THE GAME

Auburn and Wisconsin meet in a bowl game for the second time in three seasons when the Tigers and Badgers battle in the Capital One Bowl. Auburn beat Wisconsin 28-14 at the 2003 Music City Bowl in Nashville, Tenn. The only other meeting between the teams was a 7-7 tie in 1931 in Madison.

AUBURN'S BOWL HISTORY

This season's bowl appearance marks the 32nd time that the Tigers have played in a bowl game. Auburn has a 17-12-2 record in its previous 31 bowl games and has played in a bowl game in 18 of the last 24 years.

The Tigers are appearing in a bowl game for the sixth straight year, which is the third longest streak in school history. Auburn had a streak of nine straight bowl appearances from 1982-90 and seven straight from 1968-74.

Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 12-5-1 in bowl games, winning four consecutive from 1974-84 ('74 Gator, '82 Tangerine, '83 Sugar, '84 Liberty) and three straight over the past three years ('03 Capital One, '03 Music City, '05 Sugar).

TUBERVILLE IN BOWL GAMES

Tommy Tuberville is 4-2 all-time in bowl games as a head coach, including a 3-2 mark at Auburn. Tuberville has guided the Tigers to three consecutive bowl wins, defeating Virginia Tech, 16-13, in the 2005 NOKIA Sugar Bowl, Wisconsin, 28-14, in the 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, and Penn State, 13-9, in the 2003 Capital One Bowl.

Tuberville also guided the Tigers to the 2001 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (16-10 loss to North Carolina) and 2001 Capital One Florida Citrus Bowl (31-28 loss to Michigan). As a head coach at Ole Miss, Tuberville led the Rebels to a 34-31 win in the 1997 Motor City Bowl.

As both a head coach and an assistant coach, Tuberville is 9-5 in bowl games. While an assistant at Miami, Tuberville was 5-3 in bowl games, including five straight wins from 1988 to 1992 and three national championships.

IN THE CAPITAL ONE BOWL

Auburn will be making its fifth appearance in the Capital One Bowl, formerly known as the Citrus Bowl and Tangerine Bowl, and third trip to Orlando in the last six seasons. The Tigers are 3-1 all-time at the Capital One Bowl. The only bowl game in which the Tigers have made more appearances is the Gator Bowl (six), while the Tigers have also played in five Sugar Bowls.

RECORDS SET AT CAPITAL ONE

Auburn's top two bowl game rushing performances and top bowl game passing performance all took place at the Capital One Bowl. Ronnie Brown rushed for 184 yards and a touchdown on 37 carries vs. Penn State at the 2003 Capital One Bowl, while Brent Fullwood totalled 152 yards and a score vs. USC at the 1987 Citrus Bowl. In addition, Ben Leard's 394-yard passing game vs. Michigan at the 2001 Citrus Bowl is not only an Auburn bowl record, but tied for the second-best single-game performance in school history.

TIGERS' BOWL NOTABLES

Auburn will be searching for its first four-game bowl winning streak since the 1974-82-83-84 seasons when it won the 1974 Gator Bowl, 1982 Tangerine Bowl, 1984 Sugar Bowl and 1984 Liberty Bowl ... The Tigers are 16th all-time in bowl appearances (32) and tied for 13th all-time in bowl victories (17) ... Auburn's defense has held its last four bowl opponents to 16 points or less ... The Tigers are 10-3-2 in bowl games when scoring first ... Auburn is 12-2 in bowl games when scoring 20 or more points.

AGAINST THE BIG TEN

Auburn is 6-2-2 all-time against current members of the Big Ten Conference, with bowl games accounting for eight of those 10 games. The only two games that Auburn has played against Big Ten teams in non-bowl games were a scoreless tie against Ohio State in 1917 in Montgomery, and a 7-7 tie at Wisconsin in 1931.

FINAL GAME FOR TIGER SENIORS

The bowl game marks the final game for 15 Auburn seniors. Auburn's senior class has led the Tigers to a 39-11 record the past four seasons, including three SEC Western Division championships, while tying the Auburn record for most victories during a four-year period (39 - 1986-89).

The 2005 seniors include: WR Devin Aromashodu, DS Chas Crofoot, DT Wayne Dickens, DB Kevin Hobbs, DB David Irons, NG T.J. Jackson, OT Marcus McNeill, WR Anthony Mix, WR Ben Obomanu, OT Troy Reddick, C Steven Ross, FB Jake Slaughter, TE Cooper Wallace, LB Antarrious Williams and LB Travis Williams.

TUBERVILLE VS. THE BIG TEN

The Nokia Sugar Bowl match-up against Wisconsin will mark Tommy Tuberville's fourth game against a Big Ten opponent as a head coach. Tuberville is 2-1 against Big Ten teams, with victories in the 2003 Capital One Bowl (13-9) vs. Penn State and the 2003 Music City Bowl (28-14) vs. Wisconsin. Tuberville lost to Michigan in the 2001 Citrus Bowl, 31-28.

ASSISTANTS IN BOWLS

Auburn's post-season appearance will mark a return visit to a bowl for several Tiger assistant coaches. Linebackers coach Joe Whitt will be making his 18th bowl appearance while quarterbacks coach Steve Ensminger will be going to his 11th bowl game. Offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive line coach Terry Price will be going to their 10th bowl. Ensminger played in three bowls at LSU as did Price while at Texas A&M. Nall played in two while at Georgia, while defensive coordinator David Gibbs played in two bowls while at Colorado.

WESTERN DIVISION CO-CHAMPS

With a 7-1 record in the SEC West, Auburn has now won outright or shared five SEC Western Division titles in the last six seasons, and six since the SEC split into two divisions in 1992. Auburn won the West outright in 2000 and 2004 and shared the division title in 1997, 2001, 2002 and 2005.

AUBURN CLIMBING THE RANKS

After falling out of the national rankings following a season-opening loss to Georgia Tech, Auburn has climbed all the way to No. 7 in the final regular season Associated Press Top 25 poll. Auburn did not break back into the AP poll until after an Oct. 1 victory over South Carolina improved the Tigers to 4-1 and pushed Auburn to No. 22 in the poll. Auburn is 13-6 all-time when ranked No. 7, but has not played a game with that ranking since a 49-38 loss to No. 3 Florida Oct. 14, 1995.

