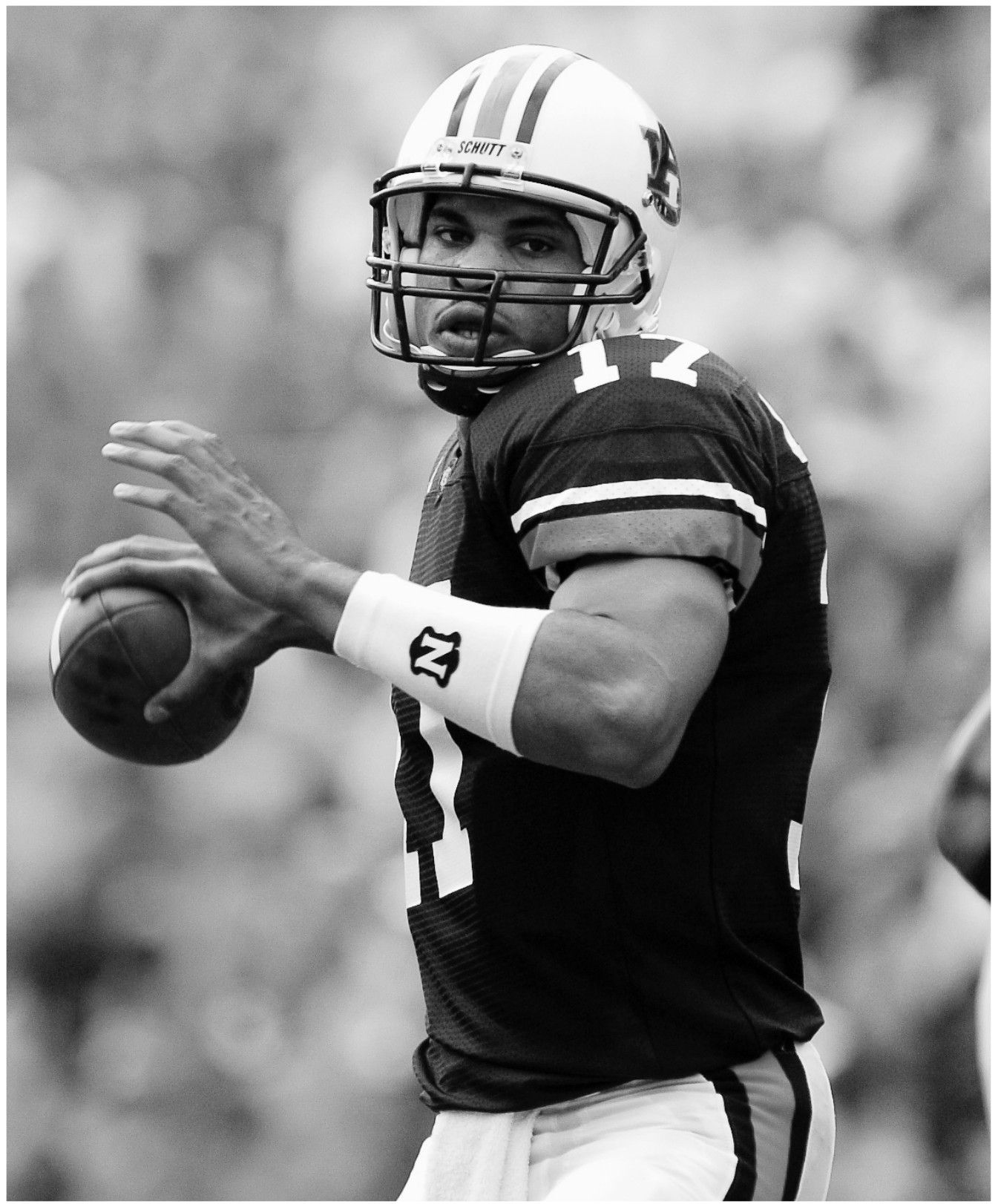

### THE GAME

Auburn will play in its first Bowl Championship Series game in school history when it takes on ninth-ranked Virginia Tech in the 71st Nokia Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La., on Jan. 3. The Tigers earned a berth by capturing the Southeastern Conference Championship, while the Hokies advanced as the Atlantic Coast Conference champions.

### AUBURN'S BOWL HISTORY

This season's bowl appearance will mark the 31st time that the Tigers have played in a bowl game. Auburn has a 16-12-2 record in its previous 30 bowl games and has played in a bowl game in 17 of the last 23 years.

The Tigers are appearing in a bowl game for the fifth consecutive year for the first time since making bowl trips in nine consecutive years from 1982-90. It is just the third time in school history that Auburn has made five consecutive bowl trips. The Tigers also made six straight bowl trips from 1968-74.

Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 11-5-1 in bowl games, winning four consecutive from 1974 to 1984 ('74 Gator, '82 Tangerine, '83 Sugar, '84 Liberty).

### TUBERVILLE IN BOWL GAMES

Tommy Tuberville is 3-2 all-time in bowl games as a head coach, including a 2-2 mark at Auburn. Tuberville has guided the Tigers to consecutive bowl wins, defeating Wisconsin, 28-14, in the 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl in Nashville, Tenn. last year and a 13-9 victory over Penn State in the 2003 Capital One Bowl in Orlando, Fla.

Tuberville also guided the Tigers to the 2001 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (16-10 loss to North Carolina) and 2001 Capital One Florida Citrus Bowl (31-28 loss to Michigan). As a head coach at Ole Miss, Tuberville led the Rebels to a 34-31 win in the 1997 Motor City Bowl.

As both a head coach and an assistant coach, Tuberville is 8-5 in bowl games. While an assistant at Miami, Tuberville was 5-3 in bowl games, including five straight wins from 1988 to 1992.

### IN THE SUGAR BOWL

Auburn will be making its fifth appearance in the Nokia Sugar Bowl and first since 1989. The Tigers, which made three Sugar Bowl appearances in a six-year span in the 1980's, are 1-2-1 all-time at the Sugar Bowl. The only other bowl game the Tigers have made more appearances in is the Gator Bowl with six.

### TIGERS' BOWL NOTABLES

Auburn will be searching for its first three-game bowl winning streak since the 1982-83-84 seasons when it won the 1982 Tangerine Bowl, 1984 Sugar Bowl and 1984 Liberty Bowl ... The Tigers are tied for 16th all-time with Ole Miss in bowl appearances (31) and tied for 14th all-time in bowl victories (16) ... Auburn's defense has allowed one passing touchdown in a bowl game in the last 14 quarters ... The Tigers are 9-3-2 in bowl games when scoring first ... RB Ronnie Brown's 184 rushing yards and 37 carries in the 2003 Capital One Bowl are Auburn individual bowl game records.

### TIGERS AND THE HOKIES

The Nokia Sugar Bowl will be the fifth all-time meeting between Auburn and Virginia Tech, but first since 1978, a 18-7 Auburn win in Blacksburg. The two teams also met in 1924, '25 and '75.

**TUBERVILLE AGAINST THE ACC**

The Nokia Sugar Bowl match-up against Virginia Tech will mark Tommy Tuberville's third game against an ACC opponent as a head coach. Tuberville's first ACC opponent was a 16-10 loss to North Carolina in the 2001 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl, with the second coming in a 17-3 loss at Georgia Tech in 2003.

**ASSISTANTS IN BOWLS**

Auburn's post-season appearance will mark a return visit to a bowl for several Tiger assistant coaches. Linebackers coach Joe Whitt will be making his 17th bowl appearance while quarterbacks coach Steve Ensminger will be going to his 10th bowl game. Offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive line coach Terry Price will be going to their ninth bowl. Ensminger played in three bowls at LSU as did Price while at Texas A&M. Nall played in two while at Georgia.

**FINAL GAME FOR TIGER SENIORS**

The bowl game marks the final game for 18 Auburn seniors. In their four years on the Plains, the 2004 senior class has posted a 36-14 record including a 22-4 mark at home. They have also won a school-record 12 games this season, guided the Tigers to an SEC Championship, won or tied for three SEC Western Division titles and will have made four straight bowl appearances.

The 2004 seniors include: RB Ronnie Brown, QB Jason Campbell, WR Silas Daniels, DE Bret Eddins, LB Derrick Graves, S Bret Holliman, C Jeremy Ingle, DE Doug Langenfeld, OG Danny Lindsey, DT Jay Ratliff, WR Sam Rives, DB Carlos Rogers, SS Junior Rosegreen, LB Mayo Sowell, OT Rich Trucks, RB Carnell Williams, K Philip Yost and SS Donnay Young.

**PERFECT, 12 AND OH**

Auburn's 12-0 is the best record in school history surpassing the 1993 squad that finished 11-0.

Auburn is just the sixth team in SEC history to start 12-0, joining the following teams: 1979 Alabama, 1980 Georgia, 1992 Alabama, 1995 Florida, 1998 Tennessee. All of the previously mentioned teams won national titles with the exception of the 1995 Florida team, which lost in the Fiesta Bowl.

**AUBURN WINS 6TH SEC TITLE**

Auburn's 38-28 win over Tennessee in the 13th annual SEC Championship game secured the school's sixth SEC title and first since 1989. It was also the Tigers' first outright title since 1987.

The Tigers won their first league title in their national championship season of 1957 before winning four conference titles in the 1980's under coach Pat Dye (1983-87-88-89).

Auburn has now won four outright SEC titles, with those coming in 1957, 1983, 1987 and in 2004.

**SEC WEST CHAMPS**

Auburn's 35-14 win over Ole Miss in Oxford clinched a berth in the SEC Championship game and the 24-6 win over Georgia locked up the outright Western Division title for Auburn.

The Tigers tied the 1993 Alabama team for the earliest date clinching a berth in the SEC Championship Game. Both squads earned their bids after games of October 30.

Auburn has won outright or tied for the SEC West title four times in the last five years under Tommy Tuberville (2000, '01, '02, '04).

**14 IN A ROW**

The 38-28 victory over Tennessee was Auburn's 14th consecutive victory dating back to the final two contests of the 2003 season. It is the program's longest winning streak since it captured 20 straight games from 1993-94.

Auburn's 14-game winning streak is the fourth-longest active winning streak in the nation and is the fourth-longest winning streak in school history.

**AUBURN FINISHES 3RD IN BCS**

Auburn finished third in the final Bowl Championship Series Standings, with an average of .9331. The Tigers finished behind Southern California (.9770) and Oklahoma (.9681).

### PERFECT IN THE LEAGUE

Auburn is the first SEC team since Tennessee in 1998 to post a perfect 8-0 record in Southeastern Conference action.

Since the SEC began divisional play in 1992, Auburn is the seventh team to have gone 8-0. Three of those teams, Tennessee (1998), Florida (1996)

and Alabama (1992) eventually went on to win the national title.

Other 8-0 teams since 1992 include Auburn in 1993, Alabama in 1994 and Florida in 1995.

### LAST 23

Since dropping its first two games of the 2003 season, Auburn is 20-3 and is outscoring its opponents by an average of 32.2-13.4.

### TOUGH 31

In Auburn's previous 31 contests, 12 have come against an Associated Press Top 10 team, including 14 in the Top 20. Auburn is 8-4 in its previous 12 games against top 10 foes.

Since the start of the 2002 season, Auburn (12) has played more games against Top 10 teams than any other 1-A school in the country.

### BIG WINS

Auburn has won nine of its 12 games by 18 points or more, including seven wins of 21 points or more. The Tigers have more wins by 18 or more points this season (9) than any other Division I-A program. Next are Utah (8), California (7), Virginia (7) USC (6), and Texas (6).

Auburn's margin of victory in SEC games is an impressive 18.9 points per game. The Tigers are seventh nationally in scoring differential, outscoring its opponents by 22.2 ppg. Louisville is first (32.5) followed Utah (25.7), Boise State (25.7), USC (24.3), Cal (23.9), Oklahoma (22.4) and Auburn.

### ON THIS DATE

The Nokia Sugar Bowl will mark the latest in a season, January 3, that Auburn has played a football game. Twice, it has played on January 2, with those games coming in the 1988 Sugar Bowl and 1997 Peach Bowl.

### IN JANUARY

Auburn is 7-7-2 (.500) all-time in the month of January, including a 1-1 mark under Tommy Tuberville.

The Tigers lost to Michigan, 31-28, in the 2001 Citrus Bowl, and defeated Penn State, 13-9, in the 2003 Capital One Bowl.

### AUBURN INDOORS

The Tigers are 3-5-1 all-time in domed stadiums, including a 1-1-1 mark at the Louisiana Superdome.

Listed are Auburn's all-time appearances in the Superdome.

### ON ARTIFICIAL TURF

The Nokia Sugar Bowl will mark Auburn's 88th game all-time on artificial turf. The Tigers are 40-44-3 (.476) when playing on artificial turf. It will be Auburn's second consecutive game on turf and third this season.

Auburn won at Ole Miss, 35-14, on the Rebel's

artificial surface at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium in Oxford on Oct. 30 and defeated Tennessee, 38-28, in the SEC Championship Game at the Georgia Dome on Dec. 4.

**IN THE STATE OF LOUISIANA**

Auburn is 15-25-7 (.394) all-time in the state of Louisiana. The Tigers last played in Louisiana on Oct. 25, 2003 in a 31-7 loss at LSU. Auburn's last win in Louisiana was a 41-7 win at LSU in 1999.

**PERFECT AT JORDAN-HARE**

Auburn ended the 2004 season a perfect 7-0 at Jordan-Hare Stadium. It is just the fifth time in school history that the Tigers have been 7-0 or better at home in a season and their first perfect record at home since 2000.

**AWARDS, AWARDS, AWARDS**

Auburn has been busy collecting postseason awards as 15 Tigers were honored by the Associated Press while 10 of those were recognized by the league coaches when both organizations recently named their All-SEC teams.

The AP handed out seven first-team All-SEC honors to Tiger players while the coaches selected eight players to their first-team All-SEC list.

Highlighting the awards was Coach Tommy Tuberville and quarterback Jason Campbell. Both the AP and the coaches named Tuberville the SEC Coach of the Year and Campbell the SEC Offensive Player of the Year. Tuberville is the fifth coach in school history to win the award, while Campbell is the 10th Auburn player ever to be named MVP and first since RB Rudi Johnson in 2000. Campbell is also just the fourth AU signal caller to earn the SEC's highest honor, joining Travis Tidwell (1949), Jimmy Siddle (1963) and Pat Sullivan (1970, '71).

The SEC coaches named RB Carnell Williams, RB Ronnie Brown Brown and Campbell to the first team, making the group the first trio from the same backfield in SEC history to sweep first-team honors

**THE LEADER**

Twice this season Auburn has trailed at halftime and twice quarterback Jason Campbell has led Auburn to victory. The Tigers overcame a 9-3 half-time deficit to LSU on Sept. 18, to win 10-9, and in the regular season finale at Alabama, trailed 6-0 at the break before winning 21-13.

In the two games Auburn has trailed at half, Campbell has combined to go 19 of 27 (70.4 percent) for 280 yards and two touchdowns.

Against LSU, Campbell was 9 of 16 for 117 yards and a TD strike. Campbell hit Courtney Taylor with 1:14 remaining with the game-winning TD. At Alabama, the senior signal caller led the Tigers to touchdown drives on their first three possessions of the second half to take a 21-6 lead. Campbell was near-perfect against the Crimson Tide, completing 10 of 11 passes for 163 yards and one TD.

**NINE STRAIGHT**

Running back Carnell Williams has rushed for a touchdown in a school-record nine consecutive games. The last time Williams was held out of the end zone was against LSU on Sept. 18. Auburn's career leader in rushing touchdowns with 45, Williams has a rushing score in 10 of 12 games this season and in 29 of 41 career games. Williams has found paydirt in 19 of his last 23 games.

**UNDER CENTER**

Senior quarterback Jason Campbell is 30-9 (.769) in 39 career starts at Auburn.

Campbell's 30 wins as a starter are first all-time at Auburn. His win over Tennessee in the SEC title game passed Stan White (1990-93), who previously held the school record with 29. Campbell trails only Stan White (45) and in career starts under center with 39.

Campbell has also started 31 consecutive games, which is the longest streak by a Tigers' signal caller since White started 44 consecutive games. In those 31 games, Campbell has directed the Tigers to a 8-4 mark against Top 10 teams and an 17-2 record in the other 19 contests.

