The BYU Cougars (1-1) host the University of Portland Pilots (2-3) Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. MT in the Marriott Center. The game will not be televised but can be heard on KSL Newsradio 102.7 FM and 1160 AM out of Salt Lake City and via the Internet at KSL.com. BYU currently owns the nation's seventh-longest active homecourt winning streak at 15 games.

COUGAR QUICK HITS

— Cougar head coach Dave Rose guided BYU to a 20-9 record and an NIT appearance last season in his first year at the helm after eight years as BYU's lead assistant. He was named the Mountain West Conference and USBWVA District VIII Coach of the Year. Rose coached his team to a second-place MWC finish — one game behind league-champion San Diego State — while turning a 9-21 team into a 20-9 success that proved to be the second-best improvement among all Division I programs.

— BYU was picked to finish second in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason MWC media poll.

— BYU's roster this season includes a solid core of returning players, including six seniors and Trent Plaisted, the MWC Freshman of the Year last year. One of nine returning lettermen, Plaisted was named a Freshman All-American after leading BYU in both scoring (13.6) and rebounding (6.9) one year ago. 2006 All-MWC Third Team forward Keena Young leads BYU this year in scoring (17.0) and rebounds (7.0).

— Players on the roster who are seeing their first action for BYU this year include junior redshirt Vuk Ivanovic (Jr., 6-10, C/F), sophomore Gavin MacGregor (6-9, F/C) and junior transfer Ben Murdock (6-2, G). Freshmen Jonathan Tavernari (6-6, G/F), Jordan Cameron (6-5, G/F) and Brock Zylstra (6-6, G/F) are expected to redshirt the season.

LOOKING AT PORTLAND

The Portland Pilots are 2-3 so far this season, having won their last two games, and return three starters among 10 letterwinners from last year's 11-18 team that tied for sixth in the West Coast Conference with a 5-9 record. Sophomore forward Jamie Jones currently leads the Pilots in scoring with 12.4 points per game on a team-best .644 shooting from the field. The 6-foot-7 California native is also second on the team in rebounds averaging 7.0 boards per contest. Senior center Ben Sullivan paces Portland on the glass with 7.2 rpg and with 3.2 assists in scoring at 10.6 ppg while shooting .444 from the field and .909 (20-of-22) from the free-throw line. The 6-foot-10 center has posted double-doubles for Portland in the last two games. Junior forward Sherrard Watson is close behind in the scoring category, averaging 10.4 ppg on .524 shooting from the floor and pulling down 4.0 rpg, also third on the team. Sophomore point guard Brian McTear currently averages 5.2 ppg to go along with 3.2 assists per game. The Pilots are without the services of last year's leading scorer Pooh Jeter, who averaged 18.5 ppg and was the only Portland player to start all 29 contests. As a team, the Pilots are averaging 58.2 ppg on .420 shooting from the field while allowing opponents to score 61.8 ppg on .388 shooting from the floor. Portland outrebounds opponents by an average of 3.8 boards per game - 36.6 to 32.8. Pilot head coach Eric Reveno is in his first season with the Portland program after a 10-year assistant coaching stint at Stanford (1997-2006).

LAST OUTING — PORTLAND DOWNS UC DAVIS FOR SECOND STRAIGHT WIN

PORTLAND, Ore. (Nov. 19, 2006) — Ben Sullivan and Jamie Jones combined for 37 points and 20 rebounds to lift the Portland Pilots to a 76-72 victory over the UC Davis Aggies Sunday afternoon at the Chiles Center. Sherrard Watson led all scorers with 21 points, establishing a career-high for the second straight game. Coming off of a 59-53 win over Montana State on Friday, the Pilots (2-3) improved to 2-0 on their home court despite missing numerous key players again on Sunday. Sullivan, who had 12 points and 14 boards on Friday, tallied his second double-double in as many games with 16 points and 10 rebounds, including two crucial putbacks in the closing minutes to give the Pilots momentum. After leading most of the game, Portland found itself trailing 57-54 with 7:46 remaining. That's when Sullivan and Jones took over: Sullivan made a three-point play to tie the game and added a pair of putbacks to give Portland a 63-57 lead. Jones also had three layups, four rebounds and a blocked shot in the final six minutes, helping ignite a 13-1 run and give the Pilots their largest margin at 70-58. The Aggies (0-4) made it interesting with a pair of three-pointers in the final minute to cut the margin to four, but Portland made four free throws in the closing seconds to maintain the victory. Jones also had a double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds, including 11 points and eight boards in the second period. Watson, whose previous career-high was six points prior to his 20-point outbreak on Friday, finished with 21 on 9-for-15 shooting from the field. "The coaches have been telling me to take shots when I get them," Watson said. "The last couple years, that wasn't my role. This year, with other players being out it's given me the opportunity to step my game up and the coaches just want me to play a bigger role (on offense)." Sophomore point guard Brian McTear set a career-high with nine assists, navigating UC Davis' relentless full court pressure admirably. "They make it hard to play your style," Portland head coach Eric Reveno said, regarding the up-tempo, full court pressing system that UC Davis plays. "Sometimes you have to go with it, be aggressive and take advantage of high percentage shots. I think we turned it over more than we'd have liked, but we were able to execute fairly well." Portland shot 52 percent from the field and held the Aggies to 42 percent shooting. The Pilots struggled at the foul line, making just 13 of 24 attempts. A 42-24 edge in points in the paint and 11-1 margin in second chance points was the difference for the Pilots. Portland held a 34-29 halftime lead, fueled by defensive intensity which led to five player control fouls on UC Davis and 33 percent shooting from the Aggies. "We did a great job of guarding them in the first half," Reveno said. "Getting five charges in one half, that's the type of energy and effort we need to be successful."

BYU VS. PORTLAND SERIES NOTES

The Cougars and Pilots have met just twice before, splitting both games for a 1-1 series tie. The two teams first met in Provo on Dec. 14, 1957 with Portland getting a 63-54 win. BYU returned the favor the following year with a 77-72 victory in Portland on Dec. 3, 1958.

