MEMO TO PRESS

PRESS BOX—Beginning with BYU's first home game this fall, press and radio guests of the University will be accommodated in new quarters (hallelujah!). The press box, which is located on the top row of the east stands, is best reached from the parking lot just east of the main entrance. Special parking will be provided press and radio workers, and passes will be issued at request.

GAME TIMES—The opening home game (Montana) is scheduled for 8:05 p.m., and the three remaining home games will begin at 1:30 p.m.

PASSES AND COMPS—Requests for working press passes and complimentary tickets should be made at least a week in advance, sooner if possible. In no cases will women or persons not working a game be permitted in the press box.

GAME BROADCASTS—Four radio booths are available, but broadcast rights must be cleared through the Director of Athletics, Edwin R. Kimball. One radio booth is reserved for the visiting team.

SERVICES—Complete game statistics—lineups, play-by-play, half time and final yardage reports, and individual statistics will be supplied by the press box.

UNIFORMS—The Cougars will wear royal blue uniforms at home and white uniforms on the road. Players numbers will also be worn on the helmets and sleeves of the players beginning this year.

HAROLD W. KOPP

Any doubts that BYU was in earnest about building a strong football team were dispelled a year and a half ago when the administration announced the selection of Harold W. Kopp, then head coach at Rhode Island, to shape the destinies of its future gridiron teams.



Coach Kopp, who is facing his second season at BYU, is, in the eyes of the Cougars' football following, just what the doctor ordered. A determined, uncompromising leader, his every effort is dedicated to the task of building the Brig-hams into a competitive, recognized team.

There's no question but what he feels "it can be done." He proved it at Rhode Island, where he took over as head coach in

1950. The Rams were in a feeble state when he assumed command. But they bounced up to defeat their state rival, Brown, three out of four times (the only other RI win over Brown was 17 years before) and capture or share the Yankee league crown in 1952, 1953 and 1955. The Rams were undefeated his last year at RI, and his record for his last four seasons was 25-5-2.

A graduate of Western Maryland (1933) he began his coaching career at Northeastern University in 1937 as line coach. He later coached at Brown, then served four years in the Army infantry in England, Scotland and Africa during World War II.

Returning to New England football, he coached the varsity line at Harvard from 1946 to 1948, moved to Yale under Herman Hickman in 1948, and then accepted the RI post in 1950. His coaching duties at RI were interrupted in 1950 when he was called into the armed services during the Korean conflict.

He holds the rank of lieutenant colonel in the reserves.

In 1949 he was a member of the coaching staff of the North team that defeated the South, and he also served as coach of the Eastern College All-Stars who defeated the New York Giants.

He has coached the single wing, T-formation and split-T.

DIXON-DAVIS

Allan Davis, Backfield Coach

Allan Davis is typical of the young, talented coaches Kopp selected for his staff. Davis, a former all-conference quarterback under



like Armstrong at University of Utah, was building football champions at Murray High (Utah) when he joined the BYU staff.

In seven years at Murray, Allan always had the Spartans ranked among the state's best. His record for his last three years was 27-4, and his team reached the state finals in 1953, won the

state crown in 1954. In 1955 the Spartans were reclassified an "A" school, and they were beaten in the state finals by East High, a team coached by Tally Stevens.

Born in Salem, Allan played ball for Payson High and was studentbody president. He graduated from Utah in 1947.

Owen Dixon, Line Coach

Line chores fall to Owen Dixon, former all-conference guard for BYU during post-war years, who also guided a prep team (B.Y. High) into the state finals before joining the Cougar staff.

A native of Provo, Dixon is regarded as one of the finest guards the school has produced. He won honors before and after a stint in the service, and he was respected throughout the league for his play.

Following graduation in 1946, Dixon joined the coaching staff at B.Y. High school. His teams were always in the running, and they won the regional title in 1952. They advanced to the state playoffs, but lost by one touchdown. He was freshman coach at BYU in 1954, joined the varsity staff in 1955.

STEVENS-TOLBERT

Tally Stevens, End Coach

First coaching assistant to be added to the staff following the appointment of Kopp was Tally Stevens, perhaps the most successful high school coach in Utah history.



Tally, giant-sized '49 graduate of the University of Utah, enjoyed phenomenal success as coach at East High School (Salt Lake City). His last four seasons as head coach netted him a 33-3-1 record and three state Class "A" championships. His overall record with preps was 49-11-3.

