1 General

This instruction manual is aimed at electrically skilled people according to DIN VDE 0105 or authorised technical staff and explains the safe and professional handling of the power supply system. The general safety regulations and the local accident prevention regulations which are valid for the area of use as well as safety instructions have to be observed. The instruction manual, especially the chapter safety, has to be read completely prior to any works on the system.

1.1 Further applicable documents

Components from other manufacturers are mounted in the systems. The manufacturers of these components carried out a hazard assessment and declared their compliance with existing European and national regulations.

1.2 Liability and warranty

This instruction manual was created considering existing standards. It has to be kept near the system and easily accessible for all staff working on and with the system.

Additionally, all laws, standards and regulations of the country, in which the system is mounted and operated, have to be observed.

The manufacturer does not assume liability or warranty for damages or consequential damages occurring through:

- non-intended use
- · non-authorised or non-professional changes of the connections, settings or programming of the system
- non-observance of rules and regulations for safe operation
- Operation of unauthorised or unsuitable devices on the Low Power System

1.3 Copyright protection

All content, drawings, images, and other illustrations are copyrighted.

1.4 Spare parts

Only original spare parts of the manufacturer must be used. Wrong or defective spare parts can lead to damages, malfunctions or total failure of the system. Furthermore, the use of unauthorised spare parts voids all guarantee, warranty, service, compensation, and liability claims.

1.5 Disposal

Packaging materials are no waste but reusable materials which have to be recycled.

2 Safety

The power supply system is safe to operate and complies with valid and recognised rules of engineering at the time of its development and production. There is, however, the risk of danger when the system is used by non-professional staff or when it is used in a non-professional or non-intended way.

The system and the connected parts must only be operated in perfect condition. The following have to be observed:

- safety instructions and hazard notes in the instruction manual
- specified work and safety instructions of the operator

Errors which influence the function or safety of the system have to be reported to the responsible person and cleared immediately.

2.1 Content of the instruction manual

Each person working on or with the system has to read and understand the instruction manual completely prior to any work on the system or battery, even when this person has already worked with this system or a similar one or has been trained by the manufacturer.

2.2 Changes and modifications of the system

Any changes or extensions to the system, which are not authorised by the manufacturer, are prohibited in order to avoid hazards and to guarantee an optimal performance of the system. Extensions, modifications or maintainance works, which are not described in the instruction manual, have to be carried out by trained service personnel only!

2.3 Responsibility of the operator

As described in point 1.2, this instruction manual has to be kept near the system and easily accessible for all staff working on and with the system.

The system must only be operated in technically perfect and operationally reliable condition. Additionally, prior to its commissioning, the system has to be checked for intactness.

2.4 Staff requirements

Only skilled technicians or authorised qualified personnel are permitted to work on or with the system after being briefed about possible hazards.

Staff are considered qualified if they are able to judge the work to be done and recognise possible hazards based on their training, expertise and experiences as well as their knowledge of the respective regulations.

If the staff lacks the necessary knowledge, they need to get a professional instruction. You also have to make sure that the tasks are clearly defined and understood and the works are carried out under supervision of skilled technicians.

3 Preface

Thank you very much for buying a power supply system of type miniControl XL *plus*! This system complies with the national and international standards DIN EN 50171, DIN V VDE V 0108-100, DIN VDE 0100-560, DIN VDE 0100-718 as well as ÖVE/ÖNORM E 8002, and ÖVE/ÖNORM EN2 (versions relevant on delivery) and guarantees the correct functioning of your emergency lighting system by means of a state-of-the-art micro-processor-controlled function control system. This documentation has been created for you to quickly commission and operate the system in an uncomplicated way.

We recommend the following course of action:

- 1. Observe the relevant danger signs and safety instructions (chapter 2)
- 2. Make yourself familiar with the design of the miniControl XL plus system (chapter 4.1)
- 3. Mount the system and batteries and connect them (chapter 4.2)
- 4. Commission the system (chapter 6)
- 5. Program the system (chapter 7)

Chapters 5.1.1 and 5.3 provide a description of the central control unit and a menu – quick reference guide. Instructions for operation and maintenance of the batteries as well as the technical data of the system you can find in chapters 11 and 12.

Note: The system has to be shut down by a specialist for maintenance works and modifications. The necessary steps are described in chapter 10

Note: Instructions regarding the programming of the system using the WebInterface can be found on the web homepage of the manufacturer.

3.1 Installation location and environmental conditions

The system and the battery system can be operated at an altitude of up to 2000m above standard elevation zero, without any power reduction, and must be placed in an appropriate room satisfying the following environmental condition:

- Air temperature: 10°C to 35 °C
- Humidity: up to 85% max. (non-condensing, refer to DIN EN 50171)

When selecting the operation room, make sure that it has sufficient ventilation. The necessary ventilation cross sections according to EN 50272-2 can be found in chapter 12.1 "Available battery types and mounting conditions". Also, please make sure that the room meets the environmental requirements corresponding to the protection type IP20 of the system.

Note: The power and capacity of the battery system depend on the temperature. The recommended temperature range is 10° C to 30° C, the ideal operating temperature is 20° C \pm 5K. Technical data given is valid for a nominal operating temperature of 20° C.

Note: The system must be located in the building such that the allowed cable lengths allowed for emergency lighting circuits will not be exceeded.

4 Danger and information signs

Included in the delivery of the miniControl XL plus system are:

- 1x miniControl XL plus system in a compact cabinet H = 1472,5mm, W= 570mm, D= 230mm
- 1x battery cabinet including 2 battery shelves
- 18x battery type RPower (according to customer's order), other types are possible (max. 17Ah)
- 1x operating tool angled 2.5mm, partially insulated
- 1x 1/4"- hexagonal bit 3 x 25mm with centre bore hole
- 1x brief instruction (this document)
- 1x connector cable set (2x tier connectors 680mm x 6mm², 15x row connectors 300mm x 6mm², hole diameter of the cable shoes either M5 (standard 17Ah))

Other tools and materials necessary for installation (brought by the installer):

- calibrated measuring device for voltage measurements of up to 500VAC or 300VDC
- hexagon screw driver (for inserting the above-mentioned hexagonal bit)
- torque wrench and screw driver for connecting the power cables
- 8mm jaw or socket wrench (torque wrench), see battery handling instructions




Figure 1: inside view

6.1 Connection of the charger and switch unit

The power supply system is connected via print terminals on the rear main board and the mains connection on X01. These terminals are divided into blocks consisting of several 3-level PCB terminals, which are described in the following chapters.

