THE GAME

Auburn makes its seventh straight bowl appearance and 33rd overall when the Tigers meet Nebraska in the 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic. It will be the second trip to the Dallas-based bowl for Auburn and will mark the Tigers' third-straight January bowl game. Auburn has not been to a bowl game in Texas since the Tigers' only other trip to the Cotton Bowl in 1986.

AUBURN'S BOWL HISTORY

This season's bowl appearance marks the 33rd time that the Tigers have played in a bowl game. Auburn has a 17-13-2 record in its previous 32 bowl games and has played in a bowl game in 19 of the last 25 years.

The Tigers are appearing in a bowl game for the seventh straight year, which is tied for the second-longest streak in school history. Auburn had a streak of nine straight bowl appearances from 1982-90 and seven straight from 1968-74.

Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 12-6-1 in bowl games, winning four consecutive from 1974-84 ('74 Gator, '82 Tangerine, '83 Sugar, '84 Liberty) and three straight from 2003-05 ('03 Capital One, '03 Music City, '05 Sugar).

TUBERVILLE IN BOWL GAMES

Tommy Tuberville is 4-3 all-time in bowl games as a head coach, including a 3-3 mark at Auburn. Tuberville guided the Tigers to three consecutive bowl wins, defeating Virginia Tech, 16-13, in the 2005 NOKIA Sugar Bowl, Wisconsin, 28-14, in the 2003 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, and Penn State, 13-9, in the 2003 Capital One Bowl.

Tuberville also guided the Tigers to the 2006 Capital One Bowl (24-10 loss to Wisconsin), 2001 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (16-10 loss to North Carolina) and 2001 Capital One Florida Citrus Bowl (31-28 loss to Michigan). As a head coach at Ole Miss, Tuberville led the Rebels to a 34-31 win in the 1997 Motor City Bowl.

As both a head coach and an assistant coach, Tuberville is 9-6 in bowl games. While an assistant at Miami, Tuberville was 5-3 in bowl games, including five straight wins from 1988 to 1992 and three national championships.

IN THE COTTON BOWL

Auburn has made just one previous appearance in the Cotton Bowl. On Jan. 1, 1986, the Tigers were beaten by Texas A&M, 36-16, in the 50th edition of the game. Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson had 129 yards rushing and 73 yards receiving while scoring both Auburn touchdowns in the game.

TIGERS' BOWL NOTABLES

The Tigers are 16th in the NCAA all-time in bowl appearances (33) and tied for 15th all-time in bowl victories (17) ... This will be Auburn's fifth bowl game played in the state of Texas (1968 Sun, 1969 Astro-Bluebonnet, 1973 Sun, 1986 Cotton), with the Tigers owning a 1-3 record in the previous four games ... The Tigers are 10-3-2 in bowl games when scoring first ... Auburn is 12-2 in bowl games when scoring 20 or more points ... Auburn has been held to fewer than 20 points in four of its last five bowl games, but is 2-2 in those four contests ... Auburn has never been shut out in a bowl game.

AU-NU HISTORY

The Cotton Bowl Classic will mark just the fourth meeting in history between Auburn and Nebraska, and the first since 1982. The Huskers have won each of the three previous encounters. The first time the two schools met was at the 1964 Orange Bowl in Miami, and No. 6 Nebraska earned a 13-7 victory over the fifth-ranked Tigers. The teams met again in 1981 in Lincoln, with the Huskers winning by a 17-3 score. The next year in Auburn, eighth-ranked Nebraska rolled to a 41-7 victory over the No. 20 Tigers.

NEBRASKA QUICK HITTEES

Nebraska won the Big 12 North Division before falling to Oklahoma in the Big 12 Championship game ... The Huskers have won five national championships and 43 conference championships in their history ... Nebraska is ranked ninth in the nation in total offense (428.8), 13th in scoring offense (31.9) and 18th in passing offense (253.2) ... Quarterback Zac Taylor has 25 touchdown passes this season, breaking the NU single-season record of 20 set by Vince Ferragamo in 1976, and broke his own school record with 3,071 passing yards ... Taylor's 44 career TD passes are also a Nebraska record ... Brandon Jackson ranks third in the Big 12 in rushing (73.2) and all-purpose yards (109.8) ... Wideout Terrence Nunn has 100 career receptions, becoming just the second receiver in NU history to reach the century mark in catches ... Nebraska has scored at least 20 points in 11 of its 13 games this season ... The Huskers have blocked four kicks this season.

FINAL GAME FOR TIGER SENIORS

The Cotton Bowl will mark the final game for Auburn's senior class. The Tigers' group of 21 seniors is the largest class at Auburn during the Tommy Tuberville era. The group has posted a 40-10 record over the past four seasons, winning more games than any previous class in Auburn history, and won the 2004 SEC Championship and the 2005 SEC Western Division Co-Championship.

AGAINST THE BIG 12

Auburn is 9-15-1 all-time against current members of the Big 12 Conference, with bowl games accounting for eight of those 25 games (3-5 record in those eight bowl games). However, Auburn has not played a Big 12 school since 1991, when the No. 13 Tigers earned a 14-10 win at Texas.

TUBERVILLE VS. THE BIG 12

The Cotton Bowl match-up against Nebraska will mark Tommy Tuberville's first game against a Big 12 opponent as a head coach. However, during Tuberville's stint as an assistant coach at Miami, the Hurricanes played in four bowl games against Big 12 schools, winning all four. Miami beat Oklahoma in the 1988 Orange Bowl (20-14), Nebraska in the 1989 (23-3) and 1992 (22-0) Orange Bowls and Texas in the 1991 Cotton Bowl (46-3).

100TH GAME AT AUBURN

Auburn's appearance in the Cotton Bowl will mark Tommy Tuberville's 100th game as Auburn head coach. Tuberville, who owns a 70-29 record in his first 99 games heading the Tigers, will become just the fourth coach in Auburn history to coach 100 games. Ralph "Shug" Jordan has coached the most games at Auburn, leading the Tigers for 265 games over 25 seasons from 1951-75 while compiling a 176-83-6 record. Pat Dye (1981-92) was the head coach for 142 games, posting a mark of 99-39-4, while Mike Donahue (1904-06, 1908-22) headed the squad for 139 games, recording a ledger of 99-35-5.

ASSISTANTS IN BOWLS

Auburn's post-season appearance will mark a return visit to a bowl for several Tiger assistant coaches. Quarterbacks coach Steve Ensminger will be going to his 12th bowl game, while offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive line coach Terry Price will be going to their 11th bowl. Ensminger played in three bowls at LSU as did Price while at Texas A&M. Nall and defensive coordinator Will Muschamp both played in two bowl games while at Georgia.

ON THIS DATE

Auburn is 4-6-2 all-time in games played on Jan. 1. The Tigers' last Jan. 1 bowl game was the 2003 Capital One Bowl, when Auburn beat Penn State 13-9. Auburn's last four Jan. 1 games have all been played in Florida since a 16-16 tie against Syracuse in the 1987 Sugar Bowl in New Orleans. The Tigers' first Jan. 1 game came in 1937 when Auburn played Villanova to a 7-7 tie in the Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba.

VS. TEAMS RANKED 22ND

Surprisingly, Auburn has never before played a team ranked No. 22 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll.

DID YOU KNOW?

Auburn is the only team in the country to have defeated two teams ranked in the top five of the final regular season Associated Press top 25 poll, as well as the only team to beat two teams playing in BCS bowl games. Auburn beat current No. 2 Florida (27-17), headed to the BCS national championship game, on Oct. 14, and beat current No. 4 LSU (7-3), slated for the Sugar Bowl, on Sept. 16.

