SEC FOOTBALL ... SECOnd TO NONE

During the last five years (2006-10), Southeastern Conference football has experienced success that is unparalleled in its football history and, perhaps, in the college football history. During this tenure, the SEC's achievements have been demonstrated by:

- Triumphs in BCS bowl games, including the BCS National Championship Game
- Non-conference success in regular season and bowl games
- Defeating highly-ranked non-conference teams
- Success in the polls and rankings
- Individual awards and All-America Teams
- Academic and Community Service Standouts
- Continued accomplishments of former SEC student-athletes in the NFL

SEC IN THE BCS

• The SEC has won five consecutive national championships, seven BCS National Championships and 21 overall national titles (AP, BCS, FWAA, coaches poll).

• Four different SEC schools have won the BCS National Championship since 2006 (Auburn, 2010; Alabama, 2009; Florida, 2006 and 2008; LSU, 2007). Tennessee (1998) and LSU (2004) have also won the BCS crown. The Big 12 (Texas and Oklahoma) and the ACC (Miami and Florida State) have each had two schools win titles since 1998.

• Since 2006, half of the slots in the BCS National Championship Game have been taken by SEC teams (5 of 10). The Big Ten and the Big 12 have two each and the Pac-10 has one.

• No other conference has won a BCS National Championship Game since Texas defeated Southern California, 41-38, in the Rose Bowl following the 2005 regular season. The SEC has won the last five.

• An SEC team has led at the end of 16 of the last 20 quarters of BCS National Championship Game play.

• Since 2006, an SEC team has been ranked first in the weekly BCS standings in 18 of the 40 weeks, with four different teams holding the top spot. Florida was first for seven weeks, Alabama for six

weeks, Auburn for three and LSU twice. The Big Ten has held the top spot for 13 weeks (all Ohio State), the Big 12 for five weeks (Texas and Oklahoma twice, Missouri once) and the Pac-10 four weeks (all Oregon).

• The SEC has had more teams ranked in the BCS standings for the most times than any other conference since 2006. The league has had 11 of its 12 teams ranked at one time or another since 2006 for a total of 192 times. The SEC breakdown: LSU (37), Florida (33), Alabama (27), Auburn (22), Georgia (16), Arkansas (15), Tennessee (14), South Carolina (13), Mississippi State (8), Kentucky (4) and Ole Miss (3).

• Since 2006, the SEC has posted a 8-2 record in BCS bowl games, more wins and a higher winning percentage (.800) than any other conference. The win total doubles the next highest conference - Pac-10 (4). Here are the BCS bowl records of all conferences since 2006:

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2010 season.

The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One Bowl has the second selection, making its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The AT&T Cotton and the Outback Bowls share the third and fourth selections from the SEC. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference.

The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the fifth selection of preference from the SEC.

New to the SEC bowl rotation this year, the Gator Bowl has the sixth selection from the SEC.

The Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl has the seventh selection from the SEC.

In selections 8-9, the AutoZone Liberty and BBVA Compass Bowls share the selection over the four-year agreement.

SEC SENDS 10 TEAMS TO BOWL GAMES

For the second straight season, the SEC had 10 teams participating in post-season bowl games. Counting 2010-11, the SEC has sent no less than eight teams to post-season bowls during the last five seasons.

The SEC sent nine teams to bowl games in 2006 and 2007, eight teams in 2008 and 10 teams in 2009 and 2010.

The most wins by the SEC in a bowl season is seven, set in 2007. During the last four years (2006-09), the SEC is 25-11 in post-season bowl games.

TWO NEW COACHES IN SEC

Vanderbilt announced Maryland offensive coordinator/assistant head coach James Franklin as its new head coach on Dec. 17. The Langhorne, Pa. native had spent the last three seasons with the Terps. He also served as offensive coordinator at Kansas State during the 2006-07 seasons and was the wide receivers coach with the Green Bay Packers in 2005. He graduated from East Stroudsburg State in 1995.