BYU'S LAST OUTING — BALDERSON LEADS COUGARS IN OVERTIME THRILLER

ROVO, Utah (Nov. 18, 2006) – BYU defeated Idaho State in thrilling fashion Saturday evening at the Marriott Center, as the Cougars posted an 84-78 overtime victory. With the win, BYU climbs to 1-1, while Idaho State falls to 1-2 on the season. Jimmy Balderson paced the Cougars with 23 points, while Keena Young added 18 points and 10 rebounds to record the fourth double-double of his career. Idaho State's Akbar Abdul-Ahad led all scorers with 26 points on the evening. Austin Ainge posted a game-high four assists. BYU got off to a fast start, jumping out to an early 8-0 lead, which included two steals and a block. Trent Plaisted started the Cougar scoring with a baseline dunk 15 seconds into the game followed by a BYU steal that resulted in a Young jumper. Moments later, Plaisted blocked Idaho State's John Ofoegbu, resulting in another bucket from Young. Balderson and Lee Cumnard teamed up to score the final bucket of the run. Balderson made a steal and flipped the ball up court to Cumnard, who netted the layup. Ofoegbu finally put the Bengals on the board at the 15:47 mark, scoring back-to-back layups. Matt Stucki then hit a three pointer for Idaho State, drawing the score even, 10-10, with just under 14 minutes remaining in the half. Cumnard immediately responded with an offensive putback to regain the Cougar lead, 12-10. Austin Ainge added a spark for BYU when he entered the game at the 11-minute mark, going 3-for-5 from behind the arc overall and converting his first three attempts. With nine minutes remaining in the half, Ainge brought the ball down the floor, hesitated at the free-throw line and lobbed a pass to a streaking Malaman, giving the Cougars a nine-point lead, 25-16. Balderson extended the lead to 12 points with 6:47 left in the half. He received the ball on the left wing, slipped past a Bengal defender, drove to the opposite side of the basket and laced the ball in. Balderson was fouled on the shot and converted the three-point play. David Schroeder then nailed a much-needed three pointer for Idaho State, but Ainge quickly responded with a three-point bucket of his own. The Bengals held on for the last shot of the half with Austin Kilpatrick draining a three-pointer to send Idaho State into the half down 13 points, 42-29. Idaho State started the second half on fire, going on a 24-5 run during the first 11 minutes. BYU went just 1-for-10 from the field to open the half. The Bengals started the half with a free throw from David Schroeder, an offensive putback by Ofoegbu and a layup from Logan Kinghorn. BYU finally got on the board three minutes into the half when Malaman hit a streaking Balderson for a layup, giving the Cougars a seven-point lead, 44-36. Kinghorn then scored six straight points to bring the Bengals to within two, 44-42. Abdul-Ahad tied the game at 45 points apiece with 11:33 remaining and then scored another jumper at the 9:50 mark to give the Bengals their first lead of the game, 48-47. Balderson broke the Cougar slump with eight minutes remaining, nailing a three-pointer from the right baseline. The bucket cut Idaho State's lead to three, 53-50. BYU came alive with five minutes left, sparked by a Plaisted free throw and buckets from Broadus and Young. A three pointer from Balderson moments later drew BYU to within two points at 60-58. Broadus regained the BYU lead at the 3:53 mark when he netted a three-point shot. Balderson followed that up with another three-pointer. Ofoegbu kept Idaho State's hopes alive, closing the gap to one-point at 64-63. With 24 seconds remaining in regulation, Broadus hit two free throws to give BYU a three-point advantage, 66-63. Idaho State's Abdul-Ahad then hit a three-pointer with six seconds left to tie the score at 68 points after two complete halves of action. BYU started off the overtime period with a bucket from Young, but seconds later Plaisted was called for his fifth foul of the evening. The Cougars were forced to play the rest of the game without the sophomore standout. Broadus netted a three-pointer with 3:39 remaining, giving BYU a four-point lead, 74-40. Balderson sealed the deal with 27 seconds remaining when he hit his fourth three-pointer of the night. Bengal head coach Joe O'Brien said he was pleased with how hard his team fought in the second half. BYU, which shot just 28 percent during the second half, managed to hit 47.4 percent of its shots on the evening, while the Bengals shot 44.4 percent from the field.

COUGARS KEEP IT CLOSE BUT FALL AT NO. 5 UCLA

LOS ANGELES (Nov. 15, 2006) – The BYU Cougars kept it close but faded at the end at No. 5 UCLA Wednesday night, losing 82-69 in their season-opener. After leading by as many as nine in the first half and hanging tight in the second half, BYU allowed the Bruins to end the game on an 18-7 run to seal the win. Senior Keena Young led the Cougars with 16 points on 6-for-8 shooting from the field and 4-for-4 shooting from the free-throw line while also pacing BYU with four rebounds. Junior Sam Burgess tied his career high with nine points on 3-for-3 shooting from three-point range in his first action since 2004-05, while Mike Rose was also a perfect 3-for-3 from long range for nine points. Jimmy Balderson and Lee Cumnard also each added nine as the Cougars shot .578 from the field, including .667 (10-of-15) from behind the arc. UCLA was led by sophomore Luc Richard Mbah a Moute with game highs of 24 points and 11 rebounds. The Bruins shot 50 percent from the field and outrebounded the Cougars 31-21, including a 14-3 advantage on the offensive glass. After UCLA jumped out to a 6-0 early lead, a layin from Young got BYU on the scoreboard at the 16:50 mark. But the Cougars continued to struggle early as the Bruins pulled down seven rebounds, including five on the offensive glass, while BYU committed six turnovers in the first five minutes of the game, resulting in a 10-2 UCLA lead. However, after a BYU time-out, a dunk from Trent Plaisted sandwiched between back-to-back Bruin turnovers sparked a 12-2 Cougar run that saw BYU take its first lead of the game at 14-12 on back-to-back three-pointers by Burgess. UCLA tied the game on the next possession, but Austin Ainge came off the bench and buried another three-pointer to stretch the lead to 17-14. UCLA regained the advantage at 18-17, but the three-pointer continued to fall for the Cougars as Rose entered the game and drained his first attempt and then Ainge and Rose each buried one to give BYU a 26-20 lead and force a UCLA time-out. The break didn't slow BYU down, however, as Rose came out of the time-out with yet another long-range bomb, the Cougars' seventh of the half, to extend the lead to 29-20. After a 5-0 Bruin spurt cut the lead to four points at 29-25, the two teams traded buckets until a three-point play and a three-point make from Cumnard on either side of a UCLA layin gave the Cougars a 39-31 lead. But BYU failed to score in the final 2:41 of the half, allowing the Bruins to cut the deficit to 39-36 at the break. Young got the Cougars going in the second half much as he did in the first with a layin on BYU's first possession, but UCLA roared back with 10 straight points to take its first advantage since leading 12-11 at the 13:02 mark of the first half at 43-41. UCLA's Collison buried a three-pointer on the next Bruin possession, starting a flurry of three-point makes by both teams, but a BYU turnover on the fastbreak as the Cougars were about to tie the game preserved the two-point UCLA lead at 49-47, which the Bruins extended to 54-47. Jimmy Balderson got on the scoreboard with a three-point play to cut the lead to 54-50 but was answered with a three-point make by the Bruins. However, a 6-0 run over the next minute of play, including four more points from Balderson, got BYU within one point at 59-58. After a pair of UCLA free throws, Vuk Ivanovic scored his first points in a Cougar uniform to again cut the lead to one with 8:15 left to play in the game. But the Bruins kept their composure and put together a 10-2 run from there to take their largest lead of the game at 71-62 with just under three minutes to play. The UCLA pressure continued the rest of the way as the Bruins recorded the 82-69 win.