THREE-YEAR DOMINATION

Auburn has posted a record of 32-5 (.865) since the start of the 2004 season, tying the Tigers for the third-best record in the NCAA over the past three seasons. Only USC (35-3, .921) and Texas (33-4, .892) have better winning percentages than Auburn during that span, while Boise State has an identical 32-5 mark.

ANOTHER WINNING SEASON

With 10 victories this year, Auburn will finish with another winning season. It marks the seventh consecutive winning season for Auburn, and the 76th in school history. Auburn, which has now had just three losing seasons in the last 25 years, has won at least 10 games 11 times in its history.

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

Auburn has had a knack for winning close ball games since Tommy Tuberville arrived as the Tigers' head coach. In his seven seasons at the helm, Auburn is 23-10 in games decided by seven points or less and has won 11 of its last 13, including all four games this season. Counting his four seasons at Ole Miss, Tuberville has a 23-15 record as a head coach in games decided by seven points or less.

SENIORS BREAK FOUR-YEAR MARK

Auburn has broken the mark for most victories over a four-year period in Auburn history with 40, and has also broken the three-year mark with 32 wins. Last year's class had set the four-year mark with 39 victories, the three-year mark (30) and the two-year record (22).

SECOND-HALF STALWARTS

Auburn has shown ability to make necessary adjustments at the half, as evidenced by the Tigers rallying from halftime deficits to beat both LSU (trailed 3-0, won 7-3) and Florida (trailed 17-11, won 27-17) this season, and breaking a 7-7 halftime tie to beat Ole Miss. Auburn has outscored its opponents 99-33 in the third quarter this year, and 60-24 in the fourth period, for a total advantage of 159-57 in the second half. Auburn has also held its opponents to 11-of-34 third-down conversions in the third quarter (32.4 percent), while converting 52.6 percent (20-of-38) of its own third down chances in the third period.

TWO THOUSAND TIMES TWO

For the first time in school history, Auburn has both a career 2,000-yard rusher and career 2,000-yard receiver on the same team. Courtney Taylor surpassed the 2,000-yard mark in receiving during Auburn's victory over Arkansas State Nov. 4, and the following Saturday against Georgia, Kenny Irons went over the 2,000-yard mark in rushing. Irons, who now has 2,114 career rushing yards, became the 12th Auburn player to pass the 2,000-yard mark in rushing, but Taylor, who has 2,028 career receiving yards, is one of just four Tigers to reach 2,000 yards receiving.

SEC SUCCESS

Auburn has won 22 of its last 25 Southeastern Conference games and 23 of its last 26 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 SEC Championship game victory over Tennessee. Auburn's success against conference schools dates back to more than just the past three seasons, as since the start of the 2000 season, the Tigers have the best record among the 12 league schools in regular season conference games. The following are the combined conference records of the 12 SEC schools from 2000-06.

TAYLOR TAKING OVER

Courtney Taylor has stepped up his production this season, posting a career-best 48 catches while grabbing at least three passes in nine games this year.

Taylor is tied for the SEC's third-leading active receiver with 147 career catches and ranks fourth with 2,028 career receiving yards. He ranks second in Auburn history in receptions, needing four to set a new school record, and fourth in receiving yardage. Of his 147 catches, 99 have resulted in first downs (67.3 percent).

JUST FOR KICKS

John Vaughn is having an All-American senior season, and was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award. Vaughn leads the SEC and is tied for seventh nationally with 19 field goals made (in 23 attempts) and ranks third in the SEC in scoring (7.4). Vaughn, whose field goal percentage of .826 is tied for fourth in the nation among kickers with at least 20 attempts, has twice made four field goals in a game this season (Sept. 2 vs. Washington State and Oct. 14 vs. Florida). He has two field goals this year of over 50 yards and broke Auburn's career scoring record, now with 307 points, which ranks 13th in SEC history.

Vaughn's 19 field goals this season is the second-highest single-season total in school history. He is three shy of the record of 22 set by Scott Etheridge in 1992.

NO RETURN POLICY

Auburn has allowed the fewest kickoff return yards in the nation this season, and by a wide margin. The Tigers have surrendered just 197 kickoff return yards, while the next lowest total is 276 by Arizona, despite the fact that the Wildcats kicked off 13 fewer times than Auburn this season. And the team that has surrendered the third-fewest return yards, Colorado, has allowed almost twice as many yards as Auburn (392). The second-lowest total in the SEC belongs to Ole Miss with 583 yards, and the Rebels kicked off 18 fewer times than Auburn.

Most of the credit goes to senior kicker Matt Clark, who leads the SEC with 49 touchbacks on 62 kickoffs this season (79.0 percent), and has had streaks of 16 in a row and 13 in a row this year. Clark, who also successfully converted an onside kick in the third quarter at South Carolina, was named SEC Special teams Player of the Week Sept. 25.

DAVIS DOING DAMAGE

Tristan Davis leads the SEC and ranks 15th in the nation in kickoff returns, averaging 26.4 yards per return while setting a new Auburn record for kickoff return yardage in a single season. Davis, who has had a return of at least 30 yards in nine of his 11 games played,

has accumulated 713 kickoff return yards, and his 26.4-yard average would rank fourth best in school history.

IRONS IN THE FIRE

Kenny Irons, who currently ranks No. 3 in the SEC averaging 82.1 yards rushing per game, has eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark 11 times in his two seasons playing for Auburn. During his past 20 games, Irons has totaled 2,081 yards rushing (104.1 yards per game). Although he is only in his second season at Auburn, Irons already ranks 10th in Auburn history with 2,114 career yards rushing.

LETHAL WEAPONS

True freshman Ben Tate has a pair of 100-yard rushing games (156 vs. Tulane, 114 vs. Buffalo), becoming the latest Tiger to post a big rushing total. In fact, Auburn has six different players on the roster who have rushed for at least 90 yards in a single game, including four that have topped the century mark.

Kenny Irons leads the list with 11 career 100-yard games including a high of 218 last year at LSU. Sophomore Tristan Davis, who is now playing safety, rushed for 162 yards last season at Kentucky, while Tate's 156-yard effort is third best among current Tigers. Senior Tre Smith had a career-best 126-yard effort as a freshman in 2002 at Alabama. Sophomore Brad Lester had a career-high 94-yard performance Oct. 14 vs. Florida, while junior Carl Stewart had 91 yards rushing in 2004 vs. the Citadel.

RUNNING BACK U.

Auburn has more running backs on NFL rosters than any other college, according to data distributed by the NFL. There are six former Tigers currently playing running back in the NFL, including: Ronnie Brown (Dolphins), Stephen Davis (Rams), Heath Evans (Patriots), Rudi Johnson (Bengals), Tony Richardson (Vikings) and Carnell Williams (Buccaneers).

NO SHUTOUTS ALLOWED

Auburn has scored in 49 consecutive games, which is the third-longest streak in school history. The Tigers have not been shut out since a 23-0 loss to USC to open the 2003 season. The second-longest streak without being shutout is 58 games, but it would be quite a while before Auburn could challenge the school record. The Tigers scored in 149 straight games from Oct. 4, 1980 through Nov. 14, 1992.

FRESH MEAT

A number of true and redshirt freshmen have been contributing for Auburn this season. Redshirt freshmen DL Sen'Derrick Marks, S Aairon Savage, LB Tray Blackmon and TEs Tommy Trott and Gabe McKenzie have all started games this season. Savage ranks third

on the team with 48 tackles, Marks has 33 tackles and ranks second on the team with 8.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks, McKenzie is tied for fourth on the team with 12 catches for 125 yards and a touchdown and Trott is fifth with 10 catches for 94 yards including two scores.

In addition, true freshman RB Ben Tate rushed for 156 yards and a touchdown Oct. 21 vs. Tulane and 114 yards and two scores Sept. 23 vs. Buffalo. Redshirt freshman DB Jeraud Powers has 25 tackles, redshirt freshman DE Antonio Coleman has 15 stops and redshirt freshman LB Patrick Trahan has 11 tackles.