6.1.1 Ethernet interface

This system has an ethernet interface, by which it can be integrated in a network for remote monitoring. Fig. 2 shows the network interface on the backplane inside the cabinet. For connection please use standard network cable (patch cable RJ45).

Note: When exceeding the maximal length of the network cable (80m) a repeater must be used for signal regeneration. The network cable must comply with the standard EN 50173.




Figure 1: Ethernet interface

6.1.2 Connection of bus-compatible modules

By means of the terminal block "communication", shown in fig. 3, you can connect further external, bus-compatible command, communication and switch modules. Please use a screened 4-wire data cable for connections. The following connections can be realised via these terminals:

- ModBus/building control (COM 1)
- external printer (COM 2)
- voltage outputs (only for service!)
- RS485-1 for SAM08, SAM24,
- RS485-2 MC-LM, MCT15 (S)
- quiescent current loop with integrated CCIF




Figure 2: Communication terminals

6.1.3 Connection of opto-/relay interface modules (IOM)

An opto-/relay interface module (IOM) was integrated as a slot-in card in order to be able to transmit error and status messages of the power supply system to external checking and monitoring devices (as required by national and international standards). It has 7 potential-free relay switch contacts (outputs) and 4 reverse polarity tolerant multi-range voltage inputs as well as another terminal (L) for the power supply (230V/50Hz) of potential-free switch contacts. Fig. 4 shows the respective 3-level PCB terminals.




Figure 3: Inputs and outputs IO-module

6.1.4 Connection of switch inputs (SAM)

A switch query module was integrated in this power supply system for the transmission of external switch commands of the general power supply. As shown in fig. 1, point 1), the switch inputs are also realised as 3-level spring-loaded terminals, which are fixed on the backplane. They are designed for wire cross sections (solid-core) from 0.5mm² bis 2.5mm². Each of these power supply systems provides 8 3-level spring-loaded terminals (50-57) as switch inputs as well as one more terminal (L) for the power supply (220/230V AC, 50/60Hz; 24-250V DC switching voltage) of potential-free switch contacts. For the connection please use mains voltage compatible cables with a cross section from 1.5 to 2.5mm² which comply with DIN 57250-1 VDE 0250-1 as well as MLAR, EltBauVo and DIN VDE 0100.




Figure 4: SAM-inputs

6.1.5 Connection of electric circuits

The electric circuits are connected via 3-level spring-loaded terminals, which are fixed on the back plane (see fig. 1, point 11). They are designed for wire cross sections (solid-core) from 1.5mm² to 2.5mm². Correct polarity is essential. For the connection please use mains voltage compatible cables which comply with DIN 57250-1 VDE 0250-1 as well as MLAR, EltBauVo and DIN VDE 0100 typically with functional integrity in case of fire (E30).

Note: Prior to that the circuits to be connected have to be checked for installation faults (short circuit and earth fault).




Figure 5: Electric circuits 1-16





Figure 6: Electric circuits 17-32

6.1.6 Mains connection PCB (filter)




Figure 8: Mains supply

Fig. 8 shows the terminals which are used to realise the connection from the mains supply on the mounting plate (see next chapter) to the main circuit board of the miniControl XL *plus*. L1 bis L3 are closed.

6.1.7 Mains supply




Figure 9: Connection of a fan

Mains is supplied via the terminals of the fuse switch disconnector shown in fig. 9 (230V/50Hz to N). Correct polarity is essential. The terminals are designed for cable cross sections of up to 6mm^2 (solid-core).

Note: The screw nuts have to be tightened with a torque of 3,5Nm. Checking this torque is part of the regular obligatory system maintennance works.

6.1.8 Connection of a fan




Figure 10: USB Port

Fig. 10 illustrates the connection of an internal or external fan. The following terminals are used: terminal 4 (fan -), terminal 47 N+L (IOM-input 2 for fan monitoring which has to be programmed via LC-display or web afterwards). For detailed information on the terminals see chapters 4.1.2 and 4.1.3.

6.1.9 Fuses for 24V-switching voltage

To protect the 24V switching voltage available on terminals 11/12 and 19/20, fuses F22 and F23 are installed behind the control center on the backplane of the system.

6.1.10 USB Power Supply for WLAN Module

The USB jack at the left-hand side of the backplane acts as a pure power supply to an optional WLAN module.

Note: This jack does not provide any interfacing functionality

Note: The WLAN-NT is not installed as standard.

6.2 Mounting and connection of the battery system

6.2.1 Mounting

Position the system in the designated place. When selecting the battery room pay attention to sufficient ventilation according to DIN VDE 0510; EN 50272-2 and EltBauVO. Make sure that the battery fuses have been removed. Mount the batteries on the respective shelves of the cabinet according to fig. 12 (depending on the used battery type). The temperature difference between the battery blocks must not exceed 3°C. The distance between the battery blocks should be at least 5 mm.




Figure 11: Mounting and connection of the battery blocks of OGiV 12170 L

Note: Prior to commissioning all blocks have to be checked for mechanical damage, correct polarity and tightness of the connector cables.

6.2.2 Connection of battery blocks

Remove the battery fuses F2, F3 and F4. Check the batteries for mechanical damage and connect them in row as illustrated in fig. 12. After that connect the cables coming from the battery terminal (fig. 1, point 8) according to fig. 12 (red = B+/positive pole to the positive pole of block 1, grey = symmetry to the negative pole of block 9 and blue = B-/negative pole to the negative pole of block 18). Depending on the used battery type you must fix the pole covers before connecting.

After connecting the batteries as shown, please measure the battery voltage and check for correct polarity at the following poles (incorrect polarity is indicated by a beep):

- 1. battery pole (B+) on battery block 1 to battery pole (B-) on battery block 18; U about 185VDC 240VDC total voltage
- 2. battery pole (B+) on battery block 1 to battery pole (B-) on battery block 9; U about 92.5VDC 120VDC symmetry voltage

If the measured voltages exceed the tolerances, one or more batteries are defect or there is an error in installation (e.g. symmetry cable on battery 10 -).

The following torques apply to screw joints:

thread diameter	maximum torque
M5	2 - 3Nm
M6	4 - 5,5Nm

Note: The clamp screws for the battery cables connected to the battery fuses (fig. 1, point 8) have to be tightened with a torque of 2,0Nm. Checking this torque is part of the regular obligatory system maintennance works.