WHAT WAS SAID AFTER THE GAME ...

BYU Head Coach Dave Rose

– “We executed our game plan really well and got ourselves in a position to win the game, but weren't able to get it done. There were a lot of 50/50 plays, but UCLA was a little bit quicker in going and getting it done. I think we've got a lot of different pieces. We just need to get it going for a full 40 minutes.”
 – “Trent [Plaisted] handled double-team really well. That's one of the reasons we got so many open shots in the first half, he was able to get the pass out. Sam, Mike and Austin all came in and hit some big shots for us. It's a good sign to get good play from our bench. Trent is going to get double-teamed a lot, but as our shooters hit more shots, teams will have to pick their poison.”

UCLA Head Coach Ben Howland

– “BYU is going to do a lot of good things this year. This was a very difficult home opener. BYU is probably the toughest team any top-25 team in the country is playing in their home opener.”
 – “If there's a better shooting team in the country, I'd like to see them. This was a hard-fought win over a very good team.”

AINGE, BALDERSON, YOUNG NAMED TEAM CAPTAINS

Coach Rose and the Cougar coaching staff have announced this year's team captains, calling upon seniors Austin Ainge, Jimmy Balderson and Keena Young to lead this year's team. “I'm proud of the way these three players have developed and of their dedication to our team,” said BYU head coach Dave Rose. “They are totally committed to this program and have earned the respect and confidence of their teammates. They will provide us with good leadership as we work together as a team to achieve our goals.” Ainge, a co-captain of last season's team, proved a valuable asset off the bench in 2005-06 after starting at the point guard spot and receiving All-Mountain West Conference honorable mention as a sophomore. Last season he ranked 11th in the MWC in assists while helping BYU lead the league in both scoring and assists. Balderson also provided a spark off the bench for the Cougars last season as he scored in double figures in 11 of the last 13 games and was the only player in the conference averaging more than 10 points per game off the bench with a 10.2 scoring average. Young led BYU in rebounding as a sophomore before becoming an All-MWC Third Team pick last year after starting the last 14 games of the year and ranking second on the team in rebounding (5.8 rpg) and third in scoring (10.3 ppg).

COUGARS DOWN HIGHLY RANKED DIVISION II MONTEVALLO IN FINAL EXHIBITION

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 8, 2006) - BYU played its final exhibition game Wednesday defeating the University of Montevallo, 92-63. Cougar center Trent Plaisted finished the night with 20 points on 8-for-9 shooting while grabbing nine rebounds, spoiling the Falcons' hopes of upsetting the Cougars. "The biggest impression for me was we got to guard something different than we see in practice everyday," said BYU head coach Dave Rose. "That was evident from all the fouls we got, but it was good for us." The Cougars opened the game on a 14-4 run with Plaisted connecting on his first four shots. Montevallo fought back and tied the game 28-28 at the six-minute mark. "Trent Plaisted is really good," said Montevallo head coach Danny Young. "He'll be in the NBA someday." BYU got a lift from its bench with five minutes left in the half when freshman guard Jonathan Tavernari hit a three to put BYU up 33-28. On the next defensive possession Tavernari grabbed the rebound and pushed it up the floor to senior captain Jimmy Balderson who hit a floating jumper to extend BYU's lead to 35-28. The Cougars finished the half with senior guard Rashaun Broadus hitting a mid-range jumpshot as time expired to put BYU up 45-35. "BYU is well coached," said coach Young. "They are very physical and very deep." The Cougars maintained their 10-point advantage until junior Sam Burgess connected from long-range at the 14-minute mark in the second half followed by back-to-back three-pointers from Broadus to extend the Cougar lead to 18 points at 66-48. Tavernari's hot hand continued in the second half as he nailed back-to-back three pointers and gave BYU its biggest lead to that point at 77-56. Coach Rose then got good minutes out of his reserves as they held the Falcons to only seven points in the final seven minutes. "There are a lot of guys that can contribute," said Coach Rose. "We got some good chemistry from a few different lineup." The Cougars had the advantage down low as they scored 33 points in the paint and had six blocks to the Falcons' 12 and 1, respectively.

