PREFACE

Since 1921, when Brigham Young University entered Rocky Mountain Conference football, zealous Cougars have built up football tradition around a university steeped in tradition.

Teams have come and gone, but each has contributed to the preservation of a Cougar reputation for courage and will to win. Each has maintained a traditional, genuine appreciation of the merits of every victorious opponent and the sportsmanship and calibre of every defeated one. Although tradition has placed University of Utah games as the most important of each season, creditable performances by other opponents, too, have made Cougarites deem them all important.

1942 gave to the "Big Seven" Brigham Young's most recent team, and 1946 brings to it, now the Mountain State Conference, the "Y's" first contribution to postwar football. In the interim between those two seasons, the coaching staff, consisting of Edwin R. Kimball, Wayne Soffe, Floyd Millet, Art Gilbert and Ferron R. Losee, while focusing all attention to active war service (with the the execption of Floyd Millet), looked forward eagerly to a revival of the Blue and White on the gridiron. No more appropriate tribute could be paid now with our efforts and gratitude those Cougars who have made football history in previous years and world history in foreign lands.

SKETCHES OF COACHES

Edwin R. "Eddie" Kimball Head Coach

Eddie Kimball, prefessor of physical education, director of athletics and head coach, has a mien that suggests he likes being "one of the boys." His friendly, ready smile is one of the many aftributes that make him popular with his colleagues, players, and friends. Love of the football game has garnished Eddie's 10 years of Brigham Young University football. He coached for six years and has a coaching record of 21 games won, 15 lost, and 6 tied. He was given a four-year military leave from 1942-1946, during which time he was the first physical training and military training officer for Commander Fleet Aviation on the west coast; was in charge of physical, military, survival, recreation, and welfare for all Naval Aviation from San Diego through the Aleutian Islands, and in the Pacific Ocean; and was staff officer for Commander Air Force, Pacific Fleet.

Before succeeding G. Ott Remney in 1937 as Head Coach and Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University, Eddie built a reputable record in competitive athletics there. He had been active in four sports at Jordan High School, Sandy, Utah. They were no less than the "Big Four," and Eddie won letters in each. On the Cougar teams of '23, '24, and'25, he played regular end and was captain of the 1925 grid team.

Eddie graduated from B.Y. U. in 1926, with a degree in Accounting and business, and a minor in Physical Education. He began coaching at Millard County High School and produced three winning teams. Next, as coach at Jordon High, he developed three state football championship teams from 1931 to 1935, one of which went on to become Southwest champions. It was in 1934 that he received a Master's Degree in Physical Education at the University of Southern California.

Coaching is far more than just a job to Eddie Kimball, and he has returned to the realm of college football with profound zest and high hope for a brand of ball unequalled before in his already colorful coaching career.

SKETCHES OF COACHES (Continued)

Wayne Soffe Assistang Coach

Wayne Soffe is "home" again after a service sojourn for four years. He joined the Navy in June, 1942, and served as Director of Athletics at the Naval Air Station at Whidley Island, California, and was in charge of the survival program for fleet units attached to CASU 33. He was discharged on August 15, 1946 and will once again combine his knowledge and techniques in coaching football and wrestling at B.Y.U.

One of the youngest members of the 1946 coaching staff, personable Wayne Sofferbegan coaching in 1938, and had been ably performing thus for six years. During this time he received a Master's Degree in Physical Education at B.Y.U. to academically supplement his athletic achievements.

In 1934, Wayne graduated from Jordan High School, where he participated in football and basketball, and was named on several all-state teams in both sports. After regular spot on the B.Y.U. eleven for three years, he was named captain in 1937, his senior year, and in this same year he was named on several all-conference teams for his work at end. Wayne is now Instructor in Physical Education and Assistant Athletic Coach.

Floyd Millet Assistant Coach, Scout

With the transferring of members of the "Y" coaching staff to various service stations during the war, Floyd Millet assumed the menter duties in football during 1942. Now it falls his lot to assist in coaching and perform the important functions of scouting.

