### 2007 AUBURN HEADLINES

- ▶ Auburn posted its eighth consecutive winning season with a mark of 9-4, and its fourth straight season with at least nine wins, tying a school record (1986-89).
- ▶ Auburn made its eighth straight trip to a bowl game, which is the second-longest streak in school history.
- ▶ With a 23-20 overtime victory over Clemson in the Chick-fil-A Bowl, Tommy Tuberville moved into a tie for second in school history with five bowl wins. Tuberville is tied with Shug Jordan and one behind Pat Dye.
- ▶ Auburn's senior class set a new school record with 42 victories over the past four seasons
- ▶ Auburn's fifth-year seniors set a new school record for most wins in a five-year period, amassing a record of 50-14 over the past five seasons.
- ▶ With a 5-3 mark in the SEC, Auburn finished with a winning conference record for the eighth year in a row, which is the longest streak in school history.
- ▶ Auburn's record during the past four seasons of 42-9 (.824) ranks the Tigers fifth out of all Football Bowl Subdivision teams during that span.
- ▶ Auburn defeated Alabama in the Iron Bowl for the sixth straight season, breaking the school record of five straight wins over the Crimson Tide set from 1954-58.
- ▶ Auburn led the SEC in scoring defense (16.9, sixth nationally) and ranked second in total defense (297.9, also sixth nationally).
- ▶ Auburn finished the season ranked sixth nationally in pass defense (173.2) and seventh in pass efficiency defense (104.30).
- ▶ During the last two seasons, Auburn has held 21 of its 26 opponents to 20 points or less.
- ▶ Of Auburn's 315 points scored in 2007, 225 (71.4 percent) were scored by underclassmen.
- ▶ Auburn had 29 freshmen see action, including 15 true freshmen. Four true freshmen started games on the offensive side of the ball this year.
- ▶ Auburn had more members of the SEC's All-Freshman Team (six) than any other conference school.
- ▶ Brandon Cox finished his career ranked in the top four in Auburn history in passing attempts (second, 927), passing yards (third, 6,959), passing yards per game (third, 158.2), completions (third, 550), touchdown (third, 42), and completion percentage (fourth, .593).
- ▶ Cox finished his career ranked third on the victories list by a starting quarterback with 26.
- ▶ Wes Byrum scored 86 points kicking and booted 17 field goals, which both tie for the third-best single-season marks in school history.
- ▶ Rodgeriquis Smith finished the season with 52 receptions, which tied for seventh most in a single season in Auburn history.
- ▶ Antonio Coleman tied for 16th nationally with 18.5 tackles for loss, which is the most by an Auburn player since 1995, and also led the team with 8.5 quarterback sacks.
- ▶ Josh Thompson led the team with 67 tackles, becoming the first defensive tackle to lead the team in tackles since Tracy Rocker in 1985.
- ▶ Patrick Lee and Jerraud Powers both had four interceptions this season, which is the most in a season by a Tiger since Junior Rosegreen had six in 2004.
- ▶ Quentin Groves finished his career with 26 sacks, tying the Auburn record set by Gerald Robinson (1982-85).
- ▶ Tommy Tuberville recorded his 100th career coaching victory with a 35-7 win over Vanderbilt Oct. 6.
- ▶ Auburn had a turnover ratio of +9 in its nine victories and -9 in its four losses.
- ▶ Auburn scored on its opening drive in seven of its last nine games, averaging 11.3 plays and 69 yards on those seven scoring drives.
- ▶ Auburn led at the half in 11 of its 13 games, and after three quarters in 11 of the 13 contests.
- ▶ Auburn held an advantage in time of possession eight times in its last nine games, and finished the season ranked second in the SEC in time of possession (31:23).
- ▶ Auburn defeated then-No. 4 Florida, 20-17, on Sept. 29, marking the seventh season in a row that the Tigers have beaten at least one top-10 team, which is the longest streak in school history.
- ▶ Eight of Auburn's 13 games this season were decided in the final two minutes.

### THE WRAPUP

Auburn finished the 2007 season with a 9-4 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the Southeastern Conference. The Tigers earned a trip to their eighth straight bowl game, defeating Clemson in overtime, 23-20, at the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

### ANOTHER WINNING SEASON

With nine victories, Auburn finished with its eighth consecutive winning season, and the 77th in school history. Auburn, which has had just three losing seasons in the last 26 years, has now won at least nine games in four straight seasons, which ties the longest streak in school history (1986-89).