COUGARS DEFEAT BROCK UNIVERSITY IN EXHIBITION OPENER

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 2, 2006) - BYU opened its exhibition season with a 90-49 trouncing of Brock University on Thursday night in the Marriott Center. Cougar center Trent Plaisted scored 13 points and grabbed eight rebounds, as BYU put an end to the Badgers' four-game winning streak. The Cougars dominated all facets of the game, shooting 51 percent from the field and 53 percent (8-of-15) from beyond the arc while holding Brock, a team averaging 83.8 points a game, to 25 percent shooting. BYU also outrebounded the Badgers, 54-33. "BYU has size and athleticism," Brock head coach Ken Murray said. "They push the ball, and they have some guys that can jump through the roof. They're a very athletic team." Plaisted wasted no time showing why he was named a Freshman All-American last season. The 6-foot-11, 245-pound sophomore scored on a put-back off of a Lee Cummand miss, flushed down a lay-up in transition and then hit a 10-footer from the right baseline enroute to a quick 11-0 Cougar lead. BYU's early advantage ballooned into a 22-2 lead before Badger forward Chris Keith nailed a three-pointer, making it 22-5 with just under 12 minutes to go. Cougar senior Mike Rose answered back with a long-distance shot of his own sparking an 11-2 Cougar run. BYU led 43-14 at halftime. The early offensive assault gave Rose an opportunity to take a look at his freshmen and transfers, as the second-year coach gave all available players time on the court. "The first group of guys we had were the [veterans], so they know the game plan," BYU head coach Dave Rose said. "The second group came out and was pretty successful." The second half saw more of the same with BYU taking a 59-22 lead with 16 minutes left to play. Mike Rose knocked down two consecutive treys, and team captain Keena Young added four points and two assists during a 16-8 run. Young finished with 13 points on 6-of-8 shooting in only 16 minutes of action. On the night, BYU outscored Brock 51-10 in points in the paint and 15-0 in fastbreak points. The Cougars got it done on the defensive end as well forcing the Badgers into 20 turnovers and nabbing 13 steals.

BYU SCHEDULE INCLUDES NATIONAL RUNNER-UP UCLA, MICHIGAN STATE AND SETON HALL

The BYU men's basketball nonconference schedule includes dates with 2006 NCAA Tournament runner-up UCLA of the Pac-10 Conference, 2005 Final Four participant Michigan State of the Big Ten Conference and 2006 NCAA qualifier Seton Hall of the Big East Conference. In all, the Cougars' non-league slate includes 14 games against teams from 10 different conferences prior to beginning Mountain West Conference play.

"We are excited about our schedule," BYU coach Dave Rose said. "We look forward to the challenge of playing some of the best teams in the country and believe the BYU Holiday Classic will be a great event for our fans. This should be a balanced, competitive schedule that will help us prepare for the conference. We hope to continue to improve as a team and build on the success our program achieved last season."

BYU will play Michigan State of the Big Ten on a neutral court at The Palace of Auburn Hills – home of the Detroit Pistons – on Dec. 9. The Spartans, who finished 22-12 last season, will play BYU at the Delta Center in 2007. New to BYU's schedule this season is the BYU Holiday Classic, which will be conducted the last weekend of December to conclude non-league play. With a four-team field that includes Big South Conference foe Liberty (Dec. 28), Mid-Continent Conference champion Oral Roberts (Dec. 29) and Big East Conference contender Seton Hall (Dec. 30), BYU fans will see teams from across the nation convene in Provo to compete with doubleheader games each day of the exempt tournament. Seton Hall and Oral Roberts were both NCAA Tournament participants last season. The Pirates will be the first Big East team to visit the Marriott Center since 1990 when St. John's played in the Cougar Classic, although BYU's last three NCAA Tournament opponents – Syracuse in 2004, Connecticut in 2003, and Cincinnati in 2001 – are Big East teams. The Cougars and Pirates will meet for the first time since an 82-80 Seton Hall overtime win at the Queen City Invitational on Dec. 29, 1958.

UCLA, Michigan State, Seton Hall, Oral Roberts, Portland, Liberty, Idaho State, San Jose State and Western Oregon are new to the schedule for 2006-07, while Lamar, Boise State, Weber State, Utah State and Southern Utah are repeat opponents from last season. Liberty is the lone first-time opponent for BYU. The Cougars own a 228-123 (.650) all-time record against their 2006-07 nonconference opponents and lead or are tied in the overall series against each program. BYU will play a minimum of nine games against teams that qualified for last year's NCAA Tournament.

The MWC season begins in Provo against reigning MWC Champion San Diego State and culminates against in-state rival Utah in the Marriott Center – the first regular-season finale between the Cougars and Utes since the 1995-96 season.

"Our league will be very competitive this year," BYU coach Dave Rose said. "Seven of the nine teams return at least three starters and five return four or more. We are looking forward to the upcoming season. I think our fans will be treated to some outstanding basketball in the Marriott Center this year."

The Cougars will play 30 regular-season games in 2006-07 prior to the MWC Tournament at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas March 6-10.

TELEVISION BROADCASTS

The Mountain West Conference's 2006-07 men's basketball television schedule will feature an unprecedented 99 games on national and regional television, including 65 of the 72 conference contests and all eight MWC Championship matchups. The television coverage provided by the MWC broadcast partners in 2006-07 is more than triple the national and regional telecasts MWC men's basketball has received in previous years. Seventy-five games will be shown on the MountainWest Sports Network (the mtn.), with 17 to be broadcast nationally on College Sports Television (CSTV) and seven on VERSUS (formerly OLN). BYU will have 18 regular-season games televised as part of the 2006-07 MWC television schedule, including three games on CSTV, one on VERSUS and 14 on the mtn. With the exception of a road game at TCU, BYU's entire conference schedule will be televised in 2007. BYU's nonconference games featured in the MWC broadcast schedule include home dates with Southern Utah (Nov. 24, 8 p.m. MT), San Jose State (Dec. 6, 7 p.m. MT) and Utah State (Dec. 16, 4 p.m. MT). While not part of the MWC television package, BYU's regular-season opener at 2006 NCAA runner-up UCLA on Nov. 15 will be televised on Fox Sports Net Prime Ticket, while the BYU-Michigan State matchup on Dec. 9 at The Palace at Auburn Hills will be carried on ESPN2 and BYU's game at Boise State on Nov. 29 will be aired on KBOI in Boise. Additional games on the BYU schedule could also be televised but have not yet been announced.