Florida announced Texas defensive coordinator/linebacker coach Will Muschamp as its head coach on Dec. 11. Prior to his time at Texas, he was the defensive coordinator at Auburn (2006-07), with the Miami Dolphins (2005), at LSU (2001-04) and Valdosta State (2000). Current Florida coach Urban Meyer will coach the Gators in the Outback Bowl on Jan. 1. He graduated from Georgia in 1994.

The SEC has not had a winner of the Biletnikoff Award (wide receiver), Lou Groza (placekicker), Johnny Unitas (senior quarterback), Ted Hendricks (defensive end) and the ARA Sportsmanship Award in the last five seasons.

• Since 2006, the SEC football student-athletes and coaches have won 43 major individual awards, an average of more than eight per year. The league won an all time high 12 individual honors this season and in 2007.

SEC SCORING TOUCHDOWNS IN BUNCHES

For the 2010 season, SEC teams scored 568 offensive touchdowns and 190 field goals. The 568 offensive touchdowns represents an SEC single-season record. That equates to 74.9 percent of all offensive scores coming from touchdowns and 25.1 percent from field goals. It is the lowest percentage of field goals in a single-season in the SEC since 2006, when SEC teams accounted for 152 field goals (25.1 percent) and 568 offensive touchdowns (74.9 percent). Below is a breakdown of offensive touchdowns and field goals since 1992:

"Competitive depth has been the SEC's self-trumpeted calling card the past several years, and at this point it's hard to argue. Dennis Dodd of CBS Sports first tweeted this amazing stat late Monday night: The SEC has had as many schools (four) win national championships in the past five years (Florida, LSU, Alabama and Auburn) as the Big Ten has in the 74-year history of the AP poll (Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota and Ohio State)." — Stewart Mandel, Sports Illustrated

"I'm picking the SEC to win all the marbles again next season. Louisiana State, with 17 returning starters, stands atop our ridiculously early preseason Top 25. Let's face it, it's really never too early to formulate a Top 25. Plus, it's only natural to wonder if the SEC can produce a sixth straight BCS national champion.

Is the phenomenon bad for college football? No way. I regard the SEC the way I regard the New York Yankees. The SEC and the Yankees set the standard. They give other teams and leagues something to shoot for." — Steven Sipple, Lincoln Journal Star

"The SEC is now 7-0 in BCS title games. The conference has won more than half of those 13 BCS championship games. They ought to rename the system, BCSEC." — Dennis Dodd, CBSsports.com

"For those five consecutive seasons now, the SEC has bullied the rest of the country. The conference is close to retiring the BCS glass football. It is 7-0 in BCS title games, having won more than half the 13 games played. A large reason why is a large defensive tackle who was the latest hulking SEC defender to terrorize a championship game opponent. When Fairley, all 6-feet-5, 300 pounds of him, wasn't threatening to make a big play he was just threatening. The big lug lives on the edge of the rulebook, but you have to admit he puts the fear (of getting pounded into the sod) in opponents. Oregon's LaMichael James, the nation's leading rusher, was held to 49 yards." — more Dennis Dodd, CBSsports.com

"The Southeastern Conference is now 7-0 in BCS championship games and has more national titles in the Bowl Championship Series era than all the other conferences combined. Auburn is the fifth different SEC team to win a BCS championship.

Maybe they should just start handing out the crystal ball at the SEC title game in Atlanta during the first weekend of December?

Of course, there are droves of SEC fans who have been suggesting the same thing for the past few years. They're not kidding, either." — Ralph Russo, Associated Press

"Amid the dignitaries on the post-game podium here Monday night was Southeastern Conference commissioner Mike Slive, whose smile flashed as bright as anyone's.

The winners, and still champion and king of college football: The SEC.

..... Monday's effort added to the defensive dominance that has become the conference's championship trademark.

