Funds still available to help pay for medical and dental care

Do you know someone in Camptonville who could use help paying for medical or dental treatment? Please help us spread the word while funds are still available, the *Camptonville Community Partnership* (at the C'V Resource Center) has a grant to assist Camptonville residents in getting medical and dental treatment at the Sierra Family Clinics in North San Juan, and the Western Sierra Clinics in Downieville.

Here's how it works: If you live in the 95922 zip code, are low income, and do not have health insurance or Medi-Cal that covers medical or dental care, you can call either clinic and see if you are eligible. If so, make your appointment using the "Camptonville Rural Health Grant," and the grant will pay for up to \$100 per office visit.



Mental Health Training Program update

In June of 2003, The Camptonville Community Partnership received a grant from The California Endowment – Local Opportunities Fund. This provided monies to develop and present mental health trainings to the Yuba County Home Visitors at the Family Resource Centers (FRC's). In addition, school staff, EMT's and other paraprofessionals were invited to attend the training relevant to their work.

Background:

Mental Health Program staff developed a survey asking the FRC's to identify their training needs. Staff compiled the results and then developed and presented the identified trainings/workshops. The following is a listing of the workshops that have been presented: Building Family Self-Esteem, Recovery Issues in the Foothills, Anger Management, Crisis Intervention, CPR, and Addiction and the Enneagram. Staff has been developing monthly articles for the Courier on Mental Health Issues and or Recovery information. A "Recovery Resource List" was developed and mailed out in the February, 2004 issue. In addition, paraprofessionals and a supervisor attended "Helping Families Make Every Dollar Count."

We have had great success and the workshops have all been rated as excellent. The Recovery Issues in the Foothills resulted in an on going AA meeting. The meeting is held every Tuesday at the Camptonville Resource Center at 7:00 to 8:30 pm. We are currently revamping our Resource Library and when that is completed, we will have many books and booklets on recovery issues that residents will have access to.

Currently, staff are developing a workshop" Family Self-Esteem" to be held October 1, 2004 at the Yuba County Office of Education FRC in Marysville. The workshop was requested by the FRC'S that attended the "Building Family Self-Esteem". This workshop will bring together the homevisitor and a family member or member(s) to better understand the challenges that come with developing self-esteem within a family. We have been encouraged by our success and we will be applying for another grant to present more trainings/workshops. Look for further information in the Courier.

You can't drive from Camptonville to Catalunya or I'd be there by now. After spending 8 ½ months in Spain without ever getting behind the wheel of a car I've really shifted gears in the 3 ½ months I've been back, putting in over 8 ½ thousand road miles. So if I haven't greeted you except with a wave from the highway it's because I haven't been here, or because I've been trying to be in two places at once.

Being here in Camptonville is a constant stream of small pleasures and treasures: Jocelyn's graduation from Camptonville school, spending time with my older kids, colleagues and friends at school, greeting friends and neighbors on the street or at the post office, falling in step with my neighbor Nellie Clark on our morning walk as if we'd never missed a day, a quiet evening by myself processing books in the library, a morning with Nellie and her great grandkids doing the same, still another with Jocelyn and our two visitors from Spain, the 300 processed books that our joint efforts added up to, fresh air, fresh fruit from our orchard, flowers from the disheveled garden, the taste of our water, the view along the river canyons that never grows old no matter how many water polo practices, soccer practices, soccer camps, soccer clinics you've driven to this week.

But the Catalunya/Camptonville connection remains strong. Roger still being there is, of course, the most powerful pull, but we also had a 14-year-old teammate from Jocelyn's soccer team in Spain, and the 19-year-old brother of the young woman who studied English with me come to visit us this summer (Our excursions account for a lot of those highway miles). They marveled at the tall trees, the wild rivers and mountains, and, of course, the distance to town, the distance to anywhere. They fell in love with fresh corn on the cob, their favorite taste treat, followed in close pursuit by chocolate chip cookies, Japanese sushi, Chinese wor won ton soup, and blackberry pie. San Francisco, the Golden Gate Bridge, cable cars and Chinatown were their favorite tourist spots. It was a special joy to be able to return some of the hospitality, friendship and generosity that was lavished upon us while we were in Catalunya and which Roger continues to receive.

To keep the foothold in two worlds Roger and I both spend a lot of time glued to the computer trading back and forth sections of the latest medical document whose translation has kept us without enough sleep 3 nights running, and the 4th night we're still up late on the phone, because it's the first time in days we've had a chance to talk. Only it's my late night and his early morning, and he's dashing off to Barcelona for 10 days at the Parliament of the World's Religions conference, or else gearing up for the next deadline. And it's not clear even where the middle is; let alone how to get it tied. In fact, the only clarity seems to be that the effort is worth it. It's what we are supposed to be attempting right now—the Camptonville/Catalunya connection.

But if you see me on the road, wave; and if you see me in person, remind me that you can't get there by driving. But if you get a chance to see Jocelyn on the soccer field you'll know why all those little trips up and down the canyon are worth it. And if you were privy to some of the car talk, you'd understand how driving is not all that bad!

Downieville Ranger District By Betty Leffew

We have had a hot and dry summer. Several of our folks are out helping with fire suppression efforts. We are experiencing very high fire danger. This is one of the driest years on record. Be extra careful.

Due to extremely dry fuel conditions, the Tahoe National Forest is preparing to implement additional fire restrictions on August 25, 2004. These record dry conditions are predicted to continue for several more months and are a public safety concern. So far this summer we have had numerous fires in our area that have damaged or destroyed homes. Some of these are: the Carson City Fire, Colfax Fire, Oroville Fire, and several fires near Redding that have left many people homeless.

New fire restrictions will include:

Wood/charcoal fires permitted in exempted, designated sites only. The use of gas, jellied petroleum, or pressurized liquid fuel will be permitted in designated sites only. Internal combustion engines will be restricted to roads only. Fuel wood cutting with chainsaws will be suspended. OHV use will be restricted to National Forest System roads only. Smoking will be limited to enclosed vehicles or buildings, or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable material in designated sites only.

Tools or machinery powered by internal combustion engines in use on or near forest, brush, or grass covered land must have one round point shovel or fire extinguisher within 25 feet of operation.

For further information on fire restrictions or fire safety, please call the North Yuba Ranger District Office during business hours Monday through Friday at 288-3231.

Indian Valley Campground will be closed from September 9th to 17th for paving of the road and camping spurs. Sometime during September the Dark Day boat ramp access road will be closed due to construction (to widen and pave the road) through the fall. If you have questions, please call Heather Newell at 288-3232.

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Please be cautious in the woods as Squirrel season opened August 7th extending through the last Sunday in January. Deer season opens in areas D3, D4 & D5 on September 25th through October 31st. All Forest Service employees can validate your deer tag. The ranger station has hunting regulation brochures available.

Fire safety at home

A minimum of 30' clearance around our homes and structures is required. Clearances of 100' or more is recommended, especially on slopes.

Keep roofs clear of needles and debris and remove 'ladder' fuels from surrounding vegetation.

Use good judgment when using power tools and internal combustion engines, especially during the heat of the day. One of the fires, which ravaged the Shasta/Redding area recently was started by a lawnmower.




Water, water
