AROUND THE SEC

Tennessee's Scotty Hopson, a 6-foot-7, 200-pound junior guard from Hopkinsville, Ky., was named SEC Player of the Week after he scored 27 points and had three rebounds in leading the Vols to a win over third-ranked Pitt in Pittsburgh. Hopson exploded for a career-high 27 points during a dominant, 10-for-13 shooting performance that powered Tennessee to the decisive upset of Pitt. Hopson not only helped give the Vols their second win over a top-10 team in 16 days, but he also ensured that the SEC won this year's SEC/Big East Invitational. In what basically amounted to a true road game in a hostile environment, Hopson was a perfect 3-for-3 from 3-point range and also shot 4-for-5 from the free-throw line. Hopson's 17.9 points per game this season lead the Vols and rank fifth in the SEC, and he is shooting a team-best .407 from long range.
- 
Kentucky's Brandon Knight, a 6-foot-3, 195-pound guard from Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., was named SEC Freshman of the Week after averaging 19.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 4.5 assists in wins over 23rd-ranked Notre Dame and Indiana. Knight recorded his fourth 20-point effort this season against the Irish. In the rivalry-win over Indiana, Knight scored five points and pulled down five rebounds over the final 10 minutes to help UK come from one-point down to pull away for the 81-62 win. He went 10-10 from the free throw line against the Hoosiers and has hit 14-straight and 19 of his last 20 from the charity stripe.
- Ole Miss' Chris Warren** became the 11th player in school history to reach the 1,500 career point mark. The senior currently has 1,518 points in 89 career games.
- The SEC finished with a 3-1 record** in the fourth annual SEC/Big East Invitational. Arkansas and Kentucky earned victories over Seton Hall and No. 23 Notre Dame, respectively, on Wednesday, Jan. 8, in Louisville, Ky. Tennessee upset No. 3 Pittsburgh while Auburn fell to Rutgers at the CONSOL Energy Center in Pittsburgh on Dec. 11.
- Four SEC teams** are receiving mention in the latest Associated Press poll. Tennessee (7th) and Kentucky (16th) are among the Top 25 while Florida and Vanderbilt are receiving votes.
- Vanderbilt's Brad Tinsley** became the 20th SEC player to record a triple-double when he achieved the feat in the Commodores' season-opener against Presbyterian on Nov. 12, 2010. His 11 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists marked the first triple-double in Vanderbilt's 110-year history.
- Six SEC players** are on preseason watch lists for either the John R. Wooden Award or the Naismith Award. Jeff Taylor (VU) and Trey Thompkins (UG) are listed on both preseason lists. Kenny Boynton (UF) is on the Wooden list while Brandon Knight (UK), Chandler Parsons (UF) and Chris Warren (UM) are on the Naismith watch list.

2011 SEC Tournament

March 10-13 • Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

The 2011 Southeastern Conference Men's Basketball Tournament will be held in a familiar setting as the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, Ga., again plays host to this event. The Georgia Dome, a world-class facility with basketball seating configuration of 26,000, serves as the site of the 12-team tournament for the ninth time in 14 years and the 10th time overall in league history. The Georgia Dome has hosted the SEC Tournament in 1995, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2002, 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008 and has been the site of the NCAA Tournament Final Four in 2002 and 2007. The 2011 event will mark the 13th time Atlanta has played host to the SEC Men's Basketball Tournament (1933, 1934, 1987, 1995, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2002, 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008).



The winner of the 11-game tournament receives the SEC's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The tournament seeds, conference championship and division titles are determined by the 16-game conference schedule during the regular season. Teams are seeded by their divisional finish and features Eastern Division-Western Division matchups in every game should the higher seed win each contest.

Atlanta served as host of the inaugural SEC Tournament played following the 1932-33 season and did so again after the 1933-34 season. The event was held every year through 1952, with the exception of 1935. After a 26-year lay-off (1953-78), the tournament was renewed in 1979. The 2010 tournament will be the 51st in league history and the 32nd since the renewal.