VS. TEAMS RANKED 21ST

Auburn has played just two games against teams ranked No. 21 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll. The No. 9 Tigers defeated No. 21 Ohio State, 31-14, Jan. 1, 1990, in the Hall of Fame Bowl, while Auburn, ranked 13th, lost to No. 21 LSU, 19-15, Sept. 21, 1996 in Jordan-Hare Stadium.

ON THIS DATE

Auburn has played four games previously on Jan. 2, winning three and losing one. The Tigers won the 1971 Gator Bowl (35-28) against Ole Miss, the 1984 Sugar Bowl (9-7) against Michigan, and the 1998 Peach Bowl (21-17) against Clemson. Auburn's only loss was a 13-7 defeat in the 1989 Sugar Bowl against Florida State.

TWO-YEAR DOMINATION

Auburn is 22-2 over the past two seasons, giving the Tigers the second-most wins and third-best record in the NCAA over the past two seasons. Only USC (25-0) and Texas (22-1) have better winning percentages than Auburn over the past two years.

DOUBLE DIP

With 22 victories over the past two seasons, Auburn has established a new school record for victories in a two-year period. The Tigers previously had four occurrences of 20 wins over a two-year span (1982-83; 1983-84; 1988-89; 1993-94).

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

Auburn has had a knack for winning close ball games since Tommy Tuberville arrived as the Tigers' head coach. In his seven seasons at the helm, Auburn is 19-10 in games decided by seven points or less and has won seven of its last nine. Counting his four seasons at Ole Miss, Tuberville has a 19-15 record as a head coach in games decided by seven points or less.

WINNING IN THE SEC

Auburn has won 16 of its last 17 SEC games and 17 of 18 against SEC opponents. The Tigers have won nine straight home games against SEC opponents and are 8-1 in their last eight SEC road games with the only loss coming in overtime at No. 7 LSU (20-17).

With a 7-1 conference record, Auburn finished with another winning record in the SEC. This marked the sixth consecutive season that Auburn finished with an SEC record of no worse than 5-3. The last time Auburn had six straight winning conference records came from 1955-60. The Tigers had streaks of five straight winning SEC seasons from 1968-72 and 1986-90.

WINNING IN THE SEC, PART II

Auburn's 15-1 mark in the conference from 2004-05 marks the fourth time in SEC history (since divisional play began in 1992) that a team has won 15 or more conference games in back-to-back seasons.

NOT SKIPPING A BEAT

There were many who assumed that after Auburn lost its 2004 starting backfield of Jason Campbell, Ronnie Brown and Carnell Williams, who were all first-round NFL draft picks, that the Tigers would struggle offensively in 2005. Instead, the Tigers' offensive numbers have improved this season.

Last year, Auburn averaged 32.1 points and 420.7 yards per game. This season, the Tigers are averaging 34.2 points and 425.6 yards per game - both numbers that would rank as the best ever during the Tommy Tuberville era. Auburn has also improved from last season in first downs (21.6 - 20.8), rushing yardage (202.7 - 183.3) and third-down conversions (.479 - .459).

The biggest difference from last year has come defensively, where the Tigers, although very solid this year, were tops in the nation in 2004. Last year's team gave up just 11.3 points per game, compared to 14.7 this season, and allowed only 277.6 yards per game as opposed to this season's 294.1. Still the 14.7 points allowed this year is second best at Auburn during the Tommy Tuberville era, and the 294.1 yards allowed ranks third.

BORGES BALL

In the four seasons prior to Al Borges' arrival as Auburn's offensive coordinator before the 2004 season, (2000-03), the Tigers scored 30 or more points in 22 of 62 (35.5%) games. Since Borges has taken the reigns of Auburn's offense, the Tigers have scored 30 or more points in 17 of 24 (70.8%) games.

STRIKE WHILE IRONS IS HOT

Kenny Irons leads the SEC and ranks 18th nationally averaging 109.5 yards rushing per game. More impressively, Irons has posted those numbers despite averaging just 10.8 carries during Auburn's first five games, including only one rush in the season opener vs. Georgia Tech.

After gaining 34 yards in the first two games of the season, Irons has rushed for more than 100 yards in eight of the last nine contests, averaging 130.1 yards per game with 13 touchdowns during that stretch while averaging 5.3 yards per carry. Irons has been a workhorse the last six games in particular, totaling 886 yards on 180 rushes (147.7 ypg; 30.0 carries per game).

On Oct. 15 at Arkansas, Irons ran for a then-career best 182 yards on 33 carries to earn SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors. On Oct. 22 at LSU, Irons posted the 14th-best single-game rushing total in Auburn history, gaining 218 yards on 27 carries, including a 74-yard scoring run in the third quarter. It was the most yards by an Auburn back since Rudi Johnson ran for 249 yards vs. Louisiana Tech Oct. 21, 2000.

Irons had 101 yards and a score Oct. 29 vs. Ole Miss and followed that with 103 and three TDs in one half vs. Kentucky. Nov. 12 at Georgia, Irons ran 37 times for 179 yards and two scores, earning SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors while tying for the fifth most rushes in a game in school history. He finished the regular season with 103 yards and a score on 28 carries vs. Alabama, becoming the second back in Auburn history to have six or more consecutive 100-yard rushing games.

Irons currently ranks tied for ninth in Auburn history for a single season with 1,205 yards rushing. By surpassing the 1,000-yard rushing mark, it marks the first time that Auburn has had a 1,000-yard rusher in four consecutive seasons.

IRONS SHINES VS. TOP DEFENSES

Auburn played two teams this season that are ranked in the nation's top 10 in rushing defense, and Kenny Irons went over the century mark against both teams.

Irons posted a career-best 218 yards on the ground Oct. 22 at LSU, which has the nation's No. 7-ranked rushing defense, allowing just 94.8 yards per game. Irons ran for 103 yards Nov. 19 vs. Alabama, which ranks No. 6 nationally giving up 93.5 yards per contest.