7 Operating your system


7.1 Control elements

7.1.1 The central control and monitoring unit

The central control and monitoring unit is the main control element of this emergency lighting system (fig. 14) and realises system tests as well as the monitoring, programming and control of charging and switching processes. The system state is indicated by a back-lit LC-display as well as five multi-coloured LED. The central control and monitoring unit has the following interfaces at the front:

7.1.2 Electric circuit module DCM32 / DCM12E

A DCM can supply up to two circuits simultaneously. They realise the automatic switching of the connected circuits to battery operation in case of a mains failure. Each circuit then works in changeover operation and can be activated separately. The circuits can be programmed either to maintained or nonmaintained operation. A combination of both operation modes in one circuit is also possible. Additionally, each circuit has an integrated earth fault, circuit, single luminaire and overload monitoring unit. These circuits are equipped with 2-pole overcurrent protection devices (system protection fuses), which can also be monitored (fuse type: 6,3x32mm, 5A, ceramic, delayed, 1,500A breaking capacity). The LC-display of the central control and monitoring unit (fig. 14, number 5) shows the state of the two circuits (A/B) after pressing the INFO-pushbutton. Here you can program operation mode, follow-up time, luminaire monitoring and supply time for each circuit by means of the direction, enter and function keys.




Figure 13: DCM circuit module

7.1.3 Charger unit LDM25

The charger module LDM25 used for charging the integrated batteries has an own processor and can, if mains voltage is supplied, work completely self-sufficiently. This module has an output current limited to 2.5A and optimises the charging process according to an IUP(TS)-curve matching the surrounding temperature of the batteries. The batteries are not charged for protection reasons if the surounding temperature exceeds 40°C. A delay fuse (3.15AT, 5x20mm) protects the unit from short circuit in case of a defect and prevents a battery overcurrent. Additionally, a battery voltage symmetry monitor and an integrated, redundant battery voltage monitor (BSW) prevent a battery overload. It is calibrated ex-works and its settings must not be changed!

The LC-display of the central control and monitoring unit shows the state of the charger module after pressing the INFO-pushbutton.

Note: The fuse is a special DC-capable type. Your supplier or the manufacturer can provide you with spare fuses.

Note: The LDM25 can be adjusted to different system designs (output current, battery type) by means of jumpers. In case of replacement please see the provided data sheet.




Figure 14: charger module

LEDs explained (see fig. 16):

LED Meaning Continuous light indicates no failure of the battery voltage monitor and that the battery voltage is less than 260V. When this voltage is exceeded, the LED goes off. If this state lasts longer than 20sec., this failure is indicated by LED 2. This LED indicates a failure. Possible failures are an activation of the battery voltage monitor (see above), a defect charger fuse and over temperature. This LED is on if there is no failure. It shows the state of the charger. LED on = batteries are being charged (charger in operation). LED off = no charging (charger not in operation).

7.2 General operating instructions

Your system can be operated and configured completely via the front control elements (fig. 17). For text input (e.g. circuit denomination) we recommend connecting an external keyboard to the PS2-interface (1).

The LCD-screen (2) displays Menus and Information. In the bottom line you can see – if active – the Softkey-Functions which are reachable via the 3 keys (3) (example see fig. 19). For navigation and data input please use the arrow keys \triangle , ∇ , \triangleleft and \triangleright (4) as well as the enter key \bigcirc (5). The up \triangle and down ∇ keys are mostly used for selecting menus and input fields. A selected menu item is indicated by inverted colouring. The right \triangleleft and left \triangleright keys are used to change values; in some cases you have to confirm your input with the enter key \bigcirc . An arrowhead \triangleright on the right indicates a submenu which can be selected with the right \triangleright or enter \bigcirc key. You can return from there using the softkey back or done.

The following chapters give some basic instructions for configuring your system. The LCD-screen shows the necessary functions which can be navigated to and then selected. The line under the headline of each chapter describes how to get to the required menu item. Example:

State \rightarrow INFO-pushbutton (DCM/ACM) \rightarrow $\triangle \nabla$ (select circuit) \rightarrow Enter \bigcirc

Note: The arrow keys \triangle , ∇ , \triangleleft and \triangleright (4) and the enter key \bigcirc (5) on the control unit correspond to the arrow and enter keys of an external keyboard. The softkeys (3) correspond to the function keys F1, F2 and F3.




Figure 15: Control elements

Password login

A number of settings can only be changed with the necessary authorisation which requires a prior system login with a password. More detailed information you can find in chapter 9.11.7 "Authorisation, login with password, logout" on page 43. For saving the changed settings the system requires a confirmation (Yes/No). If you have not logged in with password yet, you can do this at this point and then continue with the confirmation. In any case the authorisation expires ca. two hours after the last setting and the system returns to the default user status "Guest".

Service address

The contact address of the service technician who is responsible for your system is entered during the installation process. To reach this information follow the instructions in chapter 9.12 "Show service address" on page 47.

8 Commissioning of the power supply system

After you have mounted the system considering chapters 4.1 and 4.2, connected the batteries and the de-energised mains cables and removed the fuses of the circuit modules, follow these instructions:

Caution! The internal circuit terminals are energised. That is why all fuses of the direct circuit modules (fig. 1, point 7) have to be removed before switching the system on.

- 1. Operation mode switch to charging mode. Turn the operation mode switch (fig. 14, point 7) to charging mode (position "0").
- 2. Insert battery fuses F2 / F4 . Insert the battery fuses again.
- **3. Supply mains power.** Supply mains power and check the power terminals for correct configuration by conducting the below-listed measurements. In case of a misconfiguration (connection error) abort commissioning:

```
voltage between L1 (F1) and N
voltage between L3 (F1) and N
voltage between L3 (F1) and PE
voltage between L2 (F1) and PE
voltage between L2 (F1) and PE
voltage between L3 (F1) and PE
```

voltage between PE and N

This voltage should be zero. If it is not, this indicates a connection error.

4. Close mains fuse F1. Close the mains fuse F1.

The system is now activated.

5. Wait for the boot process. After switching on the system you can hear an acoustic signal and the system starts booting. This process can take several minutes. Caution: Wait for the boot process to end and never switch the system off during this time! During the boot process or after, the LC-display (see fig. 14, point 5) should look like this:



Figure 16: Boot process (left, middle) and status message (right).

