BYU OPENS SEASON AT NO. 5 UCLA WEDNESDAY IN LOS ANGELES

The BYU Cougars will face the 2006 NCAA runner-up UCLA Bruins Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. PT (8:30 p.m. MT) in Pauley Pavilion in the season opener for both teams. The game will be televised on Fox Sports Net Prime Ticket in Los Angeles and nationally via satellite on DirecTV (Prime/channel 653) and Dish Network (Prime/channel 408 or 411). The radio broadcast can be heard on KSL Newsradio 102.7 FM and 1160 AM out of Salt Lake City. The Cougars are coming off a 20-9 season and second-place Mountain West Conference finish in the first year under BYU coach Dave Rose, while the Bruins won the Pac-10 title last year and posted a 32-7 overall record under the direction of Ben Howland en route to the NCAA title game.

UP NEXT

BYU will host Idaho State Saturday at 7:30 p.m. MT in the Marriott Center. The game will not be televised.

COUGAR QUICK HITS

- Cougar head coach Dave Rose guided BYU to a 20-9 record and an NIT appearance last season in his first year at the helm after eight years as BYU's lead assistant. He was named the Mountain West Conference and USBWA District VIII Coach of the Year. Rose coached his team to a second-place MWC finish — one game behind league-champion San Diego State — while turning a 9-21 team into a 20-9 success that proved to be the second-best improvement among all Division I programs.
- BYU was picked to finish second in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason MWC media poll.
- BYU's roster this season includes a solid core of returning players, including six seniors and Trent Plaisted was named the MWC Freshman of the Year last year. One of nine returning lettermen, Plaisted was named a Freshman All-American after leading BYU in both scoring (13.6) and rebounding (6.9) one year ago.
- Players on the roster who could see their first action for BYU this year include junior redshirt Vuk Ivanovic (Jr., 6-10, C/F) and five newcomers — freshmen Jordan Cameron (6-5, G/F), Jonathan Tavemari (6-6, G/F) and Brock Zylstra (6-6, G/F), sophomore Gavin MacGregor (6-9, F/C) and junior transfer Ben Murdock (6-2, G).

LOOKING AT UCLA

The UCLA Bruins enter the 2006-07 season ranked fifth in the nation and return nine lettermen, including two starters, from last season's team that advanced to the NCAA Championship game. The defending Pac-10 regular-season and tournament champions tied a school record for total wins as they racked up a 32-7 record enroute to their 16th NCAA Final Four appearance. Junior guard Arron Afflalo returns this season after leading the Bruins in scoring last year with 15.8 points per game while shooting 46.2 percent from the floor. The 6-foot-5 first-team All-Pac 10 selection also chipped in 4.2 rebounds and 1.8 assists per game. Luc Richard Mbah a Moute, a 6-foot-9 sophomore forward, returns as the Bruins' leading rebounder with 8.2 rpg to go along with 9.1 ppg and 1.3 apg. The Pac-10 Freshman of the Year led the league in field goal percentage at .538 and ranked third nationally in rebounding among freshmen, earning Freshman All-America honors. Sophomore Darren Collison is expected to take over starting point guard duties this season after posting 2.3 apg last year and receiving Pac-10 All-Freshman Honorable Mention in 2005-06. Sophomore guard/forward Josh Shipp is also expected to be a factor this season after averaging 11.3 ppg and 4.8 rpg in four contests last year before having to sit out the rest of the season due to injury. UCLA will be without the services of NBA First Round Draft pick Jordan Farmar, a Colleague.com All-American who averaged 13.5 ppg last year. The Bruins are coached by National Coach of the Year Ben Howland, now in his fourth season at UCLA with a 61-35 record and in his 13th season overall with a 229-134 mark.

EXHIBITION GAME 1 — UCLA VS. CAL POLY POMONA

LOS ANGELES (11-2-06) — Junior guard Arron Afflalo registered game-highs of 17 points, seven rebounds and six assists, and sophomore forward Josh Shipp added 16 points to lead UCLA past Cal Poly Pomona, 73-43 in Pauley Pavilion. Afflalo and Shipp each shot 6-for-12 from the field to lead the Bruins. Sophomore center Alfred Aboya chipped in 10 points and three rebounds. Sophomore forward Luc Richard Mbah a Moute added five points, seven rebounds, three steals and two blocks. UCLA led the entire game and used a 9-0 run in the game's first 3:25 to take a 12-3 lead. The Bruins shot 55.6 percent (15-27) from the field in the first half and held the visiting Broncos to 15-of-47 shooting overall. The Bruins led 42-25 at halftime. UCLA used an 11-0 run in the first eight minutes of the second half, giving the Bruins a 55-29 advantage.

EXHIBITION GAME 2 — UCLA VS. HUMBOLDT STATE

LOS ANGELES (11-9-06) — Sophomore forward Josh Shipp scored a game-high 21 points and junior guard Arron Afflalo added 18 points to lead UCLA past Humboldt State, 87-61, in Pauley Pavilion. Joining Shipp and Afflalo in double-figure scoring were freshman guard Russell Westbrook (11) and sophomore guard Michael Roll (10) as four UCLA players scored in double digits. Sophomore forward Luc Richard Mbah a Moute led all rebounders with nine, while sophomore guard Darren Collison led the way with six assists. Shipp shot 7-for-8 from the field, including 3-for-4 from behind the three-point line. Afflalo made each of his three three-point field goal attempts in the game's first 6:34 and finished the game 3-for-6 from behind the arc and 6-for-11 overall from the field. Humboldt State took the game's first lead on a basket by Cy Vandermeer before the Bruins used a 9-0 run to take the lead. UCLA made 7-of-10 three pointers in the first half to gain a 41-27 advantage at the intermission. Humboldt State cut UCLA's lead to 13 with 12:00 remaining in the contest before the Bruins outscored the Lumberjacks 33-14 over the game's next 10:07.

2006 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP GAME — UCLA VS. FLORIDA

INDIANAPOLIS (4-3-06) — Florida's Joakim Noah dominated the UCLA Bruins on Monday night with 16 points, nine rebounds and a record six blocks to key a 73-57 blowout for Florida's first NCAA men's basketball title. Lee Humphrey added 15 points, Al Horford 14 and Corey Brewer 11 for Florida. The Gators ran to a double-digit lead early and staved off every UCLA run, winning by taking it right to UCLA early, looking inside to Noah, Brewer, Horford and senior Adrian Moss. Unafraid to make the extra pass, even in traffic down low, they finished with 21 assists, eight by point guard Taurean Green. Noah shot 7-for-9 and also had three assists and a steal. The Bruins' Jordan Farmar, who chose UCLA over Florida, was their only scoring threat. He finished with 18 points. His backcourt mate, Arron Afflalo, finished with 10, but was shut out in the first half, while the game was getting away.