### ANOTHER TOP 15 FINAL RANKING

Auburn finished the season ranked tied for 14th in the USA Today Coaches poll, and 15th in the Associated Press poll. It marked the fourth straight season that the Tigers ended the season ranked in the top 15, matching the longest streak in school history (1986-89). Auburn was second following the 2004 season, 14th after the 2005 season and eighth following the 2006 season.

### FINAL GAME FOR TIGER SENIORS

Auburn's senior class finished as the winningest senior class in school history. The Tigers' group of 17 seniors posted a 42-9 record over the past four seasons, topping last year's senior class by one victory for the most wins in a four-year period in Auburn history. The fifth-year seniors saw a school-best 50 wins during their five seasons on The Plains. The group has also been part of the the 2004 SEC Championship and the 2005 SEC Western Division Co-Championship.

### FOUR-YEAR DOMINATION

Auburn's senior class has had almost as much success as any in the country. Since the start of the 2004 season, Auburn has the fifth-best record in the NCAA with a mark of 42-9 (.824) over the last four seasons. The top teams since the 2004 season are as follows:

### SIX IN A ROW

Auburn capped its regular season with a 17-10 victory over Alabama in Jordan-Hare Stadium, marking the sixth consecutive season that the Tigers have beaten Alabama. The six straight wins in the series is a school record for Auburn, surpassing the previous best of five victories in a row from 1954-58.

### CARDIAC KIDS

Auburn games were not lacking for excitement, as eight games were decided in the final two minutes. Wes Byrum's field goal on the game's final play gave Auburn a 20-17 win at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29, and his 20-yarder with 21 seconds left lifted Auburn to a 9-7 win at Arkansas Oct. 13. In Auburn's victory over Kansas State, the Tigers were clinging to a three-point lead before a fumble return for a touchdown with just 1:11 left sealed the victory.

Auburn won the Chick-fil-A Bowl against Clemson in overtime, as Kodi Burns scored on a 7-yard run after the Clemson offense had settled for a field goal on its opening possession. And against Alabama, the Tigers converted on a fourth down play with 1:06 left that allowed them to run out the clock.

Three of Auburn's four losses were close calls. Auburn lost to LSU 30-24 when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left. Against Mississippi State Sept. 15, Auburn had a potential game-winning drive stall at the Bulldog 9-yard line with just 48 seconds left. The Tigers' other loss against South Florida ended in overtime.

### DEFENSE EXCELS DESPITE INJURIES

The Auburn defense excelled this season, ranking first in the SEC and sixth in the nation in scoring defense (16.9) and second in the SEC and sixth nationally in total defense (297.9). Auburn held 10 opponents to 20 points or less, including four in single digits. In the last two seasons, during which Auburn has allowed just 15.4 points per game, the Tigers have allowed more than 20 points just five times in 26 games, and are 20-1 when holding their opponents to 20 points or less.

### NO PASSING ZONE

Despite playing non-conference games against New Mexico State (No. 5 in the NCAA in pass offense, 331.9 yards per game) and Kansas State (No. 21 in NCAA in pass offense, threw 58 passes vs. AU) in addition to the tough SEC schedule, Auburn finished the season ranked sixth nationally in pass defense, allowing just 173.2 yards per game, and ranked No. 7 in pass efficiency defense (104.30). The Tigers, whose defense ranked sixth nationally in yards per completion (10.10), held both Mississippi State (41 yards) and Vanderbilt (88 yards) to less than 100 yards passing this season.

# 2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

## COLEMAN DOMINANT DEFENSIVELY

Antonio Coleman took over a starting spot at defensive end after senior Quentin Groves was injured in the fifth game Sept. 29 at Florida, but the sophomore played like a starter all season long. Coleman led the team and tied for 16th nationally in tackles for loss with 18.5, and also led the Tigers in sacks (8.5), which ranked tied for fifth in the SEC. His 18.5 tackles for loss are the most by an Auburn player since 1995 and third most by a Tiger since tackles for loss began being charted in 1981. (Note: Prior to 2000, sacks and tackles for loss were kept as separate statistics. For purposes of this list, the two stats were combined as they have been since 2000):

## THOMPSON TOPS TEAM IN TACKLES

Senior defensive tackle Josh Thompson led Auburn in tackles this season with 67, including 20 over his final two contests. Thompson had a career-best 12 tackles Nov. 24 vs. Alabama, and also had a double-digit performance (10) Oct. 20 at LSU. Thompson became the first Auburn player to lead the Tigers in tackles for a season since Tracy Rocker accomplished the feat in 1985.