IN THE SEVEN YEARS OF THE MWC ...

- BYU has had five 20-win seasons, leading all MWC schools along with Utah. UNLV has had three, Wyoming three, New Mexico, San Diego State and Air Force two and Colorado State none.
- BYU has had the league's top RPI three times, been second once and third on three occasions. The Cougars were third last year (67) behind Air Force (50) and San Diego State (56).
- BYU has played the toughest schedule on average of any team in the MWC (average strength of schedule rating the past seven years is 66, Utah is next at 78). BYU has had the league's toughest schedule in two of the past three seasons.
- BYU has the second-most overall wins in the seven years of the MWC (137, Utah leads at 155).
- BYU is also second in conference wins (60, Utah has 69).
- BYU has the second-most MWC regular-season titles (two) along with Wyoming (Utah leads with four).
- BYU is one of six MWC teams to win the MWC Tournament title.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS AT BYU

— With the addition of freshman Jonathan Tavernari, 26 international players have played basketball at BYU.
 — The Cougars have had an international player on their varsity roster in 35 of the past 55 years.
 — Another international player, Jean Carlos Otero from Colombia, signed with BYU in November.
 — In the last five years, BYU has rostered six international players, including four on this season's team – Jimmy Balderson (Canada), Vuk Ivanovic (Serbia) and Fernando Malaman and Jonathan Tavernari (Brazil).
 — Foreign players at BYU have received eight all-conference citations, two conference player of the year awards (Timo Saarelainen – 1985, Rafael Araujo – 2004) and eight All-America citations (Kresimir Cosic – 1972 and 1973, Rafael Araujo – 2004).
 — According to a book about basketball in Finland by Mikko Simon, BYU has the distinction of being the first NCAA Division I school to have an overseas player on its roster when Timo Lampen, a native of Lahti, Finland, took the court for the Cougars in 1960-61.
 — BYU also boasts the first foreign All-American in Kresimir Cosic, whose BYU jersey was retired on March 4, 2006. The Zadar, Yugoslavia, native played on the Cougar varsity team from 1971-73 and earned six All-America citations and three first-team All-Western Athletic Conference awards. He is the only BYU player to be inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame. Cosic passed away in 1995.
 — During the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, CBS Television analyst Billy Packer singled out Cosic during a discussion of the quality of international players now playing college basketball. Said Packer, "Kresimir Cosic, who played for BYU, was really the first great international player to play basketball in the United States."

FOUR RECRUITS COMMIT TO BYU DURING NOVEMBER SIGNING PERIOD

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 19, 2006) – BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose today announced that four players – two from the high school ranks and two from junior colleges – have committed to attend BYU next season by signing national letters of intent during November's early signing period. Joining the Cougar program for the 2007-08 season will be 6-foot-9 forward Chris Collinsworth out of Provo [Utah] High School; 6-foot-2 combo guard Jimmer Fredette from Glens Falls [N.Y.] High School; 5-foot-10 point guard Lamont Morgan out of Saddleback Community College [Mission Viejo, Calif.]; and 6-foot-7 forward Jean Carlos Otero out of Miami-Dade College [Miami, Fla.]. "We are excited about the early class," Rose said. "The common denominator is that all these guys come from winning programs and they are a key to that success. Since we are losing six seniors as well as others to missions after this year, it is important for us to address those changes, especially on the perimeter. This gives us a great start as we work toward completing our recruiting in the spring."

CHRIS COLLINSWORTH

An athletic player known for his versatility and soft shooting touch, Collinsworth earned first-team all-state honors last season after averaging 14.1 points, 6.5 rebounds and 3.3 assists per game for the 4A state runner-up Provo Bulldogs. He shot 56 percent from the field to help himself earn All-Valley Co-MVP honors by the Deseret Morning News, All-Valley First Team recognition by the Provo Daily Herald and first-team Region 7 accolades from a vote of area coaches. Showing his versatility, the 6-foot-9 forward has also played the point guard position. His inside-outside game has drawn comparisons to former BYU great Kresimir Cosic. Collinsworth received recruiting attention from schools such as North Carolina, Arizona State, West Virginia, USC and Oregon State in addition to several Mountain West Conference schools. "Chris has the ability to score in the post and on the perimeter," Rose said. "He is a tireless worker who brings a skill level that will be important to our transition offense. He's from right here in our backyard, and we are excited to have him join our program."

JIMMER FREDETTE

A talented scorer, Fredette averaged 29.3 points per game as a junior while leading Glens Falls High School to a 21-2 overall record and the state title game. A first-team all-state selection and the 2006 Times Union Player of the Year, Fredette is known for his outside shooting and playmaking ability. He made a team-leading 76 three-pointers last season while shooting 83 percent from the free-throw line and scoring more than 30 points in 12 of 23 games. The athletic combo guard also averaged 25 points for the Albany City Rocks AAU team over the summer, leading the squad to a third-place finish at AAU Nationals. An all-around athlete, he earned all-state honors as a wide receiver during his junior year before electing not to play football as a senior to concentrate on basketball. Utah, Syracuse, Wake Forest, Seton Hall, Marshall, Siena, George Mason, West Virginia, Virginia Tech and Penn State also recruited Fredette. "Jimmer is a terrific shooter who also has the ability to run a team," Rose said. "He is a very unselfish player and is very committed to hard work and getting better. He's a great addition to our team."

LAMONT MORGAN

A sophomore this year at Saddleback Community College, Morgan is an extremely quick point guard and strong team leader. He is averaging 8.7 points, 4.7 assists and 3.0 steals per game so far this season after playing in all 31 games as a freshman to help the Gauchos to a 22-9 record. Morgan has excellent defensive abilities and shot 81 percent from the free-throw line last year. As a freshman he recorded season highs of 13 points and seven rebounds while leading the team in assists 11 times. Prior to playing at Saddleback, Morgan prepped at Diamond Ranch High School in Pomona, Calif., earning first-team all-league honors. "Lamont is a winner," Rose said. "He is a team-oriented point guard who provides great leadership and is very competitive. He is extremely quick with the ball. One of the things we really like about Lamont is his ability to defend. His experience will be counted on."