- 6. Check battery voltage as well as circuit and charger modules. Check the battery voltage by means of the LC-display. It should be between 192V and 250V (fig. 18, right image, arrow). Also check the LEDs of the DCM- and LDM-modules. Steady or flashing green light indicates a correct functioning.
- 7. Operation mode switch to "ready to operate". Turn the operation mode switch (fig. 14, point 7) to "ready to operate" (position "1"). This activates the electric circuits.



Caution: Make sure that nobody works on the electric circuits before switching the system on as circuits in maintained lighting mode get energised when activated. If there are still circuits that are worked on, remove the respective fuses before switching on the system. Insert them only after having checked the circuits for short-circuits and insulation faults.

8. Check voltage at circuit outputs. The internal outputs of the circuits which are programmed for maintained mode are energised with an AC mains voltage. For this reason, all circuit module fuses should be removed prior to switching on the system. Be sure to insert the fuses only after checking each circuit for short-circuits and proper isolation. Check the voltage on each circuit terminal (fig. 1, point 11 (see also fig. 6 and fig. 7)). The measured voltage of each circuit should correspond with the AC mains voltage.

Now the installation process is completed and the system is ready to operate.

9 Checking the system state and basic settings

9.1 System state

After commissioning the LC-display shows the state of the system (19) i.e. time (1) and date (2), current battery voltage (3) and battery charging current (in battery operation – discharging current) (4), system state (5, 6). Via the softkeys (8) you can select the help-function, conduct a test or reach the menu.

Note: The system returns from each display to the status after ca. two minutes if no input is made.






Figure 17: System state

9.2 Selecting circuits and checking their status Status → INFO-pushbutton DCM/ACM → △∇(select circuit)

The electric circuits are numbered beginning with 1; each DCM-module has two circuits named A and B, whereas an ACM-module has only one circuit named A. The circuits are numbered according to their slot position from left to right, so that the A-circuits have an uneven and the B-circuits an even number (see fig. 20). If a slot is not used, the respective circuit numbers do not exist either. This means you can add circuits to the system without changing the numbers of existing circuits.

After pressing the INFO-pushbutton on the DCM- or ACM-module (fig. 20), the display shows the status of the respective circuits. Now the display shows the following information for circuits A and B (fig. 21):

- 1 circuit number
- 2 current output (in brackets: reference value for the circuit monitoring)
- 3 status of the circuit

The number of the selected circuit is marked by inverted colouring (see fig. 21 for circuit A with number $\$ 1). With the up $\$ and down $\$ keys you can change between circuits A and B. Repeated pressing of these keys takes you to the circuit status display of the other modules. Pressing $\$ or Enter $\$ takes you to the setup of the selected circuit (see next paragraph). For each circuit the following status messages can be displayed in line 3 (fig. 21, point 3):




Figure 18: Numbering of the circuits




Figure 19: Circuit status

9.3 Viewing and changing of further circuit settings
State → INFO-pushbutton DCM/ACM → △∇(select circuit) → Enter ○

After pressing the INFO-pushbutton and selecting the required circuit with \triangle and ∇ (see previous chapter), you reach the setup for this circuit by pressing \triangleright or Enter \bigcirc (fig. 22). The following information is displayed:

- 1 number of circuit (fig. 22, point 1). If this is selected (i.e. invertedly coloured), you can change to the other circuits with \triangleleft and \triangleright .
- 2 stop delay time* (explanation see below) (fig. 22, point 2). It can be set in steps between 1 min and 15 min using < | and | >; alternatively you can select a manual ** switch-back.
- 3 operation mode (fig. 22, point 3). With \lhd and \triangleright you can select the following operation modes:

Operation mode	status when system is ready to operate
maintained lighting	Luminaires are on (in mixed operation only maintained luminaires)
non-maintained lighting	All luminaires are off but get switched on when mains or sub-distributions fail.

- 4 monitoring mode (sub-menu) (fig. 22, point 4). You can reach the setup screen for the monitoring mode with \triangleright or Enter \bigcirc (see next chapter 7.3.1).
- 5 name (two lines) (fig. 22, point 5). You have 42 digits for naming each circuit. After selecting a line you can change to edit mode by pressing Enter \bigcirc . With \triangleleft and \triangleright you choose the position to be changed; the character can be chosen with \triangle and ∇ (available characters see 23). You finish the input by pressing Enter \bigcirc or done. Tip: Use an external keyboard for entering the names.

*stop delay: When switching back from "modified non-maintained lighting" (failure of mains monitor) to "ready to operate", all luminaires remain on for the programmed stop delay time. When switching back from battery operation, all luminaires keep being supplied with battery voltage for another minute; afterwards the programmed stop delay time starts running. After this time has elapsed, the circuits are switched back to their programmed operation mode (see point 3 above).




Figure 20: Circuit status

9.3.1 Programming circuit monitoring

The monitoring setup screen (fig. 24) shows the number of the circuit in the top line (fig. 24, point 1). Using the keys \triangle and ∇ you can reach the following setup options:

- 1 highest address of luminaires with single luminaire monitoring existing in the circuit, settable from 01 to 20. This number mostly corresponds with the number of luminaires existing in this circuit. The setting 00 deactivates the single luminaire monitoring.
- 2 tolerance for the current monitoring. Possible settings: off (no current monitoring), 5%, 10%, 20% (recommended), 50% (fig. 24, point 2).
- 3 measuring of the reference current (fig. 24, point 3). The current value is reset and newly defined with the next test and saved as a reference for the current monitoring.




Figure 22: Setting of the circuit monitoring

9.3.2 Programming the SAM-module

State \rightarrow INFO-pushbutton DCM/ACM \rightarrow $\triangle \nabla$ (select circuit) \rightarrow Enter \rightarrow next \rightarrow SAM programming > \rightarrow Enter

Pushing the softkey next/F2 takes you to the menu for programming the SAM and the supply time (battery operation) (25). If you select the line supply: using the keys \triangle or ∇ (25, point 2), you can set the supply time for the respective circuit in steps from 3 minutes (smin) to 8 hours (smin) or unlimited (smin) or unlimited. Selecting smin0 or smin1 using smin2 or Enter smin3 takes you to the table shown in 26. For navigating within the table use smin4 or Enter smin5. In each line you can change the following settings using smin5 or smin5:

- left column: selection of SAM/MC-LM (number 01 to 16),
- middle column: selection of SAM-input (E1...E8, MC-LM, TLS1, TLS2)
- right column: selection of the operation mode (ds, mb, gmb), see table below

The softkey back/F3 takes you back to the previous display (22). Now push the softkeys done/F3 and back/F3 in order to leave the programming. A confirmation prompt appears (27). Here you can save the changes with yes or cancel with no. After that you are in the circuit selection menu again.