OL HAS EXPERIENCE

Although they hadn't started a game as a group prior to the season opener vs. Washington State, Auburn has five offensive linemen who have a wealth of experience, combining for 183 games played and 105 starts. Senior guard Ben Grubbs has played in 49 games, starting the last 37, while his counterpart at guard, senior Tim Duckworth, has played in 31 games on the offensive side, making 21 starts. Senior center Joe Cope has started 19 of his 22 career games played, while senior tackle Jonathan Palmer (45 games, 15 starts) and junior tackle King Dunlap (36 games played, 13 starts) are new to the starting lineup this year but have seen extensive action.

GROVES IN A GROOVE

Junior defensive end Quentin Groves, who ranks second in the SEC with 9.5 sacks this season, has twice earned SEC weekly honors this year. Groves had three sacks in the second half of Auburn's 27-17 victory over Florida Oct. 14, which earned him SEC Defensive Player of the week honors. He had two sacks that both resulted in fumbles recovered by Auburn and eventually to Auburn touchdowns in the Tigers' 22-15 win at Alabama Nov. 18, earning him SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week accolades. Groves is tied for second in Auburn history with 23 career sacks, and shares the school record for sacks in a game, with four in a 2004 game vs. Kentucky.

KEEPING IT UNDER 20

Auburn, which ranks eighth in the NCAA in scoring defense at 13.9 points per game, has allowed 20 or more points in a game just twice this season, and has held its opponents to less than 20 points 28 times in its last 37 games (75.7 percent). Only Georgia (37 points) and Arkansas (27) have reached the 20-point mark against Auburn this season.

The chart below illustrates the number of times Auburn's opponents have scored 20+ points since Tommy Tuberville's arrival in 1999.

MORE THAN ONE IRONS EXCELLING

Senior cornerback David Irons was granted a sixth-year of eligibility prior to this season, and the extra year has paid dividends. Irons is tied for fifth on the team with 39 tackles (22 solo, 17 assists) this season, including a team-high 10 stops during Auburn's 24-17 victory at South Carolina Sept. 28. Irons is tied for fourth in the SEC with 13 passes defended this season (two interceptions, 11 pass break-ups).

SMOOTH TRANSITION

One of the more notable changes to the Auburn defense was the move of Will Herring, a three-year starter at free safety, to linebacker. The results have been good, as Herring leads the team with 65 tackles this season, including 7.5 for losses, and shares the team lead with two interceptions plus two forced fumbles. He also took a direct snap on a fake punt in the season opener against Washington State and rushed 42 yards in the third quarter vs. Washington State.

SENIOR STEPS UP

Karibi Dede, the only returning starting linebacker for Auburn this season, has stepped up during his senior season. Dede ranks second on the team with 56 tackles, including 29 solo stops. He also has recovered two fumbles, giving him seven for his career. Dede has started 30 games for Auburn during his career, although he had a streak of 15 straight starts snapped when he sat out the Buffalo game Sept. 23.

D-LINE IS DELIGHTFUL

Auburn replaced three starters on the defensive line this season, but the results have been favorable. Through the end of the regular season, ends Quentin Groves, Marquies Gunn and Christopher Browder and interior linemen Pat Sims, Sen'Derrick Marks and Josh Thompson have combined for 173 tackles, 40 tackles for loss and 21 sacks. Groves has team highs of 12.0 tackles for loss and 9.5 sacks, while Thompson leads all defensive linemen with 38 tackles.

HEAVENLY BLISS

Senior Kody Bliss is averaging 46.1 yards per kick, which would rank third in the nation if he had enough punts to qualify. Seventeen of Bliss' 41 punts have traveled more than 50 yards, including four over 60, and he has placed 12 punts inside the opponents' 20. Bliss was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week Sept. 18 following Auburn's 7-3 victory over LSU after averaging 48.2 yards on six punts. He had kicks of 62, 61, 51 and 50 yards, as well as punts of 34 and 31 yards that both pinned LSU inside its own 20-yard-line. He had a 69-yard punt at South Carolina Sept. 28 and a career-long 71-yard boot Oct. 21 vs. Tulane.

EXTRA POINTS

John Vaughn has made 105 consecutive PATs dating back to the 2004 season, and is 160-of-161 for his career. Prior to his only miss,

Auburn had made an SEC record 209 consecutive PATs from 1999-2004. Auburn has now made 314 of its last 315 PATs.

WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 62-4 when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 60-3 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 83-11 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 41-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 46 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 22 years, Auburn is 115-2 when scoring 30 points.

IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 21 seniors, 11 have seen time in more than 40 games during their careers, including three who have played in more than 50. Tre Smith and Will Herring, who both have redshirted during seasons in which they saw limited action, have played in 53 and 52 games, respectively, to lead the group. Kody Bliss joins Smith and Herring as players who have played in all 50 games over the past four seasons. Karibi Dede, Courtney Taylor and Ben Grubbs have played in 49 games, followed by John Vaughn (47), Marquies Gunn (46), Jonathan Palmer (45), Tim Duckworth (42) and Kevin Sears (41).

STARTS STREAK

Will Herring set a new school record for consecutive starts at Alabama Nov. 18, marking his 48th consecutive start. He broke the record of 47 set by OL Jeno James (1996-99). Herring's streak is tied for the third-longest active streak in

the nation. Herring passed former QB Stan White (45 games from 1990-93) for the second-longest starting streak in Auburn history Nov. 4 vs. Arkansas State.

Senior offensive guard Ben Grubbs has the second-longest active streak, having started 37 straight games.

JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Now in its 67th year as home to the Auburn football team, Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's ninth-largest on-campus stadium, with a capacity of 87,451 fans. The Tigers are **255-62-7 (.798)** at Jordan-Hare Stadium, including a **41-8 (.837)** mark in the last seven years. AU went 7-0 at home in both 2000 and 2004, and posted a 6-1 mark last season.

Auburn has won 12 of its last 14 games at home and 20 of its last 23 games at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

TIGERS TOUGH ON TOP TEN

Auburn has won eight of its last nine games against teams ranked in the Associated Press top 10, including a 7-3 victory over then-No. 6 LSU on Sept. 16 and a 27-17 win against then-No. 2 Florida Oct. 14. The Tigers have won six straight home games against Top-10 squads.

Last year, Auburn posted victories at No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and against No. 8 Alabama (28-18). In 2004, the Tigers defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13) in the NOKIA Sugar Bowl.

During the Tommy Tuberville era, Auburn is 14-10 in games played against top 10 teams, and has won 14 of its last 19 games dating back to a 23-20 upset of No. 1-ranked Florida Oct. 13, 2001.

Dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn has played 18 games against top 10 teams in its last 56 games (32.1 percent).

TIGER PROS

Auburn has demonstrated a proficiency for placing players in the National Football League. Auburn had 27 players listed on opening day NFL rosters, which was 11th most of any college in the nation. The Washington Redskins have the most former Tigers, with five former Auburn players on the roster.

TUBERVILLE IN EIGHTH SEASON

Tommy Tuberville is in his eighth season at Auburn in 2006 and his 12th as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference. Tuberville has the third-longest tenure in the SEC (second-longest active streak) behind Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee and Steve Spurrier of South Carolina, who are each coaching his 14th season in the league this year.

Tuberville has amassed a record of 70-29 in eight seasons at Auburn and an overall mark of 95-49. He has led the Tigers to seven straight bowl appearances.

Tuberville is fourth all-time at Auburn in wins, and is the fifth-longest tenured coach in school history.