The SEC has shown extraordinary balance in the tournament, evidenced by the fact that a different school won the first seven titles after the renewal. The event has helped set the stage for SEC teams in the NCAA Tournament, as 23 of the last 30 tournament champions have advanced to at least the Sweet 16 with five of the last 14 going on to win the national championship. Since the renewal in 1979, the SEC Tournament Champion has failed to win at least one NCAA Tournament game only four times.

Kentucky leads the league with 26 SEC Tournament titles. Alabama is second with six, while Tennessee ranks third with four. Florida and Mississippi State each have three championship trophies. Arkansas, Auburn, Georgia, LSU, Ole Miss, Vanderbilt and former league member Georgia Tech have each won one SEC Tournament championship.

Media Tabs Florida as 2011 SEC Champion

Florida was predicted to win the 2011 Southeastern Conference men's basketball championship in voting by a select panel of both SEC and national media members. Each SEC school selected media members that cover their team and additional writers from across the nation were selected by the conference office to form the voting panel.

The Gators are coming off a 21-13 season and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament. They earned eight first-place votes, topping Mississippi State which earned three votes. Tennessee and Kentucky each received two votes and Georgia garnered one vote as SEC Champion. Florida returns all five starters, including Kenny Boynton, Erving Walker, Chandler Parsons, Alex Tyus and Vernon Macklin while adding one of the top recruiting classes in the nation.

Florida was the media's favorite to win the East with 110 total points (13 first-place votes), ahead of second-place Kentucky's 95 points (three first-place votes). Georgia (72 points) and Tennessee (71 points) were separated by just one point while Vanderbilt and South Carolina rounded out the top six.

In the West, Mississippi State's 118 total points (18 first-place votes) were ahead of Ole Miss' 84 points (two first-place votes). Alabama was picked third with 82 points. Arkansas, LSU and Auburn round out the top six in the West.

Ole Miss' Chris Warren - a student-athlete who excels both on and off the court - has been tabbed as candidates for the 2010-11 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - classroom, character, community and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School™, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The candidate class will be narrowed to 10 men's and 10 women's finalists midway through the regular season, and those names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one finalist who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of community, classroom, character and competition.

Three SEC Players On Preseason Wooden List

Three SEC players were on the John R. Wooden Award Preseason Top 50 list that was announced in October by The Los Angeles Athletic Club. The list is comprised of 50 student-athletes who, based on last year's individual performance and team records, are the early frontrunners for college basketball's most prestigious honor.

SEC players on the list are: Florida's Kenny Boynton, Vanderbilt's Jeffery Taylor and Georgia's Trey Thompkins.

Transfers, freshmen and medical redshirts are not eligible for the preseason list. These players and others who excel throughout the season will be evaluated and considered for December's Midseason list and the official voting ballot released in March. The National Ballot consists of approximately 20 top players who have proven to their universities that they are also making progress toward graduation and maintaining at least a cumulative 2.0 GPA. The Wooden Award All-American Team will be announced the week of the "Elite Eight" round during the NCAA Tournament.

The 35th annual Wooden Award ceremony, which will include the announcement of the Men's and Women's Wooden Award winners, a special tribute to Coach Wooden and Wooden Award founder Duke Llewellyn, and the presentation of the Wooden Award All American Teams and the Legends of Coaching Award, will take place the weekend of April 8-10, 2011.

Five SEC Players On Naismith Award Preseason Watch List

Five players from the Southeastern Conference are listed on the 2010-11 Naismith preseason watch list, the Atlanta Tipoff Club announced on Nov. 16.

Included on the list are Kentucky's Brandon Knight, Florida's Chandler Parsons, Vanderbilt's Jeff Taylor, Georgia's Trey Thompkins and Ole Miss' Chris Warren.

The watch list was compiled by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors, which based its criteria on player performances from the previous year and expectations for the 2010-11 college basketball season. The Naismith Trophy presented by AT&T will be awarded at the 2011 NCAA Men's Final Four in Houston.

