Brigham Young University's head football coach, Charles "Chick" Atkinson, a former all-around athlete from Idaho University who is now in his seventh season at the Cougar helm, has practically a new staff of assistants for the 1955 season. Owen Dixon, for the past two years head freshman coach, joins the varsity along with two new Atkinson assistants, Wally Nalder and Max Tolbert. Dave Crowton, veteran BYU coach, is the fifth member of the coaching team. (Reed Nilsen, former line coach, accepted a position at Los Angeles State, and Bob Bunker, former end coach, is now full-time freshman basketball coach for the Cougars.)

In length of service, Chick Atkinson is one of the foremost coaches in Skyline Conference, yet one of the youngest in years.

Chick came to BYU from Pocatello High School in 1949 where his prep teams won 38 games against 11 defeats. A graduate of Pocatello High, he ranks as one of the finest all-around athletes to come out of Southern Idaho. Chick attended both Idaho State College and the University of Idaho, winning letters in four sports at both schools. He obtained B.S. and M.S. degrees at Moscow, captained the baseball and basketball teams, was selected on Pacific Coast all-conference team, and was president of letterman's club.

During World War II Chick served with the Army. Today he holds the rank of captain in the reserves. Chick

and his wife, Ann, have three children, two boys and a girl.

Wally Nalder, who will be taking over the Cougar back-field coaching duties, is a former all-conference guard from the University of Utah. He won all-America honorable mention his junior and senior years with the Utes. Before coming to BYU Wally was head football coach and director of athletics at Eastern Arizona Junior College, Thatcher, Ariz.

Regarded by a host of critics as the best small guard to come out of Utah, Nalder and his Eastern Arizona crew compiled a 20-10 record in three seasons. Last year his team was considered for participation in the Little Rose Bowl.

Nalder is a native of Layton, Utah, and attended Davis High School where he won all-state honors. He served in the armed forces during 1945 and 1946.

Max Tolbert is a native of Fayetteville, Pa., where he won letters four sports as a high school athlete. He came to BYU in 1948 and lettered in football for three consecutive seasons. In his senior year the Cougars chalked up a 6-3-1 record, and Max played a total of 456 minutes, considerably more than any of his teammates. He played both offensive and defensive right end under the old two platoon system. For the past three years Max has been head baseball coach and assistant football coach at Murray High School.

Owen Dixon is one of those coaches who lives and breathes football the year around. Two years ago Owen piloted the B. Y. High Wildcats into the state finals. All conference guard with the Cougars in the years following World War II, Dixon is an ardent follower and student of the game. After graduation from the University he joined the B. Y. High coaching staff where his team won the regional title and moved into the state football playoffs. His club missed the state title by one touchdown. Since joining the BYU staff in 1953, Owen has turned out consistently strong freshman football teams for the Cougars.

During winter and spring quarters at BYU you'll find Dave Crowton working with the Cougar baseball team or talking about the new baseball diamond being constructed north of the football stadium. Dave works tirelessly with Coach Atkinson in the capacity of assistant coach.

He also knows his athletic relations, having been active with frosh clubs and prep players for a number of years. In his prep days Dave played for Granite High School where he captained the squad in 1930. From 1938 to 1948 Dave took over coaching duties at B. Y. High School, winning the state basketball title just prior to moving into the college ranks.

Rod Kimball is the man whose job it is to keep the football team and other BYU athletic teams in sound physical shape. Of course fall is Rod's most difficult season, especially with scores of varsity and freshman footballers to tape and doctor.

Rod's athletic career started at Jordan High School in 1929. He was president of his junior and senior class, also student body president. He lettered three years in football, baseball, and two years in basketball and track. He lettered at both Utah State and BYU, and was selected as BYU trainer in 1937. Rod takes a lot of kidding from the athletes and coaches because of his large family—he has eleven children—and balding head. But he takes it in his easy-going stride. He is one of the most liked men on the campus.