12 AND COUNTING

In his 12th year as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville has five assistant coaches who have been with him all 12 years. The group includes: defensive tackles/ noseguard coach Don Dunn, running backs/special teams coach Eddie Gran, wide receivers coach Greg Knox, offensive line coach Hugh Nall and defensive ends coach Terry Price.

THE TIME HAS COME

Prior to this season, new timing rules were put into effect to reduce the length of college football games. For Auburn, there have indeed been fewer plays this season. In the previous five seasons, Auburn averaged between 66.2 and 68.3 plays per game, but this year is down to 58.4 plays per game. Auburn games averaged between 126.2 and 134.9 total plays per game over the past five seasons, but this year, Tiger games are averaging 117.0 plays per contest.

FATHERS AND SONS

Auburn tight ends coach Steve Ensminger is the father of Auburn freshman quarterback Steven Ensminger, while junior fullback Danny Perry is the son of Director of Football Operations Jimmy Perry. The younger Ensminger is the first Tiger to have his father on the coaching staff since Joe Whitt, Jr., played wide receiver from 1998-99 while Joe Whitt, Sr., who coached at Auburn from 1981-2005, was a linebackers coach.

Previously, Gene Lorendo, an assistant coach from 1951-75, saw his son Mac letter at offensive tackle from 1970-72, earning All-SEC honors as a senior, and Paul Davis, an assistant coach from 1967-80 and 1987-90, watched his son Rhett letter at split end from 1972-73.

LESTER'S TOUCHES TURN TO GOLD

Sophomore RB Brad Lester has a knack for getting into the end zone, as evidenced by his 17 career touchdowns on just 188 career touches. Lester's rate of touches per touchdown thus far during his career is far better than even the best touchdown scorers in Auburn history. The chart below shows touches per touchdown for Lester compared to five of Auburn's top TD scorers in its history.

TIGERS SWITCH TO UNDER ARMOUR

Head coach Tommy Tuberville appeared in a new Under Armour commercial that debuted during Auburn's season-opening game vs. Washington State. The 30-second spot, which promotes Under Armour's new line of football cleats and apparel, will air nationally throughout the college football season.

Kenny Irons rushed for 183 yards and a touchdown and Brad Lester scored twice as fourth-ranked Auburn opened its season with a 40-14 victory over Washington State.

Irons rushed for his ninth career 100-yard game -- and seventh straight in regular season games -- averaging 9.1 yards on 20 carries. He opened up the third quarter with a 58-yard touchdown run that gave Auburn a 26-7 lead a minute in.

Irons also caught three passes for 40 yards, giving him 223 multi-purpose yards, marking his career high.

Lester posted his third career multiple touchdown game, but the first in which he caught a pass and rushed for a score. The sophomore ended Auburn's first-half scoring with a 34-yard pass from Brandon Cox, then rushed for a 12-yard touchdown early in the fourth quarter. He ended the game with 37 yards on six carries.

Cox completed 11-of-18 passes for 191 yards and a touchdown. The junior improved to 9-3 all-time as Auburn's starting quarterback and has now thrown a touchdown in 11 of his 12 career starts.

The Tigers scored their first 12 points on four field goals from senior kicker John Vaughn, who connected on attempts of 31, 44, 52 (career long) and 30 yards, marking his career best. It was also the most by an Auburn kicker since Jaret Holmes posted four field goals against Alabama in 1997.

Washington State held the lead briefly in the first quarter after Jason Hill caught a 2-yard pass from Alex Brink, giving the Cougars a 7-6 advantage. The Tigers, however, scored the next 20 points, capped off by Irons' 58-yard run to open the second half.

Cody Boyd ended Washington State's scoring with a 50-yard pass from Gary Rogers midway through the third quarter, bringing the Cougars to within 12. However, Auburn finished off Washington State with Lester's 12-yard run and a 1-yard touchdown run by Carl Stewart late in the fourth quarter. The final score completed Auburn's 40-point night, which marked the most by Auburn against a Pacific-10 Conference opponent.

Karibi Dede paced the Tigers with eight tackles, followed by Merrill Johnson and Aairon Savage, who both had four. Auburn finished with five sacks, led by Sen'Derrick Marks' 1.5.

Will Herring accounted for the game's lone turnover, picking off Brink at the 8:41 mark of the fourth quarter.

The senior linebacker also accounted for Auburn's second-longest run of the game when he took advantage of the Cougars on a fake punt on 4th-and-14. Midway through the third, he took the snap from deep snapper Pete Compton and ran up the middle for a 42-yard gain.

Nine Tigers played in their first game at Auburn, highlighted by Aairon Savage, who also made his first start. Overall, five Auburn players started their first game in the win.

Brad Lester ran for two touchdowns and Courtney Taylor led all receivers with nine catches for 103 yards as fourth-ranked Auburn defeated Mississippi State, 34-0, at Davis Wade Stadium.

Auburn improved to 17-1 in its last 18 Southeastern Conference games and has won 18 of its last 19 games against conference opponents.

The win marked the sixth straight for the Tigers over the Bulldogs and the second straight by shutout. Over the past two games against Mississippi State, the Tigers have outscored the Bulldogs, 62-0.

The Tigers have also held Mississippi State to 18 or less points in the last eight straight games.

Lester's two touchdowns gave him two multiple-score efforts this year and four in two seasons. The sophomore rushed five times for 40 yards, including the two scores. He rushed for a two-yard touchdown less than four minutes in the second quarter. Lester then started off the third quarter with a 20-yard run to put Auburn up, 24-0.

Taylor, meanwhile, surpassed the 100-yard receiving mark for the second time in his career. The senior has now caught at least one pass in 35 of his 39 career games.

Junior quarterback Brandon Cox was 18-of-27 for 249 yards and two touchdowns -- the 12th time in his career he has thrown at least one TD -- in the win. He connected with Gabe McKenzie for a 6-yard touchdown to end the first half, then found Rodgericus Smith for a 20-yard score with less than two minutes left in the third quarter. The touchdowns for McKenzie and Smith represented the first of their careers.

Ten different Tigers caught at least one pass in the win.

Senior kicker John Vaughn set a career-high for the third time in two games this season when he booted a 55-yard field goal with seven seconds left in the second quarter. The field goal was his second of 50 yards or better this season and tied the fourth-longest distance in Auburn (2-0 overall, 1-0 SEC) history. He finished the game 2-for-2, also making a 22-yarder in the fourth quarter.

Auburn dominated defensively, limiting Mississippi State to 161 yards of total offense. The Bulldogs were able to rush for just 79 yards and pass for 82.

For the second straight game, senior Karibi Dede led the Tigers in tackles, this time coming up with six. True freshman Craig Stevens and sophomore Merrill Johnson tied for second on the team with five, followed by two others with four.

Sophomore Pat Sims paced the Tigers with 1.5 sacks as Auburn finished with four overall. Sims forced a fumble in the fourth quarter that was recovered by freshman

Jermarcus Ricks, who returned it 31 yards to the Mississippi State 4-yard-line.

Senior David Irons, meanwhile, intercepted his first career pass while finishing with two tackles.

Mississippi State (0-2, 0-2) had a chance to get on the board for the first time this season in the fourth quarter on a 37-yard field goal, but Adam Carlson's kick was blocked by senior defensive end Marquies Gunn.

The win improved Auburn to 41-27-5 all-time in SEC openers.

Auburn has held 20 of its last 27 opponents to fewer than 20 points dating back to the 2004 season.

A battle between two top-10 teams proved defensive as a Brandon Cox's 1-yard quarterback sneak in the third quarter proved to be the difference in No. 3 Auburn's 7-3 victory over No. 6 LSU at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Cox rushed through the middle of Auburn's line with 4:53 left in the third quarter for Auburn's only score of the game. It capped off a 12-play, 75-yard drive that effectively gave the Tigers the win in the lowest scoring game at Jordan-Hare Stadium since Auburn's 7-0 win over Houston in 1973.