**16 OF 22 POSITIONS-NO CHANGE**

Familiarity was a popular word in 2004 when it came to the Tigers' starting lineup. A total of 16 players--nine on offense and seven on defense--started in every game. Meanwhile, another five positions saw a player start at least 10 games at that position.

The offensive players to start in every game this season include: QB Jason Campbell, RB Carnell Williams, WR Devin Aromashodu, TE Cooper Wallace, LT Marcus McNeill, LG Ben Grubbs, RG Danny Lindsey, RT Troy Reddick, and WR Courtney Taylor.

Defensively, LE Bret Eddins, DT Jay Ratliff, NG Tommy Jackson, LB Travis Williams, CB Carlos Rogers, S Junior Rosegreen and S Will Herring, got the starting nod in every game this year.

**COMPLETE DEFENSE**

Auburn's defensive this season may be considered the most complete defense in the country as the Tigers' "D".

Auburn is first nationally in scoring defense (11.2 ppg), fifth in total defense (269.5 ypg), eighth passing defense (163.0 ypg) and 16th in rushing (106.5 ypg).

**BELOW 150**

Auburn's defense had gone 16 consecutive games entering the SEC Championship Game without allowing an opponent to rush for 150 or more yards. Unfortunately, all good things must come to an end. The Vols ran for 228 yards becoming the first team since LSU in 2003 (157 yards) to gain more than 150 rushing yards against the Tigers.

The Tigers 16-game streak marked the first time since 1970 that Auburn had gone 16 or more

games without giving up 150 rushing yards or less on the ground.

In the last 30 contests dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn's rushing defense has surrendered 150+ yards just four times.

### FOUR RUSHING TDS ALLOWED

Auburn is tied for the Division I-A lead in fewest rushing touchdowns allowed with four. The Tigers had only allowed one rushing score in the last 53 quarters, until surrendering three scores on the ground against Tennessee in the SEC Championship Game.

The only other score on the ground against the Tigers was by Kentucky on Oct. 23. Prior to the score, Auburn had not allowed a rushing TD in the first 438 minutes of the season.

### DEFENSIVE LOCKDOWN

Auburn is first nationally in scoring defense holding opponents to 11.2 points per game. A total of 67 of the 134 points (50 percent) that the Tigers have allowed have come with Auburn leading by 20 or more points.

Just 77 of the 127 points Auburn has allowed this season have come in the first three quarters of play as it has outscored its opponents, 324-77, during that time.

The last Auburn team to finish the regular season leading the country in scoring defense was the 1988 SEC Championship team at 7.2 ppg.

### GIVE ME A BREAK

First halves have not been kind to Auburn opponents this season as the Tigers have outscored their opposition, 215-39.

The Tigers have led by 17 or more points by halftime seven times and by 20 or more points five times at the half.

The Auburn defense has held its opponents to an average of 122.0 yards of total offense in the first half, including an average of just 46.6 yards on the ground. Offensively in the first half, the Tigers' offense is averaging 235.0 yards, including 101.3 on the ground and 133.7 in the air.

### NO NAME DEFENSE

Coined the "no-name defense," Auburn's prowess on defense has truly been a team effort. A total of 24 players have contributed a tackle for loss, 13 have recorded a sack and eight have forced a fumble. Twenty-four players have 10 or more tackles on the season, including 15 with 20-plus stops.

### QUICK STARTS

Auburn has scored on its opening possession in nine of 12 games this season. In two games that Auburn did not score in its opening drive, the Tigers committed turnovers inside of their opponents' red zone.

### SACKED A LITTLE, SACK A LOT

Auburn's offensive and defensive lines have been productive in opposite ways concerning quarterback sacks.

The Tigers' offensive line has been stingy allowing defenses to get to quarterback Jason Campbell. The O-Line is fourth in the SEC, allowing just 16 sacks this season, including giving up just four sacks in the last six games.

On the defensive side of the ball, Auburn leads the SEC with 35 sacks. Amazingly, the Tigers' defensive front has contributed 28.5 of the 35 sacks this season. Leading the "Sack Attack" are redshirt freshmen defensive ends Quentin Groves and Stanley McClover who are tied for third in the SEC with 7.5 sacks apiece.

### WILLIAMS OVER 1,000

Running back Carnell Williams has rushed for 1,104 yards this season, making him just the fifth running back in school history to tally two 1,000-yard seasons, joining James Brooks, Joe Cribbs, Stephen Davis and Bo Jackson.

Williams rushed for 1,307 yards as a junior in 2003.

### CAMPBELL OVER 2,000

Tigers' quarterback Jason Campbell has thrown for 2,511 yards on the season. Campbell is the fourth quarterback in school history to pass for 2,000 yards in back-to-back seasons.

The other AU signal callers to accomplish the feat were Pat Sullivan (1970-71), Patrick Nix (1994-95) and Dameyune Craig (1996-97).

Campbell threw for 2,267 yards in 2003.

### 50-50 IS GOOD

Auburn is a perfect 16-0 over the last four years when Ronnie Brown and Carnell Williams each rush for at least 50 yards in the same game. In fact, the Brown-Williams combination each rushed for at least 50 yards in 11 of the last 12 games. The only time



this season they didn't accomplish the 50-50 feat was at Alabama.

**MR. ROGERS NEIGHBORHOOD**

Senior DB Carlos Rogers' play this season is deceiving to the naked eye. Seventh on the team in tackles (41) and third in stops among defensive backs, a closer look will show that Rogers is having an exceptional season. In 2004, Rogers has had 65 balls thrown his way with only 18 passes having been completed (28 percent), while opposing teams are throwing to receivers he's covering only 20 percent of the time (65 of 329 attempts).

Rogers has also made four third-down stops and intercepted a pass for a touchdown against Louisiana Tech.

**BIG CATCH COURTNEY**

Sophomore wide receiver Courtney Taylor not only leads Auburn in receptions (38), but leads the Tigers' in clutch catches. A remarkable 30 of Taylor's 38 catches have been for first downs, including 12 third down catches to move the chains and two on fourth down.

In Auburn's 10-9 upset of LSU on Sept. 18, Taylor came up with two important catches on the Tigers' fourth-quarter game-winning drive. On 4th-and-12 on the LSU 28 with 3:07 remaining and Auburn trailing 9-3, Taylor caught a 14-yard pass for a first down, keeping the drive alive. Three plays later, Taylor snared a 16-yard touchdown pass for the game-winner.

Two weeks later at No. 10 Tennessee on the Tigers' third play from scrimmage, Taylor ripped away a would-be UT interception and touchdown and gained 14 yards and an AU first down.

In the SEC Championship Game, Taylor had a career-high 111 receiving yards as five of his six catches went for first downs.

**CAMPBELL VS. SULLIVAN**

Listed is a comparison of Jason Campbell's 2004 statistics and the numbers of Auburn's 1971 Heisman Trophy winner, Pat Sullivan. Sullivan's stats only included 10 games as in 1971 bowl stats did not count towards season stats.

**TRAVIS' TRADE**

Despite his relatively small stature for a line-backer at 6-1, 212 lbs., junior Travis Williams has made a big impression on opposing offenses.

Williams leads Auburn with 76 tackles, 55 of which have been primary stops. He also has recorded nine and a half tackles for loss and had an inter-

ception in back-to-back games against Tennessee and Louisiana Tech.

In eight SEC games, Williams had 53 tackles, including 42 primary tackles and six TFLs.

**CAMPBELL ON TARGET**

Jason Campbell, has been extremely accurate this season, completing 69.7 percent of his passes while throwing 19 TD strikes and just six interceptions. Campbell leads the Southeastern Conference and is third nationally in passing efficiency with a 172.7 rating.

The Most Valuable Player of the Music City Bowl, Campbell holds the Auburn record for career completion percentage with a .646 mark. Campbell is ranked in the Auburn top 10 in several other career records including passing yardage (7,110-2nd), pass attempts (838-2nd), pass completions (541-2nd) and touchdown passes (44-2nd).

Campbell is third in the Southeastern Conference record books in completion percentage, trailing only Tim Couch (67.1%, 1996-98) and Dusty Bonner (65.3%, 1997, 99) of Kentucky. Tennessee's Peyton Manning (1994-97) is fourth at 63.7%.

**WELL RESTED**

Sophomore punter Kody Bliss punted just once in the first half of a five-game span from The Citadel to Kentucky. In the last nine games, Bliss has been forced to punt just nine times.

On the season, Bliss has tallied just 15 first half punts as compared to 38 by the Tigers' opponents in the first two periods of play.

**FOURTH QUARTER COMEBACKS**

Auburn's 10-9 win over then-No. 5 LSU on September 18 was the Tigers' fifth fourth quarter come-from-behind win during the Tommy Tuberville Era and first since the 2001 season.

## WILLIAMS MAKES HISTORY

Tigers' running back Carnell Williams has garnered an SEC-record nine Southeastern Conference Player of the Week honors. Eight times he has been named the league's Offensive Player of the Week and once named the Special Teams Player of the Week. Williams earned his record eighth Offensive Player of the Week honors after rushing for 122 yards and two touchdowns in Auburn's 43-14 win over Mississippi State on Sept. 11.

The Attalla, Ala., native was named the SEC Special Teams Player of the Week on Nov. 15 after returning four punts for 77 yards against Georgia.

Williams' nine SEC honors surpassed former Alabama running back Shaun Alexander and Florida quarterback Danny Wuerffel, who each won the award seven times. Williams was honored four times in 2003, including three straight from October 4-18.

## OVER THE CENTURY MARK

Carnell Williams and Ronnie Brown have combined to rush for nine 100-yard games this season in 12 contests.

Williams has 16 100-yard games in his career, which is second all-time behind Bo Jackson (1982-85) who is the Auburn record holder with 21.

Brown has eight career 100-yard performances, which is ninth all-time at Auburn.

Auburn's 34-10 win over then-No. 10 Tennessee on Oct. 2 was the program's largest road win against a Top 10 team in school history. It also was head coach Tommy Tuberville's eighth win as Tigers' head coach over an AP Top 10 program.

## PAT STREAK SNAPPED

Auburn's SEC-record 209 consecutive PAT kicks converted was snapped against Arkansas on Oct. 16. After the Tigers went ahead 30-0 in the second quarter, PK John Vaughn connected on the PAT, however, an Auburn penalty negated the PAT and Vaughn missed the kick, the Tigers' first PAT miss since 1999.

Prior to Vaughn's miss, the last PAT miss was by Rob Bironas against Idaho in 1999. Contributing to the 209 consecutive PATs included: Bironas (1), Damon Duval (130), Philip Yost (24) and John Vaughn (54).

The NCAA Division I-A record is 262 held by Syracuse (1978-89).

## STARTS STREAK

Five Tigers currently own starting streaks of 20 or more games.

Leading the way is DB Junior Rosegreen and OL Danny Lindsey who have started in 39 and 38 consecutive games, respectively. QB Jason Campbell has started in 31 straight, while OL Troy Reddick has started in 25 consecutive. DB Will Herring has started in 23 straight contests.

## WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 43-4 when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 43-3 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 64-11 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

## 30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is a perfect 30-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 43 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points in a game.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 21 years, Auburn is 105-2 when scoring 30 points.

## WHEN SCORING FIRST

Auburn is a perfect 10-0 this season and has won 18 consecutive games when scoring first. The last time the Tigers scored first and did not win was in 2002 against Georgia in Jordan-Hare Stadium.

## AFTER THREE QUARTERS

The Tigers are 11-0 in 2004 when leading after three quarters and have won 13 in a row and 21 of their last 22 when taking a lead into the fourth quarter.

The only loss during that span was to Ole Miss last year in Auburn.

## TIGERS GRADS

Auburn has nine graduates that will be participating in Nokia Sugar Bowl.

Seven of the Tiger graduates had diploma's in hand before the season: RB Ronnie Brown (Communication), QB Jason Campbell, DE Bret Eddins (Business), C Jeremy Ingle (Political Science), OT Rich Trucks (Marketing/Business Administration), DB Donnay Young (Public Administration), PK Philip Yost.

Two other players, OL Danny Lindsey (Exercise Science) and LB Mayo Sowell (Sociology) received their degrees in December.

## QUICK HITS

Auburn has won its SEC road games by 29, 24, 21 and eight points, marking the first time it has won three SEC road games by 20 or more points in a season ... AU has nine 30+ point games this season, which is tied for the school record with the 1995 and 1970 teams.

## THE DECADE CLUB

In his 10th year as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville has five assistant coaches who have been with him all 10 years. That group includes: defensive tackles/nose guard coach Don Dunn, running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran, wide receivers coach Greg Knox, offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price.

## BIG CLASS

Head Coach Tommy Tuberville has his largest senior class at Auburn in 2004. The Tigers' roster includes 18 seniors, which eclipses Tuberville's other senior classes: 13 in 2003, 15 in 2002, 10 in 2001, 14 in 2000 and 14 in 1999.

Guided Auburn to the 2004 Southeastern Conference Championship. Tuberville has guided Auburn to at least a share of the Western Division title in four of his six seasons.

Led Auburn to a 28-11 mark in the SEC since 2000.

Guided five of his last six teams to bowl games, including New Year's Day bowls in two of the last three years.

Directed Auburn to eight wins over AP Top 10 teams since the start of the 2002 season.

Led Auburn to 20 wins in last 23 games, including 14 straight dating back to 2003.

Auburn's current 14-game winning streak is Tuberville's longest winning streak as a head coach.

Directed Tigers to five SEC road wins of 20-plus points in the last four years, including three in 2004.

Named the 2004 Coaches' and Associated Press SEC Coach of the Year. Was also named the 1997 Associated Press SEC Coach of the Year.

1997 American Football Quarterly magazine runner-up for Schutt Sports Coach of the Year honor. In 17 years coaching at the Division I level, has been part of 15 winning seasons, including three national championships.

Coached 39 players that have been drafted in the National Football League, including 10 at Auburn.

Coached nine first-round NFL Draft picks, including the 1991 first overall pick, Russell Maryland. Five former players have played in the NFL Pro Bowl, including Jessie Armstead, Jerome Brown, Ray Lewis, Russell Maryland and Warren Sapp.

Has 23 former players currently on NFL rosters.

Is 12-3 in his career in games decided by three points or less and 24-13 in games decided by seven points or less.

Has won 48 of last 51 regular season games when scoring 20 points or more.

Is 25-1 as a head coach in non-conference home games.

Was part owner of a catfish restaurant, "Tubby's", in Tullahoma, Tenn. The restaurant featured his special fried catfish and hushpuppy recipe. One of the top dishes was the "Tubby's Pond Platter" which included fried catfish filets, chicken strips, frog legs and a glass of pond water (punch).

John Vaughn set a career-high with a 43-yard field goal in the first quarter ... Brandon Cox threw his first career pass in the second quarter, completing it for 39 yards to Courtney Taylor ... Cox also ran for his first career touchdown of any kind ... It was a 14-yarder in the second quarter ... Taylor ran for 19 yards on a reverse in the third quarter, his first career rush ... Will Herring intercepted his fourth career interception, the third straight game in which he intercepted a pass dating back to 2003 ... Pat Sims forced his first career fumble in his first collegiate game ... Junior Rosegreen recovered his second career fumble.