BYU VS. UCLA SERIES NOTES

BYU owns an 11-10 advantage over UCLA, one of only four teams with a winning record against the Bruins with a minimum of 10 meetings in the series (6-9 vs. Duke; 5-6 vs. Indiana; 5-6 vs. Utah). The Cougars are the only team with a winning record against the Bruins in 20+ meetings. BYU is 4-6 all-time in Los Angeles. The two teams last met in 1988 with UCLA getting a 97-87 win in Provo on Dec. 3. The Cougars' last win in the series came the last time they played in Pauley Pavilion as BYU won 87-80 at UCLA on Dec. 5, 1987. The two teams have met four times in the NCAA Tournament, splitting a 2-2 record. The Bruins won in 1965 and 1971 under Hall of Fame Coach John Wooden on their way to two of their 11 NCAA titles while the Cougars won a 1950 West Regional Consolation game and a 1981 Second Round game with 37 points from Danny Ainge on their way to the NCAA Elite Eight. Thirteen of the 21 games in the series have been decided by less than 10 points with nine of those contests being decided by a margin of five points or less.

BYU IN SEASON OPENERS

BYU has a 72-32 record in season openers for a .692 winning percentage. BYU is 55-15 (.786) when opening at home, 14-14 (.500) when opening on an opponent's floor and 3-3 (.500) when opening on a neutral floor. In the last nine seasons since Dave Rose first came to BYU as an assistant, the Cougars are 7-2 in season openers with a 4-1 mark at home, 2-0 tally in away games and 1-1 record on neutral floors. Last year BYU lost at home to Loyola Marymount, 83-71, the Cougars' only home loss of the year.

OPENING VS. UCLA AND PAC-10 TEAMS

BYU will face UCLA in its season opener for the sixth time when the two schools meet on Wednesday. UCLA holds a 3-2 edge in the previous five season-opening matchups. BYU is 2-1 opening at home vs. UCLA and 0-2 when opening in Los Angeles. The last time the Bruins were BYU's first opponent of the year was in 1982, when the Cougars fell to UCLA 85-82 in Provo. Overall, BYU is 13-6 vs. Pac-10 schools in season openers, including a 4-3 record on the road. BYU has faced all 10 current members of the Pac-10 Conference in a season opener, but Arizona was not yet a member of the conference when the Cougars and Wildcats met in 1951. The last time BYU opened against a Pac-10 school was at Arizona State to start the 1993-94 season.

BYU SCHEDULE INCLUDES NATIONAL RUNNER-UP UCLA, MICHIGAN STATE AND SETON HALL

The BYU men's basketball nonconference schedule includes dates with 2006 NCAA Tournament runner-up UCLA of the Pac-10 Conference, 2005 Final Four participant Michigan State of the Big Ten Conference and 2006 NCAA qualifier Seton Hall of the Big East Conference. In all, the Cougars' non-league slate includes 14 games against teams from 10 different conferences prior to beginning Mountain West Conference play.

"We are excited about our schedule," BYU coach Dave Rose said. "We look forward to the challenge of playing some of the best teams in the country and believe the BYU Holiday Classic will be a great event for our fans. This should be a balanced, competitive schedule that will help us prepare for the conference. We hope to continue to improve as a team and build on the success our program achieved last season."

BYU will play Michigan State of the Big Ten on a neutral court at The Palace of Auburn Hills – home of the Detroit Pistons – on Dec. 9. The Spartans, who finished 22-12 last season, will play BYU at the Delta Center in 2007. New to BYU's schedule this season is the BYU Holiday Classic, which will be conducted the last weekend of December to conclude non-league play. With a four-team field that includes Big South Conference foe Liberty (Dec. 28), Mid-Continent Conference champion Oral Roberts (Dec. 29) and Big East Conference contender Seton Hall (Dec. 30), BYU fans will see teams from across the nation convene in Provo to compete with doubleheader games each day of the exempt tournament. Seton Hall and Oral Roberts were both NCAA Tournament participants last season. The Pirates will be the first Big East team to visit the Marriott Center since 1990 when St. John's played in the Cougar Classic, although BYU's last three NCAA Tournament opponents – Syracuse in 2004, Connecticut in 2003, and Cincinnati in 2001 – are Big East teams. The Cougars and Pirates will meet for the first time since an 82-80 Seton Hall overtime win at the Queen City Invitational on Dec. 29, 1958.

UCLA, Michigan State, Seton Hall, Oral Roberts, Portland, Liberty, Idaho State, San Jose State and Western Oregon are new to the schedule for 2006-07, while Lamar, Boise State, Weber State, Utah State and Southern Utah are repeat opponents from last season. Liberty is the lone first-time opponent for BYU. The Cougars own a 228-123 (.650) all-time record against their 2006-07 nonconference opponents and lead or are tied in the overall series against each program. BYU will play a minimum of nine games against teams that qualified for last year's NCAA Tournament.

The MWC season begins in Provo against reigning MWC Champion San Diego State and culminates against in-state rival Utah in the Marriott Center – the first regular-season finale between the Cougars and Utes since the 1995-96 season.

"Our league will be very competitive this year," BYU coach Dave Rose said. "Seven of the nine teams return at least three starters and five return four or more. We are looking forward to the upcoming season. I think our fans will be treated to some outstanding basketball in the Marriott Center this year."

The Cougars will play 30 regular-season games in 2006-07 prior to the MWC Tournament at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas March 6-10.

COUGARS DOWN HIGHLY RANKED DIVISION II MONTEVALLO IN FINAL EXHIBITION

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 8, 2006) – BYU played its final exhibition game Wednesday defeating the University of Montevallo, 92-63. Cougar center Trent Plaisted finished the night with 20 points on 8-for-9 shooting while grabbing nine rebounds, spoiling the Falcons' hopes of upsetting the Cougars. "The biggest impression for me was we got to guard something different than we see in practice everyday," said BYU head coach Dave Rose. "That was evident from all the fouls we got, but it was good for us." The Cougars opened the game on a 14-4 run with Plaisted connecting on his first four shots. Montevallo fought back and tied the game 28-28 at the six-minute mark. "Trent Plaisted is really good," said Montevallo head coach Danny Young. "He'll be in the NBA someday." BYU got a lift from its bench with five minutes left in the half when freshman guard Jonathan Tavernari hit a three to put BYU up 33-28. On the next defensive possession Tavernari grabbed the rebound and pushed it up the floor to senior captain Jimmy Balderson who hit a floating jumper to extend BYU's lead to 35-28. The Cougars finished the half with senior guard Rashaun Broadus hitting a mid-range jumpshot as time expired to put BYU up 45-35. "BYU is well coached," said coach Young. "They are very physical and very deep." The Cougars maintained their 10-point advantage until junior Sam Burgess connected from long-range at the 14-minute mark in the second half followed by back-to-back three-pointers from Broadus to extend the Cougar lead to 18 points at 66-48. Tavernari's hot hand continued in the second half as he nailed back-to-back three pointers and gave BYU its biggest lead to that point at 77-56. Coach Rose then got good minutes out of his reserves as they held the Falcons to only seven points in the final seven minutes. "There are a lot of guys that can contribute," said Coach Rose. "We got some good chemistry from a few different lineup." The Cougars had the advantage down low as they scored 33 points in the paint and had six blocks to the Falcons' 12 and 1, respectively.

