OPENING KICK

- Virginia is currently riding a four-game win streak, all against ACC opponents. UVA is one of 15 teams in the country and with win streak of four or more games.
- Virginia is looking to win five-straight games for the first time since 2007.
- UVA and BYU have each won 10 of their last 13 games coming into Saturday's contest. Only 18 teams nationally have 10 wins in the last 13 games.
- Saturday will be UVA's sixth night game of the season. Virginia is 3-2 in night games this season.
- For the second-straight week, Virginia is receiving votes (9) in AP poll, the Cavaliers have not been inside the top-25 since the 2019 season.
- BYU will be the second ranked opponent for Virginia this season (No. 21 North Carolina). Virginia's last road win against a ranked opponent came in 2011, a 14-13 win over then No. 23 Florida State.
- The final four games of Virginia's regular season feature three teams that are currently ranked in AP Top 25 – No. 25 BYU, No. 11 Notre Dame and No. 17 Pitt.
- Virginia's four-game win streak includes back-to-back road wins at Miami and Louisville. The Cavaliers have not won three consecutive road games in the same season since the 2011 (d. Miami, 28-21; d. Maryland, 31-13; d. Florida State, 14-13)
- Virginia is bowl eligible for the fifth time in six seasons thanks to a 40-48 win over Georgia Tech last Saturday at Scott Stadium. Bronco Mendenhall has been eligible for a bowl in 15 of his 16 years as a head coach and five of six at Virginia.



Dontayvion Wicks was named ACC Wide Receiver of the Week for the second-straight week. Wicks and Herman Moore are the only to UVA wide receivers to win the award in back-to-back weeks.

AGAINST BYU

- Virginia and BYU will meet for the first time since 2014 in Provo when Bronco Mendenhall was the head coach.
- The Cavaliers hold a 3-2 edge in the all-time series that includes a 22-16 win in the All-American Bowl in 1987. The All-American Bowl was the second bowl game Virginia had ever played in and took place in Birmingham, Ala.
- Saturday will be third time Virginia has played BYU in Provo.

THE BRENNAN ARMSTRONG EXPERIENCE

- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong comes into the weekend as the nation's leader in passing yards with 3,220. The total is already the second-most in a single season in UVA history.
- Armstrong has thrown for 300 or more yards seven times and 400 yards four times in eight games this season. Prior to this year a UVA quarterback hadn't thrown for 300 yards more than four times (Matt Schaub and Bryce Perkins) in the same season and thrown for 400 yards twice in the same season.
- Armstrong has thrown for 300 yards in three-straight games for the second time this season. No quarterback at UVA had ever thrown for 300-yards in three-straight games prior to this season.
- Nationally, Armstrong ranks second in total offense (424.6), second in passing yards per game (402.5), third in points responsible for (170), fourth in completions per game (29.9) and fifth in passing TDs (23).
- There have been 25, 400-yard passing performances across FBS this season, Armstrong owns four of them. Tops on the list is his school-record, 554-yard game against North Carolina.
- Armstrong has accumulated 3,397 yards of total offense this season, the most in the country and the third-highest total in a single-season in school history.

ARMSTRONG CONTINUES TO PUT UP BIG NUMBERS

- Brennan Armstrong threw for 300 yards in all but one game this season and now has eight 300-yard games in his career, tying Matt Schaub for the most in school history. Armstrong is the only UVA quarterback to throw for 300 in four consecutive games.
- Armstrong has amassed 400 yards of total offense in five of the eight games this season. His 538 yards against North Carolina were a single-game program record. Including Armstrong, only four players in UVA history have put together 400 yards of total offense in a game – Bryce Perkins (twice), Kurt Benkert (twice) and Mark Verica (once).

• Brennan Armstrong passed for school-record 554 yards in UVA's 59-39 loss at North Carolina. It was the third-highest single-game total in ACC History.

• The 538 yards of total offense and the 554 yards passing are the most by any FBS player this season.

• Armstrong accounted for 538 yards of total offense, breaking the program's single game record previously held by Bryce Perkins (490 yards) against North Carolina in 2019. It was the seventh highest single-game total in ACC history.

• The 554 yards passing was the most ever by a quarterback against North Carolina. Dave Brown of Duke set the previous record of 479 in 1989.

• Armstrong also set a UVA first half record of 364 yards.

ARMSTRONG VS. ASSOCIATED PRESS TOP 25 TEAMS

• In four career games against AP top-25 teams (No. 1 Clemson, No. 11 Miami and No. 15 North Carolina and No. 21 North Carolina) Armstrong has thrown for 1,213 yards (303.3 yards per game), 12 touchdowns (4 INTs) and rushed for 230 more yards and another score. That comes out to 1,443 yards of total offense (360.7 ypg) and 13 touchdowns responsible for.

THE ARMSTRONG ERA

• QB Brennan Armstrong was named the starting quarterback by Bronco Mendenhall on Aug. 27, 2020. He was the third opening-day starting quarterback under Bronco Mendenhall, joining Kurt Benkert (2016-17) and Bryce Perkins (2018-19).
 • Armstrong is the first left-handed starting QB at UVA since Jameel Sewell (2006, 2007, 2009).
 • Armstrong enrolled at UVA in January 2018 and backed up Perkins for two seasons, saving his redshirt season in 2018 under the NCAA participation rules.
 • Armstrong is the 13th different UVA starting quarterback to start an opener in the last 17 seasons. The list includes: Bryce Perkins (2018-19), Kurt Benkert (2016-17), Matt Johns (2015), Greyson Lambert (2014), David Watford (2013), Michael Rocco (2011-12), Marc Verica (2010), Vic Hall (2009), Peter Lalich (2008), Jameel Sewell (2007), Christian Olsen (2006) and Marques Hagans (2005).