In late February, the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors will compile a mid-season team of the top 30 players in the nation. Then in March, the Naismith Trophy voting academy will vote to narrow the list to the four finalists.

The Naismith Trophy is the most prestigious national award presented annually to college basketball's player of the year. For more information, visit www.naismithawards.com.

Strong NBA Presence

The Southeastern Conference maintains its strong presence in the NBA for the 2010-11 season as 40 former players were on 20 of the 30 NBA team's rosters to open the season. Nine of the 12 SEC schools have former standouts holding roster spots at the beginning of the league's 65th season.

Kentucky tops the list with 13 and former players on the rosters of 12 different NBA squads. Florida lists nine players on eight teams while LSU has seven former players with six different franchises. Boston, Chicago and San Antonio each have four former SEC standouts on its team while Charlotte, Miami and Orlando all have three SEC alums on their rosters.

Bolstering the list of former SEC players, Alabama has four former players in the league. Arkansas has three players while Auburn, Ole Miss, South Carolina and Tennessee each have one.

Pat Riley (Kentucky) and Ernie Grunfeld (Tennessee) highlight the front office list as team presidents for the Miami Heat and Washington Wizards, respectively. The NBA also lists nine assistant coaches who attended college at a current SEC institution.

Poll Worthy

The SEC is the one of just two conferences in the nation to have all of its teams ranked at least one week in the Associated Press top 25 (excluding pre-season polls) since 1999-00. Simply stated, every SEC team has been a top-25 team nationally at one point in the last 10 seasons.

Big Attendance Numbers, Again

More than 2.5 million fans have witnessed SEC basketball in each of the last four seasons. The SEC posted the fourth-largest season attendance in league history, totaling **2,518,749** fans for games featuring SEC teams in 2009-10. A record 2,638,852 fans saw SEC basketball in 2008-09 while 2,562,073 were in attendance in 2006-07 and 2,561,545 for the 2007-08 season.

Kentucky and Tennessee were both ranked among the top five nationally in average attendance. The Wildcats led the nation with an average of 24,110 fans per game while the Vols were fourth with an average of 19,168.

The SEC is 43-22 (66.2 percent) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament over the last 12 tournaments (since 1999). In 1999 the SEC won each of its six first round games, becoming the first conference to have six teams win their first round games in the same season.

How Sweet It Is

The Southeastern Conference has had at least one team advance to the Sweet 16 in 20 of the last 21 years. The SEC record for most teams advancing to the Sweet 16 is four which was accomplished in 1986 (Alabama, Auburn, Kentucky, LSU) and in 1996 (Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State). Eleven of the SEC's 12 members have advanced to the Sweet 16 since 1996.

SECond To None

During the 2006-07 academic year the Southeastern Conference became the first conference to win the Division I National Championship in Football (Florida), Men's Basketball (Florida) and Women's Basketball (Tennessee) in the same school year.

Only the SEC and the Big East have ever won both the men's and women's basketball titles in one season. SEC won both three times in 1996, 1998 and 2007. The Big East has won both twice in 2003 and 2004.

The SEC swept both the NIT and NCAA Tournaments in 2006 when Florida won its first NCAA championship and South Carolina earned its second straight NIT title. Only four conferences have won both the NIT and NCAA title, including the Big East (2003), ACC (1992) and Big Ten (1979)

Spreading The Wealth

Since the 1980-81 season, each of the 12 SEC schools has captured either an SEC divisional, overall or tournament title and 11 different schools have won or shared the SEC Championship since the league's inception in 1933.