COUGARS DEFEAT BROCK UNIVERSITY IN EXHIBITION OPENER

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 2, 2006) – BYU opened its exhibition season with a 90-49 trouncing of Brock University on Thursday night in the Marriott Center. Cougar center Trent Plaisted scored 13 points and grabbed eight rebounds, as BYU put an end to the Badgers' four-game winning streak. The Cougars dominated all facets of the game, shooting 51 percent from the field and 53 percent (8-of-15) from beyond the arc while holding Brock, a team averaging 83.8 points a game, to 25 percent shooting. BYU also outrebounded the Badgers, 54-33. "BYU has size and athleticism," Brock head coach Ken Murray said. "They push the ball, and they have some guys that can jump through the roof. They're a very athletic team." Plaisted wasted no time showing why he was named a Freshman All-American last season. The 6-foot-11, 245-pound sophomore scored on a put-back off of a Lee Cummmard miss, flushed down a lay-up in transition and then hit a 10-footer from the right baseline enroute to a quick 11-0 Cougar lead. BYU's early advantage ballooned into a 22-2 lead before Badger forward Chris Keith nailed a three-pointer, making it 22-5 with just under 12 minutes to go. Cougar senior Mike Rose answered back with a long-distance shot of his own sparking an 11-2 Cougar run. BYU led 43-14 at halftime. The early offensive assault gave Rose an opportunity to take a look at his freshmen and transfers, as the second-year coach gave all available players time on the court. "The first group of guys we had were the [veterans], so they know the game plan," BYU head coach Dave Rose said. "The second group came out and was pretty successful." The second half saw more of the same with BYU taking a 59-22 lead with 16 minutes left to play. Mike Rose knocked down two consecutive treys, and team captain Keena Young added four points and two assists during a 16-8 run. Young finished with 13 points on 6-of-8 shooting in only 16 minutes of action. On the night, BYU outscored Brock 51-10 in points in the paint and 15-0 in fastbreak points. The Cougars got it done on the defensive end as well forcing the Badgers into 20 turnovers and nabbing 13 steals.

AINGE, BALDERSON, YOUNG NAMED TEAM CAPTAINS

Coach Rose and the Cougar coaching staff have announced this year's team captains, calling upon seniors Austin Ainge, Jimmy Balderson and Keena Young to lead this year's team. "I'm proud of the way these three players have developed and of their dedication to our team," said BYU head coach Dave Rose. "They are totally committed to this program and have earned the respect and confidence of their teammates. They will provide us with good leadership as we work together as a team to achieve our goals." Ainge, a co-captain of last season's team, proved a valuable asset off the bench in 2005-06 after starting at the point guard spot and receiving All-Mountain West Conference honorable mention as a sophomore. Last season he ranked 11th in the MWC in assists while helping BYU lead the league in both scoring and assists. Balderson also provided a spark off the bench for the Cougars last season as he scored in double figures in 11 of the last 13 games and was the only player in the conference averaging more than 10 points per game off the bench with a 10.2 scoring average. Young led BYU in rebounding as a sophomore before becoming an All-MWC Third Team pick last year after starting the last 14 games of the year and ranking second on the team in rebounding (5.8 rpg) and third in scoring (10.3 ppg).

TELEVISION BROADCASTS

The Mountain West Conference's 2006-07 men's basketball television schedule will feature an unprecedented 99 games on national and regional television, including 65 of the 72 conference contests and all eight MWC Championship matchups. The television coverage provided by the MWC broadcast partners in 2006-07 is more than triple the national and regional telecasts MWC men's basketball has received in previous years. Seventy-five games will be shown on the MountainWest Sports Network (the mtn.), with 17 to be broadcast nationally on College Sports Television (CSTV) and seven on VERSUS (formerly OLN). BYU will have 18 regular-season games televised as part of the 2006-07 MWC television schedule, including three games on CSTV, one on VERSUS and 14 on the mtn. With the exception of a road game at TCU, BYU's entire conference schedule will be televised in 2007. BYU's nonconference games featured in the MWC broadcast schedule include home dates with Southern Utah (Nov. 24, 8 p.m. MT), San Jose State (Dec. 6, 7 p.m. MT) and Utah State (Dec. 16, 4 p.m. MT). While not part of the MWC television package, BYU's regular-season opener at 2006 NCAA runner-up UCLA on Nov. 15 will be televised on Fox Sports Net Prime Ticket, while the BYU-Michigan State matchup on Dec. 9 at The Palace at Auburn Hills will be carried on ESPN2 and BYU's game at Boise State on Nov. 29 will be aired on KBOI in Boise. Additional games on the BYU schedule could also be televised but have not yet been announced.

IN THE SEVEN YEARS OF THE MWC ...

- BYU has had five 20-win seasons, leading all MWC schools along with Utah. UNLV has had three, Wyoming three, New Mexico, San Diego State and Air Force two and Colorado State none.
- BYU has had the league's top RPI three times, been second once and third on three occasions. The Cougars were third last year (67) behind Air Force (50) and San Diego State (56).
- BYU has played the toughest schedule on average of any team in the MWC (average strength of schedule rating the past seven years is 66, Utah is next at 78). BYU has had the league's toughest schedule in two of the past three seasons.
- BYU has the second-most overall wins in the seven years of the MWC (137, Utah leads at 155).
- BYU is also second in conference wins (60, Utah has 69).
- BYU has the second-most MWC regular-season titles (two) along with Wyoming (Utah leads with four).
- BYU is one of six MWC teams to win the MWC Tournament title.

