



THIS IS COUGAR FOOTBALL 2012 COUGAR FOOTBALL SEASON PREVIEW

LOADED WITH UPPERCLASSMEN, BYU LOOKS FOR STRONG 2012 SEASON



OVERVIEW

After completing its first season as an independent with a 10-3 record and a No. 25 final ranking in the USA Today Coaches Poll, the BYU football team returns a strong senior and junior class for 2012. The Cougars have 14 starters returning (seven offense, seven defense) along with both kickers. Last year after Riley Nelson took over as the starting quarterback the team significantly improved in production and efficiency. BYU went from being ranked No. 78 in third-down conversions to finish the year ranked No. 5 in the nation in the category. On defense, the Cougars return the majority of a very stingy defense that was tough to move the football on, ranked No. 13 overall in the nation in total yards allowed. BYU has finished the season ranked in five of the last six years (one of 11 programs to do so in at least one of the major polls) and is one of only six programs to win 10 games or more in five of the past six seasons.

SCHEDULE

BYU's second season with an independent schedule provides even more challenges than the first and will include three Pac-12 teams (Utah, Oregon State and Washington State), along with road contests vs. Boise State, Notre Dame and Georgia Tech among others. BYU will open the 2012 season at home against BYU alum Mike Leach and Washington State on Aug 30.

QUARTERBACK

Riley Nelson returns for his senior season to lead the offense after a 6-1 stretch as the starter in 2011. The 6-foot, 196-pound, dual-threat signal caller had five games with at least three touchdown passes and four games with at least 200 passing yards and 60 rushing yards. Nelson finished 2011 with a pass efficiency rating of 152.93, good for No. 16 in the country to go along with 1,717 passing yards and 19 touchdown passes.

BYU has a lot of talent at the quarterback position with the return of senior James Lark to backup Nelson. A 6-foot-2, St. George, Utah product has all the tools to lead BYU if called upon. Beyond Lark and looking to the future are returned missionaries Taysom Hill and Ammon Olsen along with junior Jason Munns and redshirt freshman Alex Kuresa returning to add a wealth of depth under center.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Three starters return for the 2012 season in Braden Hansen (senior), a Phil Steele Preseason All-America third teamer, and Houston Reynolds (junior), expected to move from guard to center, along with senior right tackle Braden Brown. The unit will need to find replacements for Matt Reynolds, the school's record holder for consecutive starts at 52 (tied with Jan Jorgensen), and Terence Brown who started for three-straight seasons. Brock Stringham, Blair Tushaus, Manaaki Vaitai, Walter Kahaiali'i, Famika Anae, Michael Yeck and Solomone Kafu all saw playing time last year and will look to be in the rotation.

The Cougars also return missionaries Fono Vakalahi, Brad Wilcox and Terrance Alletto to help build depth at the position along with other incoming freshman joining the ranks.

RUNNING BACK

Gone is do-it-all back JJ Di Luigi and workhorse Bryan Kariya but returning are Michael Alisa and Josh "Juice" Quezada. Alisa was the second leading rusher on the team in 2011 with 85 carries, 455 yards and three touchdowns. Quezada will look to return to his freshman form when he rushed for 505 yards on 99 carries and five scores. The Cougars will get Iona Pritchard back after a broken leg sidelined him for 2011. More of a combo back at 6-foot, 240 pounds with some speed and great hands, Pritchard will look to fill a role similar to the one current NFL player Manase Tonga played before graduating in 2009.

Some unproven but talented ball carriers will load BYU's backfield in 2012. Four-star recruit Adam Hine will look to crack the depth chart after a redshirt year and David Foote will continue to make his case for more playing time after a solid year in 2011. Rugby All-American Paul Lasike is strapping on the pads and giving football a try in hopes to strengthen the backfield even more.

WIDE RECEIVER

As a sophomore, Cody Hoffman led BYU with 61 receptions for 943 yards and 10 touchdowns. The 6-foot-4, 208-pound wideout posted five 100-yard receiving games in 2011. Lining up with Hoffman will be Ross Apo, another tall target at 6-foot-3, who was the Yahoo! Sports Independent Freshman of the Year, catching 34 balls for 453 yards and nine touchdowns. In the slot position, JD Falslev returns as a junior after snagging 31 receptions for 330 yards and two touchdowns.

Six-foot-3 Brett Thompson has returned from a mission and will try to build on a freshman season when he caught six passes in 2009. Another returned missionary, Mitch Mathews, a 6-foot-6 wideout is also back. Five-foot-10 Dallin Cutler also impressed during spring ball. Another tall receiver, 6-foot-4 Terenn Houk, coming off a



redshirt year, is looking to make the two-deep along with Skyler Ridley and Cody Raymond.

FULLBACK

Bruising fullback Zed Mendenhall is back for 2012 to help plow the road for the Cougar running attack. The 5-foot-11, 245-pound product of Alpine, Utah, didn't have a carry in 2011 but was a primary fixture in a BYU ground game that averaged over 160 yards per game last season. Mendenhall is especially valuable in short-yardage and goal line packages.

Along with playing running back, look for lona Pritchard to see some time as a fullback in 2012.



TIGHT END

Always a staple in the BYU offense, the Cougars return all the tight ends from 2011 after three of the top targets went down with injury last year. Devin Mahina will be back from a neck injury and Austin Holt and Richard Wilson return from knee injuries. Marcus Mathews accounted for 27 receptions, 299 yards and one touchdown. Mathews was mostly a pass catcher in 2011 but has added more than 20 pounds to his frame and will look to be more of a complete tight end in 2012.

Kaneakua Friel will be back after seeing time last season when injuries began piling up. He caught seven passes for 55 yards and one touchdown.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Eathyn Manumaleuna and Romney Fuga return as seniors to anchor the defensive line. BYU will get back two returned missionaries with a rare three years starting experience under their belts in seniors Russell Tialavea and Ian Dulan. The Cougars add community college transfer Marques Johnson for even more depth.

Several key rotation players are back, including Simote Vea, Jordan Richardson, and Mike Muehlmann. Sixfoot-6, 270-pound Ezekiel Ansah may spend some time at defensive end after playing outside linebacker the last two seasons. Freshman Moses Kaumatule and sophomore Justin Blackmore could also contribute as well as some incoming freshmen, such as Theodore King.











LINEBACKER

A key part to BYU's defense, the Cougars return three out of four starters at linebacker. Kyle Van Noy, Brandon Ogletree and Uona Kaveinga all return and will be joined by Spencer Hadley, moving from inside to outside to help fill the void left by Jordan Pendleton. Reserve outside linebacker Alani Fua will become more of a significant contributor after a solid 2011 effort and Ezekiel Ansah continues to be a factor on the outside with his size and speed.

Manoa Pikula and Zac Stout will compete to make the two-deep on the inside after redshirt years. BYU also returns several talented line-backers in Tyler Beck, Kevan Bills, Teu Kautai, Lene Lesatele, and Uani 'Unga, a transfer from Oregon State.

CORNERBACK

Preston Hadley tied with Corby Eason for a team-high 14 pass breakups, good for No. 9 in the nation in 2011. With Eason departed and Hadley locking down the boundary side, BYU will need to seek a replacement on the field side. Sophomore Jordan Johnson saw significant time as a redshirt freshman in 2011 and looks to be the heir apparent to Eason. Senior safety Mike Hague can play all over the field and could see time at corner.

There is a lot of returning talent at the position with Robbie Buckner, DeQuan Everett, Cameron Comer and O'Neill Chambers all getting reps.

SAFETY

BYU loses one of two starters at the safety position. Junior Daniel Sorensen started every game at the KAT safety position in 2011 and will continue to top the depth chart there. Seniors Hague and Joe Sampson will also be factors at the safety positions, battling for the open free safety spot or perhaps seeing time together in nickel packages. Sophomore Craig Bills is back from a mission after playing in all 13 games as a freshman in 2009, including one start.

J'ray Galea'i, Chase Pendley and Skye PoVey all return after seeing time on the field last season.



KICKERS

Senior Riley Stephenson will handle the punting duties again after he finished his junior season with a dominating performance in the 2011 Armed Forces Bowl. Stephenson had seven punts dropped inside the 20 in the final game and finished the season with 20 punts inside the 20 and 15 boots of 50 or more yards. Stephenson can handle kickoff and field goal duties if necessary but those responsibilities should fall to junior Justin Sorensen. Sorensen was perfect on PATs in 2011 (48 of 48) after returning from a mission and will look to continue in 2012.

RETURNERS

The return game should continue to be a game-changer in 2012 with both kick returner Cody Hoffman and punt returner JD Falslev back for their junior seasons. Hoffman returned a school-record 36 kicks for 879 yards for an average of 24.42 yards. He returned one kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown, the first by a BYU player since 1998. Falslev finished the year with a 10.0-yard punt return average, No. 29 in the nation. The Cache Valley product took a punt 67 yards to the house for a score, BYU's first punt return for a touchdown since 2006.

Last season senior Mike Hague and sophomore Jordan Johnson also factored into the return game and are back in 2012. After a year away from football O'neill Chambers is back as another option for both punt and kick returns.

2012 Storylines to Watch

WINNING GAMES

BYU is in search of its sixth 10-win season in the last seven years. BYU has accomplished that feat one other time in school history. The Cougars won at least 10 games for six of seven years from 1979 to 1985. BYU won seven games in 2010 and eight games in 1982.

ROAD WARRIORS

Playing back-to-back road games may seem like something unordinary, but BYU has done it every year of Bronco Mendenhall's tenure. The Cougars have gone 11-7 under Mendenhall in back-to-back road games. In 2012 however, BYU will pull off three sets of back-to-back affairs, marking the sixth season in program history the Cougars will play such a schedule, the last coming in 1981. Also of note, of BYU's six road opponents, four of them played in bowl games.

FINALLY FULL-TIME

Though he is a senior, quarterback Riley Nelson is embarking on his first season being named the starter without any other storyline to watch. During his time at Utah State. Nelson was inserted into the starting role for the final eight games of the year as a true freshman. After transferring to BYU he backed up Max Hall in 2009 and then in 2010 split time with Jake Heaps before suffering a season-ending injury. In 2011 Nelson backed up Heaps before eventually taking over the starting duties midway through the season. The 2012 season marks the first time he will get all of the starters reps in practice during spring ball, fall camp and heading into the season.

THE HOFF WATCH

Wide receiver Cody Hoffman set the single-season school record for kick-off returns and return yards in 2011 with 36 returns for 879 yards. He recorded 1,825 all-purpose yards, the sixth-best mark by a BYU player

in a single season. He currently sits at No. 29 in career receiving yards (1,470) and receptions (103), No. 21 on the career all-purpose yardage list (2,732), No. 5 in career kickoff return yards (1,259) and No. 4 in total kick returns (50).

SEASONED VETERANS RETURN FROM MISSIONS

The Cougars typically have 30-40 missionaries out in the mission field at any given time, returning anywhere from 10-15 each season. This year BYU gets a rarity in two seniors with starting experience returning from LDS missions served after their junior seasons instead of the much more typical freshman seasons. Senior defensive lineman Ian Dulan returned before last season but redshirted and will play as a senior while fellow lineman Russell Tialavea returned in January of 2012 and will play his final season this year. Dulan has played in 30 games, totaling 51 tackles, including 8.5 tackles for loss. Tialavea has 34 games under his belt, registering 50 tackles and 6.0 tackles for loss.

A KVN PRODUCTION

Kyle Van Noy became a one-man wrecking crew at times in 2011, making plays all over the field for the Cougars. From starting the season off with a game-winning fumble recovery for a touchdown to recording a career-best five tackles for loss in the Armed Forces Bowl, Van Nov made himself into a force to be reckoned with on the defensive side of the ball. In fact, Van Noy was the only FBS Division I player in 2011 to record a stat in every major defensive category including: tackle, tackle for loss, sack, interception, forced fumble, fumble recovery, pass breakup, quarterback hurry, blocked kick and eve scored a touchdown. He was second on the team with 68 total tackles and led in tackles for loss (15) and sacks (7.0).









WORTH NOTING

BYU is one of only two schools in the nation to have its basketball and football coaches each in the top 10 winning percentage among active coaches. Bronco Mendenhall is currently 8th while basketball coach Dave Rose is 4th, (Ohio State: Urban Meyer, Thad Matta).

BYU has a proven system in place under Bronco Mendenhall. In his seven years as head coach, Mendenhall has the highest win percentage in BYU history at .733 (66-24). His 66 wins are the most by a BYU coach in his first seven years of coaching.

BYU has a 60-18 record the last six seasons, which ranks tied for No. 10 nationally in that time. Only 9 teams have more wins over the last six seasons (Boise State 73-6, TCU 66-12, LSU 64-16, Oklahoma 64-18, Florida 63-18, Virginia Tech 63-19, Ohio State 62-16, USC 61-16, Alabama 61-19)

BYU has been invited to seven-straight bowl games, won five of its last six bowls and won three straight, a program record. BYU is one of only seven schools to win five bowl games in the last six seasons.

