The purpose for creating the Camptonville Community Health Action Plan (CHAP) is to serve as a resource to guide our community and Yuba County decision makers when they are developing the Yuba County General Plan. "CHAP," has been a yearlong, community-based, collaborative process. We consider this a "living document" that will grow and evolve as the community and outside factors change.

The plan was created through a grass roots effort, which included a wide spectrum of diverse people living here and intended to exclude no one. We feel it provides a broad base of community input.

The CHAP will be available on-line in January 2008 at www.camptonville.com. Also at that time a CHAP summary will go out to residents in the local mail.

Wendy and I will continue to keep you informed. We will be attending the Yuba County General Plan Advisory Committee meetings as the planning process continues through 2008. So stay tuned Camptonville!

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
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Thanks for your summer work By Bobbie Hollingsworth

Yuba Highlands

A letter from Hal Stocker

There is a very important issue on the ballot February 5th ---aside from deciding about Hillary, Obama, etc. --- and that is Yuba Highlands. This is a huge housing project of 5,100 houses next to Beale AFB and the Spenceville Wildlife Area. It would amount to a new city the size of Marysville (13,000 people) out in the boondocks - an egregious example of sprawl.

Speaking as your Yuba County foothills supervisor, having been in office for 13 years, my advice is to vote No on Yuba Highlands. I am firmly convinced the project is bad for the county and bad for the citizens:

- Our already bad traffic would get much worse.
- Beale and the Spenceville Wildlife Area would be seriously encroached upon.
- It would be one more bedroom community, with many people going out of county to work and spend money.
- County services would suffer, since Yuba County only gets 19% of the property taxes.
- County roads would suffer, since SACOG and Caltrans (agencies that control state and federal road money) do not approve funding for roads serving sprawl projects.
- There is a good chance the project would go belly up and cost the taxpayers a lot, because development costs in a remote area are very high.

And who needs more houses now with the market at a standstill.

In short, we need Yuba Highlands like a hole in the head.

Vote no on Yuba Highlands!

Dental News By Wendy Tinnel

Have you ever wondered what the risk of tooth decay is from bacteria in your mouth? Are you more prone to getting cavities? Well, there is hope. You can be tested and then be given some techniques to decrease those bad bacteria. The CariFree Risk Assessment is a simple and easy test; it takes about

two minutes; - one minute or less to use a cotton swab to rub on several teeth, and then another minute in the CariFree Test Meter. The test results tell if you are at low, moderate or high risk for dental decay. High risk people have several simple home care strategies to reduce that risk.

The Camptonville Dental Outreach Program is just starting to screen children and their families for the dental decay bacteria. It is a great way to get together and have some "fun" testing your family for risk of dental decay. If you are interested in trying it for yourself, want to learn what the bacteria levels are, or just go over some strategies for reducing dental decay in your children's mouths, please give me a call at the Resource Center 288-9355.

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Chicken Chronicles

Happy holidays from the rebel hen ranch! Things have quieted down here-predator wise (knock on wood!) Thanks to Skippy –dog of the hill!!! He keeps it well patrolled. The latest news is the young ladies have started laying. I just love their cute little eggs. Meanwhile, Lucy and Ruth have stopped laying eggs as they have begun their first molt. Molting is when birds lose their feathers and grow new ones. They sure look pathetic! I've been putting some chicken vitamins in their water to help boost their systems during this stressful time. I wonder why chickens molt during the colder seasons?

As, I write this article I feel very worried by the lack of rain this autumn. I know it won't last but it's a great time to take advantage of the nice weather. If you haven't done so already give your hen house a good cleaning before the weather does change. Clear out everything from the house and spray it down with a good poultry approved pyrethrum spray to help alleviate mites and lice. Some predators live on the birds others hide in cracks in your coop during the day and feed at night (vicious!) Open up the coop so it can dry out real good and let fresh air in. I then dust my coop with food grade diatomaceous earth for further precaution against bugs. If you find bugs in your nesting boxes be sure to burn the bedding before adding fresh-I always sprinkle my nesting boxes with the diatomaceous earth and change that bedding weekly. Pouring the d. earth into their dusting areas is also a great way to alleviate the little devils! Although once it's wet-it is not effective. If you have a large enough indoor space for your chickens you can make them a dusting box that won't get wet. Dusting themselves is the chicken's instinctual way of getting rid of the skin predators (they are not just playing in the dirt!) It's a good idea to check your birds too. If you see mites or evidence of bites or eggs on feathers, especially around the vent (i.e. butt) area, dust the birds with the d. earth. Easier when it's getting dark as they aren't as active-they aren't particularly fond of being dusted or sprayed. Good luck!