NOTES - OFFENSE

- Virginia comes into Saturday's game with the most passing yards (3,237), the most yards of total offense (4,319) and the most first downs (221) in the country.
- UVA ranks second in passing yards per game (402.5) and fourth total yards of offense per game (539.9).
- Virginia has amassed 500 yards of total offense in all but one game this season (449 vs. Miami) and is one of five power-5 schools in the country averaging over 500 yards of total offense per game.
- Against Georgia Tech, Virginia accounted for 636 yards of total offense the sixth-most in a single game in program history and the most since 643 yards against Duke in 2010.
- UVA has scored a total of 58 points in the first half over the past two weeks (34 vs. UNC; 24 vs. Georgia Tech)
- Virginia rushed for 240 yards against Georgia Tech, its second highest total of the season and the most in an ACC contest since 262 against Boston College last season.
- Virginia matched its season-high of 48 points against Georgia Tech on Oct. 23, the fourth time this season UVA has eclipsed the 40-point mark. Virginia has had nine seasons in which it has scored 40 or more points four times in the same season (1994, 1999, 1992, 1990 (5), 1989, 1968 (5), 1914, 1896, 1894).

THE CAVALIER TARGETS

- Virginia has four wide receivers in the ACC's top-11 in receiving yards – Dontayvion Wicks (1st – 847), Keytaon Thompson (6th – 572), Billy Kemp (9th – 481) and Ra'Shaun Henry (11th – 457).
- Virginia has five players with 350 yards or more receiving, no other FBS school has four.
- Wicks earned his second-straight ACC Wide Receiver of the Week award on Oct. 25 after catching six passes for 168 yards and two touchdowns. His 77-yard catch and run in the second quarter against Georgia Tech was the longest play from scrimmage for UVA in 2021. Wicks is the first UVA wideout since Herman Moore in 1990 to win back-to-back ACC Wide Receiver Week honors.
- Wicks is tops in the ACC and fifth in the country with 22.29 yards per reception. His 847 yards receiving are the most in the ACC and the sixth most in NCAA. Wicks has hauled in eight touchdowns on the year, second most in the conference and tied for fifth most among FBS receivers.

OVER THE CENTURY MARK

- Wicks became the 12th Cavalier in UVA history with four 100-yard receiving game in a career. A Cavalier receiver hasn't put together five 100-yard games in the same year since Olimade Zaccacheaus in 2018. Kris Burd (5 in 2011) and Germane Crowell (6 in 1997) are the only other players to do it.
- Germane Crowell (1997) is the only wide receiver in UVA history with three-straight 100-yard receiving games.
- The Cavaliers have had two players with 100 yards receiving in the same game twice this season. Wicks (183) and Kemp (104) each eclipsed 100 against North Carolina while Thompson (149) and Henry (179) went over 100 against Louisville.
- There have been five different Cavaliers (Kemp-1; Wicks-4; Woods-1; Henry-1; Thompson-1) that have put together 100-yard receiving performances.

- To date, Billy Kemp IV, Keytaon Thompson, Dontayvion Wicks and Ra'Shaun Henry have each caught a pass in Virginia's eight games this season.
- 15 Cavaliers have caught a pass this season, including quarterback Brennan Armstrong who has 18 receiving yards to his name. Five pass catchers have 20 or more receptions this season.
- Jelani Woods has a touchdown in five of the seven games he's played this season. He had caught four scores in three seasons against Oklahoma State and eclipsed that mark in six games played at UVA.
- Armstrong has spread the ball around, at least nine different receivers caught a pass in five of the first six games this season including a season-high 11 against North Carolina.

KEMP ENTERS TOP-5 AT UVA

- Wide receiver Billy Kemp IV has seven or more three games this season, including nine against Miami on Sept. 30, one shy of his career high. He has caught nine or more passes in a game, six times in his career.
- Going into Saturday, Kemp has 158 career catches, the fifth-most ever by a UVA receiver. Of the 15 wide receivers inside the top 20 on UVA's career receptions list, nine have played for wide receivers coach Marques Hagans.
- Kemp has caught a pass in 23-straight games, a streak that dates back to the 2019 season.
- The sure-handed Kemp is also one of the most experienced punt returners in college football, fielding 54 career punts, the eighth most among active FBS players.

NOTES - DEFENSE/SPECIAL TEAMS

NOTING THE DEFENSE

- The Virginia defense features two of the top nine tacklers in the ACC, Nick Jackson (3rd – 8.8 TPG) and Joey Blount (9th - 8.1 TPG). Jackson, a preseason All-ACC selection, has made 70 stops in eight games and Blount has 57 tackles in seven games. Blount's 5.4 solo tackles per game are the most in the ACC.
- Three of Virginia's five interceptions on the season have come in the last two games.
- Joey Blount has back-to-back games with an interception and his eight career interceptions are tied for the 12th most among active FBS defenders.
- Virginia intercepted two passes against Duke, the first multi-interception game of the season and first since picking off five against Duke in the 2020 season opener. It was the first time this season that the Blue Devils had thrown multiple interceptions.
- Nick Jackson made a game-high 11 tackles against Duke, the fourth time this season he has registered double-digit tackles this season. He also recorded a sack and a career-high four tackles for loss. The four tackles for loss were the most since Charles Snowden made four stops in the backfield against North Carolina last season.
- Nick Grant has seven pass breakups in seven games played, tied for the most in the ACC.

