May 2022 marked the beginning of construction of Co-Line's first building expansion in Jasper County. The first loads of concrete for the footings of the new building have arrived. Concrete work will continue into June. The building is still slated to arrive this summer. Expectations are still hopeful for a late fall move-in.

On May 11, the new 11,000 gallon bulk nitrogen tank was installed at the south building. With continued growth in nitrogen cutting, this improvement in storage and technology was much needed! As part of this upgrade, two new trifectas and vaporizers were also installed to further improve our nitrogen delivery system.

In 2018, Mark began at Co-Line as a welder. He is now welding supervisor of the south building robotic weld department.



BEING AUDIT-READY EVERY DAY

I'm sure you all have heard the term "this is how we roll." Most times, this is used in a positive context, as in when someone pulls off something impressive, instead of bragging, they simply say, "That's just how we roll." I think it has a good vibe to it, and I feel if everyone here at Co-Line is on their game, as in performing their processes, being diligent, and focused, when it comes time for our external auditor to check up on us, we will have positive results. What better way to conclude an external audit than to use this "it's just how we roll" expression. I personally know



we could have said this at the conclusion of past audits, and everyone should be proud as contributors of these previous accomplishments.

The following are a few key items of where our focus needs to be prior to, during, and throughout the year to be positive contributors in our upcoming ISO audit.

• If your process has a **QUALITY CHECK**, it must be up to date, completely documented, you must display competence in what you're checking, and be able to explain it accurately and thoroughly.

• You must **SHOW CONFIDENCE** in what you're doing and be able to show off your process. Examples are your navigations through your E2 job entry, your ability to set up your project, how you produce your parts, how you verify they are correct, identifying the parts that leave your control (either transfer or finished goods), and closing out of the project. You must also be able to show evidence that your documentation requirements are complete as well.

• YOUR 6S EFFORTS MUST BE EVIDENT. Having your work areas organized from an outside perspective will likely indicate what is going on within your work cell. Keep your areas sorted out free from clutter, and have your work laid out in order. Use your allotted time to keep it spiffed up and be consistent so it becomes a habit of doing things the same way as best as you can. Make it a point to stay on top of all these efforts so over time it becomes routine.

• **BE CUSTOMER FOCUSED.** Continually think on how to improve your efforts so it positively impacts your customers, meeting and ensuring you have achieved specified requirements, going to that next level in your attention to detail, and thinking about what choices are going to be best for our customers.

When we use the expression "the exception will become the rule," let's make the exception be on the good side of things so we exceed our customer expectations. Then at the end of our audit, we will come out passing and will be able to reflect back and say, "That's just how we roll."