Figure 23: SAM programming




Figure 24: SAM-programming

9.4 Checking the state of the charger module State → INFO-pushbutton LDM

Push the INFO-pushbutton in order to check the state of the charger module. After that the following parameters of the LDM are shown (see $\,$ 28): number of the LDM25 (1), rack and slot number (2), float charge/boost charge or possible failures (3), current (4), voltage (5) and temperature (6). You can change between the data of several connected charger modules using $\,$ and $\,$. The following table explains possible error messages (28, point 3):




Figure 26: State of the charger unit

10 Function tests and electronic log

National and international standards require a regular function test of emergency lighting systems. Besides the daily visual checks of the system for operational readiness (displays) they especially require:

- A weekly function test of the power supply system including the connected safety and rescue luminaires;
- the monthly simulation of a failure of the general lighting for a period of time that allows a check of all safety and rescue luminaires for correct function, damages (and cleanliness);
- the annual check of the battery capacity by means of a function test (see above) of the system, but over the whole autonomous time given by the manufacturer including a subsequent function test of the charger modules after restoring mains supply.

The results of the above mentioned function and capacity tests are stored in the system and can be retrieved at any time.

10.1 Execution of a function test

State → test/F2

When the display shows the system state (see chapter 7.1), press test/F2 in order to start a function test. If the softkey test is not shown there, this indicates a mains failure or that the system is running in modified non-maintained lighting mode. The test function is blocked then. If you hear an acoustic signal on pushing test/F2, the test function is blocked by boost charge or a battery voltage below 230V. If there is no signal tone, a so-called manual test is carried out.

The LC-display shows the tested circuits (29, point 1). These circuits are "prepared" prior to the test, i.e. they are switched on with mains voltage and brought to working temperature for an exact current measurement (29, point 2). The duration of this process can be set to off, 5 minutes or 30 minutes. The progress is indicated by a line of dots behind the words "please wait" (29, point 3).

The test can be cancelled at the preparing time using the softkey cancel/F3 (fig. 29, point 4).

At the beginning of the actual test the display shows the message "under test" (30, point 2). A detected error is shown in line 3 (31, point 3).

After finishing the test, the display shows a summary for a few seconds (32) and the message "test finished" (32, point 2). Afterwards the display returns to showing the system state. The test results are saved in the log which can be selected and read (see chapter 8.3).




Figure 27: Test programming




Figure 28: Setting schedule




Figure 29: Test programming




Figure 30: Test programming




Figure 31: Test programming




Figure 32: Setting schedule




Figure 33: Test programming




Figure 34: Test results




Figure 35: Info function test




Figure 36: Reset errors




Figure 37: Main menu




Figure 38: Diagnosis menu




Figure 39: State of battery




Figure 40: State of mains supply




Figure 41: Menu for module diagnosis




Figure 42: State of DCM/ACM-modules




Figure 43: State of charger modules




Figure 44. State of SAM/IO modules




Figure 45: State of subsystems




Figure 46: Detailed information

Figure 48: System key parameters




Figure 49: System log

Internal and external modules have to be detected after installation so that the central control and monitoring unit can recognise and monitor them. For detection, switch the system to "ready to operate" (operation mode switch to position "I", see also chapter 9.10). Then select detect_modules in the menu installation and press Enter. When the module detection is finished, all identified modules are listed. In order to save the results of the detection in the system settings press done-/F3 and confirm the security prompt with yes-/F1.

Note: When delivered all installed modules have already been detected so that a new detection is only necessary when the system is extended in situ.

Setting the operation mode prevents an undesired activation of the emergency lighting during company shutdown times. 


Figure 51: Select operation mode




Figure 52: Configuration menu




Figure 53: Submenu "administration"

The network-menu (56) enables the configuration of the network interfaces by which a connection of several such power supply systems with each other is possible. Additionally, an access via network allows a remote control of the system by means of the internet browser of an external PC.

Submenu ip-addresses (57)

Each system has two network connections (RJ45) which are named internal (inside the cabinet) and front (at the front). Only one of them can be used at a time.

Thus in the menu <code>ip addresses</code> (57) under the menu item "adapter" (57, point 1) you can select the respective connection with \triangleleft and \triangleright (<code>internal</code> or <code>front</code>). Now the buttons \triangle and \triangleright let you make settings for the active adapter. You can set the ipaddress (<code>ip</code>), subnet mask (<code>Mask</code>), <code>Gateway</code> and <code>DNS</code>. Use the buttons \triangleleft and \triangleright to select the different characters and change them with \triangle and \triangleright . With Enter \bigcirc you finish the input, so that you can use the keys \triangle and \triangleright for selecting another line in the menu. By pushing the softkey <code>done/F3</code> you leave the ip-addresses input page; settings changes have to be confirmed with <code>yes/F1</code>.



Submenu communication (58)

Each power supply system can be linked to other systems which have a similar central control unit. This requires a clear allocation of an own IP-address to each system (see above). When they are networked, one system (called master) monitors all others (slaves). To achieve this in master and slave systems the status query in the menu communication (58) has to be set to on (58, point 1). Additionally, the IP-addresses of all slave systems have to be entered in the master system (58, point 2). The selection and change of addresses can be done as described in the above submenu addresses. The new settings become effective after leaving the submenu by pushing done/F3 and confirming with yes/F1.

Note: For safety reasons the system has to be restarted after changing IP-addresses.




Figure 55: Submenu for setting ipaddresses




Figure 56: IP-addresses of monitored systems




Figure 58: Timer programming




Figure 59: Programming IOM-inputs




Figure 60: Programming SAM-inputs




Figure 63: Setting the system time

An annual capacity test of the system is compulsory for checking the circuits and luminaires as well as the state of the battery: Despite its ageing the battery should have a capacity which is sufficient to supply the system in case of an emergency over the full autonomous time. Your system can execute such a test automatically at four different times a year.

Note: Depending on existing regional laws a capacity test may only be executed in the presence of a competent service technician. In such a case the automatic execution as described above is not permissible.