Shutouts in 2021

- Virginia and No. 1 Georgia are the only Power-5 schools in the country with multiple shutouts this season.
- To preserve the shutout against Duke, UVA recovered a fumble on the goal line on Duke's final possession of the game. It was the first fumble recovered by the Virginia defense in a goal-to-go situation since 2018 at Pittsburgh.
- The Virginia defense held Duke to 110 yards rushing. The Blue Devils came into the contest with the second-best rushing attack in the ACC, averaging 218 yards per game. It was Duke's lowest rushing total of the season.
- The shutout was Virginia's first in ACC play since 2008 when it blanked Maryland, 31-0.
- Mataeo Durant, who ranked second in the ACC in rushing coming into the game accumulated 82 yards on the ground, only the second time this season he was held under 100 yards.
- Virginia has two shutouts on the season (W&M, 43-0, Duke, 48-0). It marks the first time since 2008, UVA has two or more shutouts in the same season

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Kicker Brendan Farrell has made four- straight field goals including tries of 24 and 26 yards against Georgia Tech. His only miss on the season was from 55 yards against Louisville which would have been the third longest field goal in program history.
- Farrell is 8-for-8 on field goals from 43 yards and 19-for-19 on extra point tries this season. His 43 total points scored rank 19th in the ACC and are second to Dontayvion Wicks' 48 for the team lead.
- Farrell has accumulated 28 touchbacks since taking over the kicking responsibilities beginning in the second half of the Wake Forest game. The 44 touchbacks between Justin Duenkel and Farrell are tied with Arkansas for the most in the country.
- Farrell was chosen to "Break the Rock" after the 48-0 win over Duke. He's the first kicker since Brian Delaney in 2018 to swing the sledgehammer.
- Virginia is tied for fourth in the nation in kick return defense, allowing 14.0 yards per kick return.
- Punter Jacob Finn is averaging 45.6 yards on 26 total punts which currently the second-best season average of any punter in school history.

SEASON TEAM NOTES

INSIDE THE FOUR-GAME WIN STREAK

- Against Miami, Virginia snapped a five-game road losing streak and recorded its first road win since Nov. 2, 2019 at North Carolina.
- The win at Hard Rock Stadium against Miami was the first since 2011 and the first in the last seven games at the facility.
- Virginia had previously been 0-4 in Louisville before the 34-33 win on Oct. 16.
- The back-to-back road victories were the first since 2017 (Boise State/UNC) and back-to-back road ACC wins were the first since 2011 (Miami/Maryland).
- Virginia defeated Duke for the seventh-straight time and owns a 16-6 mark against the Blue Devils since 2000.
- Virginia scored 48 points, the second-most ever against Georgia Tech to secure its fourth-straight win of the season. The Cavaliers amassed 636 yards of total offense in the 48-40 victory.

COMEBACK CAVALIERS

- Virginia recorded its second come-from-behind victory with a 48-40 win over Georgia Tech on Oct. 23. UVA trailed 13-7 after the first quarter and scored 17 unanswered points in the second quarter to capture the lead for good.
- Virginia erased a 17-point fourth quarter deficit against Louisville, outscoring the Cardinals 21-3 in the final stanza. The 21 points were the most points in the fourth quarter all season. The Cavaliers scored 21 points in a quarter one other time this season, the second quarter against North Carolina.
- The last time Virginia scored 21 points in the fourth quarter was the 2020 season opener against Duke, all coming unanswered in a 38-20 victory.
- The game-winning touchdown against Louisville was caught by Grant Misch from a yard out with 22 seconds remaining, only his fourth career catch, two of which have been TD receptions.
- The game-winning score in the final minute was the first by UVA since 2012 when Michael Rocco connected with Jake McGee with six seconds remaining for a 10-yard score to top Miami, 41-40.
- The 17-point fourth quarter UVA comeback victory was the largest since overcoming a 10-point deficit against Syracuse in 2015.
- The 17-point deficit after three quarters was tied for the third largest ever by a winning ACC team (South Carolina down 24 at UNC in 1968; NC State down 20 vs. Maryland 2011; Wake Forest down 17 at UNC in 2001).

VIRGINIA'S RECORD WHEN...

- UVA is 15-3 when possessing the ball for 34 minutes or more under Bronco Mendenhall.
- The Cavaliers are 3-0 this season when recording multiple sacks in a game.