Auburn, however, needed defensive strength to stop LSU twice late in the game.

LSU got to within striking distance on the last drive of the game. Starting at their own 20, the Bayou Bengals moved all the way to Auburn's 19, highlighted by JaMarcus Russell connecting on a 21-yard pass to Dwayne Bowe. Two plays later, Russell found Craig Davis on the left side, but Auburn's Eric Brock brought him down at the 4-yard-line as the clock expired.

The defensive stop came in similar fashion for the Tigers, who held LSU on its second-to-last possession. The Bayou Bengals started on their own 19 and drove to Auburn's 33. Three straight plays on the ground netted LSU 2 yards before Brock came up big, tipping a Russell pass near the goal line that was intended for Early Doucet.

Auburn limited LSU to 311 yards of total offense, with 155 of those coming in the fourth quarter. The Bayou Bengals managed just 42 yards rushing on 23 attempts as the hard-hitting Auburn defense stood its ground.

LSU's defense, however, proved to be just as stingy, holding the Tigers to 182 yards of offense, including 110 through the air. Cox was 11-of-20 for the day.

Kenny Irons, meanwhile, carried the ball 25 times for 70 yards. Courtney Taylor led all Auburn players with three catches for 22 yards.

LSU opened the game's scoring in the second quarter, coming at the end of the half. Russell rushed for 2 yards after fumbling the snap, setting up a Colt David 42-yard field goal on the last play of the half.

Four minutes prior to the field goal, Auburn had its first chance of the game to score but a John Vaughn 26-yard field goal attempt hit the left upright. Auburn had run 16 plays during the preceeding drive against the physical LSU defense.

The first half saw both offenses struggle, as they did for most of the game. Auburn ran 27 plays and gained just 60 yards, while LSU was a little better, gaining 93 yards on 29 plays.

Will Herring paced all Auburn players with six tackles, including three solo and 1.5 for loss. Karibi Dede had Auburn's only sack of the game, a 1 yarder of Russell on the last drive of the game.

Five Tigers were credited with one pass deflection apiece, while the team was credited with six quarterback hurries, led by Antonio Coleman's two.

The game featured a matchup between LSU offensive coordinator and Auburn defensive coordinator Will Muschamp, who coached together at LSU from 2001-04.

The game pitted the two highest ranked teams at Jordan-Hare Stadium since 1990.

It marked the second consecutive season the game was decided on the final play and the third straight in the closing seconds.

The win gave Auburn four straight victories over LSU at Jordan-Hare Stadium and improved the Tigers' record to 7-1 win over *Associated Press* top 10 teams since 2004.

Brad Lester and Ben Tate rushed for two touchdowns apiece as No. 2 Auburn overcame a sluggish start for a 38-7 victory over Buffalo at Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

All told, the Tigers finished with 261 yards rushing, led by Tate, who entered the game with just four career carries. He finished with a team-leading 114 yards on seven carries against the Bulls.

Lester ran the ball 18 times for 83 yards in his first start of the season.

He rushed for the game's first touchdown from two yards out with 2:46 left in the first quarter but saw the Tigers go into halftime with a 10-0 lead after a John Vaughn field goal at the end of the half.

Lester scored Auburn's second touchdown of the game, a 4-yarder at 12:28 of the third quarter, to put Auburn up 17-0. Buffalo, however, stayed with the Tigers, posting a 5-yard touchdown on an Evan Wallace pass at 5:33 of the third quarter to pull within 10, 17-7.

That turned out to be the Bulls' last gasp as Tate and Tre Smith combined to score the Tigers' last 21 points in the final two quarters to widen the gap for good.

Smith made it 24-7 with a 2-yard TD with 40 seconds left in the third quarter. The score capped off an eight carry, 57-yard day for the senior.

Tate finished Auburn's scoring, rushing for a 42-yard touchdown at 11:17 of the fourth quarter and a 28-yarder with 3:44 to play.

Auburn passed the ball just 14 times, with starter Brandon Cox finishing 6-for-10 for 134 yards and one interception. Blake Field relieved Cox in the fourth quarter and was a perfect 4-for-4 for 19 yards.

Courtney Taylor led all Tigers with three receptions for 48 yards, while Carl Stewart had the game's longest play with a 54-yard pass from Cox at the start of the third quarter.

Defensively, the Tigers shined for the third straight game, limiting Buffalo to 198 yards of total offense, including 111 through the air.

Auburn was credited with 11 tackles for loss and three sacks, with Aairon Savage, Marquies Gunn and Sen'Derrick Marks each claiming one.

Merrill Johnson tied for the team lead with seven total tackles and was credited with three quarterback hurries. Will Herring also finished with seven tackles in the victory.

Kenny Irons rushed for 117 yards and two 1-yard touchdown runs as No. 2 Auburn held off a late South Carolina rally for a 24-17 victory in front of a national ESPN audience on a rare Thursday night appearance.

The Gamecocks, already having scored one fourth-quarter touchdown, threatened late in the game, driving to Auburn's 5 with less than 30 seconds left. A fourth-down pass to Sidney Rice was batted down in the end zone by Auburn's Patrick Lee, preserving the win and sending the Tigers to a 5-0 overall record.

The defense, however, wasn't needed in the third quarter as Auburn's offense ran all 28 plays and held on to the ball for all 15 minutes. Vaughn's field goal at 6:22 ended Auburn's first drive of the quarter, one that lasted for 17 plays and 8:38.

Auburn head coach Tommy Tuberville lived up to his "Riverboat Gambler" moniker after Vaughn's field goal. Matt Clark masked his onside kick perfectly, with the Tigers recovering his 13-yard kick at their own 48. That set up Auburn's 13-play, 52-yard drive that culminated eight seconds into the fourth quarter on Irons' second touchdown of the game.

Irons, who transferred from South Carolina to Auburn prior to the 2004 season, opened the game's scoring with a 1-yard run six minutes in, then scored his second of the game with 14:52 left in the fourth quarter. He topped the 100-yard mark for the second time this season and the 10th time in his career.

Brandon Cox was 13-of-19 passing for 180 yards in the win. He connected on his only touchdown pass of the game in the second quarter, hitting Tommy Trott from 9 yards out with 4:37 left on the clock.

John Vaughn accounted for Auburn's other scoring play, hitting a 24-yard field goal -- his eighth field goal of the season -- with 6:22 to play in the third quarter.

South Carolina got on the scoreboard at 9:09 of the second quarter on a Ryan Succop 49-yard field goal. The Gamecocks then scored late in the first half when Kenny McKinley caught a 13-yard pass from Syvelle Newton to pull South Carolina within four, 14-10.

The Gamecocks scored for the last time in the fourth quarter when Newton completed a 25-yard touchdown pass to Jared Cook with 8:25 left.

The Tiger defense remained stout for much of the game, limiting South Carolina to 109 yards rushing on 34 carries, an average of 3.2 yards per rush.

David Irons led all Auburn players with 10 tackles, including six solo. The Tigers were credited with four sacks, highlighted by Marquies Gunn's two.

The Gamecocks' McKinley led all players with eight catches for 110 yards.

The win gave Auburn 19 victories in their last 20 Southeastern Conference games. The Tigers, overall, have gone 27-3 dating back to the 2004 season.

Auburn also improved to 6-1-1 all-time against South Carolina. The game marked the Tigers' first in Columbia, S.C., since the 1997 season.

Darren McFadden and Felix Jones both topped the 100-yard rushing mark as Arkansas upset No. 2 Auburn, 27-10, at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The loss snapped Auburn's five-game winning streak to start the season and dropped the Tigers to 3-1 in Southeastern Conference play. The Razorbacks, meanwhile, improved to 4-1 overall and 3-0 in the SEC.