A native of Evanston, Wyoming, he played one year at Utah before going in to the service. He played some ball with the Fourth Air Force, then returned to Utah, where he was regarded as one of the finest ends ever developed at that school.

Max Tolbert, Freshman Coach

Responsibilities for priming frosh squads at BYU fall to Max Tolbert, who has reason to be proud of the 4-0 record the Kittens turned in last year. Flamboyant and expressive, Max is a major force in recruiting, is doing outstanding job with the newcomers.

A native of Fayetteville, Pa., where he lettered in four sports, he came to BYU in 1948. He lettered for three seasons as flanker, climaxing his senior year with 456 minutes of play on both offense and defense, he Cougars had 6-3-1 record that year.



Following graduation, Max coached baseball and assisted with football at Murray High for three years before joining the BYU staff in 1955.

VANNOY-KIMBALL

Jay VanNoy, Freshman Coach

Latest addition to the staff is Jay VanNoy, one of the finest athletes Utah has ever produced. Although Jay's main job is that of baseball coach, he will also assist with the frosh gridgers.



A native of Garland, Utah, he was all-conference halfback for the Aggies for four consecutive seasons, and he was Little All-America (1st string) and All-America (2nd and 3rd strings) selection his senior year. He also played varsity basketball for the Aggies.

In 1950 he signed with the St. Louis Cardinal organization, and played two seasons with the Cards, four in triple-A competition at Rochester and Columbus. He has participated in two Little World Series.

Rodney Kimball, Trainer

Veteran member of the staff is Trainer Rod Kimball, who has served all but one of the last 20 years in this position. Long in experience and know-how, Rod is among the most popular men on campus.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader at Jordan High. He won letters in two sports at Utah State and BYU in his college days, and in 1937 he was chosen as trainer for Cougar teams. Since then he has traveled countless miles with BYU teams, conditioning athletes and attending their ills.



A good natured fellow, Rod takes plenty of ribbing on two counts: (1) his hairless head, and (2) his large family of 11 sons and daughters.

First in Passing—Carroll Johnston, completed 72 passes of 167 attempts for 945 yards and eight TD's.

Fourth in Punting—Carroll Johnston, punted 26 times for 977 yards (a 37.6 average).

Fifth in Pass Receiving—Burt Bullock, caught a total of 22 passes for 277 yards, two TD's.

ENDS—Viewed from standpoint of veteran personnel, this position is weak. Only two lettermen, Paul Caldwell and Tom Clark, will be returning. But Kopp has four or five top prospects among sophomores. Talent is there, but shy experience.

TACKLES—Three returning lettermen are headed by Dave Hanks, one of Y's all-conference candidates. Transfer Howard Condie, along with sophomores John Kapele and Rex Reeve will strengthen this spot. Could be one of the strong line positions.

GUARDS—Sophomores will make presence felt here. Lonnie Dennis, Jay Goldman, Paul Eckel and George Kinder are four sophs who have edge in two guard slots. Cats could be in fine shape if these boys meet expectations.

CENTERS—Four veterans will share ball-snapping load. Lynn Reading, a junior, has edge over other lettermen Bob Olson, Paul Dalebout and Tom Phillips. Competition at center will be keen, so this should be one of strong positions in the line.

QUARTERBACKS — Carroll Johnston, two-year veteran, should be headed for greatest year. The Startin brothers, Wayne and Ron, and Don Dixon lend good depth. Dixon is a two-year letterman, Wayne won letter last year, Ron is a sophomore. Should be improved over '56 unit.

HALFBACKS—Raynor Pearce is only senior among eight candidates. Sophomores Joe McGinn, Keith Hubbs, Wayne Chamberlain, Howard Ringwood, and Verl Shell are all fine prospects. Burt Bullock and Larry Regis are returning vets. Not much size, but excellent speed, mobility. Only experience is needed here.

FULLBACKS—Two returning lettermen in Weldon Jackson and Steve Campora. R. K. Brown, however, has edge for starting berth. All three are juniors. Fourth candidate, Ralph Reese, is a sophomore. In terms of experience, ability and depth, this is strong position.

It's a gridiron axiom that the team making the fewest mistakes will win. If the Cougars are to be measured by such a standard, they may not realize that degree of success, because they will be suiting up a sophomore team this fall, and sophomores are expected to make mistakes.

Consequently the sophomore element becomes the number one consideration in a pre-season appraisal of the Cougars. A total of 24 sophomores are listed on the 47-man roster, which means more than half the team candidates have yet to play in a varsity contest. For this reason it would be folly to class the Brighams among the contenders.