COX CONTINUES STEADY PLAY

In his first year as a starter at quarter-back, sophomore Brandon Cox is having a stellar season. Cox has thrown for more than 200 yards in eight of his 10 games, and ranks second in the SEC averaging 218.7 yards passing per game. Cox's total of 342 yards passing in the season opener vs. Georgia Tech is the third-highest total in the SEC this season. His current passer rating of 138.43, which also ranks second in the SEC, would rank as the sixth-best single-season mark in Auburn history.

Cox is third in the Auburn single-season record book for most games throwing for 200 or more yards with eight, and he had six straight 200-yard passing games this season, which is tied for the second-best mark in Auburn history.

ON THE VERGE OF SEC HISTORY

Senior Anthony Mix is just one yard shy of becoming the 21st Auburn player to accumulate 1,000 career receiving yards, and if he reaches the mark, Auburn will become the first known team in SEC history to have four career 1,000-yard receivers on its team at one time. Prior to this season, the Tigers had never had three 1,000-yard receivers at once.

Currently, junior Courtney Taylor ranks 10th in Auburn history with 1,380 yards receiving, senior Devin Aromashodu is 12th with 1,317 yards and senior Ben Obomanu is 13th with 1,251 yards.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT

Auburn's offense has shown that it has both quick-strike capability and the ability to put together long, sustained drives. In fact, the Tigers lead the SEC in both scoring drives of less than two minutes (20 - tied with Georgia) and greater than five minutes (13). Georgia, with one extra game, was the only other SEC team with more than 15 scoring drives of less than two minutes, and no other squad posted more than nine scoring drives of over five minutes.

DRIVE TIME

Auburn has had more offensive success per drive than any other team in the SEC this season. The Tigers lead all SEC teams in yards per drive (36.29), points per

drive (2.75), scoring efficiency (44.2 percent) and touchdown efficiency (35.6 percent). Auburn has big leads in points per drive and touchdown efficiency, as second-place Georgia trails by nearly half a point in points per drive at 2.28, while the Tigers' touchdown efficiency is nearly 10 percent higher than second-place Florida and Vanderbilt (26.1).

SEC LEADERS

Auburn has emerged as the league leader in several statistical categories this season, including: scoring offense (34.2), total offense (425.6), third down conversions (47.9 percent), sacks (36) and sacks against (17). If scoring margin were a category in the SEC stats, the Tigers, at +19.5, would lead that category as well.

TIGER "O" TOUGH ON SEC FOES

Auburn's offense has been tough for SEC defenses to stop, as the Tigers averaged 32.8 points in conference games, and scored 39 more points than the second-ranked team (Vanderbilt - 27.9). Auburn ranked first in total offense, averaging 413.6 yards per SEC game, which was 30 yards per game better than the second-ranked team (Vanderbilt, 383.8). The Tigers' balanced attack ranked first in rushing offense (197.6) and passing efficiency (140.7), and Auburn led the league with a 47.4 conversion rate on third downs in league games.

OTHER SEC SUPERLATIVES

In conference games, it's not just the Auburn offense that excelled, as the Tiger defense ranked third in the league in scoring (15.2) and rushing defense (95.1) and tied for fourth in total defense (295.0), while the special teams ranked second in kickoff returns (22.6).

Individually, Kenny Irons ranked first in SEC games in rushing (117.6), third in scoring (7.5) and fourth in all-purpose yards (134.2), Brandon Cox led the SEC in passing efficiency (140.4) and ranked third in passing average (209.2) and Kody Bliss averaged a league-best 45.8 yards per punt in league games.

THIRD TIME'S A CHARM

Auburn has had tremendous success on third downs this season, leading the SEC and ranking tied for 10th nationally by converting 47.9 percent (69-of-144) of its third downs. When the Tigers have 10 yards or less to reach a first down, that percentage climbs to 53.4 percent (62-of-118).

Meanwhile, Auburn's defense allows opponents to convert third-down chances just 31.2 percent of the time (48-of-154). Auburn makes its third-down superiority known right off the bat, as the Tigers are 21-of-37 (56.8 percent) on third downs in the first quarter, while opponents are just 6-of-27 (22.2 percent).

SEEING RED

There has been no stopping Auburn in the red zone this season. The Tiger offense has moved inside the opponents' 20-yard-line 49 times this season, and 42 of those possessions ended with scores, including 33 touchdowns, for a percentage of 85.7, which ranks third in the SEC.

Defensively, opponents have entered the red zone 30 times this year and managed just 12 touchdowns. Tiger opponents have also booted 10 field goals from inside the red zone, but average just 3.8 points per trip into the red zone, while Auburn averages 5.3 points per trip.

With eight 100-yard rushing games, Kenny Irons now ranks tied for second with Bo Jackson's Heisman Trophy-winning 1985 season for most 100-yard rushing games in a single season in Auburn history, and his six straight 100-yard games ranks second.

Meanwhile, Brandon Cox has thrown for at least 200 yards in eight of his 10 games played this season, including six in a row. Cox ranks third in Auburn history for the most 200-yard passing games in a single season, and his streak of six straight is tied for second.

QUICK STARTS

Auburn has been a notoriously quick starter the past two seasons. The Tigers have outscored their opponents 403-103 in the first half over the past two years, including a 210-67 tally this season. Auburn has led by 10 or more points at the half in 11 of its 16 SEC games over the past two seasons. Auburn has made those early leads stand up, as the Tigers are 18-0 over the past two seasons when leading at the half.

The second quarter has been particularly kind to Auburn this year, as the Tigers hold a commanding 127-30 edge in points scored during that period.

QUARTER BY QUARTER

Auburn has shown consistency this season, holding a wide scoring margin in every quarter. The Tigers have outscored their opponents 83-37 in the first quarter, and own a whopping 127-30 edge in the second quarter. Auburn has a 79-27 advantage in the third period, and the Tigers have an 87-65 edge in the fourth quarter.

DEFENSIVE DISPLAY

The Auburn defense has been stingy when it comes to allowing points in recent seasons. In fact, in the past 43 games, the Tigers have allowed an opponent to score 30 points or more just twice (31 by LSU Oct. 25, 2003 in Baton Rouge; 30 by Georgia Nov. 12, 2005). During that same span, 29 opponents failed to score 20 points, and 16 were held to single digits.

