POST-GAME INTERVIEWS


Interviews with players and coaches are done in an informal manner on the field following each game. For assistance in locating any member of the Auburn team, contact Hank Hager.



2005 PREVIEW



Just a season removed from the best campaign in the eight-year history of the program, the Auburn softball team is ready to move forward. The Tigers are looking to make it two seasons in a row in NCAA Tournament play and three in the last four years.

Head coach Tina Deese, the architect of Auburn softball, brings a talented and experienced, but relatively young squad to Jane B. Moore Field this season. While the Tigers lost five players - four to graduation - from a team that went 42-18, players like Sara Dean, a 2004 All-Southeastern Conference first team member, and Ashley Griffin will lead an energized 2005 Tiger team.

"This is a team that has a lot of talent on the field, but what our returners bring off it are valuable as well," Deese said. "Our seniors and juniors have experience and our freshmen and sophomores are getting more and more mature in terms of their softball mentality each and every day."

Auburn returns a team that has an incredible amount of balance. All but one of the 2004 starting infield returns, while three outfielders have significant collegiate experience. Additionally, the team's top returners at the circle combined for 14 wins, 143 strikeouts and five shutouts in 162 innings of work last season.

"This is one of the most balanced teams I've ever had at Auburn," Deese said, entering her ninth season at the helm of the Tigers. "At a number of positions, we have players who can step in or continue the success they had last season."

INFIELD

Auburn returns 80 percent of an infield that committed a combined 40 errors in 60 games in 2004. Only Martha Phillips, who played 58 games at first base, was lost to graduation.

Senior catcher Sara Dean, an All-SEC team member in 2004, returns after batting .333 with a team-leading 30 runs batted in last season. The senior batted .359 with runners on base in 2004, and enters the 2005 season with a career .301 batting average.

Dean, a Valencia, Calif., native also earned Third-Team All-America and First-Team All-Region honors.

"Sara is a outstanding player," Deese said. "She deserved every honor she received last season. She has a chance to become one of the best players to don an Auburn uniform."

The team's middle infield of Lolani Alvarez - second base - and Ashley Griffin shortstop - provided Auburn with the type of defensive wizardry all top SEC teams value. Not only does the duo present solid fielding, but they also make noise with their bats. Alvarez led Auburn with 10 sacrifice hits in 2004, her first season on the Plains, while Griffin batted .273 with a team-leading 34 runs scored and six home runs.

"Lolani and Ashley are the heart of our

defense," Deese said. "They provide us with leadership up the middle and made solid offensive contributions last season."

Auburn's corner positions will be something to keep an eye on in 2005. Kristina McCain, an All-SEC Freshman selection in 2004, gets the nod again at third base. She batted .255 with 11 RBI last season. Better yet, she was successful on nine of 11 stolen base attempts and made just nine errors in 57 games.

The final piece of the infield puzzle, first base, should be filled by both senior Paige Jones and Holly Currie. Jones enters her final season with eight career home runs and 34 RBI, while Currie has become the team's maestro from the rubber. She can also make her mark from the batter's box, hitting .278 last season.

"You always need strong defenders at the corners, but players who can also swing the bat," Deese said. "Kristina, Holly and Paige are players at different points of their careers, and three who will make an impact on our team in their own way this season."

Beth DiPietro, when not throwing from the circle, Robin Martin, redshirt freshman Nicole Russo and newcomer Starr Dorsey will help buoy the Auburn infield in 2005. DiPietro did not make an appearance at the the infield last season, but, along with Russo, should battle for the third base spot.

Dorsey, meanwhile, comes to the program from Auburn High School and will add quality depth up the middle.

"Beth, Robin and Starr will make an impact in their own ways this season," Deese said. "Beth will be one of our top pitchers and will also get a chance to swing the bat. Robin has made the transition to catcher and is a player who can play anywhere in the infield.

"Nicole got the chance to see what collegiate softball is like from the dugout last season. She has made significant strides in her season on the Plains. Starr, meanwhile, will be a solid backup in her first season of collegiate softball. She plays excellent defense at second base."