2021 CAPTAINS

- Defensive end Mandy Alonso, quarterback Brennan Armstrong, linebacker Nick Jackson and running back Wayne Taulapapa will serve as team captains for the 2021 season.
- Armstrong is a captain for the second-straight season, while Alonso, Jackson and Taulapapa were elected for the first time. Only Micah Kiser (2016 & 2017) and Armstrong have been elected captains twice in Mendenhall's tenure.
- Including Armstrong, 12 Cavaliers have been named a captain twice since 1960: Perry Jones (2011-12), Vic Hall (2008-09), Chris Long (2006-07), Brennan Schmidt (2004-05), Byron Thweatt (1999-2000), Anthony Poindexter (1997-98), Shawn Moore (1989-90), Roy Brown (1988-89), Sean Scott (1986-87), Louis Martig (1960-61)

Bronco Mendenhall

Head Coach • Sixth Season

Since arriving at Virginia for the 2016 season, head coach Bronco Mendenhall has made an immense impact on the Cavalier program. From a two-win season, to the ACC's Coastal Division Championship and a New Year's Six bowl invitation, Virginia football's ascent has both remarkable and historic.

Mendenhall came to Charlottesville after a highly successful 11-year career at BYU with a vision and a plan of execution for the daunting renovation project he faced. He has masterfully crafted principles and culture, and instilled pride and purpose, leading to a standard of unbroken growth in just four seasons.

Having a plan and being able to execute a strategic approach to achieving results have been mission critical to Mendenhall's formula for success.

"Teams and organizations are perfectly designed to get the results that they get," Mendenhall is fond of saying regarding both successes and failures. His pursuit of "unbroken growth" centers around learning, applying and improving on tools, frameworks, networks, innovation and processes that deliver those results. His ultimate goal is more expansive than building a great football organization. He strives to build great people.

On-field success is just part of the story Mendenhall has scripted at Virginia. He is a powerful believer in balance, which he frequently sums up with one simple word ... AND. It has become the calling card for the UVA football program.

"I think decisions are made based on principle, and I think principles are governed by beliefs," Mendenhall said. "AND is one of our guiding principles, and that is based on my belief that football is a vehicle to develop people."

At his introductory press conference, Mendenhall stressed that he wanted students AND athletes and believed that combination was achievable, especially at an institution such as Virginia that ranks among the top three public universities in the nation. Since that time, he has not compromised his approach to achieving those means. More importantly, his teams have bought in on the concepts with great enthusiasm and demonstrated they can do so while also being successful on the field.

"I would love to win a national championship," Mendenhall said. "I'd love to develop a great program here. But what I would really love is for every kid in my program to have an amazing life."

In the world of big-time football, Mendenhall's philosophy is unconventional, but that doesn't faze him.

"I'm looking for the complete development of everyone in our program – and winning," he said. "One is not at the expense of the other. I think they go hand-in-hand, and winning, without the other, would be hollow to me."

Under Mendenhall, the UVA program has progressed from two to six to eight to nine wins prior to the 2020 pandemic-shortened season that saw the Cavaliers go 5-5. Achievements and recognitions on the field, in the classroom and around the community have exponentially increased as well.

In 2019, UVA placed 10 players on the ACC All-Academic team, the most in the program's history. Seven earned the award in 2020 when a total of 34 Cavaliers received ACC Honor Roll honors. Also in 2019, linebacker Jordan Mack was named the ACC's Jim Tatum Award winner as the league's top football scholar-athlete and was a finalist for the William B. Campbell Trophy, known in the sport as the "academic Heisman." Linebacker Micah Kiser, now a member of the Los Angeles Rams, won the award in 2017.

Giving back has become a cornerstone of Virginia football. Players frequently visit the University's Children's Medical Center and speak at local elementary schools. The team's Thursday's Heroes program has been recognized for its efforts to honor individuals across the state of Virginia who are dealing with personal adversity. In 2020, the ACC honored the Thursday's Heroes program with its "Game Changers" award, which recognizes and highlights specific conference teams' involvement with their local communities.

"I'm in pursuit, and we're in pursuit as a football program, of both of those things, and without compromising our expectations for one or the other," Mendenhall said. "I want good young people. I'm talking about morals, values, character, behavior and contribution to the world. And I want a great team. I know it sounds idealistic, but I would not coach football if I did not think it could be done, and I would not coach at Virginia if I did not think there was support for doing it that way."

Mendenhall's pursuit of individual growth is only magnified by the success his teams have also achieved on the field. His name appears often when the accolades of college football's leading active coaches are charted.

THE 4TH SIDE

- The 4th Side will be woven into the UVA home game experience in 2021. Life-size 4th Side letters are located on the northeast concourse and are a perfect game day photo opportunity. The Virginia student section will unveil a giant 4thSide Tifo just prior to kickoff at every home game. Additionally, the stadium concourses will include new 4th Side pageantry posters to reinforce the importance of UVA fans and their contributions to the game day atmosphere.
- Offense and defense are two sides. Special teams is the third side. **The 4th Side**, in Bronco Mendenhall’s teaching, is the sidelines. Mendenhall has made it a point of emphasis with his team since arriving in Charlottesville that **The 4th Side** is as important as the other three. And just as he expects his teams to perform on offense, defense and special teams, Mendenhall wants his players on the sidelines to thrive. By extension, the UVA fan base is also part of the **The 4th Side**.
- **Bronco Mendenhall Said It:** “It starts on our sideline and possibly the name of all of our fans as the entire stadium becomes The 4th Side.”
- **WR Terrell Jana Said It:** “It is the 4th Side for a reason because of the four aspects of the team. Coach shows film in the meeting room of players on the 4th Side. The team sees that and takes pride in that.”