BYU AND MWC IN POSTSEASON

BYU has earned an invite to a postseason tournament in six of the seven years of the MWC, joining Utah in leading all MWC teams. BYU is second to Utah in NCAA appearances since the formation of the MWC (BYU has made three NCAA and three NIT while Utah has made five NCAA and one NIT). UNLV has received five invites (one NCAA, four NIT). New Mexico has received four (one NCAA, three NIT) while Wyoming has three (one NCAA, two NIT), San Diego State has three (two NCAA, one NIT) and Air Force has three (two NCAA and one NIT). Colorado State has been to one NCAA Tournament. TCU's first year was last season.

SEVEN MWC TOURNAMENTS, SIX DIFFERENT CHAMPIONS

San Diego State became the first team in the MWC to win the Tournament title twice with its victories in 2002 and 2006. New Mexico's win in 2005 marked the sixth Tournament winner in the first six years of the event. The only teams not to win an MWC title are Wyoming, Air Force and TCU, who made its MWC debut last season.

**TRENT PLAISTED NAMED 2006 FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICAN
DAVE ROSE RECEIVED HONORABLE MENTION
FOR 2006 NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR**

After helping BYU become one of the nation's most improved teams last season, Cougar freshman Trent Plaisted was named a Freshman All-American and BYU coach Dave Rose received honorable mention for National Coach of the Year honors. Plaisted was named to the Scout.com Freshman All-America Second Team after leading BYU in scoring and rebounding in 2005-06. He averaged 13.6 points and 6.9 rebounds per game over the season while being selected national freshman of the week three times. He was also named the Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year and was one of only three freshmen to receive U.S. Basketball Writers Association All-District recognition, being named to the USBWA District VIII Team. Coach Rose was named the USBWA District VIII Coach of the Year and the MWC Coach of the Year in his first season at the Cougar helm. Taking over a team predicted to finish last in the MWC, Rose directed the Cougars to a second-place tie at 12-4, one game behind league-champion San Diego State. With an overall 20-9 record, Rose helped BYU become the nation's second-most improved program last year with an 11.5-game improvement over the prior season's 9-21 team. It was also the largest improvement ever under a first-year BYU coach, as Rose's 11.5-game improvement passed Roger Reid's 6.5-game jump in 1989-90, and his 11 additional victories topped the eight extra wins achieved by Rose's predecessor Steve Cleveland in his first season in 1997-98.

North Carolina's Roy Williams was named the Scout.com Coach of the Year. UCLA's Ben Howland, Ohio State's Thad Matta, Tennessee's Bruce Pearl, Kansas' Bill Self, Illinois' Bruce Weber and Villanova's Jay Wright were considered runners-up. Joining Rose in receiving honorable mention were John Brady (LSU), John Calipari (Memphis), Tom Crean (Marquette), Mark Fox (Nevada), Karl Hobbs (George Washington), Darrin Horn (Western Kentucky), Chris Lowery (Southern Illinois), Lorenzo Romar (Washington) and Bob Thomason (Pacific). UNC's Williams also garnered the USBWA National Coach of the Year award, while Tar Heel freshman Tyler Hansbrough was singled out as the nation's top freshman by the USBWA, Rivals.com and Scout.com.

DAVE ROSE, TRENT PLAISTED GARNER USBWA DISTRICT VIII HONORS

BYU's Dave Rose was named the District VIII Coach of the Year and Cougar freshman Trent Plaisted was selected to the District VIII Team by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association. District VIII represents the top players and coach from teams in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Nevada, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.



ROSE NAMED DISTRICT VIII COACH OF THE YEAR

As a first-year coach, Rose guided a team picked to finish last in the Mountain West Conference to a 12-4 second-place finish and a 20-9 (.690) mark overall. Rose was named the MWC Coach of the Year by the league's head coaches and media members. BYU finished the regular season as the most improved team in the nation (+12.5 games) over 2004-05 when the Cougars went 9-21. During Rose's seven prior seasons (1990-97) as a head coach at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, he was named Scenic West Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1993 and achieved a .746 winning percentage with six of his seven teams earning a national ranking. Rose is the first BYU coach to be District Coach of the Year since Roger Reid earned the same honor in 1992.

PLAISTED ONE OF THREE FRESHMAN NATIONALLY TO EARN ALL-DISTRICT HONORS

A 6-foot-11 forward/center, Plaisted was one of only three freshmen to receive all-district honors nationally, joining 6-foot-9 forward Tyler Hansbrough from the University of North Carolina (District III Team) and 6-foot-6 guard Brandon Rush from the University of Kansas (District VI Player of the Year). Plaisted is the first BYU player to receive USBWA All-District honors since center Rafael Araujo in 2004. Former Cougar swingman Travis Hansen was named to the team in 2003. MWC players joining Plaisted on the District VIII team include Louis Amundson of UNLV, Antoine Hood of Air Force, Jason Smith of Colorado State and Justin Williams of Wyoming. Other team members include Utah State's Nate Harris, Boise State's Coby Karl, Colorado's Richard Roby, Montana's Andrew Straight and Nevada's Nick Fazekas, who was named the District VIII Player of the Year. MWC players Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter of San Diego State were selected to the District IX Team.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS AT BYU

- Including incoming freshman Jonathan Tavernari, 26 international players have played basketball at BYU.
- The Cougars have had an international player on their varsity roster in 35 of the past 55 years.
- In the last five years, BYU has rostered six international players, including four on this season's team – Jimmy Balderson (Canada), Vuk Ivanovic (Serbia) and Fernando Malaman and Jonathan Tavernari (Brazil).
- Foreign players at BYU have received eight all-conference citations, two conference player of the year awards (Timo Saarelainen – 1985, Rafael Araujo – 2004) and eight All-America citations (Kresimir Cosic – 1972 and 1973, Rafael Araujo – 2004).
- According to a book about basketball in Finland by Mikko Simon, BYU has the distinction of being the first NCAA Division I school to have an overseas player on its roster when Timo Lampen, a native of Lahti, Finland, took the court for the Cougars in 1960-61.
- BYU also boasts the first foreign All-American in Kresimir Cosic, whose BYU jersey was retired on March 4. The Zadar, Yugoslavia, native played on the Cougar varsity team from 1971-73 and earned six All-America citations and three first-team All-Western Athletic Conference awards. He is the only BYU player to be inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame. Cosic passed away in 1995.
- During the 2005 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, CBS Television analyst Billy Packer singled out Cosic during a discussion of the quality of international players now playing college basketball. Said Packer, "Kresimir Cosic, who played for BYU, was really the first great international player to play basketball in the United States."

de TOLEDO TO PLAY PROFESSIONALLY

BYU men's basketball recruit Luiz de Toledo has decided to pursue a professional basketball career instead of playing college basketball, BYU coach Dave Rose announced on August 10.