BYU is tied for fifth among teams with the most 10-win seasons in the past seven years. In the last seven seasons, BYU has five 10-win seasons. Only four teams have had more 10-win seasons (Va. Tech, Boise State, Ohio State and TCU) over the past seven years, and BYU is one of just 12 programs with at least five double-digit victories in the past seven years.

After three losing seasons from 2002-04, BYU has earned a 66-24 record over the past seven season under head coach Bronco Mendenhall to rank No. 15 in total wins among all teams in the nation during that span. The Cougars are one of only six schools to win 10 or more games five different seasons during the past six years. Overall, only two teams have have done better by achieving double-digit wins in each of the last six years (Va. Tech and Boise State, 6 times each).

In the past seven seasons BYU has achieved top-25 rankings in various national statistical categories 88 times

(46 offense, 32 defense, 9 special teams, 1 misc.). In 2011 BYU had top-25 ratings in 23 categories, including 8 top-10 ratings. In Mendenhall's seven seasons, the Cougars have achieved 55 top-15 statistical rankings, 37 top-10 rankings and 19 top-5 rankings.

BYU consistently has one of the top attendance averages in the West. In 2011, BYU's average home attendance of 60,265 ranked No. 3 in the West behind only USC and Washington.

In the past seven seasons since Bronco Mendenhall took over as BYU's head coach, BYU has produced seven Academic All-Americans, which ranks tied for third among all Division I (FBS) programs in that timespan.

BYU has been ranked in the Top 25 during each of the past six seasons, including a place in the final national polls five of the past six seasons.

BYU IN NATIONAL STATISTICAL CATEGORIES

In the past seven seasons BYU has achieved top-25 rankings in various national statistical categories 88 times (46 offense, 32 defense, 9 special teams, 1 misc.). In 2011 BYU had top-25 ratings in 23 categories, including 8 top-10 ratings. BYU, ESPN PARTNERSHIP

On September 1st, 2010, BYU took a step in a new direction when it announced it would begin competition as a football independent for the 2011 season. The Cougars finished the inaugural independent campaign with a 10-3 record and its third-straight bowl victory.

BYU also embarked on the first year of an 8-year partnership with ESPN to televise Cougar football on the sports leader's family of networks. BYU is the only school with an exclusive television deal with ESPN and played 11 games on one of the ESPN networks in 2011, including five on ESPN, four on ESPN2 and two on ESPNU.

"BYU is nationally recognized as an outstanding university and for the history and tradition of its premier athletic programs," said Burke Magnus, ESPN senior vice president, college sports programming. "Once BYU decided to chart an independent course for football, we both recognized it is a good opportunity to build and grow our strong 30-year relationship. With this agreement, college football fans around the country will see the quality and pageantry of BYU as well as the passion and enthusiasm of its supporters."

One of the most important goals in becoming an independent was the opportunity for more national exposure for the university and its football program. BYU also sought better access for the Cougars' national fan base and the opportunity to schedule high-profile opponents.

"We've long sought broad, nationwide access to our games for our fans and increased visibility among those who may be less familiar with our university and athletic programs," said BYU President Cecil O. Samuelson. "We've also been looking for ways to take better advantage of our own unique broadcasting resources."

As it was in 2011, every 2012 BYU home football game will be televised to a live national audience on the ESPN family of networks or BYUtv. Additionally, BYU fans will be able to view same-day rebroadcasts on BYUtv of every

home game and any away game to which ESPN has the rights through conference agreements with the host team.

BYU is the first football program to garner its own exclusive deal with ESPN to broadcast its games. ESPN and ESPN2 are both available in 99 million homes, while the 24-hour college sports network ESPNU is distributed to approximately 73 million homes. ESPN also produces college football games that are broadcast on ABC.

Each year, a minimum of three home games will be carried on ESPN, ESPN2, or ABC. Additional games will be on ESPNU. At least one game each season will be carried live on BYUtv.

BYUtv is available in more than 60 million North American homes and is growing every month. It's on the basic tier of both Dish and DirectTV and is carried by more than 500 cable systems. The network constructed its own state-of-the-art production building that will allow it to televise every game in HD, along with its HD truck with the capability of broadcasting while on the road.

Competing as an independent also allows BYU the opportunity to play a unique and challenging schedule. In 2011 BYU played teams from the SEC, Pac-12, Big 12, Conference USA, Western Athletic Conference and Mountain West. For the upcoming 2012 season, the Cougars will compete against Notre Dame and teams from the Pac 12, ACC, MW and WAC. BYU has future games announced with West Virginia, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, Texas, UCF, East Carolina, Houston, Boise State and Hawai'i.

Postseason play has also been a focus and after competing in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in 2011, BYU has found a home for the '12 and '13 seasons if bowl eligible and not selected to a BCS bowl. The Cougars are slated play in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl in 2012 and travel to San Francisco for the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl following the 2013 regular season.

BYU found success in its first year as an independent and the future will be an exciting time for the school, the program and its worldwide audience.





TRADITION SPIRIT HONOR

Playing football at BYU is a unique experience unlike any other in college athletics. With a heritage that runs deep in on-and-off the field success, members of the team are expected to do all things at a "higher level," in every aspect of life. The program is guided by three distinct principles: tradition, spirit and honor.

TRADITION

BYU's football history is packed full of championships, bowl games and national honors. This tradition is something every player that passes through the program will become a part of and appreciate. Since 1974 BYU has played in 30 bowl games, won a National Championship, claimed 23 conference titles and earned 18 national top-25 finishes, including four top-10 finishes. Under head coach Bronco Mendenhall, BYU has posted a record of 66-24, won at least 10 games five of the last six years and gone to seven straight bowl games, winning three in a row. Since the 1970s, BYU has established itself as one of the top football programs in the West.

More than 60 percent of BYU's team has served a two-year Church mission. All of BYU's players take part in service opportunities throughout the community. This principle is a large factor in BYU's recruiting approach. Coaches evaluate not only the playing ability and academic achievement of possible recruits but also their moral character. BYU makes it a priority to develop a player's faith, and help make men of strength, courage, fortitude, and service.





As the head coach at Brigham Young University, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that was coming off three losing seasons, Mendenhall has guided his teams to seven straight bowl invitations, two outright conference championships and regular national top-25 rankings. The Cougars finished their first season as a football independent in 2011 with a 10-3 record and No. 25 final ranking to finish nationally ranked for the fifth time in the last six seasons.

Under his leadership, BYU has earned a 66-24 (.733) record over the past seven seasons to rank No. 15 in total wins among all teams in the nation during that span. The Cougars have received seven straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first seven teams to a bowl game.

Mendenhall has led BYU to bowl wins in five of the last six seasons to become the first Cougar teams to ever win five bowls in a six-year span and to win three in a row. Nationally, BYU is one of only seven programs to win five bowl games in the last six seasons. The Cougars have also won 10 or more games in five of the past six seasons and five of Mendenhall's seven seasons overall. In fact, only four programs have had more 10-win seasons over the past seven years.

After a 6-6 first season in 2005, the Cougars have achieved a 60-18 record over the past six years -- only nine teams have more wins over that span. BYU is one of only six FBS programs to win 10 or more games during at least five of the last six seasons, and BYU and Boise State are the only programs in the West to achieve that consistent level of success. From 2006-2009 Mendenhall guided the Cougars to four straight seasons with 10 or more wins for the first time in school history.

BYU's success under Mendenhall is also evident in the national rankings and NCAA statistics. BYU has finished ranked in the top 25 in various national statistical categories 88 times in the past seven seasons (46 offense, 32 defense, 9 special teams, 1 misc.). The Cougars have achieved 55 top-15 statistical rankings, 37 top-10 rankings and 19 top-5 rankings in that span. The Cougars have also been ranked in the top-25 polls during each of the past six seasons and finished ranked No. 12 following the 2009 season -- the program's highest final ranking since finishing No. 5 in 1996.

Another hallmark of Mendenhall's program has been the emphasis on balance and priorities in the many other facets of life outside of football. Reflecting that emphasis, BYU consistently received the most academic all-conference honorees each season as a conference member and ranks tied for third nationally for Academic All-America recipients over Mendenhall's seven seasons at the helm. Seven Cougar student-athletes have been named ESPN Academic All-Americans in that span. Among all FBS schools only Penn State and Nebraska have had more during that period.

Before going independent in 2011, BYU was consistently a top MWC contender under Mendenhall. BYU achieved a 39-9 (.813) conference record over the prior six years to help the Cougars complete their 12-year tenure in the MWC with 64 conference wins -- the most of any MWC school in the span. Mendenhall has also helped the Cougars bring bowl wins over Oregon, UCLA, Oregon State, LITEP and Tulsa

Mendenhall also serves as the team's defensive coordinator. The Cougars had the nation's No. 13 defense in 2011 to help BYU become one of only 11 programs to receive a final Top 25 overall team ranking in at least one of the two major polls during five of the past six seasons. BYU is one of only nine teams to do so in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In 2010, BYU's 52-24 New Mexico Bowl victory highlighted the progress and momentum the relatively young team gained over the course of the season as several fresh-

men played big roles in the seasonending victory. Redshirt freshman wide receiver Cody Hoffman caught three touchdowns on eight receptions for 137 yards in the bowl win, while true freshman running back Joshua Quezada ran for 101 yards on 15 carries and one touchdown.

While recording an 11-2 record and 7-1 league mark in 2009, Mendenhall's team went 3-1 against ranked opponents, including a 14-13 season-opening win over No. 3 Oklahoma and a 44-20 season-finale Maaco Bowl Las Vegas victory over No. 16 Oregon State. BYU finished No. 12 in the final 2009 polls to earn the distinction of being one of only six programs nationally to be ranked in both final polls for four straight seasons.

In 2008, BYU finished 10-3 overall and 6-2 in the MWC to achieve three straight 10-win seasons and become the first teams in Cougar history to go unbeaten at home over three consecutive seasons. Mendenhall coached

the Cougars to back-to-back 11-2 seasons in 2006 and 2007 while claiming consecutive outright MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents.

Following the 2006 season,
Mendenhall was named the American
Football Coaches Association Region
5 Coach of the Year. In addition,
the Football Writers Association of
America named Mendenhall one
of nine finalists for the prestigious
Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year
Award. On November 17, 2007,
Mendenhall led the Cougars to a
35-10 victory over Wyoming to record
his 25th career win. With the victory,
Mendenhall became the only coach
in BYU football history to win 25
games in his first 35 attempts.

In his first year in 2005 after taking over a program coming off three losing seasons, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Maaco Bowl Las Vegas -- the team's first postseason bowl appearance in three seasons. The Cougars finished tied

for second in the MWC with a 5-3 league ledger.

BYU recruits have earned Freshman All-America recognition each of Mendenhall's seven seasons as the Cougars continue to demonstrate through their recruiting efforts how they are strengthening the program with talented players and quality individuals.

Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater. Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell, Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary



coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.


Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. They have three sons.

Tom Holmoe was named Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University on March 1, 2005. He oversees a nationally recognized program with 21 intercollegiate sports, involving more than 600 student-athletes and a 150-person staff.

Since Holmoe's appointment, BYU has had more than 100 student-athletes earn All-America status. Holmoe has directed Cougar athletic programs to new conferences affiliations in 2011 and helped the football program into uncharted territory as an independent. Over the past five years, both the football and men's basketball teams have enjoyed tremendous success. BYU has won at least 10 football games five of the last six years and the men's basketball program has won at least 25 games six years in a row.

A former Cougar defensive back from 1978-82, Holmoe returned to BYU in July 2001 as Associate Athletics Director for Development. As part of his responsibilities, he supervised the Cougar Club, served as the department's liaison with the LDS Foundation, served on the BYU Alumni Association Board of Directors and worked on the capital campaign to raise funds for the University's new athletic facilities. Holmoe currently serves on the BCS Athletics Directors Advisory Committee.

A native of La Crescenta, Calif., Holmoe came to BYU on a football scholarship in 1978. He became a starter as a sophomore and went on to earn first-team All-WAC honors as a senior in 1982. Holmoe was selected in the fourth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Over a seven-year NFL career, he played on three Super Bowl championship teams with the 49ers. After retiring from professional football, Holmoe returned to BYU to serve as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards from 1990-91. He then accepted an offer from Bill Walsh to become the Stanford secondary coach in 1992, where he remained for two seasons. In 1994, he returned to the 49ers as defensive backfield coach for two seasons, where he earned a fourth Super Bowl ring. Two years later Holmoe joined the University of California staff as defensive coordinator and later became the head coach from 1997-2001.

Holmoe graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology in 1983 and received a master's degree from BYU in athletic administration in 1995. He and his wife, Lori, have four children: Shannon Packard, Danny, Erik, and Lauren.


DISTINGUISHED FACULTY

Faculty members hold advanced degrees from universities around the world. Their achievements are compelling and wide-ranging as they pursue consequential research work that is making a real difference. Alleviating hunger worldwide through more efficient agriculture, finding low-pollution energy alternatives and making significant contributions to the strengthening of families are among their many pursuits. Faculty members are regularly called upon to head national and international professional organizations and to consult with corporate and governmental entities. Above all, these high-principled men and women share an unmatched devotion to bringing the best possible education to their students.