McFadden led all rushers with 145 yards on 28 carries and a 63-yard touchdown in the second quarter. Jones was not far behind with 13 carries and 104 yards, scoring on a 1-yard scamper in the third quarter.

Quarterback Mitch Mustain and Arkansas attempted just 10 passes in the win, compared to 45 rushes. In the second half alone, the Razorbacks ran the ball 30 times and passed it just twice.

Arkansas opened the game's scoring eight minutes in with a 34-yard field goal by Jeremy Davis. A little more than four minutes later, the Razorbacks upped the score to 10-0 when Mustain tossed a 50-yard touchdown to Marcus Monk.

Auburn pulled to within three with Rodgericus Smith's 24-yard touchdown reception to open the second quarter, but the Razorbacks stretched their lead to 10 again midway through the second quarter.

McFadden found a seam and broke away for a 63-yard touchdown run with five minutes remaining in the quarter. It was the first rushing touchdown allowed by the Tigers this season.

John Vaughn connected on his ninth field goal in 11 tries this season at 1:50 of the second quarter, nailing a 36-yarder that made it 17-10. Brad Lester helped set up the field goal with a 68-yard kickoff return that put Auburn on Arkansas' 32-yard-line to start the drive.

The field goal, however, turned out to be Auburn's last points of the game.

Jones scored on a 1-yard rush with 4:54 left in the third quarter, putting the game further out of reach. Davis iced it with 3:53 in the fourth with his second field goal of the game, a 22-yarder.

The Auburn offense could not get on track, managing just 60 yards rushing and 153 passing. Kenny Irons led the team with 75 yards rushing on 15 carries, but the Arkansas defense managed 11 tackles for loss for a total of 60 yards.

Brandon Cox sprayed the ball around to seven different receivers, finishing the game 17-of-29 passing. However, a 24-yard touchdown strike to Rodgericus Smith with 14:53 left in the second quarter was the only time Auburn managed to find the end zone.

Courtney Taylor led all receivers with five receptions and was second on the Tigers with 33 yards. Smith caught a career-high four passes for 64 yards while three others -- Irons, Gabe McKenzie and Tommy Trott -- had two receptions apiece.

Eric Brock and Aairon Savage tied for the Auburn team lead with 11 tackles in the loss, marking a personal-best for both. The Tigers did not manage a sack and were credited with two tackles for loss, one each by Karibi Dede and Marquies Gunn.

The loss snapped Auburn's three-game winning streak over the Razorbacks dating back to the 2003 season.

Tre Smith returned a third quarter blocked punt for a touchdown and Auburn's defense forced three turnovers and did not allow a point in the second half as the 11th-ranked Tigers scored the game's last 19 points to upset No. 2 Florida, 27-17, at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On Florida's first drive of the second half with the Gators ahead, 17-11, Auburn's special teams unit came up big. The Gators' Eric Wilbur could not handle the snap on 4th-and-18 and had his punt blocked by Jerraud Powers at Florida's 15-yard-line. Smith recovered the block and returned it 15 yards for the touchdown to give Auburn the lead for good.

The Auburn defense picked up where the team's special teams left off. The Tigers did not allow a point in the second half after giving up 17 points through two quarters on just 18 plays. Florida managed just 85 offensive yards in the second half, including 31 on the ground.

Quentin Groves paced Auburn's stout defense, finishing with three sacks, all in the second half. He also forced a fumble on Auburn's 6-yard-line in the fourth quarter, enabling Tray Blackmon to recover it and return it to the Tigers' 38.

Groves was also instrumental with less than three minutes in the game, pressuring Florida quarterback Chris Leak. Eric Brock stepped in front of Leak's pass for his first interception of the season which effectively killed the Gators' attempt to overcome the 18-17 deficit.

The Tigers began the game's scoring on a 22-yard field goal with nine minutes remaining in the first quarter. Florida, however, matched that five minutes later when Chris Hetland connected from 22 yards out.

Dallas Baker made it 10-3 in favor of Florida a minute into the second quarter, catching a 15-yard touchdown pass from Leak.

With Florida pinned inside its five four minutes later, the Tiger defense used a little luck to make it 10-5. The Gators were guilty of a holding penalty in end zone, giving Auburn a team safety.

True freshman Ben Tate rushed for 156 yards and a touchdown and Brandon Cox threw for three scores as No. 8 Auburn defeated Tulane, 38-13, on the Tigers' 80th Homecoming game.

Tate carried the ball 26 times and scored on a 1-yard run at the 9:52 mark of the fourth quarter. The 156-yard game, 144 of those coming in the second half, was his second above the century mark this season after rushing for 114 yards against Buffalo. It also marked the seventh-best rushing performance in Auburn history.

Cox, meanwhile, completed 16-of-19 passes attempted and found three different receivers for touchdowns. Cox threw a 27-yard strike to Tommy Trott less than 10 seconds into the second half, then less than three minutes later, found Tre Smith on a 6-yard score. Cox ended his day with a 23-yard touchdown pass to Courtney Taylor with 2:20 to play in the third quarter.

The strike marked the first this season for Taylor, who led all Auburn players with five receptions for 63 yards against the Green Wave.

Auburn jumped out to a 24-10 lead at halftime, highlighted by Cox's two touchdown passes. After Tulane scored on a 21-yard field goal with 16 seconds left in the second quarter to get within 11, the Tigers received the ball at the 50 on a Green Wave squib kick. Two plays later, John Vaughn extended Auburn's lead to 14 points with a 45-yard field goal.

It took the Tigers nearly 13 minutes to score in the second half, with Cox finding Taylor down the middle. Taylor broke a couple tackles before finding the end zone, which gave the Tigers a 31-10 lead.

Ross Thevenot hit his second field goal of the game, a 31-yarder with 12 seconds left to play in the third, which turned out to be Tulane's last score of the game. Tate then iced Auburn's offensive effort with his 1-yard run in the fourth.

Quarterback Brandon Cox completed 21-of-34 passes for a season-high 253 yards and a touchdown as No. 7 Auburn won its seventh-straight game in Oxford, 23-17, over Ole Miss.

Cox found Rodgeriquis Smith on a 13-yard touchdown in the first quarter and completed eight passes to Courtney Taylor, who finished with a season-high 108 yards. Taylor was just three yards off tying his career high of 111 set in the 2004 SEC Championship Game against Tennessee.

John Vaughn connected on three field goals, including a 20-yarder with 7:35 to play in the game, which broke a 17-17 deadlock and proved to be the game winner. Tristan Davis has returned an Ole Miss kickoff 45 yards to the Tigers' 45 to help set up Vaughn's field goal.

The field goal also marked the 46th of Vaughn's career, which set a new Auburn career record. The Brentwood, Tenn., native iced the game with 35 seconds to play, connecting on a 29-yard field goal, giving Auburn its final 23-17 lead.

The Auburn defense shut down the Ole Miss offense in the second half, allowing the Rebels just 117 total yards on their last seven possessions of the game after giving up 158 yards in the first three possessions. Kenny Irons rushed for his third 100-yard game this season, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. He finished with 65 yards in the second half, where Auburn outscored Ole Miss, 16-10, after the teams went into halftime tied at 7.

Ole Miss opened the game's scoring less than three minutes in when Mico McSwain ran for a 27-yard touchdown. Cox and Smith, however, evened it up less than eight minutes later, capping a 15-play drive that lasted 7:46 and accumulated 69 yards. Ole Miss briefly took the lead again on a Joshua Shene 29-yard field goal the 10:26 mark of the third quarter. That was the last time Auburn trailed, with Lester punching one into the end zone on a 6-yard run at the 5:50 mark, giving the Tigers a 14-10 lead.