"Luiz has decided to play professionally in Brazil this season," Rose said. "As a coaching staff, we had looked forward to working with him at BYU, but we respect his decision and wish him the very best."

A native of Araraquara, Brazil, de Toledo signed a National Letter of Intent last November and was expected to enroll at BYU this fall before making the decision to turn professional. The 6-foot-7, 220-pound forward recently completed his senior season at Modesto Christian High School in Modesto, Calif.

FOUR COUGARS RECEIVE ACADEMIC MWC HONORS

Four BYU men's basketball players were honored for their achievements off the court in 2005-06 when the Mountain West Conference announced its All-Academic Team selections. The Cougar honorees featured junior starters Jimmy Balderson and Fernando Malaman as well as junior Mike Rose and true freshman Jackson Emery. Rose led the team with a 3.48 GPA in business management. Malaman, a native of Brazil, recorded a 3.42 mark in exercise science while Emery posted a 3.3 as an open major in his first year at BYU. Balderson, an honorable-mention All-MWVC pick, earned a 3.2 GPA in economics. The four hoopsters were part of an MWVC-high 168 athletes selected from BYU for winter and spring sports, 63 more than any other school in the conference. Student-athletes must have completed at least one term while maintaining a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better in order to qualify for the honor. The student-athletes must also be starters or significant contributors on their athletic team.

BYU RECEIVES COMMENDATION FOR APR SCORE

The BYU men's basketball program received a 981 score in the Spring release of the Academic Progress Report. "Our men's basketball program received a commendation, finishing in the top 10 percent of the NCAA, right up there with some Ivy League-type institutions," BYU Athletics Director Tom Holmoe said. "We are very pleased with that."

COUGARS HELP CHILDREN WITH CANCER

For the seventh year, the BYU men's basketball team joined with the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation last year to make the holidays a little more festive for over 60 local families who have children afflicted with cancer. The basketball team worked with the Foundation to host a Christmas party for these families, during which the children enjoyed a wide variety of games, food provided by Blaine Jex and the Pizza Factory and Fred Parker and the Courtyard Marriott, and local celebrities including Santa, Cosmo and the BYU men's basketball team. The party was the culmination of a week's worth of festivities as the Cougars and the Foundation also joined forces to provide the families with hundreds of toys thanks to donations from Cougar fans, community members and Wal-Mart. BYU coaches and Foundation members purchased some of the toys and then the parents selected the toys they wanted to take home and put under the Christmas tree for each of their children. The Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation is a charitable organization dedicated to providing assistance for children with cancer and their families, primarily through the collection and distribution of gifts to these families during the Christmas season. For the past eight years, the Foundation has collected toys and then distributed them to these special children and their families at a Christmas party. This was the seventh year BYU coaches, players and their families have volunteered for the Christmas party. Though he has been heavily involved with the Foundation as an assistant coach at BYU, last year was head coach Dave Rose's first opportunity to serve as honorary chairman. "This has always been a cause I feel strongly about," said Rose. "It has been such a positive experience for the coaches, players and families and is a tremendous opportunity for community members to be involved in brightening the holiday season for these children."

COUGAR CROWDS RANKED NO. 2 IN MWC ATTENDANCE

An average of 11,069 fans packed the Marriott Center last season for each BYU home game, second only to New Mexico's 13,387 average in the Mountain West Conference. A total of 20,732 fans attended BYU's last home game during which former Cougar great Kresimir Cosic's jersey was retired. The mark is BYU's highest since March 1, 2004. The Cougars went 14-1 at home last year including wins in their last 14 straight home contests, which ranks eighth in the nation. BYU celebrated its 500th game in the Marriott Center on Feb. 22 and owns a 386-116 (.769) record there.

WINNING STREAKS

The Cougars had several winning streaks last season, including their longest since the 2003-04 season at six straight victories. The streak was tied for the seventh-longest active winning streak in the nation. BYU's prior victory streaks last year included one four-game streak, two three-game streaks and two two-game streaks. BYU won 10 of its last 13 games.

BOUNCE BACK COUGARS

With its 20-9 overall record, BYU suffered consecutive defeats only once last season, the last two games, having bounced back from each prior loss with a victory. BYU alternated wins and losses in the first five league games before winning four straight games, two of which came on the road. The Cougars lost their next game but rebounded to win six straight before losing again.

MAGIC NUMBER: 70

BYU was 12-0 last season when holding opponents under 70 points and 8-9 when allowing opponents to surpass the 70-point threshold. Cougar foes averaged 71.7 points per game. BYU was also 17-4 when scoring 70 or more points and 3-5 when falling below the 70-point mark. The Cougars led the MWC in scoring, averaging 76.2 ppg, and scored 100 points in conference play for the first time since Feb. 10, 1994 in their home game against league-champion San Diego State.

FOR STARTERS

Overall last year, nine players started while Coach Dave Rose used eight starting lineups. True freshman Jackson Emery started the last six games, the first starts of his career. Rashaun Broadus started the last 12 games after missing the first Wyoming game (team rules violation) and the next two starts. Keena Young made his 14th straight start of the season at Houston. Trent Plaisted started each game while Brock Reichner started every game but the first and the last, due to illness. Rashaun Broadus started 26 games, Fernando Malaman 15 games, Lee Cummond 14 games, Jimmy Balderson 10 games and Austin Ainge four games. The majority of BYU's starting lineups featured two freshmen (Plaisted and Cummond or Emery). Five Cougars who started between seven and 23 games on the 2004-05 team (Ainge, 23 starts; Balderson, 16 starts; Young, 15 starts; Derek Dawes, 13 starts; Mike Rose, 7 starts) spent more time coming off the bench last season.

20-WIN SEASONS

With a win against New Mexico to conclude the regular season, the Cougars achieved their 29th 20-win season in 2005-06. BYU has averaged 20 wins every 2.7 years (BYU has played 78 seasons in which it has played at least 20 games in a season). BYU coach Dave Rose is the fifth Cougar head coach to reach 20 wins in his first season at the helm. He joins G. Ott Romney (20-10 in 1928-29), Stan Watts (22-12 in 1949-50), Ladell Anderson (20-11 in 1983-84) and Roger Reid (21-9 in 1989-90). Both Watts and Reid achieved six 20-win seasons in their BYU coaching careers while Romney posted five and Rose's predecessor, Steve Cleveland, achieved four.

