in 1888 by Samford Hall, named after Gov. Samford. Today Samford Hall serves as AU's administrative headquarters.

The college struggled in the shattered Southern economy during the years after the Civil War. Those that pledged large sums to the college went bankrupt and could not meet their pledges. The Methodist Church granted the institution to the state in 1872 for use as a land-grant university under the Morrill Act, signed by President Lincoln in 1862. The institution then became the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Alabama, changing from the private liberal arts school to a state-supported college with an emphasis on the new scientific and agricultural programs.

Continuous expansion followed. In 1899, the Alabama Legislature decided a new name was needed to reflect the expanded role of the institution. The college's name was changed to the Alabama Polytechnic Institute.

From the beginning, however, virtually everyone connected with the university ignored official names, preferring always the name selected for the town, founded in 1836, where the institution was located--Auburn. Elizabeth Harper, the daughter-in-law of the settlement's founder, was inspired by a line



from Oliver Goldsmith's poem, "The Deserted Village," which reads, "Sweet Auburn, loveliest village of the plain." Would the history of this institution have been the same had it been named Geneva as once was proposed for naming the town? The story goes that straws were drawn for naming the town Geneva or Auburn. Auburn won out.

As Charles C. Thach, the university's sixth president said, "The Alabama Polytechnic Institute, a high sounding phrase, is fit for legal document and grave legislation, but not to conjure with and not to yell and not to dream with as is 'Fair Auburn.'" The Legislature agreed, and in 1960 Alabama

Polytechnic Institute became Auburn University. Female students were first admitted to Auburn in 1892, making Auburn the oldest four-year coeducational school in Alabama and the second oldest in the Southeast.

Today, 12 schools and colleges advance the University's outstanding programs of teaching, research and service. The current colleges and schools and the dates of their original inceptions are: College of Agriculture, 1872; College of Architecture, Design and Construction, 1907; College of Business, 1967; College of Education, 1915; Samuel Ginn College of Engineering, 1872; School of Forestry and Wildlife Sciences, 1984; College of Human Sciences, 1916; College of Liberal Arts, 1986; School of Nursing, 1979; James Harrison School of Pharmacy, 1885; College of Sciences and Mathematics, 1986; College of Veterinary Medicine, 1907; Graduate School, 1872. In 1986, a university reorganization created the College of Liberal Arts and the College of Sciences and Mathematics from the former School of Arts and Sciences (1872), as well as portions of the School of Agriculture and Biological Sciences and the School of Architecture and Fine Arts (both subsequently renamed).

Auburn's greatest growth and development came after World War II. From a cam-





pus of 35 buildings in 1946, the university's multi-million dollar physical complex has grown to approximately 375 buildings on 1,840 acres. The Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station conducts crop, animal and soil experimentation statewide, and Extension agents are stationed in all 67 Alabama counties. Main campus enrollment currently exceeds 23,000, with more than 1,100 faculty.

In 1967, the State Legislature approved a \$5 million bond issue for the purpose of establishing a four-year university at Montgomery under the supervision and control of the Auburn University Board of Trustees. It was named Auburn University at Montgomery. AUM temporarily began operation in the former Extension Center of the University of Alabama in 1969. The Montgomery community raised money to purchase a 500-acre site seven miles east of the city off I-85. The new campus was built and occupied in 1971. Currently its enrollment stands at approximately 5,000.

Economic Impact Highlights

The Campus/City

Auburn's beautiful main campus--graced by greenery and open spaces and highlighted by historic Samford Park--is made up of 375 buildings spread across 1,875 acres. Buildings in the main campus area are within walking distance of each other. Residence halls are only a short walk from classrooms, dining and athletic facilities. Auburn is located in the Southeastern United States in east-central Alabama about 30 miles from the Georgia border.

One of the state's fastest growing cities, Auburn has a population of about 47,000. An adjacent twin-city, Opelika, has a population of about 30,000. Atlanta, Ga., is only 100 miles to the northeast via Interstate 85; Birmingham is 100 miles to the north via U.S. 280 or I-85/65; Montgomery is 50 miles to the east via I-85; and the Gulf beaches are about 200 miles away.





DR. JAY GOGUE

Auburn President

Jay Gogue began his tenure as Auburn University's 18th president on July 16, 2007.

The Waycross, Ga., native is a 1969 AU alumnus. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in horticulture from AU and a doctorate in horticulture from Michigan State University in 1973.

Gogue arrived at AU with ample experience in the top ranks of University leadership.

He was selected president of New Mexico State University in 2000 and, in 2003, named chancellor of the University of Houston System and president of the University of Houston.

Gogue worked for the National Park Service from 1973 to 1986, starting as a field research scientist and rising to the position of chief administrative scientist for several regions of the U.S. Park system.

He began his distinguished career in higher education administration in 1986 as associate director of the Office of University Research at Clemson University, where he also served as vice

president for research and vice president/vice provost for agriculture and natural resources. Utah State University selected Gogue as provost in 1995.

Gogue and his wife, Susie, met in the eighth grade as classmates in their native Waycross. They were married during their undergraduate years at Auburn. Susie also earned her undergraduate and graduate degrees from AU. They are the parents of three children and have two grandchildren.