UA held a 16-13 advantage on the offensive glass and capitalized on 40.5 percent of its offensive rebounding opportunities to Providence's 31.3 percent. This is the fifth meeting between the Tigers and Bulls with Auburn winning all four of the previous games. However, the two haven't played in 31 years, dating back to a 74-56 Auburn win in Tampa on Dec. 15, 1979, the season before the Sun Dome opened. The Tigers are 2-0 vs. the Bulls in both Auburn and Tampa. Auburn has a 6-2 (.750) record overall in games played in Tampa. Although Auburn lost to Rutgers in Pittsburgh in the DirecTV SEC-Big East Invitational on Saturday, the Tigers are playing their first true road game of the season. Auburn opened with seven straight home games at brand new Auburn Arena. Auburn is playing the back end of two straight Big East opponents on the road at South Florida. The Tigers lost to Rutgers 63-54 on Saturday in the DirecTV SEC-Big East Invitational in Pittsburgh. In Auburn's last three games, two wins against Arkansas-Pine Bluff and Georgia Southwestern and a loss vs. Rutgers, the Tigers have only allowed an average of 27.3 points the second half. In both wins, the Tigers allowed 24 second half points in each game. In the loss, Auburn allowed Rutgers 34 points after halftime. Sophomore Earnest Ross recorded the second double-double of his career with 15 points, 10 rebounds and five assists vs. Rutgers on Dec. 11. Kenny Gabriel tied his career-high with 18 points on 4-of-7 field goals, including 3-of-5 three-pointers and 7-of-8 free throws vs. Rutgers on Dec. 11. It was the first time the Charlotte, N.C., native reached double figures since the season opener when he had a double-double with 18 points and 13 rebounds vs. UNC Asheville. He had only scored 26 points in the six games in between, an average of 4.3 ppg. In fact during the drought, he was only 10-of-35 (.286) from the field and 1-of-15 (.067) from 3-point range. Gabriel had missed 15 straight 3-point attempts after making his first one vs. Samford on Nov. 19 until making his second one vs. Rutgers on Dec. 11.

The University of Florida improved to 7-2 with a 65-52 victory over Kent State. Alex Tyus led the Gators with 20 points, while Vernon Macklin added 19 and eight rebounds as the Gators dominated in the paint, out-scoring Kent 46-16 in the paint. The Gators were rock solid defensively once again, holding Kent to just 34.5 percent from the floor - 28.6 percent in the second half. It was the fourth straight game the Gators have held an opponent under 60 points and the third time in four games they held their opponent under 40 percent shooting as they're quickly developing a defensive knack and identity. Over the last four games UF has held its opponents to just 51.5 points per game, 37.0 percent from the floor and 33.0 percent from beyond the arc. They turned Kent over 15 times and got 12 points off of turnovers. The Gators dominated the glass again, out-rebounding Kent, 40-32, including 14 offensive boards. The Gators got 17 second chance points while surrendering just two. UF has out-rebounded eight of nine opponents to start the year. Florida takes a break for finals and returns to face No. 5 Kansas State on Dec. 18 in Sunrise, Fla.

Georgia makes its biennial trip to play in-state rival Georgia Tech in Atlanta in a Tuesday night contest. The Bulldogs arrive at this game with a 5-2 record overall, having defeated UAB 66-64 in their most recent outing four nights ago in Athens. The UAB game represented yet another close call in a season full of them so far. All seven games to date featured 2-possession margins inside the final minute of play. Four of them were decided on the game's last possession. Last season, 13 of Georgia's 31 games had such characteristics, and the Bulldogs were 5-8 in those contests. The Georgia - Georgia Tech series returned to campus sites for the 1995-96 season after 14 straight meetings at the Omni in Atlanta. The home team has won every time since, with one exception: 10 years + 1 day ago, Georgia won 75-70 at Alexander Memorial Coliseum. Tech's last win in Athens came 14 tries ago, on Nov. 26, 1976 in a 64-43 outcome. Tuesday's game coincides with the last day of Fall Semester classes at UGA. The Bulldogs will take an 11-day break from competition for final exams before resuming the 2010-11 season Dec. 18 against Arkansas State, which features two former SEC coaches on its staff: head coach John Brady and assistant Richard Williams. It would take a prodigious effort, but junior Trey Thompkins could score his 1,000th career point in the Georgia Tech game. He needs 33 points to become the 40th player in UGA history to reach that milestone. That Thompkins not only participated in the Old Spice Classic but affected the outcome of each game were minor miracles in themselves. He was cleared to practice just one day before the Bulldogs departed for Orlando. He had gone 25 days without participating before diving in on Tuesday, Nov. 23.