"At the end of the day," Auburn end Antoine Carter said, "the SEC is the best conference out there." — Dave Curtis, The Sporting News

"Now that Auburn has claimed the BCS national championship, there is no debate about the power structure inside the sport. The SEC is a cut above, and the bragging rights are no small matter to flag-flying residents in the Deep South.

Those five consecutive championships have been captured by four different schools, three from the same division, two from the same state.

What to make of such dominance?

No doubt, the SEC is fertile recruiting territory filled with top-flight coaches. But why do they retain so much talent? For climate and sophistication, you can't tell me that Tuscaloosa holds more appeal than Tempe.

The difference is the culture. It's the people. It's the 20,000 mostly Auburn fans who roamed about the Westgate area Monday night, screaming "War Eagle" while the championship game played inside a domed stadium just a few blocks down the road." — Dan Bickley, Arizona Republic

"A key question is what separates the Southeastern Conference, which has won the last five national championships. Some insights are obvious. As Auburn coach Gene Chizik said Tuesday in accepting his national-championship trophies, "Football in the Southeast is king."

The SEC schools lie in recruiting territory that might be the most fertile in the country. Because the SEC cares so much and has so many top-notch programs, the pressure is on every school to do everything it can simply to remain competitive. They make each other better. The SEC champion will be battle-tested and highly rated, two key ingredients for reaching the national championship game and being successful." — Herb Gould, Chicago Sun Times

"Football titles are won by the big people.

Usually, the big people from the Southeastern Conference.

The final score of this BCS Championship Game was 22-19. That is not an accurate measure of the mass-and-force advantage that both Auburn lines, particularly the defensive line, held over Oregon." — Mark Whicker, Orange County Register

"Why does the SEC win championships? It's the big guys up front. Pat Dye, the former Auburn coach, told me a long time ago that the biggest difference in the SEC and other football conferences is the big, fast defensive linemen who grow up and play in the South. It was clear in Monday night's game that Oregon had not seen anybody like defensive tackle Nick Fairley. The SEC produces more of those players than any other conference. The SEC has won five straight national championships. That is not a coincidence." — Tony Barnhart, CBS College Sports

"When the college football season begins anew in about eight months, there probably won't be a Southeastern Conference team at the top of the polls. However, by season's end, don't be surprised if another SEC team does finish on top.

Auburn became the fifth consecutive SEC team to win the Bowl Championship Series title by defeating Oregon 22-19 Monday night at University of Phoenix Stadium.

..... Still, the numbers are hard to ignore. The SEC's streak became the most dominating run for a league in eight decades, matching the Big Ten's five consecutive championships won by Michigan and Minnesota from 1932-36 -- and four came before the Associated Press began its news media poll. Auburn became the fourth different SEC school to play for BCS title in the last five seasons. Since 2006, no other conference has had more than two different schools play for the national title. To put the SEC's recent dominance in perspective, consider that the Big Ten has won just two championships in the past 40 years, by Michigan in '97 (shared with Nebraska) and Ohio State in '02. The SEC won its 10th in 19 years." — Kelly Whiteside, USA Today

"Uncle! We concede. The rest of the country, that is. Nobody plays college football like they do below the Mason-Dixon Line, which is not to be confused with the Auburn defensive line.

Compared to the Southeastern Conference, the Big Ten is a big nothing. The Pac-10 is a pack of unfulfilled promises.

Five straight national championships for the SEC. Two in a row for the state of Alabama (or acknowledging the refusal by the fans and alumni even to acknowledge the existence of the opposing school), the state of Auburn.

A year ago, the Crimson Tide folks (yes, that's a good commercial on ESPN, "Roll Tide") were gloating as much about their success as Auburn's failure. Twelve months, it's gone the other way. Sweet Home Alabama. Or Auburn." — Art Spander, RealClearSports.com

"We are witnesses to history that seems unbelievable. At least it feels that way to those of us not from the South.

With Auburn's 22-19 victory over Oregon on Monday, the Southeastern Conference has won the past five national titles since Texas beat USC after the 2005 season.