**MISSISSIPPI STATE**

Auburn won its 12th straight SEC opener ... The win was head coach Tommy Tuberville's 40th at the helm of the Tigers ... Tuberville moved into a tie for 21st all-time in the SEC with 65 career victories ... The Tigers gave up their first points of the season in the fourth quarter ... Auburn scored at least 42 points in the third straight game against the Bulldogs ... Jason Campbell threw for three touchdowns for the first time in his career ... Campbell had 26 family members in attendance - he is from nearby Taylorsville, Miss. ... Anthony Mix and Ben Obomanu both caught two touchdown passes - the first Tigers to do so since Jeris McIntyre against Vanderbilt in 2003 ... Obomanu caught his touchdown pass from Brandon Cox, marking the signal-caller's first career touchdown strike ... A Bald Eagle, Spirit, flew before the game ... It marked the first time an eagle has flown before an Auburn game at Jordan-Hare Stadium since the Tigers' game against Georgia on Nov. 16, 2002 ... The game was seen by 87,451 fans, a Jordan-Hare Stadium and state of Alabama record ... The game took place just two days after the remnants of Hurricane Ivan swept through Alabama Auburn came-from-behind for a victory for the first time since the 2002 Capital One Bowl ... The 10-9 victory is the closest in the series since LSU's 7-6 win in 1988 ... The victory was Auburn's first over a top five team since defeating No. 1 Florida in 2001 ... Auburn scored on its opening drive for the third straight time ... Auburn extended its extra points streak to 191 ... It was nearly snapped in the fourth quarter, but an LSU personal foul forced a re-kick, which John Vaughn made ... Auburn's three first-half points marked the team's lowest since failing to score against Southern California in 2003 ... LSU's opening drive touchdown broke an Auburn five-game streak where the Tigers held their opponent scoreless on its first drive ... Courtney Taylor's game-winning touchdown reception in the fourth quarter was his first career score ... Antarrious Williams earned his first career sack ... **THE CITADEL**

Auburn took a 23-0 halftime lead ... The Tigers outscored opponents, 64-9, in the first half after the victory over The Citadel ... Auburn ended the first half with 21 first downs, matching their total output against Louisiana-Monroe and Mississippi State ... Auburn failed to score on its opening drive for the first time in 2004 ... The Tigers scored on a blocked punt ... It marked their first safety since 2002 against Ole Miss ... It also marked Auburn's first blocked punt since 2003 ... The Tigers improved to 34-3 under Tommy Tuberville when leading at halftime ... They also improved to 20-4 in the month of September under Tuberville ... The Tigers' first scoring drive of the game, which ended with a Carl Stewart 1-yard run, lasted 96 yards, Auburn's longest drive to that point of the season ... Auburn

Former Auburn basketball great Charles Barkley appeared on ESPN GameDay prior to the Tigers' contest against Tennessee ... Barkley predicted on the show that the Tigers would defeat the Volunteers ... Auburn improved to 5-0, its best start since 2000 ... The win marked the Tigers' first in Knoxville since 1983 ... Auburn improved to 7-4 against top 25 teams in the last 24 games ... The Tigers improved to 3-0 in SEC play for the second consecutive season ... Junior Rosegreen tied - and set an Auburn record -- a 65-year-old SEC record with four interceptions ... He tied Mississippi State's John Nix, who set the record in 1939 ... Rosegreen earned SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors after tying the record ... Overall, Auburn intercepted five passes and forced six turnovers ... Auburn improved to 25-0 under head coach Tommy Tuberville when scoring 30 or more points ... The 34 points were the second most Auburn ever scored in Knoxville, just three behind its 1983 effort ... Head coach Tommy Tuberville improved to 9-1 in homecoming games and 6-0 at Auburn ... Auburn improved to 10-0-1 all-time against Louisiana Tech ... Auburn finished the game with six consecutive extra points, pushing its streak to 205 ... That mark set an SEC record, surpassing Alabama, which had 199 straight from 1981-87 ... The Tigers did not allow a rushing touchdown for the sixth game in 2004 and seventh straight dating back to 2003 ... The Tigers scored on their opening possession for the fifth time in six games ... Auburn won its eighth straight game - the Tigers have amassed at least 300 yards in each game ... Courtney Taylor caught at least one pass for the 18th time in 19 career games ... The Tigers held Kentucky to 110 offensive yards, the lowest total by an opponent since 2002 ... Auburn also held the Wildcats to 37 yards rushing, the second time in 2004 the Tigers held an opponent to less than 100 yards ... Auburn held a 21-0 lead after the first quarter ... The Tigers won their third straight game over Alabama, accomplishing the feat for the first time since winning four straight from 1986-89 ... Auburn has now won all five games it has played in Tuscaloosa ... The Tigers have outscored Alabama, 112-20, in those five games in Tuscaloosa ... Auburn trailed in the first quarter, the first time that had happened since the LSU game ... Auburn won its 13th straight game dating back to 2003 ... Auburn won 12 games in a season for the first time in school history ... The win gave the Tigers their first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1989 ... It is their sixth overall ... The Tigers defeated Tennessee for the second time during the 2004 season and for the third time in a row ... That marks the first time Auburn accomplished the feat since 1982-84 ... Auburn became the sixth Southeastern Conference team to start 12-0 ... Auburn outscored Tennessee, 52-10, in the first half this season and opponents, 215-39 ... Quarterback Jason Campbell was named the MVP of the game ... He threw for 374 yards on 27-of-35 passing and three touchdowns ... The 374 yards marks the fifth-best output in school history ... The 374 yards is a career high, as is passing attempts and passing completions ... Campbell accumulated 431 yards of total offense, the second-best individual effort in Auburn history ... Campbell passed for three touchdowns for the third time this season ... Courtney Taylor caught a season-high six catches for a career-best 111 yards ... He became just the second Auburn player to pass the 100-yard mark ... Of Taylor's six catches, four were for first downs ... Taylor caught 13 passes of 20 or more yards in the regular season ... # Head Coach Tommy Tuberville



In 2004, Tommy Tuberville led Auburn to its best season ever as the Tigers won a school record 12 games and captured the SEC Championship, Auburn's first conference title since 1989 and its first outright championship since 1987.

Auburn defeated four top 15 teams in the process while finishing a perfect 8-0 in conference play. The Tigers earned their first ever berth in a Bowl Championship Series game and will play in the Nokia Sugar Bowl

on Jan. 3. For his efforts, Tuberville was named the Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year and The Sporting News National Coach of the Year.

In six seasons at Auburn, head coach Tommy Tuberville has built a program that excels both on and off the field.

The season before Tuberville's arrival, Auburn finished with a dismal 3-8 overall record and a last place finish in the SEC Western Division. Tuberville guided the program back to the top of the league standings, leading Auburn to an SEC Championship, four Western Division titles including outright championships in 2000 and 2004 and co-championships in 2001 and 2002. Under his direction, the Tigers have made five consecutive bowl appearances including two New Year's Day bowl berths.

Tuberville accomplished these feats while playing 25 percent of his games against top 10 opponents and 40 percent against teams ranked in the nation's top 25. His Auburn record stands at 50-24 while his overall record in nine years as a head coach is 75-44.

Players have excelled under Tuberville's guidance as Auburn has earned 24 first-team All-Southeastern Conference awards, five All-America honors, 15 SEC All-Freshmen accolades, 25 SEC Player of the Weeks honors, two SEC Player of the Year award, one Jacobs Award presented annually to the league's top blocker and one Most Valuable Player of the SEC Championship game. Fourteen players have been selected in the NFL Draft including four taken in 2004.

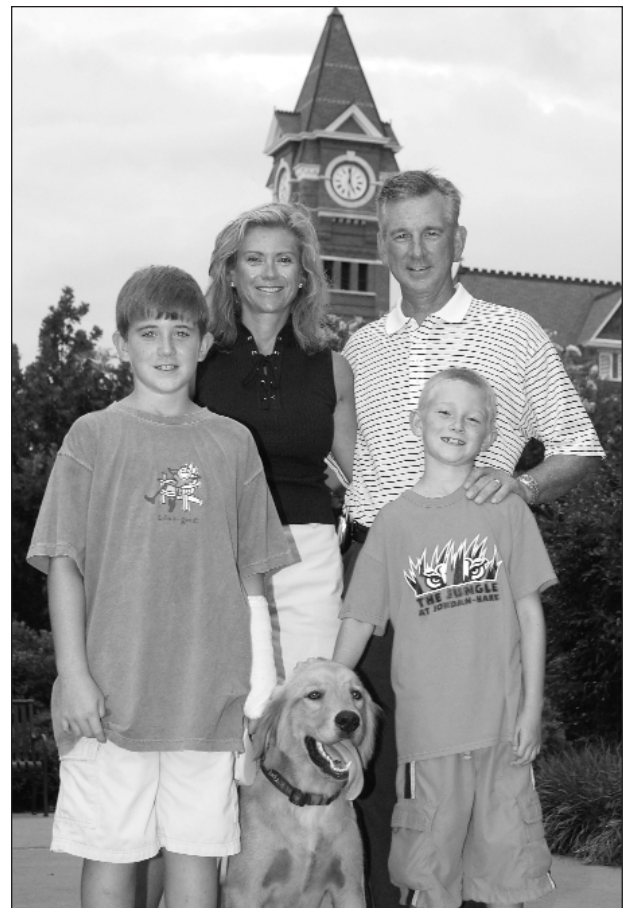
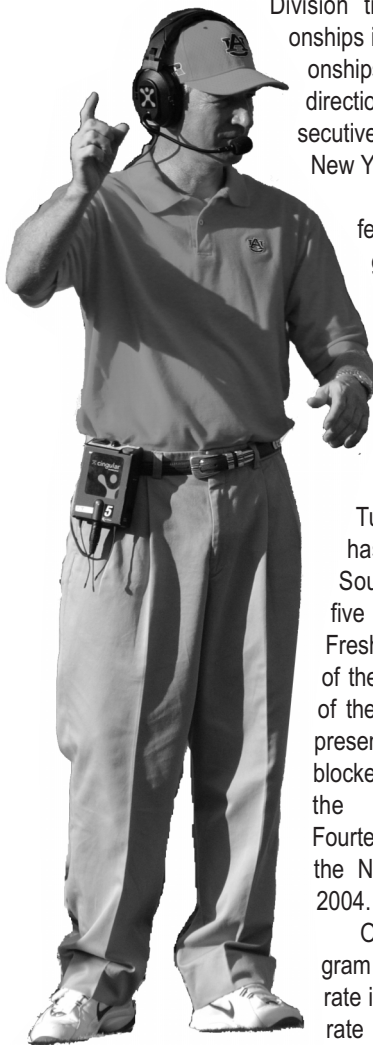
Off the field, Auburn's football program posted a 68 percent graduation rate in 2003 compared to a 54 percent rate nationally. In addition, Auburn

has earned more than 50 SEC Academic Honor Roll distinctions during Tuberville's tenure. In 2003, linebacker Dontarrious Thomas, a three-time SEC Honor Roll selection, was one of eight Division I players named a National College Scholar-Athlete which awarded an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship from the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame.

Tuberville also believes in giving back to the community. Among other activities, he hosts charity golf tournaments for Camp ASCAA, the Girls and Boys Club of Montgomery, the Auburn University Marching Band and the Alabama Sheriff's Youth Ranch.

In addition, he continually stresses the importance of participating in community service projects to Auburn's football team. Auburn football players regularly read at local schools, serve as mentors and visit with the elderly. Last summer, the football team helped construct a building for Story Book Farm, which is a non-profit organization that provides therapeutic horseback riding for children suffering from disabilities, chronic illnesses or those who have suffered a loss.

It's evident that Tuberville has built a strong program both on and off the field. He has also spearheaded efforts to upgrade and improve Auburn's football facilities. Since Tuberville took over the program in November 1998, the Tigers have seen their stadium locker room rebuilt making it one of the finest game-day facilities in the country. An assembly center and the Tiger Walk Plaza were completed in time for the 2001 season. In 2001, a 14,000-square foot weight room and a state-of-the-art training rehabilitation facility was built adjacent to the Athletic

Complex. Prior to the 2003 season, Auburn added a Sprinturf field to its practice fields.

Tuberville understands the process and commitment it takes to build a successful program. Coaching stops at perennial college football powers, University of Miami and Texas A&M and a four-year head coaching stint at the University of Mississippi, gave him the background in building and maintaining a successful program.

While at Ole Miss from 1995-98, Tuberville posted a 25-20 record. Inheriting a Rebel program plagued by NCAA sanctions and probation, he guided Ole Miss to a winning record in his first season in 1995, despite having just 61 players on scholarship. He did not have a full compliment of scholarship players to work with in any of his four years at Ole Miss.

By the time he had three recruiting classes under his belt, Tuberville led Ole Miss to an 8-4 mark and a victory in the inaugural Motor City Bowl in 1997. His efforts earned him Associated Press SEC Coach of the Year Honors and *American Football Quarterly* magazine selected him as runner-up for its Schutt Sports Coach of the Year honor.

Prior to becoming head coach at Ole Miss, Tuberville served as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas A&M for one season. In 1994, he helped lead the Aggies to a 10-0-1 record and No. 8 final ranking by the Associated Press. Under his direction, the Aggie defense finished fourth nationally in scoring defense (13.1 ppg), fifth in total defense (265.5 ypg) and sixth in rushing defense (92.4 ypg).

Tuberville served as a member of the University of Miami staff for eight seasons from 1986-93, taking over as defensive coordinator in 1993.

While serving on the staffs of Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Erickson at Miami, Tuberville was a defensive coach on teams that won three national championships, posted an 87-9 record and played in nine consecutive New Year's Day bowls.

As defensive coordinator for the Hurricanes in 1993, Tuberville directed a Miami defense which was ranked No. 3 nationally in scoring defense (12.6 ppg) and No. 5 nationally in pass defense (91.15 ypg).

Tuberville began his collegiate coaching career at Arkansas State in 1980, coaching various segments of the Indians' defense over the next five seasons. During a five-year stay at Arkansas State, Tuberville coached defensive backs, noseguards and linebackers. During his final year at ASU, the Indians advanced to the second round of the NCAA Division 1-AA playoffs.

He began his coaching career at Hermitage (Ark.) High School where he spent two years as an assistant and two as a head coach. After three straight four-win seasons, Tuberville guided HHS to a 7-3 mark in 1979 before moving to Arkansas State.

A 1976 graduate of Southern Arkansas University, Tuberville was a letterman at free safety and a two-year member of the golf team at SAU. He is a 1972 graduate of Harmony Grove High School in Camden, Ark.

Tuberville is married to the former Suzanne Fette of Guilford, Ind. They are the parents of two sons, Thomas Tucker (10) and Troy Allen (8).

Jason Campbell passed for two touchdowns and Carnell Williams ran for 103 yards as Auburn shut out Louisiana-Monroe, 31-0, at Jordan-Hare Stadium for both teams' season opener.

Campbell, who passed for 110 yards on the strength of 11-of-18 passing, found Williams for a 9-yard score in the first, then connected with Devin Aromashodu for a 32-yard touchdown in the third quarter.

Williams ran 23 times, earning his 12th career 100-yard rushing effort. Ronnie Brown ran seven times for 55 yards and one touchdown, a 30-yard blast in the final moments of the third quarter to end Auburn's scoring day. The Tigers averaged 4.7 yards per rush en route to 194 yards overall on the day.

The Auburn defense held Louisiana-Monroe to just 99 yards passing and 239 overall. Will Herring intercepted a pass for the fourth straight game and Travis Williams forced his third career fumble. Pat Sims, playing in his first career game, forced his first fumble, recovered by another freshman, Tony Bell.

Auburn took a quick 17-0 lead, scoring on its first three possessions of the game. Campbell took the Tigers on a seven-play drive, ending with Williams' first career passing touchdown.

John Vaughn, named the starter by head coach Tommy Tuberville earlier in the week, connected on a 43-yard field goal with 3:54 remaining in the first quarter to put the Tigers up by 10.

On his sixth career play, Brandon Cox put Auburn up, 17-0, with a 14-yard touchdown run. The redshirt freshman led the Tigers on a 6-play drive for the score, marching the team 71 yards. He found Courtney Taylor for a 39-yard completion on the third play of the drive, the first of Cox's career.

Jason Campbell threw for three touchdowns and three other Auburn players accounted for two touchdowns apiece as the Tigers opened Southeastern Conference play with a 43-14 victory over Mississippi State.

Anthony Mix caught two touchdown strikes, including a career-high 58-yarder, to lead Auburn with 76 receiving yards. Ben Obomanu also caught two touchdowns, highlighted by a 25-yard reception in the second quarter.

Running back Carnell Williams crossed the plain twice en route to 122 yards rushing. Teammate Ronnie Brown led the Tigers with 147 yards rushing; Auburn ended the afternoon with 283 yards on 41 carries -- an average of 6.9 yards per rush.

Campbell set a career-high with three touchdown passes. He ended the game with 139 yards on 8-of-17 passing. Brandon Cox came in the game in relief of Campbell and was perfect in passing, connecting on all five of his attempts. He finished the game with 43 yards, including a 7-yard strike to Obomanu early in the fourth quarter.