EARN YOUR JERSEY NUMBER

- Head coach Bronco Mendenhall introduced what he sees as the bedrock of his “earned not given” mantra when he arrived in Charlottesville in 2016. The majority of numbers are picked over the course of the selection ceremonies during the final three weekends of fall camp. Once the season ends, all players return to the status of no number for winter conditioning, spring ball and summer workouts.
- To be considered for number selection, players have to meet certain physical benchmarks – weight room numbers, conditioning times, etc. – but it’s also about dedication to the program, overall effort in practice and having the right disposition in the locker room.
- Bronco Mendenhall doesn’t choose the order. The task unit leaders do.
- **Bronco Mendenhall Said It:** “The task unit leaders, they’re the ones who are with their teammates every day in the locker room. They’re with them in class. They’re with them in their apartments. They see a lot more than I see. Our players have embraced it, and it matters to them to be endorsed by their peers to be on our team.”
- Alum **Jordan Mack Said It:** “Part of our program is earned not given. They know what to expect coming in, and they know nothing is going to be given. To earn a number, gear, anything with a Virginia sabre on it, you’re going to have to earn it through your hard work.”



STATE CHANGES

- White ► Grey ► Orange ► Navy ► Black
- Workout gear color is immediate feedback where our student-athletes stand in their training in order to drive positive change.
- Everything in performance is tracked from the moment they step on Grounds to show their gains. All new players begin their UVA careers wearing white.
- Black workout gear is the pinnacle in the UVA strength & conditioning. Nick Grant and Mandy Alonso were the only to players on the current roster to reach black.

THURSDAY’S HEROES

- The Thursday’s Heroes program is coordinated by the UVA team. Originally at BYU, Thursday’s Heroes transitioned to UVA when Bronco Mendenhall became Head Coach in 2016. Since then, the program has continued to grow, warming the hearts of players, coaches, fans, and of course, the Heroes. Each Thursday during the Fall and Spring season, an individual who is undergoing a difficult circumstance (medical, physical, cognitive, etc.) and their family is invited to tour the football facilities, watch practice, meet the coaches/ team, and receive special gifts unique to each Hero. Different players take turns showering the Hero with gifts, including UVA gear, an official game jersey, Beats by Dre, a bicycle, school supplies, Halloween costumes, and special video messages from favorite celebrities (Peyton Manning, Kenny Chesney, Damian Lillard, Chris Long and Hugh Jackman to name a few have taken part). The goal of the program is simple: to put a smile on the Hero’s face and to welcome them to the Virginia Football family.
- **TB Wayne Taulapapa Said It:** “Everybody is Somebody ... Every day we look up to them and the fight they are in. We want them to know they are with us and we are with them.”

UNIQUELY VIRGINIA FOOTBALL

MAD HATTERS (PUT ON THE HATS)

- The “Mad Hatters” is the name of the Virginia Football Scout Team. It drew inspiration from the character frozen in time in “Alice in Wonderland,” but the name has as much to do with the evolution of pennies scout team players once draped over their shoulder pads to brightly colored pieces of fabric, which stretch over their helmets. Hence, “Put on the hats.”
- Each Thursday after practice the “Mad Hatter of the Week” is announced by a task unit leader.
- **Bronco Mendenhall Said It:** “The way I frame it to our team is without going through that process, I think there is a fundamental step missed in their development. Most recruits and most young people want to come in and play their first year. Most of us, right, it’s kind of about us. When you’re in that role, it’s really about serving and helping your team.”

UVA GROUNDSKEEPERS

- Virginia’s football program wants to be a catalyst for change in the community, helping to turn the pain of the Charlottesville riots of Aug. 12, 2017 into a celebration of life, love and unity. During the summer of 2020, a player-led initiative was born in the form of the Groundskeepers in order to “Take Back our Grounds” from the white nationalists that descended upon Charlottesville in 2017.
- To be part of the Groundskeepers, participants take part in their own march, which starts downtown at Heather Heyer Way — the street named in honor of the woman who lost her life during the Aug. 12 demonstrations — before heading to the Enslaved Workers Memorial and the Rotunda.
- **Bronco Mendenhall Said It:** “We chose to take this march in direct opposition and the exact opposite direction of the events that happened in the death of Heather Heyer. We’re standing against hate, inequality, anything that doesn’t reflect well on the state of mankind, especially at the University of Virginia.”
- **OLB Charles Snowden Said It:** We are committed to making a change in our community. We are committed to fighting for what’s right. We are committed to a better future. We are the Groundskeepers. Just thinking about what transpired those two days and what those two days signify and stand for — There were protests led in the name of hatred, racism, oppression and that’s harmful. That’s hurtful to a lot of people and that’s not what the city of Charlottesville stands for. That’s not what the University of Virginia stands for. The Groundskeepers here at UVA, we just want to show that’s not who we are and not what we stand for. So we’re just trying to take back the power of those days and show that we stand for love, unity, respect, uplifting one another, and just doing what’s right.”
- One of UVA’s four flags they run onto the field with each game is a flag that represents the Groundskeeper, which serves as constant reminder to the community of the importance of being unified in love rather than hate.