BYU's campus is in Provo, Utah, a city of 124,496 located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City. Provo sits 4,560 feet above sea level and rests between 23-mile-long Utah Lake and the towering peaks of the Wasatch Mountains. The 560-acre campus has 284 total buildings; 78 for academics, 61 for administration and 145 for housing.

PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE

A strong curriculum delivered by outstanding faculty is key to the academic excellence of BYU graduates. From business management to nursing, from the humanities to engineering, the University's 11 colleges -- supported by comprehensive offerings from religious education -- continue to be internationally recognized for the quality of their education and the professional preparation they provide. In addition to the challenging course work and hands-on research, numerous programs offer academic and service outreach opportunities. Study abroad centers, distance-learning courses and worldwide performing arts tours are a few of the offerings that enrich BYU's academic experience.





COUGARS ON MISSIONS

ne of the first questions Bronco Mendenhall was asked after becoming the head coach at BYU was what he thought about the missionary program and if he felt it helped or hurt the BYU football program.

"Serving missions is what makes this team, this university and the Church unique," Mendenhall said. "These unique characteristics are based upon sound principles and values. Why would we not embrace them?"

Brigham Young University is owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of the Church is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. Since the organization of the Church in 1830, over one million missionaries have served.

The Church operates 340 missions around the world in 145 nations, speaking 164 languages. A mission covers a geographic area and has a central headquarters. Each is presided over by a mission president, who is called from the ranks of the Church membership to serve for a period of three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

More than 52,400 missionaries representing The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are currently serving proselytizing missions. Seventy-five percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. A substantial number of young women and older couples also serve proselytizing missions.

Missionaries work long hours—seven days a week for two years or 18 months for women and other extended periods of time for couples—teaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ and participating in community service.

In addition, about 5,100 individuals (including couples) are given special service assignments. Health specialists and doctors go to developing countries where the Church's health services program teaches preventive care. Craftsmen, artisans and construction supervisors train members in local building projects. Agricultural experts train people to produce food more effectively and economically. Other mission assignments include education, family history research and leadership training.

The missionaries and/or their families donate money to the Church to pay for their personal expenses. When his or her assignment is completed, the missionary returns home to pursue vocational, academic or other personal goals. Aside

Of the BYU football student-athletes slated to participate in 2012, 77 have served full-time, two-year missions in over 30 different countries countries around the world, including Australia, Brazil, Madagascar, Chile, England, Germany, Honduras, Japan, Philippines, India, Russia, Samoa, South Korea and Sweden—just to name a few. Another 38 are currently serving as missionaries.

from their brief orientation at a missionary training center, missionaries receive little formal training for their ministry. Missionary preparation comes primarily from personal study and, in many cases, from examples taught in the home from childhood.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With over 14 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

"The BYU donors and fans make all the difference," says Cougar Club Executive Director Michael Middleton. "For our teams to continue to achieve national prominence, the Cougar Club needs to continue to grow."

FUNDING

Cougar Club donations are used for many vital projects, including:

STUDENT ATHLETE BUILDING









■ EQUIPMENT AND LOCKER ROOMS

The 75-yard-long locker room is patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles. There is also a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the offseason.

TRAINING FACILITIES

Sponsored by Dynatronics, this area features a rehabilitation room and a hydro area with a cold pool, a hot tub with power jets, a treadmill pool with two cameras and a doctor's office. Trainers provide electrical stimulation and ultra sound treatments as well as bikes, treadmills and Cybex machines.

■ STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

Most of the Strength and Conditioning Center's equipment was custom built by Free Motion and is sponsored by Icon Heath and Fitness. Among the features are 12 full power racks with platforms, seven half racks, three jerk racks, Sorinex hurricane racks, reverse hypers, Agaton Fitness Systems, an outdoor mondo plyometric warmup area, two super leg drive sleds, two different dumbbell areas and a medicine ball wall. The first floor also has a nutrition area sponsored by Pharmanex. The second floor is the speed development area and has Tomahawk spinning bikes and TVs, five Nordic Track incline trainers, three Versaclimbers, two Scifit upper body bikes, Woodway force treadmills, H/P Cosmos treadmills with Pneu Weight devices, vibratory boards, a step mill, a turfed agility drill area with resistance and a testing area.

■ STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC CENTER

Tutors and mentors work through these offices. Athletes have access to 42 computer stations, an interactive classroom, 10 small study areas and one large quiet room. Also on staff are a sports psychologist and a nutritionist.

LEGENDS GRILLE

Fans, coaches and athletes can view 11 plasma TV screens, a ticker tape with world wide sports scores or view specialty events on a projection screen while catching a bite to eat.

■ INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

The IPF is 422 feet wide and 222 feet deep with a height of 86 feet at the center (106,000 square feet). Among its features are two artificial turf fields (55 yards & 65 yards), retractable goalposts on each end, a sideline staging facility for offensive linemen and four batting cages. The indoor surface is field turf and the building features four video platforms located 40 feet above the playing surface. The IPF serves as an indoor practice arena for the football, soccer, golf, baseball and softball teams and a variety of other sports programs, including extramurals and intramurals.

LAVELL EDWARDS STADIUM

PICTURE PERFECT

With its 63,470-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 30 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.


THE FIELD

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

EXPANSION/SEATING CAPACITY

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships). The stadium expansion increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reportedly "the largest gathering ever in Utah history" at the time. In 2003 BYU added a luxury "Club Seating" area to the east stands taking the capacity of Edwards Stadium down to 64,045. In 2010 and 2011 BYU created additional wheelchair access inside the stadium, which reduced the capacity by 575 seats to 63,470.



While BYU has never played in the Poinsettia Bowl, it is no stranger to playing football in Qualcomm Stadium, or to a MW opponent. The Cougars played in 11 Holilday Bowls at Qualcomm, formerly known as Jack Murphy Stadium, from 1978-93, including a string of seven consecutive trips from 78-84. It was the site of BYU's historic "Miracle Bowl" comeback, featuring a Jim McMahon led squad that came back from a 45-25 deficit with just four minutes remaining in the game to win 46-45 over the SMU

Mustangs. The Cougars wrapped up their undefeated 1984 National Championship season on the same field, defeating Michigan 24-17.

BYU has also visited San Diego 16 times since 1947 to play the Aztecs of San Diego State as members of the Western Athletic Conference and MW. The Cougars have a 14-11-2 record in San Diego, including bowl games.

While BYU played in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in 2011, and could end up in San Diego this year, independence has allowed the Cougars to travel to bowl games it has never been able to be a part of. BYU has an agreement for the 2013 season to travel to San Francisco for the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl at AT&T Park, another new bowl site.

BYU has an extensive bowl history that dates back to the 1974 Fiesta Bowl. Since then, the Cougars have been invited to 30 bowls, including a 24-21 victory over Tulsa in the 2011 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl, BYU's fifth bowl win in the last six years.



2011 SEASON IN REVIEW

Playing its first season as an independent program, BYU finished a unique and challenging year with familiar results, 10 wins, a bowl victory and thrilling finishes.

With a 10-3 record, BYU claimed its fifth 10-win season in Bronco Mendenhall's seven-year head coaching tenure. Mendenhall joins Oklahoma's Bob Stoops and Georgia's Mark Richt as the only three active FBS coaches with five 10-win seasons in their first seven FBS head coaching seasons.

After finishing the regular season with nine wins, BYU matched up against the Tulsa Golden Hurricane for its first-ever trip to the Armed Forces Bowl. The Cougars relied on defense, special teams and the playmaking ability of its offensive leaders en route to its 10th victory of the year.

Trailing 14-3 with under 30 seconds until halftime, deep snapper Reed Hornung ran down the field and caused Tulsa to fumble the punt with David Foote recovering the football at the Tulsa 17-yard line. Offensive lineman Matt Reynolds lost his helmet on the ensuing play but didn't quit, throwing one more block for quarterback Riley Nelson who had just enough time to find wide receiver Cody Hoffman stretching into the end zone for a touchdown, cutting the lead to 14-10 at the break.

The game went back and forth and came down to a final drive for the Cougars, trailing 21-17 to the Golden Hurricane. The offense took over with 4:18 remaining but then faced a 4th-and-9 play at midfield. Somehow Nelson evaded defenders and scrambled for a 14-yard gain to prolong the drive. With 11 seconds left from the 2-yard line, Nelson appeared to be spiking the ball to stop the clock to set up one more play but instead faked the spike and threw to an open Hoffman just past the goal line for the game-winning touchdown. Hoffman was named the team's MVP of the bowl game with eight receptions, 122 yards and three touchdowns.

BYU became one of only seven schools to win five bowl games in the last six seasons. The Cougars have been invited to seven straight bowl games under Bronco Mendenhall and have a 5-2 bowl record in those games. BYU's bowl victory this year marks the first time BYU teams have won three straight bowl games and the only time the Cougars have achieved five bowl victories in a six-year period.

BYU's bowl victory exemplified the evolution of a team relying on grit and determination over the course of a truly unique season heading into uncharted territory as an independent program.

BYU started the season 2-2, winning on the road against Southeastern Conference opponent Ole Miss and dropping a tough one-point game at Texas. The Cougars then suffered from turnover problems, losing to Utah in Provo before edging

UCF in a close game. After an up and down first four games, BYU's season turned the corner in the fifth game against instate foe Utah State.

Trailing 24-13 with 5:06 remaining in the third quarter, backup quarterback Riley Nelson was inserted to try to spark the offense in place of starter Jake Heaps.

After getting one score to cut the lead to 24-20, BYU began its game-winning drive from its own 4-yard line with 2:36 remaining in the game. A pivotal point in the drive, Nelson scrambled on a 2nd-and-10 play and eventually found wide receiver McKay Jacobson down the middle of the field for a 40-yard gain with less than one minute remaining. With 11 seconds left, Nelson's final pass was tipped and fell right into the hands of tight end Marcus Mathews in the end zone for the game-winning score. In just one quarter and about five minutes, Nelson went 10 of 14 for 144 yards, two touchdowns and rushed for 62 yards on 11 carries.

Following his performance against the Aggies, Nelson was given the opportunity to start the second half of the year. The Logan, Utah, native went on to lead BYU to a 6-1 record as a starter, passing for 1,717 yards, 19 touchdowns and seven interceptions. Nelson added 392 rushing yards and one touchdown on 88 carries. His pass efficiency rating of 152.93 to finish the year was No. 16 in the country.

BYU's team underwent several changes throughout the year and saw drastic improvements, especially to the offense. In BYU's first five games before Nelson took over at quarterback, BYU was ranked No. 78 in third-down conversions, converting 38.96 percent (30/77). When Nelson took over, the Cougars were No. 1 in the nation over the next seven games. In October BYU converted 66.00 percent (33/50) and in November converted 70.37 percent (19/27). Overall, BYU improved to end the season No. 5 overall on third downs at a rate of 51.31 (98/191).

Averaging just 18.2 points per game the first five games of the season, BYU went on to average 37.5 for the final eight games. The run game improved as well, averaging 94.4 yards on the ground in the first five and then more than doubling that average for the remaining eight games, going for 201.5 yards per game. The Cougar ground game had a season-high 290 rushing yards vs. Idaho State.

Defensively, BYU saw consistent effort and tough, physical play on that side of the ball. The Cougars finished with the No. 13 ranked overall defense, allowing 312.9 total yards per game. Always a focal point, the run-stopping effort held opponents under 100 total yards rushing eight times on the season and allowed less than 40 yards three times. BYU's pass efficiency defense was also very good, finishing No. 15, allowing

a rating of 112.58. The Cougars held five teams to less than 150 passing yards. The red zone defense was a big factor in keeping points off the board, allowing opponents to score touchdowns on just 44.4 percent of their trips inside the red zone, tied for the fifth-best mark in the nation.

Following the Utah State game, BYU won three straight, topping San Jose State and Oregon State on the road while beating Idaho State at home. The Cougars dropped a tough one to TCU at Dallas Cowboys Stadium but rebounded by winning their final three regular-season games, including a road trip to renew an old rivalry with Hawai'i in the last game.

At Hawai'i, BYU trailed 13-10 at halftime but exploded in the second half, rattling off 31 unanswered points and cruising to a 41-20 win. Nelson was questionable to start the game after suffering a collapsed lung and rib injuries three weeks earlier. He wouldn't be denied the chance to play and went on to have a career day, completing 25 of 37 passes for 363 yards and three touchdowns to finish the regular season and send BYU to another bowl game.

In its first year as an independent, BYU played 11 games on one of the ESPN networks in 2011, including five on ESPN, four on ESPN2 and two on ESPNU. The Cougars played teams from the SEC, Big 12, Pac-12, Conference USA, Mountain West and Western Athletic Conference. BYU had 17 selections to the Phil Steele All-Independent First and Second Teams, eight All-Independent honorees by Yahoo! Sports and seven players named to the inaugural FBS All-Independent Team.