JEAN CARLOS OTERO

Otero is an athletic perimeter player with excellent size and strength. Known for his ability to penetrate, he is currently averaging 15.4 points, 5.2 rebounds and 2.0 assists while shooting 62 percent from the floor in his second year at Miami-Dade College. The 6-foot-7 swingman is also an excellent perimeter defender, often drawing the assignment to guard the opponent's top scorer. As a freshman at Miami-Dade, Otero averaged 8.4 points and 6.5 rebounds per game while shooting 48 percent from the floor. A native of Barranquilla, Colombia, Otero will be the 27th international player to play men's basketball at BYU. "Jean Carlos is an athletic wing player who can beat people off the dribble, penetrate and finish," Rose said. "He has good size and strength for a wing player. His perimeter defense is going to be counted on heavily."

COUGAR CROWDS RANKED NO. 2 IN MWC ATTENDANCE

An average of 11,069 fans packed the Marriott Center last season for each BYU home game, second only to New Mexico's 13,387 average in the Mountain West Conference. A total of 20,732 fans attended BYU's last home game during which former Cougar great Kresimir Cosic's jersey was retired. The mark is BYU's highest since March 1, 2004. The Cougars went 14-1 at home last year including wins in their last 14 straight home contests, which ranks eighth in the nation. BYU celebrated its 500th game in the Marriott Center on Feb. 22 and owns a 386-116 (.769) record there.

WINNING STREAKS

The Cougars had several winning streaks last season, including their longest since the 2003-04 season at six straight victories. The streak was tied for the seventh-longest active winning streak in the nation. BYU's prior victory streaks last year included one four-game streak, two three-game streaks and two two-game streaks. BYU won 10 of its last 13 games.

BOUNCE BACK COUGARS

With its 20-9 overall record, BYU suffered consecutive defeats only once last season, the last two games, having bounced back from each prior loss with a victory. BYU alternated wins and losses in the first five league games before winning four straight games, two of which came on the road. The Cougars lost their next game but rebounded to win six straight before losing again.

MAGIC NUMBER: 70

BYU was 12-0 last season when holding opponents under 70 points and 8-9 when allowing opponents to surpass the 70-point threshold. Cougar foes averaged 71.7 points per game. BYU was also 17-4 when scoring 70 or more points and 3-5 when falling below the 70-point mark. The Cougars led the MWC in scoring, averaging 76.2 ppg, and scored 100 points in conference play for the first time since Feb. 10, 1994 in their home game against league-champion San Diego State.

FOR STARTERS

BYU's first two games of the year saw three seniors and two sophomores in the starting rotation in senior Rashaun Broadus, sophomore Lee Cummard, senior Jimmy Balderson, senior Keena Young and sophomore Trent Plaisted. While all five started games last year, the UCLA game marked the first regular-season contest in which all five started together. The same starting rotation began BYU's second exhibition game on Nov. 8 against Montevallo. Overall last year, nine players started while Coach Dave Rose used eight starting lineups. True freshman Jackson Emery started the last six games, the first starts of his career. Broadus started the last 12 games after missing the first Wyoming game (team rules violation) and the next two starts. Young made his 14th straight start of the season at Houston. Plaisted started each game while Brock Reichner started every game but the first and the last, due to illness. Broadus started 26 games, Fernando Malaman 15 games, Cummard 14 games, Balderson 10 games and Austin Ainge four games. The majority of BYU's starting lineups featured two freshmen (Plaisted and Cummard or Emery). Five Cougars who started between seven and 23 games on the 2004-05 team (Ainge, 23 starts; Balderson, 16 starts; Young, 15 starts; Derek Dawes, 13 starts; Mike Rose, 7 starts) spent more time coming off the bench last season.

20-WIN SEASONS

With a win against New Mexico to conclude the regular season, the Cougars achieved their 29th 20-win season in 2005-06. BYU has averaged 20 wins every 2.7 years (BYU has played 78 seasons in which it has played at least 20 games in a season). BYU coach Dave Rose is the fifth Cougar head coach to reach 20 wins in his first season at the helm. He joins G. Ott Romney (20-10 in 1928-29), Stan Watts (22-12 in 1949-50), Ladell Anderson (20-11 in 1983-84) and Roger Reid (21-9 in 1989-90). Both Watts and Reid achieved six 20-win seasons in their BYU coaching careers while Romney posted five and Rose's predecessor, Steve Cleveland, achieved four.

2006-07 REDSHIRTS

BYU head coach Dave Rose has announced his intention to redshirt BYU's three freshmen this season - Jonathan Tavernari (6-6, G/F), Jordan Cameron (6-5, G/F) and Brock Zylstra (6-6, G/F).

"All of these guys are good players," said Rose. "We're just trying to find the best team chemistry and roles for everyone. The experienced guys are ahead of the freshmen, especially in executing our defensive systems. Right now, it just looks like they're the group that has risen above the rest, and we'll go with them."

HALFTIME REPORT

The Cougars' 82-69 loss at UCLA after leading 39-36 at the half marked the first time since the 2004-05 season that BYU has lost when leading at the half. BYU was 14-0 when leading at the half, 5-9 when trailing and 1-0 when tied last year. Of the 14 games in which they led at the half, the Cougars led by double digits six times. BYU was more impressive in the second half. The Cougars outscored their opponents in the second period of play in all but eight games last year. BYU averaged 4.8 more second-half points than its opponents after a slight 0.24 edge in the first half.