After selecting the number of the test to be programmed (1 of 4, 66, point 1), its duration can be set duration (66, point 2) between (5min to 8h) or deactivated (off). A date (day, month) have to be set for the beginning of the test.




Figure 64: settings for automatic capacity tests

11.11.10 Configuration of the automatic Email notification

The miniControl XL *plus* system has an Email notification function, with which an Email can be sent to one or more addresses in case of a failure. This Email informs about the current content of the failure memory and shows all failures at the time of sending which have not been reset yet. The Email function is exclusively configured via WebInterface. All the following network settings have to be made on the miniControl XL *plus*, which is to send Emails:

- IP-address (unambiguous for each station, no double or multiple allocation)
- net mask (matching the network part of the IP-address)
- gateway address (address of the router, which connects to an intranet (LAN) or the internet)
- DNS (Domain Name Server)-address (IP-address of the DNS Servers for the coding of computer names in IP-addresses)

Note: An SMTP-capable mail server is necessary for Email transmission to which the system must be connected via ethernet by means TCP/IP. For this the following information about the SMTP mail server is needed:

- IP-address or name (e.g. 192.168.1.1 or mail.example.de)
- · supported authentication methods
- an existing and active Email account on the server
- login data for this Email account must be known

Note: The data exchange with the mail server is not encrypted. Make sure that the mail provider allows un-encrypted connections.

Step 1: Check network settings of the station

A PC is necessary for configuring the Email function. First check the network connection to the miniControl XL *plus* and the mail server. Connect the PC via network cable to a switch in the MultiControl network. Open the prompt and run a ping command. Example:




Figure 65: Web-interface main page and access to the email configuration page.

12 Complete shutdown (disconnection) of the power supply system

Before conducting maintenance works or making changes to the system, it has to be shut down (disconnected) by a specialist. For this the following instructions have to be observed:

- 1. Operation mode switch to charging mode. Turn the operation mode switch (fig. 14, point 7) to charging mode (position "0"). Important: Make sure that the LC-display (fig. 14, point 5) shows "charging".
- Disconnect system from mains. Turn the fuse switch disconnector down (fig. 1, point 10)".
- 3. Remove mains fuse. Remove the mains fuses (fig. 1, point 10).
- 4. Remove battery fuses F2/F4. Remove the battery fuses (fig. 1, point 8). The system is now shut down and disconnected.

13 Battery operation and maintenance

In compliance with the national and international standards ÖVE/ÖNORM E 8002 and ÖVE/ÖNORM EN 50272-2 the system has to be checked annually. The batteries used in this system are so-called maintenance-free, valve-regulated lead acid batteries. These are lead acid batteries with sealed cells, where no water re-filling is necessary over the whole service life (and which is thus prohibited). The cells are equipped with relief valves to protect them against overpressure. Diluted sulphuric acid absorbed in a glass mat is used as electrolyte.

Note: Opening the valves leads to their destruction and thus to the destruction of the battery.



Caution: The series connection of the battery blocks creates a potentially lethal voltage.

13.1 Charging and discharging

The system uses one IUTQ-controlled charger unit for charging. They consist of a charger module (LDM25) with a maximum charging current of 1A whose output is connected in parallel to the battery. Batteries, which are later built in a battery assembly as replacement, do not need an equalisation charge with normal float charge voltage in order to adjust to the terminal voltage of other batteries.

The cut-off voltage of the battery, assigned to the discharge current, must not be underrun. For this purpose the power supply system is equipped with a deep discharge protection. Normal mains operation has to be restored as soon as possible after a discharge, also partial discharge, which leads to a re-charging of the batteries. A faulty charger unit has to be repaired.

Charging the batteries is carried out in compliance with EN 50272 according to the following table:

Temperature (°C)	Charging voltage boost/quick charging (V/cell)	Float charge voltage (V/cell)
10	2,48	2,30
20	2,45	2,27
30	2,40	2,24
40	2,34	Charging unit switches off*

^{*}Above 40°C, the charging unit switches of in order to protect the batteries from further upheating and over-charge.

13.2 Maintenance and checks

Always keep the batteries clean and dry in order to avoid creeping currents. Cleaning the batteries should be carried out according to the ZVEI-leaflet "Cleaning of batteries". All plastic parts of the batteries must be cleaned using only water without cleansing additive. Do not use organic cleansers. The system automatically records battery voltage and surrounding temperature. The following parameters should additionally be checked, measured and recorded:

- battery voltage of every single block during the float charging process (block voltage)
- surface temperature of all battery blocks
- battery room temperature

If the block voltage of one block differs from the voltage of the other blocks by \pm 0.5 V/cell or if the surface temperature differs by more than 5°C, call a service technician immediately. The following visual checks have to be carried out annually:

- check all screwed and/or plug contacts of the cabling between the batteries as well as between the batteries and the system for tightness.
- · passability and function of the ventilation

Please find further tips for maintaining your batteries in the corresponding documentation.

13.1 First inspection

The first inspection has to be carried out according to E DIN EN 50171 (VDE 0558-508):2013-07 by the installation technician when commissioning the system.

First inspections have to be carried out in compliance with the local, national regulations and comprise the following points:

- check the correct selection of modules. Observe the selectivity of the distribution network of the emergency power supply
- check the correct selection and setting of the automatic transfer and switching device (ATSD)
- visual check of the settings of the protection devices
- check the batteries for sufficient capacity. The system has to be operated with the actual load over the defined time when
 discharging the batteries. The results have to be logged. When systems do not pass these tests, they have to be tested again. If the
 system fails again, it must not be commissioned. (see measurement protocol battery)
- check the function by disconnecting from mains
- check the ventilation of the mounting room and the battery according to EN 50272-2
- check the mounting rooms in terms of fire protection, equipment and facilities.

Inspections must only be carried out by electrically skilled technicians, who are trained and qualified.