KING OF THE GLASS

Redshirt freshman Trent Plaisted pulled down a career-high 18 rebounds at TCU on Feb. 25, 2006, the most by a Cougar since Gary Trost recorded 18 on Dec. 19, 1991. The mark is a Mountain West Conference record among freshmen in league play and is the most ever by a BYU freshman. Only 14 Cougars have ever pulled down more rebounds in a game.

MAKING NOISE

Jimmy Balderson played a significant role in helping the Cougars win 10 of their last 13 games. Balderson scored in double figures in all 10 wins while scoring five, 13 and seven points, respectively, in BYU's three losses during the streak. He averaged 13.7 points per game over the last 13 contests and led BYU with 21 points against New Mexico in BYU's last regular-season outing. Balderson was awarded MWC Player of the Week honors for his performance in the final week of the regular season.

FROM THE FIELD

BYU had one of its best scoring nights of the year against San Diego State on Feb. 22, 2006 as the Cougars scored 100 points for the first time since Jan. 11, 2005 in overall play and the first time since Feb. 10, 1994 in conference play. The Cougars' 59 second-half points were their most points in a half since scoring 59 in the second half against Santa Clara on Dec. 31, 2004. The Cougars also shot 59.4 percent from the floor overall, their best mark in MWC play last season, and 75.9 percent (22-for-29) in the second half, their best shooting half since shooting 82.4 percent (14-for-17) in the second half against Air Force on Feb. 23, 2004.

HALFTIME REPORT

BYU was 14-0 when leading at the half, 5-9 when trailing and 1-0 when tied last year. Of the 14 games in which they led at the half, the Cougars led by double digits six times. BYU was more impressive in the second half. The Cougars outscored their opponents in the second period of play in all but eight games last year. BYU averaged 4.8 more second-half points than its opponents after a slight 0.24 edge in the first half.

FIRST-YEAR COACH MADE AN IMPACT

Picked last in MWC preseason, first-year head coach Dave Rose directed the Cougars to 20 wins. Their 20-9 record was an 11.5-game improvement over the year before. Rose earned a .746 winning percentage when he last served as a head coach at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, from 1990-97, as six of his seven teams earned a national ranking. His winning percentage last season with BYU was .690.

MOST IMPROVED

BYU was the most improved team in the nation last year through the regular season. The Cougars' .441 jump in winning percentage (.741 in 2006 from .300 in 2005) led the country as well as its overall 12.5-game improvement. BYU's +11 wins was tied with South Alabama for top honors. With its 20-9 overall record compared to the prior year's 9-21 mark, BYU's final .390 jump in winning percentage (.690 in 2006 from .300 in 2005) was second in the country as well as its overall 11.5-game improvement. BYU's +11 wins ranked third.

PLAYING STRONG DOWN THE STRETCH

The Cougars won six of their last eight and 10 of their last 13 games while avenging their three prior league losses with wins over MWC-champion San Diego State, Air Force and UNLV. BYU lost to Air Force in the league opener as the Cougars started 2-3 in league play but finished tied for second with the Falcons at 12-4. In this stretch, BYU also won at New Mexico, snapping the Lobos' 21-game home win streak, while going 4-1 on the road. BYU achieved a six-game victory streak, which ranked tied for seventh in the nation, before its MWC Quarterfinal loss to Utah.

NEW PLAYERS MADE SOLID CONTRIBUTIONS

Five of BYU's top seven scorers and rebounders were first-year players and a walk-on. While growing into their roles last year, three freshmen, two transfers and one walk-on accounted for 62.2 percent of team scoring and 55.3 percent of team rebounding while playing 63.4 percent of total minutes and making 80.7 percent of starts.

BALANCED ATTACK

BYU boasted a balanced attack with five players averaging between 9 and 14 points. BYU had five players in double figures on nine occasions this season, including seven times during league play and in each of BYU's last four wins. Experienced starters from last year, Austin Ainge and Jimmy Balderson, played key roles off the bench with the infusion of new players.

OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

BYU was the first team to score 100 points in an MWC game since 2003 (100-90 win over San Diego State). BYU led the MWC in scoring and assists and ranked among the nation's top teams in three-point shooting (25th), assists (34th), scoring offense (36th), won-loss percentage (48th) and field-goal percentage (50th) in the final NCAA statistical rankings. Only 33 teams in the country finished with less than BYU's nine losses.

CLUTCH PLAY

BYU exhibited clutch play, solid mental toughness and strong coaching while going 11-2 in games decided by nine points or less last season after going 1-10 in games decided by a single digit the prior year.

ROSE NAMED MWC COACH OF THE YEAR BY ESPN'S PAT FORDE AND BY COLLEGE INSIDERS.COM

In addition to the league's official honor, BYU's Dave Rose received the nod as the MWC Coach of the Year by several others last season. ESPN's Pat Forde named Rose his choice for MWC Coach of the Year, as did CollegeInsiders.com.

ROSE RANKED NO. 3 AMONG NATION'S FIRST-YEAR COACHES

BYU head coach Dave Rose received national notice for the outstanding job he did during his first season guiding the Cougars. In a Feb. 12 column on ESPN.com, Pat Forde lists Rose among the top-three first-year coaches in the nation this season. Among the nearly 40 first-year coaches in college basketball this year, Forde names the 10 he feels are doing the best job, ranking Rose No. 3 overall. Picked to finish last in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason poll of MWC media members, BYU finished tied for second at 12-4, one game behind league-champion San Diego State.

COUGAR RECRUITS HAVE EXCELLED

With Trent Plaisted receiving the 2006 MWC Freshman of the Year award, BYU has now had nine recruits earn conference freshman/newcomer or a major award in their first season as a Cougar in the nine years BYU coach Dave Rose has been in Provo. Rose was Steve Cleveland's recruiting coordinator and lead assistant the past eight seasons before taking over the program this season. Six BYU players have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year.

PLAISTED EARNS THREE NATIONAL FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONORS

BYU redshirt freshman forward/center Trent Plaisted received national recognition for his play. Plaisted was named the Nivea for Men Fresh Face Player of the Week by CBS.Sportsline.com, an honor handed out to top performers in the national freshman class, while ESPN's Dick Vitale also named Plaisted his Diaper Dandy of the Week for his play the week of Feb. 6. He also was named the Rivals.com Freshman Player of the Week for his outings against San Diego State and at TCU, which included a BYU freshman-record 18 rebounds against the Horned Frogs.

COUGAR FANS SHOW SUPPORT

BYU has consistently ranked among the national attendance leaders in the 35-year history of the Marriott Center. The Cougars average of 11,069 last season was more than the regular-season champions of 27 out of 31 conferences as well as over half of the teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big 12, Big East and Southeastern Conference and all but Arizona in the Pac-10. BYU also averaged more fans than 12 of the NCAA Sweet 16 participants, including all of the Final Four teams.