There is a ray of light breaking through on the football horizon, however, and there is every reason to believe the Cougars will make some big improvements over last year's record.

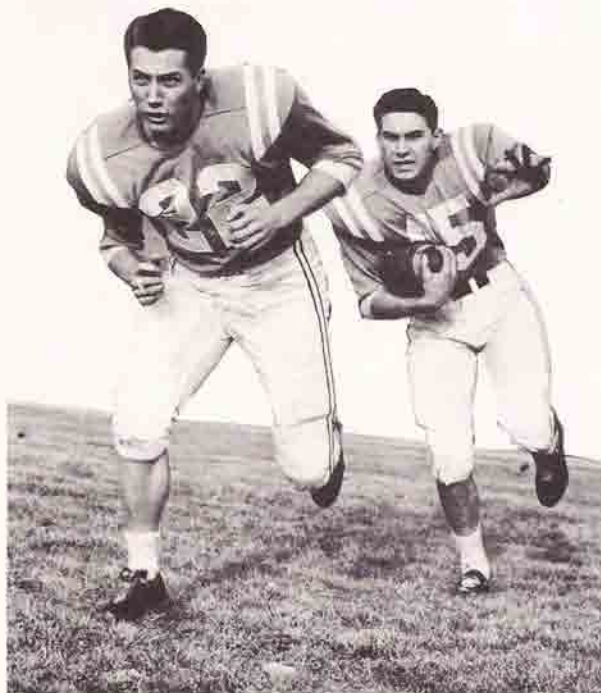
Strangely enough, the mounting swell of enthusiasm at Cougarville is due in large measure to this same crop of sophomores. These newcomers, who were undefeated in four freshman games last year, including a win over Utah, seem to have everything but experience. When combined with returning lettermen, they give Kopp the kind of team depth needed to wage Skyline battles for more than two or three quarters of each game. The talent, green and inexperienced as it is at this stage of the game, is among the finest ever seen at BYU.

The line will be good-sized and deep from end to end, although only two regulars from last year will be returning as starters. There is a chance three sophomores and a transfer will be among the seven starters, and Tom Clark will likely be the only senior on the first string line.

With receivers like Clark, Paul Caldwell, Dick Woolstenhulme, and Burt Bullock as targets, Carroll Johnston should have another great year at quarterback. Lettermen Wayne Startin and Don Dixon will back up Johnston with the signal-calling.

All but two of the eight halfback candidates—Raynor Pearce and Burt Bullock—are sophomores. Ball carriers like Keith Hubbs, Joe McGinn, Howard Ringwood, and Wayne Chamberlain are blessed with great speed, and R. K. Brown, should be more than adequate at fullback. Although the backfield is not too beefy, it has tremendous speed and a few pretty fair power runners.

The Cougars may confound even the most astute forecasters before the season is over. But one thing seems sure: win or lose, it's unlikely the Cats will be caught in a dull game.

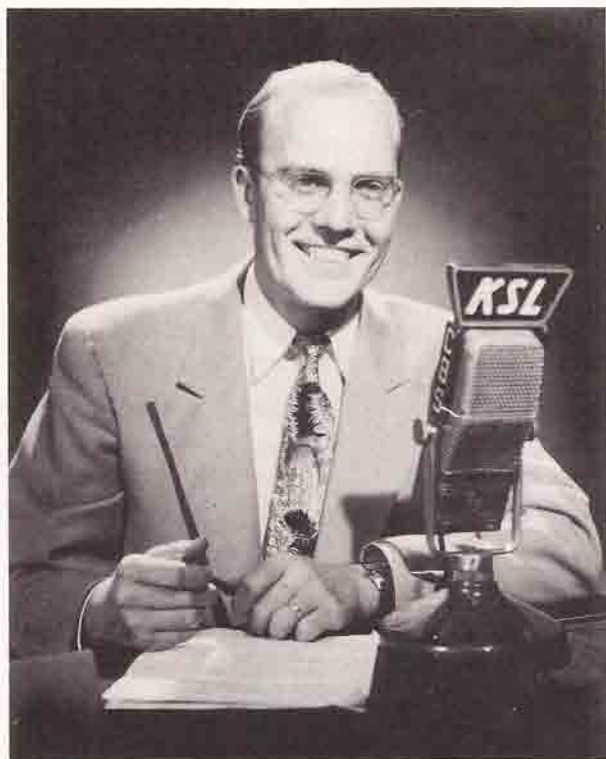