TIGERS TOUGH ON TOP TEN

Auburn's 28-18 victory against then-No. 8 Alabama was its second of the season against a top 10 team. Auburn has won six of its last seven games against teams ranked in the Associated Press top 10, including a 31-30 victory at No. 9 Georgia Nov. 12. Dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn has played 16 games against top 10 teams in its last 43 games (37.2 percent).

During the Tommy Tuberville era, Auburn is 12-10 in games played against top 10 teams, and has won 12 of its last 17 games dating back to a 23-20 upset of No. 1-ranked Florida Oct. 13, 2001.

PRIME PROTECTOR

A: Sept. 18, 2002.

Q: When was the last time Marcus McNeill, Auburn's All-American right tackle, allowed a sack?

McNeill has played 41 consecutive games, including 38 starts, since that game against Mississippi State, which was his third collegiate game, without allowing a sack. He was named a 2005 First Team All-American by *Sports Illustrated*, and is one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy.

JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Now in its 66th year as home to the Auburn football team, Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's eighth-largest on-campus stadium, with a capacity of 87,451 fans. The Tigers are 249-60-7 (.799) at Jordan-Hare Stadium, including a 35-6 (.853) mark in the last six seasons. Auburn went 7-0 at home last season, marking the second perfect home season in the last five years (7-0 in 2000).

Auburn had an eight-game home winning streak prior to a season-opening loss to Georgia Tech Sept. 3, but won its last six home games this season and has now won 18 of its last 20 games at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

JORDAN-HARE TOUGH ON SEC

Jordan-Hare Stadium has proven to be a difficult place for opposing SEC teams to play. Auburn currently owns an nine-game winning streak in home games vs. confer-

ence opponents, not losing a home game to an SEC team since a 24-20 loss to Ole Miss in 2003.

RUNNING LONG DISTANCE

For the first time in school history, Auburn has had three different backs break a run of at least 70 yards in one season. Brad Lester was the first to accomplish the feat with a 70-yard dash vs. Ball State, Kenny Irons went 74 yards for a score at LSU, and Tristan Davis joined the group Nov. 5 at Kentucky with a 75-yard gallop for a touchdown. There had been two prior occurrences of Auburn having two different players with a 70-yard run in one season (Bo Jackson and Brent Fullwood, 1985; Ralph O'Gwynne and Jimmy Fenton, 1936).

In addition, Auburn has had four runs this season of at least 60 yards, marking the first time that the Tigers have had four 60-yard runs in one season since the 1985 team had five, and just the fifth time overall (1978, 1979, 1983, 1985).

NO PASSING ZONE

Auburn played its first eight games without allowing an opponent to throw for 200 yards in a game before surrendering over 300 in two straight contests. Still, Auburn ranks 24th nationally in pass defense, allowing 189.7 yards per game, but more impressively, the Tigers are tied for third nationally in fewest touchdown passes allowed, having surrendered just six passing scores all season. Only Maryland (4) and San Diego State (5) have allowed fewer touchdown passes than Auburn this season.

CLIMBING THE CHARTS

Senior Ben Obomanu leads all Auburn receivers with 28 catches for 295 yards and five scores, and now has 18 receiving touchdowns for his career. Obomanu ranks second on Auburn's career touchdown receptions list and 13th in Auburn history with 1,251 receiving yards.

TURNOVER TURNAROUND

In a season-opening loss to Georgia Tech, Auburn committed five turnovers while forcing just one. Since then, the Tigers have turned the ball over just 11 times in the last 10 games. After suffering four interceptions in the season opener, the Tigers have thrown just three interceptions in the past 10 games.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS

Auburn ranks second in the nation this season averaging 28.4 yards per kickoff return. Devin Aromashodu has averaged

24.6 yards on 18 returns, ranking third in the SEC and 33rd nationally, but is not the Tigers' only threat. Brad Lester averaged 60.3 yards on just three returns earlier this season, including a 93-yard return for a score vs. Ball State Sept. 17.

GOOD WILL HERRING

Junior Will Herring continues to excel in his third season as Auburn's starting free safety. Herring, who has started 35 consecutive games dating back to the third game of his freshman season, leads Auburn with 64 tackles, pushing his career total to 173. Herring had a career-high 13 tackles in the season opener vs. Georgia Tech, recovered a fumble for a touchdown Sept. 10 against Mississippi State and blocked a field goal attempt Oct. 15 at Arkansas.

WILLIAMS SQUARED

Auburn's defense is anchored by senior linebackers Travis Williams and Antarrious Williams. Travis Williams, a preseason All-SEC selection, is second on the squad with 62 tackles in 10 games, and has added 5.5 tackles for loss including 2.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and an interception. Antarrious Williams, a second-team preseason All-SEC pick, is third on the squad with 48 tackles. The Williams' have combined to play in 91 games including 56 starts (Travis - 48/35; Antarrious - 43/21).

IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 15 seniors, 12 have seen time in at least 40 games during their careers. Devin Aromashodu, Wayne Dickens, Ben Obomanu and Cooper Wallace lead the list, playing in all 50 of the Tigers' games during the last four seasons. They are followed by T.J. Jackson (49), Travis Williams (48), Anthony Mix (48), Jake Slaughter (45), Marcus McNeill (44), Troy Reddick (44), Antarrious Williams (43) and Steven Ross (41).

STARTS STREAKS

Four Tigers are in the midst of starting streaks of more than 20 games. Leading the way is FS Will Herring (35) and TE Cooper Wallace (30) who have started 30 or more straight contests. NG T.J. Jackson and OG Ben Grubbs are next with 24 consecutive starts each.

FOUR HUNDRED IN TWO GAMES

Kenny Irons achieved a rare feat by rushing for 400 yards during Auburn's games at Arkansas and LSU. Irons is just the fourth back in Auburn history to rush for 400 combined yards in back-to-back games, joining Joe Cribbs, James Brooks

GOING PRO

Auburn has been very successful in terms of having players stick in the NFL, as the Tigers ranked eighth in the number of players on NFL rosters during the league's opening weekend with 31. and Bo Jackson. Irons is the first to accomplish the feat during two road games.

Cribbs (1978) and Brooks (1980) each accomplished the feat once, while Jackson hit the milestone four times during his Heisman Trophy season in 1985.

Irons' 400 yards is the seventh-best two-game total in school history.