A tireless worker, gifted motivator and strong strategist, Dave Rose guided BYU to a 20-win season while earning district and conference coach-of-the-year honors in his first season at the Cougar helm in 2005-06. Rose was named to succeed Steve Cleveland as BYU Men's Basketball Head Coach on April 11, 2005.

Rose received national notice for the outstanding job he did during his first season guiding the Cougars. Picked to finish last in the Mountain West Conference in the preseason poll of MWC media members, BYU instead earned a 20-9 record and NIT bid in 2005-06 under Rose's tutelage, including a 12-4 conference mark to tie for second place. Rose was named the USBWA District VIII Coach of the Year and received honorable mention for National Coach of the Year by Scout.com. He was named MWC Coach of the Year by the league's media and coaches and by Colleg Insider.com. ESPN analyst Bob Valvano called BYU "one of the great surprise teams in the country."

In a column on ESPN.com, Pat Forde listed Rose as one of the top first-year coaches in the nation, ranking Rose No. 3 overall among the nearly 40 first-year coaches in college basketball in 2005-06.

Rose, who served the prior eight seasons as Cleveland's lead assistant in Provo, was promoted to BYU's head job two days after Cleveland announced his resignation to take the head-coaching position at Fresno State. Rose served as BYU's associate head coach for five seasons and took over the Cougar program with 22 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons as a head coach at the junior college and high school levels.

Since coming to Provo in 1997 with Cleveland, Rose played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play in six of the past seven seasons, including three NCAA bids, while claiming two MWC titles. As associate head coach, Rose fulfilled a variety of responsibilities under Coach Cleveland, and his efforts earned notice, such as being named the top assistant in the Mountain West Conference by Street & Smith in the 2004-05 College Basketball Preview.

Rose was the team's defensive coordinator and worked with the post players. He possesses a complete knowledge of the game and worked hard in developing the team's defensive game plans. An outstanding teacher, he coached defensive skill development and implemented the defensive game plan. BYU was the top defensive team in the Mountain West Conference two of the four seasons Rose oversaw the defense.

A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose managed BYU's recruiting efforts during his eight seasons as an assistant. Rose's success as a recruiter was evidenced by his being named one of the top 25 college basketball recruiters in 2004 by Rivals.com. Each year the Cougars have brought in talented newcomers to contribute to the BYU program. The 2004 class was rated No. 17 nationally and No. 3 in the West by Rivals.com. The 2000 recruiting class also ranked in the top 20 nationally.

Proving that Rose has excelled in recruiting and developing players, nine recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major conference award in their first season as a Cougar in the nine years Rose has been in Provo. Including Rafael Araujo being named the league's top newcomer by the MWC media members in 2003 (the MWC discontinued the newcomer award that year), six BYU players have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. Most recently, Trent Plaisted was named the 2006 MWC Freshman of the Year. The following is the list of player honors earned the last nine seasons by Cougar recruits in their first seasons in Provo.

Rose has also worked closely with scheduling. BYU has played many of the nation's top teams over the past several years thanks in part to relationships Rose has developed with programs across the country. His efforts have helped the Cougars receive invitations to tournaments like the 2004 EA SPORTS Maui Invitational where BYU faced that season's NCAA Champion North Carolina.

Prior to coming to BYU, Rose was head coach at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, where he compiled a 167-57 record in seven seasons. Rose guided six of his seven teams to national top-20 rankings, including a ranking as high as No. 2, while earning three conference titles. His peers honored him as the 1993 Scenic West Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. While at Dixie, Rose coached three NJCAA All-Americans as well as longtime NBA player Keon Clark. At BYU he has recruited and coached two NBA Draft picks in Rafael Araujo and Travis Hansen.

Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at

Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie. He was the head basketball coach at Millard for three years from 1983-86.

Rose becomes the 17th person to guide the Cougar basketball program since its first season in 1903. He follows the coaching pedigree of Basketball Hall of Fame coach Stan Watts, who is BYU's all-time leader in coaching victories with a 371-254 record from 1949-72. Watts also coached at Millard High School and Dixie State College before coming to BYU.

PLAYING CAREER

Rose was a two-sport athlete at Dixie College before transferring to Houston, where he was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished second in the NCAA Tournament. At Houston, Rose played in 1980-81, redshirted in 1981-82 and played his final year in 1982-83.

At Dixie, Rose was first-team all-league in both basketball and baseball. Rose was also the Region 18 batting champion, hitting .421 as a center fielder. While playing basketball for Houston's Northbrook High School, he led the District 16AAAA in scoring, was selected first-team all-district and All-Greater Houston and was named team MVP.

PERSONAL

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose and his wife Cheryl have three children and one granddaughter. Daughter Chanell played forward on the BYU women's basketball team from 2000-03 and is married to Brock Reichner, last year's lone senior on the BYU team. Rose's wife Cheryl is actively involved in helping families who have children with cancer as vice chairperson of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation. Rose follows Cleveland as the second returned missionary to serve as BYU men's basketball head coach. Rose served a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79 between his two years as a player at Dixie College. His son Garrett returned in August 2005 from a two-year mission in Little Rock, Ark., and married his wife Brooke in November 2006. Rose also has a daughter, Taylor, who is a sixth grader at Wasatch Elementary.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Dave Rose was one of the first coaches in Utah to become involved with Coaches vs. Cancer while at Dixie State College. He helps the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation and has been a volunteer coach for youth groups. He served on the Academic Excellence Committee at Dixie. Dave and his wife Cheryl were Chamber of Commerce Citizens of the Year in St. George. Cheryl is extremely committed to serving in the community. She received the Beacon of Hope Award in 2005. After Dave got her involved, she now serves as the Vice Chairperson for the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation.

DAVE RICE

2nd year (UNLV 1991)

Dave Rice joined the BYU coaching staff in May 2005. Rice has 15 years of coaching experience, including 13 seasons at the Division I level at BYU, UNLV and Utah State. As a player, Rice was a member of UNLV's 1989-90 National Championship and 1990-91 Final Four teams that won a school-record 45 consecutive games.



In his first season at BYU, he helped the Cougars become the nation's second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record. BYU also led the Mountain West Conference in scoring and assists.

Rice came to BYU from Utah State University where he helped Coach Stew Morrill and the Aggies earn a 24-8 record, Big West Conference Tournament title and an NCAA Tournament bid in 2004-05. In his one season at Utah State, Rice's coaching duties included working with the offense and coaching the guards. In 2004-05, the Aggies led the nation in field-goal percentage (school-record .525) and ranked fourth nationally in scoring margin (+14.6), 10th in assists (17.2) and 20th in three-point field goal percentage (.391).