13.2 Repeating inspection

The repeating inspection has to be carried out in compliance with the local/national regulations. If there are no local/national regulations, the following intervals are recommended:

automatic transfer and switching device (ATSD):

- function test with load transfer: weekly
 An automatic function test must be programmed by the installation technician/operator upon installation/commissioning (instruction manual chapter 10.2)
- test through imitation of a mains failure: half-yearly
 disconnection from mains supply through disconnecting the pre-fuse of the system or pushing the mains switch (chapter 6.1.7 (fig.
 8)). The switch has to be switched on again after the function test.

protection devices:

visual inspection of the settings: yearly
 1. check the battery voltage as well as the symmetry voltage (chapter 11.3, fig. 43) with a measuring device (see chapter 5)

2. check the battery current (status screen or chapter 11.3, fig. 43) by imitating a mains failure (see "testing through imitation of a mains failure") with a measuring device (see chapter5) or a suitable and calibrated clamp-on ammeter

batteries:

- function test over a sufficient time period with the full consumer load: monthly This is done through weekly function tests.
- capacity test over the rated operating time with the full consumer load: **yearly** see maintenance schedule

earth fault monitor: weekly

• push the earth fault test button, see chapter 7.1.1 fig. 16 point 15

protection against electric shock

- measured at mains input: every 3 years
- in output circuits with residual current-operated protective device (RCD) through function test, proof of triggering with rated residual operating current: half-yearly
 Only with installed service socket (SSD)

Beyond the requirements of EN 50272-2, paragraph 14*, the battery has to be charged according to the manufacturer's instructions and then, after 24h trickle charging, undergo a discharge test. During the discharging process the central emergency power supply system has to be operated with the full consumer load and it must reach the rated operating time.

*Batteries and their operating conditions must be checked regularly for correct functioning and safety.

In compliance with the manufacturer's requirements, the following has to be checked in an inspection: voltage setting of the charger, voltages of the cells or the block batteries, electrolyte density and electrolyte level (if applicable), cleanliness, leak tightness, tightness of the connectors (if necessary), ventilation, plugs and valves, battery temperature.

13.3 Inspection before commissioning

After mounting the central power supply system, the installation technician must carry out the inspections according to HD 60364-6 chapter 61.

Part of them is the visual inspection of the stationary electrical system before the central emergency power supply system is commissioned as well as testing and measuring, preferably in this order:

- conductivity of the cables
- insulation resistance of the electrical system
- protection through SELV, PELV or protective separation
- protection through automatic switch-off of the power supply
- additional protection
- voltage polarity
- phase sequence of the external conductors
- function and operation test
- voltage drop

If an error is detected during the testing and measuring, this and each previous test, which might have been influenced by this error, have to be repeated after clearing the error.

If the installation technician of the central emergency power supply system is not the installation technician of the stationary electrical system, he must be provided with the test log of the first inspection of the stationary electrical system, which the emergency power supply system is meant for, before he can carry out the first inspection of the emergency power supply system.

The observance of the requirements as defined in the instruction manual of the manufacturer has to be proven and confirmed prior to testing and measuring by visual inspection. Particularly the following has to be inspected:

- the condition of the mounting location, marking and equipment according to standards (operating devices, means of body protection, tools, utilities)
- · protection against intrusion of solid foreign objects and liquids
- protection against external mechanical impact
- observance of the surrounding temperature (lower and upper limit)
- · observance of the maximal humidity
- ensuring the necessary ventilation

EMV-environment (A or B)

- checking if special operating conditions can disturb the operational safety and functionality of the central emergency power supply system such as vibrations, extraordinary shocks, corrosive atmosphere, strong electric or magnetic fields, explosion hazard
- . the existence of necessary operation and maintenance areas for the central emergency power supply system
- the correct selection of modules of the emergency power supply system and check if the requirements of the user according to 5.2
 have been met by the manufacturer
- checking the settings of the protection devices

If a system fails an inspection according to E DIN EN 50171 (VDE 0558-508):2013-07 paragraph 8.2.4 sub-paragraph g)*, it **must not** be commissioned!

*checking the battery concerning sufficient capacity, the emergency power supply system must be operated during the battery discharge with the rated output current over the rated operating time. Systems, which do fail this test, have to be tested again. If the requirements are not met in this test either, the system must not be commissioned.

13.4 Procedure in case of failure

If errors on the battery set or the charger unit are detected, the customer service must be called immediately. A service contract with your dealer makes error detection easier.

13.5 Proceeding in case of malfunctions

If you notice malfunctions of the battery set or the charger unit, call the customer service immediately. A service contract with your dealer enables an early recognition of failures.

13.6 Decommissioning, storing and transport

If batteries are stored for a longer time or decommissioned, store them fully charged in a dry frost-free room.

Transport note: Batteries, which show no defects whatsoever, are not treated as dangerous goods according to Dangerous Goods Ordinance Road (GGVS) or Dangerous Goods Ordinance Railway (GGVE), if they are secured against short circuit, slipping, falling over and damage (GGVS, volume no. 2801 a). The batteries to be transported must not show signs of acid on the outside. The respective exception regulations apply to all sealed batteries and cells whose tanks are untight or damaged.





15 Module descriptions

Several modules which are integrated in your system or optionally available are briefly described in the following chapters. You can download detailed information on the individual modules from your dealer's homepage.

15.1 Electric circuit module DCM32 / DCM42 (special order)

characteristics at a glance:

- 216V DC output voltage in battery operation
- 2 electric circuits per module
- 2x3A output current per module
- mixed mode in the circuit
- single luminaire or circuit monitoring in the circuit

A DCM32/42 slot-in card can contain up to two circuits at the same time. When the general power supply fails, they realise the automatic switching of the circuits to battery operation. Each circuit works separately in changeover mode and can be switched separately. The electric circuits can be programmed either for maintained or non-maintained lighting. A combination of both in one circuit is also possible. Each circuit has an integrated monitoring unit for monitoring earth fault, overload, electric circuits and single luminaires. These circuits have a double pole overcurrent protection device (system protection fuses), which are also monitored in operation (fuse type: 6,3x32mm, ceramic tube, delay fuse, 1.500A breaking capacity). After pressing the INFO-pushbutton, the LC-display of the central control and monitoring unit (14, point 5) shows the state of the two electric circuits (A/B) of the module. By means of this display in combination with the direction, enter and function keys you can program operation mode, follow-up time, luminaire monitoring and supply time for each electric circuit.

15.2 Electric circuit module DCM12E (special order)

characteristics at a glance:

- 216V DC output voltage in mains backup operation
- 2 circuits per module
- per module 2x1A output current
- mixed mode operation in the end circuit, integrated single light switchability
- single light and circuit control in the end circuit
- just in case with luminaires on ELS capable stand(MLED, MU05¹, IL (V57.3.4), KM (V38.5.2, V84.5.2))

The electric circuit module DCM12E is an end circuit component for emergency lighting systems of the types multiControl plus, midiControl plus, miniControl plus, miniControl plus and microControl plus.