Individually, wide receiver and kick returner Cody Hoffman had a breakout year, putting together one of the best all-around offensive years by a player in BYU history. The 6-foot-4, 208-pounder led the team in every receiving category with 61 receptions for 943 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also set program records with 36 kick returns for 879 yards, including the first kickoff return for a touchdown by a BYU player since 1998, a 93-yard return vs. UCF. Hoffman finished with 1,825 all-purpose yards, good for the sixth-best mark in program history.

The Cougars used a stable of running backs throughout the year. Senior JJ Di Luigi led the team for the second-straight year in rushing with 584 yards in 2011. He finished his BYU career as one of the most versatile players in school history recording 3,088 career all-purpose yards for No. 15 in school history. Bryan Kariya also graduated and led the team

with six rushing touchdowns. A Chinese major, Kariya was named Academic All-District for the second-straight year with a 3.9 GPA. Sophomore Michael Alisa emerged as a future star, finishing second on the team with 455 rushing yards.

On the defensive side of the ball, linebacker Kyle Van Noy became a huge playmaker, finishing the season leading the team in sacks (7.0) and tackles for loss (15.0). In fact, Van Noy was the only Division I player to record a stat in every major defensive statistic: tackle, tackle for loss, sack, interception, forced fumble, fumble recovery, quarterback hurry, pass breakup, blocked kick and defensive touchdown.

Linebacker Brandon Ogletree led the team in tackles with 76 total tackles and fellow inside backer Uona Kaveinga tied a school record with four forced fumbles on the year. Outside linebacker Jordan Pendleton wrapped up his Cougar career and finished second on the team with 8.5 tackles for loss despite playing in only seven games due to injury. Corner backs Preston Hadley and Corby Eason had 14 pass breakups apiece, tied for No. 9 in the nation.

BYU will look to build on 2011 as it prepares for exciting possibilities awaiting the 2012 season.

BYU - 14 OLE MISS - 13

On a day when defense dominated, the BYU football team scored 14 points in the fourth guarter to defeat the Ole Miss Rebels 14-13 at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium on Saturday. With Ole Miss facing a third-and-27 attempt from its own 21-yard line, the BYU defense came up with the play of the game. Trailing 13-7, sophomore linebacker Kyle Van Noy got into the backfield to force Rebel guarterback Zack Stoudt to fumble. Van Noy then picked up the ball near the goal line and made it into the end zone from three yards out to score a touchdown, giving BYU its first lead of the game after Justin Sorensen tacked on the extra point with 5:09 remaining in the game. The score would prove to be the difference. The defense, which gave up just two field goals on the day, held Ole Miss to give BYU the victory on the road for its first win in the independence era and just the second win over a Southeastern Conference team in program history. Sophomore Jake Heaps finished the day 24 of 38 for 225 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Freshman Ross Apo led all receivers with four catches for 46 yards and one touchdown reception. BYU's defense stole the show however, holding Ole Miss to 208 total yards and just 64 yards rushing. Safety Daniel Sorensen and linebackers Jordan Pendleton and Brandon Ogletree each had six tackles to lead BYU.

Fueled by a strong second-half Texas performance, the BYU football team fell 17-16 on the road to the No. 21 Longhorns Saturday at Darrell K. Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium in front of 100,995 - the largest crowd ever to witness a BYU football game. Texas converted its game-winning score after getting the passing game going midway through the fourth quarter. Receiver Jaxon Shipley caught two passes for 34 yards before the Longhorns reached the end zone on a 4-yard run from running back Cody Johnson. After the ensuing extra point, Texas took its first lead of the game at 17-16 with 8:46 remaining. BYU had two chances to take the lead after the Texas score, but the drives ended in a punt and an interception, respectively, enabling the Longhorns to hold on. The Cougars led 13-3 at halftime and held Texas to 88 total yards in the first half, but surrendered 201 yards in the second half while slowing down on offense. Quarterback Jake Heaps finished the day 22 of 38 for 192 yards and one touchdown. Heaps spread the ball around to 11 different receivers, but the ground game could never got going for the Cougars, as BYU picked up just 45 yards on the ground. Linebacker Spencer Hadley led the defense with 12 tackles while safety Travis Uale had nine tackles and an interception. Safety Daniel Sorensen also helped with eight tackles and an interception of his own. BYU scored on three different drives in the first half, with two ending in field goals by sophomore kicker Justin Sorensen, including a career-long conversion from 33 yards. Sorensen was 3 of 3 on field goals for the game.

The BYU football team couldn't overcome seven turnovers and fell to the University of Utah 54-10 on Saturday in the Deseret First Duel at LaVell Edwards Stadium. After BYU took a 10-7 lead in the second guarter Utah went on to score 47 unanswered points and picked up 481 total yards against a tired Cougar defense that spent much of the second half on the field. BYU lost six fumbles and threw one interception, several of the turnovers leading directly to Ute scores. Quarterback Jake Heaps found his first 300-yard passing game amidst the loss, going 27 of 50 for 305 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Wide receiver Cody Hoffman was also a bright spot, rolling up a career-high 277 all-purpose yards, the sixth-highest total for a single game in BYU history. Hoffman had a career-high 138 receiving yards on eight catches while returning eight kicks for 139 yards. Utah led 14-10 going in to the break. BYU's problems would only get worse as the game continued. Turnovers would continue to plague the Cougars with Heaps fumbling at the BYU six-yard line, giving the Utes possession again. This time Utah added a field goal at the start of the fourth quarter, giving them a 33-10 lead. The Utes would run away with the game, scoring three more rushing touchdowns en route to the victory.

Special teams, defense and the running game helped the BYU football team hang on to a 24-17 win against the UCF Knights at LaVell Edwards Stadium in front of 59,874 fans on Friday. Defensive back Joe Sampson intercepted a pass tipped by linebacker Kyle Van Noy at the BYU threeyard line to save a potential game-tying touchdown with 3:10 left in the game. UCF got the ball back with just over one minute remaining but sacks by Van Nov and defensive end Mike Muehlmann sealed the victory for the Cougars. The back-andforth finish to the game also featured wide receiver Cody Hoffman taking a kickoff 93 yards to the house for a touchdown to tie the score at 17-17 in the third quarter. The touchdown return was the first by a BYU player since 1998 when Mike Rigell ran one back 96 yards against Hawaii. The special teams unit struck again in the fourth guarter when Michael Alisa recovered a muffed punt at the Knights 8-yard line, setting up BYU's go-ahead score from running back Bryan Kariya on a 6-yard run with 10:29 left in the game. Kariya had 14 carries for 52 yards and one touchdown and caught two passes for 11 yards. Running back JJ Di Luigi rushed seven times for 38 yards, including a 16-yard touchdown run to go along with a pair of receptions for 16 yards. Altogether, BYU's running backs had their highest output of the season with 127 yards on the ground.

Quarterback Riley Nelson connected with tight end Marcus Mathews off a deflected pass for a 13-yard touchdown with 11 seconds left on the clock to give the BYU football team a 27-24 comefrom-behind victory over the Utah State Aggies on Friday night in front of a sold-out crowd of 63,513 fans at LaVell Edwards Stadium. Starting at the BYU 4-yard line, the 96-yard winning drive started with just 2:36 remaining in the game. Nelson created play after play with his feet, highlighted by a 40-yard pass to wide receiver McKay Jacobson. Nelson completed 4 of 5 passes for 66 yards and rushed four times for 30 yards on the drive. The Cougars rattled off 14 points in the fourth guarter to come back from a 24-13 Utah State (1-3) lead. Nelson entered the game with 5:06 left in the third quarter and put together two touchdown drives to lead BYU back for the win. He finished the game 10 of 14 passing for a career-high 144 yards with two touchdowns and rushed 11 times for 62 yards. Rushing for its highest total of the season, the Cougar backfield accounted for 200 yards on the ground. Quarterback Riley Nelson threw three early touchdown passes and the BYU football team held off a pesky San Jose State team 29-16 at LaVell Edwards Stadium on Saturday night. BYU used a balanced attack with 224 rushing yards and 219 passing yards to overpower San Jose State and win its third game in a row in front of 59,782 fans. Nelson finished his fourth-career start 14 of 24 passing for 219 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions. The BYU football team suffered from turnovers and mistakes, falling to the TCU Horned Frogs 38-28 on Friday at Cowboys Stadium in front of 50,094 fans. BYU outgained TCU 354 total yards to 283 but couldn't overcome three turnovers, two of which came in the red zone. Quarterback Riley Nelson threw for 215 yards and one touchdown and added another 84 yards rushing but threw two interceptions. Strong defense and consistent offense led the BYU football team to a 42-7 win over the Idaho Vandals on Saturday at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU had a balanced attack of 262 passing yards and 243 rushing yards to help beat Idaho. The Cougar defense held the Vandals to 241 total yards, including just 50 passing yards. BYU limited Idaho to minus-2 passing yards on four complete passes in the first half. Linebacker Kyle Van Noy recorded a career-high 10 tackles, including two tackles for loss, one sack and forced a fumble. Cornerback Jordan Johnson and linebacker Spencer Hadley each intercepted a pass for the Cougars. Quarterback Jake Heaps came in for an injured Riley Nelson in the first quarter and completed 15 of 20 passes for 185 yards and two touchdowns. Nelson was 4 of 7 for 56 yards and one touchdown before leaving with a chest injury. Wide receiver Cody Hoffman caught six passes for 114 yards and two touchdowns, all in the first half. Running back Michael Alisa had 10 carries for 99 yards, including a 38-yard touchdown run, and running back Bryan Kariya scored two touchdowns on the ground while picking up 35 yards. The Cougars missed a field goal on their first possession but went on to score touchdowns on the next five possessions. Nelson completed a 32-yard touchdown pass to Hoffman and gave BYU a 7-0 lead with 8:26 left in the first quarter and then left the game for good.

On Senior Night, the BYU football team overpowered the New Mexico State Aggies for a 42-7 win at LaVell Edwards Stadium on Saturday. Quarterback Jake Heaps completed 21 of 36 passes for 238 yards and tied a career-high with four touchdowns. Three seniors, Matt Marshall, Matthew Edwards and Bryan Kariya, scored touchdowns and BYU held New Mexico State to just 249 total yards, a season low for the Aggies. Senior linebacker Jadon Wagner forced a fumble and recovered another fumble in addition to four tackles. 1.5 tackles for loss and one sack. Defensive back Preston Hadley tied for a teamhigh with seven tackles to go along with two pass breakups. Linebacker Brandon Ogletree also had seven tackles. BYU improved to 9-3 on the year with a highlight-filled 41-20 victory over Hawai'i Saturday afternoon in Aloha Stadium. In BYU's first return to the Islands since 2001, the Cougars put up 28 points in the third guarter to turn a close contest into a blowout victory. Junior quarterback Riley Nelson returned to the lineup after being injured on Nov. 12 against Idaho. Nelson would have a career day, setting personal bests on 25 of 37 passing for 363 yards and three touchdowns. Other top performers for the Cougars included sophomore receiver Cody Hoffman with seven receptions, 123 yards and a touchdown and freshman receiver Ross Apo with two touchdowns on four catches and 55 yards. The Warriors led 13-10 at the half thanks to a 79-yard scoring play with 3:41 to go in the second guarter. BYU only punted once in the first half-a 55-yarder downed inside the 20-yard line-but the Cougars put only 10 points on the scoreboard as two drives ended with missed field goals. Meanwhile, the Cougar defense forced three UH punts while allowing just one sustained drive in addition to Hawai'i's one-play scoring strike. The Cougars broke out in the third quarter with four touchdowns to clearly claim control. While BYU scored on all three of its offensive possessions, the momentum changer came on defense when Uona Kaveinga forced a fumble on Hawai'i's first series and Joe Sampson returned it 26 vards for a touchdown. It was BYU's second fumble return for a touchdown and third defensive score this year and gave BYU a 24-13 lead.

in the game. After finding no one open downfield, Nelson scrambled 14 yards to convert the first down. BYU got the ball down to the 2-yard line before Nelson found Hoffman for his third touchdown catch of the game and the crafty score with 11 seconds left. With the win, BYU (10-3) locked up its fifth 10-win season in the last six years and third bowl victory in a row, its first three-game bowl win streak in program history. Hoffman, named the Armed Forces Bowl Most Outstanding Player for the Cougars finished with eight catches for 122 yards and a bowl-record three touchdowns. BYU struggled on

offense for much of the game with Nelson facing constant pressure and a running game that could never get going. The Cougars finished with 344 total yards and Nelson battled through a tough day, completing 17 of 40 passes for 250 yards and two interceptions, but adding three important touchdowns, including the game-winner. Despite the offensive issues, BYU's defense was stout as usual, surrendering just 272 total yards and only 37 yards on the ground to a Golden Hurricane team that came into the game averaging over 200 rushing yards per game. Van Noy made play after play on defense with 10 tackles to lead the Cougars, including five tackles for loss, two sacks, one forces fumble and one quarterback hurry. Special teams also played a huge role in the game. Punter Riley Stephenson had eight punts for 335 yards, including seven inside the 20-yard line and two punts over 50 yards. BYU's special teams also recovered a muffed punt setting up one touchdown in the game. Tulsa took a 14-3 lead in the second quarter with the help of wide receiver Bryan Burnham catching a 50-yard pass from G.J. Kinne to move downfield. Two plays later Kinne picked up his second touchdown pass of the game on a quick strike to tight end Clay Sears from 14 yards out. With 25 seconds left on the clock in the second quarter, BYU deep snapper Reed Hornung ran down the field on punt coverage and caused Tulsa's returner to muff the kick. The Cougars' David Foote recovered it at the Golden Hurricane 17-yard line. On the ensuing play, Nelson scrambled to his left and received a big block from a helmetless Matt Reynolds and found Hoffman for a 17-yard touchdown pass. The score trimmed Tulsa's lead to 14-10 at halftime. After back-to-back tackles for loss, including a sack from Van Noy, the Golden Hurricane missed a 46-yard field goal attempt. BYU finally capitalized on its strong defense by putting together a 9-play, 71-yard touchdown drive. Nelson threw a 30-yard touchdown pass to Hoffman again to put the Cougars in the lead for the first

time at 17-14 with 1:41 remaining in the third quarter. Tulsa answered with another touchdown drive of its own later on in the fourth quarter. Kinne hurled another pass over the top for a 30-yard touchdown in the corner of the end zone to give the Golden Hurricane a 21-17 lead with 10:42 left. BYU had Tulsa pinned up against the goal line and forced a punt but ran into the kicker to give the Golden Hurricane a new set of downs. The Cougars stopped the drive and punt returner JD Falslev still got BYU in good field position with a 22-yard return to the Tulsa 48-yard line with 4:18 remaining, setting up BYU's game-winning drive. Falslev finished with three punt returns for 44 yards to go along with a pair of receptions for 31 yards.



