Camptonville has 423 registered voters. 34 cast ballots at the polling place and 176 absentee ballots were received making the turnout 210, or 50% turnout. Locally, Hal Stocker received 136 votes to Virginia Black's 70. The total District 5 votes were Stocker's 1917 to Black's 1423.



The expansion of service is made possible by rising federal and state tax revenue for transit, as well as increased local bus ridership. Gold Country Stage ridership increased by over 15 percent in Fiscal Year 2005/06, carrying just under 284,000 passengers for the year. Some important dates to remember. September 23: Opening day of deer season in D3 zone. November 15: Sierra County streams close for fishing. November 26: Fuelwood season closes.

CPHC Children's Roundtable Report By Cathy LeBlanc

The Children's Health Committee met and wanted input. What are the highest priority health issues facing California' children today? The consensus we came to; environmental health issues such as asthma, air pollution and toxins. Please let me know your viewpoints to share with the committee.

Also stay tuned there is a Leg Day opportunity coming up with the Center for Collaborative Planning) October 20. Leg Day is an opportunity for us to speak with our Legislators at the Capitol in Sacramento. If you're interested call Cathy 288-9355.

At the general Children's Roundtable meeting we were given a Federal Legislative update on the estate tax and the presidential line item veto from David Carroll of the California Budget Project. Changes to the federal estate tax would have a major impact on the Federal budget (and therefore California) with <u>one</u> <u>trillion dollars</u> going to a small handful of the very wealthy. According to Carroll it is not a good deal and thankfully this measure doesn't have the votes needed for passage. He also said Senator Feinstein doesn't support it and we should thank her for holding on. For more information go to http://www.cbp.org/tax_bud.htm

President Bush's top priority action in the Senate is a cobbled together package of budget process reforms with only one point that will move forward, the line item veto. This would shift authority away from Congress to the President and include up to one year to decide (where as Congress has 13 days to decide) if he (the President) liked a legislative bill or not and would then be able (through this veto power) to cancel funding. It is felt that this could be used as a leverage tool in the political game, definitely miles away from our founding fathers' conception of democracy. In California the Legislative session is coming to a close at the end of the month. Anthony Wright of Health Access reported on the Governor's new found interest in healthcare and pointed out that uninsured Californians pay more than anyone for health care in the entire world. AB 2911 Nunez/ Perata and SB 1702 Perata /Nunez are 2 bills that look at helping this group using the state's purchasing power to reduce cost. For more information on this or other

Here's a Children's Health Initiative (CHI) update: Proposition 86, which will appear on the November ballot, is doing well in the polls. This proposition would increase the price of a pack of cigarettes \$2.60 and would help expand Healthy Families insurance to include folks up to 300% of the federal poverty level (FPL) also helping fund emergency rooms, child nutrition and obesity measures. Interestingly enough according to the Legislative Analyst Office (LAO) \$2.1 billion dollars are raised annually and result in 170,000 lives saved as a result of the increased cost of cigarettes!

The Yuba County Children's Council will be meeting Wed, Sept 6, at Lake Francis at 6:30 pm. The Council's focus is on the health and well being of children in the county. Parents and those who work with children are invited. They want to hear the concerns of foothill families and share ideas.






Isabelle Whittlesey, Carolyn Mumm, and Jan Jero discuss their finds at the library








Can you believe School has already started and we're harvesting our apples and grapes? Time to think safety and new batteries in your smoke detectors