Floyd came to Brigham Young University as a student in 1931, from Gila College, Thatcher Arizona. Here he starred in basketball, football, and track, winning honors in all, including selection to an all-conference basketball team. After graduating in 1933, he coached at Davis High School, Kaysville, Utah, and produced great football teams, and in 1937, a state championship basketball team. Since '37, he has come through with two track and field championship teams in the Western Division of the Mountain States Conference.

Floyd received an M S. degree at the University of Southern California in 1939, and did graduate work at B.Y.U., U.S.A.C., and U.S.C. He has been on the B.Y.U. athletic staff for approximately nine years, and is now Assistant Professor of Physical Education, and Coach of Basketball and Track.

Art Gilbert Trainer

Athletic trainer for B.Y.U. football squads is congenial Art Gilbert, whose buoyant spirit is a factor of personality that made him student body president of South High in his graduating year, and has remained alive throughout his student years at B.Y.U., and years as Instructor in Physical Education and Ithletics at Springville High School and Murray High School.

In high school, Art was active in football, basketball, and track, and was named on all-city teams. In college he was Freshman football captain, and co-captain in his seniorlyear. He received a B.S. Degree from B.Y.U. in 1940, and entered the Navy in 1942 in Tom Hamilton's Physical Fitness Program. His Naval Aviation service took him from Chapel Hill, N.C., to St. Mary's California, and North Island, California. Art was appointed trainer at B.Y.U. in the spring of this year.

Ferron C. Loseo Graduate Manager of Athletics

The job of a graduate manager is no mean one, and at Brigham Young Univ. it has fallen to a man whose experience and athletic background qualify him to efficiently transact the business peculiar to college athletics.

"Los" graduated from B.Y.U. in 1936 with a B.S. Degree. He received his M S. Degree at the University of Southern California in 1938. Roosevelt High School knew him as its Director of Athletics and Physical Education from 1936-37, but lost him to Weber follege, where his services included swiming and track coaching and intramural sports directorship.

Other experience prior to appointment as Graduate Manager of Athletics at Brigham Young University, include that of field representative of the American Red Cross, Recreation Director, Las Vegas, Nevada, and, like most of his B.Y.U. coaching staff colleagues, United States Nevy Athletic instructing.

SKETCHES OF PLAYERS

REED NILSEN - Reed came to the B.Y.U. campus before the war, and began playing at the fullback post. It wasn't long before Coach Kimball had moved him to the center position, where he gained all-conference honors. He's back this year, hard as nails, and is expected to outshine his previous accomplishments. Married, he attended Provo High School.

LARRY REED - 21-year old Larry from Clinton, Indiana, is a new man on the Cougar squad, and has an end assignment with the boys. His 6'4" and 220 pounds of versatility equip him for basketball as well as football. He has had five years of football experience in high school and in the Navy. Larry is majoring in Physical Education.

CWEN DIXON - "Jokey" is considered one of the outstending guards on the squad. He was Cougar co-captain and all-conference guard in 1941, and is classed as one of the mainstays of the team. He is now doing graduate work in Physical Education.

DON BUSHORE -Blond Don is one of the youngest members of the Couger clan. Quarterback is a new assignment for this New Jersey lad, majoring in Physical Education. He is a freshman at the Y.

JAMES KIETZMAN - "Kietz" is enother contribution from New Jersey. He's a Junior at school, and is a veteran of Navy Service. Jim's job will be on the end spot in the line.

FRED WHITNEY - One of the Salt Lake City additions to the Cougars is "Eli" or as some prefer, "Jock" Whitney. "Jock" has blue eyes and black hair. He is a sophomore, studying pre-med. He played fullback in '42, scored in the victorious game against the Utes.

RALPH ROBERTS - /nother asset to the backfield is halfback Ralph Roberts, from the neighboring town of Lehi. Ralph is interested in baseball, basketball, track, tennis, softball, and swimming, as well as football. He is majoring in Civil Engineering.

MAHLON RASMUSON - Another of the local lads to be listed with the Cougar competitors is 22-year old M-hlon Rasmuson. "Rass" is well-known to local fans for his shortstop position on the Provo Timps baseball team. He is majoring in Physical Education, and is a freshman.