## SIGN OF THINGS TO COME?

In Auburn's first game under new offensive coordinator Tony Franklin in the Chick-fil-A Bowl vs. Clemson, Auburn managed season highs in total yards (423) and first downs (24). In addition, Auburn ran a season-high 90 plays, which was 14 more than the previous season high of 76 plays at Arkansas, and 22.6 more plays than Auburn's season average entering the game of 67.4 plays per game.

## WORKING OVERTIME

Auburn played a pair of overtime contests in 2007, falling at home on Sept. 8 to South Florida, 26-23, before beating Clemson in the Chick-fil-A Bowl, 23-20. It marked the first time Auburn has played multiple overtime games in a season since 2002, when Auburn lost at Florida, 30-23, and beat Syracuse, 37-34. Auburn is now 4-5 all-time in overtime games, and snapped a three-game losing streak in overtimes with the win over Clemson.

## TUBERVILLE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Tommy Tuberville recorded his 100th career victory as a head coach during Auburn's 35-7 win over Vanderbilt on Oct. 6. Tuberville currently owns a career record of 105-53 in 13 seasons as a head coach. He became the fifth active SEC coach to have 100 career victories, joining Steve Spurrier, Phillip Fulmer, Rich

Brooks and Houston Nutt, and just the third to earn 100 victories while coaching at an SEC school (Spurrier and Fulmer).

## YOUNG BLOOD

Auburn had a lot of young talent on its squad, as illustrated by the number of points scored by underclassmen. Of Auburn's 315 points scored, 225 (71.4 percent) were scored by freshmen and sophomores, including all 23 points in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. True freshman Wes Byrum led the team with 86 points, while sophomore Ben Tate was second with 48 points and redshirt freshman Mario Fannin third with 42 points. True freshman Kodi Burns had three scores while sophomore Gabe McKenzie had two touchdowns. Sophomores Montez Billings, Antonio Coleman and Walter McFadden reached the end zone once each, and sophomore Zack Kutch had an extra point.

## FRESH MEAT

Auburn had 29 freshmen (15 true, 14 redshirt) play in 2007. The starting lineup included four true freshmen on offense, including right tackle Lee Ziemba, right guard Chaz Ramsey, left tackle Ryan Pugh and quarterback Kodi Burns. Redshirt freshmen Craig Stevens and Zac Etheridge were regulars in the defensive starting lineup, while redshirt freshman Mike Berry started the first three games at right guard. The kicking game featured true freshman placekicker Wes Byrum as well as a redshirt freshman (Ryan Shoemaker) and a true freshman (Patrick Tatum) sharing punting duties.

On Sept. 22 vs. New Mexico State, Burns became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for the Tigers since Gabe Gross in 1998. In his 13 years as a head coach, Tommy Tuberville had never before started a true freshman at quarterback.

In addition, redshirt freshman running back Mario Fannin was third on the team in rushing, while true freshman safety Mike McNeil totaled 35 tackles.

## FRESHMEN HONORED

Several Auburn freshmen were honored at the conclusion of the regular season, as the Tigers had more members of the SEC All-Freshman team (six) than any other school. Offensive linemen Ryan Pugh, Chaz Ramsey and Lee Ziemba were named to the squad, as were defensive end Antoine Carter, safety Zac Etheridge and punter Ryan Shoemaker.

Ziemba was named a First Team Freshman All-American by multiple sources, while Shoemaker earned first-team Freshman All-American honors from Rivals.com. Etheridge, Pugh and kicker Wes Byrum were all listed on Freshman All-America second teams, while Ramsey and linebacker Craig Stevens earned Honorable Mention Freshman All-American recognition.

## SEC SUCCESS

Auburn has won 26 of its last 32 Southeastern Conference games and 27 of its last 33 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 SEC Championship game victory over Tennessee. Auburn's success against conference schools dates back to more than just the past four seasons, as since the start of the 2000 season, the Tigers are have the second-best record among the 12 league schools in regular season conference games. The following are the combined conference records of the 12 SEC schools from 2000-07.