OUTFIELD

A somewhat inexperienced outfield in 2004 has matured and will become a key for Auburn in 2005. The Tigers return two starters and receive the services of junior college transfer Amy Shaw, in addition to highly-touted newcomer Brittany Scott.

Sara Ghezzi returns after an All-SEC Freshman team-caliber season where she batted .253 with 14 RBI. She is expected to patrol right field for the Tigers after committing just three errors in 60 games last season.

"Sara has the necessary tools to become an outstanding right fielder," Deese said. "She has a great arm and great instincts."

Lauren Walton, meanwhile, will start in left. She committed one error while patrolling Auburn's outfield in 2004. Walton also enters 2005 as one of the team's most capable base stealers, swiping 10 of her 13 attempts last season, and has made strides at the plate.

"Lauren is one of our fastest players," Deese said. "She was successful on all but three stolen base attempts last season. That translates into quick, instinctive play in the outfield. She will do well in her switch to left field."

Rounding out Auburn's starting trio is Shaw, a newcomer from Ashville High School. She was a first-team All-American last season and a third-team All-American as a freshman.

"Amy has incredible speed," Deese said. "She really knows how to patrol the outfield. She knows where to be and how to get there."

The trio will be joined by Scott and returner Krista Barts. Barts played in just one game in 2004, but had returned from an injury that kept her out all of the 2003 season.

Scott is another member of Auburn's highly-touted recruiting class. She comes to the Tiger

program from Mt. Dora High School in Florida. There, she batted .481 with 12 RBI and 16 stolen bases her senior season.

"Brittany brings great tools and intensity," Deese said. "She was a top player in high school and I expect to see her do well at the collegiate level."

PITCHING

With Kristen Keyes ending her spectacular three-year Auburn career in 2004, the onus will be on Currie and DiPietro to make the most out of their sophomore seasons.

The duo made significant impressions their first collegiate seasons, combining to appear in 41 games from the circle, starting 28.

"Holly and Beth were very valuable as our No. 2 and 3 pitchers last season," Deese said. "They learned well from watching and listening to Kristen and they should take that knowledge into 2005."

Currie went 8-3 in 2004, sporting a 2.13 earned run average. Opposing batters hit just .191 against her, including .158 from the right side of the box.

It is not a question of if Currie will one day be Auburn's ace. It's only a matter of when.

"Holly has all the right tools to be a great pitcher in the SEC," Deese said. "She had a great freshman season and I expect her to build upon that season and be the power pitcher we need in the SEC."

DiPietro, meanwhile, returns after posting a 6-3 mark in 2004 with a 1.20 ERA in 70 innings worked. She gave up only 10 extra base hits, keeping opposing batters to nothing more than doubles last season.

Auburn gets newcomer Brittany Day into

the mix this season, and Deese expects the Columbus, Ga., native to make her mark as the team's No. 3 pitcher.

SCHEDULE

Rainouts proved to be somewhat costly for the Tigers in 2004. Ranked opponents were on Auburn's early schedule, but the Tigers did not get a chance to play one until halfway through the season.

In 2005, Auburn will get a taste of ranked action. The Tigers will face seven opponents

who finished the 2004 season in the NFCA Top 25 poll and another, Florida, which ended by receiving votes.

"We always want to play a tough schedule, whether that's in non-conference or SEC play," Deese said. "To be the best, you have to play the best. We expect to make it to the postseason every year and the best way to get ready for that is to play quality opponents."

Auburn will hit the road early, heading to Miami, Fla., for the Florida International Tournament the first weekend of the season (Feb. 4-6). The Tigers will host the Tiger Invitational (Feb. 11-13) and War Eagle Classic (Feb. 18-20) at Moore Field.

After that, Auburn heads to Stanford to participate in the Stanford Invitational. The Tigers will visit Boyd & Jill Smith Family Stadium, the site of their 2004 NCAA Regional appearance.

"It will be nice to visit California again, but our focus will be on our opponents," Deese said. "Our five opponents there will present good early-season matchups."

