Remember that the score for the Tier III Exam is counted towards the final merit list. To qualify Tier III you need to score at least 33 marks. Therefore, pay attention make sure you are well prepared to write an essay for SSC CGL.

Tips to Prepare an Essay for SSC CGL

1. Read newspapers, articles and credible magazines

This would help you gain command over vocabulary and make you a person of concrete ideas. English medium students must read **The Hindu, The Indian Express, Economic Times, etc.**

2. Read good books

Prepare for the essay topic by reading books like **151 Essays for Competitive Examinations & How to Write Essays: A Step-By-Step Guide for All Levels, with Sample Essays 2nd Edition.**

3. Try to be neat

Remember that someone is going to sit and read your paper. If they don't know what you've written, it will be difficult to give you marks. Therefore, do not cut or overwrite and make sure your handwriting is at least readable.

4. Improve your grammar

Since you will be involved in writing an essay for SSC CGL, you should be thorough with your grammar. Pick up any basic book and learn the basic grammar rules. Reading is beneficial when it comes to honing grammatical skills.

5. Use simple words

If you think that your vocabulary is not very good, to properly explain your ideas.

6. Validate your points

Put quotes stated by some author and also give relevant examples if you remember any.

7. Remember “Practice” is the key to your success

As learning or developing any language is not a one day task in fact it is a process that you have get involved in religiously in order to succeed.

8. Time yourself well

In order to practice, pick up topics of your choice and write them within a limited time frame.

Tips to Attempt an Essay in the Examination Hall

1. Attempt the essay first

As it would require some brainstorming and also because it carries maximum marks.

2. Thoroughly analyze the topic

Before you start writing the essay keep certain things in mind. note down substantial points and elaborate them while writing the essay.

3. Do not spend unnecessary time

Remember, that you are allotted only 60 minutes to attempt 2-3 descriptive topics, so . Spend approximately 25-35 minutes on the essay. Take at least 5 minutes to jot down points and decide their sequencing.

4. Prepare a structure beforehand

You can start by writing a few keywords and then writing all various aspects related to it such as the Social, Political, Legal, Technological, Economic. Alternatively, you can pick a side in the topic and perform a **SWOT (Strength, Weakness, Opportunities, Threats)** analysis on it. An example of SWOT analysis is given below.

Consider the points mentioned below for **‘Demonetization’**:

- **Strengths:**

- The characteristics of demonetization.
- The vision behind it.
- How the process will benefit the economy.
- The unintended benefits of demonetization.

- **Weaknesses:**

- RBI's toothless role.
- The loopholes involved in the process.
- The inconvenience caused to the masses.
- Threat to certain industries.

- **Opportunities:**

- Promote transparency in the transactions.
- Promote digital banking.
- Stimulate certain industries.

- **Threats:**

- How even the demonetization process is not the ultimate solution to eradication of black money.
- How the economy can be badly affected temporarily.
- How the markets are vulnerable.
- Fall in GDP and declining foreign funds inflow.

5. Divide your essay for SSC CGL in 3 parts

Introduction, Body & Conclusion. The Body can be further divided into 2-5 paragraphs, each comprising of a single point elaborated. But at the same time should be in flow with the previous and next paragraphs. Try and wrap the whole thing up in 300-350 words.

6. Neatly summarize your opinions on the matter

The conclusion should have an appropriate and well explained ending don't forget to give a suitable title!!

7. Avoid using passive voice & avoid using “I” and “me” in essays

For instance, instead of saying “The economy has been suffering due to corruption”, say “The economy has always suffered due to corruption.”

8. Try to write the essay in the present tense

9. Don't make an ambiguous essay where you haven't picked a side

Even while your present facts from all sides, take a single stand whether in support or against the topic by giving relevant examples.

Sample Essay for SSC CGL

Demonetization – The Dawn of a Cashless India

Demonetization is the process of withdrawal of certain form of currency from circulation in the economy. The process either involves complete withdrawal of a particular form of currency or its replacement with a new one.



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Recently, the current Indian government decided to withdraw from circulation or demonetize the biggest denomination notes i.e. 500 and 1000 Rupees notes. This unexpected move came as a shock to the public. The step was seen as a landmark decision for the Indian economy by some experts. The demonetization move also witnessed a mixed response from the masses.

This is not the first time that India has withdrawn its currency from circulation. It was previously done in 1946 where Rs 1000 and Rs 10000 notes were withdrawn to deal with black money. The main objective of demonetization is to tackle the menace of black money, corruption, fake currency and terror financing. According to the Reserve Bank of India, 87% transactions are carried out through cash which provides ample opportunities to the corrupt for hoarding money and thereby harming the economy.

Before demonetization, high-value notes accounted for a total value of 86% of the notes (by value) in circulation in India. It is expected that this step will also help in promoting cashless transaction. This will be very useful in the long run, given the technological revolution being witnessed by the world.

There are some negative effects of demonetization as well. For instance, the sudden announcement created a panic among people. Long queues at banks and ATMs followed. The government and indeed, even RBI, seemed unprepared with sufficient stocks of newly minted cash to meet the needs of people. Vendors, local traders and shopkeepers found they could no longer get people to buy from them. The worst affected lived in rural areas, aloof from any kind of digital transactions. Tourism also took a hit.

It can be expected that the noble intentions of the government should bear desired results in time. The future of India may be bright if we are successful in wiping out unaccountable money from the economy. However, a deeper analysis before the implementation of the move could have made the process smoother.



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