THE SHIELD

- The shield is an important part of the Virginia football program. On the shield, which was modeled after shields used in the movie 300, has three numbers: +1, 24, +5. They represent a formula that Bronco Mendenhall and his staff developed after years of data study and analytics that will lead to probable wins. Each game UVA’s goal is to be at least +1 in turnover margin, score at least 24 points while holding opponents under 24 points and being at least +5 in field position. Accomplishing each of those goals in a game creates a winning scenario.
- Virginia’s shield (pictured) is always represented in the UVA locker room.
- The shield also has the UVA guiding principles painted around the shield.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 490 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 284-194-12.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WAH

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

- Virginia has now won eight-straight night games
- The Cavaliers improve to 84-39-9 all-time in season openers
- Under Bronco Mendenhall, Virginia has won five of six season openers
- Billy Kemp had four receptions against W&M and now has 108 for his career, tied with Patrick Jeffers for the 19th most in UVA history.
- Kemp's career-high, 55-yard punt return in the first quarter setup the game's only points in the first quarter, a 39-yard field goal by Justin Duenkel.
- The Cavalier defense held William & Mary to 183 yards of total offense, the first time holding an opponent to under 200 yards since limiting the Tribe to 193 in 2019.
- Virginia's last shutout in a season opener came on August 30, 2003, a 27-0 blanking of Duke.
- Virginia is 31-6-1 against W&M and has won five-straight meetings
- Saturday's shutout was the 13th against William & Mary in 39 all-time games. The last time the Cavaliers shutout the Tribe was in 1951, a 46-0 victory in Charlottesville.
- It marked the first time William & Mary was shutout since September 29, 2018 (23-0 against Colgate).
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong passed for 336 yards, his second 300-yard passing game of his career
- The Cavalier offense amassed 500 yards of total offense for the three-straight home game. The Cavaliers compiled 518 yards against Abilene Christian on Nov. 21 and 549 against Boston College in last year's home finale.
- Armstrong scored Virginia's first touchdown of the season, a two-yard rush in the second quarter. The signal caller also scored the first of the year last year, a four-yard score against Duke.
- UVA has now wone nine-straight games against non-conference opponents at Scott Stadium. UVA is 10-2 under Mendenhall against non-ACC foes.
- Since 2019, Virginia is 13-1 at Scott Stadium.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson led UVA with 12 tackles, the eighth time in his career he's recorded 10 or more tackles.

Game Notes

- Virginia recorded its first win over Illinois in three all-time meetings. The two teams have only met in bowl games, the 1999 MicronPc.com Bowl and the 1990 Citrus Bowl.
- Virginia has won five of its last seven matchups against Big Ten foes.
- Since 2019, UVA is 14-1 at Scott Stadium and have won 10-straight games at home against non-conference opponents.
- Virginia is 2-0 for the second time under Bronco Mendenhall (2019) and sixth time since 2000.
- Virginia has held its first two opponents of the season to 14 points, the fewest since shutting out both of its first two opponents in 1952.
- Brennan Armstrong became the third Cavalier quarterback to throw for 400 yards in a game. His 405 yards passing are the fourth most in a single game in program history.
- Armstrong threw five touchdown passes, a career-high and the most by a UVA quarterback since Kurt Benkert against Central Michigan in 2016. Armstrong has thrown multiple touchdown passes in three-straight games dating back to last season.
- Armstrong completed a career-high 27 passes. He was 7-for-13 with 171 yards (career-best) and two touchdowns in the first quarter. He completed seven of his first eight passes and completed six-straight passes starting with the Jelani Woods touchdown.
- Tight end Jelani Woods recorded a career-high 122 yards receiving, the most by a Cavalier tight end since Tom Santi (128 yards) in the 2005 Music City Bowl against Minnesota. Woods' previous career high of 54 yards receiving was established against Iowa State on Oct. 24, 2020 while at Oklahoma State.
- Woods' touchdown in the first quarter was the fifth of his career.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks caught three passes for 69 yards and two touchdowns. The two touchdown performance was the first of his career and the first by a UVA wideout since Lavel Davis Jr. caught two in the opener against Duke last season.
- Billy Kemp IV caught six passes bringing his career total up to 112, the 19th most in school history, two behind Herman Moore (1988-90) and Wali Lundy (2002-05). • Kemp IV has caught a pass in 17-straight games dating back to the 2019 season.
- Kemp's TD reception in the third quarter was his first of the season and third of his career.
- Brennan Armstrong caught his first pass of his career on the first career completion thrown by WR Dontayvion Wicks for 18 yards in the third quarter.
- Wayne Taulapapa's capped the UVA scoring in the fourth quarter with his first career receiving touchdown, a three-yard pass from Armstrong.
- Linebacker Noah Taylor recorded a career-high two sacks and now has six for his career.