TUBERVILLE IN SEVENTH SEASON

Tommy Tuberville is in his seventh season at Auburn in 2005 and his 11th as a head coach in the SEC. Tuberville has the third-longest tenure in the SEC (second-longest active streak) behind Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee and Steve Spurrier of South Carolina, who are each in their 13th season in the league this year.

Tuberville has amassed a record of 60-26 in seven seasons at Auburn and has an overall mark of 85-46. He has led the Tigers to six straight bowl appearances including three straight victories: over Virginia Tech in the 2005 NOKIA Sugar Bowl, Wisconsin in the 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl presented by Bridgestone and Penn State in the 2003 Capital One Bowl.

Tuberville is fourth all-time at Auburn in wins, and is the fifth-longest tenured coach in school history.

11 AND COUNTING

In his 11th year as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville has five assistant coaches who have been with him all 11 years. That group includes: defensive tackles/noseguard coach Don Dunn, running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran, wide receivers coach Greg Knox, offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price.

WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 53-4 when scoring 20 or more points, including a 51-3 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 74-11 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 37-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 42 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points in a game.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 22 years, Auburn is 111-2 when scoring 30 points.

THREE AND OUT

Three Auburn football players achieved

a rare academic feat, graduating from college in only three years. WR Ben Obomanu (Finance) received his diploma in May, while WR Lee Guess (Business Marketing) and NG T.J. Jackson (Public Business Administration) both graduated from Auburn in August after just three years on campus.

TIGER GRADS

Auburn began the season with nine graduates on the roster, which is tied for second most among all Division 1-A football teams and is tops among SEC schools.

In addition to Guess, Jackson and Obomanu, the Tiger graduates include: DS Chas Crofoot (Entrepreneurial Family Business), C Steven Ross (Marketing), FB Jake Slaughter (Communications), TE Cooper Wallace (Business Administration), LB Antarrious Williams (Criminology) and LB Travis Williams (Criminology).

In December, Wayne Dickens, Kevin Hobbs and Troy Reddick all earned degrees, giving Auburn 12 graduates that will be on the team at the Capital One Bowl.

Georgia Tech forced five second-half turnovers and withstood Brandon Cox's 342 yards passing as the Yellow Jackets ended Auburn's 15-game win streak with a 23-14 victory in the season opener at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Cox's 342 yards on the night were the most passing yards for an Auburn quarterback in his first career start. Cox finished the night 22-of-44 with two touchdowns and four interceptions. The four interceptions led to six Georgia Tech points on two field goals and helped offset Auburn's 392-313 edge in total yards.

Auburn was held to just 50 yards on 23 carries on the ground, while the Tech offense ran for 139 yards on 39 rushes.

Georgia Tech running back P.J. Daniels led the team with 23 rushes for a game-best 111 yards with one touchdown. Jackets' quarterback Reggie Ball completed 17-of-36 passes for 174 yards including a 35-yard touchdown pass to Calvin Johnson in the first quarter.

After the Ball to Johnson touchdown, Georgia Tech followed up with a 32-yard Travis Bell field goal with 5:29 remaining in the first quarter, giving the Yellow Jackets a 10-0 advantage.

Auburn first scored on a 39-yard Cox pass to Devin Aromashodu 43 seconds into the second quarter. A John Vaughn extra point put the Tigers within three, 10-7.

Auburn rebounded from a season-opening loss to shut out Mississippi State 28-0 in the teams' Southeastern Conference opener as the Tigers scored a touchdown in each of the four quarters of play.

The Auburn offense was running on all cylinders against Ball State as the Tigers scored on all nine possessions in a 63-3 victory over the Cardinals.

The Tigers accumulated 572 yards — 390 rushing and 182 passing — and rushed for seven touchdowns. Redshirt freshman Brad Lester scored two rushing touchdowns and recorded a 93-yard kickoff return for a score. Lester's kickoff return for a score was the first by an Auburn player since Tim Carter in 2000 versus LSU.

Junior Kenny Irons led the Auburn ground attack with 148 yards on two touchdowns on just 11 carries. His biggest score of the day, however, came on a 68-yard run in the second quarter, giving Auburn a 28-0 advantage.

Auburn won its fourth straight game over Alabama in convincing fashion, scoring three first-quarter touchdowns against the nation's top scoring defense en route to a 28-18 victory over the No. 8 Crimson Tide at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The victory gave the Tigers at least a share of the SEC West Division crown. It is the Tigers' fifth SEC West title in Tommy Tuberville's seven-year tenure as head coach.

The win put No. 11 Auburn (9-2 overall, 7-1 Southeastern Conference) on a four-game winning streak against the Crimson Tide for the first time since 1986-89. It also marked Auburn's sixth win in its last seven games against top 10 teams.

The Tiger offense was led by running back Kenny Irons, who finished with 103 yards rushing -- his sixth straight game over the century mark -- and wide receiver Ben Obomanu, who had both a receiving and rushing touchdown. Quarterback Brandon Cox, meanwhile, finished 14-of-21 for 118 yards and two touchdowns.

The Auburn defense picked up where the team's offense left off, holding the Crimson Tide (9-2, 6-2) to 188 total yards of offense while posting a season-high 11 sacks. Stanley McClover led the team with 3.5 sacks and four tackles for losses. He was followed closely by T.J. Jackson and Antarrious Williams, who both had 1.5 sacks in their final game at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Obomanu opened the game's scoring with a 7-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter. It was the 18th of his career, moving him into sole possession of second place in AU history.

Three minutes later, the Tigers saw Irons cross the plane on an 8yard run to make it 14-0.

Obomanu made it a comfortable 21-0 lead at the 4:01 mark of the first quarter when he scored on a 45-yard reverse.

The Crimson Tide scored its first points of the game early in the second quarter on a Tim Castille 1-yard touchdown run.

Cole Bennett finished Auburn's scoring with a 5-yard touchdown reception at the 2:07 mark of the second quarter.

Alabama added a field goal in the third quarter and a 1-yar touchdown run by backup quarter-back John Parker Wilson with 23 seconds left in the fourth, but it was not enough to overcome Auburn's fast start.