## TURNOVERS PROVE CRUCIAL

Turnovers played a big role in determining Auburn's success. The Tigers committed 14 turnovers in their four losses, including five turnovers each against South Florida and Mississippi State and four at Georgia, and had a -9 turnover margin in their losses. In its nine victories, Auburn committed just 10 total turnovers while forcing 19 (+9 margin). Against New Mexico State on Sept. 22, Auburn forced six turnovers, which was the most by the Tigers since forcing six against Tennessee in 2004.

## FEELING FINE IN FIRST HALF

Auburn had the lead at the half in 11 of its 13 games this season. The Tigers were the only team in the nation to lead at the half in each of their first 10 games. In addition, Auburn allowed just 44 total points in the first half of the last nine games (4.9 ppg), outscoring Florida, Vanderbilt, Arkansas, LSU, Ole Miss, Tennessee Tech, Georgia, Alabama and Clemson by a combined score of 113-44.

## SECOND QUARTER SUPERB

The second quarter was Auburn's best quarter this season, as the Tigers outscored their opponents 86-40 during the period. Auburn scored during the second quarter in nine of 13 games, while shutting out its opponents during the quarter seven times.

## HOT ROD

Junior wide receiver Rodgeriqu Smith led Auburn with 52 catches for 705 yards and five touchdowns, which tied for the seventh-most catches in a single season in Auburn history. His numbers easily surpassed what he accumulated during his first two seasons combined. Smith had his second 100-yard receiving game Oct. 27 against Ole Miss, catching eight balls for 111 yards and a score. He had a career-high nine catches for 102 yards Sept. 29 at Florida, and now ranks 14th in Auburn history with 1,266 career receiving yards.

Smith's 58-yard touchdown catch from Kodi Burns against New Mexico State was the longest pass play of the season for Auburn, and he had a 55-yarder against Kansas State, which is tied for second-longest on the team this year.

## TOP BILLINGS

Sophomore Montez Billings emerged as a steady complimentary receiver to Rod Smith. Billings had just one catch in the first four games, but had 27 in the last nine, including 11 catches combined at Arkansas and LSU Oct. 13 and 20, respectively, which was two more than he had in his career prior to that point. Billings set career highs in catches (six) and receiving yards (78) and scored his first career touchdown on a 17-yard grab from Brandon Cox at LSU.

## DYNAMIC DUO

Smith and Billings took charge in the Auburn passing game over the past eight games, getting the bulk of the catches. In the first five games, Smith had 11 catches for 253 yards and two scores, while Billings had just one catch for five yards. In the last eight games, Smith had 41 catches for 452 yards and three touchdowns, while Billings had 27 catches for 316 yards and a score.

Conversely, the other receivers and tight ends saw a drop in their production. They combined for 33 catches for 303 yards in the first four games, but combined to total only 33 more catches for 382 yards over the last nine games

## BACK FOR 2008

Auburn will lose 17 seniors in 2008, plus defensive tackle Pat Sims who declared for the NFL draft, but will still return plenty of weapons. The Tigers will return nine starters on offense, and seven on defense, plus all of its kickers and top return specialists. Of Auburn's 38 touchdowns scored in 2007, players who scored 33 of those touchdowns will return. Defensively, of the 19 players who recorded at least 15 tackles in 2007, 13 will be back in 2008.

## AWARD FINALIST

Wes Byrum's game-winning field goal at Florida was one of four finalists for the Pontiac Game Changing Performance Award. In 2006, Auburn won the \$100,000 general scholarship grand prize for Tre Smith's blocked punt return for a touchdown in a victory over the Gators. In 2007, fans voted Byrum's kick as the weekly award winner following the victory over Florida, and voted the play into the final four through three rounds of voting. Trinity's multiple lateral play for a touchdown on the game's final play won the grand prize.

## INTERCEPTION BINGES

Two Auburn players went through interception binges this season. In his first 41 career games, senior Patrick Lee had just one interception, grabbing a pick last season against Arkansas State. But Lee picked off four passes in a five-game span beginning Sept. 29 at Florida. He also had interceptions against Vanderbilt, LSU and Ole Miss.

Jerraud Powers, whose first career interception came Oct. 13 at Arkansas, picked off a pass in each of the final three regular season games, tying him with Lee for the team lead. He is the first Auburn player to collect an interception in three straight games since Karlos Dansby in the 2001-02 seasons.

The four interceptions by Lee and Powers are the most in a season by a Tiger since Junior Rosegreen had six in 2004.