Those chants of "S-E-C-I, S-E-C-I, S-E-C-I" may be annoying, but they carry great weight on the heels of Auburn, Alabama, Florida, LSU and Florida waltzing back home with the crystal football.

Since the debut of the Associated Press poll in 1936, only once has a major conference put together a streak longer than two. Yep, the SEC won three straight from 1978-80, as Alabama won the first two followed by Georgia.

For good measure, the conference owns three of the past four Heisman winners — Tim Tebow, Mark Ingram and Cam Newton. And Tebow got more first-place votes than 2008 winner Sam Bradford." — Douglas Pils, Houston Chronicle

"You know what they say about something that doesn't kill you only making you, well, pretty darned formidable.

Four different Southeastern Conference teams have won the last five BCS championship games, and thus the national title. That's impossible to do, which is why nobody has done it since the Big Ten back in the 1930s, when it was probably a little bit easier. And, in the 13-year history of the BCS, the SEC is 7-0 in the last game. Only one other conference, the Big 12, has won even two (Oklahoma in 2000, Texas in 2005). Each of the other BCS conferences - Pac-10 (Southern Cal in 2004), Atlantic Coast (Florida State in 1999), Big East (Miami in 2001) and Big Ten (Ohio State in 2002) - has won one.

Think about that, especially when you consider that it hasn't been one or even two teams doing all the damage. I don't know who's going to win it all 12 months from now. But I'd say it's a good bet that whoever gets through the SEC will have a big-time shot. And by the way, in case you're already looking that far ahead, Alabama and Louisiana State are both supposed to be really good. LSU beat Alabama this season, but has to play at Alabama in 2011.

..... Right now, what the SEC is is unstoppable. But maybe one of these years . . ." — Mike Kern, Philadelphia Daily News

WHAT THEY SAID ...

"Southeastern: Lucky or great?

The answer: yes. The Southeastern Conference won its fifth consecutive BCS title and has won seven of 13. The SEC is clearly the nation's best league but also has had its share of BCS title breaks. In the 1998 season, Florida State quarterback Chris Weinke was injured and could not play in the title game against Tennessee. Last year, Alabama defeated Texas after Longhorns quarterback Colt McCoy got injured. Louisiana State, in 2007, became the first two-loss BCS champion. In 2006, Florida edged Michigan out of a title game spot by .9445 to .9344. Auburn wouldn't have won this year had a Clemson receiver held onto a pass in September.

But these are just nitpicks — the SEC is No.1." — Chris Dufresne, Los Angeles Times

"The SEC doesn't just have better teams than the rest of the country, it has more of them. It has the richest and best television deal — a combined \$3 billion in national exposure with CBS and ESPN. It has the most passionate fans. Its coaches and players are the game's biggest stars. In the showdown between Nike University and Cam Newton Tech, Newton ultimately prevailed. The BCS title goes to Auburn University and the SEC extended its domination over college football." — Jeff Gordon, St. Louis Post-Dispatch

"There are three certainties in life: death, taxes and the SEC winning BCS title games.

.... Monday night, (Auburn defensive coordinator Ted) Roof made perfectly clear that for the fifth consecutive year, another conference's best offensive pyrotechnics couldn't withstand the SEC's brutal defenses. Five years ago, the Florida Gators began the SEC's reign atop the college football universe with a 41-14 domination of Ohio State here on the same field. Five years later, thanks to the Auburn Tigers, the SEC is still on top. And another offense has fallen victim to southern-fried defensive dominance.

On a cool night in Glendale, the SEC's reach covered the continent, ManifeSECT destiny, indeed.

SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

The head coach may challenge the ruling of any reviewable play. He retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The head coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including the ball in possession of a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - c. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by a player or an official
 - c. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - d. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - e. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - f. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loss and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - g. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Miscellaneous:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with reviewed plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)
 - i. The game clock expires at the end of a half. If at the end of the game, the time may be restored to the clock only if the score is tied or the team that would next snap the ball trails by eight points or fewer.