- Virginia had its four-game winning streak against North Carolina snapped. The Cavaliers are 4-2 against the Tar Heels under Bronco Mendenhall.
- Virginia falls to 66-36-1 all-time in night games and 24-34 in road night games.
- The loss snaps a five-game win streak in ACC openers and is the first ACC opening loss under Mendenhall.
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's single-game passing record with 554 yards breaking Kurt Benkert's mark of 455 set in 2017 against UConn. He's the first Cavalier quarterback to throw for 500 yards in a game. He threw for 364 yards in the first half, also a program record.
- Armstrong accounted for 538 yards of total offense breaking the single-game school record set by Bryce Perkins (490 yards) against North Carolina in 2019.
- Armstrong the first UVA quarterback to throw for 300 yards in three-straight games. The 300-yard game was the fourth of his career.
- Armstrong threw four touchdown passes in the contest, the third time he's thrown for four or more touchdowns in a game. He now has 31 career touchdown passes, the seventh most in UVA history.
- Armstrong moved into 14th place in career total offense at UVA with 4,333 yards, passing Dan Ellis (1997-2000) and Bob Davis (1964-66).
- Armstrong entered UVA's top-15 in career passing yards with 3,673.
- The 554 yards passing was the most ever by a North Carolina opposing quarterback. Previous high was Dave Brown (Duke) 479 yards in 1989.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks established career-highs in receptions (7) and yards (183). His 183 yards receiving were the sixth-highest single-game total ever by a UVA receiver. He caught a 40-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the second TD reception of 40 or more yards in his career (44 vs. Liberty in 2019).
- Billy Kemp IV caught a team-high eight passes and has now caught a pass in 18-straight games. He finished with a career-high 104 yards receiving, his first 100-yard receiving game of his career. He scored touchdowns of 21 and nine yards, his first two-touchdown game of his career.
- Kemp has 120 career receptions, tied with Germane Crowell (1994-97) for the 14th most in school history.
- Fentrell Cypress recorded his first career interception taking Sam Howell's pass to the end zone 66 yards. The return was the 11th longest in program history.

Game Notes

- Wake Forest extended its win streak to five games against Virginia, the longest in the series against UVA.
- The loss snapped the Cavaliers' six-game home win streak that dated back to last season.
- UVA dropped to 8-2 in night games at home under Bronco Mendenhall and 1-2 at night this season.
- The home loss for Virginia was only its third in its last 22 games at Scott Stadium.
- Virginia has accumulated 500 yards of total offense in four-straight games after 506 against Wake Forest (407 passing, 99 rushing).
- Brennan Armstrong threw for 300 yards for the fourth-straight game. Only Matt Schaub (8), Aaron Brooks (6), Bryce Perkins (5) and Armstrong (5) and have five or more 300-yard passing games in their careers. Armstrong is the only one of the group to throw for 300 in four consecutive games.
- The 407 yards passing by Armstrong was the fifth-highest total in program history.
- Of the six 400-yard passing games in UVA history, Armstrong has three of them. He threw for 405 against Illinois and 564 against North Carolina this season.

- Armstrong added a season-high 33 yards rushing and accounted for 440 yards of total offense.
- Billy Kemp IV made seven catches and now has caught a pass in 19-straight games, a streak that dates back to Nov. 9, 2019.
- Kemp now has 127 receptions for his career, surpassing former teammate Terrell Jana for 12th place on UVA's career receptions list.
- Jelani Woods, Ra'Shaun Henry, Billy Kemp, Keytaon Thompson, Mike Hollins & Dontayvion Wicks have each caught a pass in all four games this season.
- Wicks caught a career-high eight passes for 114 yards and a touchdown. He has now caught three touchdowns in the last two games.
- Wicks is the first Cavalier wide receiver with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Hasise Dubois in 2019 (Virginia Tech & Clemson).

Game Notes

- Virginia recorded its first win in five tries at Cardinal Stadium and evened up the all-time series with Louisville, 5-5.
- The Cavaliers rallied from a 17-point fourth quarter deficit, the largest fourth-quarter comeback since overcoming a 10-point margin against Syracuse in 2015, ultimately prevailing 44-38 in three overtimes.
- Virginia has won back-to-back road games for the first time since 2017 (Boise State/UNC) and back-to-back road ACC games for the first time since 2011 (Miami/Maryland)
- Virginia outscored Louisville 21-3 in the fourth quarter, the most points in the fourth quarter all season. The Cavaliers scored 21 points one other time this season, the second quarter against North Carolina.
- The game's final touchdown came with 22 seconds on the clock, the first time UVA scored in the final minute to win a game since 2012 when Michael Rocco connected with Jake McGee for a 10-yard score to top Miami, 41-40.
- Ra'Shaun Henry had nine catches for 179 yards, both the most in his two seasons at UVA. His collegiate career-high came while at St. Francis (Pa.) when he caught 12 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns against Delaware State in 2019.
- The 179 yards receiving are the second-most by a UVA wide receiver this season (Dontayvion Wicks – 183 at North Carolina) and the ninth-most ever by a UVA wide receiver in a game.
- Keytoan Thompson had a career high in receptions (10) and yards (149). He made four catches on the Virginia's final drive for 68 yards, including two on fourth down.
- Billy Kemp had eight catches on the afternoon, tying him with Heath Miller (2002-04) for sixth all-time on UVA's career receptions list with 145. He is six behind former teammate Hasise Dubois (2016-19) for fifth place.
- Brennan Armstrong was 40-of-60 for 487 yards and three touchdowns. The 60 pass attempts were a career-high. The 486 yards passing was the second-highest total in school history. He set the UVA passing record vs. North Carolina (554) earlier this year. Of the seven 400-yard games in program history, Armstrong has four of them.
- Armstrong has thrown for 300 yards in a game six times in his career and all but one game this season. The six, 300-yard games are tied with Aaron Brooks for the second most in UVA history.
- Armstrong moved into 10th place on UVA's all-time passing list with 4,835 yards, moving past Michael Rocco (2010-12) 4,731. Armstrong trails Marques Hagans (2002-05) by 42 yards for ninth place.
- Defensive back Coen King made a team-high, eight tackles, one shy of his career high. In the second quarter he a forced fumble and recovered it on a Louisville drive in UVA territory. It was only the second fumble recovery by the Virginia defense this season.