# 2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

## STELLAR SECONDARY

Auburn picked off at least one pass in each of its last nine regular season games, grabbing 12 interceptions during that span. Patrick Lee and Jerraud Powers had four picks each, while Johnathan Wilhite had two. Walter McFadden's 93-yard interception return for a score against Tennessee Tech Nov. 3 was the third-longest interception return in school history.

## COX CAREER NOTES

Brandon Cox finished his career among the all-time leaders at Auburn in several passing categories. Cox ranks second all-time in passing attempts (927), third in passing yards (6959), passing yards per game (158.2), completions (550) and touchdowns (42), fourth in completion percentage (.593) and total offense (6543), sixth in lowers interception percentage (.0345) and seventh in passing efficiency (130.44). His career yardage total ranked 18th among all active NCAA quarterbacks.

## COX FINISHES THIRD IN WINS

Brandon Cox earned his 27th career victory as a starting quarterback during Auburn's 23-20 overtime victory over Clemson in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. Cox, who finished his career 27-9 as a starter, passed Pat Sullivan (1969-71) for third for the most victories by an Auburn starting quarterback with his 27th win. Jason Campbell (2001-04) won 31 games and Stan White (1990-93) won 29. The 17-10 victory over Alabama in the Iron Bowl also allowed Cox to join Campbell as the only Auburn starting quarterbacks to beat Alabama three times.

## CAPTAIN COMEBACK

Brandon Cox led Auburn on scoring drives that gave Auburn the lead with less than four minutes left in the game five times this season.

In the season opener against Kansas State, Cox capped a six-play, 57-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown pass to Gabe McKenzie with just 2:01 left to give Auburn a 16-13 lead, before a defensive score made the final 23-13. The next Saturday against South Florida, a nine-play, 51-yard drive set up a 46-yard field goal with just 2:54 left that gave the Tigers a 20-17 lead, but the Bulls rallied to win in overtime.

Cox took Auburn 35 yards in 10 plays to set up the winning 43-yard field goal on the game's final play during a 20-17 victory at Florida Sept. 29. At Arkansas Oct. 13, he drove Auburn 50 yards on eight plays to set up the winning 20-yard field goal with 21 seconds left in a 9-7 victory.

On Oct. 20 at LSU, Cox drove Auburn 83 yards on nine plays and found Rodgeriquus Smith for a 3-yard touchdown pass that put Auburn ahead 24-23, although LSU would score with one second left for a 30-24 victory.

## COX TURNS THE CORNER

After a rough start to the season, senior QB Brandon Cox excelled during a seven-game stretch from Sept. 22-Nov. 3. After three games, Cox had completed 37-of-75 (.493) passes for 436 yards, two touchdowns and six interceptions for a quarterback rating of 90.97. In the next seven weeks, Cox completed 100-of-150 (.667) passes for 1,183 yards, six scores and just one interception, for a quarterback rating of 144.78.

## RUSHING GAME IMPROVES

The return of junior running back Brad Lester from academic suspension after the fifth game benefitted an already improving running game for Auburn. The Tigers averaged just 93.5 yards rushing in their first two games, but averaged 168.5 in their last 11, with 22 touchdowns and four games over 200 yards rushing. Four different players (Ben Tate, Mario Fannin, Brad Lester, Kodi Burns) rushed for at least 87 yards in a game during the last 11 games.

## GROVES EQUALS SACKS RECORD

Quentin Groves tied the Auburn record for career sacks with a second-quarter sack Oct. 20 at LSU. Groves finished his career with 26 career sacks, tying the record set by Gerald Robinson (1982-85). He had two sacks in the opener vs. Kansas State, and the second came with just over a minute left and Auburn clinging to a 16-13 lead, resulting in a fumble that was returned 34 yards for a touchdown by Antonio Coleman, to seal the victory.

## FRESHMAN KICKERS SHINE

Auburn was forced to replace perhaps the nation's top kicking trio after all three kickers from the 2006 season graduated. The Tigers lost Lou Groza finalist John Vaughn, the team's all-time leading scorer with 312 career points; Kody Bliss, who ranked third in the nation in punting with a 45.7-yard average; and Matt Clark, who led the nation with 51 touchbacks on 66 kickoffs (77 percent). But the newcomers excelled.

True freshman Wes Byrum made 17 field goals in 23 attempts, including game winners from 43 yards on the final play at No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 and 20 yards with 21 seconds at Arkansas Oct. 13. He had a season-long 49-yard field goal against South Florida and his 17 field goals and 86 points kicking are both tied for third best in a single season in Auburn history.

Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker ranked second in the SEC and 26th nationally in punting, averaging 42.5 yards per punt, while true freshman Patrick Tatum averaged 43.4 yards per punt with nine of his 16 punts downed inside the 20-yard line. Tatum was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week against New Mexico State Sept. 22 after placing all four of his punts inside the 20-yard line and running for a first down on a fake punt.

### NATION'S NUMBER 10 NET

Auburn ranked 10th in the nation in net punting, averaging 38.5 net yards per punt. Much of the success can be attributed to a pair of first-year punters. Redshirt freshman Ryan Shoemaker ranked second in the SEC averaging 42.5 yards per punt and has had just three touchbacks with 16 punts inside the 20-yard line. True freshman Patrick Tatum punted 16 times this season, averaging 43.7 yards per punt with nine of his 16 punts landing inside the 20-yard line.

### STARTING STRONG

Auburn started seven of its last nine games with a lengthy scoring drive (five touchdowns, two field goals), with only a pair of turnovers keeping Auburn from scoring on its first possession. Auburn's seven opening-possession scoring drives averaged 11.3 plays and 69 yards while taking 5:09 off the clock. Here are the results of Auburn's last nine opening drives:

### SUSTAINED DRIVES

Over its last nine games, Auburn did an excellent job of controlling the ball, winning the time of possession battle eight times, including each of the last seven games. In the first four games, Auburn had just one scoring drive of at least 10 plays, but in the last nine games, the Tigers had 17, plus nine more scoring drives that lasted at least eight plays.

Auburn ranked third in the SEC for the season with an average time of possession of 31:23.

### RUSHING QB

True freshman quarterback Kodi Burns led Auburn in rushing at the Chick-fil-A Bowl, totaling 69 yards on the ground including the game-winning touchdown from seven yards out in overtime. Burns became the first quarterback to lead Auburn in rushing for a game since Dameyune Craig led Auburn in rushing against Mississippi State on Nov. 1, 1997, despite rushing for just 12 yards. The last time a quarterback led the team with as many yards rushing as Burns' 69 was when Craig totaled 75 yards against Army in the 1996 Independence Bowl.

### TIGERS TOUGH ON TOP TEN

Auburn has won nine of its last 12 games against teams ranked in the *Associated Press* top 10, including a 20-17 win Sept. 29 against No. 4 Florida, and wins last season against then-No. 2 Florida and then-No. 6 LSU. The Tigers have won five of their last seven against top-ten teams and six straight at home. Two of the three losses against top-10 teams since the 2004 season have come in close calls at LSU, in overtime in 2005 by a 20-17 score and this season by a 30-24 score when LSU scored on a 22-yard pass play with just one second left.

Also in 2005, Auburn posted victories at No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and against No. 8 Alabama (28-18). In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13) in the NOKIA Sugar Bowl.

During the Tommy Tuberville era, Auburn is 15-12 in games played against top 10 teams, and has won 15 of its last 22 games dating back to a 23-20 upset of No. 1-ranked Florida Oct. 13, 2001.

Dating back to the 2002 season, Auburn has played 21 games against top 10 teams.

# 2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

## TOPPLING THE TOP TEN

Auburn's 20-17 victory at then-No. 4 Florida Sept. 29 allowed the Tigers to keep an impressive streak alive, as the Tigers have beaten at least one *Associated Press* Top 10 team every year for the last seven years, which is the longest streak in school history. The Tigers have 15 victories over Top 10 foes in those seven seasons.

The streak started in 2001 with a 23-20 victory over No. 1 Florida. In 2002, Auburn beat No. 10 LSU (31-7) and won at No. 9 Alabama (17-7). In 2003, the Tigers beat No. 7 Tennessee (28-21), then beat the new No. 7 team, Arkansas, the following week (10-3).

In 2004, Auburn defeated No. 5 LSU (10-9), No. 10 Tennessee (34-10), No. 8 Georgia (24-6) and No. 9 Virginia Tech (16-13). The 2005 season included wins against No. 9 Georgia (31-30) and No. 8 Alabama (28-18), and in 2006 Auburn beat No. 6 LSU (7-3) and No. 2 Florida (27-17).

## WINNING IN WHITE

Auburn has won 15 of its last 16 games when wearing all white, including three victories in four tries this season. Auburn had not lost when wearing white jerseys since the final road game of the 2003 season at Georgia, until the Bulldogs broke the streak in Athens Nov. 10.