The Auburn defense held Mississippi State to less than 300 overall yards - the second feat in a row for the Tigers -- and the Bulldogs weren't able to reach the 100-yard rushing mark.

Montavis Pitts and Mayo Sowell led the Tigers with six tackles. Eric Brock picked off his first career interception and Jay Ratliff forced a fumble on a sack. Sowell, Stanley McClover and Donnay Young were all credited with pass breakups.

Auburn jumped out to a 21-0 lead at halftime. Mix, Williams and Obomanu all scored touchdowns in the first half, pushing Auburn to its fourth straight victory over the Bulldogs.

Williams started off the second half scoring with a 3-yard run seven minutes in, then saw Mix catch his 58-yard touchdown with 26 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

Obomanu ended Auburn's scoring day in the fourth.

The Tigers held Mississippi State scoreless until the 1:23 mark of the fourth quarter. Kyle York found Jason Husband in the corner of the end zone for a 1-yard touchdown.

Courtney Taylor caught a 16-yard touchdown pass with 1:14 to play as No. 14 Auburn defeated fifth-ranked LSU, 10-9, in front of a Jordan-Hare Stadium and state of Alabama record crowd.

Taylor's touchdown reception was the only of the game for Auburn, which improved to 3-0 overall and 2-0 in Southeastern Conference play. Quarterback Jason Campbell, who finished the game 16-of-27 passing for 170 yards, led the Tigers on a 12-play, 59-yard drive to cap the Tigers' victory.

Earlier in the drive, on a 4th-and-12 from LSU's 28, Campbell found Taylor for a 14-yard pass to the right. Two plays later, Campbell connected with Taylor again, giving Auburn the win.

Auburn missed the ensuing extra point, but an LSU personal foul on the play enabled the Tigers to rekick, which John Vaughn promptly nailed.

Junior Rosegreen halted the ensuing LSU drive when he picked off a JaMarcus Russell pass intended for Early Doucet. The Tiger defense allowed LSU 308 yards, but just three points after the Bayou Bengals opened the game with an 80-yard scoring drive. LSU quarterbacks Russell and Marcus Randall combined to throw for 168 yards on 12-of-28 passing.

After Randall found Dwayne Bowe for a 9-yard touchdown to begin the game, Auburn used a 14-play, 69-yard drive to put three points on the board. John Vaughn connected for his second field goal of the season, a 29-yarder, to bring the score to 6-3 (LSU missed its extra point).

The Bayou Bengals answered back with a 42-yard field goal early in the second quarter and the score stayed that way well into the fourth quarter as both teams' offense's stalled.

Carnell Williams led Auburn with 75 yards rushing on 18 carries. Ronnie Brown pitched in with 67 yards in nine attempts.

Taylor, whose touchdown marked the first of his career, led the Tigers with five receptions for 71 yards. Anthony Mix pitched in with four catches. Overall, six Auburn players caught at least one pass.

Antarrious Williams, Tommy Jackson, Stanley McClover and Bret Eddins all recorded sacks for Auburn.

Travis Williams and Will Herring both had eight tackles to lead the Tigers. As a team, Auburn tallied nine tackles for a loss equating to 31 yards.

McClover was credited with a forced fumble, which was picked up by Jackson. In addition, Rosegreen and cornerback Carlos Rogers were both credited with one pass breakup.

Auburn racked up 593 yards of total offense and four players scored touchdowns in a dominating performance over The Citadel.

Carl Stewart, Carnell Williams, Jason Campbell and Jamoga Ramsey all contributed touchdowns in Auburn's 33-3 victory that sent the Tigers to their sixth straight victory dating back to 2003. Auburn outgained The Citadel, 593 yards to 169, holding the Bulldogs to less than 100 yards both rushing and passing.

Auburn opened the game with a 1-yard score by Stewart, the first of his career. The running back ended the game with 10 carries for 91 yards, a career high and just four off the pace of Williams, who led the game despite not playing a single down in the second half.

Carrying a 9-0 lead into the second quarter, the Tigers answered again when Williams scored from 1-yard out to push the lead to 16. Williams narrowly missed his 14th career 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 95 on 22 carries. He also ended the game with one catch for nine yards.

Campbell finished Auburn's scoring in the second quarter with 3:48 to play, posting the Tigers' third 1-yard touchdown. It was the first this season for Campbell, who ended the game 11-of-14 for 194 yards.

Auburn finished the game passing for 359 yards with Brandon Cox ending the game 11-of-17 for 165 yards and a 9-yard touchdown strike to Jamoga Ramsey midway through the fourth quarter.

Devin Aromashodu led all receivers with 95 yards, while Ramsey caught the first passes of his career. He ended the game with four receptions for 61 yards. All told, 10 Auburn players caught at least one pass.

The Citadel's only score of the game came with 6:01 in the fourth when Blake Vandiver connected on a 28-yard field goal. Auburn has now allowed just 26 points this season -- an average of 6.5 per game.

Mayo Sowell led Auburn with seven tackles, while Josh Thompson had five. Will Herring intercepted his second pass of the season on the first play of the game. In addition, Eric Brock blocked a first quarter Bulldog punt that netted Auburn two points when the ball was not able to be corralled and squibbed out the back of the end zone.

Defensive back Junior Rosegreen tied a 65-year-old Southeastern Conference record and the Auburn offense raced to a 31-3 halftime lead as the Tigers defeated Tennessee, 34-10, in front of 107,828, the largest crowd Auburn has ever played in front of.

Rosegreen intercepted four passes off Volunteer quarterbacks Erik Ainge and Brent Schaeffer. Rosegreen tied an SEC record set in 1939 by Mississippi State's Jack Nix. As a team, the Tigers picked off five passes and forced six turnovers.

The Auburn offense capitalized, posting 17 points off Tennessee turnovers. Carnell Williams and Ronnie Brown both had rushing touchdowns while Courtney Taylor and Ben Obomanu scored through the air for Auburn, which improved to 5-0 overall and 3-0 in Southeastern Conference play this season.

The win, Auburn's first in Knoxville since the 1983 season, was the second this season over a top 10 opponent. The Tigers defeated then-No. 5 LSU, 10-9, two weeks earlier.

Auburn scored on its opening drive of the game for the fourth time this season. Brown crossed the scoring plane with his 22nd career touchdown, a 9-yard run within the first six minutes of the game to put Auburn up early.

Tennessee's James Wilhoit answered back with a 41-yard field goal five minutes later, but it proved to be the last points the Volunteers scored in the first half. The Tigers held Ainge and Schaeffer to 6-of-23 passing in the first half and kept Tennessee to 119 yards of total offense -- Auburn had 333.

Ben Obomanu put Auburn ahead, 14-3, with a 5-yard touchdown reception from quarterback Jason Campbell late in the first quarter.

After a 24-yard John Vaughn field goal, Williams, less than three minutes later, put the Tigers up, 24-3, with a 5-yard run for a 4-play drive that lasted just 1:24.

Courtney Taylor caught his second touchdown pass of the season with 52 seconds remaining in the first half, giving the Tigers a commanding 28-point lead entering the break.

Travis Williams caught Auburn's other interception, while T.J. Jackson was credited with a fumble recovery after Ainge let the ball get away in the first quarter.

As a team, the Tigers earned six tackles for loss, led by Travis Williams and Marquies Gunn, who both had two.

Will Herring and Carlos Rogers both earned pass breakups, while Gunn was credited with a sack.

Auburn scored early, and save for a small period in the third quarter, dominated Louisiana Tech for a 52-7 victory in the 78th Homecoming contest.

Auburn opened the game with 14 points in the first quarter and led 24-0 at halftime. Jason Campbell and Brandon Cox both tossed touchdown scores for the sixth-ranked Tigers, who improved to 6-0 this season.

Ben Obomanu caught two of those touchdown strikes -- the second time he has accomplished the feat this season -- while Maurice Anderson and Silas Daniels were members of the end zone club. Ronnie Brown, who rushed for 109 yards on 10 carries, and Carnell Williams both ran in scores for the Tigers.

Defensively, Auburn held Louisiana Tech to 222 total yards of offense -- 37 on the ground -- while being credited with nine sacks and 15 tackles for loss. Carlos Rogers returned an interception for a 53-yard touchdown and Travis Williams picked off his second pass in as many games.

Carnell Williams began the game with a 6-yard score in the first quarter, followed by Brown's 3-yard burst to put the Tigers up by 14.

After John Vaughn put a 41-yard kick through the uprights, Rogers returned the interception, giving Auburn a 24-0 lead that lasted into the third quarter.

Obomanu caught a juggling 9-yard pass from Campbell in the first eight minutes of the second half. A Johnat Holland pass from Matt Kubik -- a 78-yarder -- put the Bulldogs on the board, but Auburn answered back with Daniels' touchdown less than two minutes later. The pass play set an Auburn record, two yards

better than the previous record of 85 yards last equaled by Reggie Slack and James Joseph in 1988.

Obomanu and Anderson finished up Auburn's scoring for the afternoon with their respective scores, giving the Tigers a season-high 52 points.

Auburn set an SEC record with the win. On his first kick of the game, Vaughn sent the extra point through the uprights, giving the Tigers 200 straight PAT's, surpassing Alabama, which made 199 straight from 1981-87. Auburn ended the game with seven PAT's, giving the Tigers 206 straight dating back to the 1999 season.

Auburn used yet another balanced attack, both offensively and defensively, to defeat Arkansas, 38-20, for the Tigers' ninth straight win dating back to last season.

Quarterback Jason Campbell threw for 297 yards, a career-high, and three scores and Ronnie Brown rushed for 101 yards on 15 carries as Auburn improved to 7-0 overall and 4-0 in Southeastern Conference play this season.

The win is Auburn's second straight over Arkansas, a feat last accomplished in 1997, and effectively controls its destiny in the race for the SEC West crown.

The Tigers jumped out to a 17-0 lead after the first quarter, relying on touchdown receptions by Devin Aromashodu and Courtney Taylor and a field goal by John Vaughn. Aromashodu's, a 67-yard reverse pass a little more than a minute into the game, was Auburn's second-longest play this season.

Taylor's 30-yard pass reception from Campbell gave the receiver 19 catches in 20 career games.

Auburn, which has outscored its opponents 81-9 in the first quarter and 149-19 in the first half this season, held a 30-7 advantage over the Razorbacks entering the break.

Arkansas got on the board early in the third quarter when Matt Jones found

Steven Harris for a 61-yard touchdown reception two minutes in. But Ben Obomanu stretched Auburn's lead nine minutes later, catching his fourth touchdown in his last three games.

Aromashodu led the Tigers with 102 receiving yards, while Anthony Mix had four catches for 76 yards. Carnell Williams also scored for the Tigers, as he gained 71 yards on 16 carries against Arkansas.

Campbell's 89.5 completion percentage set an Auburn record for a quarterback who has attempted 15 or more passes in a game.

Also, Auburn kept Arkansas from scoring on the ground, extending the Tigers streak of not allowing a rushing touchdown to eight games dating back to 2003.

Auburn jumped out early and held the Kentucky offense at bay in 42-10 victory over the Wildcats at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The win extended Auburn's win streak to 10 games dating back to the 2003 season. The third-ranked Tigers moved to 8-0 overall and 5-0 in Southeastern Conference play this season.

Ronnie Brown and Carnell Williams each scored two rushing touchdowns to pace Auburn. Carl Stewart added his second touchdown run this season and Kevis Burnam returned a fumble 15 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter to end the Tigers' scoring output.

Jason Campbell was 11-of-15 for 127 yards in leading the Tiger offense. Williams led the Tigers with 149 yards rushing on seven carries, while Devin Aromashodu led the air attack with four catches for 49 yards.

Williams started the scoring with a 1-yard rush three minutes into the game. He followed that less than five minutes later with a 9-yard touchdown run that pushed Auburn to a 14-0 lead.

Brown responded to his backfield partner by scoring a little more than three minutes later, using a 12-yard touchdown run to give Auburn a 21-0 lead entering the second quarter.

The Wildcats made an offensive push in the second quarter. First, Rafael Little broke Auburn's streak of not allowing a rushing touchdown in eight games by crossing the plane on a 4-yarder at the 11:30 mark of the quarter. That was all the scoring either team would do in the second, with Auburn heading into the break with a 21-7 lead.

Taylor Bagley opened the second half with a 37-yard field goal after a four-play Kentucky drive. But that's the last the Wildcats would see of the end zone.

Brown put Auburn up, 28-10, less than four minutes later after getting past the Kentucky defense for a 17-yard scoring scurry.

Stewart extended the lead seven minutes later with his score, a 1-yard blast, and was followed by Burnam's 15-yard fumble recovery in the last five minutes of the game.

Auburn was credited with seven sacks, led by Quentin Groves' three.

Stanley McClover, who also had half a sack, led the Tigers with seven tackles, four solo. Groves had six tackles.

Groves also forced two fumbles, one of which was recovered by Jay Ratliff.

The Tigers allowed 110 total yards of offense, the fewest allowed by Auburn since 1995 when allowing Ole Miss only nine total yards.

A sluggish first half proved to be no concern as third-ranked Auburn defeated Ole Miss, 35-14, under the lights in front of an ESPN-national audience.

Auburn clinched the Southeastern Conference Western Division title with the victory, guaranteeing itself its first trip to Atlanta for the SEC Championship since 2000. The Tigers moved to 9-0 on the season -- their best start since 1994 -- and 6-0 in conference with two games left in the season.

Jason Campbell ran for two touchdowns -- one in a 28-point second half -- and passed for 234 yards and another touchdown. Ronnie Brown ran for 100 yards and Carnell Williams rushed 16 times for 96 yards.

The Auburn defense bent, but didn't break in the win over the Rebels. The group racked up seven sacks, led by Stanley McClover's two, and picked off another interception, this one, the third of the season, by Will Herring.

Auburn failed to get on the board in the first quarter for the first time this season and came close to getting shut out in the first half altogether. But Campbell snuck one in the from the 1-yard line with 26 seconds to play, giving Auburn the lead to start the game for the eighth time this season.

Brown upped that lead to 14-0 two minutes into the second half on a 2-yard blast.

Ole Miss answered back with a 64-yard Bill Flowers touchdown reception, but Courtney Taylor replied with a 9-yarder four minutes later.

The Rebels came within seven again, six seconds into the fourth quarter,

on a Taye Biddle 25-yard touchdown catch, but another Campbell run, yet another 1-yarder, and a Williams 29-yard run with a little more than five minutes later sealed the win, the conference and an 11-game winning streak dating back to the 2003 season.

Travis Williams, Wayne Dickens, Doug Langenfeld, Antarrrious Williams and Quentin Groves all recorded sacks for the Auburn defense, which didn't allow a rushing touchdown for the eighth time in nine games this season.

Campbell found Taylor four times for 73 yards, while Williams, on the strength of a 57-yard catch, caught two passes for 70 yards.

Auburn continued its quest for a perfect season with a 24-6 victory over No. 8 Georgia at Jordan-Hare Stadium, to improve to 10-0 on the season. The Tigers became just the third team in school history to start 10-0, joining the 1993 and 1957 teams.

Jason Campbell threw for 189 yards and a touchdown, while Carnell Williams ran and threw for a touchdown. Campbell also set a school single-game completion percentage record after connecting on 18 of 22 passes, good for 81.8 percent.

The Tigers improved to 7-0 in the Southeastern Conference to capture the outright Western Division title. The victory over the Bulldogs sent Auburn to 12 straight since 2003, the team's longest since the 1993-94 period.

Auburn's defense, meanwhile, came two minutes away from posting its second shutout of the season. The Tigers held Georgia to 279 offensive yards -- just 85 on the ground -- and were credited with three sacks and five tackles for loss (-25).

Auburn got on the board in a hurry, posting a score in its opening drive for the eighth time in 10 games this season. Williams capped off an 8-play, 80-yard drive with a 1-yard run to the right, giving the Tigers a 7-0 lead with 6:14 to play in the first.

Williams struck again in the second quarter, only in a dramatically different fashion. On the ninth play of an 80-yard drive, Williams, from the running back spot, found wide receiver Anthony Mix for a 29-yard touchdown pass.

