JASPER COUNTY APPROVES OF CO-LINE'S PROPOSED \$1.5M CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

The Jasper County Board of Supervisors approved a tax increment financing (TIF) proposal on May 18 to assist Co-Line in an upcoming expansion project. This came after Co-Line had approached JEDCO (Jasper County Economic Development) about construction of a new 50,000-square-foot building north of the existing campus. Since the building will be on the north side of 100th Street, it will be Co-Line's first building in

Jasper County. The property was the original farmstead of Dale Brand's father, Lloyd. Over the years, the Harvestores were taken down, and most recently, the machine shed and barn along with all of the old cattle lot concrete. The proposed building has no specific purpose at this time but will allow growth of several current customers. Due to current construction costs, the building timing is unknown. TIF funding will finance about 25 percent of the construction expenses for the expansion, currently estimated at \$1.5 million.

RECREATIONAL WATER SAFETY

Water offers the most common way to beat the heat, and swimming is one of the most popular ways to do so. From backyard pools to local lakes and beaches, there are many places to swim, play or relax; however, water can pose safety issues for families. According to the U.S. Lifesaving Association, more than 100 drownings occur every year in the United States due to rip currents in the ocean. In fact, the USA Swimming Foundation reports an average of 19 children drown every year during the Fourth of July holiday.

In addition to taking swimming lessons, learning CPR, and maintaining a close watch on those in or around the water, particularly children, keep these things in mind:

SWIM IN SUPERVISED AREAS. Don't go in the water unless you know how to swim. If you or your children cannot, take swimming lessons beforehand or enter the water only where there is trained supervision.

STAY CALM IN A RIP CURRENT. Swimmers who get caught in a rip current are urged not to try to fight it. Stay calm and float with it or try to swim parallel to the shore until you are out of the current and can swim freely.

Keep rescue equipment nearby. Make sure there are life jackets, ring buoys, and

Keep rescue equipment nearby. Make sure there are life jackets, ring buoys, and other rescue equipment near the body of water. A first aid kit should be available, too.

SWIM IN SAFE AREAS. Dive only in areas that are known to be safe, such as the deep end of a supervised pool or lake. Avoid jumping in headfirst.

NO HORSEPLAY. Do not push, shove, dunk, or indulge in horseplay around the swimming pool because this can lead to falls, accidental injuries, or death. Avoid alcohol. Never drink alcohol before going into or while in the water. It can impair reflexes, vision, and judgment.

REMINDER: GET A PHYSICAL SCHEDULED

As announced last December, employees are encouraged to get a physical in 2021 to be eligible for reduced rate health insurance in 2022. Forms are available in the HR office and must be turned in by Dec. 1, 2021. The wellness physical must be completed between the dates of Dec. 1, 2020, and Nov. 30, 2021. For this year, this physical requirement is for employees AND spouses covered under Co-Line's health insurance plan. Other family members on Co-Line's insurance are not required to submit proof of a physical.

ADVANCE CHILD TAX CREDIT

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was passed by Congress on March 10 and included many COVID-19 stimulus provisions as well as income tax changes. As part of that legislation, the Child Tax Credit was expanded for 2021 only. The expansion means the credit amount was increased, became fully refundable, includes children who turn age 17 in 2021, and includes advance payments.

For tax year 2021, families that claim the Child Tax Credit will receive up to \$3,000 per qualifying child between the ages of 6 and 17 at the end of 2021 and up to \$3,600 per qualifying child under age 6 at the end of 2021. Under prior law, the Child Tax Credit was up to \$2,000 per qualifying child under the age of 17 at the end of the year. The increased amounts are phased out for incomes over \$150,000 for married taxpayers filing a joint return along with qualifying widows/widowers, \$112,500 for heads of household, and \$75,000 for all other taxpayers.

The IRS will estimate your 2021 Child Tax Credit based on information included in eligible taxpayers' 2020 tax returns or their 2019 returns if the 2020 returns are not filed and processed yet. Beginning on July 15 and continuing monthly through December,

eligible taxpayers will receive 1/12 of their estimated 2021 Child Tax Credit in a monthly payment either through direct deposit or paper check.

Eligible taxpayers do not need to take any action now to receive the Advanced Child Tax Credit other than file their 2020 tax return if they have not done so. The IRS will

launch two online portals by July 1, one for people who do not normally file an income tax return so they can provide information to be eligible to receive payments. The second portal will allow families to update information about changes in their income, filing status, or the number of qualifying children. The portals will also allow taxpayers to opt out if they do not want to receive any advance payments and instead receive the entire credit when filing their income tax returns next year.

When filing your 2021 tax return in 2022, eligible taxpayers will calculate the correct Child Tax Credit for the year and reduce that amount by any advance payments received. Unlike the stimulus check rules, if you receive more money than you should have, you will have to pay it back. To avoid this scenario, it will be important to log in to the portals on July 1 and make updates to your information as needed.

BRAND SCORES THREE WINS IN FIRST THREE RACES
