Children's Roundtable Report

Here is the news from the September Children's Roundtable, a Sacramento monthly statewide get-together of children's advocates to help us understand legislative policy issues that effect our children.

<u>The California State Legislative session ended</u> September 9, 2005.

If you would like to make a comment on a certain bill contact the Governor before October 9, 2005. He has 30 days after the legislative session ends to sign Bills.

Here are a couple of bills regarding children's health now on the Governor's desk:

<u>HEALTHY KIDS PROGRAM</u>: AB772 (Chan/Frommer) would expand and protect health insurance coverage for all California children.

<u>HEALTHY KIDS FUND</u>: AB1199 (Frommer/Chan) would create a fund for children's health coverage.

Of course we spoke about Hurricane Katrina.

The State has issued a All County Letters (I-52-05 and I-53-05) September 7 to health and human services agencies that essentially says hurricane evacuees coming into CA must be treated expeditiously if they request benefits in CA even if they lack documentation. The full letter can be viewed at

But that was not where the subject ended. There were deep emotions; "This will be in our hearts and minds for a very long time." Some comparisons between 911 and the hurricane, "There is a whole different quality and quantity than 911"

And a window of opportunity, affirmative opportunities, Kim Wade of Food Banks "With 911 we had the Patriot Act. What we need now is the Poverty Act. Proposition 73. Waiting Period and

Parental Notification Before Termination of

Minor's Pregnancy -- State of California

(Initiative Constitutional Amendment)

Should the California Constitution be amended to require notification of the parent or legal guardian of an unemancipated, pregnant minor at least 48 hours before performing an abortion on the minor?

Folks on both sides of the issue were invited to speak.

No one showed for the Yes on 73 side. Planned Parenthood presented No on 73, calling this "A campaign for teen safety" and saying, "Cutting out access to safe legal medical care is not the route to go, especially if a child cannot go to a parent or a judge." We were reminded that this was about parental notification not parental consent. A story as told concerning a teen in Indiana who was an exceptional student who got an illegal abortion. She died from an infection. Her parents could not believe she didn't come to them. But she couldn't bare the thought of letting them down. This was not a teen that was in an abusive parent/child relationship.

Others concerns had to do with the fact that this initiative would cause a court backlog if a teen chose the court exemption, which was felt to be impractical. "Courts are not well equipped to handle cases. "If a child could not go to a parent then how could they be expected to go before a judge?"

The comments were made "This is about the health and safety of a minor child. Does any parent want to put their child in jeopardy because they are afraid to tell? "" If we want abortion to be reduced, it's education that will do it. Not this law."



Critter Corner Local Rider and Horse -Champions on the Trail By Katie Jacobson

Camptonville resident of 10 years, Debra Foote, and Arabian beauty Nabiyyah (noble in Arabic), her horse, are NATRC champions. NATRC stands for North American Trail Ride Conference. Debra won the 2002 title for her division (up to 189 pounds including tack) and region, Northern California to Alaska. Nabiyyah won reserve champion in the horse category.

NATRC is competitive trail riding. There are 7 or 8 events a year and each event is roughly 20 miles long. Entries are timed and are judged at natural obstacles like creek embankments.



The rider is judged for horsemanship, crossings and going up or down steep terrain, etiquette on the trail and following safety rules. The horse is judged for attitude, hydration, and way of moving.

There are 5 vet checks at different locations during each event. Vets grade the entries and also make sure that horses are sound.

Debra has one more event in October and is hoping to win the 2005 championship as well. She explains that she used to ride "Endurance" which is 50 mile ride. She prefers NATRC. "It's safer for the horse, with less possibility of injury...and also I am older!" She adds that you get to see spectacular scenery and wildlife like wild pigs, coyotes, and deer.

She likes the camaraderie of NATRC. There are about 12 people in the Nevada City-Grass Valley area that are involved in these regional events. "It's a good family sport, like for child and parent or husband and wife...and it's great to achieve a goal with your buddy!" (the horse that is).

With the price of fuel skyrocketing, what better time than now to learn about making your own fuel from used fry oil that restaurants pay to have hauled away? The day will consist of:

An introduction to Bio-fuels, and how to make Bio-Diesel, a lunch break (Bring your own bag lunch) and finally how to convert your Diesel vehicle to run on used veggie oil.

If there is sufficient interest, we will schedule a hands-on follow-up workshop and Devin will teach us how to build a Bio-Diesel Processor!




"Say goodbye to your tired, old, lifeless resume and say hello to a sharp, effective resume".

The first meeting of the Camptonville Co-op took place last week. Those in attendance were: Katy Jacobson, Molly Spackman, Lisa McCandless, Shera Blume and Carol Holland. Look for the meeting notes on bulletin boards at the Post Office, Lost Nugget, Lost Luigi's and Rebel Ridge Market. Together, we banged out some of the rules and assigned points to various tasks. Some were interested in pet sitting, childcare and garden work (watering, landscaping etc)..... other tasks will include going to town and doing an errand, log splitting type manual labor and maybe even computer help. For instance, I may need help moving a large object and could enlist the help of someone who has signed up.

I was in a co-op for 7 years and really enjoyed getting to meet my neighbors and creating a real community!

Basically when you need a task done you call whoever is the secretary. The secretary scans the list and finds the person who has the most points and can do the job. (You can say no but if you accrue more than 50 points you can't request help until you whittle it down by serving others.)

When the secretary finds a person the two are given phone numbers and can meet to discuss what is needed. This meeting can take place at one of our 2 restaurants if need be...just to make sure both are comfortable with each other..... or at the home to get the "lay of the land".

Once the job is done the person who helped will call the secretary and the point accounting will take place. That person will be credited for time and work and the person whose job it was will accrue those points.

If you must drop out, and cannot work off your points, each point will be worth \$5.00. This will be paid to the secretary and then split up to the people who are owed.

This will be a great way to have some community relating and help each other out and make living in the hills as easy as it is beautiful!!

There are many of us that walk, jog and ride our bikes around town. We are constantly being chased or charged by dogs. Even if they are friendly to you or your kids, they are scary to us. There is a leash law in this town, even as small as it is. It states: If the dog is outside of your fenced yard they are to be on a leash and controlled by the owner. If you are reported to Animal Control, it will mean a \$310.00 fine and an appearance before the Judge to explain why you cannot control your dogs. Please be considerate.

Sierra Family Clinic expands

The Sierra Family Medical Clinic was awarded a \$322,393 grant from The California Endowment, a private health foundation whose mission is to expand access to affordable health care to underserved people and communities in California.

Since our dental office opened a year ago, we've been so overwhelmed by the demand for services, that the typical wait time for an appointment is more than three months. Grant funds will be used for equipment and to install another dental chair in the clinic. We will be able to see more patients, and double the hours for our dental hygienist.

We've provided care to more than 2,000 patients since we opened last year. We're able to provide these services through programs such as MediCal, Healthy Families, County Medical Services Providers, and by accepting a sliding fee scale for the uninsured and underinsured.