Game Notes

- Virginia has won seven-straight meetings against Duke and leads all-time series, 40-33. UVA is 16-6 against the Blue Devils since 2000.
- Virginia is 49-45-2 all-time in homecomings games and has now won three-straight for the first time since 2007-09.
- The Cavaliers scored 34 points in the first half, the most in an ACC game since 2004 against North Carolina.
- Virginia intercepted two passes, the first multi-interception game of the season and first since picking off five against Duke in the 2020 season opener. It was the first time this season that Duke had thrown multiple interceptions.
- The Virginia defense held Duke to 110 yards rushing. The Blue Devils came into the contest with the second-best rushing attack in the ACC, averaging 218 yards per game. It was Duke's lowest rushing total of the season.
- Mataeo Durant, who ranked second in the ACC in rushing coming into the game accumulated 82 yards on the ground, only the second time this season he was held under 100 yards.
- The shutout was Virginia's first in ACC play since 2008 when it blanked Maryland, 31-0.
- The 48-point margin of victory was the highest in the Bronco Mendenhall era. (2016-present). It was the sixth time since 2016 UVA has scored 48 or more points in a game.
- The 48-0 shutout was the largest in ACC play since defeating Miami, 48-0 in 2007.
- Virginia has two shutouts on the season (W&M, 43-0, Duke, 48-0). It marks the first time since 2008, UVA has two or more shutouts in the same season
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong passed for 364 yards, all in three quarters of action. It marked the sixth time this season he has passed for 300 or more yards.
- Armstrong went over the 5,000-yard passing mark for his career and moved into seventh place all-time on UVA's career passing list with 5,199 yards. He surpassed Marques Hagans (4,877), Marc Verica (4,992) and Aaron Brooks (5,118) in Saturday's game.
- Wide receiver Billy Kemp IV caught six passes for 65 yards, his 22nd straight game with a reception. He took over sole possession of sixth place all-time on UVA's career reception list (150 receptions), passing Heath Miller (144 receptions).
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks led UVA with seven catches and 125 yards and a touchdown. The 100-yard receiving game was Wicks' third of the season. He has a reception in all seven games this season.
- Specialist Brendan Farrell was a perfect 2-for-2 on field goals (31, 34) and was 5-for-5 on extra points. He is 6-for-6 this season on field goals from 43 yards and in.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson made a game-high 11 tackles, the fourth time this season he has registered double-digit tackles. He also recorded a sack and a career-high four tackles for loss.
- Joey Blount recorded his seventh career interception and made four tackles (three solo).
- De'Vante Cross intercepted a second quarter pass that setup Farrell's 34-yard field goal. He has six career interceptions.

Game Notes

- Virginia won its fourth-straight ACC games for the first time since 2011.
- The Cavaliers amassed 636 yards of total offense the sixth-most in a single game in program history and the most since 643 yards against Duke in 2010.
- It marked the 43rd meeting between Georgia Tech and Virginia, the all-time series is even at 21-21-1.
- The 48 points against Georgia Tech were the most by UVA since 1992, a 55-24 win in Charlottesville.
- Virginia compiled 454 combined yards between the second and third quarters, out-scoring the Yellow Jackets, 34-11 in that span.
- Virginia rushed for 240 yards, its second highest total of the season and the most in an ACC contest since 262 against Boston College last season.
- Brennan Armstrong accounted for 495 yards of total offense (396 passing, 99 yards rushing), the second-highest single-game total in program history. He owns the single-game mark of 538 set against North Carolina earlier this season.
- Armstrong's 99 rushing yards were the most by a Cavalier this season. His 45-yard rush in the second quarter was also the longest by a UVA rusher in 2021.
- Armstrong accounted for a career-high, six touchdowns (4 passing, 2 rushing). It marked the third time in his career he's had multiple rushing touchdowns in a game. UVA improved to 7-0 when Armstrong rushes for a touchdown. Armstrong has 10 career rushing touchdowns, the 10th most by a UVA quarterback.
- Dontayvion Wicks recorded his fourth 100-yard receiving performance of the season, finishing with six catches for 168 yards and two touchdowns. He collected 132 yards in the second quarter. His 77-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter was the longest play from scrimmage this season for UVA.
- Wicks' had his second two-touchdown game of the season (at UNC). He has a touchdown reception in all but two games this year and leads the team with eight touchdowns in 2021.
- Billy Kemp IV caught Brennan Armstrong's first pass of the night to extend his consecutive games with a reception streak to 23 games. He caught eight balls for 50 yards and caught his seventh career touchdown.
- Kemp surpassed former teammate Hasise Dubois for fifth place all-time on UVA's reception list and now has 158 receptions at UVA.
- For the second-straight game, Joey Blount intercepted a pass. It was the second of the season and eighth of his career.
- Noah Taylor blocked a point after try on Georgia Tech's second touchdown of the day, the first PAT block by UVA since Juan Thornhill blocked one at Indiana in 2018.