Vaughn extended that lead with less than a minute left in the third quarter, splitting the uprights for a 31-yard field goal, his first of the game.

Josh Thompson and Savage both had six tackles to pace the Tiger defense, which limited the Rebels to just 86 yards rushing and 170 yards passing. Quentin Groves posted 1.5 sacks in the win, while Sen'Derrick Marks was credited with 1.5 tackles for loss.

Auburn extended its lead in the all-time series against Ole Miss to 23-8, and is 8-1 in games played in Oxford. Overall, the Tigers have won six of their last seven meetings against the Rebels.

The Auburn defense limited Arkansas State to just 177 yards of total offense as the Tigers defeated the Indians, 27-0, in their final regular season non-conference game of the season.

The shutout marked the second of the season for Auburn after defeating Mississippi State 34-0 in the second game of the season. It was the first time since 2000 the Tigers posted two shutouts in the same season.

The Tiger defense limited Arkansas State to 89 yards passing and 88 rushing. The 177 yards allowed by the Tigers was the second-least this season, trailing only the 161 accumulated by Mississippi State on Sept. 9.

Courtney Taylor set a career-high with 116 yards receiving and Carl Stewart scored through the air and the ground to pace the Auburn offense, which finished with 399 yards overall.

Taylor caught four passes -- all coming in the first half -- and surpassed his previous career-high in receiving by five yards. His 116 yards marked his second straight 100-yard effort, third of the season and fourth of his career. He is the first Auburn player to post back-to-back 100 yard receiving games since 1999.

Taylor also set a career-high with a 57-yard reception from Brandon Cox in the second quarter that placed Auburn on the Arkansas State 15 and eventually led to a John Vaughn field goal.

Arkansas State managed to complete just two passes in the first half for no yards. The Indians were able to get into Auburn's territory just once, and it came in Arkansas State's 10th series of the game. The Indians were close to scoring on the drive, but a fumbled snap on a 19-yard attempted field goal kept them off the scoreboard.

Auburn finished with six tackles for loss, including sacks by Merrill Johnson and Aairon Savage. Patrick Lee intercepted his first career pass in the fourth quarter, returning it 18 yards.

Taylor began the game's scoring in the first quarter, catching a 13-yard touchdown pass from Cox. It was the first of two touchdown passes for Cox, who completed 12-of-21 passes for 251. He connected with Carl Stewart at the 4:01 mark of the third quarter for the team's final touchdown of the game.

Stewart, who finished the game with 41 yards receiving on three receptions, also scored on a 1-yard run at the 9:31 mark of the third quarter. The score was his second on the ground this season and put Auburn up, 20-0.

The Tigers saw themselves up 10-0 after the first quarter when Vaughn connected on a 21-yard field goal at the 1:15 mark of the first quarter. He made it 13-0 with a little more than four minutes to play in the second quarter, when, buoyed by Taylor's 57-yard reception, Vaughn connected on a 22-yard field goal.

Vaughn finished the game with nine points to give him 304 for his career. He is just the 15th player in SEC history to surpass 300 points (is now ranked 12th).

Taylor's 116 yards gave him 2,018 for his career, making him the sixth Tiger to surpass 2,000.

The win marked the 31st for Auburn over the past three seasons, setting a new program record for most victories over a three-year span. Additionally, dating back to the 2003 season, the Tigers have won 39 games, which ties the program record for most over a four-year span.

Georgia scored the game's first 24 points and freshman quarterback Matthew Stafford passes for 219 yards and rushed for 83 more as the Bulldogs defeated No. 5 Auburn, 37-15.

The Tigers entered the locker room at halftime with a 30-7 deficit after Brad Lester scored on a 21-yard run at the 4-minute mark of the second quarter. Auburn was able to get within 15, 30-15, late in the third quarter after Rodgeriqu Smith scored on a 34-yard catch. But a Stafford 9-yard run early in the fourth quarter pulled Georgia away from good.

Kregg Lumpkin ran for a score and 105 yards on 21 carries in the win.

The Georgia defense, meanwhile, limited Auburn to 171 yards of total offense, including 35 through the air. Brandon Cox was able to complete just four passes in 12 attempts, and was picked off four times, including three times by Georgia's Tra Battle.

Georgia controlled the clock, putting its possession time to 38:12 while Auburn's was 21:48. That led to a clear advantage in the number of plays, 66 to 37, which helped lead to 446 yards of total offense for the Bulldogs.

Lumpkin opened the game's scoring on Georgia's first drive. He rushed for an 8-yard touchdown at the 9:18 mark of the first quarter.

Gordon Ely-Kelso made it 10-0 three minutes into the second quarter with a 34-yard field goal that capped off a six play drive.

Brennan Southerland continued Georgia's scoring streak with a 1-yard run at the 5:42 mark of the second quarter that made it 17-0. And less than a minute later, Tra Battle intercepted his second pass of the game and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown, giving the Bulldogs a 24-point advantage.

Auburn battled back with a two-play drive. Starting off at the Georgia 41 after Tristan Davis returned the ensuing kickoff 40 yards, the Tigers handed the ball to Courtney Taylor for a 20-yard rush. Lester then took the handoff from Cox for the 21-yard rushing touchdown.

Georgia, however, pushed the lead to 23 points with Lumpkin's 14-yard touchdown pass from Stafford with 29 seconds to play. The ensuing extra point was blocked, giving the Bulldogs the 30-7 lead at halftime.

Smith's 34-yard touchdown reception from Cox came at the 4:27 mark of the third quarter, pulling the Tigers to within 15 after Lee Guess caught a two-point conversion. Auburn ended the third quarter having gained 95 total yards in the frame, but was not able to make a bigger dent in the score after Georgia gained 121 of its own.

Stafford ended the game's scoring with a 9-yard rush at the 12:28 mark of the fourth quarter.

Will Herring, who played in his 51st career game and tied the Auburn career record with his 47th straight start, finished with a team-leading nine tackles. Aairon Savage added eight tackles and forced a fumble in the first quarter that was recovered by Tray Blackmon.

The Tigers were able to recover three Georgia fumbles, including one apiece by Sen'Derrick Marks and Jerraud Powers.

The Bulldogs' win marked the seventh time in the last 10 games in the Auburn-Georgia series that the road team has won.

Quentin Groves forced two second-quarter fumbles that led to touchdown runs by Brad Lester and Kenny Irons as Auburn won its fifth straight game over Alabama, 22-15, at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

The Tiger defense held off a late Crimson Tide rally in the fourth quarter, stopping Alabama deep in Auburn territory. The Tigers stopped four consecutive Crimson Tide plays on their second-to-last drive of the game, with each play from within the Auburn 20. A 5-yard tackle for loss by Will Herring began the four-play set, then two straight incomplete passes led to a 4th-and-15 from the AU 18 where a John Parker Wilson pass to Nikita Stover fell to the ground.

Auburn went into halftime with a 14-9 lead, courtesy of a 12-yard rushing touchdown by Lester and an 8-yarder by Irons. Groves set up both touchdown drives by forcing fumbles by Wilson -- first on a 7-yard sack to begin the second quarter, then on a 5-yard sack on the next drive.

Groves finished the game with seven tackles, including six solo, to finish third on the team, behind both Herring and Karibi Dede, who had eight tackles apiece. Herring finished with eight solo and forced a fumble in the fourth quarter that was recovered by Sen'Derrick Marks.

The Tigers fell behind early in the third quarter, 15-14, after Travis McCall caught a 13-yard pass from Wilson. The Crimson Tide, however, failed on the ensuing two-point conversion on an incomplete pass.

Auburn answered back seven minutes later when Prechae Rodriguez stretched over an Alabama defender for a 22-yard touchdown reception from Brandon Cox. Lee Guess then caught a two-point conversion pass from Carl Stewart, giving Auburn its final 22-15 lead.