Auburn participates in the Buzz Classic in Atlanta, Ga., for its final non-conference tournament, then begins Southeastern Conference play by hosting Arkansas at Jane B. Moore Field.

Six of Auburn's 10 SEC opponents made appearances in an NCAA Regional in 2004. Much of the same can be expected in 2005.

"The SEC is always one of the best conferences in the nation," Deese said. "I expect nothing less this season. Each game is a challenge for each team in the conference.

"Our goal is to win our division, then advance to the SEC Championship game, and ultimately visit an NCAA Regional."



MOORE FIELD





Auburn enters its third full season at newly renovated Jane B. Moore Field, home to Tiger softball.

The Tigers played their first full season at the modern Moore Field in 2003, and, in 2004, went 19-5 en route to an NCAA Regional appearance. Auburn has utilized its home field advantage, going 48-24 in three seasons at the current incarnation of Moore Field and 104-86-1 at home since 1997.

The final phase of the softball complex, completed prior to the 2003 season, added 1,400 seats, a concession area, indoor batting cages and a state-of-the-art press box with two luxury boxes.

The Tigers started playing at the facility on Apri 24, 1998, when they played their first home game at the new on-campus field. The Tigers hosted Georgia, also making it the first SEC game played at the facility. Junior Kim Blair recorded the first hit for the Tigers while senior Ashley Camp drove in Blair for the first run at the new park.

1999 marked the first full season the field was in use. Prior to the new complex, the team played its games at the Auburn city complex. "The Auburn Complex was adequate," said Auburn head coach Tina Deese, "It just wasn't ours. It didn't offer the stadium type environment that we want to have."

The dream of an on campus facility, which began when softball was added as an intercgiate sport started to take form in November of 1996, when the Board of Trustees approved a bid from French and Associates Landscape Architects for the construction of phase one which was intended include the actual playing surface. French and Associates was responsible for the design and construction of Golden Park in Columbus, Ga., which was host to the 1996 NCAA Women's College World Series and the 1996 Summer Olympic Games Softball competition. The firm was also responsible for the construction of the South Commons Softball Complex in Columbus, including its centerpiece, the South Commons Stadium, which was the host to the SEC tournament from 1997-2000.

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new complex were held on August 4, 1998, on a plot of land adjacent to the intramural fields, in an area of campus that would eventually be home to the women's sports complex, the McWhorter Center. The complex houses offices for soccer, softball and gymnastics, and also contains the gymnastics team's practice area.

Phase one of the softball complex consisted of the construction of the playing field, including the outfield fences, bullpens, dugouts, and restroom facilities and a state-of-the-art scoreboard.

"We are extremely excited about having a facility of our own. It is hard to be competitive in the SEC without your own on-campus complex," said Deese.

During 1997, the league's inaugural season of softball, six of the eleven sponsoring schools had stadiums. That list included brand new facilities at Tennessee, Florida, Arkansas and Mississippi State.

In addition to the obvious recruiting benefits, the complex offers other benefits to the Tigers as well.

The plans for the facility called for it to resemble a scaled down version of the home of Auburn Baseball, Plainsman Park at Hitchcock Field. Permanent seating for 1,500 was built in phase two of the project.

The Auburn Softball Complex was renamed Jane B. Moore Field in 2002 in honor of Dr. Jane Moore who served more than 20 years as a member of Auburn's Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics.

In 2004, Deese posted a 42-18 record with the Tigers, the best season in program history. The Tigers won 19 games in the SEC, finishing second



in the Western Division, and were a game away from earning a spot in the SEC Championship game. Auburn finished the season ranked 20th, a program first.

In her first season, Deese led Auburn to a 34-35 overall record and a third-place finish in the SEC Tournament. However, tough times followed as the Tigers suffered two more losing seasons before Deese guided the program to its first winning season in 2000. That team finished 34-31 overall and proved that Auburn was a program on the rise.

In her time at Auburn, Deese has helped mentor one second-team All-American and two third-team All-Americans. In addition, she has tutored 11 first and second-team All-SEC players.