CONFERENCE HISTORY

On Aug. 31, 2010, BYU announced its football program will compete in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision as an independent beginning with the 2011 season. Since the university instituted a football program in 1922, BYU had been a member of five different conferences, including the Rocky Mountain (1922-37), Mountain States/Skyline (1938-61), Western Athletic (1962-98) and Mountain West (1999-2010). The Cougars claimed their first conference championship in program history in 1965, going 4-2 in the WAC under head coach Tom Hudspeth. BYU won its next title, the first of 18 under legendary coach LaVell Edwards, in 1974. During its time in the MWC, the Cougars won four championships, including back-to-back undefeated conference seasons in 2006 and 2007.

MOUNTAIN WEST (1999-10)

- -- For the third time in program history, BYU chartered the creation of a new conference, this time joined by New Mexico, Utah, Air Force, Colorado St., San Diego St., UNLV and Wyoming. TCU joined in 2005. -- Football posted a 64-26 (.711) conference record in its 12 years in
- the conference.
 -- The Cougars' four MWC titles,
 64 wins and 54 All-MWC First
- Team selections equal or surpass any MWC team since the league's inception.
- -- BYU won four MWC titles, including back-to-back championships in 2006-07. In three of its championship seasons, BYU went undefeated in conference play.

WESTERN ATHLETIC (1962-98)

- -- BYU was a charter member of the conference along with Arizona, Arizona State, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.
- -- The WAC eventually expanded to as many as 16 schools in 1996.
- -- Football posted a 187-69-2 (.729) conference record in its 37 years in the conference.
- -- While in the WAC, the Cougars won the 1984 National Championship, finishing 13-0.
- -- BYU won a total of 19 titles while in the WAC, including its first-ever football championship in 1965 and 10-straight from 1976-85.
- -- BYU's 19 WAC titles, 187 conference wins and 199 All-WAC First Team selections are all still the most by far of any WAC team.

MOUNTAIN STATES/SKYLINE (1938-61)

- -- BYU was a charter member of the conference, leaving with Colorado, Colorado St., Denver, Utah, Utah State and Wyoming when the RMFAC was deemed too large. Montana and New Mexico joined in 1951.
- -- After Colorado left in 1947, the conference became popularly known as the Skyline Conference.
- -- Football posted a 41-75-12 (.367) conference record in its 24 years in the conference.
- -- The conference dissolved in early 1962 after BYU, Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico left to form the WAC.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN FACULTY ATHLETIC (1922-37)

- -- BYU joined the RMFAC in 1918 with football participation beginning four years later.
- -- Football posted a 46-52-4 (.471) conference record in its 16 years in the conference.
- -- When BYU joined, other RMFAC schools included Colorado, Colorado A&M (now Colorado St.), Colorado College, Colorado School of Mines, Denver, Utah, Utah St. and Montana St. Wyoming, Western St. and Colorado Teacher's College (now Northern Colorado) joined two years later.
- -- Known today as the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC), it is now a Division II conference with 14 members.

First 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Evre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4.571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

Another 11-win season ... a 17-game win streak and ranked eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 70 NCAA records and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... McMahon wins the first Davey O'Brien Award ... Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl... also coaches in the Japan Bowl... Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game... loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V... Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-American... BYU finishes third nationally in total offense... Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

1983 Another 11-win season... Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team... quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-Americans... after losing to Baylor in

the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring... Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game... BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI... Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone... Young wins the Davey O'Brien Award and finishes runner-up for the Heisman.

Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season... win streak is extended to 24 games... quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)... defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-American... team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)... defensively. Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense... another WAC championship and a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII... Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations ... Bosco is runner-up for the Davey O'Brien Award and third in the Heisman.

Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic... that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawaii allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season... defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-American and WAC Defensive Player of the Year... Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards becomes winningest coach in

WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-America ... Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams ... Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards... Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

BYU defense leads the nation with 50 takeaways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points... after offensive line is decimated in preseason camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games... Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regularseason game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All-American Bowl versus Virginia.

Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 13th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes



the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-American... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-American teams... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...also wins the Davey O'Brien Award...finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-American and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Tv Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties No. 7 Iowa. 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the

closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing... BYU wins WAC title and goes to the Aloha Bowl

BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown receptions (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 53-straight games with a touchdown pass ends at CSU, but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

It's a historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll... five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988... BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant coach John Farley, who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December... Cougars are third nationally in passing with John Walsh fifth in total offense... Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdowns.

A first-ever multi-year contract for a BYU coach is given to Edwards... the string of 17 consecutive bowl games comes to an end... Cougars finish No. 2 in NCAA in punt returns at 18.9, while James Dye is number one at 21.9... Steve Sarkisian is the first junior college player since 1973 to start as a

BYU quarterback ... BYU finishes in a four-way tie for first in the WAC.

BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State... BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since 1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game...the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points allowed (18.7)...James Dye finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship game with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998 BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title ... The Cougars meet Tulane in the Liberty Bowl ... BYU's season is highlighted by its defense, ranked No. 5 in the nation, allowing only 91.2 rushing yards and 273.9 total yards per game ... After a slow start, the Cougars won seven games in a row ... Season highlights included a 26-6 thumping of Arizona

State, a 13-0 shutout of San Diego State and a 26-24 victory over Utah ... Rob Morris, John Tait, Brian Gray and Daren Yancey were all named to the All-WAC first team ... John Tait was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft (14th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs ... Sophomore kicker Owen Pochman set a school record by connecting on 62 consecutive PATs.

1999 Won the first-ever Mountain West Conference Championship with an 8-4 season record (5-2 conf.) ... A 27-20 win over Air Force marks LaVell Edwards' 250th victory as head coach of the Cougars ... junior kicker Owen Pochman becomes the school's all-time leading scorer, picking up 90 points on the season to give him a career total 247 ... a six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the USA Today/ CNN Coaches' Poll ... running back Luke Stalev is named Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against

Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-frombehind victory...Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference First Team... Pochman and Tevita Ofahengaue are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengaue being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

In his first season after taking over the BYU football team Gary Crowton led the Cougars to 12-consecutive victories and an outright Mountain West Conference title thanks to a dramatic come-from-behind victory over Utah in Provo ... Luke Stalev was named a consensus All-American and became BYU's first Doak Walker Award winner for the nation's top running back ... Staley led the nation in scoring at 15.45 points per game and was third nationally in rushing at 143.82 yards per game ... The Cougars led the nation in scoring offense with 46.77 points per game and in total offense with 542.85 yards per game ... BYU was the first MWC school to go undefeated in conference games and boasted eight players being named as first-team all-league ... Staley was named Offensive Player of the Year in the Conference and set BYU single-season records for points scored, touchdowns scored and rushing yards ... injuries took Staley out of the Cougars' final two games which resulted in loses at Hawai'i and in the Liberty Bowl against Louisville ... BYU climbed the national polls to as high as No. 7 on Nov. 25th and finished the season ranked No. 24 in both polls ... First-Team All-MWC defensive end Ryan Denney was named to the Academic All-America team and was drafted in the second round by the Buffalo Bills ... All-MWC tight end Doug Jolley was also selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

For the first time since 1973 the Cougars finished the regular-season with a sub-.500 record ... coincidentally, the '73 season was the second under legendary coach LaVell Edwards ... his replacement, Gary Crowton, just completed his second season at BYU...for the first time in the four-season history of the MWC, BYU failed to win a conference road game, going 0-3 ... the Cougars combined to post a 9-2 conference road mark through the league's first three seasons ... Matt Berry was the first redshirt freshman quarterback to start at BYU since Ty Detmer in 1988...Brady Poppinga led the MWC with eight sacks for minus 52 yards ... Matt Payne led the country with a punting average of 47.6 yards.

BYU posted back-toback losing seasons for the first time since 1970-71 before LaVell Edwards took over the reigns of the program ... John Beck became only the second truefreshman to start at quarterback for BYU when he started against Stanford ... Running back Revnaldo Brathwaite recorded the longest run from scrimmage in Cougar history, a 95-vard score against San Diego State ... Freshman tight end Daniel Coats was named to The Sporting News Freshman All-America team after posting 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns...The Cougars' NCAA-record scoring steak ended at 361 after being shut out 3-0 against Utah in the final game of the season. The last time BYU was shut out was when Arizona State blanked the Cougars in 1975.

2004 BYU posted its third-consecutive losing season, the longest such streak since the Cougars were sub-.500 from 1959-64 ... Despite the losing 5-6 record, BYU finished third place in the MWC at 4-3 ... The Cougars' schedule was one of the most difficult in team history, including games against Notre Dame, the defending national champions USC,



then-undefeated Boise State and an undefeated University of Utah team ... John Beck threw for 2,563 yards while Todd Watkins caught 52 passes for 1,042 yards and six touchdowns ... Austin Collie, a true freshman, caught a team-high 53 passes for 771 vards and eight touchdowns ... Matt Payne finished his career as second on BYU's all-time scoring list with 312 and set an NCAA record for most consecutive field goals between 40-49 at 14 ... he also set the school record for most consecutive PATS with 67 ... Gary Crowton resigned at the end of the season and was replaced by Bronco Mendenhall.

Under the direction of first-year coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars were 6-5 overall in the regular season and finished tied for second in the Mountain West Conference at 5-3 ... earned an invitation to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl and played California, losing 35-28 ... Mendenhall revamped the coaching staff prior to the season, adding Robert Anae (offensive coordinator), Brandon Doman (quarterbacks coach) and Patrick Higgins (wide receivers coach) ... BYU also switched back to the traditional uniforms with the Y logo on the helmets while maintaining the navy blue ... John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown led an offensive attack that was BYU's most potent since 2001, averaging 33.0 points per game (second in the MWC and 24th in the nation) and 462.4 yards of total offense per game ... Beck led the conference and was fifth in the nation in passing yards (309.1 per game) and led the conference in touchdown passes (27) ... Brown also added six 100-yard rushing games to give him 11 for his career, the most in BYU history ... Harline led the team and ranked among the top tight ends in the nation with 63 receptions for 853 yards and five touchdowns ... Beck, Brown and Harline were all named to the All-MWC First Team Cameron Jensen led the team in tackles for the second-straight year by recording 84.

straight opponents over the final three months to finish the 2006 season with an 11-2 record ... Defeated Utah with the nowfamous "Beck to Harline" play, a lastsecond touchdown from John Beck scrambling for time and finding tight end Johnny Harline on his knees in the end zone with time expired to win 33-31 ... The Cougars tallied a perfect clip against league opponents to win their first outright Mountain West Conference Championship since the 2001 season ... BYU went on to dismantle Oregon, 38-8, in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl ... The Cougars' 10-game win streak marked the longest since the 2001 season and only the seventh time in the program's history the Cougars have had nine or more consecutive wins in a single season ... BYU earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings, finishing at No. 15 in the final poll ... Under head coach Bronco Mendenhall—the Mountain West Conference and AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year—the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.5 yards per game during the regular season. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.5 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.8 points per game ... The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08 ... Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging +1.08 turnovers per game ... BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.7 points per game ... Registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006, finishing the season as the most dominant home team in the nation and the most

BYU knocked off 10

dominant home team in BYU history by earning a +35.16 home scoring margin, first in the nation and a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979.