GLEN CLARK - From subnarines to pigskin service comes Glen Clark, veteran of three years football, basketball and track experience in high school. Glen is an addition to the Cougar Backfield.

NORMAN MARCHANT - Wyoning's contribution is no small one. "Big Norm" of 6'2" of husky line naterial, served in the Army Air Corps, during which time he played basketball with the Bainbridge MAF all-stars.

Springville High School at tackle. Weighing well over two hundred pounds, he is expected to make a strong bid for one of the prominent reserve positions.

FRANK WHITNEY - One of the fathers of the squad, Frank also prepped at Springville High School. One of the Cougar's returning lettermen, he holds down a leading guard position.

DATE SMITH - As an all-around athlete at Thatcher High in Arizona, Smith gained several all-conference honors. While a three-year letterman there, Thatcher boasted the outstanding aggregation in its history, both in football and basketball. He ropes calves in rodeos as a side-line.

GEORGE IMBODEN - Called "Bugs" by those who know him, this lad has made a fine showing at the quarterback slot. A former halfback, he came from Long Beach with brother Earl.

CECTL LLOYD - Alternating at quarterback and halfback, "Ceece" gained all-state honors last year at Preston, Idaho. His major is as yet undecided, but hopes to go into business.

LOUIS MAIBEN - Maiben is another neighbor to the B.Y.U. campus, claiming Springville for his home. / halfback, weighs 160 pounds.

DWIGHT STAPLEY- "Dimp" was learning the fundamentals of Coach "Eddie" Kimball's new formation last spring; was termed as a wonderful prospect, and is still considered one. He was an outstanding athlete at Mesa, arizona, and is studying pre-law.

ROSS VIEHWEG- Starting out as a fullback, the coaching staff has moved Ross to the center post. Calls Weston, Wyo., as his home, but attended Brigham Young High School.

LYLE KOLLER - Although only eighteen, Koller has spent time in the Navy and is back in school to get an education. He was named on every all-state team here in Utah at the halfback spot, but has been converted into a quarterback.

STAN STAPLEY - A transfer from Utah University where he copped allconference honors, Bish" is now playing for the blue and white Cougar team. Standing six feet, two inches tall and weighing 230 pounds, he will be of tremendous importance at his tackle position.

FLOYD RICHARDSON - Another fellow who wasn't playing right position, Richardson was shifted to the wings from his halfback shoes. A 22-year old freshman.

ROY BOULTER - From Price, Utah, comes this giant tackle. Roy will be making a good addition to Young's forward wall.

JACK PRICE - Out of four sons, Jack is Mr. and Mrs. Price's only redhead. He has more nicknames than any other player on the team, some of which are "Red", "Brickwall", "Carrot Top," and "Rusty." Jack is a sophomore and his major is Geology. He served on an L.D.S. mission in California.

DON CHAVES - Don's sports interests branch into the fields of basketball and tennis, as well as football. He's a veteran of the Navy Sea Bees, and will play in fullback position for the Y.

GAYLE HOLT - Inother lineman is Navy veteran Gayle Holt, from Riverton, Utah, who is one of the several 6'4" Cougars on the squad this season. He tips the scale at 210 pounds.

FIELDING ABBOTT - Fielding likes veriety in his lettering, and earned letters in high school in football, tennis, basketball, and swimming. He'll handle the ball at center position.

BRUCE CSBORNE- Fullback Bruce Osborne is expected to give Coach Kimball a pleasing performance this season. He lettered in football at the Utah State Agricultural College in 1942, and is a veteran of the Marine Corps.

J. ELLIOT CAMERON - "Cormy" is another lineman that will bear watching this season. His football past includes being named all-state center for three years while in high school, and all-conference fullback for Intermountain Junior Colleges. He's a veteran of 41 months of service with the United States Medical Corps.

DEAN CALL - Deen is a telented sophomore, majoring in Agriculture at the Y. At 19, he has participated in drama, FFA public speaking, held offices in district and state associations, played violin, bass violin and bass horn in high school orchestras, and received three letters for football in high school.

RAY MILLER - Another former star of Springville High School, Miller is trying out for the end slot. Friendly, he is known for his enthusiasm.