Thirty-five players during Deese's tenure at Auburn have been named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

Entering her 14th year as a head coach, Deese was also responsible for starting the softball program at Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala.

In her eight seasons at Huntingdon, Deese proved her ability to build a program as she amassed a 286-123 record. She led her teams to seven straight winning seasons and third-place finishes in the NAIA (National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics) in 1992 and 1994. Those years, she won 49 and 55 games, respectively. In 1992, Deese was named NAIA District 27 Coach of the Year.

In addition to her duties as Huntingdon softball coach, Deese also handled volleyball head coaching duties.

Prior to her arrival at Huntingdon, Deese served as a pitching coach at her alma mater, Florida State, from 1985-86.

Deese began her playing career in 1982 as a member of Golden West College's (Calif.) Varsity Softball team. She helped lead the team to the California State Championship in 1983 and was named the California State Championship Most Valuable Player.

Her accomplishments at Golden West led her to Florida State where

she once again was greeted with immediate success. In 1984, her first season with the Seminoles, Deese led the nation in strikeouts per seven innings at 11.6, which remains tied for fifth in NCAA history. As a result, she was named the Lady Seminoles Most Valuable Player while helping lead the team to the Florida State Championship. She was also named to the All-Southeast Region First Team -- a feat she duplicated her second season and final season at Florida State.

Deese received a bachelor of science degree in leisure services and studies from Florida State in 1986. She later received a bachelor of arts degree from Huntingdon College in human performance and kinesiology in 1994. She completed her master of arts in teaching from Troy State University in 1995.

Deese and her husband, Allen, have one son, Kyler, 11, and daughter, Jessi, 6.

FIRST YEAR

Jack Byerley enters his first season as an assistant coach for the Auburn softball team. He was named to the staff in August, 2004, after two years as the head coach at Francis Marion University in Florence, S.C.

Byerley serves as the team's top assistant and works primarily with Auburn's hitters. In addition, he also oversees the Tigers' infielders.

Prior to joining Auburn, Byerley led Francis Marion to a 73-26 record. He guided the Patriots to a 36-9 mark in 2003, then bettered that a year later, going 37-17. In 2003, Francis Marion earned its first ever national ranking in Division II play.

Byerley served as the top assistant at the University of Florida from

2000-02, helping lead the Gators to an NCAA Regional appearance in 2001.

Prior to his stint at Florida, Byerley was the head coach at Central Alabama Community College from 1996-2000, posting a 205-47 record.

He came to Alexander City from Robertsdale High School in Alabama, where was the head coach from 1981-96.

The Albuquerque, N.M., native graduated from the University of South Alabama in 1981 with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education and Health.

He and his wife, the former Barbara O'Berry, have four children; daughter Jennifer (22), and sons Brien (20), J.J. (12) and Blake (11).

Former Auburn standout Ashley Moore enters her first season as an assistant coach for the Tigers, having joined Tina Deese's staff in September.


Moore played for the Tigers from 1999 to 2002, breaking 15 school records along the way. She is Auburn's all-time leader in hits, runs, doubles, hit by pitches and total bases. In addition, she is second all-time in runs batted in, home runs, on-base percentage and slugging percentage.

Moore became the program's first ever Second-Team All-American honoree in 2001 after batting .381 with 22 doubles, 11 home runs and 40 RBI. She garnered First-Team All-Southeastern Conference honors in 2001 and 2002 and was named to the All-Region team both seasons.

Moore holds Auburn's single-season record for home runs, collecting 17 during the 2002 season.

After her four-year career with the Tigers, Moore served as a student assistant coach for the 2003 season, then was drafted by the New England Riptide of the National Pro Fastpitch Softball League in January 2004.

The Birmingham, Ala., native graduated from Auburn in 2002 with a degree in physical education. Moore came to Auburn from Vestavia Hills High School, where she earned 15 varsity letters in volleyball, softball, basketball, swimming and track. She earned three first-team All-State honors while at Vestavia Hills.