Head coach Bronco Mendenhall led the 2007 BYU team to its second-straight outright Mountain West title behind another perfect 8-0 MWC season ... BYU's second straight 11-win season was capped with a No. 14 national ranking in both the Associated Press Top-25 and USA Today Coaches Poll ... The season marked the highest finish for the Cougars in the national polls since 1996 ... Behind the arm of All-MWC sophomore quarterback Max Hall and the legs of Freshman All-American Harvey Unga, BYU's all-time leading freshman running back, the Cougars are the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win back-to-back outright league titles and to record back-to-back undefeated league records ... To go along with their 16-game conference win streak, the Cougars boasted the nation's longest overall winning streak at 10 games and won 21 of their last 23 games ... BYU reached its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl victory, 17-16, in dramatic fashion -- with a block on UCLA's potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired ... Mendenhall is the first coach in school history to lead the Cougars to three consecutive bowl games in his first three years as head coach ... Hall, in his first year as a starter, put in the fourth best performance by a first-year quarterback at BYU to date and was the nation's top sophomore quarterback in terms of passing yards ... As the nation's 10th ranked defense, the Cougars allowed just 307.2 yards per game, allowing only one 100-yard rusher all season ... Unga picked up Freshman All-America and MWC Freshman of the Year honors after leading the Cougars with an average of 94.4 yards per game ... Defensive lineman Jan Jorgenson ranked ninth nationally with 13.5 sacks on the season.

The Cougars posted their third consecutive season with 10 or more wins with a 10-3 final record in 2008 ... in the national polls each week during the season, including a ranking as high as No. 7 ... finished third in the MWC at 6-2 and received an invitation to the 2008 Pioneer Las Vegas bowl ... ranked No. 16 in the final BCS standings before a 31-21 defeat to Arizona in Las Vegas ... with another undefeated home record the 2008 Cougars maintained LaVell Edward Stadium's undefeated record over three seasons, a program first ... three Cougars -- Matt Bauman. Kellen Fowler and David Oswald -named ESPN the Magazine Academic All-Americans, a program record ... iunior wide receiver Austin Collie. junior tight end Dennis Pitta and senior offensive linemen Ray Feinga and Dallas Revnolds were named to the All-MWC First Team, while junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen was named to the first-team defense ... Pitta was one of only two unanimous selections ... seven Cougars received All-America accolades ... Collie was named to six different teams, including first-team All-America recognition from CBSSports.com and second-team accolades from The Associated Press ... offensive lineman Matt Reynolds was named to four Freshman All-America teams, including three first-team awards ... Collie led the nation in total receiving yards and in receiving yards per game with a BYU single-season record of 153.8 receiving yards ... Pitta was second among tight ends and 27th among all receivers with 83.31 receiving yards per game ... Hall was No. 6 in passing yards per game, No. 7 in total passing yards, No. 8 in completions per game, No. 9 in total off. and No. 11 in pass efficiency ... he totaled a MWC single-season record 35 touchdowns, including seven scoring throws in BYU's 59-0 win over UCLA ... Unga turned in his secondstraight 1,000-yard rushing season with 1,132.

In a season featuring several signature victories. BYU achieved an 11-2 record (7-1 MWC) and No. 12 final ranking in the national polls ... No. 12 ranking is highest since No. 5 in 1996 ... ranked as high as No. 7 during the season ... earned highest-ever final BSC standings at No. 14 ... one of only six schools nationally to be ranked in both final polls and the final BCS standings each of the last four years and the only program to do so from a nonautomatic-qualifying BCS conference ... won more games (43-9 record) the last four years than all but four teams in the country ... opened the season with a 14-13 win over No. 3 Oklahoma at new Dallas Cowboys Stadium and finished with a 26-23 overtime win against No. 19 Utah and a 44-20 triumph over No. 16 Oregon State in the Maaco Bowl Las Vegas ... made its fifth-straight bowl appearance for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994 ... individually, senior tight end Dennis Pitta earned consensus All-America honors while setting the NCAA record for most career receiving yards by a tight end (2,901) and breaking Austin Collie's school record for career receptions (221) ... Pitta was named to 10 different All-America teams ... nine different Cougars (Pitta, Max Hall, Brian Logan, Matt Reynolds, Terence Brown, Braden Hansen, Jordan Pendleton) received various All-America recognition, including two receiving Academic All-America honors (Scott Johnson, Matt Bauman) ... seven members of the team were named to the All-Mountain West Conference teams with six other Cougars receiving honorable mention ... Harvey Unga became the school's all-time leading rusher with thirdstraight 1,000-yard season ... Max Hall set BYU record for most wins as a starting quarterback with 32.

2010 Starting the season 2-5 with six games against eventual bowl-bound teams, BYU finished the year winning 5 of

its last 6 to finished third in the MWC (5-3) and earn the program's sixthstraight bowl invitation ... finished the season with a 52-24 win over UTEP in the New Mexico Bowl ... BYU set 31 New Mexico Bowl and 11 BYU bowl records during the game ... Heaps was named Offensive MVP while Rich was named Defensive MVP ... Senior kicker Mitch Payne set the all-time BYU scoring record, finishing with 334 points ... Heaps broke every BYU freshman guarterback record, playing in every game as a true freshman ... Junior Bryan Kariya was named an Academic All-American, the only FBS running back to earn the honor ... Riley Nelson was one of 11 FBS players named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team ... Matt Revnolds. Andrew Rich and Vic So'oto were named All-MWC First Team and JJ Di Luigi was named to the Second Team with seven others named honorable mention ... BYU finished its time in the MWC with the most wins (64) in conference history.

In BYU's first season as an independent, the Cougars won 10 games for the fifth time in six years ... won fifth bowl game in six years and third straight ... finished season ranked No. 25 in the USA Today Coaches Poll and RV (No. 26) in the AP Poll ... ranked No. 5 in third down conversions and No. 13 in total defense ... had 12 games broadcast on national television with ESPN/BYUtv agreement ... put together four fourthquarter comeback victories including 24-21 Armed Forces Bowl win ... quarterback Riley Nelson started seven of final eight games ... Kick returner Cody Hoffman set program record for kick returns (36) and kick return yards (879) in a single season ... Hoffman had 1,825 all-purpose vards, the sixth best mark in school history ... Nelson's pass efficiency rating of 152.94 was No. 16 nationally ... seven Cougars selected to the inaugural FBS All-Independent Team ... running back Bryan Kariya named Academic All-District for second consecutive year.

BYU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

After posting a perfect 13-0 season, the Cougars were awarded gold national championship rings after winning the 1984 National Championship.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan at the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior guarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to offensive lineman

Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the No. 1 spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to

Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then secondranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984







47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

TY DETMER: 1990 HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawaii. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor has been awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-foot, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing. Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's

Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They







JASON BUCK • 1986

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270-pound senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

MOHAMMED ELEWONIBI • 1989

Mohammed Elewonibi, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mount Mohammed" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two
Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of
Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska,

While his teammates and coaches were watching in their hotel rooms from Hawaii, over 6,000 miles away, BYU running back Luke Staley was named the winner of the 2001 Doak Walker Award. The annual award, which was presented on the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla., is presented to college football's top running back.

"This is a great honor," Staley said. "I can't express how grateful I am for my family, my teammates, my coach everyone who made this possible."

In addition to winning the Doak Walker Award, Staley was also named as a first-team member of the prestigious Walter Camp Foundation All-America Team. Staley was the first BYU consensus All-American since Ty Detmer was twice selected in 1990 and 1991. In addition to the Walter Camp Foundation All-America team, Staley was named a first-team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association, Football Writers Association of America, the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News and CNNSI-just to name a few.

"We're very proud of Luke and all his accomplishments," BYU head coach Gary Crowton said. "Since we started this season back in August, we have been telling these guys to work hard, stay focused and great things will happen. This award, although presented to Luke, is a tribute to the hard work and commitment each and every player and coach has made this season. Luke is probably one of the best examples we have had, in terms of working

hard and staying focused.



Staley, from Tualatin, Ore., led the nation in scoring (15.5 p/game), yards per carry (8.1 y/carry) and finished the 2001 season ranked third in the nation in rushing, averaging 143.8 yards per game. He helped pace the Cougars to a 12-2 record on the season, scoring a BYU single-season record 28 touchdowns. Staley also racked up a BYU single-season record 1,582 yards rushing on the season.

Legendary Cougar coach LaVell Edwards has twice been recognized as one the greatest coaches in college football. The sixth-winningest coach in NCAA football history earned the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 1979 and the Kodak Coach of the Year Award in 1984.

tenure, LaVell Edwards accumulated many personal accolades to match. Edwards' first national recognition for his coaching prowess came in 1979 when he was honored with the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award. A panel of 11 former college football coaches selected the BYU coach. On the heels of BYU's first national championship five years later, Edwards' coaching peers honored him with what he then called his greatest personal accolade, the Kodak Coach of the Year Award. As successful as his teams were on the field, Edwards' coaching philosophy did not reflect a win-at-all-costs mentality. He didn't bark orders or rule the sideline with an iron fist. Generally, the assistant coaches were delegated the duty of handling the Xs and Os while he saw to the administrative tasks of the program. His personal demeanor also gave him the ability to relate well with his players whether teaching them about football or other

"Just seeing how he handles himself with the media and with people in general ... he's always genuine with them. He treats everybody well," Former BYU quarterback and current BYU athletic administrator Robbie Bosco said. "Those are the things he'll leave with me, more than winning football games."

SAMMY BAUGH TROPHY

On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year. In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award. Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972). Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Jeff George (1989), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995), Ryan Leaf (1997), Daunte Culpepper (1998), Chad Pennington (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), David Carr (2001), Matt Leinart (2004), Brady Quinn (2005) and Sam Bradford (2008). of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award honoring the nation's best quarterback. olumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU guarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runnerup and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in recent years,

and Ty Detmer will be inducted in December 2012, along with several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list in the future.

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top-15 career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 29 years LaVell Edwards coached at BYU, the Cougars led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times. In 2006. Mountain West Conference Player of the Year guarterback John Beck was the No. 4 passer in the nation as he helped lead a resurrection of the storied BYU offense of old. The tradition continued with quarterback Max Hall who was the nation's top-ranked sophomore quarterback in his first season as the starter and was among the top ten in passing yards and passing efficiency his senior year.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball. The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for a conference championship 23 times, played in 30 bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

BYU'S POLYNESIAN TRADITION



YU's football program has tapped into the Pacific Islands to find players since 1951 when Harry Bray of Hilo, Hawai'i transferred from Weber College to play for the Cougars. Other Pacific Islanders who followed included: Famika Anae (1954-55), John Kapele (1957-59), John Kawaa (1962-1963), John Lupoi (1967-1969) and Henry Nawahine (1964-1965). Some of BYU's most celebrated and decorated players have come from the Pacific islands, including All-Americans, national record holders and players who have gone on to compete in the NFL.

Since 1951, hundreds of Polynesian players have suited up for BYU. The Cougars' Polynesian players have come from Hawaii, Tonga, Samoa and Fiji. Some of the most notable players include Vai Sikahema, the NCAA's career leader in punt returns, All-American and NFL veteran tight end Itula Mili and BYU's third all-time rushing leader Lakei Heimuli. Six former BYU Polynesian players are currently on NFL rosters.

Of the hundreds of Polynesian players, several rank among the top statistical leaders in BYU history. Two of the top-10 career rushers are Polynesian, including career leader Harvey Unga. Two of the top-10 leaders in career





receiving yards are also Polynesian. Since 1982, 10 of BYU's season-rushing leaders have been Pacific Islanders.



ight ends have thrived in the BYU offensive system for years. Like no other school in the nation, BYU's tight ends have earned unprecedented success as a featured position in BYU's wide-open offense. Over the years, Cougar football has emerged as the home of some of the best pass-catching tight ends in NCAA history. Starting with "Miracle Bowl" hero Clay Brown in 1980, ten BYU tight ends have earned All-American status. Since 1976, 12 Cougar tight ends have received 20 First-Team All-Conference citations. In this decade alone nine different Cougar tight ends have made NFL rosters. Four former Cougars helped lead their teams to the Super Bowl-Doug Jolley with the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Chad Lewis with Philadelphia Eagles in 2005, Itula Mili with the Seattle Seahawks in 2006, and Gabriel Reid with the Chicago Bears in 2007. Two former BYU Cougars, Todd Christensen and Chad Lewis, have been named to several Pro Bowl teams during their successful professional careers as tight ends. A BYU tight end was named first-team all-conference (Jonny Harline in 2005 and 2006 and Dennis Pitta in 2007, 2008 in 2009. and 2009) in five-straight years. In 2009, BYU became the first team in conference history to sweep the MWC tight end honors as

Dennis Pitta, the NCAA's career receiving tight end leader, was an NCAA Consensus All-American

Andrew George earned All-MWC Second Team accolades while Pitta was a consensus All- American.





HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

The College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Indiana, has honored seven of BYU's Football Greats. The seventh Cougar to be inducted into this prestigious hall is Heisman Trophy Winner Ty Detmer.