For the eighth year, the BYU men's basketball team will join the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation in an effort to raise money for families who have children with cancer and participate in the Foundation's annual Christmas party for those families. The Foundation will be collecting monetary donations and any unwrapped toys through the first three weeks of December. Toys can be dropped off at the nearest Far West Bank location, at Harmon's Down Town Auto Center located in Provo or at the men's basketball office located next to the Ticket Office at the Marriott Center. Monetary contributions will also be accepted at the men's basketball office. One hundred percent of all donations to the Foundation will go directly towards the Christmas party for more than 90 families who have children with cancer living primarily in Utah County. "This has always been a cause I feel strongly about," said BYU coach Dave Rose. "It has been such a positive experience for the coaches, players and families and is a tremendous opportunity for community members to be involved in brightening the holiday season for these children." Cheryl Rose, vice chairman of the Foundation and wife of coach Rose, discussed the challenges these families face financially and how the Foundation hopes to help these families now and in the future. "For many of these families, it is financially impossible to always have food on the table, a roof over their heads or even have Christmas," Cheryl Rose said. "We want to create a Christmas experience that they will never forget and hopefully in the future help families meet those basic needs that they can't on their own." Rose says that asking for donations has usually been difficult for her, but with such a meaningful cause it has been easy. It has enriched her life, which is something she hopes others will enjoy by contributing to these families. "It's a privilege for me to associate with these families," she said. "They are such an example to me. Even with all that they've been through, they have such a strength and passion for life. It's almost selfish on my part to be involved because I get so much out of it." This year's Christmas party will be held Dec. 20 at 6:30 p.m. in the LaVell Edwards Stadium Cougar Room. Parents will be invited to the Cougar Room on Dec. 19 to choose the gifts their children will receive. The gifts will then be distributed at the party. FIRST-YEAR COACH MADE AN IMPACT

Picked last in MWC preseason, first-year head coach Dave Rose directed the Cougars to 20 wins. Their 20-9 record was an 11.5-game improvement over the year before. Rose earned a .746 winning percentage when he last served as a head coach at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, from 1990-97, as six of his seven teams earned a national ranking. His winning percentage last season with BYU was .690.

MOST IMPROVED

BYU was the most improved team in the nation last year through the regular season. The Cougars' .441 jump in winning percentage (.741 in 2006 from .300 in 2005) led the country as well as its overall 12.5-game improvement. BYU's +11 wins was tied with South Alabama for top honors. With its 20-9 overall record compared to the prior year's 9-21 mark, BYU's final .390 jump in winning percentage (.690 in 2006 from .300 in 2005) was second in the country as well as its overall 11.5-game improvement. BYU's +11 wins ranked third.

PLAYING STRONG DOWN THE STRETCH

The Cougars won six of their last eight and 10 of their last 13 games while avenging their three prior league losses with wins over MWC-champion San Diego State, Air Force and UNLV. BYU lost to Air Force in the league opener as the Cougars started 2-3 in league play but finished tied for second with the Falcons at 12-4. In this stretch, BYU also won at New Mexico, snapping the Lobos' 21-game home win streak, while going 4-1 on the road. BYU achieved a six-game victory streak, which ranked tied for seventh in the nation, before its MWC Quarterfinal loss to Utah.

NEW PLAYERS MADE SOLID CONTRIBUTIONS

Five of BYU's top seven scorers and rebounders were first-year players and a walk-on. While growing into their roles last year, three freshmen, two transfers and one walk-on accounted for 62.2 percent of team scoring and 55.3 percent of team rebounding while playing 63.4 percent of total minutes and making 80.7 percent of starts.

BALANCED ATTACK

BYU boasted a balanced attack with five players averaging between 9 and 14 points. BYU had five players in double figures on nine occasions this season, including seven times during league play and in each of BYU's last four wins. Experienced starters from last year, Austin Ainge and Jimmy Balderson, played key roles off the bench with the infusion of new players.

OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

BYU was the first team to score 100 points in an MWC game since 2003 (100-90 win over San Diego State). BYU led the MWC in scoring and assists and ranked among the nation's top teams in three-point shooting (25th), assists (34th), scoring offense (36th), won-loss percentage (48th) and field-goal percentage (50th) in the final NCAA statistical rankings. Only 33 teams in the country finished with less than BYU's nine losses.

CLUTCH PLAY

BYU exhibited clutch play, solid mental toughness and strong coaching while going 11-2 in games decided by nine points or less last season after going 1-10 in games decided by a single digit the prior year.

ROSE NAMED MWC COACH OF THE YEAR BY ESPN'S PAT FORDE AND BY COLLEGE INSIDERS.COM

In addition to the league's official honor, BYU's Dave Rose received the nod as the MWC Coach of the Year by several others last season. ESPN's Pat Forde named Rose his choice for MWC Coach of the Year, as did CollegeInsiders.com.

ROSE RANKED NO. 3 AMONG NATION'S FIRST-YEAR COACHES

BYU head coach Dave Rose received national notice for the outstanding job he did during his first season guiding the Cougars. In a Feb. 12 column on ESPN.com, Pat Forde lists Rose among the top-three first-year coaches in the nation this season. Among the nearly 40 first-year coaches in college basketball this year, Forde names the 10 he feels are doing the best job, ranking Rose No. 3 overall. Picked to finish last in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason poll of MWC media members, BYU finished tied for second at 12-4, one game behind league-champion San Diego State.

COUGAR RECRUITS HAVE EXCELLED

With Trent Plaisted receiving the 2006 MWC Freshman of the Year award, BYU has now had nine recruits earn conference freshman/newcomer or a major award in their first season as a Cougar in the nine years BYU coach Dave Rose has been in Provo. Rose was Steve Cleveland's recruiting coordinator and lead assistant the past eight seasons before taking over the program this season. Six BYU players have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year.

PLAISTED EARNS THREE NATIONAL FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS

BYU redshirt freshman forward/center Trent Plaisted received national recognition for his play. Plaisted was named the Nivea for Men Fresh Face Player of the Week by CBS.Sportsline.com, an honor handed out to top performers in the national freshman class, while ESPN's Dick Vitale also named Plaisted his Diaper Dandy of the Week for his play the week of Feb. 6. He also was named the Rivals.com Freshman Player of the Week for his outings against San Diego State and at TCU, which included a BYU freshman-record 18 rebounds against the Horned Frogs.