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with the HD Instant Replay system provided by XOS Digital. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official and the Communicator are selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live HD video feed is sent directly to the replay booth from the TV truck. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while recording it into the XOS Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play while the Communicator marks all incoming replays.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Replay Technician. As the Technician and the Communicator mark the incoming video, each view will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Replay Technician can touch the thumbnail and immediately send that play or replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a jog shuttle remote controlled by the Replay Official. All video is viewed on an HD monitor that sits in front of the Replay Official. The touch screen is only used to select the replays and to log specific play data in the event a call is overturned.

While all plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the HD Replay System developed by XOS Digital of Orlando, FL. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from XOS Digital.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL NOTES

A PRIMER FOR NCAA RULES FOR FOOTBALL SAFETY [From NCAA.com]

For years, the NCAA has been at the forefront of student-athlete safety and implemented initiatives to make competition as safe as possible. Rules changes have expanded beyond the traditional notion of helmet-to-helmet contact and added a focus on all hits targeting and contacting defenseless players above the shoulders.

“The health and safety of student-athletes is the reason the NCAA was created,” said NCAA President Mark Emmert. “We have to remain vigilant to that mission, and these types of injuries require our careful attention.”

Rogers Redding, football rules secretary-rules editor and Southeastern Conference Coordinator of Football Officials, noted that the NCAA Football Rules Committee continually reviews player safety and has implemented rules to remove the word intent from head-down contact, penalize the horse-collar tackle, eliminate wedge-blocking and strengthen penalties regarding the tackling of defenseless players.

“Student-athlete safety is of the utmost importance, and the Association will continue to protect its student-athletes,” Redding said.

Football student-athletes who target the head and neck area of defenseless players will continue to be penalized for initial contact with a forearm, elbow, shoulder or helmet. A 15-yard penalty is enforced on these violations. In egregious situations, officials may eject the offending player. Last season, five Division I football student-athletes were ejected from games for these violations.

Following the rules change in 2009 requiring conferences to further examine these fouls after games, 73 plays were reviewed, resulting in four suspensions from games. In addition, some conferences sent letters of reprimand to coaches and student-athletes following post-game reviews.

“We believe the committee’s decision has helped to reduce the unnecessary roughness penalties involving hits to the head,” said David Parry, national coordinator of football officials. “We have seen a decline in them.”

Rules changes for the 2010 season mandate that injured student-athletes, including those who exhibit signs of a concussion, must be cleared by appropriate medical personnel as determined by the institution before returning to competition. An injured player must also miss a play before he is allowed to take part in the game again. Previously, a player could return to action before the next play if a timeout was called.

Receiving teams are no longer allowed to have wedge-blocking formations of three or more players on kickoffs. (NCAA research showed that one of every five injuries that occur on kickoffs resulted in a concussion.) Two-player wedges remain legal, but the formation of three or more players in a wedge is now a foul that results in a 15-yard penalty. It also will be considered a live-ball foul, regardless of whether there is contact between opponents.

The NCAA’s health and safety needs are addressed through the collaborative efforts of national office staff, governance committees, sports rules committees, sports issues committees and external associations. The NCAA Football Rules Committee works closely with the NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports and other medical experts.

NCAA football rules changes timeline

1976 – Rule changes for the 1976 football season eliminate the head and face as a primary and initial contact area for blocking and tackling.

2002 – The NCAA Football Rules Committee adds specific language to define when a student-athlete is defenseless and adds a point of emphasis for protection of these players.

2005 – The NCAA Football Rules Committee changes college football rules regarding spearing and head-down contact, removing any reference to “intent” from the rule. In addition to the rule change, the NCAA focuses on the education of student-athletes, coaches, officials and administrators regarding prevention of head and neck injuries. The NCAA partners with several membership groups (coaches, athletic trainers, etc.) to produce educational materials to teach proper tackling technique and prevention of head contact.