TY DETMER

Quarterback: 1988-1991 Induction: December 2012

BYU's only Heisman Trophy Winner, Detmer is BYU's seventh inductee into the Hall of Fame. Detmer also won the Maxwell Award, two Davey O'Brien Awards and set 59 NCAA records in his tenure. Twice named a consensus All-American, Detmer won national player of the year awards from organizations such as UPI, CBS, Scripps Howard and the U.S. Sports Academy. His 15,031 career passing yards and 121 touchdowns were NCAA bests at the time, and the gunslinger still holds nine NCAA records. A three-time First Team All-WAC performer, Detmer led College Football Hall of Fame coach LaVell Edwards' teams to three conference championships, four bowl games, three AP top 25 finishes and a 28-21 win over top-ranked and defending national champion Miami on

Sept. 8, 1990. The NCAA Today's Top VI Award recipient still holds 10 school records, including the season and career marks for total offense, passing yards and 400-yard games. A ninth round selection of the 1992 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers, Detmer played 14 seasons in the NFL. The founder of the Ty Detmer Charitable Foundation, he regularly holds the Ty Detmer Youth Football League in Grants, N.M. He remains involved in the Davey O'Brien Foundation and the Children's Miracle Network, and he makes yearly appearances at numerous fundraising events for youth organizations. A 2000 inductee of the BYU Athletics Hall of Fame, Detmer is currently the head coach at St. Andrew's Episcopal School in Austin. Texas.



GORDON HUDSON

Tight End: 1980-1983 Inducted: 2009

Hudson is the first non-quarterback to represent BYU as a player in the Hall. A consensus All-America First Team pick in 1982 and 1983, Hudson is still the NCAA FBS record holder for most passes caught per game by a tight end (5.4) in a career, most career yards per game by a tight end (75.3) and most yards in a single game by a tight end (259). Hudson helped BYU win four conference championships (WAC) and earn four Holiday Bowl invitations during his career from 1980-83. He totaled 2,484 receiving yards and 22 touchdowns during his All-American career.



STEVE YOUNG

Quarterback: 1982-83 Inducted: 2005

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Young set 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player of the Year honors. In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306 of 429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to its second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, 3,902 yards passing, 4,346 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. He completed 592 of 907 attempts for a .653 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and had 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games. A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-

up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community. Young retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49ers to win the Super Bowl in 1995, earning MVP honors.



LAVELL EDWARDS

Head Coach: 1972-2000

Inducted: 2004

A coaching icon whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU--a tenure that ranks fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 20 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17-straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At

the helm, Edwards coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans—not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1984. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. "A spectacular choice," Steve Young said. "When you think of the Hall of Fame, you think of longevity, excellence, leadership and quality. In my book, Hall of Fame and LaVell Edwards go hand in hand. He is definitely a worthy recipient of this honor."

JIM MCMAHON

Quarterback: 1978-81 Inducted: 1998

In 1998 Jim McMahon (1977-78, 80-81) joined former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively. McMahon set 75 NCAA records at BYU, was a 1981 First Team All-American by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he earned First team All-America from the FWAA. McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference



records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first team all-league. He broke 23 school records, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU. McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).

MARC WILSON

Quarterback: 1976-79 Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-America honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England



Patriots. Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Washington with their four children.

GIFFORD NIELSEN

Quarterback: 1975-77 Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes. "From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked. "It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm



of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. Over three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game. Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-America selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials and media representatives. The College Football Hall of Fame is located in South Bend, Indiana, and is open year round. For more information visit http://collegefootball.org/.

ALL-AMERICANS

ELDON FORTIE ('61,'62) Nicknamed "The Phantom," Fortie broke 21 school records and is one of only two players in BYU football history to have his number retired. Rushed for 1,149 yards, an average of 5.8 per carry, and passed for 814 yards in 1962. Holds BYU record for most rushing yards in a game (272).

JAY MILLER ('73) Led the nation in receiving with 100 receptions for 1,181 yards including eight touchdowns. Holds BYU record for most receptions in a game (22) and most receiving yards in a game (263

WAYNE BAKER ('74) Named second team All-American his senior season when he finished with 82 tackles (67 assisted, 15 solo). He also recorded nine quarterback hurries and 10 quarterback sacks as a senior.

BRAD OATES ('75) He was All-Western Athletic Conference and co-captain his last two seasons at BYU, and was named second team All-American by the Associated Press, the highest honor ever for a BYU football player to that date.

ORRIN OLSEN ('75) Started all 11 games. Brother of Merlin and Phil Olsen.

GIFFORD NIELSEN (76) Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," he threw 207 completions for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdown passes. Led nation in touchdown passes, second in total offense, fourth in passing. As a team, the Cougars finished first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9). 1994 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

MARC WILSON (78,79) Threw 250 completions for 3,720 yards with 29 touchdown passes. Threw seven touchdown passes in first start. Led NCAA in total offense. Ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating. 1979 Senior Bowl MVP. Finished third in Heisman voting. Set 19 NCAA records in his career. Winner of Sammy Baugh Trophy as College Passer of the Year. Led team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

CLAY BROWN ('80) Made game winning "hail mary" catch in 1980 Holiday Bowl against SMU. Had 1,009 receiving yards in 1980.

NICK EYRE ('80) Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-American lineman. Finished third in the Outland

Trophy voting. Was a three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

JIM McMAHON ('80,'81) Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns in 1980. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. Led nation in total offense (385.6) and pass efficiency (176.9), which ranks fourth all-time in NCAA history. Finished fifth in Heisman voting. Won firstever Davey O'Brien Award in 1981. Led nation with 3,555 yards passing including 30 touchdowns. Led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8). Finished third in Heisman voting. Finished career with 75 NCAA records. 1998 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

BART OATES ('82) As a two-year starter on the offensive line, Oates earned Honorable Mention All-WAC in 1981 and All-WAC First Team in 1982. He was also named to the All-District VII All-Academic team. Oates also enjoyed a successful career in the NFL.

GORDON HUDSON ('82,'83) A two-time All-American, Hudson had 67 catches for 928 yards and six touchdowns in 1982 and 44 catches for 596 yards and six touchdowns in 1983. He was also a two-time first-team All-WAC selection. He set five NCAA records.

STEVE YOUNG ('83) Won Davey O'Brien Award and finished runner-up for the Heisman. BYU led nation in total offense and was second in scoring. Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game.

ROBBIE BOSCO (84,85) Led BYU to only National Championship in school history. Led nation in total offense and finished runner-up in passing efficiency (151.8). Runner-up for Davey O'Brien Award and third in Heisman voting.

KYLE MORRELL ('84) As BYU's safety Morrell was honored as the WAC Defensive Player of the Year with 70 tackles, three interceptions and one sack.

LEON WHITE (*84) Selected defensive MVP of the 1984 Holiday Bowl. Named second-team All-America by The Sporting News as a junior (1984) and honorable mention All-America as a senior (1985) by the AP. Had 10 pass deflections in 1984, including five against Utah State. Recorded 90 tackles, five tackles for loss and two sacks his senior season.

DAVID MILLS ('84) Led team in receivin during his senior season when he caught 60 passes for 1,023 yards and seven touchdowns. Played on four WAC championship teams, including the National Championship team in '84.

TREVOR MATICH ('84) Was named to the AP All-America Third Team and Football News Honorable Mention as a center. Also named All-WAC First Team, played in the senior bowl, and was the 28th pick in the 1985 NFL draft by the New England Patriots.

MARK BELLINI (*85) A former walkon, Bellini led BYU with 63 receptions for 1,008 yards, including 14 touchdowns his senior season in 1985. He was also 10th nationally in receiving average of 5.7 catches per game. Had 138 receptions, 2,267 yards receiving and 23 touchdowns in his career.

TREVOR MOLINI ('85) Named third-team All-American as a tight end his sophomore season and received an honorable mention nod during his junior season. Caught 63 passes for 849 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore. Caught 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns against New Mexico in 1985.

JASON BUCK ('85,'86) Became only the third player in the western United States to win Outland Trophy. Had 59 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks in 1986.

PAT THOMPSON ('88) Led conference in punting with 49 punts for 2,195 yards, an average of 44.8 yards per punt. Led the nation in punting for much of the season.

MO ELEWONIBI ('89) Didn't play football until after high school. Led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior. He was the 1989 Outland Trophy winner.

BOB DAVIS ('89) Had 137 tackles, including six sacks his senior season. Dick Butkus Award candidate.

CHRIS SMITH ('89,'90) Led team with 60 catches for 1,090 yards, including five touchdowns in 1989. Set NCAA record for tight end with 1,156 yards receiving in 1990. Caught 68 passes and scored two touchdowns.

TY DETMER ('90,'91) First collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Passed for 5,188 yards and 41 touchdowns. Member of the NCAA All-Decade team. Still holds 10 NCAA records. His career record of 15,031 yards passing is third highest in Division I football history.

BYRON REX (92) Named UPI Second Team All-American tight end in 1992. He was also a two-time All-WAC selection (1991-1992).

ALAN BOARDMAN ('93) A four-year starter who recorded 204 punts for 8,636 yards, averaging 42.3 yards per kick. His freshman year he ranked ninth among punters nationally with a 43.13 average per kick.

EVAN PILGRIM ('92,'94) A three-year starter on BYU's offensive line. In 1994, his senior season, Pilgrim anchored an offensive line that was fifth in the nation in total offense. He helped Jamal Willis become the all-time leading rusher in BYU history, and led the Cougars to a No. 10 national ranking (final season ranking). Pilgram was named a second team All-American guard by the Associated Press after his senior year.



ITULA MILI ('96) Had 46 catches for a nation-leading 692 yards and three touchdowns for tight ends. First-team All-WAC after senior season.

STEVE SARKISIAN ('96) He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American.

ROB MORRIS (98,99) Two-time all-conference selection. His 345 career tackles is eighth all-time at BYU. He was as a first round draft pick in 2000 by the Indianapolis Colts. Morris was named to the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News All-American first-teams after his senior year. He was also a semifinalist for Butkus Award, given to nation's top linebacker, and the WAC Defensive Player of the year in 1998 after posting 147 tackles during his junior season.

LUKE STALEY ('01) NCAA leader in scoring (15.45 points per game) and third in the nation in rushing average at 143.82 yards per game. Set BYU single season records in touchdowns scored (28), most points scored (170) and rushing yards (1,596). He led BYU to 12-2 record and MWC Championship. He earned the nation's top running back award, the Doak Walker Award, after his outstanding junior season.

MATT PAYNE ('04) In 2004 he was named AFCA and Sporting News First Team All-American and AP Second Team All-American as a punter. 2004 Ray Guy and Iou Groza Award Semifinalist. Led the nation with 51 punts for an average of 48.0 yards per punt while earning All-America honorable mention recognition in 2002. He was also an All-MWC First Team selection three times (2002-04).

DANIEL COATS ('03) Set a BYU freshman tight end receiving record with 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns. Named a Sporting News Freshman All-American in 2003.

JONNY HARLINE ('06) Picked up six All-America citations, including First Team honors from The Sporting News, ESPN, College Football News, CBS Sportsline.com, Sl.com and Third Team honors from the Associated Press. Harline led all BYU receivers in receiving yards (935) and touchdowns (12).

JOHN BECK ('06) Named a Sporting News Second Team All-American while picking up Honorable Mention citations from CBS Sportsline.com, Pro Football Weekly and College Football News. Beck finished his BYU career as the second Cougar passer to surpass to 10,000-yard mark.

JAKE KURESA ('06) Named a College Football News Second Team All-American while earning an Honorable Mention citation from The Sporting News. Anchored an offensive unit that was fourth in the nation in yards per game. He started games at tackle, guard and center during the 2006 season.

JAN JORGENSEN ('06) Earned Third Team Freshman All-America honors from the Sporting News. Jorgensen started each of BYU's 13 games as a freshman. He tied for the team league with five sacks and led all defensive linemen with 34 total tackles.

HARVEY UNGA ('07) Named a Rivals. com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2007 after compiling 1,050 rushing yards and 600 receiving yards. Unga is the Cougars' alltime leading freshman running back and the first BYU freshman to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in a single season. He holds the school record for most 100-yard rushing games as a freshman with seven and holds the MWC Freshman Rushing record with 1,227 yards. Received College Football News Sophomore Team honorable mention in 2008 after rushing for 1,132 yards

DALLAS REYNOLDS ('05,'08) Named a College Football News Third Team All-American as a senior center in 2008 after anchoring an offensive unit that was ranked No. 6 in the nation in passing and No. 16 in total offense. Named a Sporting News Third Team Freshman All-American and a Rivals. com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2005 on offense that

was ranked No. 13 in the nation. He started in all 12 games as a freshman and all 51 games of his career.

AUSTIN COLLIE ('08) Named to six different All-America teams as a junior in 2008 after leading the nation with 1,538 receiving yards and 118.31 vards per game. He was named to the CBS Sports.com First Team. earned second-team honors from AP, The Sporting News, Sports Illustrated and Rivals and third-team recognition from College Football News. Declared early for the NFL Draft as BYU's career receiving leader. Named a Sporting News Second Team Freshman All-American in 2004 after leading the nation's freshman receivers with 4.82 catches per game and 70.1 vards per game. He was also the 2004 MWC Freshman of the Year.