The LSU Tigers are now 6-2 on the season and face a busy week, hosting Coastal Carolina on Monday at 7 p.m. and McNeese State Thursday at 7 p.m. before traveling to Bossier City, La. for a "neutral court" home game against Wichita State at the CenturyTel Center. The McNeese game will be televised by Cox Sports TV and CST has just announced they will pick up the Cox Kansas feed of the game and broadcast it live Saturday night in the CST viewing area. In LSU's first game in 11 days because of final exams, LSU was a rallying 59-55 winner over Central Michigan on Saturday night at the PMAC. LSU was 11 points down with 14 minutes to play in the game before tying the game with 2:03 to play. LSU was able to make its last 12 free throws after starting the night 4-of-10. LSU shot 62 percent in the second half from the field and 47 percent for the game. Malcolm White was the lone Tiger in double figures with 12 points. It marked just the third time in 22 games in the Trent Johnson era that LSU won a game scoring under 60 points and the fifth time that LSU won when trailing at the 10 minute and 5 minute marks of the game.

Ole Miss improved to 6-2 on the season with a 101-69 win over Mississippi Valley State on Monday night. It was the highest point total by the Rebels since a 108-64 win over Centenary in December of last year. Chris Warren led six Rebels in double figures with his 18 points. The senior point guard also moved into 10th place on the school's career scoring list with 1,518 points. Trevor Gaskins added 15 points, and Terrance Henry had 14 and a team-best eight rebounds. Newcomers Nick Williams, Dundreous Nelson and Demarco Cox each chipped in 10 points. Reginald Buckner tied a career high with five blocks, which he has done four times in eight games this season. Ole Miss hosts ETSU in Oxford on Saturday, which is technically part of the Cancun Governor's Cup. The Rebels head to Mexico next week for three games in Cancun, beginning with a Dec. 22 matchup against Texas State.

The game will be the second nationally-televised game for South Carolina and their second game against a ranked opponent. The Commodores dropped an 85-82 overtime decision to Missouri in Columbia on December 8. Vanderbilt dropped its first true road contest of the season against #15/11 Missouri. VU played its first overtime game of the 2010-11 campaign, and their first since a 96-94 win over Georgia on February 25, 2010. The Commodores are now 55-49 in overtime games. Vanderbilt's last overtime loss came at Alabama on March 8, 2008 (73-78). The Commodores shot 52.5% for the game against Missouri, the sixth time this season that VU has shot over 50%. Wednesday was the first loss when shooting 50% or better. Vanderbilt was 11-for-22 from the charity stripe (50%), its lowest of the season. The previous low was 69.2% (18-26) against Nebraska on November 18. Missouri attempted 81 shots in the game, the most by an opponent all season, and the most since South Carolina attempted 81 on February 28, 2009. The Commodores had 10 blocks as a team, which tied for the most in the Stallings era (10 vs. Southern Miss (1/2/09); vs. MTSU (1/4/10); vs. Manhattan (12/30/09). John Jenkins led the team with 23 points, his sixth 20+ effort of the season. He was 7-for-14 from the field, 5-for-10 from three, and 4-for-4 from the free throw line. Jeffery Taylor scored 18 points and grabbed 10 rebounds, his sixth career double-double and his first of 2010-11. Festus Ezeli tallied 16 points, his seventh double-figure scoring game of the season and 10th of his career. He also pulled down nine rebounds. Ezeli was 6-of-7 from the floor. He is now 28-for-35 from the field in his last four contests. Ezeli also had a career-high six blocks, the first time since Julian Terrell blocked six against Appalachian State on December 22, 2003. Vanderbilt does not play again until Saturday, December 18, against Southeastern Louisiana.
