Personal use Christmas tree cutting permits are available in the Plumas National Forest. For information, please call the ranger station in Quincy at (530) 283-0555 or in Blairsden at (530) 836-2575. For the price of \$10.00 per tree, you will receive a map of the Christmas tree cutting areas, regulation, and a permit.

Burn permits are no longer needed for dooryard burning. You still need to check the Department of Air Quality for burn day status. During business hours, call the North Yuba Ranger Station for burn status information. After hours or on weekends please call the appropriate count:

Journey Home Hospice wants to extend a big thank you to the local farmers! The Camptonville community gardens and produce market at Rebel Ridge set aside a percentage of their proceeds and generously donated it to the Camptonville School and the Hospice. A special thanks to Jimbo Garrison, whose homemade pickles were a huge success. Farmers rock!

Journey Home is committed to making compassionate end-of-life care at home within reach of all members of our community. We have developed our volunteer program to respond to the needs of hospice patients in our unique rural setting. The following services are offered at no charge to patients or their families: community education, skilled nursing, community caregiver referrals, family advocacy, volunteer support such as respite for caregivers, shopping, transportation, and bereavement support. We also offer referral to our local lodging for the hospice patient unable to stay in his/her own home. We believe with these services in place, families can remain together in their home when a loved one is dying. With hospice support in the home:

- \* A safe and personalized environment can be achieved at the end of life when the medical system can do no more.
- \* People facing the end of life and their caregivers are empowered by the knowledge of what to do at home.
- \* Patients and family members no longer feel isolated and alone in their situation.
- \* Patient and family/caregiver have access to twenty-four hour on call nursing services.
- \* Patients need for equipment, supplies and support services are evaluated.
- \* Volunteer support can provide respite care and companionship for patients, and relief for family and caregivers.
- \* Volunteer bereavement and grief support can ease the challenges for families after the loss of a loved one.

All our services are supervised and supported by our medical director, hospice nurse and trained volunteers. On-going bereavement support is available every 1st Monday of the month or by appointment. For information please call 288-1234.

#### Club Live Update