After a John Vaughn 32-yard field goal, Auburn held a 17-0 lead at halftime. On the season, the Tigers have outscored their opponents, 194-26, going into the break.

Both teams kept each other scoreless in the third quarter, but Auburn wasted no time in the fourth. Brown caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Campbell less than a minute into the quarter, putting Auburn up and in control, 24-0.

A late Georgia touchdown -- David Greene found Leonard Pope for a 6-yard score with 2:13 left -- got the Bulldogs on the board for the first and only time in the game.

Williams led all rushers with 101 yards, while Brown paced the Tigers with 88 yards receiving on seven catches.

Williams also had a stellar game on special teams, finishing the game with 77 punt return yards.

Carlos Rogers led Auburn with eight tackles and picked off a David Greene pass in the end zone. Rogers also was credited with a sack and two tackles for loss (-9).

Travis Williams, Antarrrious Williams and Stanley McClover were all credited with at least half a sack. Travis Williams also led the Tigers with two quarterback hurries.

Auburn's quest for a perfect regular season held true as the Tigers came-from-behind for a 21-13 victory over Alabama in the 69th annual Iron Bowl.

The Crimson Tide held a 6-0 lead at halftime, but the Tigers' offense scored on its first three possessions of the second half to ensure Auburn an 11-0 record and 8-0 mark in Southeastern Conference play this season. It marks the first time since the 1993 season that the Tigers have gone undefeated in the regular season.

The win gives Auburn three straight victories over the Crimson Tide. The last time the Tigers accomplished the feat came from 1986-89, when Auburn won four straight in the Iron Bowl series.

Jason Campbell went 18-of-24 for 224 yards and one touchdown. Carnell Williams and Ronnie Brown were held in check by the Crimson Tide defense in the first half, but exploded for two touchdowns in the second half. Williams has now scored at least one touchdown in his last eight games and nine of 11 this season. Brown, meanwhile, is not far behind. The running back has scored in seven straight games and eight of the 10 games he's played in this season.

The Auburn defense held Alabama down, keeping a Crimson Tide rushing offense that averaged more than 200 yards a game entering the contest to 50 in 31 attempts. Twice in the first half, Alabama received the ball inside Auburn's 10-yard-line. Only once, a 22-yard field goal by Brian Bostick, did the Crimson Tide put any points on the board. In the other instance, Kevin Sears came away with his first career interception.

After keeping close through the first half, Auburn scored within three minutes of the second half. Williams went left for a 5-yard score, giving the senior

44 career rushing touchdowns, setting a new Auburn record -- and passing Bo Jackson.

Taylor made a spectacular catch on a perfectly placed pass from Campbell seven minutes later to give Auburn an eight-point lead. The touchdown reception marked Taylor's fifth this season. The touchdown throw was Campbell's 41st career, moving him into second place all-time in Auburn history -- surpassing Dameyune Craig.

Brown finished up Auburn's scoring with a 2-yard blast less than four minutes into the fourth quarter, capping a 10-play, 52-yard drive that consumed 5:20 of the clock.

The Crimson Tide scored on an 18-yard reception with 1:26 left, but its ensuing onside kick fell into the arms of Taylor, who smothered the fall.

Montavis Pitts and Junior Rosegreen led Auburn with eight tackles. Rosegreen, Will Herring, Carlos Rogers and Zach Gilbert were all credited with pass breakups.

Jason Campbell passed for 374 yards and three touchdowns as No. 3 Auburn defeated 15th-ranked Tennessee, 38-28, to earn its first Southeastern Conference Championship since 1989.

Campbell completed 27-of-35 passes and also ran for 57 yards on 13 carries. He ended the game with 431 offensive yards -- the second best in Auburn history -- en route to being named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Auburn, meanwhile, went 12-0 for the first time in school history. The Tigers defeated Tennessee for the second time during the season and third meeting in a row. The Tigers had not defeated the Volunteers in three straight games since 1982-84.

Auburn started off the scoring early, capitalizing on a Carnell Williams fumble into the end zone as Cole Bennett jumped on the ball, and the Tigers had a 7-0 lead less than two minutes into the game.

Williams got his score five minutes later, taking the ball into the end zone for a 5-yard rush. The score marked Williams' 13th this season and extended his scoring streak to nine games, a school record.

Tennessee's Cedric Houston scored on a rush with no time left in the first, but Courtney Taylor, who led all players with 111 yards on six catches, scored on a 4-yard pass from Campbell with 9:15 to play in the second.

Robert Meachem and Gerald Riggs combined for the next 14 points early in the third quarter, giving Tennessee a tie with the Tigers. Yet Devin Aromashodu's 53-yard

touchdown reception from Campbell with 3:45 to play in the third gave Auburn a cushion, one that was expanded to 10 points with a John Vaughn 22-yard field goal to start the fourth quarter.

A Tennessee touchdown less than two minutes later pulled the Volunteers to within three, but Ben Obomanu ensured Auburn's SEC Championship with a 43-yard touchdown pass from Campbell with 6:56 to play.

Travis Williams led Auburn with eight tackles, including one for loss, while Carlos Rogers was credited with two pass breakups.

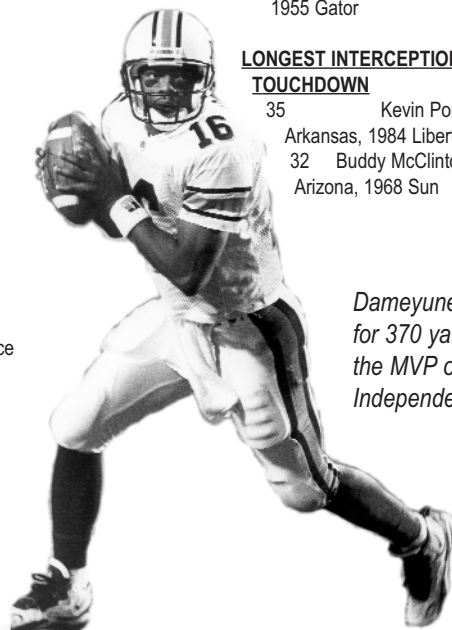

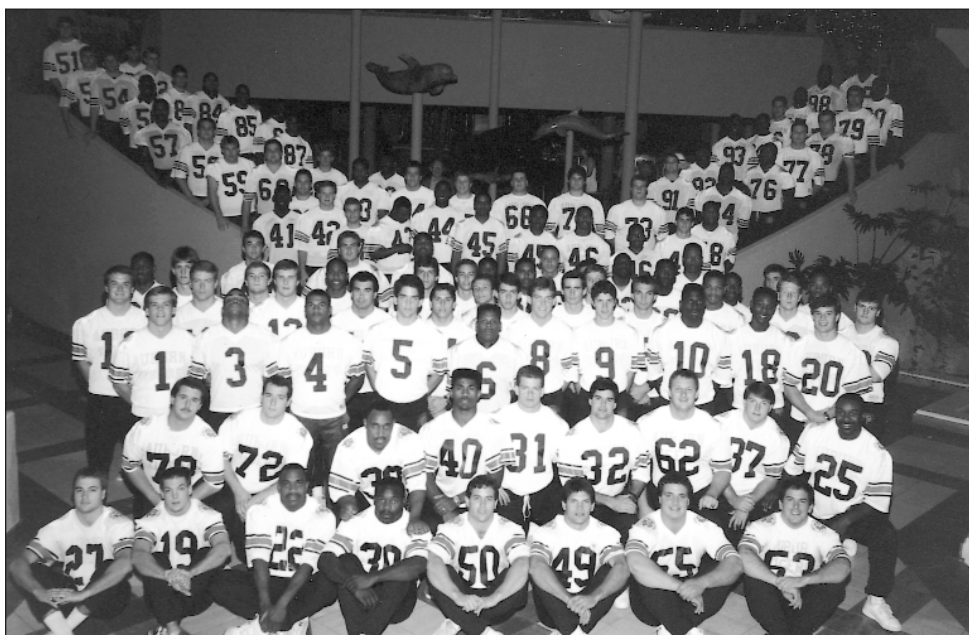

## 1937 Bacardi Bowl



**Auburn 7**  
**Villanova 7**

January 1, 1937  
Cuban National Sports Festival  
Havana, Cuba

Auburn's bowl history began in 1937 when the Tigers and Villanova tied 7-7 in the Bacardi Bowl, sometimes referred to as the Rhumba Bowl or the Cigar Bowl, the climaxing event of Cuba's annual National

Sports Festival. The game was played in Havana, Cuba, and is the first and only bowl game to ever be played outside the United States.

An Auburn drive in the first quarter stalled on the 10-yard line where the Wildcats took over on downs. After a Villanova punt, Auburn back Billy Hitchcock broke loose around left end and rambled 40 yards for the Tigers only score. The score at the half was Auburn 7, Villanova 0.

Auburn stopped a Villanova drive on its own 12-yard line during the third quarter but couldn't get field position. Villanova was able to tie the score when they blocked an Auburn quick kick and the ball bounced into the endzone where Wildcat Lineman Matthews Kuber fell on it for the score. The PAT tied up the game.

Auburn's return to the States marked an end to more than 11,000 miles of football travel for the 7-2-2 Tigers that finished the season ranked 13th in the nation under coach Jack Meagher.

The game was played in a revolutionary atmosphere. Fulgencio Batista, the dictator who would be overthrown by Fidel Castro 22 years later, had just assumed power. The game was almost canceled because Batista's picture was not in the game program. A quick trip to the printer saved the Bacardi Bowl and allowed Auburn's bowl history to get off to a significant and historical beginning.

## 1938 Orange Bowl

Southeastern Conference officials lifted a ban which forbade SEC teams to play post-season games in bowls other than the Rose and Sugar Bowls and allowed Auburn to play Michigan State in the Orange Bowl.

A capacity crowd of 19,000 fans watched an aggressive Auburn team defeat the powerful Spartans, 6-0, limiting Michigan State to only two first downs, the first coming late in the third quarter, and 57 total offensive yards, 32 yards rushing and 25 passing. Auburn racked up 233 yards on the ground and 79 through the air for 312 total yards.

Auburn's only score was set up by a George Kenmore 60-yard punt return that put the Tigers on the Spartan 36-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Kenmore passed to Ralph O'Gwynne at the Spartan two-yard line. On fourth and goal from the one, O'Gwynne circled left end for the only score of the game.

Coach Jack Meagher's Tigers finished the season with a 6-2-3 record.

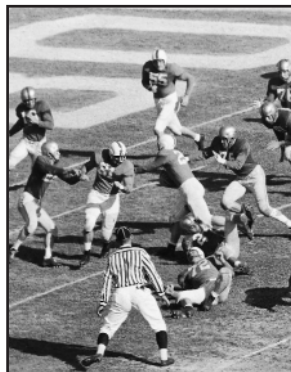

In Auburn's first bowl appearance in 15 years, and first bowl game under Ralph "Shug" Jordan, the Tigers starting offensive backfield included a future Governor of Alabama (Fob James) and a future coach of

the University of Georgia (Vince Dooley), but Texas Tech was not impressed and handed the Tigers a 35-13 defeat.

Dooley guided Auburn to a touchdown the first time they had the ball as the Tigers went 60 yards in 10 plays, with James' 21-yard run being a key play in the drive. Bobby Duke scored from the one. A tough Auburn defense held the Red Raiders, the nation's highest scoring team, to just 11 yards in the first quarter. But it wasn't long before they would get on track.

Texas Tech scored early in the second period on a 30-yard pass from Jack Kirkpatrick to Bobby Cavazos. Auburn came back after an intercepted pass, and Dooley scored on a 10-yard run to end the drive. The Tigers led 13-7 at halftime, but it was all downhill from there.

Texas Tech scored the first two times they had the ball in the second half, once after blocking an Auburn punt, to lead at the end of three quarters, 21-13. Two touchdowns on two possessions in the fourth quarter made the final score read Texas Tech 35, Auburn 13.

Auburn became the first team to play in the same bowl game twice in the same year when they defeated Baylor 33-13 in the 1954 Gator Bowl. The Tigers had met Texas Tech in the Jan. 1, 1954, Gator Bowl, but

then Gator Bowl officials decided to move the game away from New Year's Day.

Baylor fumbled the opening kickoff, Auburn recovered and five plays later "Joltin Joe" Childress scored the first Auburn touchdown.

Baylor came back with a nine-play, 63-yard drive to tie the score at 7-7 at the end of the first quarter.

Auburn's two possessions of the second quarter resulted in a pair of touchdowns, a 43-yard run by Fob James and a four-yard Bobby Freeman to Jimmy Long pass which capped a 92-yard drive. Auburn led at the half, 21-7.

The Tigers scored twice in the second half, sandwiching their scores around a five-play, 66-yard drive by the Bears. Childress capped an 87-yard Auburn drive with a three-yard run, and the Tigers ended the scoring with a three-play 67-yard drive to win going away, 33-13.

Childress was the game's MVP with 134 yards on 20 carries.

Auburn finished the season with an 8-3 record under Coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan.

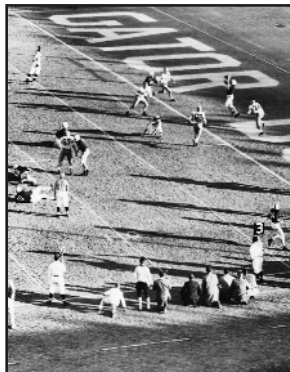

## 1955 Gator Bowl

It was Auburn's third straight trip to the Gator Bowl and Vanderbilt's first bowl game ever and that might tell the story of Auburn's 25-13 upset loss to the Commodores.

Vanderbilt scored first on a seven-yard Don Orr to Joe Stephenson pass which was set up by a Howell Tubbs fumble, the first of three for him that day, which gave the Commodores the ball on the Tigers' 39-yard line. Auburn scored early in the second quarter, driving 72 yards for the TD. Tubbs passed to Fob James for 38 yards and the touchdown. Vanderbilt scored quickly, going 76 yards in four plays as Orr scored from the three-yard line. The extra point was not good and the Commodores led at the half, 13-7.

Another Tubbs fumble set up Vanderbilt's first scoring drive of the second half. Recovering at the Auburn 45-yard line, Vanderbilt took eight plays to score with Phil King going over from the one, giving Vanderbilt a 19-7 lead. A poor punt and a 15-yard penalty gave the Commodores the ball on the Auburn 26-yard line after the Tigers were unable to move. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Charlie Horton scored from the Auburn one to give Vanderbilt a 25-7 lead. Auburn finished the scoring with a seven-yard Jimmy Cook to Red Phillips pass at the end of a six-play, 66-yard drive to make the final score 25-13.

Auburn fumbled five times with Vanderbilt recovering all five to set up the Tigers most disappointing loss of the 1955 campaign. The Tigers finished with an 8-2-1 record.

Joe Childress was voted Auburn's outstanding player.

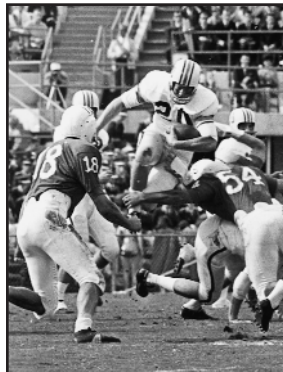

## 1964 Orange Bowl

A trip to the Orange Bowl capped a near perfect season for the Auburn Tigers. Coach "Shug" Jordan led his Tigers to a 9-1 record with a rugged defense and an option offense featuring All-America quarter-

back Jimmy Sidle and halfback Tucker Frederickson. Auburn had defeated Alabama 10-8 to earn the chance to play the Big Eight powerhouse Nebraska Cornhuskers.

Auburn found itself in the hole on the second play from scrimmage as Nebraska quarterback Dennis Claridge sneaked off right guard for a 68-yard touchdown gallop that left Auburn trailing 7-0 before most of the fans were seated. Two Dave Theissen field goals gave the Cornhuskers a 13-0 lead with over 10 minutes remaining in the first half. That is the lead the Nebraska team took in the locker room.

The "Jekyll and Hyde" Auburn team was as dominating in the second half as they were inept in the first half. Sidle led the resurgence of the Tigers by capping off their only scoring drive with a 13-yard run in the third quarter. With only 1:30 left in the game, the Tigers were on the Nebraska 10-yard line. But a costly motion penalty and an incomplete fourth down desperation pass sealed the Cornhusker victory.