Auburn's loss snapped its 15-game winning streak, which was the third longest streak in school history and third longest active streak in the NCAA ... The loss also snapped Auburn's eight-game home winning streak ... Auburn fell to 86-25-2 all-time in season openers, including a 4-3 mark under Tommy Tuberville ... Brandon Cox, in his first career start, threw for 342 yards, setting a new school record for passing yards in a starting debut ... Cox threw 44 passes, becoming the first Auburn guarterback to throw at least 40 passes in a game since Daniel Cobb in 2001 ... Georgia Tech picked off four Auburn passes, tving the fifth best mark ever by an Auburn opponent ... Courtney Taylor extended his consecutive games streak with a reception to 12 with an 11-yard catch in the second quarter. He finished with six catches for 80 yards ... Ben Obomanu had his 15th career touchdown catch in the second quarter and tied his career high with six catches for 90 yards ... MISSISSIPPI STATE

Auburn won its 13th straight conference opener dating back to 1993, and extended its winning streak against SEC opponents to 11 games ... Auburn won its fifth straight game against Mississippi State ... Auburn posted its first shutout since a 31-0 victory over Louisiana-Monroe in 2004. It was the Tigers' first shutout of an SEC opponent since a 9-0 win at Alabama in 2000 ... Auburn's second scoring drive started and ended with passing plays, and in between, included 11 straight rushes ... Auburn recorded five quarterback sacks ... Cole Bennett's 33-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was the longest reception of his career and his second career touchdown catch ... Devin Aromashodu's five-yard touchdown catch in the second quarter was his seventh career TD grab ... Tre Smith's 38-yard reception in the second quarter was his longest since a 40-yard catch against Louisiana-Monroe in 2002 ... Eric Brock's third-quarter interception was the second of his career, both coming vs. Mississippi State ... Kody Bliss had a 61-yard punt in the third quarter, equalling the second best of his career ... Will Herring recovered a fumble for a touchdown in the third quarter, which was the first Tiger fumble returned for a TD since Spencer Johnson scored vs. Vanderbilt in 2002 ... Auburn improved to 5-0 all-time against current members of the Mid-American Conference ... Auburn's 35-0 halftime lead was its largest at the half since a 45-0 halftime edge against Louisiana-Monroe Nov. 1, 2003. Auburn won that game 73-3 ... Auburn's 63-3 victory was the largest margin of victory since the 73-3 win over Louisiana-Monroe ... Auburn's defense went 97:26 without allowing a point before Ball State scored on a 33-yard field goal with 9:06 left in the third guarter ... Auburn scored touchdowns on all nine possessions ... Auburn finished with 390 yards rushing. It was the first time the Tigers have rushed for at least 300 yards since accumulating 405 yards vs. Mississippi State in 2003 ... Kenny Irons' 13yard touchdown run was his first touchdown as an Auburn Tiger and the third of his career. He had one rushing touchdown and one receiving score during his two years at South Carolina. ... Irons' 68-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was the longest by an Auburn player since Carnell Williams scored on an 80-yard run vs. Alabama in 2003 ... Brad Lester surpassed Irons' run in the fourth quarter, scampering 70 yards ... Irons rushed for a career-high 147 yards on 11 carries and two touchdowns, all in the first half ... Irons' 147 first-half yards were the most by an Auburn player since Ronnie Brown had 152 yards in the opening half against Ole Miss in 2002, before finishing with 224 yards ... Lester's 93-yard kickoff return for a touchdown was the first kick return for a score by an Auburn player since Tim Carter went 100 yards for a score vs. LSU in 2000. It was the 10th longest return in school history ... Tony Bell had his first career interception in the fourth guarter ... Tristan Davis' fourth quarter touchdown was the first of his career ... Davis played both running back and safety for the Tigers, scoring a touchdown and then recording a tackle on the next Ball State possession.

WESTERN KENTUCKY

Auburn improved to 69-8-5 all-time on Homecoming, and won its 13th straight homecoming game ... Auburn was forced to punt on its third possession, snapping a string of 10 consecutive drives (plus one kickoff return for a touchdown) by Auburn that resulted in scores, with nine touchdowns and one field goal ... Auburn held Western Kentucky scoreless in the first half, holding a 24-0 lead at the break. It marked the third straight game that Auburn had not allowed a first-half point ... Auburn allowed its first touchdown since the second quarter of the season opener against Georgia Tech with 11:54 left in the fourth quarter. It snapped a string of 13 straight quarters in which Auburn had not allowed a touchdown, and it was the first touchdown in 199:34 against the Tigers ... Blake Field made his first collegiate start in place of Brandon Cox, and completed 13-of-21 passes for 200 yards and three touchdowns. It was the first time an Auburn quarterback threw three TD passes in a game since Jason Campbell last season vs. Tennessee ... Fields' first nine completions went to nine different receivers, and he finished the game completing passes to 10 different players ... Field's 38-yard screen pass for a touchdown to Brad Lester was the first touchdown pass of the quarterback's career ... Lester's touchdown reception was his first career scoring catch, and it was his fourth touchdown in the last two weeks ... Kenny Irons bettered the 100-yard mark in rushing before halftime for the second straight game. Irons had 16 carries for 108 yards in the first half, and ended the game with 111 yards on 18 carries ... John Vaughn tied his career high with three field goals (28, 20, 32). He previously kicked three field goals in the 2005 NOKIA Sugar Bowl (23, 19, 24) ... Lee Guess, who missed the first three games due to injury, caught his first pass of the season in the fourth quarter, covering 24 yards. Auburn's 41-point margin of victory was South Carolina head coach Steve Spurrier's second-worst loss as a head coach at any level. Spurrier's worst loss was a 45-3 defeat at the hands of Tennessee in 1990 ... Auburn did not allow a point in the first half for the fourth straight game and outscored its opponents 104-0 in the first half during those games ... Auburn scored on its opening drive for the third straight week ... Auburn's 31-0 halftime lead was its largest halftime lead against a conference opponent since Oct. 18, 2003, when the Tigers led Mississippi State 38-7 at the break ... Auburn allowed a second-quarter sack, which was the first sack surrendered by the Tigers since allowing one in the third quarter vs. Mississippi State Sept. 10 ... Kenny Irons rushed for two touchdowns in the first half, scoring on a 1yard run in the first guarter and a two-yard plunge in the second period. It gave Irons five rushing touchdowns in the last three weeks ... Wayne Dickens had his first career fumble recovery in the first quarter ... Brad Lester had his fourth and fifth rushing touchdowns of the season ... Ben Obomanu caught his 16th career touchdown pass in the second quarter, a 15-yarder from Brandon Cox. The touchdown moved Obomanu into sole possession of third place on Auburn's career touchdown receptions list ... Brandon Cox completed passes to 10 different receivers, and connected on 19-of-29 passes for 245 yards one touchdown and no interceptions. Cox had not been picked off since the season opener against Georgia Tech ... Carl Stewart's 1-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter was his second of the season and the fourth of his career.