GROUND GAME: Scatbacks Phil Oyler, Gary LaComb, Jim Crittenden, Bob Bills, Will Stolworthy, for speed. LeGrand Young, and fullbacks for power plays.

PASSING GAME: Bob Olson will be doing most of the flipping, along with quarters Don Dixon, Carroll Johnston, and others. Oyler and Overstreet may pass from halfback slots.

KICKING: Jay Weenig on kickoffs, Weenig and Ken Gomm on PAT's.

FROM THE CATS . . .

SIGNS OF IMPROVEMENT

At first glance it looks like a good year for "building" at Cougarville. There are 23 first-year players on the roster, half a dozen others playing the Atkinson T-formation for the first time, and big holes left by seniors and other regulars no longer with the Cats. Church missions and the armed services have further depleted the Y grid ranks.

Despite arguments to the contrary, the Cougars can be sized up as something more than nuisance value in the coming football campaign. The three returning members of last year's starting eleven—Jay Weenig, Ralph Powers and Phil Oyler will be augmented by (A), five former lettermen returning from the service, (B) a couple of promising transfer students, and (C) a group of determined, promising young gridders up from last year's fine freshman squad. Add to this Coach Atkinson's own evaluation of the 1955 squad—"slightly improved over last year's team"—and you have the brighter side of the BYU picture.

True, the '55 squad has obvious personnel problems. The squad as a whole, is green. The tackles and flanks need seasoned help and greater depth, and the key quarterback position appears vulnerable from several standpoints. On the other hand, the guard and center slots are well manned, and the two halfback positions are loaded with some of the fastest ball-carriers ever seen in Skyline competition. The fullbacks, too, will stand comparison with those of recent seasons.

The fact that practically no position is "cinched" by any player this fall is a wedge Atkinson and staff are using to squeeze the best performances possible from the BYU charges.

Bob Olson, who was injured before last year's campaign was underway, looms as the man most likely to engineer the Y's dilating offense. And such scatbacks as Oyler, Gary LaComb, Jim Crittenden, Bob Bills, Willard Stolworthy, should give the opposition plenty of anxious moments. LeGrand Young and fullbacks like John Velasco, Ken Gomm, Roy Jones, and others, will be shouldering the Cats' power running.

With a preponderance of young, inexperienced players to work with, the '55 squad may be a little slow in coming. But once they are rolling, the path leading out of the second division may be easier to find, if it's not too late in the season.

Meanwhile the pressure will be on those clubs favored over the Cougars. And with the only direction to travel being up, the Cougars should be in line for a better season than they had in 1954.

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY

Located at Provo, Utah

CAMPUS: Brigham Young University is located in Provo, Utah, a city of nearly 30,000 which increases considerably during the school year. Located in the northeast section of Provo, the campus is split into two campuses. Campus property covers nearly 400 acres. Provo is bordered by Utah Lake on the west, 12,000-ft. Mt. Timpanogos on the north, and the Wasatch mountains in the east.

FOUNDING: Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon).

ADMINISTRATION: Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson president; Dr. Wesley P. Lloyd, dean of students. The university is governed by a Church Board of Trustees.

ENROLLMENT: Over 7,000 total last year. Co-educational.

STADIUM: The Y Stadium is located north of the campus proper. It is built on the side of University Hill, facing west. Seating capacity, including the temporary bleachers on the west side of the field, is around 10,000.

SCHOOL COLORS: Royal Blue and White.

TEAM NICKNAMES: Cougars, Cats, etc.

CONFERENCE: Mountain States Intercollegiate Athletic Association, better known as the "Skyline Conference." The conference includes Wyoming University, Colorado A&M, Denver University, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural College, Montana State University, and New Mexico University. The latter two joined the conference in 1951. E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah.

SCHOOLS and COLLEGES: Graduate School, College of Applied Science, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Commerce, College of Fine Arts, College of Education, Division of Religion, Extension Division, School of Nursing, School of Engineering. Credits from the university are recognized nationally.

SCHOOL SONG: "The Cougar Song" is the official fight song.