Auburn dominated in the second half, combining for 110 rushing yards and 101 passing yards while limiting Nebraska to 43 yards on the ground and nine in the air.

Sidle finished the day with 96 yards rushing on 21 carries.

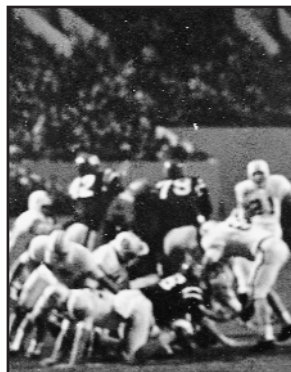

It was the Seventh Annual Liberty Bowl, but the first to be played in the present site of Memphis, Tenn., that saw the Ole Miss Rebels hold off a gallant Auburn comeback to win 13-7.

Ole Miss got the scoring started when Johnny Keyes connected on a 42-yard field goal in the first period. Auburn marched right back and scored when fullback Tom Bryan broke off left tackle and raced 44 yards for the touchdown. The score at halftime was Auburn 7, Ole Miss 3.

The Rebels took the opening kickoff and ran off nine consecutive rushing plays to march to the Tiger six-yard line. From there reserve quarterback Joe Graves went to the air and found wingback Doug Cunningham for a six-yard touchdown pass. The extra point gave Ole Miss a 10-7 lead. Keyes added another field goal to complete the scoring but not the action. Auburn marched deep into Rebel territory. But, with only seconds remaining, the Tigers' desperation fourth down pass fell incomplete, preserving the win for the Rebels.

Auburn's Bryan was selected as the game's Most Valuable Player and the Outstanding Back. He finished with 111 rushing yards on 19 carries. Tiger back Robert Fulghum was selected as the Outstanding Defensive Back. Coach "Shug" Jordan's team finished with a 5-5-1 record.

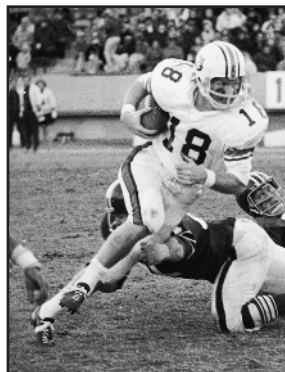

The Tigers broke open a 10-10 halftime deadlock and exploded to a 31st Annual Sun Bowl win in El Paso, Texas.

Auburn jumped to a 10-0 lead early in the game behind a 65-yard scoring pass from quarterback Loran Carter to halfback Mickey Zofko and a 52-yard field goal by John Riley. Arizona came back with a touchdown pass and field goal of their own to tie the score as the players headed for the locker room at the half.

Auburn reserve quarterback, Tommy Traylor, scampered nine yards to open the second half scoring for the Tigers on their first possession of the half. Two plays later, Buddy McClinton picked off an errant Wildcat pass, one of three interceptions for McClinton, and raced 32 yards for another Auburn score. Riley added another field goal and Carter flipped a 43-yard touchdown pass to Tim Christian to complete the Tiger scoring.

The game's oddest play occurred when Auburn punter Connie Frederick had a punt blocked by Arizona. The Wildcats almost recovered the loose ball for a touchdown but Frederick managed to get to the ball first and was able to punt the ball a second time.

Auburn's defense combined for a Sun Bowl record of eight interceptions.

McClinton was named the game's Most Valuable Player while teammate David Campbell was named Most Valuable Lineman from his defensive tackle position.

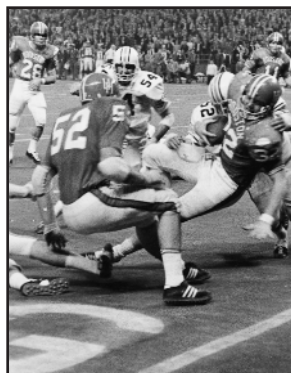

Auburn played its first football game indoors losing to Houston 36-7 in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

Houston executed its veer offense to perfection and executed Auburn in the process. Behind the leadership of sophomore quarterback Gary Mullins, the Cougars piled up Astro-Bluebonnet records for rushing yards with 376 and total yards with 516.

Auburn's Terry Beasley, just a sophomore, fumbled the ball away at the Tiger 29-yard line on the opening kickoff. The Cougars covered those 29 yards in seven plays with Mullins sneaking over from the one-yard line.

Later, Houston capped an 80-yard drive with a Carlos Lopez 27-yard field goal to take a 10-0 lead early in the second quarter. A bowl record 57-yard punt by Auburn's Connie Frederick put Houston back at its own 16-yard line, but the Cougars stormed away with an 84-yard, five-play drive. Strong went 74 yards on the first play of the drive and scored the touchdown on fourth and goal from the one.

Auburn mounted its only scoring drive of the game, going 67 yards in five short plays in the second quarter. A 36-yard halfback pass from Mickey Zofko to Frederick finished the drive. The Tigers seemed to take the momentum into the locker room after blocking a Cougar 25-yard field goal attempt, late in the quarter.

But Houston took command early in the second half. After receiving the second half kickoff, the Cougars marched 73 yards in eight rushing plays and scored when Ted Heiskell cracked over from the one yard line. The two-point conversion attempt failed and Houston led 22-7. Auburn drove to the Houston 28-yard line before a Rat Riley 45-yard field goal was blocked. Auburn never recovered.

This game was billed as the "Battle of the Quarterbacks," and it was that and more. Auburn had Pat Sullivan, heir apparent to the Heisman Trophy the next year, and Ole Miss had Archie Manning, one of the top

QBs in SEC history.

Auburn started off quickly as it was the familiar combination of Sullivan to Terry Beasley for a 13-yard scoring strike with just over three minutes gone in the game. Auburn scored twice more before Ole Miss could retaliate. Sullivan connected with Alvin Bresler for an eight-yard touchdown pass. On the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, Auburn recovered a Rebel fumble and went up 21 points as Sullivan executed the quarterback draw for 37 yards and a touchdown.

Manning led a Rebel comeback by directing his team to a 79-yard, 10-play drive capping it off with a one-yard run. Manning later connected with Floyd Franks on a 34-yard touchdown pass to cut Auburn's lead to 21-14 at the half.

A 42-yard, Sullivan-to-Beasley pass set up Auburn's first score in the second half, as Mickey Zofko hit off right tackle for a six yard touchdown run early in the third quarter. Manning led his team back again with a 42-yard run to put the Rebels at the Auburn 23-yard line.

Auburn's final score came on a Larry Willingham 55-yard punt return with only nine seconds remaining in the third quarter, to take the Tigers to a 35-21 advantage.

Manning was again the key to the Rebels final score as he scrambled for a 37-yard gain to the Auburn 34. From there Chumbler went over from the one to cut the Tigers' lead to seven.

Missouri's defense kept Auburn's offense off balance from the opening kickoff and stormed away with a 34-17 win in the 39th Annual Sun Bowl.

Auburn was able to score first following a Missouri fumble which Auburn's Rusty Deen recovered at the Missouri 49. Auburn's seven play drive could only muster 30 yards and the Tigers settled for a 35-yard Roger Pruett field goal.

After an exchange of punts, Missouri recovered an Auburn fumble at the AU 35-yard line. One play later, Missouri had the lead as quarterback Chuck Link passed to John Kelsey for the TD.

Missouri scored again one minute later following another Auburn fumble. Ray Bybee scored on a two-yard run capping a three-play, 24-yard drive.

Missouri continued to move the ball, scoring on a 10 play 48-yard drive, with Ray Smith connecting with Kelsey from two yards for his second touchdown, and a 21-3 Missouri lead.

With 3:08 to play in the first half, Auburn started on its only real offensive threat of the game. Quarterback Phil Gargis passed to Thomas Gossom from 17 yards out. Only eight seconds remained in the half and Auburn had cut the lead to 21-10.

On the ensuing kickoff, Missouri's John Moseley took the ball 84 yards for the touchdown. Missouri went to the locker room with a comfortable 28-10.

Missouri opened the second half scoring on a five-play, 33-yard drive that began after recovering an Auburn fumble. Smith found Jim Sharp in the corner of the endzone on a 14-yard scoring strike to make Missouri's lead 34-10.

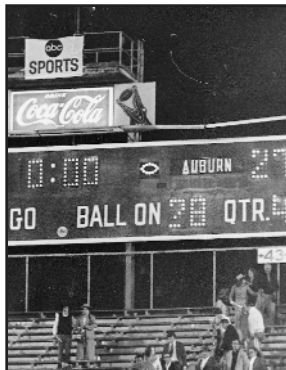

The Auburn Tigers made their sixth Gator Bowl appearance, and their third in five years, a success when they defeated the Darrell Royal-coached Texas Longhorns 27-3. Had not Auburn fumbled seven times,

a bowl record, the score might have been even more embarrassing as the Tigers dominated from the opening kickoff.

The Tigers stopped the Longhorns on the Texas four-yard line following the opening kickoff and Texas never seemed to recover. Auburn got its first chance with the ball at its 40-yard line and promptly drove 60 yards for its first touchdown. The drive was capped when quarterback Phil Gargis connected with Ed Butler for a seven-yard score.

A Longhorn fumble gave the Tigers the ball at the Texas 27. Two Mitzi Jackson runs covered the distance to the endzone as Auburn went up 14-0 with only nine minutes gone in the game.

Texas started a drive on their own 23-yard line. The Longhorns moved the ball to the Auburn 18-yard line, behind the running of freshman running back, Earl Campbell, before the drive sputtered. The Longhorns settled for a Billy Scott 35-yard field goal with 1:00 left to play in the first quarter and Auburn led 14-3.

When Texas tried to punt the ball away from inside their own 10-yard line, Auburn's Jim McKinney blocked the punt out of the endzone for a safety.

Auburn scored its final points in the fourth quarter. Gargis passed to Butler for 14 yards and a touchdown for one score. The Tiger 29-yard drive was set up by a Mike Fuller interception of a Texas pass. Gargis passed to Dan Nugent for the two-point conversion. Chris Wilson kicked a 28 yard field goal with 0:09 showing on the game clock.

passers in BC quarterback Doug Flutie, but in the end it was Auburn, not Boston College, who lived by the pass. Auburn QB Randy Campbell was named the game's Most Valuable Player, narrowly edging teammates Lionel James who gained 101 yards on 18 carries, and Mark Dorniney, who intercepted one of Flutie's passes and was the game's most valuable defensive player. The Tigers traveled by land as well as air. Ten Auburn backs carried the football, with James' 101 yards and Bo Jackson's two touchdowns leading the way. In all, Auburn gained 490 yards against BC; 313 rushing, 177 passing. Auburn led 23-10 at the half and stretched the lead to 33-10 before Boston College mounted a comeback against Auburn reserves. The Eagles scored on the last play of the game for the 33-26 final.

Al Del Greco's 19-yard field goal with 23 seconds remaining in the game gave Auburn a hard fought 9-7 win over Michigan and its first Sugar Bowl Championship.

It was Del Greco's third field goal of the night as the Coral Gables, Fla., senior accounted for all of Auburn's scoring. In addition to the game winner, Del Greco had kicks of 31 and 32 yards.

Auburn's Bo Jackson was the game's leading rusher, gaining 130 yards on 22 carries. Jackson, closing out a brilliant sophomore season which saw him become a consensus All-American, was named winner of the Miller-Digby Trophy as the game's outstanding player.

Auburn's winning drive covered 60 yards in 16 plays. The Tigers took possession on their own 39 with 7:44 left in the game. The ball was on the Michigan one when Auburn elected to kick the field goal rather than go for a touchdown on fourth and one.

Coach Pat Dye's Tigers finished with an 11-1 record, the SEC Championship, and a third place national ranking in the AP, UPI and USA Today polls. The New York Times computer poll ranked the Tigers No. 1 based on results and schedule difficulty. Auburn's 1984 opponents averaged winning 70 percent of their games, not counting the games with Auburn.

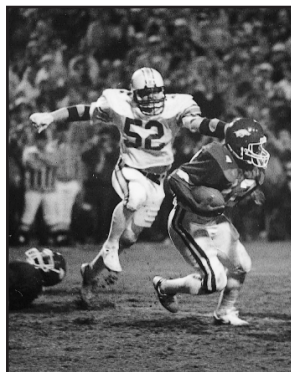

Halfback Bo Jackson closed out his injury-shortened junior season with a Liberty Bowl MVP performance against the Razorbacks of Arkansas. Jackson gained 88 yards on 18 carries and scored two

touchdowns, with his final score the difference in the game.

Arkansas scored first with 7:27 in the first quarter on a 31-yard field goal by Greg Horne. But with 3:00 left in the first period, Jackson capped off an 80-yard drive as he scored on a 2-yard run. Robert McGinty's PAT attempt was no good.

Auburn scored again before the first quarter was over when freshman cornerback Kevin Porter stepped in front of Arkansas quarterback Brad Taylor's intended receiver and raced 35 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Pat Washington ran in for the two-point conversion. Porter's interception was the first of four interceptions the Auburn defense recorded in the game.

Arkansas made the score 14-9 with 11:56 remaining in the game when fullback Marshall Foreman scored from two yards out, three plays after Arkansas had recovered an Auburn fumble on the Tiger 6-yard line. The Hogs' two-point attempt failed.

Then, with 5:38 remaining to be played, Jackson took a pitch around left end and took it 39 yards for the touchdown to make the score 21-9.

Arkansas scored with 3:10 remaining in the game on a 25-yard pass from Taylor to receiver James Shibest, but Auburn defensive end Kevin Greene blocked the extra point attempt.

The Auburn defense held strong on the final Razorback offensive series and the Tigers held on to win 21-15. The victory marked the third consecutive bowl victory for the Tigers and gave Auburn the best three-year record in the Southeastern Conference with 29 total victories.

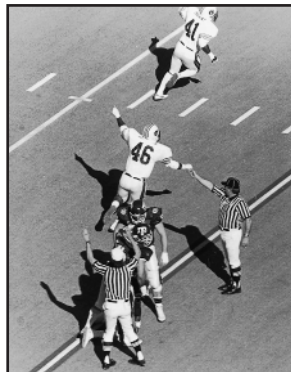

Auburn took its 8-3 regular season record to Dallas, Texas, to face SWC Champion Texas A&M in the 50th annual Cotton Bowl Classic. The bowl marked the fourth-consecutive bowl game for the Tigers

and the fulfillment of a commitment by the players to play in a New Year's Day contest.

Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson's five-yard touchdown burst early in the first quarter gave the Tigers an early 7-0 lead, but two score by the Aggies gave A&M the lead, 12-7, at the end of the first period.

With 8:28 remaining in the first half, Jackson took a pass from QB Pat Washington and raced 73 yards for a touchdown to again give Auburn the lead 13-12. But a 26-yard field goal by Aggie PK Scott Slater with 50 seconds remaining in the half would give Texas A&M the lead for good.

Auburn managed only a field goal in the second half, a 26-yarder by freshman Chris Johnson, while Texas A&M romped to a 36-16 victory.

Twice in the fourth quarter, Auburn failed to convert fourth down situations, one halting a drive at the Aggie two-yard line.

QB Pat Washington was two of seven for 82 yards and was replaced due

to injury in the second quarter by Jeff Burger, who was five for 10 for 72 yards. Bo Jackson capped off his Heisman season by rushing for 129 yards on 31 carries and one touchdown and catching two passes for 73 yards and a touchdown. He was the offensive Player-of-the-Game.

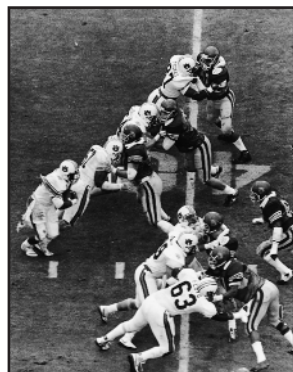

Auburn's January 1 date with Southern California in Orlando's Citrus Bowl marked the fifth consecutive bowl game for the Tigers, the third New Year's Day Bowl.