COUGAR FANS SHOW SUPPORT

BYU has consistently ranked among the national attendance leaders in the 35-year history of the Marriott Center. The Cougars average of 11,069 last season was more than the regular-season champions of 27 out of 31 conferences as well as over half of the teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big 12, Big East and Southeastern Conference and all but Arizona in the Pac-10. BYU also averaged more fans than 12 of the NCAA Sweet 16 participants, including all of the Final Four teams.

A tireless worker, gifted motivator and strong strategist, Dave Rose guided BYU to a 20-win season while earning district and conference coach-of-the-year honors in his first season at the Cougar helm in 2005-06. Rose was named to succeed Steve Cleveland as BYU Men's Basketball Head Coach on April 11, 2005.

Rose received national notice for the outstanding job he did during his first season guiding the Cougars. Picked to finish last in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason poll of MWC media members, BYU instead earned a 20-9 record and NIT bid in 2005-06 under Rose's tutelage, including a 12-4 conference mark to tie for second place. Rose was named the USBWA District VIII Coach of the Year and received honorable mention for National Coach of the Year by Scout.com. He was named MWC Coach of the Year by the league's media and coaches and by CollegInsider.com. ESPN analyst Bob Valvano called BYU "one of the great surprise teams in the country."

In a column on ESPN.com, Pat Forde listed Rose as one of the top first-year coaches in the nation, ranking Rose No. 3 overall among the nearly 40 first-year coaches in college basketball in 2005-06.

Rose, who served the prior eight seasons as Cleveland's lead assistant in Provo, was promoted to BYU's head job two days after Cleveland announced his resignation to take the head-coaching position at Fresno State. Rose served as BYU's associate head coach for five seasons and took over the Cougar program with 22 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons as a head coach at the junior college and high school levels.

Since coming to Provo in 1997 with Cleveland, Rose played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play in six of the past seven seasons, including three NCAA bids, while claiming two MWC titles. As associate head coach, Rose fulfilled a variety of responsibilities under Coach Cleveland, and his efforts earned notice, such as being named the top assistant in the Mountain West Conference by Street & Smith in the 2004-05 College Basketball Preview.

Rose was the team's defensive coordinator and worked with the post players. He possesses a complete knowledge of the game and worked hard in developing the team's defensive game plans. An outstanding teacher, he coached defensive skill development and implemented the defensive game plan. BYU was the top defensive team in the Mountain West Conference two of the four seasons Rose oversaw the defense.

A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose managed BYU's recruiting efforts during his eight seasons as an assistant. Rose's success as a recruiter was evidenced by his being named one of the top 25 college basketball recruiters in 2004 by Rivals.com. Each year the Cougars have brought in talented newcomers to contribute to the BYU program. The 2004 class was rated No. 17 nationally and No. 3 in the West by Rivals.com. The 2000 recruiting class also ranked in the top 20 nationally.

Proving that Rose has excelled in recruiting and developing players, nine recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major conference award in their first season as a Cougar in the nine years Rose has been in Provo. Including Rafael Araujo being named the league's top newcomer by the MWC media members in 2003 (the MWC discontinued the newcomer award that year), six BYU players have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. Most recently, Trent Plaisted was named the 2006 MWC Freshman of the Year. The following is the list of player honors earned the last nine seasons by Cougar recruits in their first seasons in Provo.

Rose has also worked closely with scheduling. BYU has played many of the nation's top teams over the past several years thanks in part to relationships Rose has developed with programs across the country. His efforts have helped the Cougars receive invitations to tournaments like the 2004 EA SPORTS Maui Invitational where BYU faced that season's NCAA Champion North Carolina.

Prior to coming to BYU, Rose was head coach at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, where he compiled a 167-57 record in seven seasons. Rose guided six of his seven teams to national top-20 rankings, including a ranking as high as No. 2, while earning three conference titles. His peers honored him as the 1993 Scenic West Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. While at Dixie, Rose coached three NJCAA All-Americans as well as longtime NBA player Keon Clark. At BYU he has recruited and coached two NBA Draft picks in Rafael Araujo and Travis Hansen.

Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie. He was the head basketball coach at Millard for three years from 1983-86.

Rose becomes the 17th person to guide the Cougar basketball program since its first season in 1903. He follows the coaching pedigree of Basketball Hall of Fame coach Stan Watts, who is BYU's all-time leader in coaching victories with a 371-254 record from 1949-72. Watts also coached at Millard High School and Dixie State College before coming to BYU.

PLAYING CAREER

Rose was a two-sport athlete at Dixie College before transferring to Houston, where he was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished second in the NCAA Tournament. At Houston, Rose played in 1980-81, redshirted in 1981-82 and played his final year in 1982-83.

At Dixie, Rose was first-team all-league in both basketball and baseball. Rose was also the Region 18 batting champion, hitting .421 as a center fielder. While playing basketball for Houston's Northbrook High School, he led the District 16AAAA in scoring, was selected first-team all-district and All-Greater Houston and was named team MVP.

PERSONAL

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose and his wife Cheryl have three children and one granddaughter. Daughter Chanell played forward on the BYU women's basketball team from 2000-03 and is married to Brock Reichner, last year's lone senior on the BYU team. Rose's wife Cheryl is actively involved in helping families who have children with cancer as vice chairperson of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation. Rose follows Cleveland as the second returned missionary to serve as BYU men's basketball head coach. Rose served a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79 between his two years as a player at Dixie College. His son Garrett returned in August 2005 from a two-year mission in Little Rock, Ark., and married his wife Brooke in November 2006. Rose also has a daughter, Taylor, who is a sixth grader at Wasatch Elementary.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Dave Rose was one of the first coaches in Utah to become involved with Coaches vs. Cancer while at Dixie State College. He helps the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation and has been a volunteer coach for youth groups. He served on the Academic Excellence Committee at Dixie. Dave and his wife Cheryl were Chamber of Commerce Citizens of the Year in St. George. Cheryl is extremely committed to serving in the community. She received the Beacon of Hope Award in 2005. After Dave got her involved, she now serves as the Vice Chairperson for the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation.