Auburn extended its SEC road winning streak to five games ... Auburn improved to 3-0 in the SEC for the fifth time in the last six seasons ... Auburn was playing its first road game of the season. Auburn and Nebraska, which also played its first road game Oct. 15, were the last two Division I-A teams to play a road game this season ... Arkansas' first-quarter field goal marked the first points allowed by Auburn in the first half this season since the season opener vs. Georgia Tech. The Tigers had shut out their last four opponents during the first half ... Will Herring's blocked field goal in the second quarter was the second blocked field goal by the Tigers this year ... Auburn outscored Arkansas 14-0 in the third quarter, moving its scoring advantage to 51-3 in the third quarter this season ... Auburn was six-of-six on scoring opportunities in the red zone (four touchdowns, two field goals), improving to an SEC-best 28-of-30 in the red zone this season ... LSU

Auburn's streak of 12 consecutive SEC victories came to a close with the 20-17 overtime loss at LSU ... Auburn fell to 3-4 in overtime games. The Tigers' last overtime game was a 30-23 loss at Florida on Oct. 19, 2002 ... Skyler Green's 66-yard punt return for a touchdown was the first punt returned for a touchdown vs. Auburn since James Riddle of Syracuse went 85 yards in 2002 ... Auburn trailed at the half, 7-3. It marked just the third time this season that Auburn has trailed at the half (Georgia Tech, Arkansas) ... The Auburn defense held LSU to 111 total vards and no offensive touchdowns in the first half. LSU entered the game averaging 386.4 yards and 30.8 points per game ... LSU's third-quarter touchdown was the first touchdown allowed by Auburn in the third quarter this season. Auburn entered the game with a 51-3 advantage in points scored during the third quarter ... Auburn trailed 14-10 entering the fourth quarter. It was just the second time this season that Auburn trailed after three quarters (Georgia Tech) ... Kenny Irons' 218 yards rushing vs. LSU ranks 14th in Auburn's single-game rushing list. Irons is just the 14th player in school history to rush for over 200 yards in a single game. The last Tiger to rush for 200+ yards in a game was Carnell Williams with 204 vs. Alabama on Nov. 22, 2003 ... Irons' 74-yard touchdown run in the third guarter was a career-long rush for Irons and the longest play from scrimmage for Auburn this season. The previous long was a 70-yard run by Brad Lester vs. Ball State ... Irons' 74-yard burst is tied for the 24th-longest rush in Auburn history and the longest since Carnell Williams went 80 yards on the first play of the 2003 game vs. Alabama ... Kody Bliss had a 63-yard punt late in the second quarter that went out-of-bounds at the LSU 4-yardline. It was a season and career long punt for Bliss, whose previous career long was a 62-yard boot in 2003 vs. Louisiana-Monroe ... Jake Slaughter's 19-yard reception in the third quarter was his first reception since 2003 and the fourth of his career ... Anthony Mix's 5-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter was his second of the season and the seventh of his career.

OLE MISS

Auburn became bowl eligible for the sixth consecutive season. Auburn had not been to at least six straight bowls since going to nine straight from 1982-90 ... Auburn won its eighth consecutive SEC home game and 10th of its last 11 ... Ole Miss finished with just 23 yards rushing. It marked the seventh time in the last nine meetings that Auburn has held Ole Miss to fewer than 100 yards rushing ... Ole Miss passed for 186 yards. The Auburn defense had not allowed an opponent to throw for 200 yards in a game this season ... Auburn scored first on a 28-yard pass from Courtney Taylor to Devin Aromashodu in the second quarter. It was the fifth time this season that the Tigers have scored first ... The Auburn defense held Ole Miss to just three points, marking the fourth game this season the Tigers have held opponents to single digits ... In SEC play this season, the Auburn defense allowed its first five opponents just 47 total points, an average of 9.4 per game ... Kenny Irons ran for 101 yards on 32 carries, giving him over 100 yards rushing for a third consecutive game ... Ben Obomanu caught his 17th career touchdown pass in the third quarter, tying him for second in Auburn history with Karsten Bailey (1995-98) ... Courtney Taylor's 28-yard touchdown pass to WR Devin Aromashodu in the second guarter was his first pass thrown during his collegiate career, and the first by any Auburn wideout since Tim Carter completed a 39-yard pass to Marcel Willis in 2000 at Florida. It was the first touchdown pass thrown by an Auburn non-quarterback since Carnell Williams hit Anthony Mix for a 29-yard score vs. Georgia in 2004 ... Brandon Cox finished with 205 yards passing. It was the sixth time in seven games that Cox threw for at least 200 yards ... Marquies Gunn finished with three tackles for losses, which was a new career high, including a quarterback sack ... Carl Stewart's 25-yard pass reception in the first quarter was the longest reception of his career ... Devin Aromashodu's touchdown catch was his fourth of the season and the ninth of his career ... Steve Gandy, making his first career start, had his first career interception in the second period, returning it 29 yards.

