West Nile virus

A friend of ours who lives in Camptonville told us that she recently lost her unvaccinated horse to the virus. So, it can happen here.....

The following is excerpted from a press release put out in the spring by the California Department of Food and Agriculture

California's horse owners are being urged to make sure their animals are vaccinated following the confirmation of this year's first equine case of West Nile virus. The three-year-old quarter horse stallion from Tulare County died on July 4, and had not been vaccinated.

Last year, 456 horses in California were known to have contracted the disease, and 200 of them died. In the great majority of those cases the horses either were not vaccinated or were vaccinated improperly.

"This case is a signal to all of our state's horse owners that West Nile is active again this year and vaccination is the best way to protect horses," said California State Veterinarian Dr. Richard Breitmeyer. "If your horses are not vaccinated or you are not sure of their status, contact your veterinarian as soon as possible to make sure your animals' vaccinations are current."

Signs of West Nile virus in horses include stumbling, staggering, wobbling, weakness, muscle twitching and inability to stand. Horses contract the disease from carrier mosquitoes and are not contagious to other horses or people. Not every horse exposed to the virus will die.

So far this year the CFDA reported 49 cases state wide, with 22 fatalities. Two cases were reported in Yuba County and none in Nevada County.

Children's Roundtable Report By Cathy Le Blanc

The Healthcare subcommittee of the Children's Roundtable followed up on the big question of last month: What are the highest priority health issues facing California's children today?

Nancy Spradling (School Nurse) stated that statewide asthma is up and so is type 2 diabetes among our school kids. Lack of School nurses is a huge issue, especially since technological advances are allowing more kids going to school who have chronic and acute health care issues, (this issue crosses social and economic lines). She felt that the Healthcare subcommittee should raise this point and take the lead in getting these issues "out there" (to the public and policy makers).

Jean Tepperman Editor of *The Children's Advocate Magazine*, was concerned about health issues not normally brought up at the Roundtable (includes mental health too) such as: autism, maternal depression, sexual abuse and domestic violence to name a few. She then came up with the idea of working on a year long strategy, reaching out to children's advocates to help discuss and develop a platform for high priority health issues (for example air quality, obesity, nutrition, oral health, etc.) and put this into a *Children's Health Bill Of Rights* to present to the public and our policy makers.

At the General Roundtable meeting we discussed a couple of the up-coming November Ballot Propositions*.

Proposition 85 Parental Notification Constitutional Amendment Amends California Constitution to prohibit abortion for an unemancipated minor unless a physician has notified their parents, except in a legal emergency or by judicial waiver.

A year ago Californians defeated Proposition 73, with a few changes, it's back as Proposition 85. (The definition of life of the unborn is omitted in Proposition 85) The Proposition is an amendment to the California Constitution. In 1953, a state law was enacted that allowed minors to receive, without parental consent or notification, the same types of medical care for a pregnancy that are available to an adult. Because of changes in the law, this includes abortion.

Al Hernandez Santanna of the Catholic Conference supported 85 and Kathryn McLearan of Planned Parenthood offered opposition. Al said, "This is not about abortion it's about parental education." Kathryn said "thousands of teens at risk who live in dangerous violent homes are at the mercy of an over crowded court system which may not even speak their language. These kids don't need a judge they need a counselor."






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Yuba River Ranger District By Betty Leffew

With the cooler weather it is a great time to visit the district trails. The Sierra Buttes area is beautiful this time of year. The fall colors are starting to show. Motorists are urged to use extreme caution while traveling in fire traffic areas.

Fuelwood cutting is still open. You must call in to see if it is a cut day before you go out to get your wood. Remember you only have till November 26 to get your firewood cut. Dooryard burn permits are still suspended until further notice.

Bullards Bar will be closing for the season on October 15. Sites 1 through 14 in Schoolhouse and Sugar Pine in Hornswoggle group camp will remain open for use with no services and no fee. The campgrounds along Highway 49 and the high country are open until mid October.

Use caution while in the woods, as it is Deer Season. The season closes in D3, 4 & 5 on October 29th.

Bassetts Fire Information Update

Holding and mop-up efforts continue 300 feet into the fire area along the perimeter while suppression rehabilitation of handlines, dozer lines, staging areas, helispots, safety zones, drop point areas, continues in the fire area. The burned area emergency response assessment is being completed which will determine any emergency rehabilitation needed before the first major storm event to protect life, property, and natural and cultural resources. The Forest Service will begin assessing longer term recovery needs in the future. Forest Service Road 09 is closed from Gold Lake Highway east to Chapman Saddle. Deer hunting season continues in D3 and D4 zones. The fire area is closed to hunting. Beginning October 1, fire and rehabilitation information can be obtained by calling the Yuba River Ranger District at (530) 288-3231 or on the Internet at www.inciweb.org. The Tahoe National Forest Supervisor Steve Eubanks and NorCal Team II Incident Commander Bill Kaage would like to thank both the citizens and firefighters from the local communities that supported fire suppression efforts.

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Another Fall, another birthday