2008 – The NCAA makes the horse-collar tackle illegal, revamps illegal contact of an opponent and simplifies the chop-block rule. More emphasis is placed on eliminating hits on defenseless players and blows to the head. No player is permitted to initiate contact and target an opponent with the crown

of his helmet, and no player is permitted to initiate contact and target a defenseless opponent above the shoulders.

2009 – A rule is added to require conference review of fouls related to targeting/initiating contact to players. If a foul is not called, conferences are allowed to review plays and impose sanctions. As a result, several conferences enforce suspensions on fouls using supplementary discipline.

2010 – Wedge blocking is eliminated and specific concussion and injury management rules are implemented. Injured student-athletes must be cleared by appropriate medical personnel (as determined by the institution) before returning to competition. The committee also clarifies that contact above the shoulders with any body part is a violation (e.g., forearm, shoulder, etc.). The committee took advantage of the two-year playing rules process that allowed for safety alterations in the non-change year.

SEC - AP POLL HISTORY

The Southeastern Conference has had at least five teams ranked in at least one AP Top 25 poll every year since expansion (1992). This season, the SEC had at least five teams ranked in every AP poll.

Since 1992, the SEC has had at least 5 teams ranked in the AP Top 25 a total of 224 times, an average of 11.8 times per year. Since 1992, the SEC has had at least 5 teams ranked for at least 10 weeks in 15 of the last 19 years.

The SEC has had seven teams ranked in the AP Top 25 poll eight times since 1992, including this week. The league has also had seven teams ranked three weeks in 1999 and 2007 and one other week this season. Here is a history of multiple teams from the SEC in the AP Top 25 poll.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball. In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this 15-year contract includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSsports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN is the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rights holder for the SEC, including every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package).

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks have increased coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network presents an SEC Game of the Week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually) as well as the studio show *SEC Weekly*.

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, is the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature an SEC Game of the Week (generally at noon ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ESPN produces the integrated SEC Studio show, hosted by Dari Nowkhah, with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia and NFL standout.

ESPN360.com: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts are offered on the broadband sports network.

ESPN Mobile TV: Live games are simulcast on mobile phones.

ESPN International: The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

ESPN Deportes: ESPN holds domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

ESPN GamePlan: The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, offers SEC action.

ESPN Classic: The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

ESPN.com: Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, has an agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement began with the 2009-10 academic year and goes for five years.

FOX SPORTS NET

Fox Sports Net's (FSN) regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Carolinas, FOX Sports Tennessee, Sun Sports, FOX Sports Southwest and FOX Sports Houston – will be the outlets for a minimum of 92 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include eight live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). SEC athletic events on FSN will be distributed to more than 22 million cable and satellite households throughout the SEC territory.

INSTITUTIONAL MEDIA PACKAGES

As part of the SEC's television contracts, each conference institution was able to maintain a contractual television arrangement of its own. As part of this arrangement, each SEC institution has the ability to televise one pay-per-view football game per year as well as to host its own tape-delayed game package, coaches' TV shows as well as other sport packages.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION**SEC Weekly on ESPNU**

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program airs Wednesdays at 5 p.m. ET on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show is hosted by Cara Capuano with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. *SEC Weekly* is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, airing live every Wednesday at 10 p.m. ET, breaks down every SEC game with footage, interviews and analysis. Tim Couch, former Kentucky standout and top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, joins the live, weekly one-hour show as an analyst, with host Charles Davis and analyst Randy Cross. Also new to the SEC Gridiron LIVE team is social media host Kristina Akra. SECGridironLIVE.com is the hub for the show's social networking component, allowing viewers to participate in the live show and interact instantaneously with the broadcast team and SEC fans across the country.

CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

CBS Sports starts its SEC programming with its live pre-game show COLLEGE FOOTBALL TODAY followed by the "SEC Game of the Week" CBS College Sports Network will broadcast SEC TAILGATE on select Saturdays at 2:00 PM, ET, from the site of CBS Sports' SEC Game of the Week. The show brings fans a fast paced and authoritative look at football and life in the SEC. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, and features local SEC legends and celebrity alumni.