The Tigers' 9-2 regular season had left them one victory shy of becoming only the fifth team in Auburn history to win 10 games in a single season. Auburn's all-time football record stood at 499 victories. A 16-7 triumph over USC, the nation's winningest bowl team, gave the Tigers their 10-2 record and the 500th all-time Auburn win.

USC was the first on the scoreboard when linebacker Marcus Cotton intercepted a Jeff Burger pass and returned it 24 yards for a Trojan touchdown. But that would be the only points USC would score the rest of the day.

In the second period, the Tigers culminated an 80-yard drive with Burger hitting tight end Walter Reeves with a three-yard touchdown pass. With 1:30 remaining in the first half, All-America tailback Brent Fullwood ran in from four yards out for a score. PK Chris Knapp kicked his second PAT of the quarter to give Auburn a 14-7 lead.

With 4:48 left, OLB Aundray Bruce hit USC QB Rodney Peete in the backfield, causing a fumble which was recovered by a teammate, Nate Hill on the Auburn 48-yard line.

The Auburn defense held strong throughout the second half. In the fourth quarter, Auburn DT Tracy Rocker dropped Peete for a 13-yard sack and a safety, making the score 16-7.

Bruce, who recorded three QB sacks and caused a fumble which set up an Auburn scoring drive, was voted the overall Citrus Bowl MVP.

Auburn finished the season ranked sixth in the nation in the final AP poll and eighth in the UPI rankings.

A 9-1-1 regular-season record and the 1987 Southeastern Conference championship earned the Tigers a trip to New Orleans and a January 1 date with unbeaten Syracuse in the USF&G Sugar Bowl.

Sophomore place-kicker Win Lyle's 30-yard field goal with one second remaining in the game gave the Sugar Bowl the first tie in its 54-year history, a 16-16 deadlock.

The game that matched the best of the South against the best of the East — the sixth-ranked Tigers and the fourth-ranked Orangemen. Auburn's first touchdown was set up on a 58-yard flanker reverse pass from wide receiver Duke Donaldson to wide receiver Lawyer Tillman. With 5:45 remaining in the first quarter, quarterback Jeff Burger hit Tillman for a 17-yard score.

The Tigers held a 10-7 lead at halftime, but the Orangemen tied it at 10-10 by the end of the third quarter. Syracuse place-kicker Tim Vesling booted field goals of 32 and 38 yards in the fourth quarter while Auburn's Lyle was good on tries of 41 and 30 yards, the final kick tying the game for good.

Tillman, the game's leading receiver with six catches for 125 yards, was named the game's offensive MVP by ABC-TV.

The trip to New Orleans was Auburn's fourth New Year's Day bowl game in five years.

Auburn lost to Florida State 13-7 in one of the most exciting Sugar Bowls ever played. The Tigers spotted FSU a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter, then came roaring back and almost overtook the

Seminoles in the final seconds of the game.

Seminole tailback Sammie Smith became the first back in more than two years to gain 100 yards rushing against Auburn. Then the Tigers began their run. Auburn scored on a 20-yard pass from Reggie Slack to All-America tight end Walter Reeves to cut the FSU lead to six points. The Tigers had another first half threat when linebacker Smokey Hodge intercepted an FSU pass and returned it to the FSU 25, but a fumble at the 12 cost Auburn a scoring opportunity. Time and time again in the second half, the Auburn defense stopped Florida State scoring threats, and with three minutes left, the Tigers began their move to glory from their own four-yard line. Auburn converted three fourth down plays as it moved down field, but with five seconds left, an intercepted pass ended Auburn's hopes of victory and gave Auburn a 1-1-1 record in three Sugar Bowl appearances under Coach Pat Dye.

With the Buckeyes leading 14-3 in the second quarter, Shane Wasden returned a punt 34 yards to Ohio State's 33. As the clock was ticking down, Slack threw 11 yards to Greg Taylor for a touchdown.

In their first three possessions in the second half, the Tigers scored three times and led OSU 31-14. The big drive came in the second possession of third quarter with Auburn winning 17-14. The Tigers went 80 yards in 16 plays. On third and 11 at the OSU 41, Slack threw to Wasden for nine yards. He then threw to Alexander Wright on fourth and 2. Finally, three plays later, Slack raced up the middle seven yards for a touchdown with 8:33 to go in the game.

Auburn clinched the win with a 32-yard drive at the end of the game. When Ohio State failed at a fake punt attempt, Auburn used it to its advantage. Slack threw to Casey for a two-yard touchdown, putting the Tigers out of reach.

Reggie Slack was MVP of the game. He completed 16 of 22 passes for 141 yards, three touchdowns and rushed for a touchdown. Auburn ended the season with a 10-2 record.

Quarterback Stan White put the lid on a late Auburn come-from-behind win when he scampered one yard on a fourth-down bootleg to lift Auburn to a 27-23 win over Indiana in the 1990 Peach Bowl.

White's game-winning touchdown was his second of the day as the Tigers finished the 1990 season 8-3-1. For his efforts the freshman was named the Offensive MVP of the game. Auburn linebacker Darrel Crawford was named the Defensive MVP as the Tigers limited Indiana to just 220 yards total offense.

Auburn opened the scoring with White's first touchdown of the day, a six-yard run with 3:37 to play in the first quarter. Indiana tied the game at 7-7 on the final play of the first period when Trent Green scored from three yards out.

Auburn scored on an 11-yard White to Alex Smith pass and tacked on a 26-yard Jim Von Wyl field goal to take a 17-10 lead into the half.

Following a scoreless third period, the Hoosiers took a 23-17 lead into the game's final minutes on the strength of two more touchdown runs by Green. Green's third touchdown of the day came with just 2:27 to play.

White and receiver Herbert Casey converted on a pair of critical third down situations on Auburn's final drive of the game to set up White's game winner in the last bowl game Auburn would play with Pat Dye as head coach.

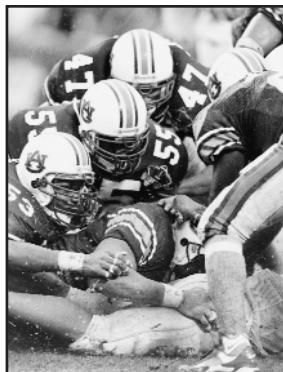

Richardson was intercepted by Dell McGee at the Penn State 36. Five downs later, Nix connected with freshman receiver Robert Baker for a 25-yard touchdown and a 7-3 lead.

Conway field goals of 22- and 38-yards put Penn State on top to stay at 9-7.

Auburn took possession deep in its own territory with 1:43 remaining in the half. On third down with 19 seconds left, Nix, on the run, threw an ill-advised pass down the sideline that fell into the hands of free safety Kim Herring.

Penn State quickly went to work. Richardson completed a 43-yard pass down the left sideline to Joe Jurevicius at the Auburn eight. With five seconds left, Richardson found running back Mike Archie over the middle for a score.

The Nittany Lions scored on all four possessions in the third quarter. In the first drive, Richardson capped an eighty-yard effort with a nine-yard strike to Engram.

Midway through the fourth, following a Penn State fumble, Auburn mounted a 43-yard scoring drive. Fullback Kevin McLeod raced up the middle for a touchdown and a final margin of 43-14.

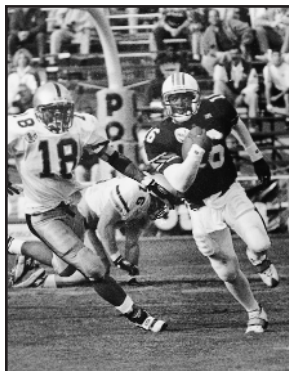

Army's J. Parker's 27-yard field goal attempt with 29 seconds remaining sailed wide right as Auburn held off a late Cadet charge to win the 1996 Independence Bowl, 32-29.

In winning its first bowl game in six years, Auburn utilized the talents of quarterback Dameyune Craig. Craig threw for an Independence and Auburn bowl record 370 yards while rushing for 75 more in earning Offensive MVP honors.

Craig led Auburn to the game's first 20 points, throwing touchdown strikes to Tyrone Goodson (30 yards) and Willie Gosha (seven yards) and setting up a pair of Jaret Holmes field goals.

Meanwhile, the Tiger defense held Army's option attack in check for most of the first half. The Cadet's finally got on the scoreboard when Bobby Williams scored with 1:27 remaining in the first half to make it 20-7, Auburn.

Auburn built its lead to 32-7 in the third quarter on a 33-yard scramble by Craig and an 18-yard burst by Rusty Williams. Two-point attempts after both scores failed.

Army made a valiant comeback in the fourth quarter as Demetrius Perry and Bobby Williams both scored touchdowns to cut Auburn's lead to 32-21 with 5:52 left. Cadet quarterback Ronnie McAda then found Rod Richardson on a 30-yard catch-and-run for another touchdown with 1:27 remaining. Williams' two-point run made the score 32-29.

After recovering the ensuing on-side kick and moving the ball to Auburn's 10, Army tried the 27-yard field goal attempt by Parker on third down.

Five minutes later, Rusty Williams put the Tigers ahead to stay, 18-17, with a seven-yard run. Jaret Holmes added a 22-yard field goal, his third of the day, with 4:11 left.

Auburn's defense dominated the game, holding Clemson under 100 yards in both rushing (60) and passing (86) and to just 146 yards total. Auburn held Clemson to just four first downs and had just one of 14 third-down attempts converted against it.

Holmes' career-long 52-yard field goal gave Auburn a 3-0 with 9:49 left in the first quarter. But Clemson took the lead midway through the second quarter after blocking a Holmes' punt. Chad Speck returned the block 18 yards for a touchdown and a 7-3 Clemson lead.

Auburn trimmed the lead to 7-6 with a 24-yard Holmes field goal before halftime, but another blocked punt set up another Clemson touchdown with 5:15 left in the third.

The 20th-ranked Auburn Tigers made a late fourth quarter charge, but fell short, losing to 17th-ranked Michigan Wolverines, 31-28, in the Capital One Florida Citrus Bowl.

The Tigers utilized the arm of senior quarterback Ben Leard who set two Auburn bowl records by throwing for 394 yards and three touchdowns. Answering a first quarter 31-yard Wolverine touchdown pass from Drew Henson to David Terrell, Leard threw his first of touchdown to Ronney Daniels in the second quarter to tie the game at 7-7.

Auburn took the lead as Leard hit senior Clifton Robinson on a 20-yard touchdown with 11:04 before the half. But, Henson connected on a four-yard pass to B.J. Askew to tie the game at 14-14. Michigan regained the lead on an 11-yard scamper from Anthony Thomas to end the first half at 21-14.

Michigan built its lead to 28-14 in the third quarter as Thomas, named the game's MVP, entered the endzone on a 25-yard burst, his longest of the day. Auburn junior running back Rudi Johnson crossed the goal line with 4:08 to go in the third, to bring Auburn within seven, 28-21. The Wolverines connected on a 41-yard field goal by Hayden Epstein to increase their lead to 31-21 to end the quarter.

Leard responded by connecting with freshman Deandre Green on a 21-yard pass in the endzone to trim Michigan's lead to three, 31-28, with 2:26 to go.

Duval's ensuing on-side kick was recovered by Michigan and the Wolverines ran out the clock to earn the 31-28 win.

Leard was named Auburn's offensive MVP while Javor Mills, who recorded six tackles and two sacks was the Tigers' defensive MVP.

The only other score in the half came when the Tar Heels drove the ball 84 yards resulting in a field goal by kicker Jeff Reed.

North Carolina came out of halftime and added to their lead as Peach Bowl Offensive MVP QB Ronald Curry scrambled 62 yards for a touchdown putting UNC ahead 16-0.

The Auburn defense responded well, not allowing any more points for the rest of the game and treated football fans to a play that will be remembered in Auburn football history.

An errant Darian Durant pass was snatched out of the air by whip Karlos Dansby as he was falling out of bounds. Dansby then tossed the ball to line-backer Dontarrious Thomas to complete an amazing interception. The play was later nominated for the ESPY Awards' "Most Spectacular Play" of the year.

The Auburn offense, feeding off the momentum from the interception,

moved the ball down the field. Jason Cambell connected with Casinius Moore on an 11-yard pass that set up Auburn kicker Damon Duval's 34-yard field goal with 13:16 left in the game.

On a warm and windy day in Orlando, the 19th-ranked Auburn Tigers knocked off 10th-ranked Penn State behind a stymieing defense and Capital One Bowl MVP Ronnie Brown's 184 yard, two touchdown performance.

Penn State's Larry Johnson, who finished third in the Heisman Trophy balloting, was unable to get on track as Auburn's defense limited him to only 72 yards on 20 carries.

Auburn fumbled on its first possession giving Penn State the ball on the 15-yard line, but the Nittany Lions were forced to settle for a 21-yard Robbie Gould field goal.

The Auburn defense held the Nittany Lion's offense the rest of the half, allowing only a 27-yard field goal by Gould.

After a sluggish first half, the Tigers came out in the third quarter with a run-dominated offensive scheme and Ronnie Brown punished the Penn State defenders to the tune of 119 second half yards.

Auburn took its first possession of the second half and marched 74 yards, scoring on a one-yard Brown touchdown run, which put Auburn ahead, 7-6. The fast Tiger defense took control, allowing Penn State only 31 yards of offense in the third quarter.

Penn State replaced quarterback Zack Mills with Michael Robinson who sparked the Nittany Lion offense to a fourth quarter field goal, putting Penn State up 9-7.

On Auburn's next possession, Damon Duval's punt was downed at the one-yard line pinning Penn State deep in their own territory.

After a short punt by Penn State, Auburn drove the ball inside the red zone, where Ronnie Brown bounced a run to the outside taking it 17 yards for the game winning touchdown.

Brown's 184 yards rushing were the most ever by an Auburn player in a bowl, and it was the most yards rushing of anyone in the 2003 bowl season. Dontarrious Thomas was named the game's defensive MVP after helping hold Penn State to just 268 yards.

## 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl

With a combination of a stellar defensive performance, which contributed six sacks, and the leadership of Music City Bowl MVP Jason Campbell, the Tigers put together 14 fourth-quarter points en route to a 28-14 win over Wisconsin.

Wisconsin started the second quarter by driving the ball to the Auburn seven-yard line where the Badgers had it first and 10, but Auburn's defense forced Wisconsin to kick a 20-yard field goal, for a 3-0 lead.

Auburn responded on the next drive as Ronnie Brown had 43 yards on six carries culminating with a one-yard touchdown to give the Tigers a 7-3 lead. Wisconsin could only manage another field goal before the half to make the score 7-6 at the intermission.

Auburn struck first coming out of the half, going 80 yards on 16 plays and taking 7:16 off the clock. The drive was capped when Carnell Williams ran the ball through the middle for a one-yard touchdown.

In the fourth quarter, the Badgers took the ball at the Wisconsin 48-yard line, and began the drive with several key completions by Jim Sorgi. The drive ended with a 12-yard pass to Lee Evans for a touchdown, and a two-point conversation pass to tie the game at 14.

The Badgers seemed to have the momentum in their favor, until Carlos Rogers deflected a pass into the air and Will Herring was able to intercept it on the Auburn 13-yard line. After a couple of unsuccessful Auburn plays, Jason Campbell connected with Jeris McIntyre on third and eight for what would become

a 51-yard play to the Wisconsin 34-yard line. It would only take Auburn three more plays to put it into the end zone as Brown scored his second touchdown of the day from two yards out.

Auburn put an exclamation point on the game during the ensuing Wisconsin drive when Reggie Torbor and Karlos Dansby sandwiched Jim Sorgi causing a fumble. Tommy Jackson recovered it, and two plays later Auburn would put the final points on the board with a one-yard run by Carnell Williams to make the score, 28-14.

Campbell, who earned MVP honors, finished the game with 138 yards on 10 completions, rushed for 67 yards and engineered two fourth-quarter drives. Auburn's defense held Wisconsin to 261 yards. Torbor collected 2.5 sacks for a loss of 12 yards and Dansby totaled a team-high 10 tackles including 1.5 sacks.

# Auburn University

## HISTORY

Auburn University has a proud and dynamic 148-year history. The institution was chartered on February 1, 1856 as the East Alabama Male College, a private liberal arts school established by Alabama Methodists to foster Christian education.

A single four-story building was completed at a cost of \$111,000 in 1859 with 80 students enrolled and a faculty of five.