He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Golden Key honor societies, Sigma Chi Fraternity, Sigma Xi scientific research society and the National Society of Scabbard and Blade, the honorary military society for all branches of service. Gogue previously served as an accreditation reviewer for the Pacific Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.

JAY JACOBS

Athletics Director



Auburn Director of Athletics Jay Jacobs has a vision of leading Auburn Athletics to becoming the nation's preeminent Athletics Department. In his brief tenure at the helm of the Tigers' program, the department has prospered athletically, academically and financially.

Under Jacobs' leadership, Auburn Athletics has made major strides that have benefited Auburn student-athletes, coaches and fans.

Athletically, the Tigers have claimed seven national championships under Jacobs, including a school-record four titles in 2005-06, along with nine Southeastern Conference titles. Last year, the Auburn men's and women's swimming and diving programs each won NCAA titles, while eight programs finished in the top 15 nationally, including seven that recorded top 10 finishes on the national level.

Individually in 2006-07, Auburn produced 73 All-Americans, 37 All-SEC performers, 11 NCAA individual and relay champions, 24 Southeastern Conference champions and four Tiger student-athletes were named SEC Athlete of the Year in their respective sport.

Academically, Auburn has earned four public recognitions by the NCAA for scoring in the 90th-100th percentile nationally in the Academic Progress Rate (APR). The APR, which is a formula based upon student-athletes' retention and eligibility, has honored the men's golf program in 2005 and 2006 and the football team in 2006.

In 2006-07, four Auburn student-athletes were Academic All-Americans, four were named SEC Scholar Athletes of the Year, 106 earned Academic All-SEC honors and National Champion Kerron Stewart won the Honda Sports Award for Track and Field, presented annually to the nation's top collegiate female track and field athlete. A total of 40 percent of Auburn student-athletes earned grade point averages of 3.0 or better during the Spring 2007 semester, including 165 student-athletes that were honored at the annual Tiger Torch Banquet.

Jacobs, who gained strong business expertise as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Tigers Unlimited prior to his appointment as Director of Athletics, has initiated several successful business ventures for the Athletics Department.

In December 2005, Auburn signed a five-year contract with Under Armour Performance Apparel to be the official outfitter of the University's athletic teams. The five-year contract, worth over \$10.6 million in sponsorship, product and additional benefits, provides Auburn's athletic teams Under Armour uniforms, cleats, apparel and accessories.

Auburn also extended its multi-media rights contract with ISP Sports for an additional nine years following the end of the current agreement in 2007. The new terms include revenue to the Athletics Department of an average of more than \$5.8 million annually, more than double the previous contract of nearly \$2.4 million per year.

Under Jacobs' leadership, Auburn has also moved forward with numerous facility projects designed to benefit Tiger athletic programs and their fans.

The approval in June 2007 of a new \$92.5 million state-of-the-art basketball arena and practice facility ranks among Jacobs' most significant accomplishments. Groundbreaking for the new arena will occur in the summer of 2008 with the facility opening prior to the 2010-11 season.

The 243,792 square foot facility, which will be built on campus north and west of the existing Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum on Roosevelt Drive, will have an approximate capacity of 9,600. It will include over 29,000 square feet of student-athlete space, a two-court practice facility, coaches offices, the Auburn University Athletic Ticket Office, an AU Team Store, the relocated Lovelace

Museum and two food courts, along with many other amenities.

The most recognizable completed project under Jacobs' watch has been the Jordan-Hare Stadium Phase 1C renovation, which was completed in August 2006. The renovations included new concessions and expanded restroom facilities on the west and east concourses along with a spacious plaza on the west side of the stadium.

For the 2007 football season, Auburn fans will enjoy a new \$2.9 million high definition (HD) video display scoreboard in the south end zone. The first of its kind in the Southeastern Conference, the HD display will measure approximately 30 feet high by 74 feet wide.

In 2005-06, Auburn opened the new Hutsell-Rosen Track, and a new wood floor surface was placed over the old tartan floor at Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum.

For Jacobs, it was only fitting that he was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec. 22, 2004, after working in almost every area of the Auburn Athletics Department for the previous 20 years.

It was the final step for Jacobs in a career that had allowed him to gain a wide range of experiences in collegiate athletics, from the perspective of a student-athlete, to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director for Tigers Unlimited, Auburn's fund-raising arm.

Jacobs grew up just 20 miles from Auburn in LaFayette and made several trips a year to the campus to watch athletic events. Later, after moving to Jacksonville, Fla., where he attended high school, he returned to Auburn for college.

In 1991 he became an Assistant Athletics Director. Three years later, he was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Operations, overseeing a variety of support functions in the Athletics Department.

As the Senior Associate Athletics Director in charge of Tigers Unlimited from 2001-05, Jacobs oversaw the fund-raising efforts that secured approximately \$60 million in gifts the last three years. He spearheaded a \$90 million capital campaign, the largest in Auburn athletics history.

Jacobs earned his undergraduate and master's degree in business administration from Auburn in 1985 and 1988, respectively. He is married to the former Angie Sapp of Dublin, Ga. The couple has three daughters, Haley, Meagan, and Jayne.