THIS IS THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

SEC MISSION STATEMENT

"The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

THE SEC

The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports – 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

2009-10 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed four national championships in the 2009-10 year. SEC teams have won at least four national titles every year since 1991. In eight of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up. The SEC had national championships in football (Alabama), men's indoor track & field (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Florida) and baseball (South Carolina).

In its 77 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 183 team national championships, including 67 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2009-10 OVERALL SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in both men's and women's sports. The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in 10 men's and 11 women's sports and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish. Wrestling is included in the men's totals, but the sport is not sponsored by the Southeastern Conference.

In the 10 men's sports for the survey, the SEC had 398 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 396 points, followed by the Big 12 with 395 points, Big Ten with 279.5 points, ACC with 238 points and the Big East with 83 points. In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC led the way with 502.5 points followed by the Pac-10 with 480 points, the Big 12 with 382 points, ACC with 369 points, Big Ten with 221 points and the Big East with 164 points.

Combining the 21 sports in the survey, the SEC had 900.5 points to pace all conferences followed by the Pac-10 with 876 points, Big 12 with 777 points, ACC with 607 points, Big Ten with 500.5 points and the Big East with 247 points. The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 17 seasons since 1986-87, the first year this survey was done, and in 11 of the last 12 seasons. The SEC has had the highest women's point total five times since 1986-87, including three of the last six years.

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST FIRST-TEAM ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 15 of its student-athletes earn first-team ESPN The Magazine / CoSIDA Academic All-America status in 2009-10, more than any other Division I conference in the nation. The Big 12 had 14 while the Big Ten and Pac-10 had 13 student-athletes each earn the honor.

The SEC had 36 total student-athletes earn either first, second or third team mention. That total is second overall to the Big 12 Conference, which had 39. The Big Ten was third with 34 total student-athletes earned first, second or third team mention.

The SEC's academic success of its student-athletes in 2009-10 was not just Academic All-Americans. The league honored 2,424 of its own student-athletes who made the SEC Academic Honor Roll. The league also honored Auburn swimmer Jordan Anderson and Tennessee track & field athlete Phoebe Wright with its McWhorter Scholar-Athletes of the Year as well as naming a scholar-athlete of the year in each of its sports.

Among honors given by the NCAA, SEC student-athletes also shined. Three student-athletes from the SEC – Florida's Tim Tebow (football), Georgia's Courtney Kupets (gymnastics) and Alabama's Brittany Rogers (softball) were honored this past year with the Today's Top VIII Award from the NCAA. Since 2004, the SEC has had 10 student-athletes awarded this honor, more than any other conference in the country.

The SEC also had 13 student-athletes receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2009-10, more than any other conference in the nation.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states: "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (29 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than 6.5 million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2009. The average capacity of the 12 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.

In men's basketball, the SEC has finished second in national average attendance for four straight seasons and has finished in the top three every year since 1994 (17 straight years). Kentucky has led the nation in 14 of the last 15 years in attendance. In 2009-10, five SEC schools finished in the top 30 in average attendance.

In women's basketball, after finishing third in the nation for 10 straight seasons, the SEC was second in national average attendance in 2009-10. The SEC has had at least two schools in the top 25 in average attendance every year since 1999-2000. Tennessee has led the nation in attendance in 10 of the last 11 seasons. In 2009-10, the SEC had four schools finish in the top 25 in average attendance.

In baseball, the SEC and one of its institutions have led the NCAA in total and average attendance for the last 13 seasons, and 18 of the last 24 years. The SEC and its member institutions own virtually all regular season, conference tournament, NCAA Regional and Super Regional attendance records. The SEC has broken its own national record each of the last five seasons in total attendance, after having set a goal of 1.5 million fans in 2005 as part of the league's "Drive for 1.5 ... Pack the Parks" promotion.