The college building, then named Old Main, was used as a Confederate hospital from 1864 until classes resumed in 1866. When fire destroyed Old Main in 1887, it was replaced on the same site in 1888 by Samford Hall, named after Gov. Samford. Today Samford Hall serves as the university's administrative headquarters.

In 1899, the Alabama Legislature decided a new name was needed to reflect the expanded role of the institution. The college's name was changed to the Alabama Polytechnic Institute.

In 1960 Alabama Polytechnic Institute became Auburn University.

Women students were first admitted to Auburn in 1892, making Auburn the oldest four-year coeducational school in Alabama and the second oldest in the Southeast.

Auburn's greatest growth and development came after World War II. From a campus of 35 buildings in 1946, the university's multi-million dollar physical complex has grown to approximately 375 buildings on 1,840 acres. The Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station conducts crop, animal and soil experimentation statewide, and Extension agents are stationed in all 67 Alabama counties. Main campus enrollment is more than 23,000, with about 1,270 faculty.

## AUBURN TODAY

Twelve schools and colleges advance the university's outstanding programs of teaching, research and service. The current colleges and schools and the dates of this original inception are: College of Agriculture, 1872; College of Architecture Design and Construction, 1907; College of Business, 1967; College of Education, 1915; Samuel Ginn College of Engineering, 1872; School of Forestry and Wildlife Sciences, 1984; College of Human Sciences, 1916; College of Liberal Arts, 1986; School of Nursing, 1979; James Harrison School of Pharmacy, 1885; College of Sciences and Mathematics, 1986; College of Veterinary Medicine, 1907; Graduate School, 1872. In 1986, a university reorganization created the College of Liberal Arts and the College of Sciences and Mathematics from the former school of Arts and Sciences (1872), as well as portions of the School of Agriculture and Biological Sciences and the School of Architecture and Fine Arts (both subsequently renamed).

AU's College of Engineering took a major leap forward in 2001 when an alumnus decided his alma mater should take the national lead in the teaching of wireless communication and related engineering research and teaching. Samuel L. Ginn, a pioneer in

wireless communication, backed up his vision with a \$25 million gift to the college and announced plans to spearhead an additional \$150 million in support.

Auburn has been home to an excellent honors program since 1979, which was established as the first Honors College among Alabama's colleges and universities. The college has proven to be one of Alabama's major inducements to the brightest students who are interested in Auburn.

## AUBURN AT A GLANCE

- A 2001 study determined AU had a nearly \$4 billion economic impact on the state of Alabama, including a \$1.5 billion impact on the economy and \$2.4 billion impact in "human capital".

- **U.S. News & World Report** -- for the 11th consecutive year - gave AU the highest public university ranking in the state. In its America's Best Colleges 2004, the magazine listed AU No. 44 among the top 50 public national universities, one of only four Southeastern universities in the top 50.

- The November 2003 edition of **Kiplinger's** magazine ranked AU among its best values in U.S. public institutions, as did the 2004 Princeton Review. Kiplinger rated AU 26 in terms of in-state student value and 31 for out-of-state student value. Among SEC-member institutions, only two others ranked above Auburn in in-state value, and three others in out-of-state value.

- AU is the only university in the country to offer a degree in wireless technology, and the first in the Southeast to offer degrees in software engineering.

- AU is known for its "rocket science." Four NASA astronauts graduated from AU, and the current director and one past director of Kennedy Space Center are also AU alumni.

- The College of Veterinary Medicine is the oldest college of veterinary medicine in the South and seventh-oldest in the nation, with more than 5,600 doctors of veterinary medicine have graduated from the College, which has alumni in all 50 states.

## AUBURN PEOPLE

Auburn faculty and alumni are world-class achievers in practically every arena. Here are just a few examples:

- Auburn has graduated six astronauts: Henry "Hank" Hartsfield ('54), T.K. Mattingly ('58), Kathryn Thornton ('70), Jan Davis ('77), Jim Voss ('72), and the late Clifton Williams ('54).

- Vincent "Bo" Jackson, a two-sport professional star who won the Heisman Trophy in 1985, received his bachelor of sciences degree in family and child development from Auburn in 1992.

- Fob James ('57), as an Auburn student-athlete earned all-America honors as a running back for the Tigers. In addition to an extremely successful career in industry, including founding DP Industries, he was twice elected governor of Alabama.

- Timothy D. Cook, senior vice president of worldwide operations for Apple Computer, Inc., of Cupertino, Calif., is responsible for leading Apple's global operations organization.

- Rowdy Gaines ('82) is an Olympic gold medalist, world record holder and television sports commentator.

## THE CAMPUS/CITY

Auburn's beautiful main campus graced by greenery and open spaces and highlighted by historic Samford Park -- is made up of 375 buildings spread across 1,875 acres bordered on two sides by farms and woodlands. Buildings in the main campus area are within walking distance of each other. Residence halls are only a short walk from classrooms, dining and athletic facilities. Auburn is located in the Southeastern United States in east-central Alabama about 30 miles from the Georgia border.

One of the state's fastest growing cities, Auburn has a population of about 45,000. An adjacent twin-city, Opelika, has a population of about 30,000. Atlanta, Ga. is only 100 miles to the northeast via Interstate 85; Birmingham is 100 miles to the north via U.S. 280 or I-85/65; Montgomery is 50 miles to the east via I-85; and the Gulf beaches are about 200 miles away.

**Interim President**

The Board of Trustees unanimously named Edward R.

Richardson as interim president of Auburn University on Jan. 20, 2004.

Richardson, former state school superintendent, has a familiarity with Auburn, born of a 24-year association with the university, as preparation for the interim presidency.

Prior to accepting the post, Richardson had been state superintendent of education since October 1995. During his eight-year tenure in Montgomery, Richardson was the Alabama Board of Education's executive officer for the State Department of Education. In that capacity, he was the state's top appointed official over Alabama's K-12 public schools. Richardson became state superintendent at a time when the State Board of Education was starting the most ambitious academic improvement program in Alabama's history.

Among his first major responsibilities as state superintendent was to oversee implementation of the Education Accountability Law passed in the 1995 Legislative Session. The State Board of Education developed a plan that requires schools and school systems to operate with academic and financial accountability. Richardson enforced that law and intervened in 10 school systems for financial reasons and in one school for academic reasons. In 1996, Richardson recommended to the State Board of Education a plan for implementing the nation's highest graduation requirements.

Richardson also implemented the issuance of easy-to-understand report cards on the performance of every school system in the state and the development of a comprehensive technology plan for all elementary and secondary schools. The plan included providing advanced courses via distance learning to schools that might not otherwise offer such courses.

Before he became state superintendent, Richardson

was superintendent of schools for the Auburn City Board of Education for 13 years. He spent nine years as a teacher, assistant principal and principal in the Montgomery County school system and served nine years as principal of Andalusia High School.

Richardson has earned three degrees from Auburn University—a B.S. in science education in 1962, an M.Ed. in 1967, and an Ed.D. in 1972, both in educational administration.

## DAVID HOUSEL Athletic Director

David Housel has always stated that his top priority was to leave Auburn better than he found it. By any standard or measure, he has done just that, as Auburn experienced its greatest period of growth, progress and success in its history

under his leadership.

Housel announced in March that he will step down as Athletic Director in January, 2005 and will retire from the University in early 2006. He will leave a lasting legacy which has seen nearly every aspect of the department, most notably the overall success of its athletic teams on and off the field, improve under his watch.

Simply put, Auburn's athletic department has prospered under the direction of David Housel in his 10 years as Athletic Director.

Consider under Housel's leadership:

- Auburn has won seven team national championships. In the previous 38 years, Auburn had captured only one national championship.
- \* Auburn has won 30 Southeastern Conference titles in the last 10 years. In the previous 10 seasons, the Tigers won eight titles.
- Had 141 teams advance to post-season play, an impressive average of more than 14 a year. In 2003-04, 16 of 21 teams advanced to post-season play and seven teams finished in the top 25 nationally.
- Posted its highest graduation rates ever.
- Experienced the greatest facilities enhancement program in its history with \$30 million in new or improved facilities operational and \$95 million more in planning stages. Projects have included the construction of Samford Stadium-Hitchcock Field at Plainsman Park, Jane B. Moore Field, the Jonathan Bell Lovelace Museum, the McWhorter Center for Women's Athletics, the James T. Tatum Strength and Conditioning Center, the Rehabilitation and Strength Center at Plainsman Park, Tiger Walk Plaza, new locker rooms at Jordan-Hare Stadium and renovations to Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum and the soccer complex. Currently under construction is a state-of-the-art Academic Center, renovations to Jordan-Hare Stadium, a new track, while on the drawing board are plans for an indoor tennis facility, an outdoor pool and an expanded indoor football practice facility.
- Operated in the black financially every year, one of the very few Division IA programs to do so on a consistent annual basis. Auburn's athletic budget exceeds \$40 million annually.
- Had numerous athletes win individual NCAA titles, earn All-America honors, 82 Academic All-Americans, and 683 Academic All-SEC performers.
- Had coaches earn 12 National Coach of the Year awards and 18 SEC coach of the year awards.
- Added two sports, softball and equestrian, to meet gender-equity commitments.
- Implemented a strong Champs/Life Skills program and Tiger Tracks Career Development program to encourage Auburn student-athletes to develop their skills away from athletics, and to participate in community activities and prepare themselves for life after athletics.

The Athletic Department has four major measures for evaluating quality and success: competitive success, the academic success of its student-

athletes, fiscal responsibility and rules compliance. By any standard of measure, Auburn has been successful in meeting these objectives during Housel's tenure as Athletic Director.

Housel, 58, refuses to take credit for any of these accomplishments, giving credit to the Board of Trustees, the President, and above all, to the Auburn people.

"This is the work of Auburn people," he says. "Whatever we have been able to accomplish is a direct reflection of Auburn people and their support of the school they love. We are fortunate to have some excellent coaches and student-athletes, but our ultimate success comes from the commitment of the Board of Trustees, the President and the love and support of Auburn people."

Housel has dedicated the better part of his life to helping Auburn succeed. He came to Auburn as a freshman on June 9, 1965, graduating in 1969 with a degree in Journalism. He worked in the Ticket Office from 1970-72, taught Journalism from 1972-80 and rejoined the athletic staff as Assistant Sports Information Director in 1980. He was named Director in 1981 and Assistant Athletic Director in 1985.

Housel became Auburn's 13th Director of Athletics on April 1, 1994. "People may agree or disagree with decisions that are made," he said, "but they will never be able to question the reasons for those decisions. There will be no agenda other than the betterment of Auburn." His one goal is to leave Auburn and the athletic program better than he found it.

A past president of the SEC SID's, Housel is a former chair of the NCAA Public Relations and Communications committees. He worked 18 straight Final Fours and served on the Media Coordination Committee from 1983 through 1994 when he was named Athletic Director. He has also served on the District III Postgraduate Scholarship Committee, and has served as chair of the Dean's Council for Auburn's College of Liberal Arts. Housel currently is a member of the NCAA Championships Cabinet and the Executive Committee of the Southeastern Conference. He also serves on the Board of Directors for AuburnBank, the Auburn Wesley Foundation, the Lee Country Red Cross and is a member of The Birmingham Pledge Advisory Board.

An award winning free lance writer, Housel has written two books, "Saturdays To Remember," and "From the Desk to David Housel, A Collection of Auburn Stories." An honorary member of the Auburn Football Lettermen Club and the University Singers, he is also a member of three Halls of Fame, the Sports Information Directors' Hall of Fame (1998), the Tony Brandino Hall of Fame (1998), and his hometown Hall of Fame.

Listing his hobbies as birds, books, Broadway "and a little golf," --which means he enjoys the game, but is not very good at it. Housel made his Broadway debut in 1992 in the Cameron MacIntosh production of "Five Guys Named Moe" at the Eugene O'Neill Theater.

He is married to the former Susan McIntosh, a former third grade teacher at Wright's Mill Road Elementary School in Auburn.



## **HAL BAIRD**

### **Athletic Assistant to the President**

One of the most respected and successful coaches in Auburn history, Hal Baird was named Athletic Assistant to the President in March, 2004.

Baird oversees the day-to-day operations of the Athletic Department. He previously served as a Senior Associate Athletic Director and the Senior Men's Administrator since November, 2000.

In his first month as Athletic Assistant to the President, Baird spearheaded two coaching searches which resulted in the naming of Jeff Lebo the men's head basketball coach and Nell Fortner, the women's head basketball coach.

For 16 seasons from 1985-2000, Baird served as Auburn's head baseball coach where he posted a record of 634-328 while leading the Tigers to nine NCAA Regional appearances and two College World Series berths. His overall record was 779-393.

The winningest coach in Auburn history, Baird led the Tigers to two SEC Tournament championships and one SEC Western Division title. He guided the Tigers to nine seasons of 40 wins or more and two 50-victory seasons. He ranks as the fourth winningest coach in SEC history by victories.

In addition, the Tigers won at least 30 games in each of Baird's 16 seasons. A Baird-coached college baseball team never suffered a losing season in 16 years at Auburn and five at East Carolina.

In 1997, Baird guided Auburn to one of its most successful seasons ever. The Tigers won 50 games for the second time, finishing with a 50-17 mark while advancing to the College World Series for the second time in four seasons.

But it was 1994 that may be looked upon in the years to come as the "breakthrough" season. It will be remembered as the year Baird first escorted one of his teams to Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Neb., where Baird himself played for the Triple-A Omaha Royals from 1974-76.

It was a year which recognized Baird's solid work, as he was named South Region Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches' Association.

The 1995 team not only won 40, but it did so quicker than any team in SEC history, taking just 45 games to reach that magical accomplishment. Auburn won the SEC Western Division en route to finishing with a school best record of 50-13. And, for the first time in school history, the 1995 Tigers were the No. 1 seed at an NCAA Regional and spent part of the season as the top-ranked team in the country.

Perhaps one of Baird's most important contributions during his coaching tenure at Auburn came off the playing field. Baird was one of the driving forces behind the construction of Samford Stadium-Hitchcock Field at Plainsman Park.

It was his vision that combined the great traditional ballparks of the past with the modern structures of today, making Plainsman Park one of the

crown jewels of amateur baseball. Baseball America named Plainsman Park the nation's top collegiate baseball facility in 2003.

In his 16 years at Auburn, Baird coached 50 players who have gone on to play professional baseball. He coached two first-round draft picks: pitcher Gregg Olson, drafted in 1988 by the Baltimore Orioles, and first baseman Frank Thomas, selected by the Chicago White Sox in 1989. Olson was an All-America selection in 1987 and 1988, Thomas in 1989.

Baird also coached the NCAA's all-time strikeout leader at Auburn, John Powell, who finished his career in 1994 in Omaha with 602 strikeouts and Tim Hudson, who won the 1997 Smith Award, signifying collegiate baseball's top player.

Following a stellar collegiate career as a pitcher at first Ferrum College and then East Carolina, Baird spent seven years in professional baseball with the Kansas City and Cleveland organizations.

As a charter member of the Royals Academy, Baird joined such notables as Frank White and U.L. Washington in helping to break new ground in pro baseball.

Baird posted a career record of 25-16 with a 3.11 ERA from 1971-76. His 2.97 ERA at Omaha in 1975 was fourth-best in the American Association that year. In 1976, his final season of pro ball, he had a 2.21 ERA in a career-best 50 appearances. He was named to all-star teams in both the Gulf Coast League (1971) and the Southern League (1973).

After his pro career, he returned to college baseball where he quickly earned the reputation as a bright and successful coach.

Baird began his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater, East Carolina, where he worked closely with the pitching staff. In 1980, he was named East Carolina's head coach and for the next five seasons compiled an overall record of 145-66 (.687).

During his five-year head coaching tenure at East Carolina, Baird's teams made three appearances in the NCAA Tournament and won the Eastern College Athletic Conference championship twice.

In addition to his winning percentage as a coach, his pitching staffs were of national caliber. In 1981, the Pirate staff led the nation with a 2.78 ERA. In his eight years with the Pirate program, East Carolina's pitching staffs were ranked in the nation's top 20 five times.

Baird was rewarded for his work at his alma mater in October 1994, when he was inducted into the East Carolina Athletics Hall of Fame.