## FOUR OF FIVE IN SINGLE DIGITS

Auburn held four of five opponents to single digits in games played from Oct. 6-Nov. 3, as Vanderbilt (seven points), Arkansas (seven), Ole Miss (three) and Tennessee Tech (three) each posted just one score against the Tigers. It marked the first time that Auburn held four of five opponents to single digits since 1988, when the Tigers kept five straight opponents in single figures, falling at LSU (7-6) before beating Akron (42-0), Mississippi State (33-0), Florida (16-0) and Southern Miss (38-8).

## TUBERVILLE'S NINTH SEASON

Tommy Tuberville completed his ninth season at Auburn in 2007 and his 13th as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference. Tuberville has the third-longest tenure in the SEC (second-longest active streak) behind Phillip Fulmer of Tennessee and Steve Spurrier of South Carolina, who both coached in their 15th seasons in the league this year.

Tuberville has amassed a record of 80-33 during his tenure at Auburn and has led the Tigers to eight straight bowl appearances.

Tuberville is fourth all-time at Auburn in wins, and is the fifth-longest tenured coach in school history.

## TUBERVILLE ELECTED TO HALL OF FAME

In October, Tommy Tuberville was elected into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame, and will be inducted on Feb. 28 as part of the Class of 2008. A native of Camden, Ark., Tuberville graduated from Southern Arkansas University in 1976. He started his coaching career at Hermitage High School in Arkansas, serving as an assistant coach (1976-77) and head coach (1978-79), before starting his collegiate coaching career at Arkansas State, where he was an assistant coach from 1980-84.

## IMPRESSIVE PERFORMANCES

Auburn defense was impressive in its first two road games, holding two of the SEC's top offenses far below their season averages. Sept. 29 in Gainesville, Auburn held Florida to 17 points, 312 yards of offense and 14 first downs, which was more than 32 points below its scoring average of 49.2 points per game, more than 200 yards below its average of 517.8, and 11 first downs below its average of 25 per game. Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback Tim Tebow, who averaged 325.4 yards of total offense and 4.4 passing/rushing touchdowns this season against all other opponents, was held to 276 yards of total offense and two scores by the Tigers.

At Arkansas on Oct. 13, Auburn held the Razorbacks to just seven points, 193 yards including 67 rushing, and 11 first downs, which was over 35 points below their scoring average of 42.6 points per game, 314 yards below their average of 507.6 (271 yards below their rushing average of 338.4) and 12 first downs below their average of 23.4. Auburn held the nation's top rushing duo of Darren McFadden and Felix Jones to a combined 85 yards, which was 197 yards below their combined averages.

In addition, Auburn held Florida scoreless in the first half, becoming the first team to shut out the Gators in the first half since South Carolina led 3-0 at the break on Nov. 14, 1992 in Gainesville.

## IN A RUSH

Auburn accomplished some rare feats in a victory over New Mexico State Sept. 22 that echoed a 2005 victory over Kentucky. Both Ben Tate (111 yards) and Mario Fannin (103 yards) went over the century mark, marking the first time since that game at Kentucky that Auburn had two 100-yard rushers in the same game. In the game at Lexington, Tristan Davis rushed for 162 yards and Kenny Irons had 103.

In addition, Fannin rushed for three touchdowns, becoming the first Auburn back since Irons in that same game at Kentucky to rush for three scores in one game. Fannin had a 67-yard touchdown run late in the game, which was the longest play from scrimmage for Auburn since Davis raced 75 yards for a score in that same game at Kentucky.

## SENIOR SIGNAL CALLER = SUCCESS

Senior Brandon Cox, in his third season as Auburn's starting quarterback, helped Auburn keep a string of successful seasons with returning senior starting quarterbacks alive. Including this season, the last 11 seasons that Auburn had a senior returning as the starter at quarterback, the Tigers have won at least eight games every year, averaging 9.6 wins per season during those campaigns. Auburn's combined record during those 11 seasons is 106-26-2, and the Tigers won SEC Championships in 1983, 1987, 1989 and 2004 and SEC Western Division Championships in 1997 and 2000.

Incidentally, Auburn went 10-1 against Georgia during those 11 seasons, and 9-2 against Alabama with eight straight wins.