The electric circuit module is equipped with two electric circuits each ("circuit A" and "circuit B"), where each circuit is designed for a maximum output current of 1A. Each electric circuit module can realise a single light scanning as well as a self-calibrating circuit control.

Furthermore, each circuit has an earth connection monitoring, which signalizes a possible earth fault in the end circuit by means of a red LED (error). However, this monitoring is only active when the BAS (mode selection switch) is set to charge mode (emergency lighting blocked), i.e. the end circuits are not engaged.

The programming of each control mode of the lights in the end circuit is carried out at the central computer separately for each circuit. The configuration of the lighting switching mode and the single light switchability via powerline requires a PC/Laptop.

By means of the INFO button, integrated in the front panel, all relevant data of each DCM can be retrieved and are shown on the display of the central computer. Possible errors and states of the components and electric circuits such as consumer control mode, connected consumer rating, end circuit defects etc. are displayed here.

15.3 Electric circuit module ACM (special order)

The circuit modules are equipped with an electric circuit ("circuit A"), suitable for a maximum output power of 500VA. The ACM works in changeover operation, which means, in normal operation 230V AC 50/60 Hz are connected to the end circuit terminal and in emergency operation a 230V 50Hz square wave voltage. Each circuit module can realise a single light query as well as a self-calibrating circuit monitoring.

Furthermore, each ACM has an earth fault monitoring, which signalises a possible earth leakage by a red LED (Fehler / Error). This monitoring is only active, however, if the BAS (mode selection switch) is set to charging mode (emergency light blocked), and thus the end circuits are not connected. The integrated overload protection guarantees switching the end circuit off as well as an optical signal (LED Fehler / Error) if a too high consumer load is connected in battery operation. The programming of the respective light monitoring mode in the end circuit is carried out on the central computer separately for each circuit. The INFO pushbutton, integrated in the front, is used to retrieve all relevant data of the respective ACM and display them on the central computer. Possible errors, module status or circuit status, monitoring mode, connected loads, defects of an end circuit fuse etc. are displayed here.

15.4 Switch query module SAM08 (optional)

The switch query module SAM08 is a bus-compatible light switch query module which can be used for a joint switching of emergency and general lighting. When connected to the multi-bus RS485 of the miniControl XL *plus* emergency lighting system, it transmits the switch commands to the control computer by which the switch commands can be allocated to the respective circuits. For this purpose it has 8 galvanically isolated inputs, which are designed for a voltage of 230V AC +/- 10% and so can be connected to the light switches and circuits of the general lighting. The SAM08 module and the miniControl XL *plus* systems are connected in series (feed through wiring) via screened 4-core data line; up to 15 of these SAM08 modules can be connected via this line as one of these lines is already connected to the internal SAM08. A J-Y(St)-Y cable or similar in compliance with DIN VDE 0815 and 0816 have to be used as data line.

The switch query module SAM24 is a bus-compatible light switch query module which can be used for a joint switching of emergency and general lighting as well as for 1-, 2- or 3-phase mains monitoring (195V AC activation voltage). When connected to the multi-bus RS485 of the miniControl XL *plus* emergency lighting system, it transmits switch commands to the respective circuits. For this purpose it has 8 galvanically isolated inputs, which are designed for a voltage of AC 200V – 255V/50Hz or DC 24V – 255V and so can be connected to the light switches and circuits of the general lighting. The SAM24 module and the miniControl XL *plus systems* are connected in series and/or star-wired via screened 4-core data line; up to 15 of these SAM24 modules can be connected via this line as one of the available addresses is already allocated to the internal SAM08. A J-Y(St)-Y cable or similar in compliance with DIN VDE 0815 and 0816 have to be used as data line.

15.6 MultiControl Line Monitor MC-LM (optional)

The MC line monitors are line monitors for connection to the miniControl XL emergency lighting system. With the MC-LM it is possible to monitor three phases, e.g. a general mains distribution. If less than 3 phases are to be monitored it is necessary to bridge unused phase inputs with assigned connections at the MC-LM. The switching threshold for recognising a mains failure or a severe mains fluctuation lies at 85% of the nominal mains voltage (230V AC), i.e. at approx. 195V AC. It is possible to connect the MC-LM modules to the emergency lighting device in series. Use the respective connections on the MC-LM for this purpose, and assign each individual MC-LM to a different address.

Setting the requisite addresses for each MC-LM is carried out using the rotary encoder switch on the module. The DIP switch is required for activating and deactivating the terminal resistance. This must be activated on the last module of the connected series (setting - ON). An indicator LED provides information on the current status of the line monitor. If the LED is illuminated constantly then the connected voltage is OK. If the LED is not illuminated then the connected voltage of the general distributor is faulty.

The remote panels MCT-15 and MCT-15S are designed to provide a decentralised display of the statuses of emergency lighting systems of types MC-series. The panel provides visual and acoustic indications of the respective system status. Visual indications are provided in the form of plain text and LED. In the event of faults, an acoustic signal is also issued. The acoustic signal can be acknowledged with the "RESET acoustic signal" button although this does not influence the error message (visual indication).

In addition to these indications, statuses such as Mod non-maintained, test operation, mains OK, batt. OK, DCM fault etc. are also displayed in plain text. By using the (ON/OFF) button or key switch on the MCT-15, it is possible to switch the system operating mode from charging mode to standby mode or vice versa. By pressing the Switch "DS On/Off" the maintained circuits of the system can be turned on and off.

However, in the event that no key switch is integrated into the indicator panel it is necessary to ensure that the MCT-15 is safeguarded against access by unauthorised personnel (DIN VDE 0108 part 1 section 6.4.3.11). In order to be able to trigger the external test function, the test button must be pressed until the message "ready" appears in the display. This is necessary to prevent an accidental triggering of the test function. Please refer to the wiring documentation for connection variants and connection schematics.

15.8 PC230 (optional)


The Power-Control (PC230) monitors voltages in sub-distributions of the general lighting. Three phases can be monitored. If fewer phases are monitored, unused monitoring contacts have to be bridged with connected contacts. The upper switch threshold is set to 195 V, i.e. 15% lower than mains voltage of 230V. The status can be queried via two changeover contacts on the module. Usually one of these contacts is integrated in a monitoring loop of an emergency lighting system. The NC-contact [18-15] or [28-25] has to be wired. If the contacts are used for other purposes, please strongly observe the power rating of 2A-30V/DC, 0.3A-




Figure 75: PC230