KENTUCKY

Auburn won its 15th straight game against Kentucky since the Wildcats' last victory in 1966 ... Auburn's 80-yard touchdown drive on the opening possession was the Tigers' eighth scoring drive of 80 or more vards this season ... Auburn led 28-10 at the half. The Tigers improved to 6-0 when leading at the half this season ... Auburn outscored Kentucky 21-3 in the second quarter, improving their scoring margin to 113-20 in the second quarter this season ... In Auburn's last seven games against Kentucky, the Tigers have had 27 rushing touchdowns and six passing touchdowns ... One more rushing yard for Tre Smith (99 yards) would have resulted in Auburn having three Tigers rush for 100 or more yards in a single-game for the first time since 1983 when Tommie Agee (219), Lionel James (115) and Bo Jackson (105) accomplished the feat. Tristan Davis rushed for 162 yards and Kenny Irons 103 vs. Kentucky ... Irons had his fourth straight 100-yard rushing game and his sixth of the season. It was the third time this season he had over 100 yards rushing in the first half ... Irons had three rushing touchdowns in the first half, giving him 10 rushing touchdowns this season. Carnell Williams was the last Auburn back to have three of more rushing touchdowns in a game, scoring six times on the ground vs. Mississippi State in 2003 ... Irons became the 19th player in school history to rush for 10 or more rushing touchdowns in a single season ... Irons carried the ball 23 times, all in the first half, giving him 115 rushing attempts in his last four games ... Tristan Davis also surpassed 100 yards rushing, finishing with 162, marking the first time Auburn has had two backs rush for more than 100 yards since Ronnie Brown (147) and Carnell Williams (122) both went over the century mark in 2004 at Mississippi State ... Brandon Cox finished with 201 yards passing, giving him seven games with 200 or more passing yards this season ... With two catches for 28 yards, Anthony Mix moved into Auburn's top 20 for career pass receptions ... Prechae Rodriguez caught a 41-yard touchdown pass from Brandon Cox in the second quarter. It was the first touchdown catch of Rodriguez's career ... Tristan Davis' 75-yard touchdown run in the third guarter was his second rushing touchdown of the

season on just his third attempt. He had a 52-yard touchdown run earlier this season vs. Ball State, giving him 124 yards rushing on his first three career attempts ... GEORGIA

Auburn won for the 10th time in its last 12 games in Athens ... Auburn moved one game ahead of Georgia for the best record in the SEC since 2000 with a record of 35-12 during that span ... The 31 points scored by Auburn were the most allowed by Georgia this season and the most since 2003 ... Auburn's 92-yard touchdown drive on the opening possession was its longest of the season in terms of yards ... Georgia entered the game allowing an average of 13.8 points and 288.9 yards per game. Auburn scored 14 points and had 274 yards in the first half alone ... Auburn won its 11th game in its last 16 tries vs. teams ranked in the top 10 ... John Vaughn's 20-yard field goal late in the fourth quarter gave the Tigers their first fourth-quarter comeback since a 10-9 victory over LSU in 2004. Vaughn also kicked the extra point to give Auburn the win in that game ... There were nine lead changes in the game, including four in the fourth quarter ... Kenny Irons surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the season, marking the 17th 1,000-yard season in Auburn history ... Irons went over the 100-yard rushing mark on his 14th carry in the second guarter. It was the fourth time this season he surpassed 100 yards rushing in the first half ... Irons had his seventh 100-yard rushing game of the season, tying for third most in a single season in Auburn history ... Cox had not been picked off since the first half of an Oct. 15 game at Arkansas ... Brad Lester had a 30-yard run on his first carry since Oct. 15 at Arkansas. It was his fourth run of at least 20 yards this season ... Ben Obomanu's 30-yard touchdown run in the third quarter was his first career rushing touchdown ... Brandon Cox's 53-yard pass to Devin Aromashodu in the fourth quarter was Auburn's longest pass play of the season. The previous long was a 41-yard touchdown strike to Prechae Rodriguez at Kentucky ... Karibi Dede recovered two fumbles, returning one 15 yards for a touchdown ... Dede's fumble recovery was the second defensive score of the season for Auburn.

ALABAMA

Auburn won its fourth straight game over Alabama for the first time since 1986-89 ... The last time Auburn beat an Alabama team ranked eighth or higher was in 1989 (No. 2 Alabama) ... Auburn improved to 12-5 in its last 17 games against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 10, winning five of its last six ... Auburn clinched a share of the SEC Western Division title, and has now won or shared six of the last seven SEC Western Division titles ... Auburn's 15 seniors played their final game in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Auburn improved to 39-11 over the past four seasons, tying for the most wins during a four-year span in Auburn history ... Auburn has won 22

games over the past two seasons, which is the most over a two-year span in school history ... The Tigers improved to 7-0 this season when scoring first ... Auburn led 21-0 at the end of the first quarter. The 21 points scored by Auburn in the opening period were the most scored by Auburn against Alabama in any quarter since the Tigers scored 21 points during the fourth quarter of a 49-26 Auburn victory in 1969 ... The Auburn defense held Alabama to minus-17 yards of offense in the first quarter, including minus-35 yards during Alabama's first four drives ... The Auburn defense recorded a school record 11 sacks, including five in the first quarter alone ... Auburn scored more points in the first half (28) than Alabama had allowed in any game this season ... The 28 first-half points scored by Auburn were the most by the Tigers against Alabama in any half since Auburn scored 35 second-half points vs. the Tide in 1969 ... Ben Obomanu's seven-yard touchdown reception was the 18th touchdown catch of his career, moving him into sole possession of second on Auburn's career touchdown receptions list ... Obomanu's 45-yard touchdown run marked his second consecutive game with a touchdown run ... With two touchdown passes, Brandon Cox moved into a tie for eighth on Auburn's single-season touchdown passes list with 14 ... Kenny Irons finished with 103 yards rushing, marking his eighth 100-yard rushing game of the season and sixth in a row. His eight 100-yard games is tied for second most in a season in Auburn history with Bo Jackson in 1985, and his six straight 100-yard games is the second-best streak in school history, one behind Joe Cribbs' record of seven set in 1978 ... Irons' eight-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the 13th of the season, moving him into a tie for sixth on the school's single-season rushing touchdowns chart. It was his fifth consecutive game with a rushing touchdown ... With an 18-yard reception in the second quarter, Anthony Mix became the fourth current Auburn player to surpass 1,000 career receiving yards. It is the first known occurrence in SEC history of one team having four career 1,000-yard receivers on its squad at the same time. However, Mix later lost two yards on his next catch, pushing his career total back to 999 ... Cole Bennett had his second touchdown catch of the season and first since the Mississippi State game in the second guarter. It was his third receiving touchdown of his career and fourth overall ... John Vaughn made four extra points, and in the process, became Auburn's all-time leader in extra points made and attempted, passing Damon Duvall (1999-2002) in both categories. Vaughn improved to 127-of-128 for his career in extra