Alabama opened the game with a 24-yard field goal by Jamie Christensen in the first quarter, then saw the Tigers jump to a 14-3 lead after the touchdowns by Lester and Irons.

The Crimson Tide, however, scored the next 12 points. Stover caught a 52-yard touchdown pass from Wilson at the 1:23 mark of the second quarter. The ensuing two-point conversion, however, was intercepted by the Tigers, giving Auburn a 14-9 lead at the half.

McCall scored Alabama's last points of the game at the 8:56 mark of the third quarter on the 13-yard pass from Wilson.

Irons led all players with 19 rushes for 85 yards and was followed by Lester, who gained 54 yards on 15 carries.

Cox finished the game 6-of-14 passing for 137 yards, completing three passes to Rodgeriqu Smith for 55 yards. Stewart totaled two receptions for 60 yards.

The win marked the fifth in a row for Auburn over Alabama, the Tigers' longest streak in the series since 1954-58. Auburn head coach Tommy Tuberville also became the first coach ever to win four straight games against the Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa.

With the win, Auburn improved to 6-0 all-time in games played in Tuscaloosa.

The win gave Auburn its 10th of the season, marking the 11th time in school history the Tigers reached double-digit victories.

Auburn won for the seventh time in its last eight games against teams ranked in the Associated Press top 10 dating back to the 2004 season ... Auburn held its second straight SEC team without a touchdown for the first time since 1989 ... Auburn trailed 3-0 at the half. It marked the first time this season that Auburn trailed at the half ... Auburn had a 16-play drive in the second quarter that lasted 8:31, which was the longest drive of the year for the Tigers in terms of time of possession and plays. The 61-yard drive ended with a missed 26-yard field goal by John Vaughn ... The 10 total points made this game the 12th-lowest combined scoring game in stadium history. It was also the lowest scoring home game since Auburn defeated Houston, 7-0, in 1973 ... Kody Bliss had a season-long 61-yard punt in the first quarter, then topped that with a 62-yard punt in the second quarter ... Tristan Davis' 58-yard kickoff return in the second quarter was the longest return of his career ... Quentin Groves had three sacks in the third quarter, pushing his career total to 19.5, moving him into fourth place in Auburn history in career sacks ... Tre Smith's 15-yard return of a blocked punt for a touchdown was the first blocked punt returned for a touchdown by Auburn since Justin Fetsko scored in 2003 vs. Louisiana-Monroe ... Brad Lester rushed for a career-high 94 yards (on 17 carries).

Tulane

Auburn improved its all-time record in homecoming games to 67-8-5 ... Auburn clinched its seventh straight winning season with its seventh victory of the season ... John Vaughn became Auburn's all-time leading scorer when he kicked an extra point after Auburn's first touchdown. Vaughn entered the game tied with Carnell Williams with 276 career points... Ben Tate finished with a career-high 156 yards on 26 carries and a one-yard touchdown plunge. His 156 yards rushing are the seventh-most ever by an Auburn freshman in school history ... Brandon Cox tied a career high by throwing three touchdown passes. He threw for three scores last season at Arkansas ... Courtney Taylor finished with five catches for 63 yards and a touchdown for his third straight game with at least five catches ... Kody Bliss booted a 71-yard punt late in the first quarter. It was tied for the third-longest punt in school history and the longest since 2000 ... Zach Gilbert's 57-yard interception return was the first of his career and a season long for Auburn.

Ole Miss

Auburn won for the seventh consecutive time in Oxford ... Auburn committed two turnovers in the first half (one interception, one fumble). It marked just the second game this season that Auburn has committed more than one turnover ... The game was the first of the season in which Auburn was tied at the half (10-10) ... Brandon Cox threw for a season-high 253 yards. His previous season high was 249 yards at Mississippi State ... Courtney Taylor finished with eight catches for a season-high 108 yards. The 108 yards just missed his career-high of 111 yards receiving vs. Tennessee in the 2004 SEC Championship game ... It marked the third time in Taylor's career that he had at least 100 yards receiving and was second time this season ... Kenny Irons rushed for 106 yards, posting the 11th 100-yard rushing game of his career, including the third this season ... Brandon Cox threw just his third interception of the season in the second quarter. He had thrown 112 consecutive passes without an interception dating back to the first quarter of Auburn's game against Buffalo Sept. 23 ... Aairon Savage had his first career interception late in the third quarter ... John Vaughn had three field goals giving him 47 for his career, passing Damon Duval (1999-2002) and Win Lyle (1987-89) for the Auburn record for most field goals in a career.

Arkansas State

Auburn posted its second shutout of the season. It marked the first season that Auburn has had two shutouts since 2000, when the Tigers blanked Vanderbilt (33-0) and Alabama (9-0) ... Auburn finished the season 4-0 against non-conference opponents, and is now 22-2 in non-conference home games under Tommy Tuberville ... Auburn improved to 12-0 all-time in games against current members of the Sun Belt Conference ... Auburn set a new school record for victories in a three-year span with its 31st victory since 2004 ... Courtney Taylor finished with a career-high 116 receiving yards, marking his fourth career 100-yard receiving game and second in a row ... Taylor became the first Auburn player to have back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Ronny Daniels in 1999, who had 143 vs. Central Florida and 249 vs. Georgia ... John Vaughn's first extra point of the day was his 100th-consecutive made extra point ... Brandon Cox had his third-straight 200-yard passing game, and his fourth of the season, throwing for 251 yards.

Georgia

Auburn's eagle Tiger made his final pregame flight as War Eagle VI before retiring after 20 years of service ... The game marked just the second all season that Auburn trailed after three quarters ... Kenny Irons finished with 49 yards rushing, becoming the 12th player in Auburn history to surpass 2,000 career yards rushing. Irons pushed his career total to 2,029 ... Tristan Davis had a 40-yard kickoff return in the second quarter, marking his fourth straight game with at least one kickoff return of 40 or more yards ... John Vaughn's tied his own school single-season scoring record for points by a kicker (87), originally set in 2004 ... Rodgeriquis Smith's 34-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter was his fourth touchdown reception of the season, and his third of at least 20 yards ... Brandon Cox's two-point conversion pass to Lee Guess was the first two-point conversion by Auburn since Jason Campbell completed a pass to Ben Obomanu vs. Arkansas in 2004.

Alabama

Auburn won for the fifth time in a row against Alabama for the first time since 1954-58. It matched the longest winning streak for Auburn against Alabama in series history ... The Tigers are now 6-0 all-time in games played in Tuscaloosa ... With 10 victories this season, Auburn reached double digits in wins for the 11th time in school history ... Auburn's senior class recorded its 40th win over the past four years, setting a new Auburn record for victories over a four-year period ... Will Herring broke an Auburn record by making his 48th consecutive start. Herring broke the school record held by OL Jeno James (1996-99) ... Tristan Davis had 87 kickoff return yards, setting a new Auburn single-season record with 713 kickoff return yards, breaking the old record of 654 set by James Brooks (1977) ... Kenny Irons finished with 85 rushing yards, and moved up to 10th in Auburn history with 2,114 rushing career rushing yards ... Quentin Groves' two sacks gave him 23 for his career, moving him into sole possession of second on Auburn's career sacks list. ... Brandon Cox's 22-yard touchdown pass to Prechae Rodriguez in the third quarter was the 32nd of his career, moving him into sole possession of fifth place on Auburn's career touchdown passes list ... Rodriguez's touchdown catch was his first of the season and the second of his career. It was his longest reception of the season, surpassing a 19-yard catch against Tulane ... Carl Stewart's two-point conversion pass to Lee Guess marked the second straight game that Guess has caught a two-point conversion pass ... David Irons made his second interception of the season and his career to end Alabama's final possession of the game.