DENNIS PITTA ('08,'09) Named a consensus All-American in 2009. Earned first-team honors by Walter Camp Foundation, AFCA, and Pro Football Weekly; second team by AP, Sports Illustrated, CBS Sports and Rivals; third-team by Sporting News and Phil Steele; HM by College Football News. Set the NCAA record for career receiving yards by a tight end (2,901). Was Rivals.com All-America Third Team in 2008. Also received honorable mention from Sports Illustrated and College Football News.

MATT REYNOLDS ('08) Named to four different Freshman All-America teams in 2008, including Football Writers Association of America First Team, Rivals.com First Team, College Football News.com First Team and Sporting News Second Team. Started all 13 games on veteran offensive line featuring four other senior starters. Received College Football News Sophomore Team recognition in 2009.



Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever. BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the guarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowbovs were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 vards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys. BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402. BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula. Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-vard pass to Mike Chronister. but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead, Navv cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation. Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana. The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 vards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense. Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 vards on seven kickoff returns.

GAME SUMMARY:

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four guarters and another of four minutes duration. SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, and blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33. Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield. SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left. McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge. As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground. Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79. Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a sevenyard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime, Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good. BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense. led by quarterback Steve Young. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-vard field goal by Brad Burditt, BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard guarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 vards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster-thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama, BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive. The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break. Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go. Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Mary Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' firstever national championship. David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 vards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead. In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead. Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats-one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24. The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries. The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-vard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times. Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29). missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission. BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third guarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away, Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter. Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining. But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia coach George Welsh was head coach of Navy, which beat BYU 23-16 in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal. It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49.694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second guarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7. A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third guarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter. BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory. Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 vards and caught four passes for 41 vards.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Thomas was named the top defensive player, BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU. BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy. KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an

Louisville just managed to take a 14-7 lead into the break, scoring with only 14 seconds left. Louisville contained the Cougar attack for the remainder of the game while reaching the end zone twice more themselves. Although Louisville went on to win 28-10. BYU's defense played one of its best games of the season. holding the Cardinals' high-powered offense to 228 yards passing and only 58 yards rushing.

The 2006 BYU championship run ended with a Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl championship as the Cougars (11-2) dominated Oregon (7-6), 38-8, to finish the season with a 10-game winning streak in front of a Sam Boyd Stadium record crowd of 44.615. The Mountain West Conference champion BYU team set a school record for margin of victory in a bowl game, beating the Ducks by 30 points. Previously, the largest margin of victory for a BYU team in a bowl game was a 25-point defeat of Oklahoma in the 1994 Copper Bowl, BYU dominated all facets of the game, out-gaining Oregon 548 total yards to 260 total yards. BYU passed for 375 compared to Oregon's 166 and rushed for 173 compared to the Ducks 94. BYU seniors John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown finished their careers in style. Beck completed 28-of-46 passes for 375 vards and two touchdowns. Harline, who was named Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl MVP, caught nine passes for a career-best--and Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl record--181 yards and a touchdown. Brown had 17 carries for 120 vards and two touchdowns and also caught seven passes for 55 yards. Brown also became the first BYU runner to rush for over 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Beck and Brown became the first quarterback/running back combo to pass for 3,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in the same season twice.

No. 17 BYU (11-2) won its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16, against UCLA (6-7) in dramatic fashion -- by blocking the Bruins' potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired. With only three ticks on the clock, true freshman Eathyn Manumaleuna extended his right hand at the right time to block UCLA's potential game-winning, 28-yard field goal as time expired to create what will be known as one of the most memorable bowl finishes in BYU Football history. The victory also avenged an earlyseason loss to the Bruins -- one of only two losses the Cougars suffered during the season. The Cougars, who finish the 2007 season on a 10-game winning streak, were led by sophomores Max Hall and Austin Collie. Hall threw 21-35 for 231 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore receiver Austin Collie was named the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl Most Valuable Player after racking up a game-high 107 yards on six receptions. Collie's 14-yard touchdown reception from Max Hall with 10:32 left in the second quarter gave the Cougars a 10-3 advantage. He was also credited with a game-high 195 all-purpose vards, including three kick returns for a total of 88 yards. The win marked the first time BYU has won back-to-back bowl games since the 1994 Copper Bowl and the 1996 Cotton Bowl. The win over UCLA extended the Cougars' win streak to 10 straight games, which marked the nation's longest active winning streak.

Defensively, senior linebacker Matt Bauman recovered a key fumble, returning it 34 yards for a touchdown. The score marked the first fumble recovery for a touchdown in BYU bowl history. Fellow team captain Scott Johnson intercepted an Oregon State pass in the fourth quarter and returned it 56 yards to set up BYU's final touchdown of the game. BYU and Oregon State met for the first time in a bowl game and for the first contest since BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall played for the Beavers in 1986. Kyle Van Noy made play after play on defense with 10 tackles to lead the Cougars, including five tackles for loss, two sacks, one forces fumble and one quarterback hurry. Special teams also played a huge role in the game. Punter Riley Stephenson had eight punts for 335 yards, including seven inside the 20-vard line and two punts over 50 yards. BYU's special teams also recovered a muffed punt setting up one touchdown in the game.



BYU'S NFL DRAFT FACTS

- The Cougars have had eight different players drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft, and one player selected in the first round of the USFL Draft (Steve Young).
- Dennis Pitta became the 10th BYU tight end picked in the NFL Draft and the fourth since 2001. The consensus All-American was the 16th pick in the fourth round of the 2010 draft, 114th overall by the Baltimore Ravens. Pitta is the first Cougar to be selected by the Ravens.
- BYU has had 66 players drafted over the past 26 years, including 38 players over the past 20 years.
- Four members of the BYU coaching staff were selected in the NFL or CFL Draft, including Lance Reynolds (1978, Pittsburgh Steelers), Steve Kaufusi (1988, Philadelphia Eagles), Ben Cahoon (1998, Montreal Alouettes) and Brandon Doman (2002, San Francisco 49ers.) Additionally, two BYU athletic department administrators were also selected in the NFL Draft, including Robbie Bosco (1986, Green Bay Packers) and Tom Holmoe (1983, San Francisco 49ers).
- Over the past 25 seasons, 37 offensive players from BYU have been drafted, as well as 27 defensive players and two special teams players.
- BYU's all-time leading receiver Austin Collie was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts in the fourth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. A 6-foot-2, 206pound wide receiver, Collie was the 27th pick of the fourth round and the 127th overall selection. In his rookie year, Collie was named to the All-Rookie team, catching 60 receptions for 676 yards and seven touchdowns including 6 catches for 66 yards in Super Bowl XLIV.

BYU NFL NOTES

Since 1973 NFL season, BYU has had 248 players sign contracts with NFL teams, including 107 draft picks. BYU has had 10 first round picks, the most recent being line-backer and former graduate assistant Rob Morris in 2000.

The average player coming from BYU spends nearly four and a half years in the NFL, about one year longer than the average NFL career.

Punter Lee Johnson has had the longest NFL career to date, spanning 18 seasons with six different teams. Johnson was drafted in the fifth round to the Houston Oilers (1985-87). He went on to play for the Cleveland Browns (1987–1988), Cincinnati Bengals (1988–1998), New England Patriots (1999–2001), Minnesota Vikings (2001) and Philadelphia Eagles (2002). At the time of his retirement, his 51,979 punting yards were the third most in NFL history.

Thirty-nine players from BYU have played in the Super Bowl, bringing home 38 total championship rings. Former defensive back and current Athletic Director Tom Holmoe has the most with four rings, including three as a player and one as a coach, all with the 49ers. From 1980-1992 the Cougars had at least one representive in the Super Bowl each year.

Pittsburgh Steelers Brett Keisel is the longest tenured active NFL player from BYU, heading into his 11th year. Keisel was drafted in the 7th round by the Steelers in 2002.

Steve Young is arguably BYU's best known NFL player, spending 15 seasons in the league, 13 with the 49ers. Young won Super Bowl XXIX 49-26 over the Chargers with a Super Bowl record six touchdown passes, winning the game's MVP award. He was also the league's MVP for the '94 season with 3,969 passing yards, 35 touchdowns and an NFL-record 112.8 passer rating.

MEDIA SERVICES

The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, situated on the west side of LaVell Edwards Stadium. Access to the press loge may be obtained via either the north or south elevators with media credentials.

The BYU Athletic Communications staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs, game stats, post-game quotes and media guides for both teams.

With four minutes remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU Head Coach Bronco Mendenhall and selected players

The BYU press box is also equipped with high-speed internet access. Wireless passwords will be provided with other game materials to media working in the press box.

PARKING

LaVell Edwards Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU

campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

INTERVIEWS

All interview and information requests regarding all players, coaches and Athletic Department personnel must be arranged in advance through the Athletic Communications office at (801) 422-8948. BYU provides regular media availability each week. Local media members are responsible for attending after-practice media availability to conduct interviews. Opponent and national media can arrange telephone interviews through the Athletic Communications office.

The Athletic Communications office will send an advisory each week detailing the weekly availability opportunities. Any other interview requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance. Interviews with players are not permitted after Wednesday each game week. Players and coaches will not be available for interviews prior to practice. No player interviews will be conducted during regular class hours.

A weekly news conference with head coach Bronco Mendenhall will be held each Monday on the second floor of Legends Grille in the Student Athlete Building on campus. The news conference will begin at 10 a.m. MT and will be broadcast live on BYUtv and BYUtv.org. Please contact the Athletic Communications office for specific times and other details if

requesting access opportunities.

TELEVISION PARTNERS

On Sept. 1, 2010, Brigham Young University announced a new 8-year deal with ESPN to televise Cougar football on the sports leader's family of networks. BYU is the first program to sign an exclusive deal with FSPN.

ESPN has agreed that any BYU games it doesn't select may be televised live on BYUtv.

Since 2011, every BYU home football game is tele-



vised to a live national audience on the ESPN family of networks or

BYUtv. Additionally, BYU's national fan base is able to view same-day rebroadcasts on BYUtv of every home game and any away game to which ESPN has rights through conference agreements with the host team.

"We've long sought broad, nationwide access to our games for our fans and increased visibility among those who may be less familiar with our university and athletic programs," said BYU President Cecil O. Samuelson. "We've also been looking for ways to take better advantage of our own unique broadcasting resources."



BYUtv is available in 55 million North American homes and is growing every month. It's on the basic tier of both Dish and DirecTV and is carried by more than 500 cable systems. The network owns a new state-of-the-art production truck that will allow it to televise games in HD.

ESPN and ESPN2 are both available in 99 million homes, while the 24-hour college sports network ESPNU is distributed to approximately 73 million homes. ESPN also produces college football games that are broadcast on ABC.

Each year, a minimum of three games will be carried on ESPN, ESPN2, or ABC. Additional games will be on ESPNU. At least one game each season will be carried live on BYUtv.

In 2011, BYU had 12 football games broadcast to a national television audience including five on ESPN, four on ESPN2, two on ESPNU and one on BYUtv.

ESPN has televised many of the great games in Cougar football history, beginning with the network's first live college football telecast. In that 1984 game, the Cougars defeated No. 3 Pitt at the beginning of BYU's national championship season.

ESPN also carried BYU's defeat of top-ranked Miami in 1990, a contest that is still the eighth-highest rated regular-season college football game on ESPN since that year. BYU's season-opening win over No. 3 Oklahoma was ESPN's ninth-highest rated game of the 2009 regular season.

"BYU is nationally recognized as an outstanding university and for the history and tradition of its premier athletic programs," said Burke Magnus, ESPN senior vice president, college sports programming. "Once BYU decided to chart an independent course for football, we both recognized it is a good opportunity to build and grow our strong 30-year relationship. With this agreement, college football fans around the country will see the quality and pageantry of BYU as well as the passion and enthusiasm of its supporters."

RADIO

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the BYU Radio Sports Network is KSL Newsradio in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 12th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell is in his 21st season on the broadcast crew, having served as the sideline reporter before stepping into the booth.

Wrubell's on-air partner and game analyst is former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons, who begins his 32nd season on the BYU Football broadcasts. Former Cougar receiver and kick returner Nate Meikle returns to the broadcast team in his fourth season reporting from the sidelines, while Jason Shepherd joins the crew as gameday studio host, assisted by veteran contributor Andrew Adams.

KSL's BYU Football broadcasts are heard via satellite on BYU Radio (SiriusXM 143) and over network affiliates in Utah, Idaho and Nevada. Coverage is also available online at ksl.com, which streams BYU Football games to a worldwide audience.

COACH'S SHOWS

In addition to its comprehensive game-day coverage, KSL Newsradio broadcasts "BYU Football with Head Coach Bronco Mendenhall" Wednesday nights at 7 p.m. throughout the season, with a live audience in attendance. KSL-5 Television airs the TV show bearing the same name each Sunday night at 11 p.m. MT, with KSL's "Voice of the Cougars," Greg Wrubell, hosting both programs.
