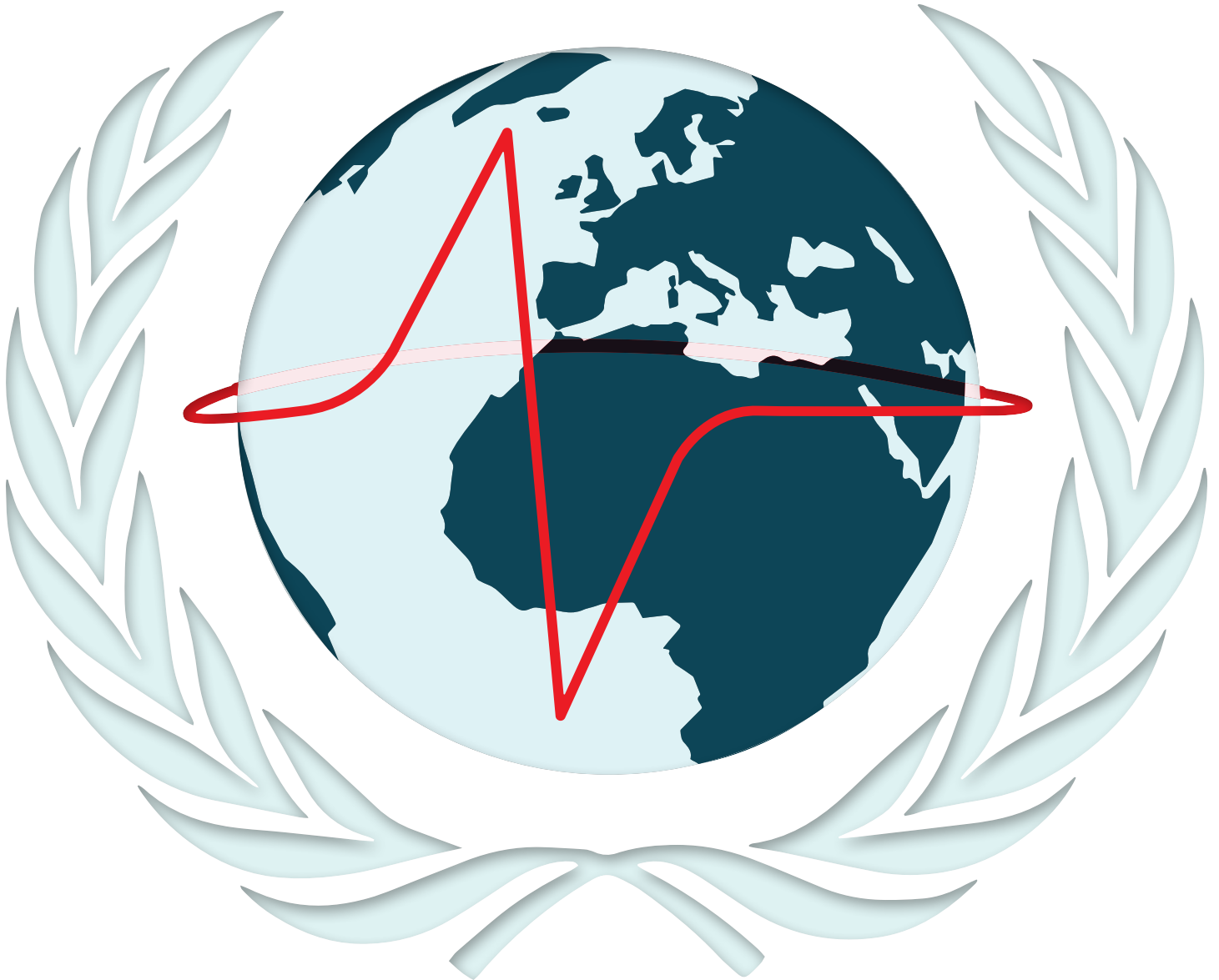

# THEME + ERINN PHELAN AWARD

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## Conference Theme

The theme for BUSUN XXII will be “promoting vital dialogue.” Delegates this year will be presented with opportunities to think outside the box in developing solutions to global health challenges, in line with Sustainable Development Goal 3, “to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages.” Many global health efforts have traditionally focused on infectious diseases like malaria and tuberculosis. However, other global health topics are broad, including sanitation, reproduction, mental health, addition and substance abuse, immunization, malnutrition, and gender-based violence. We recognize that no single solution will tackle every challenge, but improvements are possible if we consider and analyze the intersections between these health outcomes.

We encourage delegates to think outside the box in identifying factors, beyond income or healthcare spending, that contribute to inequities. For example, individuals who have been displaced from their communities often have higher incidence rates of infectious diseases and mental health issues like post-traumatic stress disorder. Marginalized communities have been disproportionately impacted by disrupted access to healthcare with the increasing frequency and intensity of natural disasters. Yet disparities exist even in times of stability: individuals may be denied access to healthcare as a result of identities including race, language, socioeconomic status, citizenship, disability, and sex or gender. Understanding these barriers is the first step in addressing inequities.

We hope that all delegates, regardless of the nation or individual that they are representing, will leave BUSUN this year with a deeper understanding of the intersectional nature of global health and how domestic and international policies can help increase the access, affordability, and equity of healthcare for all communities.

## Erinn Phelan Award

We are proud to continue this special award instituted in 2011 in honor of Erinn Phelan, to be given to the female delegate at who demonstrates the greatest commitment to women’s empowerment. Erinn Phelan, a former BUSUN Secretary-General, was working as a coordinator for Mayor Bloomberg’s NYC Civic Corps when she was involved in a hit-and run accident in Brooklyn, NY. She was accompanied by Alma Guerrero, her close friend and another former BUSUN Secretary-General. We would like to honor these women and we hope that the award will motivate all delegates to deepen their awareness of and commitment to women’s empowerment.

This award is presented to a female delegate that best embodies the following qualities: visionary leadership, dedication, and unwavering commitment to service. All shortlisted candidates for the Erinn Phelan Award will be notified by Saturday, November 10th and invited to a short interview with the Secretaries-General. Based on the candidates’ applications, interviews, and committee performance, a recipient will be chosen and announced during Closing Ceremonies. ## Code of Conduct

### *Dress Code*

Delegates are expected to dress in Western business attire for all committee sessions. Western business attire is a collared shirt, tie, and slacks for males and a dress, business suit, or professional pants with an appropriate blouse for females. Sneakers, jeans, and t-shirts are unacceptable for committee sessions, but appropriate informal attire is acceptable for evening social events like the delegate dance.

## *Alcohol and Drug Policy*

Alcohol and illegal drugs are prohibited at all times during the conference, including the hotel stay. If any delegates are caught in possession or under the influence of alcohol or any illegal drugs, parents or guardians will be immediately informed and the delegates will be asked to leave.

Delegates must wear their badges (credentials) in a visible manner at all times during the conference and related events. The badges serve as the primary form of identification recognized by BUSUN staff and campus officials.