Rice spent 11 seasons as an assistant coach at UNLV, which is the second-longest tenure ever for an assistant in that program. During his time at UNLV as both a player and a coach, the Rebels had 12 players go on to play in the National Basketball Association, eight of whom were drafted in the first round, including six lottery picks. While in Las Vegas, Rice worked under four head coaches in Jerry Tarkanian, Tim Grgurich, Bill Bayno and Charlie Spoonhour. In his last eight seasons at UNLV, the Runnin' Rebels received seven postseason invitations and averaged 20 wins per year.

In addition to his Division I experience, Rice served as an assistant coach for one season at Chaffey (Calif.) College in 1994, helping the Panthers to a 32-6 record and an appearance in the California State Final Four. He also spent one season at Claremont (Calif.) High School, where he was an assistant coach under his father Lowell, a long-time high school coach. That team went 21-7, winning the Baseline League Championship and reaching the CIF quarterfinals. Rice earned his bachelor's degree in political science from UNLV in 1991 and his MBA in 1993. He was also a two-time UNLV Scholar-Athlete of the Year and a Rhodes Scholar candidate.

Prior to playing at UNLV, Rice began his college career at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif., where he earned All-South Coast Conference honors as a sophomore and was chosen from among more than 13,000 student-athletes as the 1989 California Junior College Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He graduated from Claremont High School. A native of Claremont, Calif., Rice and his wife Mindy have two sons, Travis (9) and Dylan (4).

JOHN WARDENBURG

6th year (BYU 1986)

John Wardenburg joined the BYU coaching staff as an assistant coach in May 2001 and served four seasons under former BYU coach Steve Cleveland before being retained on the staff by current BYU head coach Dave Rose.



In 2005, he helped the Cougars become the nation's second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record. BYU also led the Mountain West Conference in scoring and assists.

Wardenburg has 19 years of coaching experience. He came to BYU with 15 years of coaching experience at the high school and junior college levels. His primary responsibilities have included defensive skill development, game film preparation, summer basketball camp director, recruiting and assisting Coach Rose with defensive game plan preparation.

Wardenburg compiled a 105-62 record in seven years as a head coach at Payson High School (1988-93) and Pine View High School (1999-01) while guiding his teams to five league titles and seven state tournament berths. In those seven years, his teams earned three fifth-place state tournament finishes, one third-place finish and a 3A Utah State Championship with his 2001 Pine View team.

After Wardenburg's Payson teams claimed three league titles and posted a 76-43 overall record, he served as an assistant coach from 1993-97 at Dixie State College under current BYU head coach Dave Rose and helped the Rebels to a 95-31 record and a national ranking as high as No. 2. Wardenburg left coaching for two years to serve as Dixie's Director of Athletics. He returned to coaching as the head coach at Pine View High School in St. George where he recorded two highly successful seasons before joining BYU's staff in 2001.

Wardenburg's Pine View teams won the league title both seasons he was the coach while achieving a 29-19 record. Wardenburg earned 3A Coach of the Year honors in 2000 after coaching his team to a third-place state finish and was named Championship Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding his team to the state title.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Wardenburg was a multi-sport athlete at Kiel High School in Kiel, Wis. He served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to The Netherlands from 1977-79 and earned a BA in political science from BYU in 1986 and an MA in health, physical education and recreation from Utah State in 1992.

Wardenburg and his wife Pam have four sons, Scott, Jonathan, Adam and Barrett, and one granddaughter.

Walter Roese was hired in June 2005 as an assistant coach under Coach Dave Rose, becoming the first Brazilian full-time assistant coach in NCAA Division I Men's Basketball.



With his outstanding knowledge of the game and large international recruiting network, Roese is a valuable addition to the BYU coaching staff.

In 2005, he helped the Cougars become the nation's second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record. BYU also led the Mountain West Conference in scoring and assists.

A 1994 Cum Laude graduate in International Business Administration from BYU-Hawaii, Roese earned an MBA at BYU in 2003 before serving as BYU's director of basketball operations under former Cougar coach Steve Cleveland for two years.

Roese coached the Brazilian Junior National Team this past summer, helping his native country qualify for the 2007 World Cup. He also previously served as a volunteer assistant at BYU-Hawaii under Ken Wagner after finishing his professional playing career.

A native of Novo Hamburgo in southern Brazil, Roese played seven years professionally in Brazil and Italy after graduating from BYU-Hawaii. He still holds the Brazilian professional league record with 23 assists in a single game. He has represented the Brazilian National Team and professional clubs at four World Cup tournaments and several international championships in Europe, Asia and South and North America, winning state, national and South American championships. In 1986, he was Brazil's top-rated junior player. Roese has continued to excel as an athlete. In August of 2003, he hit a three-quarter-court shot at the buzzer to give Brazil a one-point victory in the semifinals of the Masters World Basketball Championships (ages 35-40) in Orlando, Fla., before leading Brazil to the title win over Russia.

Roese has experience at nearly every level of the college game. Roese attended the University of Houston, West Texas A&M and BYU-Hawaii while playing at the Division I, Division II and NAIA levels. He was the MVP of the Lone Star Conference in 1992 while playing at West Texas A&M and was a Scholar Athlete All-American at BYU-Hawaii. He served as a volunteer director of athletic marketing and assistant basketball coach at BYU-Hawaii from 2000-01 before attending the Marriott School of Management at BYU to obtain his MBA degree.

Roese comes from an athletic family that has seen six members participate at the Olympic level in basketball, volleyball and tennis. Fluent in English, Spanish and Portuguese, Roese and his wife Monique are the parents of two children, Leonardo and Agatha.

Magrath, Alberta, Canada

PLAYER SUMMARY: Balderson is a 6-foot-6 guard who ranked fourth on the team in scoring and led all perimeter players in shooting last season. He led BYU in three-point percentage in 2005, making 16 starts after coming out of a planned redshirt year. A talented scorer, he has excellent range from the three-point arc and has good size. He led the Canadian National Development Team in scoring at the World University Games in Izmir, Turkey, in August 2005. During the eight-game tournament, he averaged 14.9 points and 4.1 rebounds while shooting 50 percent from the floor and 40 percent from three-point range. Balderson played in 27 of 30 games as a freshman reserve on BYU's 18-12 team that advanced to the second round of the 2002 NIT, logging 8.5 minutes per game while shooting .487 from the floor, .306 (11-of-36) on threes and .657 from the line. His 48.7 percent shooting from the floor led all BYU perimeter players.


