Background

The European Cluster Collaboration Platform (ECCP), on behalf of the European Commission, in collaboration with Brainport Development, AgriFood Capital, and the Province of Noord-Brabant, is proud to organise the Clusters Meet Regions event in Eindhoven, Netherlands, on 26 & 27 March 2025.

This is the 19th edition of the Clusters Meet Regions event series, an initiative launched in 2022 to bring together clusters and policymakers at the EU, national, regional, and local levels. These events serve as a dynamic platform for exchanging best practices, strengthening industrial ecosystems, and addressing regional economic development challenges.

The conference in Eindhoven will foster dialogue and generate insights to shape regional cluster policies and future EU strategies. It will highlight the pivotal role of clusters in driving innovation, advancing sustainability, and enhancing economic resilience at both the regional and European levels.

With Brabant's leadership in **Robotics & Artificial Intelligence (AI), Circular Semiconductors, Plant-Based Agri- & Foodtech, and Safety & Security**, the event will provide participants with first-hand experience in a thriving regional innovation ecosystem.

Here are some facts and figures:

After Gelderland, Brabant is the largest province in the Netherlands in terms of area. We have many neighbors: Zuid-Holland and Gelderland to the north, Zeeland to the west, Limburg to the east, and Belgium to the south. Germany is also just around the corner. Eindhoven and Tilburg, with over 225,000 inhabitants each, are the largest neighboring cities. They are followed by Breda (over 180,000) and 's-Hertogenbosch (over 150,000), the capital of Brabant. This city, colloquially known as Den Bosch, is the birthplace of the world-famous painter Hieronymus Bosch. And who doesn't know the St. John's Cathedral and the 'Bossche Bol', an oversized chocolate cream puff?
