As of Oct. 15, meals are available at noon on site at Co-Line five days a week. Kelly Rozenboom is now preparing "Salad Bar Fridays." Some will remember her as the daughter of Ron and Vickie Nikkel of Lynnville.

"Maidrite Mondays" with two maidrites or one chilirite, chips, and dessert are prepared by Janet Freese, Tana Brand, and Faye Brand. Julie Roose and Linda DeJong prepare home-cooked meals on Tuesdays and Thursdays respectively. Karen Harrill brings in pizza, chips, dessert, and pop on Wednesdays.

The cost is \$3 per meal available in the training room, with extra helpings available for \$1 each. The menu appears each month in this newsletter on the next-to-last page and is also posted on bulletin boards, by the time clocks, and on the Company Calendar where employees on vacation or sick are also listed each day.

The daily lunches have become one of the most talked about perks at Co-Line as many employees take advantage of the wonderful food. To this day, the meals are only \$5 each with Co-Line subsidizing the cost. Thank you to the Brands for offering this great benefit!

LAKE 7-A WATER USED IN CONTROLLED BURN AT KEY CO-OP

Over 300,000 gallons of water from Co-Line's Lake 7-A was used as part of a controlled burn of obsolete buildings at Key Cooperative in Sully on Saturday, Aug. 21. Approximately 339,000 gallons of water was pumped and hauled from the lake. The water from Co-Line was poured into two portable water reservoirs



north of the old elevator. Co-Line's gracious offer of water along with the area farmers who made multiple trips to haul it into Sully were instrumental in the safe razing of the buildings.




In addition to the water from Lake 7-A, approximately 450,000 gallons of water was pumped to the burn via a mile-long, eight-inch hose from Marty and Betty Vander Molen's pond just east of Sully. An additional 108,000 gallons of water was used from the city water system. An estimated total of 897,000 gallons of water was used throughout the day.

A total of 17 fire departments were in town providing equipment and men for the controlled burn of the old grain elevator that could be seen from over 30 miles away. A rectangular annex building and two fertilizer sheds were also burned.



concussions go undiagnosed and untreated. Symptoms commonly last 7-10 days, and include any one or more of the following: Headache, confusion, difficulty remembering or paying attention, balance problems or dizziness, feeling sluggish, hazy, foggy, or groggy, feeling irritable, more emotional, or "down," nausea or vomiting, bothered by light or noise, double or blurry vision, slowed reaction time, sleep problems, or loss of consciousness. For some people, concussion symptoms can persist longer, called Post-Concussion Syndrome. Post-Concussion Syndrome can last for weeks, months or even years.

A concussion is a mild form of brain injury and should be taken seriously. Culturally, many Americans view a concussion as no big deal, perhaps having been told themselves to "shake it off" or "play through it." However, returning to situations where an injured person faces another potential blow to the head before a concussion fully heals can result in "Second Impact Syndrome," which can be serious and potentially life-threatening.

Concussions have become an epidemic in the United States, with millions of mild traumatic brain injuries happening each year. National Concussion Awareness Day[®] is recognized on the third Friday of each September yearly, which falls on Friday, Sept. 17, this year.

According to a poll by the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, nearly 9 out of 10 adults in the US can't correctly define a concussion. The Center for Disease Control defines a concussion as "a type of traumatic brain injury caused by a bump, blow, or jolt to the head or by a hit to the body that causes the head and brain to move rapidly back and forth. This sudden movement can cause the brain to bounce around or twist in the skull, creating chemical changes in the brain

and sometimes stretching and damaging brain cells."

THE PERFECT PIT STOP by Jeff Kling

What does a perfect pit stop consist of? First off, "perfect" must be defined. Perfect = without errors, flaws, or faults, complete and lacking nothing essential. Using a NASCAR pit stop as an example, consider these factors: When to pit and what all do you do?

Crew chiefs will have a play book (so to speak) for strategies as the race progresses. But there are so many factors that it's nearly impossible to predetermine a perfect stop. They can narrow it down a bit to four tires and gas at certain intervals, basically a standard stop. A standard stop will rarely come into play because of the infinite unknowns. Consider adjustments alone and one begins to see nothing can be considered standard other than the key processes (tires and fuel).

How might this compare to a standard project here at Co-Line? When a customer submits a request, some projects will be simple in comparison to others – somewhat similar to pit stop scenarios. All key information must be obtained from our customers and then CLEARLY communicated to production, the same for a race team monitoring all the data prior to setting up for their stop.

We could think of each new job like a pit stop; you receive and review all the essential information, the parts come, you process, verify, and send them on their way. With this planning, preparation, and execution, the parts will have their best chance making it to the customer without additional stops – in other words, a perfect pit stop.

Our ISO requirement 8.6, Release of products, states that we are to implement planned arrangements at appropriate stages to verify the product requirements have been met. In other words, we're required to do our quality checks, simple as that. But in a race, unfortunately, the only check is when the car gets up to speed – much like if we don't do our checks, there could be a huge crash once the customer receives our parts. We don't even want to think about that. So again, your pit stop isn't complete until you have verified that it is what the customer requested. Don't be that guy who doesn't get the lug nuts tight... Stay focused; we're all in this together.