## FILLING IN ADMIRABLY

Junior linebacker Chris Evans, who finished third on the team with 64 tackles, earned his first career start against South Florida Sept. 8. The result was the highest tackles total by an Auburn player in almost five years. Evans tallied 14 tackles (five solo, nine assists), which was the most by an Auburn player since Karlos Dansby had 14 tackles at Florida on Oct. 19, 2002. He posted a team-high eight tackles in the following game against Mississippi State, becoming the first Auburn player since Dansby in 2002 to have at least 22 tackles in two games.

## 50-YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Auburn honored its 1957 national championship team during an Oct. 6 game against Vanderbilt. The team wore their white road uniforms and helmets with no AU logos and gray facemasks, similar to those worn during the 1957 championship season.

The 2007 season marks the 50-year anniversary of Auburn's 1957 National Championship team. The '57 Tigers finished with a perfect 10-0 record, including a 7-0 mark in the SEC, and was selected as the national champion following the season by the *Associated Press*. Auburn outscored its opponents that season by a combined score of 207-28, posting six shutouts and ending the season with a 40-0 whitewashing of Alabama.

# 2007 Auburn Football Game Notes

## JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Now in its 68th year as home to the Auburn football team, Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's ninth-largest on-campus stadium, with a capacity of 87,451 fans. The Tigers are **261-64-7 (.797)** at Jordan-Hare Stadium, including a **47-10 (.825)** mark over the past eight years. AU went 7-0 at home in both 2000 and 2004, and posted a 6-1 mark in 2005.

## UNDER THE LIGHTS AT JORDAN-HARE

Auburn has been tough to beat in night games at Jordan-Hare Stadium, accumulating a record of 14-2 since the 2000 season in home games starting at 6 p.m. or later. That stretch includes a 4-0 record against ranked opponents, with wins over No. 1 Florida in 2001, No. 2 Florida in 2006, No. 7 Tennessee in 2003 and No. 14 Georgia in 2000. The Tigers had a four-game winning streak in home night games prior to an overtime loss to South Florida Sept. 15.

## IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 17 seniors, 10 saw time in at least 40 games during their careers, including three with at least 50 games played. Cole Bennett and Eric Brock led the group with 52 career games played, followed by Quentin Groves (51), while Josh Thompson and Patrick Lee saw action in 49 games. King Dunlap and Zach Gilbert were next with 48 games played, followed by Carl Stewart (47), Brandon Cox (44) and Leon Hart (40).

## STARTS STREAK

Brandon Cox had a streak of 24 consecutive starts at quarterback snapped Sept. 22 against New Mexico State. He had started every game since a 2005 contest against Western Kentucky.

The longest active starting streaks now for Auburn belong to three players who started all 13 games both last season and this season. Senior Josh Thompson ended his career with 26 straight starts, while junior Rodgeriqus Smith and sophomore Sen'Derrick Marks will take 26-game starting streaks into next season.

## NO SHUTOUTS ALLOWED

Auburn has scored in 63 consecutive games, which is the second-longest streak in school history. The Tigers have not been shut out since a 23-0 loss to USC to open the 2003 season. It will be a while before Auburn could challenge the school record. The Tigers scored in 149 straight games from Oct. 4, 1980 through Nov. 14, 1992.

## WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

Auburn has had a knack for winning close ball games since Tommy Tuberville arrived as the Tigers' head coach. In his nine seasons at the helm, Auburn is 28-13 in games decided by seven points or less and has won 16 of its last 21.

## TIGER GRADS

Auburn began the season with 10 graduates on the roster, which was the third most of any Football Bowl Subdivision team. Three more graduated following the 2007 Fall semester, giving Auburn 13 graduates on the Chick-fil-A Bowl roster.

The Tiger graduates include: TE Cole Bennett (business administration), C Jason Bosley (finance), SS Eric Brock (public administration), QB Brandon Cox (business administration), DT Tez Doolittle (criminology), OT King Dunlap (adult education), DB Zach Gilbert (public administration), DE Quentin Groves (criminology), CB Patrick Lee (criminology), H Matthew Motley (exercise science), RB Danny Perry (exercise science), RB Carl Stewart (political science) and NG Josh Thompson (physical education).

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 66-7 when scoring 20 or more points in a game, including a 63-6 mark in the regular season. Dating back to 1995, Auburn is 87-14 when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

## 30+ POINTS EQUALS VICTORY

Under Tommy Tuberville, Auburn is 42-0 when scoring 30 or more points in a game. Auburn has won 47 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points.

The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996.

In the last 22 years, Auburn is 116-2 when scoring 30 points.
